2012 SEASON PREVIEW



MIZZOU PREPARES FOR AN EXCITING NEW ERA

Often times, with the start of a new football season comes hyperbolic claims about the beginning of a new era, or talk of a new future. For the University of Missouri, however, that claim is absolutely grounded in reality, as Mizzou embarks on an historic new era in 2012 with its initial season of membership in the Southeastern Conference. Missouri's move to the vaunted league – home of the last six consecutive Bowl Championship Series national champions – officially began July 1, less than eight months following the historic announcement made on the MU campus on November 6, 2011.

As it relates to Mizzou Football, Head Coach Gary Pinkel and his staff worked hard behind the scenes to get ready for the move, which encompasses much more than just Xs and Os and adjusting to offensive and defensive schemes in the SEC.

"There's several areas of making the transition, in every phase of our program," said Pinkel. "There's a transition in recruiting and recruiting areas. There's a transition in facilities, we have to make facility improvements. Salaries have got to get comparable to what we're going against in the SEC. On the football side of it, the offense and defense that we're dealing with, that's a big part of it, learning about the league and how the other programs do things, certainly," he added.

"There's a transition in scheduling, and marketing this change," Pinkel said. "We put a plan in place, and we'll make sure we do all the preparation necessary each and every day so that when we get to September we'll be ready to go. Recognizing that we're moving to a great league, I have tremendous respect for the Southeastern Conference, no question about it. It's hard to argue against it that year in and year out, it's the best league around. That being said, I think anytime you go into something new, you have to prove yourself, and you have to earn respect. That's our approach and that's what we're going to do," he said.

Fortunately for Mizzou fans, the Tiger program is in great shape heading into its new conference home. Coming off an exciting eight-win season a year ago – despite featuring a first-time starter at quarterback and a rash of injuries which took a big toll throughout the season – Mizzou looks to





continue its upward trajectory in 2012. The Tigers, under Pinkel's direction, have become one of the most consistent winners in the nation. Mizzou is just one of six schools from BCS automatic qualifier leagues who have won a minimum of eight games in each of the past six seasons (2006-11). The other five programs are a who's who of the nation's elite – LSU, Oklahoma, USC, Virginia Tech and West Virginia are the others. And it's more than just consistency, as the Tigers have won at a high level. That's evidenced by the fact that Mizzou's 48 wins in the past five seasons is tied for 9th-most in the nation from 2007-11.

Looking back at the 2011 season, Pinkel expressed admiration for his team's ability to overcome tough breaks and reach eight wins against a schedule that was ranked by the NCAA among the nation's toughest.

"We certainly had our share of adversity and we kept battling through it, when you lose those close games and with all of the injuries – I've never seen a season where our team has been impacted so much by injuries," Pinkel said. "The bottom line is, you have to deal with it, you have a plan for it and you stick to it and stay positive and you work through it. Late in the season, we're sitting there at 4-5 and we had just lost to Baylor in a close game to a real good football team at their place. We had a choice there how we'd finish the season, and I thought we really handled it well," Pinkel said.

Instead of folding, the Tigers banded together and closed the season with four wins for the first time since 1965.

"We got the Texas win and obviously the Texas Tech game was huge and then we finish it off with beating Kansas to get some momentum," Pinkel said. "Then all of a sudden we closed it out the right way and win a bowl game against a real good North Carolina team. So I thought our coaches and players did a tremendous job, I was very, very proud of them for how we battled through. We stayed positive and the leadership of our team stayed steady through it all. Anytime you win your last four games and beat a good team in a bowl game, it's a real positive for your ballclub," he added.

Pinkel believes that finishing the 2011 season so strongly will only pay dividends going forward.

"It's amazing how positive it is when you win that last bowl game, how that just runs right into everything," Pinkel said. "Does it have anything to do with next year? I don't know that it does specifically, but I'll tell you one thing, it sure beats the alternative. It definitely gives a real positive focus to the future, we certainly look at it that way," he said.

When fall practice begins in August, Tiger coaches will be taking a look at every position and the competition taking place. There are a lot broad-based goals that Pinkel achieved in the spring.

"With spring football, we looked at offensive and defensive schemes," Pinkel said. "We do that every year and that's where we begin to determine if there are things we want to adjust in terms of what we do. We look at personnel and getting the right players in the right spots, and the competition everywhere – offense, defense and special teams. One of the bigger things too, is just how the players are showing us by how they practice and perform, how close they're getting to playing at a championship level in the Southeastern Conference. That's what we're constantly looking at," Pinkel said.

As is the case with every spring practice period, there were a number of projected starters sitting out while they continued to recover from off-season surgery. The injury bug also bit a couple of projected offensive starters, as QB James Franklin was knocked out early in camp with a shoulder injury, while TE Eric Waters suffered a knee injury. Both required corrective surgery, but each is expected back in time for fall camp.

"We had several starters out with injuries in the spring, the bad news is they didn't get work, but the good news is you really give a lot of younger players a lot of extra work, focused work to improve," Pinkel said. "Ultimately when you get those other guys back, you're better off," he said.

As the roster refreshes itself each year in college football, the Tigers will certainly be looking for some young, promising talent to step to the forefront in 2012. But they'll have the luxury of playing with a solid core of veterans who should make Mizzou a contender in the SEC East this coming season.

In all, 13 starters return to the fold, with six on offense and seven on defense. Included in that





total are a couple of starters who sat out the 2011 season due to injuries – senior LT Elvis Fisher and senior LB Will Ebner. Both were awarded medical hardship waivers by the NCAA in the off-season, giving them one more much-welcomed year of eligibility.

OFFENSE OUTLOOK

The Tiger offense returns six starters from a unit which ranked 12th nationally a year ago in total offense, averaging 475.54 yards per game. With first-year starting QB James Franklin under center, the Tigers became one of the most balanced offenses in the nation, averaging 244.00 yards rushing (9th nationally, 1st in the Big 12 Conference) and 231.54 yards passing (64th nationally, 6th in the Big 12).

QUARTERBACK

There's no question that quarterback is the key cog in making the Tiger spread offensive attack hum smoothly, and junior QB James Franklin emerged as one of the nation's top playmakers a year ago. Franklin finished his initial year as a starter ranked 15th in the nation in total offense with just under 4,000 yards (3,846 for an average of 295.85 per game). He just missed out on the major achievement of becoming a 3,000-yard passer and 1,000-yard rusher, as he finished with 2,865 yards and 21 touchdowns, while running for 981 yards and adding a team-best 15 touchdowns. His 36 touchdowns accounted for ranks as the 3rd-best season in MU history. Tiger coaches are excited about the potential for continued growth by Franklin, and the fact that there is typically a big step taken in the second year as a starter in the MU system (Brad Smith went from five wins in his first year as a starter, to eight wins in his second year. Chase Daniel improved from eight wins to 12 wins, while Blaine Gabbert went from eight wins to 10 wins).

Backing Franklin up will be redshirt freshman Corbin Berkstresser, a very talented signal caller who was a prolific prep quarterback, as well as junior Ashton Glaser, who made big improvements a year ago and looks to challenge for playing time in 2012. Both Berkstresser and Glaser got snaps with the number one offense after Franklin went down, with Berkstresser pinning down the top backup spot heading into the fall.

"James' injury was unfortunate this spring, but we're confident he'll be ready to go in August. We're expecting James to become a better player," Pinkel said. "He did some great things last season, but I really don't think he's scratched the surface of how good he can be. Corbin Berkstresser is excited, he's got a great work ethic and he's very talented, and he's itching to show how good of a player he can be. Ashton Glaser is a veteran of the program who's competing in there and is very valuable to our depth. We expect both of them to go out there and compete every day with the intention of winning the job," Pinkel said.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The offensive line is charged with protecting and paving the way for Mizzou's exciting and versatile attack. Three starters from last year's line have matriculated, in RT Dan Hoch, as well as LG Jayson Palmgren and RG Austin Wuebels, but three more starters are coming back in 2012. If that seems like fuzzy math, it's nevertheless accurate, as junior LG Travis Ruth and junior RT Justin Britt are back in the fold, and they're joined by three-year starting LT Elvis Fisher, who is ready to go after sitting out all of 2011 with a knee injury he sustained last August in two-a-days. Fisher had started all 40 games MU played in the 2008-10 seasons.

"Getting Elvis Fisher back is huge, we're moving Justin to right tackle so Elvis can go back to his old spot," Pinkel said. "Justin did a great job last year, getting thrown in there when Elvis went down. It's a great story too, Justin was so excited to have Elvis back that he volunteered to move over to the right side to give Elvis back his old spot, we didn't even have to have a conversation about the possibilities. Now you have Elvis Fisher back, and he's a three-year starter, you've got Mitch Morse who played some last year which was good, Travis Ruth has tons of experience and was a starter last year, Jack Meiners has a lot of experience and Justin Britt has a lot of experience. Getting Elvis back really gives this group a much more veteran look that we wouldn't have without him. With that being said, we're really looking forward to seeing the young players proving themselves, like Chris Freeman, Taylor Chappel, Brad McNulty, Nick Demien, all those guys. We just need them to work hard at improving and trying to get better and see where they end up going. A trio of Tigers, in junior T Mark Hill, sophomore G Anthony Gatti and redshirt freshman Conner McGovern, all sat out spring drills due to either off-season corrective surgery, or injuries. Obviously when we get the other guys back that will make us stronger," Pinkel said.

TAILBACK

Tailback was a huge focal point of the Tiger offense in 2011, thanks to several factors: the outstanding play of a veteran offensive line; the dual-threat capabilities of QB James Franklin which created pressure on opposing defenses; and the emergence of TB Henry Josey as one of the nation's most dangerous ball carriers.

Josey began the year number three on the depth chart, but as injuries knocked out both Kendial Lawrence and De'Vion Moore, Josey made the most of his opportunity. In his first start, all he did was rush for 263 yards and 3 touchdowns against Western Illinois. He would follow with 100-yard outings in five of the next six games, and he stood as the Big 12's leading





rusher until his season was cut short in game number 10 against Texas, when he was lost for the year with a knee injury. Prior to the injury, Josey amassed 1,168 yards and 9 touchdowns, and averaged a whopping 8.1 yards per carry. His rushing total was the 5th-most in MU single-season history, and also earned him 1st-Team all-conference honors, despite missing the last quarter of the season. Josey was not able to participate in the spring, and it is currently unknown whether he'll be back in time for the 2012 campaign.

Whether Josey can go or not in 2012, the tailback position is in good hands, with the return of senior TB Kendial Lawrence, who ran for 566 yards and 5 touchdowns overall in 2011. He began the 2011 season as the starter, but a broken bone suffered in practice before week number two held him back until the middle of the season. Lawrence stepped up when Josey went out, as he had a pair of 100-yard games in MU's four-game winning streak to close the year, including 106 yards and one touchdown against Texas' vaunted defense, and he capped it with a 108-yard, one-touchdown performance in the Independence Bowl against North Carolina. Senior Jared McGriff-Culver (111 yards, 1 TD in 2011) and sophomore Greg White (11 carries, 38 yards in 2011) will look to solidify their standing on the depth this fall, and they'll be joined by sophomore Marcus Murphy, who had to miss the 2011 season due to an off-season shoulder injury, after he ran for 181 yards and two touchdowns as a true freshman in 2010.

"We all know Henry Josey's story," Pinkel said. "He was dealt a very tough break, but the bottom line is he'll have three years to get two years of eligibility in. We're going to work with our doctors and trainers and see how things play out. We're prepared for either scenario, and if he can be on the field this year that's great, but there's absolutely no pressure on him to do so, the great news is that he can take as much time as he needs to get ready. Henry has been working very hard and making great progress, so we'll see where that goes. Whatever works best for him works best for everyone," Pinkel said.

"Kendial Lawrence stepped into the starting role last year and did an outstanding job of continuing the production from the tailback spot that we needed when Henry went out," Pinkel said. "He came along really well last year and really helped our football program. We get Marcus Murphy back from an injury a year ago and he can add a lot to the depth. Jared McGriff-Culver and Greg White also got some experience last year, and we'll be looking for them to grow this year," he said.

RECEIVERS

On paper, the receivers position group loses the most from a year ago, as starters Michael Egnew, Wes Kemp and Jerrell Jackson have graduated. Offsetting that is the fact that MU's leading receiver for each of the last two seasons returns, in senior WR T.J. Moe. Moe, who has a combined 146 receptions for 1,694 yards and 10 touchdowns in the past two years, will be looked upon to provide not only the big plays that Tiger fans have become accustomed to recently, but he'll also provide the veteran leadership that a young, but talented group needs. Others expected to lead the way include junior WRs Marcus Lucas (23 receptions for 414 yards and 5 touchdowns) and L'Damian Washington (20-364, 3 TDs), who finished 4th and 5th, respectively, in receiving for Mizzou in 2011.

Among the top candidates to replace Egnew at tight end is junior Eric Waters, who showed his potential last year when he made a 42-yard catch-and-run touchdown in MU's big win at Texas A&M.



Despite the losses here, Pinkel is optimistic about MU's receiving group heading into the spring.

"T.J. Moe is a great player and a great leader for this team, and we've got guys like L'Damian Washington and Marcus Lucas who both did some great things last year as young players," Pinkel said. "Developing the depth there is going to be critical, as is getting guys out there who can make big plays, the guys who can create things after they catch the ball. I'm excited that we can become a better passing team, even though we lose some outstanding players like Michael Egnew, Wes Kemp and Jerrell Jackson. We want to run the football, we always have, but we also want to be a great throwing team, so we utilize people around the perimeter because that puts more pressure on the defense. We're all certainly aware of James running the ball more, moreso than we did with Blaine and Chase, maybe not as much as Brad Smith. But certainly James has allowed us to do different things, which has been a real plus in our offense," he said.

DEFENSE OUTLOOK

On the defensive side of the ball, Mizzou's numbers might not have popped off the page a year ago, but playing in the offensive-centric Big 12 Conference makes it tough to put up gaudy defensive stats. The Tigers ranked 4th in the Big 12 (61st in the NCAA) in total defense, allowing a respectable 380.00 yards per game, while the scoring defense was even better, ranking 3rd in the league and 44th nationally (23.54 ppg). Mizzou's stout defensive front, anchored by tackles Dominique Hamilton and Terrell Resonno, helped the Tiger defense to a number 29 national ranking against the run (127.38 avg.).

DEFENSIVE LINE

While Hamilton and Resonno are gone, as well as a handful of other starters from that unit, six Tigers return who were starters in 2011, and a seventh, in senior LB Will Ebner, returns after being granted a medical hardship. Ebner, who has started 16 games over the last three seasons, was injured in the season opener against Miami (Ohio), and was held out the rest of the year. He's back and ready to unleash his powerful hitting on would-be ball carriers.

Up front, the Tiger defensive line had a completely new look in the spring, as the only returning starter, senior DE Brad Madison, sat out camp as he continued to recover from off-season shoulder surgery. Even though he was missed, the situation was a positive, as it cleaned up an injury which kept Madison at less than 100 percent for the entire 2011 season. Senior DT Sheldon Richardson, who is one of the top candidates to start at tackle after making a pair of starts in 2011, was also out while recovering from off-season surgery.

The cupboard wasn't bare, however, as Pinkel was able to evaluate some young talent who showed what they can do in the spring environment.

"When we get Brad Madison and Sheldon Richardson back from injury I think our defensive front can be pretty strong," Pinkel said. "We have some big losses in Jacquies Smith, Terrell Resonno and Dominique Hamilton – big guys who were mainstays for a long time. That being said, we have a lot of competition on the line. Jimmy Burge, Marvin Foster will compete inside, and we've moved Matt Hoch to the inside to tackle, and I think it's going to be a great move for him, he's about 285 right now. On the edges, Kony Ealy played a lot last year, and so did Michael Sam, Brayden Burnett, and we'll get Madison back, who was an all-conference type of player in the past. Shane Ray is a real good young player, we saw him on the scout team last year and he did some great things," Pinkel said.





LINEBACKER

The middle of the Tiger defense looks to be the strength in 2012, as two of three starters from 2011 return, in senior Zaviar Gooden and junior Andrew Wilson. While Luke Lambert, who started all 13 games at strongside linebacker last year, is gone, it's an even trade overall with the return of Ebner, who has 149 career tackles and 16 starts to his credit. Wilson and Gooden were Mizzou's #1 and #3 tacklers in 2011, as Wilson led the team with 98 tackles, and he ended the year by winning defensive MVP honors in the Independence Bowl win over North Carolina. Gooden has started all 26 games over the past two seasons, and was third on the team with 80 stops in 2011 while adding a pair of interceptions to tie for the team lead in that category.

"We've got Will Ebner back from a year out with injury, which is huge," Pinkel said. "We've got back Zaviar Gooden, who's an all-conference player, and Andrew Wilson, who was the MVP in our bowl game. I feel like we're pretty stout there overall. I expect Donovan Bonner and Darvin Ruise to step up their game, they've been around for awhile and we expect them to make more contributions. We've also got some good young players in Clarence Green, Kentrell Brothers and Brandon Durant who we are looking forward to seeing them get in there and compete," he said.

CORNERBACK

The Tiger secondary was very youthful in 2011, and it showed at times with some inconsistent play, but three of four starters are back for the new season, and that bodes very well for what should be a very talented position group.

Junior CB E.J. Gaines did nothing but impress in 2011 in his first year as a starter. All he did was win 1st-Team All-Big 12 acclaim as he ranked 5th nationally, while setting an MU record with 16 passes broken up. He'll be joined at the other corner by fellow returning starter, senior CB Kip Edwards. Edwards was also a first-time starter in 2011, and he managed to break up three passes, grab one interception and force two fumbles while recording 55 tackles on the year. The third returning secondary starter is senior FS Kenronte Walker, who took over primary duties there for the last part of the season, and ended up 9th on the squad with 44 tackles.

"You've got E.J. Gaines back and he was an all-conference player last year, he did some great things," Pinkel said. "Kip Edwards is back, he's a returning starter with tremendous ability. Randy Ponder is back as our primary nickel guy, so we're pretty solid there overall. Developing the depth with young guys like Xavier Smith and David Johnson is going to be really important," he said.

SAFETY

At safety, the Tigers will undoubtedly miss former standout SS Kenji Jackson, who was a mainstay in the secondary over the past four seasons. But with Walker's return, as well as a talented mix of veterans and newcomers, Pinkel is optimistic about the potential here.

"Kenronte Walker ended last year as a starter and he did some good things, as did Braylon Webb before he got banged up," said Pinkel. "Matt White, we also expect him to get better, and we've got a couple of talented young players in Ian Simon and Cortland Browning who we're excited to take a look at," he said.

SPECIALISTS

In 2011, the kicking game became a one-man show, as Trey Barrow was the punter all season long, and in his first year as a starter, he earned 2nd-Team All-Big 12 honors for ranking 2nd in the league, and 9th nationally with his punting average of 44.82 (also good for an MU single-season record). Barrow also unexpectedly took over the place-kicking duties for the final six games of the season, when former All-American PK Grant Ressel was lost for the season with a hip injury. Barrow filled in admirably, as he made all 23 of his extra point tries, while making a respectable 7-of-9 field goals.

"We've got Trey Barrow back, and we're looking forward to seeing him develop further," Pinkel said. "He was already playing at a pretty high level a year ago, but there's room for growth still. Andrew Baggett is someone who we want to take a look at for placekicking, so we put him out there in the spring and he did some good things overall. It should be a good competition to watch in the fall and I'll be interested in seeing how it sorts itself out," he said.


Mizzou got better instantly when it learned in the off-season that Ebner was awarded an extra year of eligibility, after he missed all but one game in 2011 due to various injuries ... Is healthy and ready to go for his last year in a Tiger uniform, and he will combine with fellow LB Andrew Wilson as a hard-hitting duo ... Lines up at the middle linebacker spot, where he is atop the depth chart heading into fall ball.

2011 SEASON

Scheduled to be top middle linebacker on the team, but suffered a concussion in the season opener against Miami (Ohio) and was held out long enough that it was decided to shut it down for the year.

2010 SEASON

Had a tough bout with the injury bug most of the season, but he played through it to give solid contributions to Mizzou's much-improved defense ... Missed a pair of games due to a neck strain, and played the entire season less than 100 percent due to a foot injury that he chose to delay surgery on until after the season ... Made six tackles against Kansas State on Nov. 14 ... Also recovered a fumble against KSU ... 





In 11 years at the University of Missouri, Gary Pinkel has meticulously built a previously downtrodden program into one of the most successful in the nation. With 48 wins in the last five seasons (ranking as 9th-most in the nation from 2007-11), three division titles since 2007, and a school-record seven-consecutive bowl game appearances, Pinkel's vision for success has come to fruition, and is pointed toward an even brighter future.

Mizzou played in its seventh-straight bowl game in 2011, and ended with an 8-5 record after a dominating 41-24 win over North Carolina in the Independence Bowl. The final record was impressive considering it came in a year in which the Tigers were challenged with key injuries while facing a schedule that was ranked as the seventh-toughest in the nation (Sagarin). Pinkel led his team to wins over three bowl teams in the regular season (Texas, Texas A&M, Iowa State), while all five of MU's losses came at the hands of bowl-bound opponents.

A testament to the consistency that Pinkel and his staff have developed at Mizzou is the fact that MU is one of only six schools in BCS-AQ conferences to have posted a minimum of eight wins in each of the last six seasons. The others in that very select group include: LSU, Oklahoma, USC, Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

In 2010, Mizzou posted its third 10-win season in four years under Pinkel, as MU went 10-3 overall, including a 6-2 mark in Big 12 Conference play that earned them a spot atop the North Division rankings for the third time since 2007. Included among those 10 wins was a watershed moment for the program, and for Tiger Nation overall – a 36-27 win over top-ranked Oklahoma on Homecoming, which marked the first-ever win by Mizzou over a #1-ranked team.

A sign of growing respect for the work that Pinkel and his staff has done to build the program came along with that win over Oklahoma. That week, Mizzou

was the focal point of the entire college football universe, as ESPN sent its wildly popular traveling show, "ESPN GameDay," to the MU campus. A record crowd of an estimated 18,000 Tiger fans packed the picturesque Francis Quadrangle for the Saturday morning show, and made everyone associated with the school glow with pride. A national audience watched the GameDay program, and then the nation promptly watched the Tigers pull away in the fourth quarter against the Sooners to move to 7-0 on a season for only the third time in school history.

Pinkel ranks third on Mizzou's all-time coaching wins list with an 85-54 record. He is in a select group of MU coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, as the only coaches to have an MU record above .500 dating back to 1935.

Pinkel has guided Mizzou to eight bowl games, surpassing the previous MU record of six he previously held along with Dan Devine. With wins in the 2008 AT&T Cotton Bowl (38-7 over Arkansas) and in the 2008 Valero Alamo Bowl (30-23 over Northwestern), Pinkel became the first coach to lead the Tigers to bowl victories in consecutive seasons since Powers did the trick in 1981 and 1982.

Over the past nine seasons, Pinkel has led Missouri to a 76-40 record (65.5%) and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2011. Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl, Pinkel has won 57 of his last 81 games overall (70.4%). He is the first coach in school history to earn seven straight bowl berths.

His success has led to an increased commitment to the Tiger Football program from the University, as Pinkel was awarded with a two-year contract extension in April of 2011 that will keep him on the Tiger sidelines through the 2017 season. With eight winning seasons, Pinkel has directed MU to eight of the 10 winning campaigns the school has had overall since the 1983 season.



Pinkel's 10-year record at Mizzou stands at 85-54, and in his 21 years overall as a head coach, his teams have a 158-91-3 overall mark (63.3%).

With a school-record 12 wins in 2007 and 10 more in 2008, MU's two-year win total of 22 was third-most in the nation during that time, trailing only USC (23) and Oklahoma (23). The back-to-back 10-win seasons marked the first such occurrence in Mizzou history, and Pinkel has now directed three of the four double-digit win seasons in school annals.

In 2007, Pinkel guided Mizzou to arguably the greatest season in school history. Among the myriad achievements that year included a school-record 12 wins, claiming MU's first New Year's Day bowl victory since 1966, getting the program's first-ever Big 12 North Division crown, and earning a No. 1 Associated Press national ranking for the first time since 1960 and coming up one win shy of playing for the national championship.

To simply list the highlights surrounding Pinkel's renaissance in Columbia would not do his body of work justice. After all, Mizzou's current run of seven-straight bowl games have been the culmination of hard work and determination that began after his hiring on Nov. 30, 2000.

While Pinkel himself would say that it is still a work in progress, his program's numerous accomplishments can be highlighted, which helps to tell this story of football success in Mid-Missouri.

In achieving the program's first No.

1 national ranking since 1960, Missouri raced to a 5-0 start in 2007, including wins over a Rose Bowl bound Illinois team and perennial nemesis Nebraska. The Tigers averaged nearly 42 points per game in those five wins and only a late flurry of points by the Fighting Illini kept any of those games in doubt.

While eventual Big 12 Champion Oklahoma was the lone stumbling block for Pinkel's squad in 2007, the Tigers set numerous school records, including school marks for wins (12), points per game (39.9), total points (558) and total offense (6,864 yards). Most of the offensive records were broken again one year later, as the Tigers' potent spread attack upped those marks to 42.2 points per game, 591 total points in 2008.

For his outstanding achievements both on and off the field in 2007, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He also was named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf in 2007.

In winning a school-record 12 games in 2007, Mizzou clearly caught the attention of the national football community, as the Tigers began the season unranked but quickly darted up the charts with wins over bowl teams such as Illinois, Texas Tech and Colorado. And after the Tigers defeated arch rival and 2nd-ranked Kansas on Nov. 24th, Mizzou stood atop the college football world, ranked number one for the first and only time since 1960. Mizzou was featured on every college football television

show after, and also graced the covers of virtually every prominent national sporting publication, including Sports Illustrated, The Sporting News and USA Today.

While the 2007 Tigers cashed in on the steady growth of the program over the previous six seasons, the Tigers also enjoyed an exciting 2006 campaign that saw them win eight regular-season games for just the 10th time in school history, and Missouri's appearance in the Brut Sun Bowl marked MU's third bowl game in four seasons - the first time in 25 years that Mizzou had reached three bowls in four years.

Pinkel and his program successfully built on the momentum created from a scintillating 38-31 win over South Carolina in the 2005 Independence Bowl that saw his Tigers overcome a 21-point deficit. The thrilling win marked the largest come-from-behind win in school history, and it gave Mizzou only its second bowl win in the previous 24 years.

After taking over a program that had fallen on hard times in 2001, Pinkel had

increased success in each of his first three seasons, improving from four wins in 2001 to five wins in 2002, to the 2003 squad which went 8-5 and made the school's third bowl appearance since 1983.

Long considered a "sleeping giant" of a program, Mizzou had a breakthrough 2003 season under Pinkel's guidance.

The list of accomplishments turned in by the 2003 team was impressive:

The eight regular-season wins marked the first time since 1980 - and only the 4th time since 1960 - that MU had amassed that many wins in the regular season. The team became only the 9th in MU's history to accomplish the feat...

MU went a perfect 6-0 at Faurot Field that season, with the win total marking a school record for one season at home. Mizzou had never won more than five games at Faurot, which opened as Memorial Stadium in 1926. It also marked MU's first unblemished home season since the 1974 team went 5-0...

Mizzou's 41-24 win over #10 Nebraska





on Oct. 11th was one for the history books, as it broke a 24-game losing streak to the Huskers for MU, making Pinkel the first Tiger coach to beat Nebraska since Warren Powers in 1978...

The Nebraska win also marked MU's first win over a top-10 opponent since 1981, breaking a string of 45 straight losses to top-10 foes for the school...

The 31st head coach in the program's history, Pinkel was hired on Nov. 30, 2000, and began immediately to prove to his colleagues, alumni, fans and student-athletes that Tiger Football could be a national player.

After a rebuilding year in 2001, Pinkel had Mizzou much improved in his 2nd campaign -- and playing for bowl eligibility entering the Tigers' final game of the season. Tough losses to 3rd-ranked Oklahoma (on a late fourth quarter fake field goal), to 18th-ranked Colorado (in overtime) and a last-second loss at 22nd-ranked Iowa State were all that kept Mizzou out of a bowl game.

Pinkel opened the 2002 campaign by leading MU to one of the program's most impressive season-opening wins in recent history when Mizzou dismantled Illinois -- the defending Big Ten Conference champions and a 2001 BCS Bowl team -- 33-20 in St. Louis, Mo. He later defeated Mizzou's heated rival, the Kansas Jayhawks, as MU downed Kansas 36-12 to give him a 2-0 record vs. KU -- making him only the third coach in school history to win his first two encounters against Kansas.

Pinkel came to Missouri after spending 10 very successful years as head coach at Toledo, where he amassed an impressive

73-37-3 record (65.9%).

The school's alltime winningest coach, Pinkel's last six teams there went a combined 50-18-1 overall. Three of those teams advanced to play in the post-season, capturing one Mid-American Conference championship and three MAC West Division titles. Three of his last five teams at Toledo were ranked in the nation's top 25. His 1995 squad went 11-0-1, and was one of just two schools (national champ Nebraska was the other) to finish the season without a loss.

For his accomplishments at Toledo, Pinkel was inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame in February of 2009.

Prior to becoming a head coach, Pinkel learned the trade from one of the alltime great coaches, the legendary Don James. For 12 years as an assistant under James at Washington (1979-90), Pinkel helped guide the Huskies to a combined record of 104-37-2 (73.4%) and three Pac-10 Conference titles. He served as UW's offensive coordinator for seven seasons (1984-90), and helped mold one of the nation's most potent offensive attacks.

Pinkel played under James at Kent State University, where he was an all-conference and honorable mention All-American tight end. He graduated in 1973.

Pinkel graduated from Kenmore High School in Akron, Ohio, and received his bachelor of science degree in education from Kent in 1973. He did post-graduate studies at Kent and Bowling Green, and in 1997 was inducted into the Kent Athletic Hall of Fame. He was born April 27, 1952. Pinkel and his wife, Vicki, have a daughter, Erin, and sons Geoff and Blake.

Dave Steckel will enter his 12th season at Missouri as the Tigers' linebacker coach, and the 2012 campaign will be his third with the added duties of defensive coordinator – a position he was awarded with by Head Coach Gary Pinkel in February of 2009 following the departure of former coordinator Matt Eberflus to the NFL's Cleveland Browns. In fall, 2011 he also was awarded with the title of assistant head coach.

The Tiger defense played a big role in Mizzou's overall success in 2011, as it ranked 4th in the offense-happy Big 12 Conference in total defense, allowing 380.00 yards per game. The Tiger defense came up big in wins over Texas (247 yards allowed) and Kansas (137), while closing the season in impressive fashion against North Carolina in the Independence Bowl. In MU's 41-24 bowl win, the Tiger defense shackled the Tar Heels and held them to just 36 yards rushing – some 120 yards below their average.

In 2010, Steckel's defense emerged into one of the most improved in the nation last season. Mizzou led the Big 12 Conference, and ranked 6th in the nation, in scoring defense, allowing only 16.08 points per game in the high-scoring Big 12.

Steckel's linebacking corps was decimated by injuries throughout the 2010 season, but that didn't stop his troops from turning in big performances each week. Senior Andrew Gachkar developed into one of the top linebackers in the league, and he was named a 1st-Team All-Big 12 performer, giving Steckel a 1st-Team All-Big 12 linebacker for the fifth-straight year (Sean Weatherspoon – 2007, 2008, 2009). Gachkar ranked second on the team with 84 tackles, just one shy of fellow linebacker Zaviar Gooden, a sophomore who was named honorable-mention All-Big 12 for leading MU with 85 stops in his first year as a starter.

Steckel has consistently produced results with his linebacking corps at Mizzou. He is also a highly-successful recruiter, primarily

in the state of Texas. A passionate and enthusiastic teacher of the game of football, Steckel has mentored his linebackers over the years with positive results.

Under Steckel, the Missouri defense followed the fire of its new coordinator in 2009 with an attacking style of play. The Tiger rush defense excelled, thanks to his linebackers and a stout defensive line, and ended the season ranked 26th in the NCAA against the run (118.62 avg.) – that figure is the lowest rushing average allowed in a season by a Tiger defense since the 1983 squad ranked 5th nationally with an average of 97.70 per game.

Sean Weatherspoon concluded his stellar Tiger career by winning 2nd-Team All-American honors, as well as being named a 1st-Team All-Big 12 performer for the third straight year – making him the first Tiger in the Big 12 era to achieve 1st-Team all-league status three times. Weatherspoon ended third on MU's career tackles chart, and was eventually a first-round selection by the Atlanta Falcons in the 2010 NFL Draft (number 19 overall selection). Sophomore Will Ebner also emerged as a steady force in the middle of the field, as he earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors for his play, which featured 78 tackles to rank him 3rd on the squad in 2009.

Steckel's group helped lead the Tiger defense in 2008, with junior Sean Weatherspoon commanding the lion's share of attention. "Spoon" turned in a very impressive season that saw him earn 1st-Team All-Big 12 acclaim, as well as 3rd-Team All-American honors, based on his 155 tackles. He was also named a finalist for the prestigious Butkus Award, and he repeated in 2009 as a finalist for the award again.

Weatherspoon was joined in the 100-tackle club in 2008 by senior Brock Christopher, who totaled a career-high 105 stops in his final season in a Tiger uniform. Christopher won honorable-mention All-Big 12 honors for his play for a second straight

year in 2008.

Steckel returned to Gary Pinkel's coaching staff in 2001 after spending five seasons as the linebacker and defensive line coach at Rutgers University.

Steckel helped mold James Kinney into a prolific tackler, as he ended his Tiger career by breaking the MU career tackles record (434) during his senior season of 2004. Kinney led MU in stops in 2004, with 112, making him the first player in school history to record three consecutive seasons of 100 or more tackles. He earned 1st-Team All-Big 12 honors for his efforts, and signed a free-agent deal with the Jacksonville Jaguars after the 2005 NFL Draft.

In his 11 seasons at Mizzou, Steckel has had at least one of his linebackers earn all-league recognition each year, including two each in the 2001, 2002, 2003, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2011 seasons.

The 2006 season featured stellar play from senior standouts Marcus Bacon and Dedrick Harrington. Bacon earned 1st-Team All-Big 12 acclaim for his play that featured a team-best 112 tackles. He became MU's first linebacker to win the Big 12 defensive player of the week award since 1997, when he won the award for his play in week two against Ole Miss. Harrington had his best season as a Tiger, as he totaled a career-high 100 stops.

One of MU's top recruiters, Steckel has helped land numerous all-stars for Mizzou, primarily out of the state of Texas. He was responsible for the successful recruitment of Southlake Carroll High School quarterback Chase Daniel, who was named the EA Sports National High School Player of the Year. Daniel lettered as a true freshman at

MU in 2005 and just two years later was a Heisman Trophy finalist, finishing fourth in the 2007 Heisman voting. Steckel was able to attend the prestigious ceremony in New York City that December.

Two of Steckel's stars were honored for their play in 2003, as Kinney was named 2nd-Team All-Big 12 by the Associated Press, while Barnes earned Honorable Mention acclaim by both league coaches and media. Barnes impressed enough people that he eventually signed a free agent contract following the 2004 NFL Draft with the Baltimore Ravens, and later played for the Washington Redskins.

At Rutgers, Steckel coached two all-conference defensive linemen from 1996-99, both of whom went on to play in the NFL. In 2000, Steckel moved to coach the linebackers. He served as one of Rutgers' chief recruiters, signing 14 players in his first three seasons.

Before Rutgers, Steckel coached the defensive line for Pinkel at Toledo from 1992-95. He was the defensive line coach during the 1995 undefeated season that went on to win the Las Vegas Bowl. Steckel helped coach a defensive unit that ranked No. 1 in the Mid-American Conference and 12th nationally. One of those players, Dan Williams, was the 11th overall selection in the 1993 NFL Draft.

Steckel served in the United States Marine Corps from 1975-78. He then went on to graduate from Kutztown State College and earned a master's from Miami (Ohio) in 1982.

He is married to the former Mary Beth Thomas of Floyd's Knob, Ind. They have one beautiful daughter named Amanda.

Assistant Coach David Yost has been with Head Coach Gary Pinkel for the past 15 seasons in a variety of capacities, and the 2011 campaign marked his 11th season at Mizzou playing a vital role in the success and development of the Tiger program. Pinkel's recruiting coordinator since 1997, Yost also serves as the Tigers' quarterbacks coach and placekickers coach at Mizzou. In the fall of 2011, Yost was awarded with the title of assistant head coach.

He did an outstanding job of molding the Tiger offense to its strengths in 2011, as Mizzou won the Big 12 rushing title, and ranked 9th nationally, averaging 244.00 yards per game. Mizzou proved to be one of the most balanced offensive attacks in the nation in 2011, thanks to the talents of first-year starting QB James Franklin, as well as outstanding play from the Big 12's 2nd-leading rusher, Henry Josey, and a veteran offensive line. Mizzou was one of only two schools in the country to average at least 230 yards rushing and passing on the year.

Prior to the 2009 season, Yost assumed the added role of offensive coordinator, and in the 2009-10 seasons, he helped guide an attack which featured the arm of quarterback Blaine Gabbert, who was a first-round NFL Draft pick by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Under Gabbert, the Tigers won 10 games in 2010 for only the fourth time in school history, thanks in large part to Yost's offense, which ranked 35th nationally in yards per game (409.62 avg.). Gabbert ended the year with his second-straight 3,000-yard campaign, throwing for 3,186 yards and 16 touchdowns, while running for 232 yards and five more scores in all, and he closed his three-year Tiger career by throwing for 434 yards – an MU bowl game record – in the 2010 Insight Bowl against Iowa.

In Yost's first season as coordinator, the Tiger offense ranked 14th in the nation in passing, averaging 285.46 yards per game, despite the inexperience of first-year starting quarterback Blaine Gabbert. In all, the Tiger offense ranked 32nd in the nation in total offense, averaging 412.46 yards per game.

Gabbert continued MU's recent success at the quarterback position, following in the footsteps of Tiger legends Chase Daniel and Brad Smith. Gabbert completed his sophomore season by throwing for 3,593 yards (the 3rd-most in MU single-season history) and 24 touchdowns.

As if that weren't enough for his ledger, Yost helped mold first-year starting kicker Grant Ressel into an automatic machine who won 1st-Team All-American honors for his near flawless 2009 season. Ressel stepped into the kicking job vacated by former record-setting Jeff Wolfert, and one-upped Wolfert, who left holding the NCAA career accuracy record for combined kicks. All Ressel did in his first year as a starter was break the NCAA single-season accuracy mark for combined kicks, as he connected on an amazing 65-of-66 total kicks, including 26-of-27 field goals and 39-of-39 extra points. Ressel led the nation in field goal accuracy, in addition to his NCAA season record. Those feats were good enough to earn him 1st-Team All-Big 12 acclaim as well. He followed with another stellar year in 2010, as Ressel made 17-of-19 field goals and 45-of-47 extra points.

Yost has been instrumental in the development of MU's renowned spread attack. The Tigers broke numerous offensive school records in 2008, thanks to the play of Yost's star pupil, quarterback Chase Daniel. In putting together only the third 10-win season in school history, the Tigers established records for points (591), points per game (42.2) and passing yards (4,625), just to name a few.

Yost has to be considered one of the top quarterback coaches in the nation, based on his work in helping develop Daniel, and his predecessor, Brad Smith. Daniel had an amazing three-year run as a starter come to a close in 2008, and he left holding virtually every major passing and total offense record on the books. The 22 wins amassed over the 2007 and 2008 seasons ranked third nationally during that stretch, trailing only Oklahoma and USC.

Daniel caught the nation's attention during the 2007 season, as he amassed 4,559 yards

of total offense (ranking 7th in the NCAA) and 4,306 passing yards with 33 touchdowns while leading MU to a record 12 wins and a final No. 4 Associated Press top-25 ranking. That December, a proud Yost got to join Daniel for an experience of a lifetime, as Daniel was one of four invitees to the Heisman Trophy ceremony in New York City, where he finished fourth in final voting.

He is also known for his work with former record-setting quarterback Brad Smith. Yost helped guide Smith through four magical seasons that saw him break an eye-popping 69 different Mizzou, Big 12 and NCAA game, season and career records. Under Yost's tutelage, Smith became the greatest run-pass dual threat QB in NCAA Division I-A history, as he is the only athlete to throw for 8,000 yards and rush for 4,000 yards in a career. In 2005 alone, Smith amassed 2,304 yards in the air and 1,301 more on the ground – making him the first player in NCAA D-IA history to reach the 2,000/1,000 mark twice in a career.

Yost oversaw the transformation of previously unheralded walk-on Jeff Wolfert into one of the best Cinderella stories in all of college football. Wolfert, who won the kicking job in fall camp just prior to the 2006 season, had kicked in just one high school game before coming to MU as a scholarship diver on the men's swim team. Wolfert was an all-conference diver in 2004-05, but spurned his diving scholarship to pursue his dream of kicking. After seeing no action as a walk-on in 2005, Wolfert was simply amazing as he connected on an MU record 18 field goals (in 20 attempts) and was a perfect 45-of-45 on extra points to earn himself on the prestigious Lou Groza Award list of semifinalists.

Wolfert followed his surprising 2006 season with an even better year in 2007, as he made an amazing 88-of-92 combined kicks (21-of-25 field goals, 67-of-67 extra points) and won honorable mention All-America honors by Sports Illustrated, while winning

1st-Team All-Big 12 acclaim as he scored an MU single-season record 130 points. He closed his career in 2008 by repeating as a 1st-Team All-Big 12 pick, and ended as the most accurate kicker in NCAA history for combined field goals and extra points (185-of-185 extra points, 59-of-72 field goals).

The 2002 season saw Yost guide Smith, a redshirt freshman, during an historical season as he became only the second player in NCAA Division I-A history to throw for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards in a season.

Smith was at it again in 2003, as he broke his own single-season total offense record, with 3,383 yards. He ended the season with 1,977 passing yards and rushed for 1,406 yards, the latter of which is the No. 2 single-season rushing mark in MU history.

From 1997 to 2000, Yost held the same responsibilities for Pinkel at Toledo. He spent four seasons coaching two of the most productive quarterbacks in Toledo history in Tavares Bolden and Chris Wallace. Bolden developed into one of the most versatile signal-callers in the MAC.

Yost came to Toledo from Tiffin University, where he coordinated the offense along with coaching quarterbacks and receivers in 1995. During the 1994 season, he coached wide receivers.

A native of Carrollton, Ohio, Yost spent time coaching his former high school team after graduating from Kent State University. A graduate of Kent State, Yost earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in early childhood education in 1992. He has done graduate work in educational psychology. He was married to the former Carrie Crossett, a former soccer student-athlete at Mizzou (and sister of former MU kicker Adam Crossett) in June of 2005, and the couple had their first child, daughter Kennedy Caroline, in December of 2006. Son, Keaton, was born in December of 2008 and son Kamden was born in April of 2011.

Cornell Ford is in his 19th season as a valuable member of Coach Gary Pinkel's staff, including his 12th at Mizzou working with the Tiger secondary. Beginning with the 2004 season, Ford has coached the Tiger cornerbacks, after he focused on MU's outside safeties his first three years. Ford is also the Tigers' chief recruiter in St. Louis, where he has signed some of the very best players in the state.

In 2011, Ford oversaw the development of true sophomore E.J. Gaines into one of the nation's top young cover men. Gaines set a Mizzou record with 16 pass break ups in his first year as a starter, and tied for 5th nationally with 18 passes defended overall (including 2 interceptions).

Both of Ford's starting cornerbacks earned All-Big 12 status for three straight seasons (2008-10), including Carl Gettis and Kevin Rutland both in 2009 and 2010. The Tiger pass defense was a large reason for Mizzou's much-improved play in 2010, as MU led the Big 12 and ranked 6th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 16.08 points per game. The Tigers also ranked 11th nationally in pass efficiency defense, with an opponent passer rating of 108.45.

Rutland's development earned him an invitation to the 2011 NFL Combine, and while he went undrafted, he was signed immediately by Jacksonville, and last season made his first career NFL start for the Jaguars.

In 2009, Gettis and Rutland were named honorable mention all-league by league coaches for their play. Gettis ranked 6th on the team in 2009 with 61 tackles, and led the team with 5 pass break ups, to go with having a hand in 4 turnovers in his third year as a starter. Rutland, in his first year as a starter, developed into MU's top corner, as he won honorable-mention all-league status and was named the team's cornerback of the year for his season, which included 47 tackles and a team-high 2 interceptions.

Both of Ford's starting cornerbacks

earned All-Big 12 mention in 2008, with senior Castine Bridges and sophomore Carl Gettis winning honorable mention all-league acclaim for their play on the Tigers' 10-4 squad. Gettis further established himself as one of the top young defensive backs in the Big 12 Conference as he ranked 5th on the Tiger squad with 78 tackles, 4 pass break ups and 1 interception. Bridges closed out his Tiger career with 69 tackles and 1 interception, plus a team-high 7 pass break ups.

Mizzou's cornerbacks turned in a solid 2007 season overall, and were a definite reason that the Tiger defense was one of the best in the Big 12 Conference. True freshman Carl Gettis blossomed under Ford's coaching, as he became a starter early in the year and eventually won 2nd-Team Freshman All-American honors for his play. Senior Darnell Terrell was invited to the NFL Combine in the off-season, and later signed a free-agent contract with the Cleveland Browns.

The Tiger secondary was instrumental in MU's defensive improvement in 2006, and Ford's cornerbacks were a big reason why. Led by junior Darnell Terrell, who earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors from league coaches, the Tigers ranked 2nd in the Big 12 Conference, and 37th nationally, in pass defense, permitting 185.69 yards per game on average. That fact was even more impressive, considering that sophomore starting CB Domonique Johnson missed five games due to a knee injury midway through the season.

After losing his top performer from 2004 in Shirdonya Mitchell, Ford helped develop his cornerback unit into one that was dependable and steady in 2005. Mizzou ended the 2005 regular season ranking 4th in the Big 12 in pass defense, allowing an average of 212.55 yards per game.

Senior Marcus King blossomed into a big-play performer for the Tiger secondary in 2005, as he led the team with a career-high

13 passes broken up – including a record-breaking 99-yard interception return for a TD in the Independence Bowl win. King earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors by both league coaches and media for his efforts, and he teamed with fellow senior A.J. Kincade to give the Tigers a dependable tandem. King later went on to earn a free agent contract with the NFL's Dallas Cowboys following the 2006 NFL Draft, and another Ford protégé, Calvin Washington, was invited to the rookie minicamp of the Washington Redskins following the draft as well.

Just about every one of Ford's cornerbacks had career years under his coaching in 2004, and that performance was instrumental in Mizzou's substantial improvement in defense. Thanks in large part to his cornerbacks, Mizzou led the Big 12 Conference, and ranked 3rd nationally in pass defense in 2004, allowing an average of just 149.27 yards per game. His corners grabbed 8 of MU's 15 interceptions in 2004, which was a nice team improvement from a total of 9 in 2003 (including 3 from cornerbacks that year).

Senior Shirdonya Mitchell blossomed into a high-level cornerback in 2004 under Ford's direction, as he ranked 5th in the Big 12 Conference, and 33rd nationally, with his 4 interceptions. Mitchell earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors for his play, in only his second year playing defense, and signed a two-year free agent deal with the Miami Dolphins following the 2005 NFL Draft. Juniors Marcus King and A.J. Kincade also had big years, as King tied for the team lead with four turnovers gained (2 interceptions and 2 fumbles) and led the team with 7 pass break ups, while Kincade had a career-high 2 interceptions, including a game-winning pickoff in overtime of the season finale at Iowa State.

In addition to his coaching duties,

Ford has worked hard to earn a reputation as one of the most well-trusted recruiting presences in his area of St. Louis. His hard work and straightforward approach has paid off recently, as he has successfully attracted stars such as Will Franklin, Jeremy Maclin and 2008 signees Blaine Gabbert and Wes Kemp to Mizzou. In 2009, he landed Gateway Tech superstar Sheldon Richardson, who was one of the nation's top overall prospects, and this past February, MU signed a class which ranked 21st-best in the nation according to Rivals.com, and that was the highest ranking ever for a Tiger recruiting class. Ford was also successful in getting Missouri's foot in the door in other St. Louis schools where there hadn't been much Tiger success in recent years.

Ford spent five seasons at Toledo coaching the wide receivers. Toledo graduate Mel Long pulled in 175 receptions in his four-year career, 21 of those for touchdowns. He also held the longest active streak in NCAA Division I for consecutive games with a reception. Under Ford, Long became Toledo's all-time leading receiver.

Before Toledo, Ford coached at Marietta College where he coached the quarterbacks, running backs and receivers, while also serving as the team's strength and conditioning coach. Marietta led the conference in rushing offense in 1994 and 1995 and owned the league's top running back both seasons.

Prior to joining the Marietta staff, Ford served two seasons as a graduate assistant at Toledo. He helped with the offensive line in 1992 and the secondary in 1991.

Ford holds a bachelor's degree (1991) in physical education and a master's degree (1993) in sports administration from Toledo.

He and his wife, Dawn, are the parents of a son, Devin, and a daughter, Taylor.

Joining the Mizzou coaching staff for his second tour of duty is Assistant Coach Alex Grinch, who was hired in January of 2012 as safeties coach. Grinch returns to Mizzou after serving as part of Gary Pinkel's staff from 2002-04 in a graduate assistant role, and he comes to Mizzou after a very successful run with other programs.

Grinch just completed his third season coaching the Wyoming secondary with former Mizzou assistant Dave Christensen. Three of his Cowboy defensive backs earned postseason honors in 2011, as Wyoming reached a bowl game for the second time in three seasons. Senior free safety Tashaun Gipson and junior strong safety Luke Ruff both earned Second Team All-Mountain West honors in 2011. True freshman cornerback Blair Burns was named First Team Freshman All-American by CBSSports.com and Honorable Mention Freshman All-American by CollegeFootballNews.com. Burns was also an Honorable Mention All-Mountain West honoree.

Wyoming concluded the 2011 regular season ranked No. 34 in the nation in pass defense, allowing only 202.2 yards passing per game. The Cowboys ranked No. 1 in the Mountain West and tied for No. 5 in the NCAA in most turnovers gained (31 total). UW's defense also led the MW and ranked No. 4 nationally in most fumbles recovered (18) and was No. 3 in the conference and No. 32 in the nation in most passes intercepted (13 total). Individually, Burns tied for No. 2 in the Mountain West and No. 23 in the nation in interceptions (4). Gipson tied for No. 4 in the conference and No. 65 in the NCAA in interceptions (3), and Ruff ranked No. 5 in the conference and tie for No. 77 in the nation in tackles (8.1 per game).

In 2011, Wyoming ranked among the Top Five most-improved teams in the nation, and its eight wins were the most by the Cowboys since 1998. UW finished in sole possession of third place in the Mountain West behind only Top 25 teams TCU and Boise State. Wyoming's eight wins included key conference road victories over Air Force and San Diego State. The only two

conference losses for the Cowboys came at the hands of the Horned Frogs and the Broncos.

Grinch's first two seasons, he coached former Cowboy free safety Chris Prosinski, who was drafted in the fourth round of the 2011 NFL Draft by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Prosinski was the 121st overall pick in the draft and also earned Second Team All-Mountain West honors his senior season of 2010. For the second consecutive season, Prosinski recorded over 100 tackles and led Wyoming in tackles. He was credited with 108 tackles in his senior season, and concluded his career ranked No. 4 in career tackles at UW with 373.

Grinch joined the Cowboy coaching staff in December of 2008 from the University of New Hampshire. He will be entering his 10th season as a college coach in 2012. In his previous nine seasons coaching at the college level, he helped guide seven of those teams to postseason play, including Wyoming's victory in the 2009 New Mexico Bowl.

Only one starter returned to the Wyoming secondary in 2011, senior cornerback Tashaun Gipson, who earned Honorable Mention All-Conference honors in 2010. Gipson ranked No. 2 in the conference and No. 26 in the nation in passes defended in 2010, averaging 1.00 per game. He also ranked No. 4 in the MW and No. 87 in the NCAA in interceptions, with three picks his junior season.

In 2010, all four starters returned to the Cowboy secondary. That group included 2009 Second Team All-Mountain West free safety Prosinski, Gipson and his older brother Marcell at cornerback and 2009 Freshman All-American Shamiel Gary at strong safety. Prosinski ranked 10th in the NCAA in tackles in 2009, averaging 10.8 per game. His 140 total tackles in '09 ranked as the fourth best single-season total in school history. Gary earned First Team Freshman All-America honors from the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) in '09. He became the first Wyoming Cowboy to earn that honor since the FWAA established the

team in 2001. Gary was one of only 28 freshman in the nation to receive the honor. Of those 28 freshman honored, he was one of only 14 true freshmen named to the team.

Grinch coached at New Hampshire for four seasons from 2005 through 2008. His first two seasons at New Hampshire, he coached the cornerbacks before being promoted to secondary coach and recruiting coordinator for the 2007 and 2008 seasons. In Grinch's final season at New Hampshire, the Wildcats concluded the season ranked No. 7 in the nation in the final Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Coaches' Poll and were ranked No. 8 in the final Sports Network Rankings. UNH advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2008 FCS Playoffs, defeating Southern Illinois, 29-20, on the road in the first round before losing at Northern Iowa, 34-36, in the quarters.

During Grinch's four seasons at New Hampshire, the Wildcats posted records of 11-2 in 2005, 9-4 in 2006, 7-5 in 2007 and 10-2 in 2008. UNH advanced to the FCS Quarterfinals in 2005, 2006 and 2008. The Wildcats also made it to the First Round of the Playoffs in 2007. The 2005 squad was the No. 1 seed entering the FCS Playoffs after capturing the Atlantic 10 Conference Co-Championship. In 2006, UNH defeated Northwestern of the Big Ten in the season opener. The following season, New Hampshire defeated another Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team in Marshall.

Grinch coached two Second Team All-CAA defensive backs in 2008. Senior John Clements was named Second Team at safety and sophomore Dino Vasso earned Second Team honors at cornerback. In 2007, Grinch coached First Team All-Conference senior safety Jeff Pammer and Second Team All-Conference junior cornerback Clements. The 2006 season saw Clements earn Third Team All-Conference honors as a corner. His first season at New Hampshire, Grinch tutored Second Team All-Conference honoree Corey Graham, a cornerback, who was drafted in the fifth round of the 2007 NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears.

Graham was selected to play in the 2012 NFL Pro Bowl as a special teams ace. As recruiting coordinator his final two seasons at New Hampshire, Grinch oversaw all of the Wildcats' recruiting efforts.

Prior to his four seasons as an assistant coach at UNH, Grinch was the defensive graduate assistant coach at Missouri for the 2003 and 2004 campaigns, and was an administrative graduate assistant at Mizzou for the 2002 season. The Tiger defense ranked No. 2 in the Big XII Conference in total defense in 2004 and was No. 1 in pass defense. The 2003 season saw Mizzou post an 8-5 record and advance to the Independence Bowl.

Grinch enjoyed an outstanding college playing career at Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio. He was a member of three NCAA Division III National Championship teams at Mount Union in 1998, 2000 and 2001. Over his four-year career, Grinch's Mount Union teams posted a 54-1 record and won four consecutive Ohio Athletic Conference Championships.

His senior season of 2001, he was named a Third Team All-America safety by D3football.com. He also earned National Defensive Player of the Week honors twice during his career from Don Hansen's National Football Gazette. Not only did he receive All-America honors on the field, but Grinch was a First Team Academic All-Conference selection his senior season.

He completed his bachelor's degree in sports management with a focus in marketing and a minor in business administration from Mount Union in May 2002, and earned a master's degree in educational leadership and policy analysis from Mizzou in December 2004.

Grinch was married to the former Rebecca Blaser of Alliance, Ohio on June 28, 2003. Their first child, son Tyler, was born during the Grinches' first year at Wyoming on Nov. 23, 2009. Their second child, daughter Corbi Elaine Grinch, was born on July 8, 2011.

Josh Henson joined the University of Missouri football coaching staff in February of 2009 as its newest assistant coach. The first new hire to join Gary Pinkel's staff since he came to Mizzou in 2001, Henson came aboard to serve as co-offensive line coach. A former standout offensive lineman at Oklahoma State, Henson spent his prior four years as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at Louisiana State University, where he developed the reputation as being a tremendous on-field teacher of the game, while also leading the charge for LSU's recruiting classes which ranked among the top 10 in the nation four times - including a 2009 class which ranked as No. 2 in the nation according to Rivals.com.

Henson has provided an immediate impact for the Tiger football program, both on and off the field. The Tiger offensive line - despite the pre-season loss of All-Big 12 left tackle Elvis Fisher to a season-ending injury - developed into a stout unit that paved the way for a Big 12 team rushing title in 2011. The Tigers ranked 9th nationally, and led the Big 12 in rushing (244.00 avg.) and also ranked 12th nationally in total offense (475.54 avg.), despite featuring a first-year starter at quarterback.

In 2009, he helped coach a trio of Tiger offensive linemen - senior Kurtis Gregory (2nd-Team), and sophomores Elvis Fisher (Hon. Men.) and Dan Hoch (Hon. Men.) to All-Big 12 honors. The offensive line helped protect first-year starting quarterback Blaine Gabbert well enough so that MU ranked 14th in the nation in passing, while allowing only 20 sacks in 13 games and 467 passing attempts.

It was more of the same in 2010, as the offensive line was a key element to Mizzou's 10-win season (only the fourth double-digit win season in school history), as four of Henson's five starters won some level of all-conference honors. Senior center Tim Barnes established himself as one of the top

centers in the nation, and he took home 1st-Team All-Big 12 honors for his outstanding play. Also earning all-conference acclaim were juniors Dan Hoch (2nd-Team), Elvis Fisher (Hon. Men.) and Austin Wuebbels (Hon. Men.).

In the recruiting battles, Henson quickly helped MU establish ties to areas in which it had little success in recent years, and his efforts helped the Tiger 2010 class to a No. 21 national ranking by Rivals.com - marking the highest ranking ever for an MU recruiting class.

Prior to Mizzou, Henson spent 10 years as a player and coach at Oklahoma State, prior to his most recent successful stint as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at LSU. He replaced former Tiger coach Dave Christensen, who was the first assistant to leave Pinkel's staff since coming to MU in 2001. Christensen was named the head coach at Wyoming in December of 2008.

In 2007, Henson's coaching efforts helped LSU sophomore tight end Richard Dickson put together one of the most productive seasons at the position in school history. Dickson turned in the third-highest single-season reception total by a Tiger tight end in school history, and he capped the 2007 season by catching a pair of touchdown passes in LSU's 38-24 win over Ohio State in the 2008 BCS National Championship Game.

The Tiger tight ends played a key role as LSU's offense set a total of 10 school records in 2007, including points in a season and total yards in a season. Following the 2007 season, LSU tight end Keith Zinger was selected in the seventh round of the NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons.

As LSU's recruiting coordinator, Henson's abilities made an immediate impact on the Tiger roster as LSU had the nation's No. 2-ranked signing class in 2007 after a consensus top 6 national rating in 2006. For his efforts, Henson was ranked as

one of college football's top 25 recruiters in 2006 and 2007 by Rivals.com.

At Oklahoma State, Henson was instrumental in the development of Billy Bajema, who was a three-year starter for the Cowboys. As a senior in 2004, Bajema was one of the top tight ends in the country, earning first-team All-Big 12 honors. Bajema was picked in the seventh round of the 2004 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers.

Henson also played a vital role in OSU's offensive development as the Cowboys ranked among the top 15 scoring teams in the nation for three consecutive years. The Cowboys averaged over 34 points per game from 2002-04, which included 35.9 points per game in 2003 and 34.5 points a game in 2004.

As Oklahoma State's recruiting coordinator, Henson played a key role in OSU's 2003 signing class being ranked No. 15 in the nation by Rivals.com. A year earlier, Rivals.com rated the Cowboy class as the 26th-best in the country.

As a player, Henson was a four-year letterwinner with 40 career starts for Oklahoma State from 1993-97. He was a starter on the offensive line as well as team captain for Oklahoma State's 8-4 team in 1997, a squad that played in the Alamo Bowl

against Purdue. He was a second-team All-Big 12 selection as a senior, in addition to being an honorable mention All-Big 12 pick as a junior. Off the field, Henson was named the recipient of the L.L. Boger Award as a senior, an honor that recognizes a student-athlete's achievement both on the field and in the classroom.

Henson graduated from Oklahoma State with a bachelor's degree in secondary education in 1998. Upon graduation, he went straight into coaching, serving as a high school football coach in Kingfisher, Okla. In one season at Kingfisher, he helped guide the Yellowjackets to the state semifinals.

Henson returned to Oklahoma State as a graduate assistant in July of 1999, spending one year with the Cowboy offensive line before taking a full-time position with OSU as tight ends coach in 2001.

Henson is a native of Tuttle, Okla. He and his wife Shauna have an 8-year old son, Will, and a 4-year old daughter, Kate. Henson lists golf, fishing and hunting as his hobbies in his spare time.

Andy Hill has coached 11 seasons under Gary Pinkel and 16 seasons overall at the University of Missouri, making him the longest tenured coach on the Tiger football staff. Hill has coached the Mizzou wide receivers ever since joining the Missouri staff in 1996, and in 2009, he assumed responsibilities for the Tiger tight ends for the first time, with his new title being that of receivers coach.

Over the past few seasons, Hill has coached several of the most prolific pass catchers in the nation, as well as in Mizzou history. In 2010, junior TE Michael Egnew emerged as the nation's most productive receiving tight end, as he won consensus 1st-Team All-American honors, and was a Mackey Award finalist, for a year that saw him catch 90 passes for 762 yards and five touchdowns. That was an astounding progression for Egnew, who caught a combined seven passes in his first two years as a Tiger. Another great story in 2010 was the development of sophomore WR T.J. Moe into one of the nation's most prolific receivers as well. Moe burst onto the scene by catching 92 passes for 1,045 yards and six touchdowns, a year after he caught two passes as a true freshman in 2009. Moe's play won him 2nd-Team All-Big 12 honors. Hill, who also works with Tiger punters, helped develop first-year player and senior punter Matt Grabner into an honorable mention All-Big 12 performer after averaging 42.6 yards per punt.

Junior Punter Trey Barrow took over duties for the first time in 2011, and ranked 9th nationally with his MU single-season record punt average of 44.82 yards per kick.

Danario Alexander's 2009 season saw him lead the NCAA in receiving (137.0 yards per game), as he shattered school records for receptions (113), receiving yards (1,781) and receiving touchdowns (14). Alexander twice won Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week honors during his incredible 2009 season – making him the first receiver in the talent-rich tradition of the Big 12 Conference to win the honor twice in the same season. Alexander won 1st-Team All-American honors for his

efforts in 2009, and he ended his career holding the MU career record for receiving yards (2,778).

The 2009 season saw senior punter Jake Harry IV turn in an outstanding season which included honorable mention All-Big 12 honors. Harry ranked 29th nationally in punting average (42.77), and he helped Mizzou rank 4th in the country in team net punting (40.48) – the highest MU has ever finished in the national standings in the category.

The 2008 season saw Hill work to develop sophomore Jeremy Maclin into arguably the most dynamic player in the nation. Maclin set an MU single-season record with 102 catches, 1,260 yards and 13 touchdowns receiving, and he also led the NCAA in all-purpose yardage, with his per-game average of 202.4 yards. The game-changer won consensus 1st-Team All-American honors for his play, as well as being named a finalist for the Biletnikoff Award, given annually to the nation's top receiver. Maclin chose to bypass his final two years of eligibility at Mizzou, and was taken with the 19th overall selection in the 2009 NFL Draft by the Philadelphia Eagles.

Hill's group produced in record numbers during the Tigers' 10-4 season in 2008. As a team, Mizzou's passing attack shattered school records for receptions (404), receiving yards (4,625) and receiving touchdowns (41). Mizzou's passing attack ranked 4th in the NCAA in 2008, with a per-game average of 330.36 yards. In addition to Maclin's many exploits, another pupil of Hill's had a strong close to his Tiger career. Former walk-on Tommy Saunders developed into one of the Big 12's most underrated receiving threats, as he caught 72 passes for 833 yards and seven scores in 2008, and he ended his career ranked among MU's top-10 in both receptions and yardage.

Thanks in no small part to Hill's work with the receivers, Mizzou's offense set myriad records in 2007, as the passing attack ranked 9th in the NCAA, averaging 314.07 yards per game. Two of his pupils, senior Will Franklin and freshman Jeremy Maclin, earned all-

league honors for their outstanding play in 2007, including Maclin, who was a consensus 1st-Team All-American for his exploits as both a receiver and return man, in addition to being named 1st-Team All-Big 12 and Big 12 Offensive Freshman of the Year. Franklin, who was selected in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs, won honorable mention All-Big 12 honors, and ended his stellar Tiger career ranked in the school's top 10 for receptions and yards.

Under Hill's tutelage in 2006, the Tiger receiving corps was instrumental in helping Mizzou develop into a passing attack that ranked 10th in the country, averaging 276.15 yards per game. Four Tiger wideouts had 25 or more catches, including Franklin (48), Perry (37), Brad Ekwerekwu (32) and Tommy Saunders (25). Franklin earned honorable mention All-Big 12 status for his breakout year, which included 829 yards and six touchdowns in 11 games, with the yardage total ranking as the seventh-most in MU single-season history. Perry, a true freshman, developed quicker than anticipated, as Hill coached him to honorable mention freshman All-American honors.

Hill also doubles as a highly-successful recruiter, primarily in the Kansas City and mid-Missouri areas, as he's been responsible for landing such big names over the years as Martin Rucker, 2008 Mackey Award Winner Chase Coffman, and Tony Temple, among numerous others. He was named by Rivals.com as one of the top-10 recruiters in the Big 12 Conference for 2007.

Hill helped develop Gage into one of the top receivers in the Big 12 Conference and one of the premier wide outs in the country. After converting from quarterback in the spring of 2000, Gage caught 200 passes for 2,704 yards and 18 touchdowns in three seasons – all MU career receiving records. Gage left after

2002 holding virtually every game, season and career receiving mark on the Mizzou books, and made an impact professionally, where he was the Tennessee Titans' leading receiver in 2007 and 2008.

Five of Hill's receivers are among 12 Tigers all-time to accumulate over 160 receiving yards in a single-game, with Gage holding the school record of 236 yards (accomplished twice). Missouri has had 16 different receivers go over 100 yards in a single game during Hill's tenure.

Previous to Missouri, Hill was the head football coach at Hutchinson (Kan.) Junior College. Hutchinson went 18-6 under Hill, including a 10-2 record in 1995 when it won its first Conference title since 1969 and ranked ninth in the final NJCAA national poll. He was named the conference Coach of the Year. Hill was the offensive coordinator at Hutchinson in 1992 and 1993 after serving as a graduate assistant at SMU in the spring of 1992.

Hill is a Mizzou grad who walked on the Tiger football team in 1980 and eventually earned a scholarship. He lettered in 1980, '81, '83 and '84 and played on Missouri teams that earned trips to the Liberty, Tangerine and Holiday Bowls. In his career, Hill caught 51 passes for 946 yards and scored seven touchdowns. As a senior, he caught 25 passes for 445 yards and three scores. Following his playing days at Missouri, he spent time in the training camps of the Kansas City Chiefs and Calgary Stampeders in 1985 and '86.

Andy and his wife Sarah are the parents of a daughter, Patricia Ryan, and son Andrew. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in economics from MU in 1985. He worked for the athletic department as MU's group sales coordinator in 1988-89, and also worked at American Bank in his hometown of Trenton, Mo., and for Edwards D. Jones Co. in Brookfield.

Brian Jones

Running Backs

Brian Jones has been a member of Gary Pinkel's coaching staff since 1992. He has coached an excellent running game for the last 17 seasons, after initially coaching wide receivers from 1992-94.

Jones oversaw the transformation of the Tiger offensive attack into one of the nation's most balanced, as Mizzou was one of just two schools nationally in 2011 to average at least 230 yards rushing and passing.

His tailbacks carried a big load in 2011, as the Tigers won the Big 12 Conference team rushing title, averaging a league-best 244.00 yards per game (ranking them 9th in the NCAA). Led by super sophomore Henry Josey, who ranked 2nd in the Big 12 (12th nationally), averaging 116.80 yards a game before ending his season early in game #10 against Texas. Despite his early end to the season, Josey earned unanimous 1st-Team All-Big 12 honors after beginning the year at No. 3 on the depth chart.

Jones and his troops also rose to the challenge in 2010, as a talented group of tailbacks combined in committee style to rush for over 1,500 yards and 19 touchdowns as the Tiger run game ranked sixth in the Big 12 overall, averaging 156.38 yards per game (2,033 yards all told on the season).

In 2008, Jones took a first-year starter with limited prior experience, in true sophomore Derrick Washington, and helped mold him into one of the Big 12 Conference's top running backs. Washington became only the eighth running back in Mizzou history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season, as he tallied 1,036 on 177 carries (5.9 avg.) in 2008. He added 17 rushing touchdowns in his first year as a starter, which was just one shy of the school single season record.

The 2009 season saw the Tiger run game contribute with 1,651 yards, of which 1,342 came from the trio of junior Derrick Washington, sophomore De'Vion Moore and true freshman Kendial Lawrence. Washington earned honorable mention All-Big 12 acclaim for his season, which included

865 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns, to go with 26 receptions out of the backfield.

Of the eight Tiger running backs with 1,000-yard seasons, Jones has coached four of them in his time on the Mizzou sideline, including one each in three consecutive years, from 2006-08.

Jones helped develop Tony Temple into one of the top ball carriers in the Big 12 Conference in recent years, as the Kansas City, Mo., native ranked second in the league in rushing in 2006, with a career-high 1,063 yards and seven touchdowns, and followed with a 1,039-yard, 12-touchdown campaign in 2008, becoming the first running back in Mizzou history to claim multiple 1,000-yard seasons.

Temple closed his Tiger career in illustrious fashion, as he broke a 52-year old record by rushing for a Cotton Bowl-record 284 yards and four touchdowns in Mizzou's rout of Arkansas. The yardage total was also the second-most in the history of Division I-A bowl games.

With Mizzou's high-flying passing game getting most of the headlines, it's easy to overlook the fact that the Tigers also run the ball very well and very often. Mizzou ran for just under 2,500 yards in 2007 (2,467), and amassed 29 rushing touchdowns as well, providing a nice compliment to the air game. They followed with 2,153 yards and 28 rushing scores in 2008.

Temple earned honorable mention All-Big 12 status by league coaches in both 2006 and 2007. He also ran for 194 yards and two touchdowns in the 2006 Sun Bowl against Oregon State.

Despite their overall youth, and some injury problems for each one throughout the year, Jones' group made steady progress in 2005, and contributed heavily to MU's rushing attack, which ranked 3rd in the Big 12 Conference, and 17th in the NCAA, averaging 205.25 yards per game. Mizzou's tailbacks combined to rush for more than 1,100 yards and tallied 8 TDs in 2005, averaging a healthy 5.6 yards per carry.

In May of 2006, Jones was one of only 25 coaches selected to participate in the prestigious NCAA Expert Coaches Academy.

Jones' backs rushed for over 1,200 yards and had 9 of MU's 13 rushing TDs on the season in 2004. They were led by junior Damien Nash, who had 792 yards and 7 TDs, and redshirt freshman Marcus Woods, who had 428 yards and 2 scores. Woods was named 1st-Team Freshman All-Big 12 for his efforts in 2004. Nash was a 5th-round draft pick by the Tennessee Titans in the 2005 NFL Draft.

Mizzou had one of the nation's most potent rushing attacks in 2003, as the Tigers pounded their way to 3,087 yards, good for a per-game average of 237.46 yards that ranked MU 1st in the Big 12 Conference and 6th in the NCAA statistics. It marked the first time since 1960 that MU won a conference rushing championship, when the Tigers led the old Big Eight with a mark of 249.3 yards per game. Missouri rushed for 38 touchdowns on the year, on the way to scoring a school single-season record 399 points.

Jones' workhorse from 2001-03 was tailback Zack Abron. Abron thrived under Jones' coaching and turned himself into one of the top backs in the Big 12 Conference. Abron rushed for a career-best 1,155 yards in 2003, making him only the 7th 1,000-yard rusher in MU history.

Abron set numerous career records in 2003, as he left MU holding the standard in rushing yards (3,198), touchdowns (42) and points (252). He improved his average yards per rush from 3.6 as a freshman in 2000 to a healthy 5.3 in 2003, and also worked with Jones to develop himself into a pass-catching threat out of the backfield. Abron was named 2nd-Team All-Big 12 in 2003 for his work, and went on to sign a free agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons following

the 2004 Draft.

During Jones' last two seasons at Toledo, UT's running attack was ranked in the top-10 in the country. In 2000, the Rockets' running game ranked ninth in the country, racking up 253.8 yards per game. UT compiled 2,792 yards on the ground and averaged 5.43 yards per carry. In 1999, Toledo ranked 10th in the country in rushing, compiling 239.2 yards per outing and ranked No. 1 in the nation in yards per attempt (5.35). Jones' protégé Chester Taylor racked up 1,176 yards and ranked 20th in the country, while his rushing average of 6.5 yards per carry ranked second-best in the nation.

In 1995, Toledo led the league and ranked fifth in the nation in rushing, averaging 244.5 yards per game. The Rockets' starting tailback that season, Wasean Tait, broke 16 school records. Tait was the named the MAC Player of the Year and garnered second team All-America honors ranking second in the nation in rushing and third in scoring.

Jones came to Toledo from Lafayette College where he served as the wide receivers coach for one season. Prior to that, Jones served three years each as an assistant coach with the Massachusetts (1988-91) and Villanova (1984-87).

He also had coaching stints at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (1983-84), Norwich (VT) University (1982-83) and the New York Institute of Technology (1981-82).

Jones was an offensive lineman at the University of Connecticut, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in marketing in 1980. He also holds a Master of Science degree in administration and physical education from Norwich (1983).

Jones was born in Jamaica and raised in New York City. He and his wife, Mary Kay, are the parents of sons Grant and Brandon, and daughter Audrey.

Craig Kuligowski is in his 21st season alongside Gary Pinkel, including his 17th season coaching the defensive line. One of the more accomplished assistant coaches in the nation, Kuligowski has coached six Tigers to 1st-Team All-Big 12 honors, including four in the last five seasons – Lorenzo Williams in 2007, followed by Ziggy Hood in 2008, Aldon Smith in 2010 and Dominique Hamilton in 2011.

Hamilton was an anchor on the line for Mizzou in 2011, as he led all Big 12 interior linemen with his 56 tackles, and he also helped clinch a pair of dramatic wins at Texas A&M and against Texas Tech when he deflected passes to end each game.

The 2010 season saw Smith earn 1st-Team All-Big 12 honors despite missing three games with a broken leg early in the year. Following his sophomore season, Smith chose to bypass his final two years of eligibility and was a first-round draft pick in the 2011 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers, where he blossomed into one of the league's top defensive rookies in 2011.

Smith wasn't the only Kuligowski protégé to earn acclaim in 2010, as five linemen in all took home honors, including sophomore end Brad Madison (2nd-Team), junior end Jacques Smith (Hon. Men.), junior tackle Terrell Resonno (Hon. Men.)

Coach "Kul" debuted a star pupil in 2009 – redshirt freshman end Aldon Smith – who turned out to be one of the top freshmen in the entire nation. Smith was named the Big 12 Conference Defensive Freshman/Newcomer of the Year, in unanimous fashion, and he also earned 3rd-Team All-American honors, as well as 1st-Team Freshman All-American honors for his outstanding play in 2009.

Smith broke the MU single-season quarterback sacks record in 2009, with 11.5 to surpass the old mark of 11 set in 2000 by former All-American Justin Smith. Aldon Smith also had 19 tackles for loss in his first year on the field for Mizzou, and he led all of the nation's freshmen in both sacks and tackles for loss a year ago. Smith was joined by senior Jaron Baston (2nd-Team All-Big 12)

in receiving all-conference honors in 2009.

Kuligowski's defensive line was stout against the run in 2009, as it helped the Tiger defense to a national ranking of 26th against the run (allowing 118.62 yards per game). The ranking and yards allowed were the lowest by any Mizzou defense against the run since the 1983 team ranked 5th in the country with an average of 97.70 yards per game.

Hood, and another star disciple, defensive end Stryker Sulak (who earned 2nd-Team All-Big 12 mention in both 2007 and 2008) were invited to participate in the 2009 NFL Combine, and both were eventually taken in the 2009 NFL Draft, with Hood going in the first round with the 32nd overall pick by the defending Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers, with Sulak going in the 6th round to the Oakland Raiders. Sulak ended his career tied for second on Mizzou's quarterback sacks list, with 22.5, while Hood finished 10th with 15.5 for his career.

In 2007, Kuligowski coached all four of his starters on the Tiger defensive line to at least honorable mention All-Big 12 honors, including Lorenzo Williams, who claimed 1st-Team mention for his outstanding play.

The 2006 season also saw Kuligowski's pupils succeed at a high level, as he coached standout defensive ends Brian Smith, Xzavie Jackson and tackle Lorenzo Williams to All-Big 12 honors, with Smith earning 2nd-Team mention, while Jackson and Williams won their first-ever honorable mention acclaim.

Despite being hurt severely by injuries in 2006, the Tiger defensive line was a disruptive force early and often, as they amassed 28 combined sacks of MU's overall 36 sacks on the season which were the second-most in school history (41 sacks in 1982 is the MU record). Smith was a catalyst, as he broke MU's career sack record before breaking his hip in game eight against Kansas State. Jackson and Williams stepped up in Smith's absence, and rank on MU's alltime career top-10 in sacks.

Facing arguably the biggest rebuilding

job at any position on the team in 2005, Kuligowski oversaw a defensive line that grew into a solid unit, despite losing three starters from 2004 to the NFL. Junior defensive end Brian Smith blossomed into an every-down player, and had a monster year, ranking among the best in the Big 12 Conference with 9 QB sacks, 17 tackles for loss and 12 QB hurries, to go along with his career-high total of 66 tackles. Smith earned 2nd-Team All-Big 12 accolades for his performance.

Kuligowski's line was a focal point for the Tiger defense in 2004, and a major reason for the overall improvement of the defense. Three of his pupils – tackles Atiyyah Ellison and C.J. Mosley, and end Brian Smith – earned various All-Big 12 honors for their play in 2004, with Ellison and Mosley pulling in 1st-Team distinction. Redshirt freshman Lorenzo Williams also earned 1st-Team Freshman All-Big 12 honors by The Sporting News.

Two of Kuligowski's protégés were drafted as part of the 2005 NFL Draft, as tackles Atiyyah Ellison (3rd round) and C.J. Mosley (6th round) were picked by the Carolina Panthers and Minnesota Vikings, respectively. Later, defensive end Zach Ville signed a free agent deal with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Kuligowski's line has steadily improved against the run since he arrived in 2001. In 2006, Mizzou allowed 134.54 yards per game on the ground, which ranked 58th nationally. The 2004 Tiger outfit allowed 152.09 yards rushing per game, which ranked them 64th in the nation. In 2005, the numbers were virtually identical, with an average of 152.18 yards per game that ranked MU 63rd nationally. That followed a mark of 167.23 yards per game in 2003, which ranked them 72nd in NCAA statistics. That marked an improvement from a rank of 78th in 2002 (167.75 ypg) and 89th in 2001 (198.73).

Under Kuligowski's leadership, the Tiger defensive line proved to be the strength of MU's defense in 2002. Led by senior tackle Keith Wright and senior end Antwaun Bynum, the Tiger front four was a constant disruptive force for opposing teams. Wright led the Big 12 Conference, and ranked in the top-10 nationally, with 23 tackles for loss in 2002, while Bynum ranked among conference leaders in sacks, fumbles forced and tackles for loss.

Bynum earned first team All-Big 12 honors in 2002, and was named an honorable mention All-American by CNNSI.com, while Wright was a first team All-Big 12 pick by various outlets. Wright's development led to him being a 6th-round selection by the Houston Texans in the 2003 NFL Draft.

Kuligowski was credited with building one of the top defensive lines in the MAC during his tenure at Toledo. In 2000, the Rockets were ranked fifth in the country in rushing defense, allowing just 81.5 yards per game and 2.46 yards per carry. They were ranked third in the country in scoring defense, third in total defense and No. 1 in turnover margin.

In 1997, Kuligowski coached first team All-MAC lineman Jason Richards, who signed with the NFL's Tennessee Titans.

Kuligowski was a four-year standout at Toledo (1987-90) as an offensive tackle. He was named first team All-MAC two straight years and helped lead UT to the MAC title his senior year. He was an integral part of the 1990 offense that turned in totals of 135 rushing first downs, 2,474 rushing yards and 4,335 total yards, all top five marks in Toledo history.

Kuligowski earned a bachelor of business administration degree from Toledo in 1991. He and his wife Mary have two daughters: Peyton and Madeline, and son Max, who was born in March of 2005.

Bruce Walker made a move in 2009 to serve as co-offensive line coach, a position he had assisted with for the previous 13 seasons under Gary Pinkel, while also being in charge of the tight ends. He made a name for himself one of the top tight ends coaches in the nation the past several years, as he helped develop Martin Rucker and Chase Coffman into two of the most accomplished players in the nation. Each won consensus 1st-Team All-American honors in 2007 (Rucker) and 2008 (Coffman), and Coffman capped his record-breaking career by winning the John Mackey Tight End Award, given annually to the nation's top player at that position. Coffman became the first Tiger in history to win a national individual honor that is specific to a position group.

In Walker's first year as co-offensive coach in 2009, his group excelled at protecting first-year starting quarterback Blaine Gabbert. Thanks to the line's work, Mizzou ranked 14th in the nation in passing while allowing only 20 sacks in 13 games. Three of Walker's linemen – senior Kurtis Gregory (2nd-Team), and sophomores Elvis Fisher (Hon. Men.) and Dan Hoch (Hon. Men.) – all earned Big 12 award status. Gregory eventually earned an invitation to the NFL Combine for his stellar play.

It was more of the same from Walker's group in 2010, as the Tiger offensive line helped pave the way for an attack that ranked 35th in the nation, averaging 409.62 yards per game as Mizzou won 10 games for only the fourth time in school history. Four of Walker's starting five on the line earned some level of all-conference honors, including senior center Tim Barnes (1st-Team), junior tackle Dan Hoch (2nd-Team), junior tackle Elvis Fisher (Hon. Men.) and junior guard Austin Wuebbels (Hon. Men.).

In 2011, the Tiger offensive line – despite the pre-season loss of All-Big 12 left tackle Elvis Fisher to a season-ending injury – developed into a stout unit that paved the way for a Big 12 team rushing title in 2011.

The Tigers ranked 9th nationally, and led the Big 12 in rushing (244.00 avg.) and also ranked 12th nationally in total offense (475.54 avg.), despite featuring a first-year starter at quarterback.

From 2004-08, Walker had the luxury of working with the best pair of tight ends in the nation, in Martin Rucker and Chase Coffman. Rucker culminated his outstanding Tiger career with an award-winning season in 2007, as he was a consensus 1st-Team All-American, becoming MU's first All-American tight end since the great Kellen Winslow in 1978. Rucker caught an MU-record 84 passes in 2007 for 834 yards and 8 touchdowns, while also being a finalist for the John Mackey Tight End Award. Rucker was selected in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Cleveland Browns.

Coffman caught 90 passes for 987 yards and 10 touchdowns in 2008, despite missing two games due to injury, and he ended his career with school records of 247 receptions and 30 touchdowns, to go with the 2nd-most receiving yardage in MU history (2,659). He was a third-round NFL Draft pick in 2009 by the Cincinnati Bengals.

Each player won 1st-Team All-Big 12 honors in 2006 (Rucker from coaches, Coffman from media), and Coffman was a semi-finalist for the John Mackey Award. The duo combined to catch 111 passes for 1,149 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2006.

In 2005, Rucker earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors after leading MU with 47 catches for 567 yards and 1 TD, with his catches ranking 1st among Big 12 tight ends in 2005, and 2nd-most in MU single-season history for the position. Coffman, despite being a true freshman, was nothing but impressive from day one in fall camp, as he tied Rucker with 47 catches for 503 yards and 4 TDs. Those numbers ranked at the time as the 3rd-best single-season performance in MU tight end history, and earned the rookie a spot on the Rivals.com Freshman All-American 1st-Team.

In 2004, the tight ends were instrumental in MU's passing attack, with the primary weapons being senior Victor Sesay and redshirt freshman Martin Rucker. The duo combined for 50 catches, 577 yards and 6 touchdowns on the season. Rucker earned 2nd-Team Freshman All-American honors for his standout rookie year that saw him grab 19 balls for 263 yards and 4 TDs, the latter of which was the 2nd-best total on the squad. Sesay signed a free agent contract following the 2005 NFL Draft with the Miami Dolphins.

In 2001, Missouri tight ends combined for 50 receptions, 484 yards and eight touchdowns. Dwayne Blakley was tabbed honorable mention All-Big 12 after pulling in 34 receptions for 362 yards and four touchdowns. He went on to sign a free agent contract with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs, and currently plays with the Atlanta Falcons, having started multiple games during the 2007 season.

Walker has successfully recruited some of the best high school players out of the state of Texas while at Mizzou. Walker signed highly-regarded all-state defensive end Brian Smith (Denton) in 2002 and all-state wide receiver Thomson Omboga (Grand Prairie) in 2001. Smith went on to become Mizzou's alltime career quarterback sacks leader and was drafted by the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars. Walker also inked safety Justin Garrett, who was a productive multi-year starter for the Tigers, and more recently signed Jacques Smith of Dallas, who made big impressions while earning significant playing time in 2008 as a true freshman defensive end. His recruiting bounty of several stars in 2010 helped the Tiger recruiting class garner a national ranking of 21st-best in the nation

– the highest a Tiger class has ever been ranked.

While at Toledo, Walker coached two of the best tight ends to ever wear a Rockets' uniform. From 1998-2000, Walker coached All-MAC tight end Mike Billik, who finished his career with 75 receptions. He also coached Lyle Green, who was voted the team's most valuable receiver in 1999 and a co-captain in 2000. Green was the third overall pick in the 2001 CFL Draft. During the 2000 season, the Rocket tight ends combined for 59 catches and six touchdowns.

In 1993, behind Walker's offensive line, the Central Washington led all NAIA schools in total offense, averaging 517 yards per game. CWU also ranked first in the NAIA in rushing, averaging 198.5 yards per game. In 1995, the Wildcats earned a share of the NAIA national title, tying Findlay (OH) in the title game.

The quarterback of that team, Jon Kitna, finished his career with 12,907 yards in total offense and 12,353 passing yards, the best and second-best, respectively, in NAIA Division II history.

Walker graduated from Eastmont High School in East Wenatchee, Wash., where he earned All-Mid Valley League honors at linebacker and center. He played two seasons at Yakima Valley College before Central Washington.

A 1983 graduate of CWU, where he earned a bachelor of science degree in business administration, Walker was a two-year starter for the Wildcats at center. He earned a Master of Science degree in physical education in 1989.

Walker and wife, Sharryn, are the parents of Natalie and Maggie.

In his ninth year as part of the Tiger coaching staff – and sixth in his title of director of football recruiting – is Nick Otterbacher. He assumed those duties after serving as an offensive graduate assistant coach for the 2006 season, when he helped coach a Tiger offense that broke numerous school records and ranked eighth in the nation in total offense (425.62 yards per game).

In his current role, Otterbacher oversees organizational efforts of virtually all aspects of MU's extensive recruiting program operations, such as coordinating on-and-off campus visits, mailings and other logistical arrangements. Mizzou's 2010 recruiting class was ranked 21st-best in the nation according to Rivals.com, which marked the highest-ever ranking for a Tiger class of recruits. The recently-completed 2012 class was ranked as high as No. 20 by ESPN.com, and featured the nation's No. 1 overall prospect in Dorial Green-Beckham from Springfield, Mo..

Otterbacher served as an offensive graduate assistant coach for the 2005 and 2006 seasons, after serving on staff as an administrative graduate assistant in 2004.

A native of Tampa, Fla., Otterbacher was a four-year starter at center for the

University of Toledo, where he played under Tiger Head Coach Gary Pinkel through the 2000 season. In his four-year playing career, Otterbacher was part of Toledo teams that went a combined 34-13 from 1998-2001, and won or shared three Mid-American Athletic Conference championships, while playing in the Motor City Bowl in 2001.

After graduating from Toledo with a degree in business management in May of 2002, Otterbacher got his start in coaching at Duquesne University, where he served as the tight ends and assistant offensive line coach for the 2002 season which saw Duquesne post an 11-1 record and claim the Metro Atlantic Conference championship.

He then went to West Virginia Tech as an assistant coach, and was the offensive line coach and run game coordinator and recruiting coordinator for the 2003 season, prior to joining the Mizzou staff in July of 2004.

He and his wife, Jessica, have a daughter, Reagan, and a son, Kaine Charles Cotton Otterbacher, who was born in Dallas, Texas, the week of MU's 2008 Cotton Bowl victory over Arkansas.

Dan Hopkins, a 2004 University of Missouri graduate, is in his fourth season as Director of Football Operations, after being promoted to that post prior to the 2009 season. Previously, he spent two years as the Tiger Football staff's administrative graduate assistant.

In his current role, Hopkins is involved in a wide variety of important administrative duties that involve the Tiger program.

'THE 5th DOWN' — A GAME TO REMEMBER; A GAME TO FORGET

One of college football's most historic games took place on Faurot Field on Oct. 6, 1990, when the eventual national champion Colorado Buffaloes pulled out a 33-31 victory, scoring the winning touchdown on what turned out to be a fifth down on the last play of the game.

With MU leading 31-27, Colorado embarked on a frantic march down the field in the final minute of play. Gaining a first down at the MU three-yard line, with 31 seconds to play, CU quarterback Charles Johnson spiked the ball to stop the clock. After regrouping, Eric Bieniemy charged up the middle to the one-yard line and Colorado called its final time out. Eighteen seconds remained.

It was here that the officials failed to notify the chain crew to flip the down marker from 2nd to 3rd down. When play resumed, Bieniemy tried to go over the top but was thrust backward by Tom Reiner, Mike Ringgenberg and Maurice Benson. The clock reached eight seconds, and officials ordered it stopped momentarily to clear the pileup.

Then, on what was fourth down, Johnson spiked the ball again. With two seconds to play, Johnson squirted over right tackle Mark VanderPoel. Hit by Reiner and Ringgenberg, he rolled over and extended the ball into the endzone and the officials signalled touchdown.

Pandemonium reigned for more than 20 minutes as those in attendance tried to determine just what had happened. But, with time expired, there was no avenue for appeal. What had appeared to be a major upset victory for the Tigers went into the record books as a bitter pill to swallow.

Colorado went on to win the Big Eight Conference championship, and with a victory over Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl, claimed a share of the national championship.

- 5-G-MU 1 Johnson runs middle. TOUCHDOWN. Johnson run for PAT, no good.
