FIRST AND 10

-Ohio faces off against Louisiana-Monroe in the 2012 Independence Bowl on Dec. 28 at 2 p.m. (EST). The game can be seen on ESPN.

-The Bobcats will make their fourth-consecutive bowl appearance and their fifth in the last seven years.

-Ohio is one of just 28 schools in the country to go to four straight bowl games.

-The Bobcats will make their 50th appearance on the ESPN Family of Networks since 2005.

-The Bobcats have won 14 of their last 19 games dating back to last season.

-Ohio ranks ninth in the NCAA in turnover margin.

-Quarterback Tyler Tettleton became Ohio University's all-time leader in career completions at Ball State on Nov. 14. On Nov. 7 against Bowling Green, he became the program's all-time leading passer.

-Tettleton currently holds six of the school's career passing records.

-Running back Beau Blankenship, who set the program's single season rushing record, has rushed for 1,500 yards to become the eighth individual in school history to surpass 1,000 yards rushing.

-Ohio became bowl eligible for the sixth time in the last eight years following its 38-31 win over Buffalo on Oct. 6 and was the first team in the country to become bowl eligible.

-The Bobcats won seven straight games to open the season. Ohio's 7-0 start was its best start to a season since 1968.

-Ohio is one of four teams in the Mid-American

Conference that have been ranked in the AP Top 25 this season.

-Head coach Frank Solich coached in his 100th game at Ohio on Nov. 7 against Bowling Green.

A WIN OVER LOUISIANA-MONROE WOULD...

-Mark the Bobcats' second bowl win in program history.

-Mark back-to-back bowl wins for Ohio. Only four current league members have won bowl games in consecutive years.

-Hand Ohio its seventh nine-win season in school history and fourth under the direction of head coach Frank Solich.

-Give the Bobcats' their 15th win in their last 20 games dating back to last season.

-Mark the Bobcats' first win over a Sun Belt opponent since 2009 when it defeated North Texas.

-Give head coach Frank Solich his 59th career win at Ohio, which would tie him with former Miami head coach Randy Walker for 12th on the MAC all-time career wins list.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

-Junior running back Beau Blankenship needs just 80 yards on the ground to crack into the Top 15 on the all-time single season MAC rushing list.

-Blankenship's eight 100-yard rushing games this year are tied for the most in school history for a single season. If he surpasses 100 yards rushing he will become the all-time single season leader for most 100-yard games.

-Blankenship's 11 rushing touchdowns are ranked in the all-time Top 10 for a single season. He is currently two

-Redshirt senior offensive lineman Eric Herman will look to make his 51st-consecutive start against ULM.

-Quarterback Tyler Tettleton is just four touchdown passes shy of 20 for the season. No Ohio signal-caller has ever thrown for 20-or-more touchdown passes in back-to-back seasons.

-Tettleton is also just 57 yards shy of totaling 6,000 yards for his career.

-Wide receiver Donte Foster is just two touchdown receptions shy of cracking into the all-time top three for career touchdown receptions. He is currently fifth all-time with 13 career receiving touchdowns.

-Foster is also just four catches shy of cracking into the all-time single season Top 10 for receptions.

-Linebacker Keith Moore is just 11 tackles shy tallying 100 tackles for the season.

OHIO vs. TEAMS FROM THE SUN BELT

Ohio's matchup with Louisiana-Monroe is the first all-time meeting with the Warhawks, however the Bobcats are no stranger to teams from the Sun Belt Conference. Ohio has played six games against teams from the Sun Belt and has an overall record of 4-2. Ohio's last meeting against a Sun Belt team came against Troy in the 2010 R&L Carriers New Orleans Bowl.

SCOUTING LOUISIANA-MONROE

Louisiana-Monroe comes into the Independence Bowl, having split its final four games of the season to finish the year 8-4. ULM will be making its first bowl appearance since moving up to the FBS ranks beginning with the 1994 campaign. ULM earned a total of 10 postseason honors from the Sun Belt Conference following a strong 2012 campaign. Head coach Todd Berry was named the

league's coach of the year, while junior quarterback Kolton Browning was tabbed the conference's offensive player of the year. Browning led an offense that set school record with 59 touchdowns this season. Defensively, ULM lead the Sun Belt in stopping the run, limiting opponents to just 135.8 yards per game.

25,893 - The Bobcats played in front of a school record crowd of 25,893 fans at Peden Stadium in its home-opener.

21,844 - Ohio averaged a school record 21,844 fans at Peden Stadium this past fall.

2,513 - Quarterback Tyler Tettleton surpassed 2,500 yards through the air for the second-consecutive season.

1968 - The Bobcats 7-0 start was their best start to a season since the 1968 campaign.

1,500 - Running back Beau Blankenship rushed for a program record 1,500 yards on the ground during the regular season.

400 - Senior place kicker Matt Weller finished the regular season with 400 career points, which ranks No. 1 all-time in school history.

367 - The Bobcats scored 367 points in 2012, which is the third-highest mark in school history.

100 - Head coach Frank Solich coached in his 100th career game at Ohio earlier this season against Bowling Green.

50 - Senior offensive lineman Eric Herman made his 50th consecutive start in the Bobcats regular season finale at Kent State.

24 - Ohio scored 24 points in its season-opening win at Penn State.

23 - The Bobcats were ranked as high as No. 23 in the Associated Press Poll.

SIX BOBCATS EARN MAC ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS

Seniors Matt Weller, Eric Herman, Skyler Allen and junior Beau Blankenship earned All-MAC Second Team honors, while high school teammates and senior defensive players Alphonso Lewis and Neal Huynh were named to the All-MAC Third Team. Weller's Second Team honor marked the third time in his career he was selected All-MAC.

TETTELTON 2K PLUS

Ohio signal-caller Tyler Tettleton became the first quarterback in school history to throw for 2,500-yards or more in back-to-back seasons. His 2,513 passing yards this season rank second all-time for a single season.

AMONG THE NATION'S BEST

Ohio junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton has established himself as one of the nation's best signal-callers. Tettleton is one of only three quarterbacks across the country that have thrown 15-or-more touchdowns and three-or-fewer interceptions.

Blankenship's 269 yards at Massachusetts served as a game and career-high. In 2012, Blankenship finished the regular season ranked No. 10th in the NCAA and third in the MAC in rushing, averaging 125.0 yards per game. At the end of the season, Blankenship was named All-MAC Second Team and Phil Steele All-MAC First Team. Earlier in the year, Blankenship was named to the Phil Steele, CBS Sports and SI.com Midseason All-America Teams.

A RECORD PACE

In 2012, junior Beau Blankenship surpassed former

-Finished the game with 164 receiving yards.

-Junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton's 79-yard touchdown pass to Foster was the Bobcats' longest play from scrimmage of the year.

-His 79-yard touchdown reception was the sixth longest receiving play in school history.

WELLER FINISHES STRONG

Senior kicker Matt Weller struggled through the Bobcats' first four games of the season as he connected on just 9-of-15 field goals. Since Sept. 29, Weller has drilled 13-of-15 field goals.

MOORE NOMINATED FOR THE BURLSWORTH TROPHY

Junior linebacker Keith Moore has been nominated for the 2012 Burlsworth Trophy. The 50 nominees for the award were announced Nov. 13. Moore (Grove City, Ohio), who joined the team prior to the 2010 season as a walk-on, leads the team in tackles with 86. The Trophy is given to the most outstanding football player in America who began his career as a walk-on. A walk-on is defined as a player who began his first season of participation with a D1 (FBS) football program without financial aid of any kind from his university's athletic department.

SECOND HALF WARRIORS

In 12 games this season, Ohio has proven to be a very strong second half team, outscoring its opponents 163-133 in the final 30 minutes. In the last five contests, Ohio has limited its foes to just 48 points (9.6 avg.) total during the second half.

Ohio has never been ranked in all three polls at the same time. The Bobcats had also never been ranked in the BCS Standings or the USA Today Coaches Poll.

LOOKING BACK AT BLANKENSHIP'S CAREER DAY AT UMASS

-Junior running back Beau Blankenship tied former Bobcat running back Bill Gary's school record of 43 carries.

-Blankenship rushed for 148 yards in the first half. He would go on to finish the game with 269 yards, which is the third highest single game total in school history.

-Blankenship's 43 carries and 269 rushing yards were both career-highs.

-Blankenship's 269 yards rushing marked just the sixth time in school history in which an Ohio running back has surpassed 250 yards rushing.

GETTING DEFENSIVE

-The Ohio defense held Eastern Michigan scoreless in the second half, allowing just 135 yards after halftime.

-Ohio was outgained 309-216 in the first half, but the defense responded in the second half, holding Miami to just 115 yards of total offense in the second half alone.

-The Bobcats tied a season-high with three fumble recoveries against Buffalo.

-Junior Keith Moore tallied a season-best 16 tackles (solo) in the Bobcats' win over Buffalo.

-Ohio forced Norfolk State into five turnovers. The five turnovers forced by the Bobcats were a season-high.

-The Bobcats have allowed the fewest points and the fewest yards in the Mid-American Conference in 2012.

-Ohio's defensive unit has limited its opponents to less than 100 yards rushing in three of its four games this season.

-Ohio forced Marshall into three turnovers on Sept 15.

-The Bobcats notched six sacks on Sept. 8 against New Mexico State.

-Ohio notched its 38th non-offensive touchdown since 2004 after Nathan Carpenter recorded a pick six late in the third quarter against New Mexico State.

-Ohio held Penn State to just 173 yards of total offense over the final three quarters in its opener against the Nittany Lions.

-Patterson's kick return for a touchdown was the first since Chris Garrett did so in 2009 at Tennessee.

-Patterson's 100-yard kick return for a touchdown was also the Bobcats' 39th non-offensive touchdown since the start of the 2004 season.

ALL GOOD THINGS MUST COME TO AN END

Quarterback Tyler Tettleton threw his first interception of the season vs. Buffalo, which marked the first time in 161 attempts dating back to last season in which he has thrown an interception.

THE NATION'S BEST

Ohio grabbed the nation's attention on the season's first Saturday with a second-half rally to beat Penn State on the road, 24-14, earning Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week honors for games of the weekend of Sept. 1.

MR CLUTCH

Quarterback Tyler Tettleton is quickly developing into one of the nation's top quarterbacks in the clutch. Leading by just three points midway through the fourth quarter at Penn State, Tettleton led a 14 play, 93-yard drive, which was capped by a five yard touchdown pass to Donte Foster. Tettleton also led game-winning drives against Bowling Green and Utah State, which clinched the MAC East and the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl titles, respectively.

Since taking over as the starter in 2011, Tettleton has thrown for **1,017 yards, seven touchdown passes** and just two interceptions in the fourth quarter.

A PAIR OF FORMER WALK-ONS MAKE THEIR MARK

Ohio defensive end Corey Hasting and middle linebacker Keith Moore were both walk-on players, but now the two have earned scholarships and are currently key starters in the Bobcat defensive unit. In 12 games this season, the Bobcat duo have combined for 140 tackles and 10.5 tackles for loss.

SPREADING THE WEALTH

Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton has hit 14 different targets this season. Junior Donte Foster leads the team with 56 receptions.

HEAD COACH, EIGHTH SEASON

Nebraska '66

Eighth Season at Ohio (58-44, 40-24 MAC)
14th Season Overall (116-63)

Head Coach Frank Solich has continued a storybook turnaround during his tenure at Ohio University. Now in his eighth season (14th overall), the Bobcats have been bowl-eligible in six of his first eight years at the helm, have won 54 games since 2006 and have had student-athletes selected in the NFL Draft in four of the past five seasons.

In 2012, Solich directed Ohio to its best start to a season since the 1968 campaign as the Bobcats opened the year 7-0 and earned the program's first-ever Top 25 ranking in the USA Today Poll and the Bowl Championship Series standings. In addition, the Bobcats found themselves in the Top 25 of the Associated Press poll for the first time since the 1968 campaign.

Following the 2012 campaign, Ohio earned a bid to the 2012 Independence Bowl to punch its ticket to a fourth-consecutive bowl trip. The Bobcats also placed six individuals on the 2012 Mid-American Conference All-Conference teams.

In his seven previous seasons as Ohio head coach, Solich has guided the Bobcats to an impressive 50-40 record. In 2011, Solich led the Bobcats to their first-ever bowl win as Ohio defeated Utah State 24-23 in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl to finish the year 10-4 in a game that was seen nationally on ESPN.

Ohio's win over the Aggies gave the Bobcats their first 10-win season since 1968. The Bob-

cats' 10 wins were also the most among division I-A teams from the state of Ohio. The Bobcats four losses came by a combined total of just 19 points (4.75 points per game).

Solich's 2011 Bobcat squad set 47 school records, won six of the team's last seven games and had a league-best 11 players on the MAC All-Conference teams. In addition, Solich picked up his 100th career victory following a convincing 30-3 victory over Gardner-Webb on Sept. 10.

Among the 11 players selected All-MAC, place kicker Matt Weller was named Special Teams Player of the Year, offensive lineman Joe Flading was named First Team and quarterback Tyler Tettleton became the first Ohio signal-caller to be named all-league since 1985. Under Solich's watchful eye, Tettleton re-wrote Ohio's single season record book as he set 12 records and became the first quarterback in school history to pass for 3,000 yards in one year, while in the process throwing a program-best 28 touchdowns.

The 2011 campaign also saw Ohio defeat arch-rival Miami for the sixth-consecutive season - the program's longest winning streak since it won six straight from 1937-1942. Since Solich took over in 2005, Ohio has only suffered one loss to Miami.

When it was all said and done, the 2011 senior class posted a combined record of 36-27 to complete the best five-year run in program history.

In 2010, the Bobcats went to the New Orleans Bowl, making the program's fifth bowl appearance and third in the past five seasons.

Following the season, seven student-athletes were named All-MAC and quarterback Boo Jackson finished his career as Ohio's career leader in completion percentage (.604), pass efficiency (136.3), total offense per play (6.18), passing yards per attempt (7.7) and touchdown passes (38). He also finished the season with 26 total touchdowns, 48 in his career, which is fourth all-time. He also accumulated 18 passing touchdowns in 2010 (fourth all-time on the single-season list).

The 2009 season was equally successful as the senior class compiled 28 victories during its four years on campus. In addition, Ohio boasted a school-record 12 All-MAC selections with four capturing All-America honors en route to a second MAC East title in the squad's last four years. Solich was named the conference coach of the year by Phil Steele.

Following back-to-back seasons of bowl eligibility, the Bobcats followed it up with an offensive outburst that rewrote many of Ohio's all-time team and individual records in Frank



Solich's fourth year at the helm. In 2008, the Bobcats' aerial attack set three school single-season passing records, including passing yards, passing yards per game and touchdown passes all of which stood until the conclusion of the 2011 season.

Overall, Ohio also totaled 4,337 yards of total offense, which at the time was the third-highest total in school history. Individually, quarterback Boo Jackson threw 19 touchdown passes and put himself in the top of three of Ohio's career passing categories, including completion percentage, yards per attempt and passing efficiency.

Besides Jackson, five players garnered All-MAC recognition, while in the classroom, five picked up Academic All-MAC awards. Perhaps the best individual honor under Solich came with safety Mike Mitchell being drafted by the Oakland Raiders in the second round of the NFL Draft (47th overall), becoming the highest drafted Bobcat since 1948 and the highest under Solich.

With Solich as coach in 2007, Kalvin McRae became the first Ohio player in history to rush for 1,000 yards in three consecutive seasons. Other players achieved success for the offense as well, with tight end Andrew Mooney setting the single-season Bobcat touchdown reception record and quarterback Brad Bower tying the career record for most yards per pass.

In 2006, Solich guided Ohio to its first MAC East Division championship, the program's first MAC title of any kind since 1968, earning the Bobcats a spot in the GMAC Bowl, which marked the Bobcats' first bowl game since that same 1968 season.

Following the year, Solich was rewarded with MAC Coach of the Year honors, marking the third time in eight seasons in which he had won his league's coach of the year award. Ohio's five-win improvement from 2005 (4-7) to 2006 (9-5) tied for the sixth-best turnaround in the nation.

In his first three seasons, Solich guided the Bobcats to 19 victories in his first three campaigns after the squad had won 11 games in the previous four seasons. Since his arrival, Solich has coached 51 All-MAC players. His charges have also gained national recognition. At the conclusion of the 2011 season, Joe Flading earned SI.com All-America honors. In 2009, LaVon Brazill and Noah Keller were named to various All-America teams, while Matt Weller and Gerald Moore were tabbed as Freshman All-Americans. In 2005, Dion Byrum became Ohio's first non-special teams All-American since 1968, and three rookies have been honored on The Sporting News Freshman All-America squads.

Ohio has also seen an increase of national television exposure since Solich's arrival in 2005 as the Bobcats have played on the ESPN Family of Networks 38 times. In 2011, Ohio's final six games were broadcast on the ESPN Family of Networks.

Since Solich arrived in Athens, Bobcat players have been named to watch lists for such prestigious honors as the Maxwell Award, the Butkus Award, the Lombardi Trophy, the Lott Trophy, the Biletnikoff Award and the Nagurski Trophy. Byrum was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award, presented to the nation's top defensive back, in 2005.

Off the field, Solich is equally proud of his player's accomplishments in the classroom. In the past three seasons, the Bobcats have had 18 Academic All-MAC selections. He has also had two seasons where an Ohio player has been named a semifinalist for the Draddy Trophy, one of the most prestigious academic honors in college football. Academic success is nothing new for Solich's teams. While head coach at Nebraska, almost 90 percent of his student-athletes earned their degree. Seven times Huskers earned first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America honors and on four other occasions, second-team honors were bestowed.

Solich was named the Bobcats' head coach on Dec. 17, 2004. In short order he assembled a talented and tested coaching staff, coordinated recruiting efforts to assure a steady stream of outstanding student-athletes to the program, supervised a highly productive off-season

weight program producing dozens of personal bests and concluded all-business spring drills introducing his players to tried and true offensive and defensive schemes.

Solich's arrival brought a renewed enthusiasm to the Bobcat football program. Ohio used that spark to begin a massive renovation of Peden Tower to better serve its student-athletes.

The momentum carried over into Solich's first season on the sidelines at Peden Stadium. Solich's first win at Ohio came against defending Big East champion Pittsburgh in his home debut. Dion Byrum's two interception returns for touchdown on national television in an overtime victory put the Bobcats on the national stage. The win was one of only two victories for MAC teams against BCS-conference opponents during that season.

Solich arrived in Athens after six seasons as the head coach at the University of Nebraska. Solich spent nearly 30 years as part of the Nebraska program as a player, assistant coach and head coach. A Big 12 Coach of the Year in 1999 and 2001, Solich produced nine-win seasons in five of his six years as head coach of the Huskers. In 1999, 2000 and 2001, he generated 12, 10 and 11 win seasons, respectively. He also generated six-consecutive bowl appearances including a 2001 run at the national championship against Miami in the Rose Bowl.

Under Solich's leadership, Nebraska spent 54 consecutive weeks in the Associated Press Top 10. In his first five seasons as Husker head coach, Solich won 49 games, more than both his storied predecessors, Bob Devaney and Dr. Tom Osborne, in their first five years at Nebraska.

Moving on from Nebraska following a 2003 season in which his Huskers went 10-3, Solich was nevertheless determined to stay as close as possible to the college game until just the right opportunity came along. In a unique professional development opportunity all too often ignored by colleagues, Solich chose to travel the college and professional ranks to update his knowledge of the game, broaden his perspectives on its nuances and challenges and ready himself for the next great challenge.

Stepping back from the sideline included wide-ranging visits to some of Division I-A's top programs as well and the schedule included much more than a courtesy call. His ambitious fact-finding odyssey included stops at Oklahoma, Texas, Wisconsin, Miami and Southern California.

Coming from his native Cleveland to Lincoln back in 1962, he was recruited to play fullback for the Cornhuskers as a part of Bob Devaney's first class of freshmen. During his time in the Husker program, Nebraska went 9-2, 10-1, 9-2 and 10-1. He earned All-Big Eight honors in 1965 and was the first Husker to rush for 200 yards in a game. His place in the Nebraska tradition was formalized with his induction into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 1992.

While his accomplishments as a player were impressive, his work as a gifted teacher and assistant coach perhaps had as much to do with his arrival in the shrine as anything. Nine of the 15 seasons he served as running backs coach, Nebraska led the nation in rushing. He recruited and coached 1983 Heisman winner Mike Rozier and produced at least one all-conference running back in thirteen of the fifteen years he mentored that position. As a head coach, Solich mentored Eric Crouch to the 2001 Heisman Trophy.

The Bobcats played in their first-ever bowl game on Dec. 31, 1962 when they faced West Texas State in the Sun Bowl. The Bobcats finished the regular season with an 8-2 overall record and a 5-1 conference record to finish second in the MAC.

After a scoreless first quarter, Ohio got on the board first on a 52-yard field goal by Jim McKee. West Texas State answered with a touchdown on a 13-yard halfback pass from Jerry Richardson to Jerry Don Logan, and the extra point gave the Buffs a 7-3 lead they carried into halftime.

The Ohio defense accounted for the next score when Skip Hoovler picked up a fumble at the nine-yard line and returned it 91 yards for a touchdown. The play still stands as the longest fumble return in Sun Bowl history and is tied for the fourth longest in any bowl game. Bob Babbitt completed a pass to Ken Smith for the two-point conversion to give Ohio an 11-7 lead heading into the fourth quarter. Hoovler went on to take Lineman of the Game honors.

The Bobcats pushed the lead to 14-7 on McKee's second field goal of the game, a 24-yarder. West Texas State scored late in the contest on a 32-yard touchdown pass from Dave Gibson to Richardson. Instead of tying the game with an extra point, the Buffs went for the win and converted the two-point conversion for the 15-14 victory.

McKee set a trio of Sun Bowl records in the game, connecting on two field goals in five attempts, including the 52-yarder. All three of McKee's misses in the game came from longer than 50 yards (51, 56, 53).

Ohio completed a 10-0 regular season, winning the MAC title to earn a berth in the 1968 Tangerine Bowl. The Bobcats entered the contest scoring 37.6 points per game, which still stands as the school record.

The Ohio and Richmond offenses racked up a combined 91 points and 1,001 yards of total offense. The Spiders outgained the Bobcats 556-445.

Quarterback Cleve Bryant and end Todd Snyder, both of whom were first-team All-MAC picks, connected on a 48-yard touchdown pass on Ohio's first possession. Richmond scored the next 14 points, but the Bobcats tied the score on a seven-yard run by Bryant. The Spiders quickly reclaimed their advantage on a touchdown run by Joe Kellum and O'Brien's second touchdown toss of the day. Another touchdown pass from Bryant to Snyder made the score 28-21 at halftime.

The Ohio duo connected again on a 45-yard score to tie the game in the third quarter, but the Spiders were able to post back-to-back touchdowns to take the lead for good. Dave LeVeck scored to pull the Bobcats to within eight at 42-34. Richmond tallied what proved to be the game-winning touchdown on O'Brien's fourth touchdown pass.

Bryant would add his fourth touchdown pass in the game, a school record that is still in place today. A two-point conversion brought Ohio within seven with 1:53 left, but the Bobcats would get no closer.

Bryant completed 17-of-33 passes for 223 yards, while Snyder had 11 catches for 214 yards in the contest. Bryant was later inducted into the Citrus Bowl Hall of Fame in 1988.

The Bobcats appearance in the 2007 GMAC Bowl was the program's first bowl game since 1968. Ohio also reached milestones with a school-record seven MAC wins and its first MAC East Division championship.

Kalvin McRae finished the game with 37 yards on 10 carries, while quarterback Austen Everson completed 14-of-his career-high 34 pass attempts for 175 yards and a touchdown. Scott Mayle caught four passes for 56 yards, both team highs. Tight end Thomas Christy saved his best game for his last with two catches for 43 yards and a touchdown, all career highs. The senior linebacking trio of Tyler Russ, Matt Muncy and Michael Graham led the Bobcat defense with nine, six and six tackles, respectively. Senior cornerback T.J. Wright recorded an interception for the Bobcats.

All 21 points in the first half were scored in the final nine minutes of the second quarter. The Golden Eagles scored the first points of the game on a 43-yard run by Tory Harrison. Southern Miss made it 14-0 on its next possession with a two-yard touchdown run by Damion Fletcher with 3:03 left in the half. The Golden Eagles' defense provided the third score of the night when James Denley stepped in front of a pass by Brad Bower and returned it 18 yards for the score to give USM a 21-0 lead.

Fletcher gave the Golden Eagles a 28-0 lead with his second touchdown of the game on the first drive of the second half. The Bobcats scored the games' final points with 9:34 left in the fourth quarter on a 13-yard touchdown pass from Everson to Christy.

The Marshall Thundering Herd got up by three touchdowns early and held off a game Ohio squad 21-17 in the Little Caesars Pizza Bowl at Ford Field. Marshall finished its campaign at 7-6, while Ohio finished at 9-5.

Linebacker Noah Keller's 17 tackles on the day gave the junior 155 total tackles this season, the best defensive effort for the Bobcats in more than 15 seasons. The total also placed Keller in Ohio's all-time top 10 for single-season tackles.

With 7:11 remaining in the third quarter, Theo Scott connected with junior receiver Terrence McCrae for an 8-yard touchdown pass to cap a five-play, 37-yard drive. The touchdown pass was Scott's 20th of the season, setting a new single-season school record for touchdown passes. It was also the ninth touchdown reception of the season for McCrae, which tied the school record for single-season touchdown receptions, set in 2007 by tight end Andrew Mooney.

Matt Weller booted his 21st field goal of the season, setting a new school record for field goals made in a single season, both for the team and for Weller individually.

The 2009 Ohio senior class made a significant mark on the program's history by becoming the only class to go to two bowl games and by winning more games (28) than any class in 40 years.



College football: Ohio selected as MAC favorite

DETROIT — It's nothing like the pressure of being on the cover of Sports Illustrated or Madden NFL, but Ohio University football coach Frank Solich knows what he will tell his players about being picked to win the Mid-American Conference championship.

Members of the media overwhelmingly chose the Bobcats to win the East Division and gave them the narrow nod to defeat Toledo in the championship game.

"I knew coming in here that we could be picked to win, so we'll be like that DirecTV commercial where we have an eye patch on," Solich said yesterday at Ford Field during the annual conference media day. "When people think you are tough, they want to find out how tough."

Ohio has not won the MAC championship since 1968. It blew a 20-0 half-time lead in losing 23-20 to Northern Illinois in last season's title game.

The Bobcats, though, redeemed themselves with a 24-23 victory over Utah State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

"Winning that game gives us tremendous motivation," Solich said. "Now, we want to (get more) things done. We left (the MAC championship game) with a bitter taste. That was tough to take. We had control for a half, (and) we didn't get it done."

Optimism is running high because Ohio might have the best quarterback in the MAC in junior Tyler Tettleton and the best defensive back in senior Travis Carrie. Tettleton was named to the watch list for the Davey O'Brien Award, which is presented to the nation's top quarterback. Carrie was added to the Jim Thorpe Award watch list (best defensive back). The Bobcats also return standouts in kicker Matt Weller, right guard Eric Herman, safety Gerald Moore and tight end Jordan Thompson.

Ohio will be put to the test when it opens the season on Sept. 1 at Penn State. The nation will be focused on State College in the wake of the Jerry Sandusky child sex abuse scandal, the firing of legendary coach Joe Paterno and crippling sanctions by the NCAA.

"The only thing we can do is show up and play good football," Solich said. "We also have our hearts out for the victims, but there isn't anyone on the planet who doesn't feel that way."

Athletic director Jim Schaus said he scheduled the game "about four or five years ago."

"We're going there to win," Schaus said.

Toledo also is creating a buzz. The Rockets defeated Air Force 42-41 in the Military Bowl despite former coach Tim Beckman being hired away by Illinois leading up to the game.

Matt Campbell, an assistant who took over the team for the bowl game, said credit goes to the players for finishing 9-4. He wound up getting the head-coaching job.

"I just told the kids the day I got the job that changes happen in life — that is inevitable — but greatness is a choice," Campbell said. "We have a chance to take that next step. I think our kids have worked hard to take that next step."

The Rockets return an impressive core of quarterbacks in Austin Dantin and Terrance Owens, as well as center Zac Kerin of Olen-tangy and linebacker Dan Molls.

They will have to replace receiver Eric Page, one of their greatest players ever. He left early for the NFL but was not drafted.

Kent State, picked fourth in the East, went 5-7 last season but won four of their final four games under first-year coach Darrell Hazell.

"To our players' credit, when things got really bad on the scoreboard, they did an excellent job of staying glued together," said Hazell, a former Ohio State assistant. "They kept believing."

Ohio Bobcats, Toledo Rockets picked to be division winners in Mid-American Conference preseason football poll

DETROIT -- The usual suspects sit atop the Mid-American Conference preseason football poll, announced this morning at the league's Media Day.

Ohio was the 17-vote unanimous choice to win the MAC's East Division title. Toledo, in a much closer vote, was picked to win the MAC West.

The Rockets, with seven first-place votes, are expected to be challenged by Northern Illinois (five votes) and Western Michigan (four).

Kent State is projected to finish fourth in the MAC East behind No. 2 Bowling Green and No. 3 Miami. Rounding out the division is expected to be Buffalo, Akron and newcomer Massachusetts.

In the West, after UT, NIU and WMU, Ball State, Eastern Michigan and CMU round out the picks.

It's interesting to note the two teams picked to win their divisions, OU and Toledo, are two of the teams with the least returning starters in the league. Toledo sits at the very bottom of the league with only 12 starters returning from last season. OU sits behind Akron (13) in the East with just 15 returning starters.

However, both teams return top quarterbacks. Tyler Tettleton (3,286 yds, 28 TDs) leads the way for OU, while it was clear the Rockets will once again employ a two-quarterback system with Austin Dantin (1,404 yds, 15 TDs) and Glenville High product Terrance Owens (2,022 yds, 18 TDs)

Both Dantin and Owens were in Detroit for Tuesday's media day activities. Owens, who was drafted in baseball by the San Diego Padres, said sharing time under center is no issue.

"It's part of our system," the former Tarblooder said. "It's just a matter of stepping up at the right time when it's your turn. We're both good quarterbacks. It's what we need to do to win a championship.

Being picked as the East favorite did not faze Bobcats coach Frank Solich, who said it was akin to walking down the street with an eye-patch. According to Solich, the perception is, if you have an eye-patch you must be pretty tough. OU was awarded the eye-patch.

"Now we'll see how tough we really are," he said.

The Bobcats will open the regular season Sept. 1 on ESPN at Penn State. It will be the first game for the Nittany Lions under the numerous sanctions imposed Monday by the NCAA.



Bobcats tabbed to win MAC

DETROIT-- The Bobcats are believed to be good enough to win the Mid-American Conference this season.

Now, can Ohio prove to be tough enough to make it reality?

Ohio University was the only team picked to win the Mid-American Conference East Division, and was the top choice to win the 2012 MAC Championship game, in the 2012 MAC Football Preseason Poll announced Tuesday at the conference's annual football media day at Ford Field.

The league's media contingent voted in the poll. The same poll picked Ohio to finish second in the MAC East in both 2010 and 2011.

Ohio coach Frank Solich figured his team would be a target this season after winning the MAC East last fall. Now, the bulls-eye on the Bobcats' back is a little larger. Solich said the 'Cats situation isn't unlike the one of a fictional character in a recent DirecTV commercial.

In the commercial, a man gets an eye-patch and as a result has to prove he's tough enough to wear it.

"You know how (the commercial) goes?" Solich asked. "When you get an eye-patch, people think you're a tough guy. When people think you're a tough guy, they want to see how tough.

"Well, we got the eye patch," he continued. "Now we'll see how tough we really are."

In the East Division, Ohio led the way with 119 total points followed by second-place Bowling Green (91). In the West Division, voting was more balanced as just eight points separated the top three teams with Toledo (87), Northern Illinois (83) and Western Michigan (79) filling the top three spots.

In the last four years, the conference has had six different programs compete in the MAC title game and 10 of the MAC's 13 programs have appeared in a bowl game over that span.

Solich said the parity of the conference has increased since his arrival in 2005.

"I really believe any team could win it," Solich said. "When I first started, there were levels. Some teams were up top, some on the bottom. But no more."

Ohio received all 17 first-place votes to emerge as the clear favorite on the East side. The Bobcats return 49 letterwinners and 15 starters from last year's 10-4 team that won the MAC East Division title, and finished the season with a 24-23 win over Utah State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. The bowl game win was the first in program history for Ohio.

The Bobcats also return starting quarterback Tyler Tettleton, who set 12 single-season records a year ago while throwing for 3,286 yards and 28 touchdowns.

Tettleton said the recognition was nice, but doesn't mean anything in terms of the 2012 season.

"It's nice to be thought of that way, but it's no guarantee," he said. "We feel we have unfinished business."

That unfinished business is an overall MAC Championship. Ohio hasn't won one since 1968, but came close last season. The Bobcats blew a big halftime lead in a loss to Northern Illinois in the 2011 MAC Championship Game.

"That's a big motivating factor," said Ohio senior cornerback Travis Carrie. "We still have something to prove."

Ohio was followed in the poll by Bowling Green and Miami, which were separated by just seven points for second and third place. Struggling Akron and UMass, making the jump to FBS football for the first time this season, received the lowest two point totals in the poll.

Toledo returns 48 letterwinners and 12 starters from a 2011 team that was 9-4 and 7-1 in conference. The Rockets also knocked off Air Force, 42-41, in the Military Bowl. First-year head coach Matt Campbell spent the last three years as the Rockets offensive coordinator and will have the services of two returning quarterbacks in the form of Austin Dantin and Terrance Owens.

Northern Illinois, the defending MAC West champion and winner of the 2011 MAC Championship game, was chosen second in the division. Western Michigan was third, and also received four first-place votes. Ball State, Eastern Michigan and Central Michigan rounded out the West Division voting.

"It's going to be a dogfight," said Eastern Michigan coach Ron English. "And not just in the West. The conference as a whole has a lot of teams that really compete."

"I think Miami is going to be good. Bowling Green returns a ton of people. And then Frank, well Frank's always good. He has Ohio really clicking."

The 2012 season kicks off on Thursday, Aug. 30 with five games, including four non-conference games and one conference game between Ball State and Eastern Michigan.

More wild MAC offense? Yes, please

DETROIT - Whatever the Mid-American Conference's reputation is nationally, it's probably not boring.

Look for that to continue in 2012 as nine MAC teams return their starting quarterbacks, and 11 of the 13 teams bring back at least six players who started on offense at some point in 2011.

It would be impossible to predict a repeat of what happened last November, when Northern Illinois essentially clinched the West Division title by beating Toledo, 63-60, and just a week later Toledo beat Western Michigan, 66-63, in the same stadium.

It would also be silly to pick against some sort of high-flying run of memorable shootouts.

"The best part of our Toledo game was the next week I got to kind of watch it (Toledo-WMU) on TV and didn't have to agonize," Northern Illinois coach Dave Doeren said Tuesday at MAC Media Day. "Thinking about winning 63-60, with us returning two kickoffs for touchdowns then scoring last, it was a heck of a game...for the ages.

"It was a game I hope I never have to go through again."

Northern Illinois quarterback Chandler Harnish, the MAC Player of the Year, graduated and was drafted in the seventh round by the Indianapolis Colts after leading the conference with 4,595 all-purpose yards. Among those returning are Western Michigan's Alex Carder (4,143 all-purpose yards, 31 passing TDs), Ohio's Tyler Tettleton (3,915 all-purpose yards) and Miami of Ohio's Zac Dysert, who's likely to pass Ben Roethlisberger as the school's all-time leader in passing yards and, if he can come close to matching his 3,513 passing yards from last year, can finish as one of the most productive quarterbacks in MAC history.

Dysert is 4,395 yards short of Dan LeFevour's MAC career record. Getting there seems absurd, but this is the MAC.

In all, five players who threw for more than 3,000 yards last season return. Toledo returns its 1-2 quarterback punch of Austin Dantin and Terrence Owens, who combined to throw for 3,426 yards and 33 touchdowns last year. Bowling Green returns both quarterback Matt Schilz (3,024 passing yards) and running back Anthon Samuel, the MAC Freshman of the Year in 2011. Six players who earned conference first or second-team honors at wide receiver or tight end also return.

VOTES ARE IN: Ohio was the unanimous choice of the voting media to win the East Division, while Toledo was made the pick in the West. The Rockets got seven first-place votes, while second-place choice Northern Illinois got five and third pick Western Michigan got four.

Central Michigan was voted sixth and last in the poll but got one first-place vote.

"I think the West is very strong," Doeren said. "I chuckled at the (poll) when I saw one guy had Ball State last. I thought they were one of the toughest teams we played last year. The West is very strong, very bal-

anced, there are a lot of experienced quarterbacks. I think if anything has been proven in the MAC, it's that it's anybody's league and it usually comes down to who has the best quarterback."

Bowling Green was voted second in the East, not much ahead of Miami and Kent State in third and fourth, respectively.

The league title game will be played on Nov. 30. The MAC and Ford Field announced a four-year contract extension to keep the MAC title game there through the 2015 season.

NEW GUYS: Massachusetts jumps to Div. I/FCS status and begins play this fall as a football-only member of the MAC, giving the East Division seven teams. Temple left its football-only role in the MAC to play in the Big East this season. Temple will join the Big East in all sports in 2013-14.

Kellen Pagel -- a native of Strongsville, Ohio and the son of former Cleveland Browns quarterback Mike Pagel -- is expected to again be the quarterback at UMass. He started eight games last year after transferring from Bowling Green.

UP FOR GRABS: Second-year Kent State coach Darrell Hazell said his team will hold an equal-reps-for-all quarterback competition in training camp. Senior returnee Spencer Keith has the experience edge, but Hazell said junior college transfer David Fisher and true freshman Colin Reardon will also be given a chance to compete.

2012's 10 best games to watch in the MAC

DETROIT – Being ready for Mid-American Conference football often means being ready for four-hour games and plenty of scoring.

Oh, you're fine with that?

We don't know if last year's 63-60 Northern Illinois win over Toledo or Toledo's 66-63 win over Western Michigan (just a week later) can be topped. But we're just a few weeks away from finding out. Below is the very-early list of the 10 most interesting games on the MAC schedule this season.

These won't necessarily end up being the best or the biggest games involving MAC teams this season, but they're simply the most interesting based on preseason storylines and expectations and potential ramifications. Bonus points for mega-points potential, of course.

10. Toledo at Arizona, Sept. 1 – Toledo beat a Rich Rodriguez-coached team before, and now Rich Rod's first game at Arizona comes against a talented Rockets team that's used to the big stage. Rodriguez knows from that miserable experience in 2008 that he'd better have his team ready, and first-year coach Matt Campbell has two game-proven quarterbacks and what should be an improved defense as the Rockets aim for the upset.

9. South Florida at Ball State, Sept. 22 – What in the world is South Florida doing playing a game in Muncie, Indiana? After going 6-6 with a relatively young team a year ago, Ball State comes into the season with some expectations for the first time since Nate Davis was running the show. The Cardinals will treat this one like the Super Bowl and if senior quarterback Keith Wenning can get hot, an upset is possible.

8. Ohio at Kent State, Nov. 23 - Most recent Thanksgiving Weekend games at Kent State have had little consequence and little – like, a few hundred brave souls – attendance. But the Flashes are expecting to be much improved in Darrell Hazell's second year as coach, and they're expecting this game to mean something. Maybe Kent State will be playing for bowl eligibility, or maybe the MAC East title will be on the line. Stay tuned.

7. Cincinnati at Toledo, Oct. 20 – A nice little intra-state rivalry game between teams coming off of nice seasons. The Bearcats seem to be the team with more to lose, especially going on the road in the midst of their conference schedule, and Toledo will see this as an opportunity to gain further regional and national respect. Both programs deserve credit for making signing a home-and-home deal, and it should make for a very entertaining football game.

6. Bowling Green at Ohio, Nov. 7 – The kind of midweek showcase game the MAC has used to gain national recognition pits the two East favorites. Expect some scoring, a nice crowd at Peden Stadium and plenty on the line as highly-touted quarterbacks Tyler Tettleton and Matt Schilz (over 6,200 combined passing yards last year) trade throws. Bowling Green running back Anthon Samuel could have a big year in store as well.

5. Miami at Ohio State, Sept. 1 – It won't be even a little quiet in Ohio

Stadium for Urban Meyer's debut. And absolutely no one outside of the Miami locker room is giving the Redhawks a chance to keep it close. But playing at Ohio State is always a big deal for Ohio natives, and this is a showcase game for Miami's pitch-and-catch, NFL-prospect duo of quarterback Zac Dysert and receiver Nick Harwell.

4. Toledo at Western Michigan, Sept. 29 – Western Michigan QB Alex Carder is primed for a big season and is maybe the single biggest reason Western is regarded as having a solid chance to win the balanced West division. Toledo has posted back-to-back second-place finishes in the West Division and knows it probably can't give up a game to the Broncos here and expect to eventually finish first. Another fun one is probably in store.

3. Bowling Green at Florida, Sept. 1 – There's no way Bowling Green could pull this upset, right? Probably not, but the Falcons should be able to score some points, and Florida is still seeking an identity and trying to find its next star quarterback. It seems like one that will be close for a while before the home team pulls away, but don't be shocked if the Falcons hang around and make the Swamp natives a little restless.

2. Toledo at Northern Illinois, Nov. 14 – Even if it's 49-45, it will be a stinker based on last year's standards. But don't expect a stinker. Northern Illinois has to replace do-it-all QB Chandler Harnish and its offensive line, but should be better defensively and still explosive at the skill spots. Toledo is still going to score, and this game is again set for mid-week national TV. Buckle up.

1. Ohio University at Penn State, Sept. 1 – It's the easy pick as the most interesting game involving a MAC team, but not just because it's Penn State's first game of the new era. The Bobcats are experienced and loaded for a strong season, and with so much uncertainty surrounding Penn State an OU win wouldn't be a tremendous upset. If the Bobcats can win here and at Marshall two weeks later, when might they lose?

Season opener against Penn State will 'challenge' Ohio's game-day focus

DETROIT — Ohio officials publicly voiced their thoughts about the Penn State scandal for the first time Tuesday at the Mid-American Conference Football Media Day.

Their messages didn't reek of public relations pitches or prepared sentiments. Fans of the game themselves, Ohio personnel said the monstrosity struck a chord far beyond just a professional level.

The season-opening showdown will likely tug on Ohio's heartstrings, but coach Frank Solich said the team's focus will be on the two things it can control: how it practices and performs on the field.

"Everyone is concerned and heartbroken for the victims involved, but the only thing we can do is show up and play our best football," he said.

That will be easier said than done for Ohio, which will catch its fair share of extra attention heading into the game.

The brunt of the scrutiny will be placed on their opponents, but stepping into the limelight — or the frenzy that will be Penn State's Beaver Stadium on the first day of the season — will bring baggage not associated with a more routine first game.

The Bobcats' recent season-openers have been against lower-profile opponents. They have performed accordingly, winning four of their last six.

The last time Ohio opened the season against a similar caliber of competition was in 2005, when it experienced varying results.

Losses to Northwestern and No. 4-ranked Virginia Tech sandwiched one of the program's signature wins — an overtime triumph against Pittsburgh at Peden Stadium.

For the Bobcats, goal No. 1 is to keep potentially shaky hands and heavy hearts out of the picture in Happy Valley.

"It'll be a challenge to really make sure we're focused on what we need to be about," Solich said.

Leading up to the NCAA's Monday ruling that issued Penn State a \$60 million fine, four-year bowl ban, and the loss of 40 scholarships over four years and 112 wins between 1998 and 2011, among other penalties, the Bobcats weren't especially keen on keeping up with Penn State's every move.

"Things were changing on almost a daily basis, that it was difficult to really get a feel for the direction it was going," Solich said.

Solich and Tom Symonds, Ohio's assistant athletics director for media relations, said contact with their opponents was not outside normal procedures.

Ohio's front office view is no different. Director of Athletics Jim Schaus said he expects nothing different in the team's readiness for the game than when the Bobcats beat New Mexico State this past season or Wofford College the year before.

"It's certainly a tragic situation they've gone through — we feel for those victims — but our focus is on the football game," Schaus said. "Our focus is on playing the game, and to do that well, and not getting caught up in commenting or dealing with any of those outside issues."

Schaus was responsible for scheduling the game four years ago and said the matchup, despite extraneous circumstances, fits both universities' molds for the season's first game.

He said Athens' close proximity to State College, the fans' willingness to travel for the game and the number of tickets the Nittany Lions opened up to the Bobcat fan base made the scheduling attractive for both parties.

The matchup makes financial sense as well. Penn State will pay Ohio "a quality amount" for the game, Schaus said, and the trip won't require more than a six-hour bus ride.

If the Bobcats' plans fall into place, as some fans are predicting on social media, the ride there may drag on longer than their return trip.

"It's an exciting opportunity for us to play a Big Ten school," Schaus said. "We try to have a game like that at least once a year. It's enjoyable for the players and the fans."



Scott back for the start of fall camp

The last time Tremayne Scott was taking reps on the turf inside Peden Stadium he felt something pop in his foot.

That was nearly four months ago.

After surgery, and months of rehab, Scott was again taking reps inside Peden on Monday afternoon as the Bobcats opened their 2012 fall camp with their first official practice.

Scott, a senior returning starter at defensive end, wasn't wearing any extra protective gear and was taking part in as many reps as he was allowed.

"Close to 100 (percent)," Scott said when asked to assess his overall health. "I got back in good time. Everything feels pretty good."

Scott credited Ohio strength coach Sonny Sano and head trainer John Bowman for their help in a regimen over the past four months that helped get him ready to play. Ohio finished the spring with no assurances that Scott would be ready to go by August, or at all.

But head coach Frank Solich liked what he saw from the DE on Monday.

"He moved around real well today. In fact, tried to slow him down a little bit because he's anxious to get out there and show what he can do again," Solich said.

"He's a guy that is a tremendous finisher. He brings a lot of energy to a football team."

The Bobcats, as a whole, had plenty of energy on the first day of camp. It's a sign the squad is still driven to prove something, Scott said. Ohio's motto this season is "Unfinished Business" in reference to a loss last December in the Mid-American Conference Championship game.

Last month, Ohio was tabbed the overwhelming favorite to win the MAC East Division, and the media pick to win the 2012 MAC championship game.

"There's definitely a target on our back this year," Scott said. "We're expected great things, and great things are expected out of us."

"It's going to start with our chemistry and trusting everybody on our team, offense or defense."

Another list

Junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton has landed on another postseason award watch list. Tettleton, on Monday, was named to the 2012 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Watch List.

The Golden Arm Award is given to a student-athlete who is not only a strong athletic performer but also a person of high character with admirable scholastic achievement and leadership qualities.

Last month, Tettleton was also named to the watch lists for both the

Manning Award and Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award. Both are given annually to the best quarterback in college football.

Athletes only

Two members of the 2012 Ohio recruiting class were listed as 'Athlete' when their addition to the Bobcat program was announced in February.

At the start of fall camp, however, both Sebastian Smith and Davon Henry find themselves on the offensive side of the football.

Smith, from Pickerington Central HS outside Columbus, will be joining the wide receiver ranks as a 6-foot-2, 180-pound target.

Henry, from Round Rock, Texas, is listed at 6-foot-2 and 232 pounds. He'll be lining up at tight end, and has switched his jersey number to 85.

Comings and going

Three potential members of the 105-man fall camp roster will not be joining the Bobcats until the roster is expanded to 120.

Kicker Josiah Yazdani, an Alexander HS grad, suffered a knee injury at the end of spring camp and will likely be sidelined most of the season.

2012 recruit John Tanner, a tight end from Cincinnati Moeller HS, had shoulder surgery in the offseason and will also miss fall camp.

Athens HS grad Mitch Rider, a walk-on linebacker, will be on the active roster when it's expanded with the start of the fall semester.

There have been a handful of additions to the 105 as well, including CB Mike Terpin, LB James Radabaugh, K Matt Amicone, LB Garrett Foster, WR Dayne Hammond and K/P Matt Ringle.

Football: Team prepares for fall camp, evaluates goals for upcoming season

While many students begin to count down the days until they return to campus, Ohio already has a different day circled on its calendar.

The Bobcats began a 26-day fall camp Monday, which leads up to their season-opening showdown with Penn State on Sept. 1.

Ohio has high expectations on the table heading into its 2012 campaign, stemming from its first ever bowl win in 2011.

“We’ve met a number of goals, but we’ve left some things on the table,” coach Frank Solich said. “Our football team understands that they’ll work toward trying to accomplish those goals.”

Preseason accolades were dolled out to individuals and the team throughout the preseason. Quarterback Tyler Tettleton, defensive back Travis Carrie and kicker Matt Weller all were named to college football’s major awards watch lists.

Perhaps the biggest honor bestowed on Ohio was the weight of being the preseason Mid-American Conference favorites, as pegged by the conference’s media conglomerate.

But before even thinking about MAC play, the Bobcats have plenty to prepare for. Solich said that even though the Nittany Lions have had their psyches tested during the offseason, the Bobcats will have to make sure their heads are on straight as well.

“It will be a challenge of making sure that we are focused on what we need to be about,” he said. “We can control how we practice and how well we play, those are the only two things that we are going to be focused on.”

Carrie, one of the team’s four captains, echoed his coach’s sentiment, saying that the team’s focus will be on itself instead of the Penn State blue and white swirling around the confines of Beaver Stadium during the season opener.

“Going into the game, both teams have one goal, and the goal is to win,” Carrie said. “Penn State traditionally has been a good a team and that’s what we’re expecting from them.”

Last season’s potent offensive unit lost playmakers and anchors on the offensive line, but the Bobcats’ offensive line depth leads Solich to consider it his team’s strength.

“I do know that we will have a very good offensive front again,” Solich said. “We lost four athletes at the receiver position that caught a lot of balls for us, it remains to be seen if we will replace that, but Tyler (Tettleton) is bright, he knows it takes a combination of things to build the statistics he had.”

Tettleton facing expectations in 2012

So how does one follow up the best statistical season in a program's history?

For starters, you don't worry about trying to do just that.

That's the approach Ohio junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton is trying to take this season. The son of a former major leaguer and Oklahoma native broke onto the college football scene in 2011 with a season unlike any other in Ohio football history. Tettleton put up dazzling numbers as Ohio posted a 10-4 mark and capped the year with a win in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

The damage to the Ohio record book was extensive. Tettleton became the first Ohio QB to throw for more than 3,000 yards in a single season. Along the way, he set 12 new Ohio records. He finished with 3,302 passing yards, 658 rushing yards and accounted for 38 touchdowns via the air or on the ground.

It's hard to believe now, but Tettleton was an unknown just 12 months ago. Last fall, he was a first-time starter.

Now? Tettleton is the face of the program and has a mountain of expectations on his shoulders as the Bobcats opened their 2012 fall camp on Monday.

To give you an idea of what's expected, Tettleton has been named to four different watch lists for awards that go to the best quarterbacks in college football. His team is the heavy favorite to win the Mid-American Conference East Division, and the Bobcats are the preseason pick to win the MAC Championship game.

From unknown to superstar in less than a year's time, it's fair to wonder how the redshirt junior will handle the attention, the pressure and expectations.

His teammates and coaches aren't expecting anything other than the same old 'Tett' they've seen before.

"I think he can handle it," said Ohio quarterbacks coach Gerry Gdowski. "He's always been a mature kid who's had his priorities right and understands what's important."

"Now, he's got to go out and perform," he added. "I know he wants to perform even better than he did last year. Sometimes that little added pressure can make you work a little harder, study a little more, all those kinds of things."

Tettleton hasn't strayed from his own motto, which is to worry about the team first and stats later. He said that when he was named the starter in August 2011, and wasn't budging from the stance this week.

"It's the same thing. I just focus on the team more than anything and focus on our goals as a team," Tettleton said. "All that stuff that goes on in the season, the stats and all that, it will take care of itself at the end of the year. And whatever happens, happens."

His teammates believe, like Gdowski, the quarterback has the right mental makeup to handle anything that comes his way.

"The kid knows what he's doing," said junior WR Mario Dovell, who recounted marveling at how Tettleton broke down defenses during a summer film session.

"He breaks it all down," he added. "He's like an offensive coordinator too. He really knows what he's talking about."

And no special treatment for the starting quarterback yet. If there's a sprint, he's running it. Senior flanker Tyler Futrell said Tettleton's work ethic hasn't been dulled by last year's success.

"Works harder than anybody I've seen," Futrell said. "At the same time, he's out here doing what he needs to do to be a quarterback at the top level and fulfilling his potential. He's just fighting for it every day."

That includes trying to find a way to be better, as difficult as that might seem. Tettleton completed 64.3 percent of his passes in 2011, and had 10 interceptions — or one in every 41.5 pass attempts.

Gdowski said he'd like to see the completion percentage bump a little.

Ohio offensive coordinator Tim Albin said the focus for Tettleton's improvement in year two is based on two things: pace and turnovers. Albin wants more of the former, and less of the latter. Like most everyone else, he doesn't anticipate the added attention being a distraction for the signal-caller.

"That's the spotlight. That's being a quarterback. That just comes with the position," he said. "He's the perfect guy to handle it. He has a great mindset."

"I mean it's going to be tough to duplicate what he got done last year in the throwing game," Albin continued. "But if we can improve the turnover number, I think the end result — the wins and losses — will show at the end."

Ohio head coach Frank Solich has been around a lot of good quarterbacks, even Heisman Trophy winners. He's said Tettleton's mental approach is exactly what you look for.

But he cautioned you never know what you might get year to year.

"I think he'll handle it well. But on that kind of situation, you kind of have to wait and see," he said. "He's got the right personality, the right makeup, he's got the leadership ability. He's got everything that makes you say 'Hey, this year will just be a continuation of last year.'

"But every year is a new year. We got a lot of confidence in him. He's got a lot of confidence in himself. The players around him have a lot of confidence in him. Now we see how it plays out."

Dovell, Futrell get chance to fill receiving roles

They aren't LaVon Brazill and Riley Dunlop.

But Tyler Futrell and Mario Dovell have been waiting for their chance to prove they could be.

Futrell and Dovell, two wideouts with the Ohio football team, are being counted on to fill some big shoes on the offensive side of the football for the Bobcats.

Opportunities were few and far between for the pair over the past couple of seasons as Ohio's receiving corps relied on others — such as the now graduated Brazill and Dunlop — but that's not the case any longer.

Tyler? Mario? You're up.

"You have to seize the moment," Dovell said. "You have to take the best of it and run with it."

Brazill, a sixth-round draft pick of the Indianapolis Colts and currently second on Indy's depth chart, ran with it better than any other receiver in Ohio history. And while Brazill set several Ohio receiving records, Dunlop was perhaps underappreciated. A multi-year starter, Dunlop was a clutch performer and critical on third downs.

The duo was a big reason Ohio ramped up the offense in 2011, and a big factor in quarterback Tyler Tettleton's record-setting season.

With their departure, it's up to a new group of receivers — headed up by Futrell and Dovell — to make sure the offense stays clicking on all cylinders. Ohio has one returning starter at flanker, junior Donte Foster, but for the most part the Bobcats will have to break in a new crop of perimeter threats.

"It's difficult when you lose somebody like LaVon and Riley. Both of them are very talented," Futrell said. "We just got to come up and try to fill their shoes. We're not going to replace them, but at the same time we still have a talented group at wideout and we can still get things done."

Futrell and Dovell have paid their dues. Futrell, a 6-0, 179-pound, fifth-year senior from Altoona, Pa., came to Ohio as a cornerback. After a position switch and redshirt year in 2008, Futrell has appeared in just 27 games over the last three seasons.

Futrell has six career catches for 90 yards, and all came last season.

"I came a long way. It's been a long time," Futrell explained. "As a senior, this is what you're always building up to. Fortunately I got into the position to make an impact on this team. Hopefully turn some heads and open some eyes."

"Hopefully we can come out and do what we're projected to do."

Dovell, 6-foot, 200-pound, redshirt junior from Whetstone HS in Columbus, will be trying to fill Brazill's shoes, specifically. He's the projected starter at the 'Z' receiver position where Brazill shined a year ago.

Like Futrell, Dovell had few chances with the offense the past few seasons. After a redshirt season in 2009, he's played in 25 games over the past two years. Dovell has 12 career catches for 183 yards, and averaged a healthy 18.9 yards per catch in 2011.

Dovell knows the pressure is on for him to do his part; Ohio returns six starters on offense and is the heavy favorite to again win the MAC East Division.

"There is a little bit of pressure," he said. "With two of the leading receivers leaving, that's pretty rough. We know (Foster) is going to do his part. But they're counting on me and Tyler to fill the roles of those other guys."

Dovell said he was able to glean some tips from Brazill this summer. After missing the bulk of the spring season with a broken thumb, Dovell relished the chance to work with Brazill during June and July when the now pro wide receiver visited Athens.

"He's one of those guys who once he made it to the league, he still came back," Dovell said. "He still took the time to teach us some things."

"Just working out with us and telling us the little odds and ends of what we need to do better," he continued. "I appreciate him a lot."

Tettleton has faith in his new primary targets. Last year, Brazill was a security blanket for the first-time starter. When in doubt, Tettleton looked for No. 7.

This fall, Tettleton said Ohio doesn't necessarily need a dominating No. 1 receiving presence.

"I don't know if you can replace LaVon Brazill but you can have guys that step up and make enough plays to where we can be successful. I think we have those guys," he said.

"Donte Foster, Mario Dovell and Tyler Futrell. I think those guys are going to be the three-headed monster for the receiving corps."

Futrell agreed that the Bobcats have a chance to get by without Brazill if everyone else just elevates their game a little bit. He believes a more balanced approach in the passing game can pay dividends.

"Everybody knew who it was going to on third or fourth down last year. But this time, they have three people to deal with it," he said.

"Hopefully we can mix and match, and find the open guy. Make a bigger play."

Bobcats motivated, focused for 2012

There are certain things the Ohio University football team must do over the next three weeks of fall camp in order to be ready to play in the season opener.

The Bobcats have to replenish their wide receiving corps, find a suitable replacement for Noah Keller at middle linebacker, and straighten out a brand-new punting unit.

But, finding motivation and focus won't be on the 'Cats to-do list. They've already got that in spades, and made it perfectly clear Saturday afternoon during the team's annual Media Day function inside Peden Stadium.

This season is all about unfinished business for Ohio, and that means claiming the program's first Mid-American Conference championship since 1968.

The Bobcats came oh-so-close a year ago. Ohio led 20-0 halftime, but lost 23-20 to Northern Illinois in the MAC Championship game.

"That still eats at us. That's the unfinished business that we have to do this year," said senior tight end Jordan Thompson. "In order to do that, we have to be ready to go week one and carry that momentum through the season."

Head coach Frank Solich, entering his eighth season in Athens, has done a remarkable job rebuilding a once dead-and-forgotten program. Ohio has three MAC East titles during his reign, and the Bobcats begin 2012 as the "team to beat" in the MAC.

It's a far cry from when Solich took over the program. The Bobcats were more likely to be picked last than even third during his first couple seasons.

"It's great. It's a real tribute to our football players, guys that have played here in the past," Solich said. "Those guys are the ones that got the program from where it was — not really being recognized as a threat to win the conference — to now being chosen to win it."

But the biggest accomplishment has so far remained out of reach. The Bobcats are determined to change that in 2012.

"We've been able to get into the MAC Championship game. We've not been able to win it," Solich said. "We were very, very close, but being close is not getting it done."

The Bobcats recognize it won't be easy. Being the favorite confers no advantages on game day. Ohio won't be distracted by outside expectations, nor will they be buying into any predictions said junior flanker Donte Foster.

"People say we should win the league, but I see that as paper talk," he said. "If we don't do the work on the field, then none of that is going to happen."

With a favorable slate of conference games, and a friendly non-conference schedule, it's even possible Ohio could run the table for a 12-0 regular season — if the 'Cats can spring a big road upset in the opener on Sept. 1 at Penn State.

But while fans mull over the possibilities, the Bobcats claim they're only focused on one thing: being the best they can be. Thompson said the 2012 squad has the right mental makeup to handle the external expectations, and reach its potential.

"Not only do other people expect great things, but we expect great things on our team," he said. "We expect to win a lot of ballgames this year because of the depth that we have and the guys we have coming back."

"We believe we have a team worthy of winning."

And a team with the fortitude to work hard enough to make it happen, said senior right guard Eric Herman. Solich's blue-collar, decidedly unflashy approach has been molded into his team's fiber.

"We have to work for this. This isn't something that's given," Herman said. "We earned the preseason pick, we have go out and earn it again."

"Nothing's guaranteed."

Youth served in first Ohio scrimmage

Over the last 18 months, Kendric Smith has spent time in three different college football programs.

He was a walk-on at national power LSU in 2010. Smith spent 2011 as a tight end/H-back at a junior college (Blinn). And this fall he's been trying to carve out some playing time for himself on the Ohio defensive line.

What hasn't changed during each of those stops is Smith's explosive athleticism. The 6-foot-3, 245-pound sophomore still has that burst off the edge that coaches like, and got to show it off a few times during the Bobcats' first scrimmage of the fall season Tuesday afternoon inside Peden Stadium.

Smith garnered a sack and a couple of other stops during Ohio's 50-play, live-action scrimmage. The offense had one touchdown scoring drive, capped by Brian Palermo's 3-yard run, and one turnover — Brian Hairston's interception late in the session.

"It felt good to make a play or two," said Smith. "We're just learning and getting better every day."

Smith wasn't the only relatively new face to make a play. Ohio coach Frank Solich said his younger players would get the bulk of the reps during the scrimmage, and that's what happened.

Ohio held out most of its starters, and the first team offense and defense saw roughly only 12 snaps or so. The Bobcats played without three running backs, its starting three wide receivers, three-quarters of its starting defensive line, both starting outside linebackers, one starting safety and one starting cornerback.

With so many sitting out — most for a variety of relatively minor injuries — the scrimmage was cut back by about 20 plays, Solich said. Still, the exercise gave the coaches what they wanted — a chance to view the youth of the roster at game speed. And in that regard, the scrimmage was a success.

"I thought we moved around the field really well," Solich said. "The execution certainly needs to improve, but the speed and physical play of the team was really what you're looking for at this point. We can certainly build off of that."

Unofficially, the offense finished with 188 total yards on 47 total plays. The Bobcats had just two explosive pass plays (more than 15 yards) and didn't have a run for more than eight yards. The lone touchdown drive came on the first series of the day.

Defensive coordinator Jimmy Burrow, whose group played without seven starters, thought his unit held up fairly well against an offense that exerts pressure with different formations and personnel groups, and a rapid, no-huddle pace.

"It was a good day to evaluate young guys and pressure," Burrow said. "Our offense is tough, they do a lot of different things. Can you get lined

up right? Can you get your subs in?

"I thought we handled it OK. It looked decent for the first scrimmage."

Starting quarterback Tyler Tettleton played just 12 snaps, but was sharp as he completed all three of his passes for 24 yards. Backup Derrius Vick was 5 of 7 for 69 yards, including a 32-yarder to WR Matt Waters on post route that set up Palermo's touchdown run. It was the longest play of the day for the offense, which also included a 19-yard Vick pass to TE Art Jordan.

"I just really wanted to concentrate on making the catch. I felt like I was a little bit open," said Waters, a junior college transfer fresh on the Ohio roster this season. "It was one of those where I was going 'Don't drop it, don't drop it.'

"Once that was out of the way, things kind of slowed down for me."

Walk-on freshman QB J.D. Sprague was 5 of 7 for 22 yards and had one scramble for eight yards. Freshman QB Greg Windham, coming off a bout with the stomach illness creeping through camp, was 1-for-3 for four yards with the lone interception.

Freshman RB Daz'mond Patterson was the only one of the top four running backs to play; he led all ballcarriers with 30 yards on 11 carries. Palermo finished with 17 yards on nine carries.

Chris Johann was the leading receiver with three catches for 18 yards, while Chase Cochran (four yards) and Dayne Hammond (eight yards) both had two catches.

The offense did have five penalties for 30 yards; the defense was flagged once for five yards. The offense was able run at a fairly high pace as the play clock was never an issue. Offensive coordinator Tim Albin said that was a plus, and so too was the fact there was only one turnover and two sacks.

"I'm more excited about that than anything," Albin said. "The first team looked pretty smooth at it. The second offense did some good things, but they stalled out a couple of times."

The Bobcats have one more full scrimmage scheduled, on Monday, and open the season Sept. 1 with a 12 p.m. kickoff at Penn State. Soon, Ohio will have to break down into scout teams to really hone in for the opener.

That time is not quite here yet, Solich said.

"At some point and time that decision has to be made, but we're not there right now," he said. "We still have a little bit of time to keep bringing some of those young guys along."

Humble Tettleton Boasts Big Numbers

What Ohio coaches appreciate about junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton is that his offensive numbers are inflated and his ego is not.

Last season, he became the first quarterback in school history to pass for more than 3,000 yards. He set 12 school records. He threw for 28 touchdowns and ran for 10. But he still practices as if he's trying to earn his keep on every play.

"He's a tremendous leader and a tough, tough player," Ohio coach Frank Solich said. "Our players love playing for him. He never points a finger and always has the demeanor you want in a quarterback. He never shows disappointment or elation. He just moves on to the next play. So we have the right guy."

The only numbers that Tettleton seems comfortable discussing are the team's desire to improve on last year's 10-win season, which was the program's first in 43 years.

"We want to do more," Tettleton said. "We want to get 11 wins year, win the MAC, and get to a bigger bowl game. Our theme this year is that we have some unfinished business."

Tettleton's professional attitude might be inherited because he is the son of former major leaguer Mickey Tettleton, who produced 245 home runs over 14 seasons with four teams. Tyler has fond memories of serving as ball boy for the Texas Rangers when he was 6 and 7 years old.

"I remember to this day him walking in every day, and (Tyler's) uniform would be hanging up in the locker next to mine," the elder Tettleton said. "It was just great times being out on the field at 3 o'clock and seeing him hitting in the stadium and chasing down fly balls in the outfield."

Tyler was a quality baseball player, but his passions started to move toward more action-packed sports before he got to middle school. "He was always a kid who could run, and they stuck him center field and I think he got bored out there," Mickey Tettleton said.

But the lessons Tyler learned from watching his father on the diamond do translate to the football field. The Tettletons still talk often about the mental aspects of being a successful athlete.

"We have talked about it a lot, especially over the last few months," Mickey Tettleton said. "Coming off the year he had, I talked to him about not putting added pressure on himself to match those numbers. I told him to go out and be consistent, play smart and the numbers will take care of themselves."

Ohio recruiters were keenly aware of young Tettleton's family background. "We are not going to turn a blind eye to good DNA," joked offensive coordinator Tim Albin.

Tettleton flew under the radar as a high school quarterback in Norman, Okla., because he has to stretch to measure in at 6-0 and he missed his junior season to injury. Ohio was one of three schools that believed he

could play college quarterback.

"We knew he was talented, but our crystal ball wasn't this clear to know he was going to end up with close to 40 touchdowns," Albin said.

Albin said there was no issue with his height. "You can't measure heart," Albin said. "And he has the work ethic to be a great quarterback."

Tyler's 2011 heroics included the game-winning touchdown when Ohio beat Utah State 24-23 for the first bowl win in school history.

His numbers last season were certainly helped by the presence of LaVon Brazill, who had 74 catches and then was drafted by the Indianapolis Colts.

"We had good people up front last season, and we had receivers who could get things done," Solich said. "What that mix will be this season is uncertain. But I do know we will have a good offensive front. We have lost four receivers who caught a lot of balls for us. Whether we can replace them remains to be seen."

The top four receivers on the roster now — Dontè Foster, Mario Dovell, Tyler Futrell and Chase Cochrane — all have promise. Foster had 30 receptions and five touchdowns last season.

"I have so many guys around me who can make plays if I get them the ball," Tettleton said.

He ran for 658 yards last season, but he doesn't consider himself a running quarterback. "I'm a pass-first guy," he said.

The younger Tettleton plans to continue to talk to his father about staying focused on his team objective.

"We talk about not letting anything outside affect the way I'm playing," Tyler said.

Mickey Tettleton said he enjoys talking football with his son. "It doesn't bother me one bit that he didn't pick baseball," he said. "Of all the things he has accomplished, what I'm most proud of is how he had handled things."

Blankenship not slowing down

Beau Blankenship was supposed to spend fall camp battling Ryan Boykin for the honor of being the Bobcats' starting running back.

But, thanks to Boykin's hamstring injury early in camp, that hasn't materialized. Instead, Blankenship appears to have the starter's job locked up halfway through camp.

It's not like Blankenship, a 5-foot-9, 200-pound dynamo, will slow down anyway. The redshirt junior, who was a high school teammate with Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton in Norman, Okla., approaches every day, every play the same way — at full speed.

"I try to go 100 miles an hour when I'm training or practicing," said Blankenship, who started his collegiate career at Iowa State before transferring to Ohio. "I always prepared like I was the starter even when I wasn't."

"I'm approaching things the same way now," he added. "I'm trying to be the best I can be and practicing just like I always have."

That approach helped Blankenship emerge in the second half of the 2011 season. He played in 13 games last season and ended the year as the top sub at RB. He averaged just under five yards a carry and finished with 462 yards and four touchdowns.

Ohio offensive coordinator Tim Albin likes the way Blankenship attacks the line of scrimmage.

"He's got really good balance. He's quick. And he can get his foot in the ground and get to top speed better than any guy that I got," Albin said. "He's powerful. He can make the cut and get to full speed better than anyone we have."

Though he's on the top line of the depth chart right now, Blankenship said that's not his number one goal. He just wants to get better.

"I'm not really worried about that. I'm just doing what I can do and trying to let the other stuff take of itself."

Three's company

Tettleton and Blankenship aren't the only Ohio offensive leaders from the Norman area. Junior wide receiver Donte Foster is from nearby Guthrie, Okla.

Foster, who joined Ohio after a short stint at Seminole State (JC), is the club's leading returning receiver with 30 catches for 352 yards and five touchdowns last season.

It's entirely possible that Ohio's leading passer, rusher and receiver could all be from the same concentrated geographical area this season.

"We're a thousand miles away from home," Foster said. "It's neat to think about that."

"We're just trying to make our state happy, and the Ohio Bobcat nation happy."

Foster will also try to help the Bobcats forget the heavy graduation losses in the receiving corps. Ohio lost 120 receptions from a year ago to graduation.

"A lot of people think the wideouts are rebuilding, but I see us as reloading," Foster said. "We just need to be able to step up and make plays."

Camp surprise

One of the unexpected contributors in fall camp has been sophomore defensive end Kendric Smith. At 6-foot-3 and 245 pounds, Smith has the ideal frame for rush end in Ohio's 4-3 defensive alignment.

Smith has played well so far in camp, and turned in several noteworthy plays in the Bobcats' first scrimmage on Tuesday. Currently, Smith is slotted on the third team defensive unit — which isn't bad since he's relative new to the position.

Smith played tight end the past two years; he was a walk-on at SEC power LSU for the 2010 season and last fall he played as a tight end/H-back at Blinn College (JC) in Brenham, Texas.

He admits his journey to Athens has been a long one, but he thinks he's found a home.

"It seems like I've been in a lot of places, but I'm definitely glad to be in the (hunter) Green," he said. "The main thing now is studying the (defensive) playbook. Like really studying, like it's a class."

Odds and ends

RB Ryan Boykin has now sat out a week of camp with a hamstring injury. ... CB Travis Carrie, a three-year starter and team captain, has not practiced since injuring his shoulder last Friday. His status moving forward remains uncertain. ... The Bobcats will hold their second full-contact scrimmage on Saturday morning, at 10 a.m., inside Peden Stadium. ... Ohio's season opener is Sept. 1 at Penn State. The game will air live on ESPN and has a 12 p.m. kickoff.



Carrie out for the season

Travis Carrie's season ended before it even began.

Carrie, a fifth-year senior cornerback, returning starter and team captain, will miss the 2012 season, Ohio University football coach Frank Solich said Thursday after the Bobcats wrapped up practice inside Peden Stadium.

Carrie will soon have surgery on his injured shoulder. The injury occurred Aug. 10 in Ohio's fall camp. Since then, the team and Carrie have explored several options for possible treatment in order to avoid surgery.

None, however, could get Carrie back on the field this season.

"(Carrie) will not be able to play this season. It will require surgery," Solich said.

Carrie was hurt on a relatively routine play. In 7-on-7 drills, Carrie lunged over a receiver on a slant route with his arm out to deflect the pass. After landing, he immediately removed himself from the field.

That was two weeks ago, and was the last time Carrie took part in any on-the-field practice activities.

Carrie's status is a definite hit to the Bobcats, the clear preseason pick to win the Mid-American Conference East Division and MAC Championship ship game. Ohio opens the season Sept. 1 at Penn State.

A cornerstone of the secondary, Carrie had the size (5-10, 212 pounds) to be effective against the run and the athletic ability to also be the club's 'shutdown' corner. The Antioch, Calif. native played as a true freshman in 2008 as part of Ohio's nickel package, then took a medical redshirt in 2009.

Carrie became a starter at corner in 2010, and last fall had a breakthrough season with career-highs in tackles (49), passes defensed (17), interceptions (4) and punt return average (12.5). He was named Second Team All-MAC last season, and this summer was named to the 2012 Thorpe Award watch list, Phil Steele's preseason First Team All-MAC team and one of five MAC players on the inaugural Senior Bowl watch list.

Carrie was regarded as perhaps the best pro prospect on Ohio's roster this season, and one of the best defensive players in the MAC.

Ohio won't just miss Carrie on defense; he was a top-flight special teams threat as well. Solich has said Carrie would be a terrific running back with athletic ability, and had hoped to showcase those skills more this season with a more pronounced role on punt and kick-off returns.

Carrie also excelled as a 'gunner' on the punt team. He was part of the reason that Ohio opponents returned just nine of 54 punts in 2011.

Solich said he anticipated the surgery being done "quickly."

The decision for what happens next will be up to Carrie. He has already graduated from Ohio, but could petition the NCAA for a sixth-year of eligibility under the medical hardship provision. Carrie could also move on and try to pursue a professional career.

"That's a question he's going to have to answer," Solich said. "He's thinking through a lot of things."

"I think he'd obviously like to play. But since that's been ruled out, he has the option of coming back next year," the coach continued. "We'll file a petition for that, and he has great grounds for it."

"It doesn't seem like that would be a problem. But it's a decision for him to make."

On the field, Ohio's cornerback group just got a lot younger. Redshirt junior Jamil Shaw was expected to start opposite Carrie, with sophomores Lorenzo Fisher and Ian Wells, and redshirt freshman Devin Bass all expected to get reps. Now, Fisher, Wells or Bass will likely be inserted into a starting role.

On special teams, with Carrie out, freshman RB Daz'mond Patterson, Bass and senior WR Ryan Clark will get more opportunities on punt and kick-off returns.

Carrie, speaking at the MAC media day in Detroit in July, said his goal for life after football included being a athletic trainer who worked with developing kids.

"I love helping out. I love being a part of somebody's success," he said.

For now, he'll have to help the Bobcats in an advisory role instead of being an on-the-field leader. It wasn't what he had in mind a month ago, but injuries are and will always be a part of the game.

"No guarantees," he said in July. "You never know what can happen, how quickly things can change. You have to approach every practice, every game like it could be your last."

Penn State opponent to wear helmet decals honoring victims of child abuse

The Ohio football team will wear special decals on its helmets to honor victims of child abuse when it meets Penn State next Saturday in the season opener for both teams.

The Bobcats' equipment staff has been working with the Penn State athletic department to design the stickers, which will mirror patches worn by the Nittany Lions throughout the season.

The gesture is meant "to join the Penn State team in showing support for child abuse victims," Ohio athletic director Jim Schnaus wrote in an email to Yahoo! Sports on Saturday.

The game is Penn State's first since the conviction of former assistant coach Jerry Sandusky, who was found guilty in June of 45 criminal counts of sexual abuse of 10 boys. It will also be the team's first game under new coach Bill O'Brien, who said on the first day of practice earlier this month, "We have to understand our responsibilities to children."

Penn State was dealt major NCAA sanctions after the Sandusky conviction and the ensuing Freeh Commission report, which was ordered by the school itself. The sanctions included a \$60 million penalty, a four-year football postseason ban and a vacating of all wins dating back to 1998.

Ohio's decision to wear the decals was finalized late this week. According to the NCAA, no other teams have thus far requested permission to wear special decals in games against Penn State this season.

Ohio is coming off its first 10-win season since 1968 and its first bowl win, a 24-23 victory over Utah State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Bobcats eye big things in 2012

It's time.

Simply put, that's how the Bobcats are approaching the 2012 season.

The program has been rebuilt, and is now a model for consistency in the Mid-American Conference. Veteran head coach Frank Solich has put his stamp on this team — from off-season conditioning, to summer school, to the training table, to the soon-to-be constructed practice facility, to the program's name recognition across the country.

The Bobcats are winning games, claiming division titles, earning bowl bids and — thanks to last season's breakthrough season — even winning bowl games and garnering 10-win campaigns.

The one thing Ohio hasn't accomplished during the Solich era is win an outright MAC title. Anything short of that in 2012 will ring hollow. The Bobcats were the preseason pick to win the MAC East and the MAC Championship game; Ohio is also getting national media attention as a team which could possibly go undefeated and 'crash the BCS'.

It's time.

"Unfinished business," said senior captain and tight end Jordan Thompson, who was citing the team's motto for 2012. "We need to keep moving this forward."

Forward ultimately means getting back to, and winning the MAC Championship game. Ford Field in Detroit was the site of Ohio's biggest disappointment last season; it was where the Bobcats played brilliantly for 30 minutes then collapsed when the goal was within reach. Northern Illinois erased a 20-0 halftime deficit and won 23-20 as a field goal split the uprights as time expired.

The Bobcats shook off that loss to post the first bowl win in the program's history with a last minute comeback over Utah State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. As thrilling as the victory was, it will be the MAC Championship game loss that drives Ohio this season as much as the bowl win.

"Of course that sticks with you," said junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton. "To come so close, and then have it not happen. That's tough to take and something we want to take care of."

The Bobcats have motivation, they have continuity (14 starters return) and they have a roster as talented as any Solich has put together in Athens.

Can Ohio pull it all together and post the kind of season some believe is possible?

Offense

Tettleton, unbelievably, was one of the club's biggest question marks heading into last season. It turned out everyone underestimated the first-

year starter.

Locked in from the start, Tettleton put together the single-best season at the position in Ohio history. He completed 64 percent of his passes for 3,306 yards, and notched 28 touchdowns against 10 interceptions. He was also the team's second-leading rusher with 621 yards and added 10 rushing touchdowns.

Add it all up, and Tettleton set 12 new single-season Ohio records. A true dual-threat option at QB, Tettleton's emergence as on-field leader and playmaker will be just as important this fall.

"We think he can up that competition percentage a bit. He's got a year of experience to draw on. There's reason to believe he'll continue to get better," said Ohio quarterbacks coach Gerry Gdowski.

When Ohio clicked offensively last season, the club's hurry-up approach was equal parts ground-and-pound, dink-and-dunk and big shots down the field. The Bobcats have pieces in place to ensure that versatility remains.

It'll start on the offensive line where the interior three starters return. The two new tackles — junior John Prior and Ryan McGrath — were worked in during the course of the season and will man the edges. But with a collection of potential bruisers in the middle with guards Eric Herman, Vince Carlotta and Jon Lechner and centers Skyer Allen and JD Bales, Ohio shouldn't see a substantial drop off in its ability to generate yards through the run game.

The offensive line will have depth, experience and size. The running back spot will also be deep. Junior Beau Blankenship (462 yards) and Ryan Boykin (430) split time as the primary backup last season, and will give the backfield a 1-2 punch. Smaller, speedier options in Kyle Hammonds and newcomer Daz'mond Patterson will be intriguing change-of-pace options.

At receiver, Ohio will need to replace 120 receptions from last season and will have to find a new No. 1 target with the departure of flanker LaVon Brazill — who is now making a push to be a starter as a sixth-round draft pick with Indianapolis.

Ohio will continue to spread the field, but may use more tight ends to do it. Thompson, a four-year player, is rock solid, and Troy Hill has the length and athleticism to be a vertical threat down the middle. Derek Rorack was the second tight end of choice last season and remains a viable candidate, while Tyler Knight gives the position a bigger, more physical option.

At wideout, Donte Foster returns as a starter and is the logical choice to be the new No. 1 receiver given his experience, athleticism and knack for making tough choices. Senior Tyler Futrell and junior Mario Dovell are slotted to be the other starters, but will be getting first-team gameday reps for the first time.

There are other potential breakout players outside as well. Chase Cochran had the best fall camp out of any of the wideouts and may yet push into the starting lineup. Bakari Bussey is a senior who has developed better blocking skills and will see more time. Senior Ryan Clark, a converted corner, is on the small side, but has tremendous speed and will help stretch the field.

And then there's Ohio's pace. Offensive coordinator Tim Albin found last season that the Bobcats averaged more yards per play the faster they ran. He wants the Bobcats to continue to try to find ways to decrease the time between snaps.

"Pace, pace, pace," he said. "We want to go faster, as fast as we can."

Defense

It will start up front for Ohio this season as four seniors will make up the starting defensive line, and it's a group that has to find a way to apply more pressure to the pocket.

The Bobcats were ninth in the MAC last season in sacks, and those often came on blitzes which further exposed a secondary that had to cover too long in stretches.

Defensive ends Tremayne Scott and Corey Hasting, and tackles Neal Huyhn and Carl Jones give Ohio a good first four — finding a second group has also come along during camp as the Bobcats could go eight to 10 deep. The Bobcats were solid against the run last season — with a couple of exceptions. But if the pass rush improves, Ohio could make a substantial jump.

At linebacker, Ohio will have a hole in the middle with the departure of four-year starter Noah Keller. But the Bobcats have experience on the outside with Alphonso Lewis and Jelani Woseley, and will likely have junior Keith Moore and redshirt freshman Ben Russell splitting time in the middle.

And while Ohio will usually lose a linebacker in a nickel package, Lewis and Woseley both are getting experience at more than one linebacker spot. It means keeping both on the field more often is a probability.

The secondary entered camp as definitely a strong suit, but has been hit by injury. The biggest loss is fifth-year senior cornerback Travis Carrie, who miss 2012 after a shoulder injury suffered the first week in camp.

Carrie may have been Ohio's best overall athlete, and there was no doubt he was the team's best cover corner and return man.

"It's a big loss," Ohio defensive coordinator Jimmy Burrow said. "It opens up a hole on the depth chart, you have to adjust and move a guy around here and there."

"But now, we have to have some other guys step up."

At safety, returning starter Gerald Moore has missed a large chunk of camp, but is expected to be ready for the opener. Moore (84 tackles in 2012) will be needed more than ever as an anchor in the back end of the defense.

Sophomore Josh Kristoff (52 tackles) will be the other starter, and started the final 10 games of 2011. Sophomore Thad Ingol worked into the rotation as well last season, while nickel standouts Nathan Carpenter and Mose Denton are also getting extra work at safety to provide more depth.

The Bobcats will be young at corner. Junior Jamil Shaw will be a first-year starter, while either sophomore Lorenzo Fisher or sophomore Ian Wells will man the other side. Redshirt freshman Devin Bass and senior Octavius Leftwich — moved back to corner from the nickel — will also see plenty of time as well.

Ohio returns eight defensive starters. The hope is that pays off with more turnovers.

"We were good defensively last year, but we think we can be great this year," Moore said. "We lost a big piece with (Keller) but there's a lot of guys who know what they're doing out there."

Ohio has no concerns at kicker where Matt Weller returns as a four-year starter and one of the best in the MAC. There is some doubt at punter where redshirt freshman Grant Venham will be learning on the go this season.

Schedule

The reason for a lot of the optimism surrounding the Bobcats this fall is the schedule.

Ohio opens at Penn State on Sept 1, but after that the Bobcats may be favored in each and every game the rest of the way.

The Nittany Lions, hammered by NCAA sanctions this summer, are breaking in a new coach with new offensive schemes. That game will give the Bobcats its biggest spotlight of the season and could be the spark to ignite a terrific 2012.

After that, Ohio's only other non-conference challenge should be a road trip to Marshall, where the Thundering Herd will be eager to avenge a 44-7 setback in Athens last year.

In MAC play, the Bobcats avoid West Division favorites Northern Illinois and Toledo during the regular season. None of Ohio's MAC foes had a winning record in 2011.

It's a schedule tailor-made for a lot of wins.

It's a roster built to compete for a league championship.

And, with a couple of breaks, it's a year that could end up in Bobcat lore.

"The potential is there to do the things we want to do and to move the program in the direction we want to move it," Solich said. "It won't be easy. We've got to work for it."

"We'll see."

We just need to go in there and play football and not worry about anything else.'"

"But 107,000 people. It'll be intense."

Tettleton: "Well, 107,000 is no different to me than playing in front of 25,000 here. There's a couple more bleachers. Not going to change the game for me."

"How do you like your chances?"

Tettleton: "We think we have a good chance if we play our game. We feel like this is an amazing opportunity for us. We win this, and we keep winning, and we'll have a chance to get ranked in the Top 25."

"So I've got a way for you to really get at your father. Tell him you thought he was a home run hitter in the major leagues, and now you've found out that Derek Jeter hit more home runs than him, so how good could he really have been?"

Tettleton: "That's a good one."

"Why not baseball for you?"

"Bruce and the band partying with the students!" he said. "No way! That is awesome! Awesome!"

Highly regarded Ohio University team embraces 'tremendous opportunity' to play at Beaver Stadium

Penn State's preparations for Saturday's opener against Ohio University started last week with film study and multiple practice periods geared toward the Bobcats.

It didn't take long for veterans to manufacture a conclusion: the Bobcats represent the toughest Week 1 assignment of their college careers.

"If you watch them on tape, they are good," fifth-year senior defensive end Pete Massaro said. "They are a good football team. They have a lot of experience coming back. They are going to be a very tough opponent."

Three of Penn State's past four Week 1 opponents — Indiana State, Youngstown State and Coastal Carolina — presented tap-ins. Akron, which visited Beaver Stadium in 2009, is a recent Mid-American Conference bottom feeder.

Ohio is predicted to win the MAC East. Some are viewing the Bobcats, who went 10-4 and won a bowl game for the first time in school history last season, as a potential Bowl Championship Series buster.

When the schools reached a scheduling agreement in 2008, it appeared the game would pad both athletic department's coffers. The Bobcats are receiving \$850,000 for visiting Beaver Stadium, while Penn State is receiving a lucrative seventh home game.

Four years later, the game offers one of the MAC's top programs a major showcase. ESPN is broadcasting the game, which begins at noon, and the television audience might swell because of the curiosity surrounding Penn State's on-field response to recent NCAA sanctions. Penn State officials are hoping Saturday's crowd exceeds 100,000 fans.

"It's a tremendous opportunity," Ohio athletic director Jim Schaus said in a telephone interview. "We want our student-athletes to play against teams of the highest level. It helps financially in our budget and it helps building a program and in recruiting if we're playing a high-quality opponent on national TV."

Neither the Bobcats nor coach Frank Solich should be fazed by the scene. Ohio returns 15 starters from a team that lost four games by a combined 19 points. The Bobcats recently visited Ohio State and Tennessee, two of college football's most hostile environments. The Bobcats played both teams tough, losing to Tennessee 34-23 in 2009 and Ohio State 26-14 in 2008. The Buckeyes handled the Bobcats 43-7 in 2010.

Solich's Ohio tenure, which started in 2005, includes a road victory at Illinois and home victory against Pittsburgh. He called playing at Penn State a "huge challenge."

"But we have been to Ohio State twice and probably should have won one of those games," he added. "We played Tennessee within range. We beat Illinois, we beat Pittsburgh. We have some things to fall back on. I'm interested to see how we respond to this situation."

This isn't the first time Solich has groomed a team to play at Penn State.

His 2002 Nebraska team lost to the Nittany Lions 40-7 before 110,753 fans.

Solich replaced Tom Osborne in 1998 and led Nebraska to a 58-19 record in six seasons, but athletic director Steve Pederson fired Solich after the Cornhuskers went 9-3 in 2003.

After a year away from coaching, Solich landed at Ohio, which won just 11 games from 2001-04. Two key assistants — offensive coordinator Tim Albin and defensive coordinator Jimmy Burrow — worked with Solich at Nebraska. They are among four assistants who were part of Solich's original Ohio staff.

"That continuity is a plus for our football team," Solich said. "We have a lot of contacts around the country. We recruit the entire country, not just Ohio and the surrounding states."

The staff has evolved since arriving in Athens, a small city in rural southeastern Ohio that houses 22,000 college students. The Bobcats' offense featured rugged Nebraska-like characteristics early in Solich's tenure, but they now scrap the fullback for a third wide receiver in many formations.

Ohio averaged 248.7 passing plays and 30.5 points per game last season. Quarterback Tyler Tettleton, the son of former Detroit Tigers catcher Mickey Tettleton, returns after passing for a school-record 3,302 yards last season.

The style has helped Ohio increase its talent pool. The Bobcats' roster includes players from 18 states, including Pennsylvania, Florida, Texas and California. Altoona's Tyler Futrell, Neal Huynh and Alphonso Lewis, and Hollidaysburg's Ryan McGrath, are among the projected starters.

"There's no question we are getting more athletic guys," Solich said.

Increased television exposure is helping Ohio raise its profile. The Bobcats' final six 2011 games were aired on ESPN networks. Ohio is already scheduled to appear on ESPN networks five times this season.

"It's huge for our alumni and it's huge for our brand name," Schaus said. "We're Ohio University, we're in Athens, Ohio, we wear green and white. We're not Ohio State. We're not this other school. The exposure is tremendous for our program. We don't take it for granted."

The renewed interest helped the school implement a plan to improve its football facilities, and season ticket sales are up 92 percent over last season.

Throw it together, and Penn State might be facing its toughest opener since Miami's 2001 visit.

"They are a heck of a football team with a great coach in Frank Solich," Penn State coach Bill O'Brien said. "That's going to be a very tough opener."



‘Cats don’t anticipate noise problems

As a kid growing up in Altoona, Pa., Tyler Futrell attended several Penn State games at the Nittany Lions' Beaver Stadium.

He knows full well what to expect in terms of noise when the Bobcats open the season there on Saturday.

“Oh man, even as a fan in the stands it’s hard to hear yourself think when it gets rocking,” said Futrell, a fifth-year senior Ohio wide receiver. “I know the crowd noise is unbelievable there.”

With a listed capacity of 106,572, Beaver Stadium could be the site this weekend for the biggest crowd to ever witness a Bobcat football game. The largest crowd ever to see Ohio play football was 105,075, when the Bobcats traveled to Columbus to take on the Buckeyes in 2010.

Even if a sell-out falls short, Saturday’s game could be just the third time more than 100,000 fans were on hand for an Ohio game. Junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton on the field when the ‘Cats traveled to Tennessee early in the 2009 season, and the third-largest crowd for an Ohio game (95,535) showed up despite an all-day rainstorm.

To prep for the possibility, Ohio has been piping in loud crowd noise for the last week during its practices inside Peden Stadium.

“Classes hadn’t started yet so we were allowed to, as you say, jack it up as loud as we wanted to,” Solich joked on a MAC conference call Monday.

But the way Ohio runs its offense should also help combat the effect of loud crowd noise. The Bobcats never huddle, and usually never use a cadence to snap the ball. In theory, Ohio will never have to strain to hear the play call — it’s signaled in visually — and is used to working with a silent count.

“When we were at Tennessee a couple years back, the crowd played a little bit of a factor but that was when we were under center and were trying to make calls at the line,” said senior tight end Jordan Thompson.

Ohio University quarterback takes different path

As a kid growing up in Altoona, Pa., Tyler Futrell attended several Penn State games at the Nittany Lions' Beaver Stadium.

He knows full well what to expect in terms of noise when the Bobcats open the season there on Saturday.

"Oh man, even as a fan in the stands it's hard to hear yourself think when it gets rocking," said Futrell, a fifth-year senior Ohio wide receiver. "I know the crowd noise is unbelievable there."

With a listed capacity of 106,572, Beaver Stadium could be the site this weekend for the biggest crowd to ever witness a Bobcat football game. The largest crowd ever to see Ohio play football was 105,075, when the Bobcats traveled to Columbus to take on the Buckeyes in 2010.

Even if a sell-out falls short, Saturday's game could be just the third time more than 100,000 fans were on hand for an Ohio game. Junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton on the field when the 'Cats traveled to Tennessee early in the 2009 season, and the third-largest crowd for an Ohio game (95,535) showed up despite an all-day rainstorm.

"That was amazing, that was such a fun atmosphere to be a part of," Tettleton said. "That's what we're expecting this time too."

Column: Some little guys have big plans, too

It's a guaranteed payday, sure, but there's rarely much glory in being the opponent. The way it usually works, a small school opens the college season against a much-bigger one at their place, with little more than a puncher's chance of winning. By the luck of the draw, the first team to venture into the Nittany Lions' den in the post-Paterno era turns out to be Ohio U.

"We've been at it a little more than three weeks now and we've prepared well in practice," Bobcats coach Frank Solich began Tuesday. "This week we've addressed how, if we're going to be as good as we think we are, we've got to be great on the road. We've talked about the travel, the hotel, all the other distractions, we've even cranked up the sound at practice the last couple of days to give the players a sense of what it's like to play in front of 108,000 people."

"But I've been in that stadium before," he added a moment later. "And the noise we're simulating is not close to what we're going to get."

Solich has plenty of big-game experience, but he knows replicating the emotional pitch at Penn State is tougher still. Before taking over at Ohio seven years ago, his first head-coaching job came in 1997 at Nebraska. There, Solich had to follow the equally legendary Tom Osborne after 19 seasons as one of Osborne's assistants. He was eager to get started then, the way his Penn State counterpart, Bill O'Brien, will be Saturday afternoon. But Solich knows plenty of things about this debut will be different, too.

The child sex-abuse scandal centered around former Penn State defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky cost Joe Paterno his job, his legacy, and may have even hastened his death from cancer last January. The NCAA sanctions levied in July left many in Happy Valley seething.

"After what happened, they'll have that circle-the-wagons mentality. They've been through a lot," Solich said. "They lost nine or 10 players through transfers, but those that stayed will be united in what they want to be about this season. In the end, they'll be ready to do what they've done for many years at Penn State, which is play excellent football. They'll want to set the tone early. We'll have our hands full right from the start."

But little guys sometimes harbor big plans, too. Solich has been preparing for this kind of game almost from the moment he arrived at Ohio U.

In recent years, his teams have taken games against Pitt, Illinois, Tennessee, Rutgers and Ohio State — twice — to diminish the fear factor implicit in facing big-time programs on the road. Plus, these Bobcats are coming off a 10-4 season after winning six of their last seven, a MAC East Division title, and their first-ever bowl game — with even bigger things expected this time around. Solich's staff at Ohio has remained largely intact throughout his tenure, and in quarterback Tyler Tettleton, he's got a fourth-year quarterback who knows the system intimately, handles pressure well and just completed the most productive season of any passer in school history.

"We like our chances," said Tettleton, who comes by his confidence easily. He's the son of two-time former All-Star catcher Mickey Tettleton of the Texas Rangers. "Anytime you're going up against a team that's in the BCS, the Big Ten and it's the first game of year, there's obviously going to be a lot of emotion — especially after what happened there. ... Being a college

football fan, I followed it. It was a tough situation. The victims will be in our thoughts and prayers, but at some point it's going to be a football game like lots of other games.

"And being honest, I'll admit we're excited to play in front of that big a crowd, with that many more people watching, because we'll know pretty quick whether the goals we set — a Top 25 ranking, getting back to the MAC Championship and another bowl game — are realistic."

Solich believes that if that question is answered early in the game, it won't be response the Bobcats are hoping for. He expects the Nittany Lions to "surge" at the start of the game — "It's bound to be physical, we're going to have to match that intensity with some of our own right away — and given the emotions roiling the crowd, more than once or twice afterward.

"At some point, maybe when the game is close and they're building momentum, all that nervous energy in the crowd is going to give them a lift," Solich continued. "And we've told our players, 'Nobody in the stands is going to come down and contribute. It's going to come down to the guys on the field, so don't forget those are the only people you're playing.'

"We've proven we're a pretty good football team, and we've played that way in tough situations against some storied programs in the past. And as long as we don't forget that," he said finally, "we should be all right."

A brother's impact fuels Ohio's Corey Hasting

York, PA - Corey Hasting, a determined but non-descript defensive end, was living his story 16 months ago.

He was a former walk-on at Ohio University and had pushed past the odds.

He had earned that elusive scholarship.

Then he earned a starting spot, the same one he will fill Saturday at Penn State.

He was a business administration major proving most everyone wrong. Things made sense.

And then he received a text message on April 21, 2011.

He was in class. He would call his mother later.

"No, leave and call me now," she responded.

He did and she was crying hysterically.

It was about his brother, his hero of sorts.

Now, everything about his story would always be about someone else, too.

Scotty Hasting is two years older than Corey.

They played sports together, Scotty usually winning, always pushing.

"Everything I learned from him," Corey said. "He taught me how to be cool with friends and to talk to girls, how to go about things in a respectful manner."

"He's the older brother. To be better than him is what I'd strive for."

While Corey focused on football and college, Scotty moved from one job to another before joining the Army.

As soon as he finished boot camp, his platoon was shipped to Afghanistan.

He left behind a wife and a year-old son.

"Obviously, I was kind of worried for him because it was right when the war was really getting heavy and ugly for our troops," Corey said. "I was really scared for him but confident he would do well ..."

Corey learned that his brother's main job was patrolling Afghani camps looking for al-Qaeda and the explosives they hide.

On that April day in 2011, he entered a hut, searching.

Suddenly, someone jumped from behind a wall, maybe 10 feet away.

They made eye contact for a moment.

And as Scotty dropped his metal detector and reached for his gun, the man began spraying his automatic weapon.

Scotty was hit 14 times.

Several times in his shoulders, four times in a hip, once through a thigh. A lung collapsed. His kidney was nicked.

Fortunately, his bullet-proof vest caught four more shots, barely keeping one from

entering his neck.

That saved his life.

So did a quick evacuation to an Army hospital, then to Germany where his pulse suddenly vanished. He underwent emergency surgery to move an artery.

Finally, he arrived at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Bethesda, Md.

Corey and his family only knew Scott was in critical condition.

Corey sat alone that first night, thinking, "What did I say last to him? Did I tell him I loved him? Did I tell him I miss him? Could I have been a better brother?"

When he and his family made it to Walter Reed, Scotty couldn't walk and was nearly comatose from pain medication. Vacuums constantly cleaned his wounds.

"I was glad he was alive, but it was hard to see him that way," Corey said.

And yet it seemed like every day the brothers were together, Scotty gained a bit of strength and healing. Less than two weeks later he started walking.

Corey dedicated last season and this one to him. He writes the words "For Him" on his cleats before each game.

Somehow, Scotty recovered enough to attend a couple of Ohio's games last year to watch Corey play.

"He definitely motivates me a lot to prove to him I can do this. I can't let him down," Corey said. "Going through what he's going through, reacting to it the way he does ... It really shows me that through adversity, you have to push through."

"It really helps me. In a game, we might let an opponent score, but you can't get down on yourself."

Now, his last season is nearly upon him.

He still tears up every time he tells his brother's story, knowing it's changed his life while still trying to make sense of it.

How football, in a way, seems so shallow now.

And yet how it also means more than it ever could.

MAC preview: Under Solich, Bobcats trade 'cellar dwellers' for 'champs'

ATHENS, Ohio — By Christmas break in 2004, Ohio University football had bottomed out. • Then-athletic director Thomas Boeh had fired coach Brian Knorr, who won 11 games in four seasons, and the Bobcats' talent pool was the weakest in the Mid-American Conference. • The national coaching search that would ensue began and ended with one name: Frank Solich.

Somehow, Boeh coaxed the former Nebraska coach back into the game after a one-year hiatus to lead a program whose reputation rivaled that of the Bad News Bears.

Solich once vowed that he would never coach at a university that wasn't near a major city or airport. The OU offer changed his mind.

"I took the job because I thought we could win," he said.

Eight years later, as a new season begins, the Bobcats are coming off their third East Division championship since 2006 and first bowl victory ever. They are also a popular pick by coaches and the media to win the MAC championship.

"What we've been able to do is a real tribute to our football players and players of the past," Solich said. "We've come from not being recognized to being picked to win the conference. It's a tribute to our coaching staff."

The health of the program will show at the gate: Season-ticket sales are up 92 percent, including a 72 percent jump in the high-priced tower seats of Peden Stadium.

The excitement surrounding OU football begins with redshirt-junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton and builds from there.

The Bobcats have three returning starters on the offensive line, athletic tight end Jordan Thompson, stout running backs Beau Blankenship and Ryan Boykin, an angry defensive line and rangy defensive backs Travis Carrie and Gerald Moore.

Tettleton, the unquestioned team leader, said the 24-23 win over Utah State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl buoyed players during winter conditioning.

Still, it couldn't erase the sting of the team's MAC championship loss preceding the bowl appearance: Leading at halftime 20-0, the Bobcats fell 23-20 to Northern Illinois.

"We didn't get it done in the MAC," Tettleton said. "That's good motivation. We want to get back to Detroit and win that thing."

Which explains the Bobcats' theme for the season: "Unfinished business."

"We have a lot of confidence because the guys coach Solich brings in are good citizens on and off the field," Tettleton said. "I think we do things the right way. We have that chemistry."

Parts of that chemistry hail from as far away as Oklahoma: Tettleton and

Blankenship are from Norman, and receiver Donte Foster from Guthrie.

"It's crazy we all ended up in Ohio," Blankenship said. "I transferred here from Iowa State. I knew Tyler was here."

Foster, who caught 30 passes last season, signed with Ohio partly because he knew about Tettleton's success in high school.

"It was just a great opportunity," he said. "We felt we could work well together. I really didn't know where the university was, to tell you the truth. But I knew the team was a winner."

Winning is precisely what the Bobcats, who finished 10-4 last season, want to keep doing.

"Coach Solich preaches playing hard, physical football and having respect for the game," Foster said. "It was that simple."

"We want to be hard-nosed."



Bobcat quartet eager for trip home

Without a doubt, when the Bobcats square off against Penn State on Saturday inside Beaver Stadium they'll be doing so in decidedly hostile territory.

But for nearly a fifth of Ohio's starting lineup, it won't be an intimidating atmosphere. In fact, for them, it'll be a happy return home.

Four Bobcat starters grew up in the hilly region surrounding State College in central Pennsylvania. Defensive tackle Neal Huynh, outside linebacker Alphonso Lewis, and wide receiver Tyler Futrell played in high school in Altoona, Pa. Offensive tackle Ryan McGrath calls Duncansville, Pa. — also in the vicinity — home. All four will be in Ohio's starting lineup on Saturday.

Growing up in the region, all four players are familiar with Penn State and what that program means to the local populace. Getting to play the Nittany Lions won't just mean a chance for friends and family to come see them in action, it will also give them a chance to play on the field where some of their early football memories were made.

"It's an opportunity of a lifetime for me," said Futrell, who came to Ohio as a cornerback and now will make his first start as a wide receiver.

"Around here (Ohio) a lot of people are Ohio State fans, and that's what it's like back in Altoona.

"Now, we're playing against them. It's a totally different state of mind. Now, they're the enemy," he added. "It's kind of surreal at this point."

Some friends may be cheering for the individual Bobcat players, but hoping for a Penn State victory. Such is the dilemma for the home town folks when high school stars came back playing for the visiting teams.

"I'm going to have a lot of guys, who went to Penn State for their college education, there," explained Lewis. "It's going to be some mixed emotions for them. They're not going to know who to be cheering for."

Growing up, not all of the four Bobcats were admitted PSU fans. Lewis and McGrath both said they were more partial to West Virginia. All said they admired and respected the Nittany Lions' program, but family ties dictated a different allegiance as youngsters.

"No, I wasn't. My dad played at West Virginia and my uncle played at Pitt," McGrath said. "I respect their program and all that, but we never really cared for Penn State much, honestly."

Besides a homecoming, the game offers a chance for the Pennsylvania transplants to catch up with former high school rivals. PSU receiver Alex Kinney will be one that Lewis expects to talk to, on the field.

"Alex plays the slot so I might be out there on him and we'll be jawing at it back and forth," he said, laughing.

While it may be a big game for the four players, personally, they all said it was just one of 12 this season for the Bobcats. A win or loss on Saturday won't change their ultimate goal — a Mid-American Conference cham-

pionship.

"It's a big game for a lot of reasons, including just from being the first contest of the year," Huynh said. "Getting out there for real, getting everything going on both sides of the ball. We're all excited to get out there and play."

"I think we're approaching it the same way as any other game though," he added. "We're not putting any extra emphasis on it."

Solich finds his niche with Ohio University

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. -- This is supposed to be Ohio's year, the season when it all comes together. The Bobcats have a star quarterback, an offensive line that could have three all-conference players and a potent, balanced defense.

They have coach Frank Solich, too. He just signed a five-year contract extension Thursday. Job security.

In eight years, Solich has turned a forgettable team that had never won a bowl game before his tenure into a relatively chic pick to go undefeated this season (that would mean a victory today against Penn State). He has made the world acknowledge him for reasons other than his controversial firing at Nebraska.

"It's been a great place for me," Solich said in a phone conversation. "You know, I'm going to feel pretty good about myself as a coach if I get to where this is operating at a level I want to operate at."

In November 2003, Solich was fired from Nebraska after finishing the regular season 9-3. He had coached in the national championship game two years earlier.

Nebraska athletic director Steve Pederson, who is now at Pitt, replaced Solich with Bill Callahan, who was 27-22 and had a losing record in the Big 12. He might be better known for directing a gesture some interpreted as a throat slash toward a referee than for winning any games.

Of course, Solich's departure was rough. He was a Nebraska man. He was an assistant for 25 years after playing there in the 1960s. Sports Illustrated featured him on the cover in a white jersey in 1965.

He spent the year after his dismissal visiting other programs. Solich wanted to gain an understanding of the game outside Nebraska. In December 2004, an offer came from Ohio.

Solich knew Ohio University, kind of. After spending his first few years in Pennsylvania, he grew up in Cleveland. He was a star football player at Holy Name High School. He didn't even think about Ohio U.

Aside from 1968, when Ohio was undefeated until a Tangerine Bowl loss, it had operated in anonymity. It was just what Solich wanted.

"Getting back to Ohio, there wasn't a major school there," Solich said. "But I was OK with it. I was also OK with taking over a program that wasn't successful."

In 2006, his second season, Ohio won nine games, the most it had won since 1968. He has an overall record of 50-40 with the Bobcats.

This year, Ohio returns its starting quarterback, Tyler Tettleton, who threw for 3,302 yards and rushed for 916 yards last year, three of its best offensive linemen, an experienced secondary and defensive line and one of the Mid-American Conference's best kickers in Matt Weller. SI.com has predicted an undefeated season.

Penn State coach Bill O'Brien called the Bobcats "an excellent football team."

Ohio has done almost everything to reverse its forgettable past in Solich's tenure. It won 10 games last season, won its first bowl game, has won its MAC division, has refurbished facilities and has an indoor practice facility on the way.

But Ohio has not defeated a BCS-conference school since 2005, Solich's first year, when Ohio beat Pitt. Since, it has lost games to Rutgers, Ohio State, Tennessee, Connecticut, Northwestern, Virginia Tech and Missouri.

A victory against Penn State would set Ohio on the course for a historic season, and if you want to get really crazy, talk of a BCS game down the road. Such accom-

plishments would help buttress Solich's reputation further, not that he is interested in the praise.

"I've always believed in myself as a coach," he said. "It doesn't bother me to be viewed in any certain way. I know I'm a good coach, and that's all that matters to me."

Ohio, PSU kick off season

The Nittany Lions have spent the last 10 months listening to critics nationwide rip their program, their institution and their fan base.

The Bobcats have spent the last 40 years dealing with the fact they were an after-thought in the world of Division I college football.

A new era begins today for one of the two programs inside cavernous Beaver Stadium. Ohio University will try to spring the upset and jumpstart a possible run to an undefeated season and an elusive Mid-American Conference championship. Penn State wants to usher in new coach Bill O'Brien with an easy win and prove to the world that, despite the most turbulent off-season in college football history, the Nittany Lions aren't about to be ignored.

The Lions will be playing for the first time in more than 40 years without Joe Paterno on the sideline. Once the winningest coach in Division I history, Paterno was fired in November when the Jerry Sandusky child abuse scandal broke and died less than three months later.

The Freeh Report followed, which damned the Penn State administration for not doing enough to stop Sandusky. The NCAA levied heavy sanctions on the program in late July, including a four-year ban on postseason games and scholarship reductions. Since then, 11 players have — with the NCAA's blessing — transferred.

O'Brien, since his hire early in 2012, has tried to direct attention to the future. For instance, for the first time Penn State will take to the field with names on the back of their jerseys.

The Lions get a chance to exorcise that off-season full of dismay, disappointment and horror today in front of more than 100,000 white-clad fans.

"It's basically a new era of Penn State football," said O'Brien, the former New England Patriots offensive coordinator who is a head coach for the first time.

"There is a lot of this that is about a lot more than football. But (today) is about football," he continued. "What is a big deal now is how we play."

The Bobcats know the emotional outburst they'll be facing. Ohio head coach Frank Solich addressed that issue in July and despite the perception PSU will be undermanned, he believes his team is still facing a big challenge.

"The guys who stay, you know they're going to be committed. That team will be one which is united, which will do whatever it takes," Solich said. "They're still going to be a tremendously talented football team, and they will be one that is on a mission."

The Bobcats, too, have big goals in mind beside the \$850,000 they'll receive for playing in State College. Coming off a 10-4 season with a roster that returns 14 starters, Ohio has been a sexy pick in the preseason to possibly break into the Bowl Championship Series conversation.

With a schedule full of winnable games after the opener, it's not a gigantic stretch to see the Bobcats put together the best season in the program's history.

"I think we're looking at it as a chance to gain some respect. A lot of people say 'Oh, they're from the MAC, they're not worth anything.' But this is Ohio and we think we have a pretty good program," Ohio senior tight end Jordan Thompson said. "The tradition has been built over the course of several years and we always say take the program to the next level and this is a chance to do that."

"And what better way to do that than in front of the whole country tuned in to watch the game."

On the field, the Bobcats have a shot to do just that. Tested by big-time road games throughout Solich's tenure, Ohio won't be awed by the huge crowd, ESPN cameras, or the pedigree of O'Brien's coaching tree or the resumes of the PSU players.

Ohio's lineup is heavy with fourth- and fifth-year players, and the quarterback — junior Tyler Tettleton — has given the 'Cats a belief they can win any game. Tettleton is back after a sensational sophomore season when he set 12 Ohio quarterback records and threw more than 3,000 yards and accounted for 38 touchdowns.

"Anytime you're playing a team like this it's huge for us as a university and a program. We're just excited to go out there and play a really good Big Ten and BCS opponent," he said.

PSU's strength is its defensive front seven, and the Lions were one of the better teams in the nation in giving up just 16.8 ppg. The question is can Ohio handle that front line well enough to expose a PSU secondary that is young and inexperienced?

"We're going to do what we do. We just can't shoot ourselves in the foot," said Ohio offensive coordinator Tim Albin. "We're going to have to pick and choose our spots. It's important that we make some plays when we're matched up one-on-one."

The other match up is a bit of a mystery. O'Brien is bringing a completely new offensive philosophy, and has been stingy about giving away any hints about what the Lions might do.

But he can't hide the fact that PSU was near the bottom of the country last season with 177 passing yards and 19.3 points per game. And that was before the team's best rusher, receiver and top kicker all left this summer.

Ohio doesn't have a lot of firm information about how to scheme the Lions, but will do its best to control the ground game and force former walk-on quarterback Matt McGloin to beat them through the air.

"Usually we go into ballgames making sure that we try to stop the run. I don't see this as being any different," Solich said. "They're talking about throwing the ball a lot this year but it's clear that they can put together a very good running game, and if they do that against us then they have everything going."

The x-factor is can Ohio handle what should be a rabid environment and take the Lions' first, emotionally-charged punch?

"I've told the guys we have to feed off that energy," said Ohio senior safety Gerald Moore. "It's not our crowd, but something in you has to fight back. You have to feed off that energy and make it your own."

If the Bobcats can do that, they have the savvy and experience to make it a four-quarter ballgame. And then it will anybody's game to win.

And if that's the case, Ohio might be, could be, the team leaving the field with a new era in tow.

Bobcat bits — Ohio will don green helmets for the first time during the Solich era, and will don helmet decals that mirror the ones Penn State will use this season to raise awareness about child abuse. ... Ohio is 0-7 in its last seven matchups against teams from BCS conference, with the last win coming at Illinois (20-17) in 2006. ... The Bobcats are 2-11 against BCS teams in Solich's seven years at the helm. The program is 6-37-1 all-time against teams in the Big Ten. ... Penn State leads the all-time series 5-0, but the two teams haven't played since 1974. ... The 'Cats are 4-3 in season openers under Solich, but just 1-3 vs. Division I (FBS) teams in openers. ... Penn State is 100-13 all-time in season openers.



Ohio stuns Penn State, 24-14

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. — For Penn State, the day was supposed to be about a return to normalcy, a return to football — where the Nittany Lions have always been able to find solace.

It was supposed to be a celebration for Penn State and its beleaguered football program.

Instead, Tyler Tettleton and the Bobcats crashed the party.

Guided by the terrific Tettleton, Ohio upset and dominated the Nittany Lions 24-14 Saturday afternoon in front of 97,186 inside Beaver Stadium.

Tettleton hit on 31 of 41 passes for 324 yards and two touchdowns, and added 47 rushing yards for another score, as Ohio (1-0) posted the biggest win of the Frank Solich era — and perhaps in Bobcats' history.

"This is truly one of the most exciting moments in Ohio Football history," said Ohio President Roderick McDavis, who was high-fiving players on the field and then gave one his patented locker room speeches afterward. "To come into this stadium, on this day, and win just speaks volumes about how far we've come."

Penn State (0-1), and its fervent fan base were desperate for something to cheer about after an off-season marred with scandal, the death of the iconic Joe Paterno, and draconian NCAA sanctions.

And for a while the Lions roared. Head coach Bill O'Brien's pass-heavy offense racked up yards early, and PSU took a 14-3 lead into halftime after a blocked punt set up Matt McGloin's 14-yard touchdown pass to Matt Lehman.

But the Bobcats were just getting warmed up. Ohio dominated play after the first quarter; after the emotional lift left the Lions so did their advantage. PSU out gained Ohio 173 yards to 52 in the first quarter. After that, the Bobcats racked up 447 total yards to the Lions' 189 over the final three quarters.

"We played with heart and intensity, and just put it all on the line," said Ohio wide receiver Donte Foster, whose 5-yard touchdown catch from Tettleton put the game out of reach with 2:55 remaining. "After we made some adjustments, we came back and started to put the licking on them."

The win snapped a seven-game losing streak for Ohio against Bowl Championship Series (BCS) teams, and gave the 'Cats their first win over such a program since 2006. Ohio had never before beaten Penn State, and the Lions dropped their season opener for the first time since 2001.

"This is an awesome feeling. We've been building this thing year by year, a little bit at a time. You want to keep moving things forward," said Ohio tight end Jordan Thompson. "We definitely did that today."

Down 14-3 at the break, Ohio caught a break to get back into it. Tettleton forced a throw in the early third quarter, back to the middle of the field, and it was deflected. Ohio flanker Landon Smith snagged the carom, then wove his way to the end zone to cap the 43-yard scoring play that cut the deficit to 14-10.

Penn State, sensing the game was slipping away, went for it on fourth down from the Ohio 30-yard line on the next series. But McGloin's throw was off the mark, and the Bobcats responded by quickly grabbing the lead.

On the ensuing drive, Tettleton dropped in a perfect ball down the right sideline to Ryan Clark for a 33-yard pickup on third-and-two. Four plays later, Tettleton dove in from the one and the Bobcats had a 17-14 lead.

"He was a part of a lot of big plays. He kept a lot of drives going," Solich said of his quarterback.

And as the game went on so too did running back Beau Blankenship and Ohio's

offensive line. The Bobcats' next drive ended with a missed Matt Weller field goal attempt, but Ohio still led 17-14 when it got the ball back on its own 7 with 9:37 remaining.

Ohio methodically worked the ball down the field and capped the 93-yard, 14-play series when Tettleton fired the 5-yard TD toss to Foster in the end zone.

At that point, most of the Penn State faithful headed for the exits.

"In our minds, I don't think it was," Blankenship said when asked if he thought the game was an upset. "We go into every game thinking we're going to win."

"We always go in with that chip on our shoulder wanting to get the victory and thinking we can."

Blankenship finished with 109 yards on 31 carries, and added seven receptions for 72 yards. Foster finished with five catches for 32 yards.

McGloin finished 27 of 48 with a late interception and 260 yards for Penn State. The Lions rushed for just 92 yards, and had three turnovers to none for the Bobcats.

"They were the better team today," O'Brien said.

It didn't start that way.

Ohio spent the first half trying to come to grips with PSU's new offense, which included 26 throws in the first two quarters. Playing soft on the corners, the Bobcats saw McGloin hit on 16 of 26 in the first half for 178 yards and two touchdowns.

The Lions threw it seven times alone on its first drive, which included a fourth-down conversion at midfield. But Ohio stopped the possession with Keith Moore's fumble recovery on the Ohio 21-yard line.

The Lions kept slinging it, and broke a scoreless tie with 3.1 seconds left in the first quarter. On first down, McGloin slid away from some pressure and dumped it off to Bill Belton. Belton plowed over the front right pylon for a 6-yard touchdown reception and the Lions led 7-0.

Ohio had an early drive stall at the PSU 36, and elected to punt. The Bobcats next series resulted in another punt, but Alphonso Lewis recovered the fumble punt catch by PSU linebacker Gerald Hodges on the PSU 13-yard line. Four plays later, kicker Matt Weller put Ohio on the board with a 22-yard field goal.

Weller, however, missed 44-yard attempt later in the second quarter, and another special teams mistake really put the Bobcats up against it. With time running down in the first half, Ohio punter Grant Venham had his punt blocked by Nyeem Wartman. Three plays later, after starting at the Ohio 18, McGloin hit Matt Lehman for a 14-yard touchdown pass and the Lions took a 14-3 lead into the halftime break.

But the Bobcats kept battling. Eventually the scoreboard showed what they believed at the onset; Ohio was the better team.

"It's amazing to come in here with a Big Ten, BCS opponent like them. It's fairly surreal," Tettleton said. "It hasn't really hit yet that we did that."

Ohio will take the field for its home opener on Saturday, when New Mexico State comes to Peden Stadium for a 7 p.m. kickoff.

That'll do Tett, that'll do

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. — There was a lot to admire about the Bobcats' 24-14 win over the Nittany Lions on Saturday.

Ohio played with guts to storm back from a 14-3 deficit with 21 unanswered second-half points.

The 'Cats showed fortitude and intelligence to weather PSU's blitz of varied offensive formations and schemes early on, and ended up doing a good job of keeping the Lions stuck between the 20s.

And Frank Solich's even-keeled, confident leadership kept the team on task throughout despite more than 96,000 fans — the vast majority of which viewed the Bobcats as a diversion from the real story of the day.

The biggest thing to like if you're an Ohio fan? If you watched the game, you already know.

Junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton did something many better-known, more highly-regarded quarterbacks never did. He went to Happy Valley and turned a snarling, big, athletic defense into an ineffective unit which appeared incapable of throwing him off stride.

Ohio had good wide receivers last season. On Saturday, Tettleton showed that last year's super productive offensive season wasn't entirely the result of who was catching the ball.

Just look at the numbers. Tettleton hit 31 of 41 passes, over 70 percent, for 324 yards and two touchdowns. He took just one sack, for a loss of one yard, but also had nine carries for 47 yards and another score.

Tettleton shifted seamlessly from running the zone read with bowling-ball back Beau Blankenship, to putting the ball where it had to be on a critical third-down throw.

In the second half — with the game on the line — Tettleton was at his best as he completed 16 of 19 passes for 207 yards and both scores. Reworked PSU secondary or not, that's three incompletions against conceivably one of the best defenses in the Big Ten.

"Baller. The guy is just a straight up baller," said Ohio fifth-year senior tight end Jordan Thompson.

Tettleton dropped in a perfect deep ball to Ryan Clark along the right sideline for a 33-yard gain. His swing passes to Blankenship were on target and gave his back a chance to move upfield.

His best throw was his last one. Facing a critical third-and-goal from the PSU 5-yard line with just a three-point lead, Tettleton hung in the pocket, then lofted a throw to the left corner of the end zone. He was immediately drilled by a rushing defensive line-

man.

Wideout Donte Foster tracked down the ball right where he knew it would be.

"We ran that play a million times in practice," Foster said. "I knew he was going to put it right there at the back pylon like we're always saying. He took a hit, but I think he felt the touchdown more than that hit."

"I really wouldn't want anyone else as my quarterback," he continued. "He's a smart player. He takes hits, he gets up and makes another play."

It was such a good day that his worst decision of the second half still resulted in a touchdown. Tettleton threw late, back toward the middle of the field, early in the third quarter. After a deflection, Landon Smith hauled in the ball and scored on a 43-yard pass play.

Questioned about that good luck afterward, head coach Frank Solich wasn't about to apologize for it.

"That was a key, but you know what I thought was the real key? Us being able to go on a 93-yard drive, 17 plays," he said.

That drive, in the fourth quarter, clinched it. Tettleon was 5-for-5 on the drive as frustrated PSU defenders couldn't get to him, or in the way of his passes.

And afterward, after Ohio had clinched the biggest win in perhaps program history and certainly the biggest regular-season win under Solich, Tettleton needed all of five minutes to mention New Mexico State — the next opponent on the Ohio schedule.

"It's just one game. We have to take them one at a time and that's what we'll do," he said.

Solich didn't need convincing he had the right guy running the show before the game. Now, the rest of the country shouldn't either.

"He's probably opened some eyes around the country," Solich said. "It just shows what kind of player he is, what kind of personality he's got, the demeanor he has. It just all adds up."

"We got the right guy."

You shouldn't find anyone in State College willing to disagree with that.

Penn State brought back to reality

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. - No one thought it would be easy, the journey or any aspect of the emotional first step of it, but there was supposed to be enough energy and enthusiasm to carry the home team through and start a new era of Penn State football on a high note.

Instead, Saturday brought harsh reality. Penn State lost its season opener to Ohio University, 24-14, after leading 14-3 at halftime.

This is the start of a new era during which Penn State will lose a lot of football games.

New Penn State coach Bill O'Brien might be the right man for the job, and he's done and said a lot of the right things in helping his players and the university move forward in the wake of an unprecedented scandal and subsequent NCAA sanctions that forever changed the university and the football program. Right now, though, O'Brien has a job that not many envy. And further losses won't make it any easier.

This counts as an upset only because a Mid-American Conference school with no real football tradition beat a Big Ten school with plenty of it. The Bobcats are experienced and gritty, and they didn't let a horrendous first-half performance weigh them down. Penn State was sloppy, missed opportunities to extend its early lead and momentum and held no discernible edge in personnel.

To sum it up, Ohio running back Beau Blankenship -- all 5 feet 8 of him -- had grass stains on the front of his jersey, not on the back, after racking up 181 yards of offense.

"I think our (offensive) line took control as the game wore on," Ohio coach Frank Solich said. "We wore them down a little bit."

That's the MAC team beating up the Big Ten team, not the other way around.

It's going to be a long year for Penn State. And a long few years -- maybe a long decade.

The Nittany Lions will have 20 scholarships cut, to a limit of 65, from 2014 to 2017. They'll be able to sign no more than 15 recruits per year beginning next February and for the next three years. Eleven players of varying talent and experience levels left the program this summer after the NCAA sanctions said they could transfer without penalty and barred Penn State from postseason play for four years.

Running back Silas Redd and wide receiver Justin Brown were due to play Saturday night for USC and Oklahoma, respectively. Both of those players would have been Penn State's returning statistical leaders at their respective positions. Both could play big roles for their new teams. Their current team certainly missed them Saturday.

"We have to do better," O'Brien said. "We have to coach better. It starts with me."

The better quarterback played for the visiting team Saturday, too, and in the second half Ohio's Tyler Tettleton was both the luckiest and best player on the field.

Tettleton's first touchdown pass of the season came on what he called a "horrible throw," one thrown to where one of two Penn State players probably should have intercepted it in the middle of the field. It instead bounced into the air, into the hands of Landon Smith, and went in the books as a 43-yard touchdown.

O'Brien had to feel as sick then as he did a few minutes later when Penn State starting cornerback Stephon Morris was carted off with an apparent ankle injury. To O'Brien's credit, he's made no excuses and tried to remain positive. He's got a heck of a job ahead.

"Ohio is a very, very good football team," O'Brien said. "A veteran team coached by an excellent head coach. They beat us. They were the better team today."

Tettleton engineered a 14-play, 93-yard scoring drive the next time the Bobcats had the ball, making it 17-14 when he capped it with 1-yard run. He threw a pinpoint fade to Donte Foster in the corner of the end zone for the clincher with 2:55 left.

The announced crowd was 97,186, but it was pretty silent for the final 20 minutes. Penn State seemed to thrive early on emotion involved with a new start and the chance to move forward, but that wore off. The pregame ceremonies included a moment of silence for victims of the sex abuse scandal, and the Nittany Lions' entrance included 200 former lettermen and more than 600 Penn State athletes being on the field to greet the team.

A T-shirt seen on dozens of fans inside Beaver Stadium read, "Those Who Stayed May Not Be Champions, But They Will Forever Be Legends." Earlier this week, Penn State senior fullback Michael Zordich said the build-up to this game would include "the most emotional run out of the tunnel in college football history."

At the end, the Nittany Lions made the first of many long walks back to the locker room.

"We talked about the emotion of it," Solich said. "We knew we were going to have to take on a surge -- a surge that would come from the fans, from the players, the atmosphere. We knew it would be a difficult atmosphere to play in."

"I just wanted our guys to try to turn it into just a football game, and we're pretty good at playing football."

Penn State threatened only once in the second half, getting stopped on downs at the Ohio 30. Nittany Lions quarterback Matt McGloin threw a pair of touchdown passes in the first half but struggled in the second, when he went 11-of-22 for 82 yards and an interception.

Over the last two years, McGloin has been a 54-percent passer, averaging 7 yards per attempt. He might be better this year, and O'Brien's system might be better for him, but he and his receivers couldn't make enough plays in the second half Saturday to sustain Penn State's hot start.

The new era started with O'Brien choosing to go for it on fourth-and-one -- and going with McGloin in a shotgun for that play. Penn State converted that, scored first late in the first quarter and went up 14-3 after blocking a punt deep in Ohio territory late in the first half.

By the final minutes, though, Blankenship was consistently getting into the second level of the defense, Tettleton found a way to throw for 324 yards and McGloin's body language offered the remaining fans little hope of a miracle comeback. Ohio got the bounces, the breaks and a win that gives its program some rare national spotlight.

The Ohio Bobcats are movin' on up the college football ranks. Penn State is in for some tough times, and that's going to take some getting used to.

When a Coach Called a Shift

Frank Solich's faith in the option offense had been forged and confirmed over an almost three-decade association with Nebraska. Solich played fullback there under Bob Devaney. He coached under Tom Osborne, winning three national championships with the same reliable, grinding attack. When he replaced Osborne, the option helped him win 49 games in his first five seasons, more than either Devaney or Osborne over a similar stretch.

In 2003, after his sixth season, one in which Nebraska went 9-3 in the regular season, he was fired, marking perhaps the first time his faith in the option was shaken. Still, two seasons later, he introduced the option to Ohio University, where the Bobcats were often ignored, a stigma perhaps worse than mediocrity.

"I felt like that if I did build this, and felt comfortable with it when I got done building it, then I'd feel pretty good about my coaching career," said Solich, who guided Ohio to a 24-14 victory over Penn State on Saturday. It could catapult the Bobcats for the rest of what is considered a winnable schedule.

Ohio won nine games in Solich's second season and went to the GMAC Bowl, the program's first bowl appearance since 1968. By Solich's sixth season, Ohio was playing in a second straight bowl, but it still felt foreign to Solich when his team was trailing Troy, 38-7, at halftime of the 2010 New Orleans Bowl. His defense could not keep up with Troy's spread offense in what became a 48-21 loss.

"That was one of the hardest losses for me to take, by the fact that we were virtually out of it at halftime," Solich said. He added, "I wasn't used to those kinds of games."

Selfless and smart, Solich sent his top offensive assistants, the coordinator Tim Albin and the quarterbacks coach Gerry Gdowski, to Troy, Ala., where they spent three days gleaning ideas, plays and formations. Like the rest of the football landscape, the Mid-American Conference had shifted; that season, there were six 1,000-yard receivers and just two 1,000-yard rushers.

The season before, Solich sent assistants to learn Nevada's pistol offense, which had averaged 38 points. Now Solich envisioned using the pistol and the spread, scrapping the fullback dive for the zone-read run.

"For my whole career, there was a quarterback under center; now there wasn't," Solich said. "My whole career, we huddled up. Now we weren't going to huddle? That was about as big a change for that you could think. But it wasn't hard to make that decision. Just seemed the right thing to do."

If the Bobcats were to keep up with teams like Penn State, Solich said, "you're probably not just going to pound it at those guys," but run around and throw over them.

So serious were his intentions, Solich installed the offense in one off-season, made possible by the familiarity that quarterback Tyler Tettleton and the team's stable of running backs, including Beau Blankenship, already had with it.

Tettleton, son of the former major league baseball player Mickey Tettleton, and Blankenship became best friends running the spread offense together in high school in Norman, Okla. They had been rivals in middle school, then Blankenship chose to join Tettleton in high school to run the zone-read.

Again, Blankenship followed Tettleton after their freshman seasons in college. Blankenship decided to leave Iowa State, and the first person he called was Tettleton, who sold him on Ohio. Yet neither had proved much when Solich decided on the spread.

For Ohio, it was a dream season: the Bobcats won 10 games, including their first bowl game. Tettleton threw for 3,302 yards, ran for 658, and accounted for 38 touchdowns. Three running backs each ran for more than 400 yards.

It got better Saturday. Blankenship ran over Penn State for 109 yards, and Tettleton threw over the Nittany Lions for 324. Leading by 17-14, on third down at the Penn State 5 in the fourth quarter, Solich let Tettleton call the play. The high-arching pass for a touchdown was never in doubt.

"He understands who we are," Albin said of Tettleton. "There's not a lot of guys in the country that you have that much trust in."



Ohio's breakthrough continues

The 2012 season had just seen its first notable upset. A MAC team had just knocked off a traditional Big Ten power at its 100,000-seat stadium. And so of course, ESPN cut to ... Tom Rinaldi interviewing the losing coach.

Certainly, Penn State's first home game post-NCAA sanctions and first home opener in a half-century without Joe Paterno merited some unique and intensive media coverage. But there seemed to be little mention of the Nittany Lions' opponent Saturday, even after Ohio pulled out a 24-14 comeback win.

"Obviously there was huge story behind [the game]," Bobcats coach Frank Solich said Sunday. "That story got portrayed almost on a daily basis. But we also knew those that turned on the game, and those that attended it, weren't going to watch Penn State play themselves. They were going to watch Penn State play Ohio. It was a tremendous opportunity to show what we're all about."

Solich, who's been the head man in Athens since 2005 (now longer than his 1998-2003 Nebraska tenure), hopes the exposure from Saturday's victory marks the next step in his program's continued rise. The Bobcats reached their first MAC championship game in Solich's second season and returned again in 2009 and '11. Last season Ohio won 10 games for the first time since 1968 and notched the first bowl victory (over Utah State in the Idaho Potato Bowl) in school history.

Solich noted Sunday that the Bobcats' rally from a 23-10 deficit in that bowl game to a 24-23 victory very much paralleled Saturday's game in Happy Valley. Penn State, buoyed by the emotion of the day, outgained Ohio 173 yards to 52 in the first quarter, and took a 14-3 lead in the second. But Solich's team dominated the last three periods, notching 447 yards to Penn State's 173. Touted quarterback Tyler Tettleton was particularly poised and accurate, finishing 31-of-41 for 324 yards while rushing for 47 yard on nine carries.

"That's him," said Solich. "He's obviously the catalyst."

That may be, but Solich has been the key to Ohio's consistency. In a league where coaches routinely jump to a major conference at the first hint of success, Solich, 67, isn't going anywhere.

"I enjoy coaching so much it doesn't matter where I'm coaching," Solich said. "Obviously the financial rewards may be greater at one school over another, but I'm at the point in my career where I feel pretty comfortable with what I'm doing."

The kid went and did it

Well, in the span of seven months, Ohio's beaten Michigan in basketball and Penn State in football. That's a little heady for my alma mater. Actually, it's a lot heady. I introduced you to the kid in the middle of the football headiness, quarterback Tyler Tettleton, last week, and I figured you'd want to hear his reaction after Ohio 24, Penn State 14, with Ohio churning out 499 yards of total offense and Tettleton a 31-of-41 afternoon.

Tettleton was, well, reserved Sunday afternoon, 24 hours after walking off the field in Unhappy Valley.

"It really didn't hit me 'til today, what we did," Tettleton said from his apartment in Athens. "I got back and watched the highlights on TV and said, 'Wow, we beat Penn State.'

"The day, the whole scene, was great. When we got to the stadium, you could just feel how they were ready to move on and start a new era. They were so into it. So spirited. They were some of the best fans, all of them. In the pregame, I felt the emotion, but once the game started, all of that went out the window. It was another game. You're just playing."

Down 14-3 in the third quarter, the 6-foot Tettleton had OU at the Penn State 43. Third and seven. He threw a ball off his back foot, slightly behind wideout Landon Smith. As soon as the ball left his hand, Tettleton wanted to slap himself. He said he thought, Oh crap. Why'd I do that?

"Probably one of the dumbest throws I've made in a while," he said.

The ball ricocheted off a Penn State defender's hands, into Smith's, and Smith ran for a 43-yard touchdown. "You saved me!" Tettleton told Smith.

More Tettleton: "After the game I kind of thought I might be all emotional, but I wasn't. I saw my mom, and she hugged me. She was in tears. She knew this was what I wanted, the chance to play in games like this. Then we got on the bus. It was five and a half hours back to campus."

Tettleton and his mates were the toasts of Court Street, the main street in Athens where the team went to be patted on the back around 11 Saturday night. Rumor has it the students had had a few beers before the team arrived.

"What's the weirdest sight you saw on Court Street?" I asked.

He thought a few seconds. "The weirdest thing ... well, I'd say seeing people wearing my jersey. I mean, I can't get used to that. It's crazy. I don't like the spotlight much. I'm just glad we were able to do this for the university. I'm blessed to be here. I always think of the programs that passed on me because they didn't think I could

do it. These coaches took a shot on me."

Tettleton sounded like an NFL quarterback, the more he talked. "Penn State's over," he said. "Now it's time to focus on New Mexico State."

Bobcats racking up wins, respect

The thought that the isolated, rolling hills of Southeast Ohio would and could never be home to a major college football program successful enough to consistently play in bowl games and earn national attention wasn't lost on Frank Solich.

In fact, when Solich accepted the head coaching position at Ohio University in Dec. 2004, he broke at least a couple self-imposed rules he'd set when he spent nearly a year traveling and visiting some of the country's top programs while weighing his options and waiting on his next opportunity to coach.

"A lot of things worried me," Solich says now, now that he's able to smile about them. "First of all, I told myself I'd never take a job that didn't have a heavy population base right next to the school. I'd never take a job that didn't have a major airport right next to the school."

After 25 years coaching at Nebraska and six as head coach during which he won at a 75-percent rate, Solich was dismissed following the 2003 season. He spent the 2004 season visiting old friends and rivals at places like Texas, USC, Wisconsin and Oklahoma, and by the end of that season, the job at Ohio University -- the polar football opposite of those places he'd visited -- was available.

The Bobcats won all of 11 games from 2001-04, but Solich saw an opportunity. Logic be damned.

"I took the job anyway," Solich said.

Last week, Solich signed an extension through 2017. Last weekend, the Cleveland, Ohio native's eighth season in Athens started with what's probably the program's signature win, a 24-14 victory at Penn State. The Bobcats were the unanimous pick of preseason poll voters to win the Mid-American Conference's East Division for the third time in four years. There's just one more 2011 bowl team on the 2012 bowl schedule, lending plenty of ammo to the thought that a team that returned 15 starters from last year's 10-win team can surpass that total this season.

There used to be a definite ceiling on Ohio football, not to mention a constant struggle for any type of large-scale attention. Now, there's a realistic possibility this year's Bobcats can win as many games as any team in the country.

"People around the country are familiar with Ohio football," Solich said. "They know Ohio football exists. There was a point in time I don't think that was the case. We mark that as progress."

"There was probably a time people made a little check mark on

the schedule next to Ohio like it was an automatic win. I don't think people necessarily want to schedule us anymore."

The blueprint Solich has followed started with recruiting good players who are also good people, and it's continued with a bunch of other coaching cliches about work ethic and consistency. Finding a franchise-type quarterback is usually how teams take significant leaps, and the Bobcats found theirs in Tyler Tettleton, the son of former Major League Baseball player Mickey Tettleton, when he signed in 2009.

Solich half-jokingly said his goal is to run a "boring" program, one that focuses on small steps and always the next one. He said his experience has taught him to concentrate on keeping the highs from getting too high and the lows from getting too low. It's a humble program, too. Solich said a blowout loss to Troy in the 2010 New Orleans Bowl taught his coaching staff a lot about an up-tempo, no-huddle offense, and by the following fall the Bobcats were using it.

By now, Tettleton has practically mastered it.

"His talent fits any offense," Solich said. "It fits ours to a T."

Getting to the GMAC Bowl in 2007 marked the school's first bowl trip since 1968. Last year's comeback win in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl marked the first bowl win ever. The win over Penn State was the first over a Big Ten school since 2006, and Tettleton's 324 passing yards in that game kept him on pace to break the school's passing yardage record later this fall, probably just past the midpoint of his junior year.

"That's what I came here for, honestly, to be a part of big wins and a team that plays on TV and gets national exposure," Tettleton said. "I believed it could happen. People know about us now."

Tettleton admits he wasn't quite sure what to think the first time he flew from his home in Norman, Okla., into Columbus with his parents and made the scenic, 80-mile drive from there to Athens. From a football standpoint, "I didn't really know who they were," Tettleton said.

But he knew of Solich. And when the winding drive eventually brought the Tettletons to civilization, he liked what he saw.

"It just comes out of nowhere," Tettleton said. "There's the stadium. There's the campus. And immediately...it felt like home."

After starting his college career at Iowa State, running back Beau

Blankenship transferred to join Tettleton, his high school teammate and close friend in the Ohio backfield. At Penn State last weekend, Blankenship ran for 109 yards and caught 72 yards worth of passes from Tettleton, who threw for three touchdowns.

The depth chart has players from Ohio, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Maryland, Virginia, Texas, New York, Florida, Alabama, Iowa and Pennsylvania. The Oklahoma and Nebraska players represent Solich's roots and connections in that part of the country. The rest are a hodgepodge of those who were previously overlooked, just generally believed -- or both.

Travis Carrie, an NFL prospect at cornerback who's out for the season with a knee injury suffered in preseason camp, came 2,500 miles to Athens from Concord (Ca.) De la Salle, one of the nation's most successful high school programs over the last two decades. Corey Hasting is a former walk-on from the Cincinnati area who's now a fifth-year senior starting on the defensive line alongside fellow seniors from Altoona, Pa., Arlington, Texas, and Ocala, Fla.

"We have a staff that really has contacts around the country," Solich said. "Our staff has pretty much stayed together, and people like that continuity. We have that going for us in recruiting. We have a tremendous school; an Ohio University education is recognized around the country. We have a walkable campus, a beautiful campus and it's full of good people."

"If you can't make a friend on our campus, you can't make a friend."

Said Blankenship: "My road here is different than most because I'm a transfer, but Coach Solich being the head coach, that's a name people recognize. And he's a coach any player in the country would want to play for. (Offensive coordinator Tim) Albin and all the other recruiters go in to places and just recruit. They believe in what they're selling. They see no reason they can't get any player, no matter where he's from or who else is recruiting him."

To grasp just how much the standards and expectations have changed, consider that the five-year record of 36-27 compiled by the just-departed 2011 seniors is the best in program history. That's the kind of record that would get coaches fired in lots of places -- like Nebraska -- but at Ohio University, it's reason for celebration and future excitement.

"I've only been involved in all my years of coaching with four schools, and two of those were high schools," Solich said. "Those two were building jobs. I had more fun coaching those jobs than I ever had. I felt like it was time for me to have some fun again."

"The fact it had to be built was not a detriment to me. I kind of embraced the thought of building the program."

He's still going. The win at Penn State made Solich's overall record at Ohio 51-40 and 28-14 since 2009. A new locker room and indoor practice facility are under construction, and the recruiting plan is clearly working. Seven players who played at Ohio under Solich were in NFL training camps this summer.

The school's switch from quarters to semesters ensures students

will be on campus for all of the team's home games, and overall season ticket sales are at a record high. A decade ago, most students couldn't be bothered to check out even a single football game. Now, a bunch of them wear Tettleton's No. 4 jersey around campus.

Because of the relatively soft schedule, even a 13-0 Ohio team would be the longest of longshots to play in a BCS bowl game. But 44 years after Ohio last won the MAC title at 10-1, the 2012 team has reason to believe it can match that accomplishment and pass both that team and last year's in the win column.

A ceiling on the program? That's now as imaginary as the major airport and major population base that border Athens, Ohio. The list of goals, Solich said, is still growing.

"There's so much more to come," Tettleton said. "There's so much more we can do."

Solich: Much work to do

Ohio coach Frank Solich was a lot like a picky parent looking over a grade card as his team watched film of its 24-14 victory over Penn State last Saturday.

The Bobcats recovered from a 14-3 deficit in a raucous environment, but pats on the back lasted only hours after the game. They play New Mexico State at 7 p.m. Saturday in Peden Stadium.

“We didn’t look at so much what we did well and got accomplished, but we looked at what we didn’t accomplish,” Solich said. “There’s an awful lot to move forward with. I don’t care how many players you have back, you have to establish a new identity each year. You have to find your personality. We have a ways to go to find our personality, but I like where we’re at.”

New Mexico State defeated Sacramento State 49-19 in its opener. In 2011, the Aggies were 4-9, including victories over Minnesota and Fresno State.

Under Solich, Ohio players enjoy big victories only so long before the focus shifts to the next game.

“It’s clear to everybody in our program that sustaining continuity is how we approach every game,” Solich said. “We can get beat in any game. You have to get ready for every game. We preach that all the time. (New Mexico State) scored 49 points in their last game. Who are we to think we can’t go to work and play our best game?”

The odds were against the Bobcats, who were playing a Penn State team that thought it did not deserve four years of scholarship reductions and a bowl ban from the NCAA in the aftermath of the Jerry Sandusky child sex-abuse scandal. Sandusky last coached at the school in 1998.

Ohio coaches told the players they were going to State College, Pa., to win a game.

“We’re always talking to our players about the belief that we will win,” Solich said. “That is so important in the culture of your team. If you have that belief, then you work to get it done. It’s about doing the right things on and off the field. We’ve got some really great competitors, and that can carry over to other guys on your team. It’s kind of boring to hear and say, but we take it one game at a time.”

Thompson leads determined group of tight ends

Day after day, practice after practice, Jordan Thompson remains a constant on the Ohio football practice football.

Sore knee, gimpy ankle, or as was the case in 2011 a surgically repaired shoulder, are all dealt with and then ignored when it's time to take the field. Besides the spring camp in 2011, when he was fresh off the surgery, you'd be hard-pressed to find anyone who can remember Thompson ever missing a practice that wasn't related to class.

"It really just comes down to taking care your body," said Thompson, a fifth-year senior, two-time team captain and four-year starter at tight end. "Every guy knows what's best for their body. If it takes a half-hour in the cold tub, or coming in when you have time off to get in the training room, you do it."

"You have be aware of what your body needs."

It's a practice that the entire position group is trying to follow. Junior Troy Hill blew his knee out early in the 2011 fall camp. Junior Tyler Knight has been dogged by knee issues since his arrival in Athens. Sophomore Derek Roback juggles back pain as part of his daily routine.

Everybody hurts, sometimes.

"As a group, we all have something," said Roback, the second tight end most of last season. "You have to keep pushing."

So far, so good in 2012. Hill was the opening day starter opposite of Thompson at Penn State. Both Roback and Knight got reps as well. The Bobcats are incorporating more two tight ends sets so far this season, and used that personnel grouping to finish off PSU last week with a 14-play drive late in the fourth quarter.

Hill pushed through his rehab a year ago. Not only was he cleared to start fall camp, but brought back a more muscular frame as well. He admitted he was devastated by the injury last fall.

"It's depressing. It feels like the whole world is crashing down on you," he said. "You're sitting around with your leg in a brace. Everyone else is getting ready for the season."

"It was just dedication, determination," Hill said. "I had the support of my teammates, my family. Everybody stayed on me so I could make a fast recovery and get back out here."

Ohio head coach Frank Solich said it's tough to dog your rehab, or practice habits, with Thompson on the squad. Whatever the ailment, Thompson finds a way to be physically ready. Thompson even somehow dodged the stomach virus that hit roughly half the roster early in fall camp.

"He's been truly amazing in that regard," Solich said.

In 2010, when Thompson couldn't lift his arm above his shoulder, his still ground out every day in practice. Solich said the tight end's tolerance for pain is as great as any player he's worked with.

"It's extremely high. It's up there with the tough, tough guys. It's hard to get him off the field," the coach said. "You need to have those kind of guys for not only their ability on the field but also their leadership."

Roback misses a day every now and then. His back issue is "fine" most days, but will continue to be a hindrance as long as he plays the sport.

He said having players in a similar situation — Thompson's shoulder and Hill's knee for instance — make it easier tackling his own. And having teammates willing to continue forging ahead helps in fighting off any bouts of self-pity.

"It really helps. When you have guys who have had pretty severe injuries...it really helps with the morale of the group when they're still doing the work, still doing whatever they have to do to keep going," Roback said.

And leading the way is Thompson, just as he's done the last four years. Hill said he's a great role model to follow.

"Good guy first of all and great mentor. He knows what he's talking about," Hill said. "I see what he does and make it my own."

Thompson said the group, though different in personality and background, have plenty of shared ties on the football field. And those ties help keep the group moving forward.

"We've all had our different trials. We're all working for the same thing, while fighting some of the same issues," he said. "We're in it together."



Bobcats ambush Aggies, 51-24

The Bobcats celebrated head coach Frank Solich's birthday in a big way.

Ohio enjoyed the support of a record-setting crowd, kicker Matt Weller became the program's all-time leading scorer and Beau Blankenship had a career night as the Bobcats throttled visiting New Mexico State, 51-24, Saturday night inside Peden Stadium.

The Bobcats (2-0) never trailed, but needed 24 unanswered points to blow open a close game in the third quarter to give Solich a satisfactory present on his 68th birthday.

"We didn't play perfect football, but we played good football," said Solich.

A Peden Stadium record crowd of 25,893 was on hand to watch the Bobcats, who were coming off a win at Penn State and are generating buzz as a possible threat to 'bust the BCS' this season with an undefeated campaign.

"All the students came out to support us, that was probably the largest student section we've ever had. It was great," said sophomore defensive back Nathan Carpenter. "Ever since we beat Penn State last week, everyone is coming together with us and getting on board with the team.

"We just have to keep things going for them and hopefully they keep coming around."

Ohio ran roughshod over visiting New Mexico State with 584 total yards, including 293 rushing yards.

Running back Blankenship had a career night with 27 carries for a career-high 168 yards and two touchdowns, and quarterback Tyler Tettleton threw for 257 yards and two more scores. Weller accounted for 15 points himself, with field goals of 37, 25 and 26 yards and six PAT kicks. With 303 career points, Weller now sits alone atop the Ohio record book.

"It's an honor to be able to be on this team for a fourth year now and be on such a great team with great guys," said Weller. "It's humbling."

Blankenship was the focal point of the offense much of the night, and for a second-straight week gave Ohio a dedicated workhorse to feed the ball to.

"He's done a lot of good things for us in two weeks," Solich said.

The Aggies (1-1) were game early, but faded in the second half as the Bobcats scored 24 straight in the third quarter to turn a 21-17 lead into a 45-17 mountain with 51 seconds left in the stanza. Quarterback Andrew Manley finished a pedestrian 12 of 24 for 132 yards with a touchdown and an interception. New Mexico State averaged just 2.4 yards per carry, and finished with only 70 rushing yards.

Ohio never trailed but did have some anxious moments. The Aggies answered each of Ohio's first two scores before Blankenship put the Bob-

cats ahead for good, at 21-14, with a 33-yard touchdown run with five minutes left in the first half.

Ohio had a chance to take a double-digit lead on a first half field goal, but the Aggies' Austin Franklin stuffed the attempt with a block. And the Bobcats first series after half ended with a quick three-and-out

The defense, which collected four sacks, came up with a stop early in the third and forced the Aggies to settle for a 38-yard field goal. After Tyler Stampler made the kick to cut it to 21-17, the Bobcats never looked back.

Weller answered with a 37-yarder of his own to make it 24-17, then Blankenship's 5-yard run pushed the lead to 31-17.

Carpenter picked Manley on a short out route on the Aggies' next series, and scored on a 22-yard return to make it 38-17 with 6:30 left in the stanza.

Tettleton finished the barrage with a 40-yard touchdown toss to Landon Smith that made it 45-17.

Akeelie Mustafa snapped the string for New Mexico State with a 91-yard kick off return touchdown, but by then it was too late. Field goals by Weller, from 25 and 26 yards, in the fourth quarter finished off the easy home win.

"The second half, like last week, was where we made some big strides," Tettleton said. "We really came together and got it done."

Ohio's first possession of the night ended with Tettleton's 6-yard touchdown run and the Bobcats looked like they would be in for a big night.

The Aggies pulled even on Tiger Powell's 2-yard score late in the first, but Ohio surged back in front 14-7 on Tettleton's 28-yard touchdown to Donte Foster.

New Mexico State tied it again, with 10:40 left in the first half, on Manley's 42-yard touchdown pass to Franklin, before Blankenship's longest run of the night snapped the tie for good late in the second quarter.

Ohio wasn't always pretty — it had a field goal blocked and gave up a kick-off return touchdown for instance — but wiped out an opponent it was expected to anyway.

"It was just a matter of executing much better," Solich said. "They were frustrated, I was frustrated (in the first half). We all want to play better."

Ohio puts its unbeaten record on the line next Saturday night at Marshall. Kick off is scheduled for 6:30 p.m.

College football: Central Ohio Watch

For the few seconds it takes a football team to break the huddle and line up for a play, Keith Moore's brain began to go haywire as he scanned the crowd of 97,000-plus inside Beaver Stadium two weeks ago.

Moore, a redshirt junior linebacker from Grove City, was starting his first college game for Ohio University. His mother, father, girlfriend, best friend and four relatives were in the stands watching.

"I was nervous, but really excited," Moore said. "I told my dad later on that before that first play, I said to myself, 'Oh, my, I am going to play against Penn State, a team I had been watching for years on national television growing up.'

Seconds later, after players from both teams began getting to their feet after the tackle, Moore was OK. He knew he belonged.

"Everything went back to normal," he said. "I said, 'This is just football, the game I grew up playing in the back yard.'"

Moore played an integral role in the Bobcats' 24-14 victory over the Nittany Lions by making eight tackles and recovering a fumble.

He was just as important in a 45-24 victory over New Mexico State on Saturday in making nine tackles and breaking up a pass.

What is remarkable is that four years ago Moore was preparing to watch football games in the stands at Peden Stadium as a student. He had passed up an offer to play for Marian College near Indianapolis.

"I backed out of that," Moore said. "I just didn't feel good about it. Then two days before Ohio started classes I got a call from the coaches asking if I would walk on to play on the practice squad."

Moore was a 5-foot-11, 190-pound defensive back. Thirty-five pounds and a lot of heavy-duty eating and weightlifting later, he's the man in the middle and on scholarship.

Linebackers coach Ron Collins told Moore days after a Famous Idaho Potato Bowl victory over Utah State in December that his studies would be paid for.

"It was a long time coming," Moore said. "I won't lie — it was rough at times being a walk-on. It has been a lot of hard work. The coaches are so good to walk-ons here. Coach Collins kept telling me last year that I was having a good season and that (the scholarship) could be coming. I kept fighting. Coach Collins finally told me, 'I'm pretty sure I got you, son.'"

Moore was way down on the depth chart after switching from safety to linebacker, but he quickly made a name for himself on special teams. Last season, he began playing linebacker on third down around midseason.

With Noah Keller having graduated, Moore became a starter this season.

"I knew the odds were against me," he said. "It was so very, very discouraging at first. I was so small, but I kept eating and lifting. I mean, I ate a lot."

Moore will graduate with a degree in exercise physiology this school year and will play next season as a graduate student.

"I have two options," he said. "I can go for a bachelor's degree in arts and science. That is a one-year course of study. Or I can go to graduate school and also work in a cardiac rehabilitation facility. All I know is that this is an awesome time to be a Bobcat."

Frank Solich transforming Ohio University into the 'Boise State' of the Midwest

Frank Solich has a rule. He vowed he would never break it. No matter what, he told himself, he would never take a head coaching job at a school that didn't have a conveniently located airport.

He broke the rule. And not just a little bit, either. Ohio University, where Solich took the head coaching job seven years ago, is more than an hour from the nearest airport. How remote is it? So remote that West Virginia is closer than the Columbus airport. So remote that you have to drive through a national forest to get from Athens to your flight.

"We don't have a major airport nearby," Solich says. "We don't have a large population. We're kind of isolated. Those things are concerning."

Not concerning enough, apparently. Ohio U. is now the hottest football team in the Buckeye State. Sorry Columbus, Cincinnati, and Cleveland (and Oxford, Akron, Bowling Green and Toledo). The Bobcats had at least as many wins last year (10) as any other Division I team in the state. That hasn't happened since 1968. And it's likely to happen again, as Ohio is the only unbeaten MAC team, having already beaten Penn State on the road. The Bobcats are favored to win the rest of their games, and although you shouldn't expect them to get consideration for a BCS bowl, you should expect them to be a topic in the wearying December debates about who "deserves" what bowl.

"We can be kind of like a Boise State," says senior quarterback Tyler Tettleton. "We're still not at a top level but we can be recognized across the country."

The key word is "recognized," because both Tettleton and Solich are on the verge of getting recognition that's well overdue. Solich, you'll recall, was Tom Osborne's hand-picked successor at Nebraska. He took the Cornhuskers to the national title game in 2001 after 19 years as an assistant, but was fired two years later with his "appalling" record of 58-19. (Solich had more wins over the same six-season time frame than Osborne did in his first half-dozen years.) Bo Pelini will have to go 18-2 to match Solich's record. He hasn't even taken the Huskers to a BCS bowl.

Nebraska's trash was Ohio's treasure. Solich was perfect for a program that needed to set itself apart from the too-many-to-name D-I competitors in the state. Forget about challenging OSU, how about competing against Kent State?

"We have not had a strong winning history," acknowledges athletic director Jim Schaus. "At some point you have to develop a vision. You need the right leadership. He knows what a successful program looks like."

And what a successful quarterback looks like. Solich had one in Eric Crouch, and although Tettleton is much more traditional in style, the winning knack is the same.

Tettleton has dealt with his own Big 12 snub. He grew up a huge Okla-

homa State fan and got serious interest from the Cowboys until he tore his ACL as a junior in high school. Every single D-I offer vanished – eight to 10 schools, he says – and the son of former big-league slugger Mickey Tettleton was left with a lone offer from Northern Iowa. Then Ohio reached out at the last minute and Tettleton de-committed to go to Athens.

"I wanted to prove a lot of people wrong," Tettleton says. "I'm not saying anything's wrong with Ohio. I just felt like I wanted to prove something to all those people that dropped me."

So the spurned coach and the spurned quarterback went on the war-path together. Ohio won its first-ever bowl game last December, the Famous Potato Bowl in (of all places) Boise. This season the Bobcats have outscored opponents 51-10 in the second half and Tettleton has thrown for 599 yards and six touchdowns in the fourth quarter alone. Penn State looked like it might have had its opening game in hand at halftime, but Ohio did all the scoring after the break to stun the Nittany Lions. Clearly some of the resilience of both Solich and Tettleton has shown up on the field.

"We're two tough people," Tettleton says. "Competitive guys, all about winning."

That might be the best parallel between Ohio and Boise State (besides the remote location). It's way too soon to compare the two programs on the field, as Boise has done nothing but win under Chris Peterson for many years now, but in both cases you've had a no-nonsense head coach paired with an undersized quarterback (both are 6-feet tall) who makes precious few errors against supposedly better teams. Kellen Moore was never going to be Dan Marino, but it's hard to bench a guy who keeps the offense on the field. Tettleton hasn't thrown an interception in nearly 100 attempts, going back to last season.

"Getting done what Boise got done requires a lot of things to go right," says Solich. "You need to win at a tremendously high level. Win your conference. Continue to go to bowl games and win bowl games. I'm not a guy that tries to look that far down the road. I want to do everything right, right now. Then another step will be ahead of you."

There are suddenly several steps in view. Solich has kept his staff mostly intact. His reluctance to eye bigger jobs (he's 68) gives recruiting major ballast. The school is building a \$12.5 million indoor complex. And Solich will be the first to tell you about a new highway bypass that will make the trip to the airport a little less arduous.

There will be no international airport in Athens anytime soon. But if the Bobcats keep winning, coming to play in Southeast Ohio will be less about how you're getting there and more about where you're going.

These are the good old days for Ohio

When Ohio administrators landed exiled former Nebraska football coach Frank Solich to coach the wobbling Bobcats in December 2004, they had something like this in mind.

Solich, separated from his beloved Cornhuskers in 2003 after three decades of service, has long since made his home in Athens where he has begun his eighth season. That makes him the fourth-longest serving coach in the program's history.

That wasn't necessarily expected. Nor were the following: Solich is 52-40 at Ohio entering Saturday's 6:30 p.m. game at Marshall. The last OU coach 12 games above .500 was Bill Hess, who went 108-91-4 from 1958-77.

Speaking of the Hess era, 1968 was the last time the Bobcats won 10 games in a season - until last year, when the Bobcats went 10-4 and won the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Oh yeah, that was the Bobcats' first-ever bowl victory.

Oh, yeah, Part II: That haul to Boise was Ohio's third bowl game in a row, exactly half the school's all-time total.

The 2011 senior class compiled a 36-27 record, the best five-year run in school history.

And along the way, the Bobcats thrashed Marshall 44-7 last September.

"It was an amazing year, not only for me but this team, the whole program and the university," said quarterback Tyler Tettleton. "It was something special, great to be a part of and something we'll try to build on."

As if that weren't enough, the Bobcats opened this season with a 24-14 win at Penn State. The circumstances were unusual, to put it mildly, but the Nittany Lions built a 14-3 halftime lead.

Ohio then overwhelmed Penn State in the second half, scoring 21 unanswered points. In the final three quarters, Ohio outgained Penn State 447-173, a previously unthinkable stat.

It was Ohio's second Big Ten scalp under Solich, with Illinois the other victim in 2006. The Bobcats also upended Pittsburgh in 2005, in Solich's second game.

And now, Ohio will try to win its first two road games for the first time since 1976, and beat Marshall in consecutive games for the first time in three decades. After Saturday, the Bobcats will try to win their first MAC title since 1968.

Yes, these are the glory days of Ohio football, and the players don't want them to end.

"Hopefully, we'll win 11 games, win the MAC championship and go to a bigger bowl," Tettleton said.

Ohio QB has big league arm

CHARLESTON, W.Va. - Of the many benefits to having a two-time Major League Baseball All-Star catcher as a dad, Ohio University quarterback Tyler Tettleton said one of the best is the advice. The sports they play may differ, but Mickey Tettleton can offer sage words to when it comes to how to approach athletics at the highest levels.

Among the most important, Tyler Tettleton said, is the need to stay calm.

"The one thing he's really instilled in me is to not be too high or too low, just be even keel and not show many emotions out there," he said. "That's one of the biggest things I've learned from him, and it's helped me a lot."

That's not always easy to do, especially when national pundits predict your football team can finish its season undefeated. But to accomplish that, the Bobcats (2-0) must first get past a Marshall team still smarting from last year's 44-7 loss in the "Battle for the Bell."

Kickoff is 6:30 p.m. Saturday.

"We know they're going to be out for some revenge," he said.

Tettleton threw for 285 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for another 53 yards and a score in last year's game at Athens. That performance was a perfect example of his 2011 season, where he became the Bobcats' first 3,000-yard passer and also finished second on the team in rushing with 658 yards. He also led Ohio to a Famous Idaho Potato Bowl win over Utah State, the first bowl victory in school history.

While the redshirt junior is dangerous both with his arm and his feet, Tettleton said he's always considered himself a pass-first quarterback.

"When anything is not there, I get into scramble mode, I try to make things happen with my feet," he said. "I don't try to slide or get out of bounds. I try to extend that play and get the extra yards. That's what Coach (Frank Solich) wants out of us, to be tough, hard-nosed guys and to get every inch we can."

"Tough" is a word both Solich and Marshall Coach Doc Holliday use to describe Tettleton. He recovered from an ACL tear his junior year at Norman North High School in Oklahoma to play for one of the two universities to offer him a scholarship, New Mexico State being the other. He carried the ball 166 times in 2011, second most on the team.

"He's what a quarterback's all about," Holliday said. "What I've said all along is that the quarterback position, intangibles are what

it's all about, and there's no doubt he has that. He brings a lot to the table and you better ... when you talk about them you start with him. There's no doubt he's the leader of that offense."

Solich said Tettleton's mental and physical toughness make him a favorite among his teammates. He's a favorite among his receivers because of his release. Tettleton has the ability to anticipate receivers breaking open. Plus he's a devoted student of the game.

"He's a very bright player," Solich said. "He's a smart football player, so he's not a guy that makes the same mistakes over and over again. He's the complete quarterback and it's always difficult when you're faced with defending a complete quarterback."

With Tettleton under center, some in the national media have predicted great things for Ohio. SI.com's Holly Anderson predicted the Bobcats to finish 12-0 and Tettleton to be the Mid-American Conference's top offensive player. And while that buzz has grown both in and around Athens, Tettleton and the rest of the Bobcats' upperclassmen have been preaching patience and calmness.

He knows the Thundering Herd (1-1) wants the bell back and will be fueled by a Joan C. Edwards Stadium atmosphere he said is one of his favorites in which to play. So it won't be too difficult to refrain from daydreaming of season's end and focus on Saturday.

"It's so tough to not look ahead and to think about being 12-0, win the MAC championship and all that stuff, but you can't get wrapped up in all that stuff," he said. "We really emphasize to just take it one game, one week at a time."

Blankenship shouldering the load

In two games since assuming the mantle of starting running back, Ohio junior Beau Blankenship has shown everything head coach Frank Solich could have asked for.

Toughness. Dependability. Production. Durability.

"He's shown to be one of those workhorse type of backs," Solich said. "By his toughness, he's able to turn those two or three yard runs into a five or six yard gain."

Two years ago, however, Blankenship was looking for a fresh start. The player lauded for his toughness now couldn't stay on the field at Iowa State.

Blankenship, a compact 5-foot-9 and 202 pounds, signed with the Cyclones after starring in high school. As a teammate of current Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton at Norman North High School in Oklahoma, Blankenship racked up 5,050 rushing yards and 59 total touchdowns.

That success didn't translate at Iowa State. As a true freshman with the Cyclones in 2009, Blankenship played in seven games and got just four carries.

"It looked real promising my first year. I was in line to get a real shot," he said. "I didn't redshirt and then I got injured a few times."

"After that, my shot...well they kind of pushed me away."

Blankenship sprained a foot to miss the second half of the 2009 season. Another injury knocked him out of spring ball. Then early in fall camp of 2010, he rolled an ankle. It was the final straw.

"I felt like it was a sign I needed a fresh start and needed to leave," Blankenship said.

Blankenship called his high school teammate, came to Ohio a few weeks later, and has been a mainstay with the Bobcats ever since. He played on the scout team in 2010 while sitting out a redshirt year. Last fall he developed into the top backup, and this fall he's the clear-cut starter.

"When I talked to (Tettleton), he gave me a straight answer," Blankenship said. "He said it's a great spot, and he loved it here."

"After that, everything worked out. I felt like God opened the door and I'm blessed to be here."

So far, Blankenship has blessed the Ohio offense with two, tough-as-nails, uber-productive starts. He ranks eighth in the nation with 138.5 rushing yards per game. His 349 all-purpose yards leads the team. Blankenship is averaging 29 carries a game, 4.8 yards per carry and has two touchdowns with 277 yards for the season.

His relentless style -- Blankenship finishes runs well and always seems to get yards after first contact -- has given Ohio's offense a physical presence to balance out the wide-open throwing used by Tettleton and the club's receiving core.

Blankenship has been so impressive in the first two games he's already

drawing comparisons to Kalvin McRae -- the program's all-time leading rusher and the driving force behind Solich's first teams at Ohio from 2005-07.

Offensive coordinator Tim Albin, who also coaches the running backs, can see the similarity. While McRae was patient and picked his way through traffic, Blankenship uses quickness to attack the hole quickly.

Both however, get the most out of every play, and never have to leave the field.

"I think that's a very good analogy. Kalvin was the most durable, he was the durable king. He was an every down guy," Albin said. "I see a lot of that in Beau. Whatever is blocked, he gets. And then he's falling forward, which is huge. There's lot of yards after contact."

Albin's stable of backs -- Blankenship, junior Ryan Boykin, redshirt freshman Kyle Hammonds and true freshman Daz'mond Patterson -- all have different strengths. But Blankenship brings the whole package.

"He's playing at a level better than any of the other backs I got, as far as every down. Daz goes good things, Kyle does good things, Ryan does good things. But when you combine all three things, he's done a really nice job," Albin said.

Blankenship said he's not about to shy away from the heavy early-season workload. That's what he wants. After his stint at Iowa State, he's eager to prove he can be the durable, every-down threat Ohio wants.

"When I was training and preparing for the season, that's what I had in my mindset -- to be able to carry that load and shoulder it," he said. "The weight room, the lifting, the running, the agility work -- all of it -- and then the mindset. I believe I can carry as many times as they want."

"That's what it was like in high school. That's what I'm used to and that's what I like."



Bobcats escape Marshall with 27-24 win

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. — Jelani Woseley was in the right place at the right time.

And because of that, the Bobcats finally had a winning feeling in one of their least-favorite locales.

Woseley's interception, with 29 seconds remaining, halted a potential game-winning drive and helped Ohio escape Huntington with a 27-24 win over Marshall in front of 33,426 on Saturday night.

It was the Bobcats' first win in Huntington since 1977, and Ohio's first-ever in Joan C. Edwards Stadium. Ohio (3-0) overcame deficits of 14-0 (first quarter) and 24-17 (fourth quarter) to craft another tough-as-nails epic in what could be shaping up to be a special season.

"I couldn't be any prouder of our guys," said Ohio coach Frank Solich. "This was another tremendous comeback."

The late pick was the only blemish on a record-setting night for Marshall quarterback Rakeem Cato. The sophomore completed a Marshall record 44 passes on 65 attempts and racked up 432 yards and three touchdowns. But his last throw was the one he'll remember.

"I was just looking at his eyes. He tried to look off and I waited," Woseley said. "He tried to throw it over, but I was able to jump up and catch it."

Marshall took a 21-17 lead in the third when Cato fired a 14-yard touchdown pass to Gator Hoskins; the throw had so much mustard it split a defensive double-team.

The Thundering Herd made it 24-17 with 14:13 remaining after Justin Haig booted home a 37-yard field goal.

The Bobcats drew closer with 10:43 remaining when, on fourth-and-five from the Marshall 27, quarterback Tyler Tettleton changed the play at the line of scrimmage and lofted a touchdown pass to Ryan Clark down the right sideline. The touchdown toss tied it 24-24.

"I probably shouldn't have done that, but it worked out well," said Tettleton, who finished 20 of 35 for 200 yards and three touchdowns. "I just have that kind of confidence in Ryan to go get it."

After the teams exchanged punts, Marshall kicked the passing game into gear again and was looking at a third-and-two from the Ohio 30. Cato fired to Antavious Wilson in the right flat, but Ohio cornerback Lorenzo Fisher popped the ball free. Ohio nickel back Nathan Carpenter swiped the ball out of mid-air and raced 48 yards down the Marshall 31.

After a series of runs, Ohio kicker Matt Weller booted home a 38-yard field goal to give the Bobcats the 27-24 lead with 1:37 to go.

"I turned around, the receiver was juggling the ball and I just tried to snatch it out of the air," Carpenter said. "I tried to run as far as I could."

Marshall's last drive reached the Ohio 27, but on second-and-10 Cato drifted to his right and tried to throw late back across the middle.

Woseley was waiting on it. Ohio took three kneel-downs and left town

with back-to-back wins over Marshall for the first time since 1980.

"3-0 right now is an amazing feat by our guys," Solich said. "We've played three, tough, physical football teams, and found a way to get the job done."

The Herd opened the game full of arm-waving, prancing swagger. All of that was gone by halftime, however, as the Bobcats turned the game around with a dominating second quarter.

Cato came out firing, and hit 14 of his first 17 passes. By the time the first quarter ended, Marshall led 14-0 on touchdown passes from Cato to Jazz King (3 yards) and Aaron Dobson (five yards).

Ohio switched gears and flipped the script in the second quarter. Ohio piled up 200 yards in the second quarter alone, and had surged back to take the lead by intermission after Tettleton touchdown passes to Troy hill (six yards) and Tyler Futrell (four yards), and Weller's 22-yard field goal.

"We just started clicking. We just started making plays," said Ohio RB Beau Blankenship, who finished with 102 yards on 30 carries. "We were kind of slow at the beginning but then started coming together a little bit."

Thanks to the late escape, the Bobcats' perfect season remains intact. Ohio puts it on the line against next week with a 2 p.m. start against Football Championship Subdivision foe Norfolk State at Peden Stadium.

"Last year, we started 3-0 as well and we lost the fourth game. We can't let that happen again this year," Carpenter said.



Solich wants to slow down Tettleton

The task is two-fold for the Bobcats this week.

Not only does Ohio (3-0) want to keep its perfect record intact, but head coach Frank Solich would also like to shore up the overall health of his club. He said he'll be careful this week as the Bobcats prep to face Football Championship Subdivision (FCS, formerly Division I-AA) foe Norfolk State (2-1) Saturday afternoon inside Peden Stadium.

Specifically, Solich was referring to starting quarterback Tyler Tettleton. Ohio's signal caller entered the game at Marshall with sore ribs; he left it with a bruised hand.

The same could be said for starting running back Beau Blankenship. Ninth in the nation in rushing yards per game (126.3 yards/game), Blankenship is on pace for more than 320 carries this season. He's dinged up with a sore knee.

Solich likes the way both players go hard every day, but seemed determined Monday to find a way to ease their load in practice this week.

"(Tettleton) only has one gear. He only knows how to play the game one way," Solich said. "I can't get him to not practice."

"We're going to tie him up this week a little bit and let him heal up before he goes out and goes 100 miles an hour like he usually does — whether he likes it or not."

Sure enough, Tettleton was held out of Monday's practice.

"I hate it. It's the worst thing you can do to me. But they want me to sit out for safety reasons and rest and all that. It's fine with me," Tettleton said. "Anyway that can get me ready for Saturday, I'll do it."

Ohio has other injury concerns. The team's depth at cornerback took another hit Monday when Solich said junior Jamil Shaw will likely miss the rest of the season. Shaw, the starter for the opener at Penn State, injured his shoulder just eight plays into the game.

"He tried to come back on that shoulder and it's slipping," Solich said. "It needs surgery. I don't think there's any chance of getting him back."

On the defensive line, starting DE Tremayne Scott may miss several weeks. Scott re-injured his foot in the win at Marshall; he broke the same foot in spring camp back in March. Solich said a walking boot for the next few weeks may be the limit of Scott's activity.

There are other issues. WR Donte Foster is still wearing a hard mold on his injured thumb. RB Ryan Boykin is still not 100 percent with a sore hamstring. NG Neal Huynh missed Monday's workout with a sore shoulder. OLB AJ Grady and CB Ian Wells — a starter with Shaw out — also sat out Monday's practice.

"We have to be conscious of our health," Solich said.

Polling data

Ohio continued to pick up steam in the Associated Press Top 25 poll this week, but failed to move the needle much in the USA Today/Coaches' Poll.

In the AP poll, Ohio clocked in at No. 29 in the country and received 20 points. A total of 11 voters listed the Bobcats on their respective Top 25 ballot.

Ohio appeared on five ballots after week one, and on nine ballots after week two. Ohio was 34th overall, with 17 points, in the AP poll a week ago.

The Bobcats were listed at No. 25 by six voters; Ohio's highest listing on a ballot was No. 22.

In the Coaches' Poll, Ohio was tied for 42nd with five points this week. A week ago, the Bobcats were tied for 44th with just two points.

Winner, winner

Ohio made it a perfect 3-for-3, in regards to the MAC East Division Players of the Week awards, on Monday.

For a third straight week, at least one Bobcat was named to the weekly honor roll. And this time, Ohio had double winners.

Tettleton, a junior QB, and senior kicker Matt Weller both earned Player of the Week honors after Ohio's win over Marshall on Saturday night.

Tettleton, the MAC East Offensive Player of the Week, completed 20 of 35 passes for 200 yards and three touchdowns. Tettleton completed passes to nine different receivers, didn't throw an interception and improved to 13-4 as a starter. It was the fourth time in his career that Tettleton received the award.

Weller, meanwhile, picked up his seventh MAC East Special Teams Player of the Week award after he connected on a pair of field goals, including the game-winner from 38 yards away.

Weller also hit all three of his PAT kicks, and averaged 59.8 yards per kick off with two touchbacks.



Bobcats wary of FCS Spartans

At first glance, Ohio seems to be set up with a tailor-made opponent on Parent's Weekend.

The Bobcats (3-0) will make their now yearly foray against Football Championship Subdivision (FCS, formerly Division I-A) on Saturday when they host Norfolk State (2-1) inside Peden Stadium.

But Ohio head coach Frank Solich said the Spartans' FCS moniker shouldn't be taken lightly. Norfolk State will have the athletes available to give the Bobcats plenty to worry about.

"They're very athletic when you look at them on tape," Solich said. "I don't know how they're perceived by other people, I know how they're perceived by our coaches. And I know once our players get a chance to see them on film, I know how they'll be perceived by our players."

"They're a very good football team, they're capable of winning."

Norfolk State has a recent winning pedigree. The Spartans were 9-3 in 2011, and qualified for the FCS playoffs. Norfolk State opened this season 2-0, and rallied back from 23-0 and 30-7 deficits before falling 37-36 in overtime to Howard last weekend.

"They'll play very good football. They'll be very confident in their abilities coming in, as they should be," Solich said. "We expect it to be a heck of a football game."

Ohio will have more scholarship players, and in general more depth and a size advantage. But the Spartans won't be short on playmakers.

As an example, the Bobcats have three players on their roster who originally signed with schools from the power six, or BCS automatic qualifying conferences. The Spartans will have seven.

Four of those transfers are on the defensive side of the ball in the form of a trio of backup linebackers and defensive tackle Cameron Jude. Jude, 6-3, 290 pounds, transferred in from Michigan State.

Offensively, three of the Spartans' best originally started their college careers elsewhere. Offensive lineman Michael Kay began at Syracuse. Wide receiver Xavier Boyce, the Spartans best big-play threat and first team all-conference preseason selection, began at Virginia Tech. Starting quarterback Nico Flores, a fourth-year junior, started his college career with UCF.

And that list of transfers from bigger programs doesn't include OLB Jamal Giddens — who has 12 tackles for loss and 7.5 sacks in his last five games — or redshirt freshman RB Brendon Riddick, who already has 260 rushing yards and six touchdowns on the year.

The Spartans have guys who can play.

"Just because they play at a smaller school doesn't really mean anything," said Ohio senior wide receiver Bakari Bussey. "Football is football wherever you go. And they have good football players."

The divide between FCS and the majority of non-BCS level FBS programs isn't nearly as large as it used to be either. In 2012, FCS teams have been

particular efficient at scoring upsets over 'higher level' competition.

In three-plus weeks, nine FCS programs have scored wins over FBS opponents. There were four such upsets on Sept. 15 alone. One Mid-American Conference team, Eastern Michigan, has already had such a loss this season.

Ohio players were made aware of this fact this week.

"We don't want to be another one of those guys," said senior defensive end Corey Hasting.

"They got skill kids all over the field. We can't take them lightly whatsoever," he added. "This is going to be their biggest game of the year. They're going to come in here thinking they can win and thinking they have a chance. It's up to us as a team to stop that in the first quarter."

Norfolk State will be playing a FBS foe for the fifth time in the program's history, all coming in the last six seasons. The Spartans haven't had a near-miss yet however.

Norfolk State has played twice at Rutgers, once at Kentucky and once at West Virginia since 2011. The combined score of those games is 183-15.

But as the Spartans proved in March with an upset win over Missouri in the NCAA Tournament, it only takes one win to make people notice.

It's a concept not unfamiliar to the Bobcats, who enter every game thinking they can win.

"We always feel we can go and upset any team. We don't feel that anybody is outright better than us. If we play hard and play our best ball, we can come out on top," Ohio WR Ryan Clark said. "I'm sure any other team feels that way."

"Clearly we have a bulls-eye on our back right now, so of course they're going to bring their 'A' game and we're going to have to prepare for that."

Clark's transformation is complete

After scoring his first collegiate touchdown on Saturday night, Ohio redshirt senior Ryan Clark said he's been getting plenty of congratulations around campus -- and also a question.

"Why didn't you move to receiver sooner? Stuff like that," explained Clark.

Indeed, Clark's transition from cornerback to wide receiver is certainly complete. A fourth-quarter, game-tying touchdown -- on fourth down nonetheless -- is a sure-fire way to cement your status as one of the team's key playmakers.

As little as six weeks ago, Ohio fans were probably unaware of Clark -- who converted from defensive back to wideout last spring. But for those in the know, head coach Frank Solich and quarterback Tyler Tettleton for instance, Clark's adjustment to the offensive side of the football was one of the key developments of fall camp.

Clark, a 5-9, 169-pounder burner from Macedonia, Ohio, gives the Bobcats an explosive speed guy on the outside. Clark is regarded as the fastest player on the Ohio roster.

"With his athleticism and his speed, he's got to be on the field somewhere," said Tettleton, who has completed nine passes for 114 yards to Clark. "He's made huge strides this fall and it's just great to see him grow each week."

"We can use that and it's going to help us down the road."

Ohio needed more speed at the position. Solich said Clark had already proven hands -- he's been a punt returner for the past three years -- so it made sense to ask him to switch spots last spring.

"You can't have enough good receivers when you run our style of offense," Solich said. "It's played out really well for him, it's played out well for us."

Clark came to Ohio as a walk-on. After a redshirt year, he broke through as a special teams contributor in 2009 and 2010. Last season Clark played in all 14 games, mostly as kick-off and punt returner. As a corner, reps were hard to come by.

Clark said he didn't mind the position switch. After fighting to eventually earn a scholarship, he wasn't content. He wanted to do more.

"That was a big part of it. There was a better chance of me getting on the field. I wanted to contribute more," he said.

The transition wasn't instant. It required a lot of route running in the off season; it meant plenty of extra throwing and catching with Tettleton during the summer. But Clark wasn't a complete novice; he played WR at Nordonia HS, and spent four years working against Ohio's wide receivers in practice.

Clark wasn't learning a new position, he was knocking the rust off an old one.

In fact, it was easier than trying to stick through the lean times when he was a walk-on.

"It was a lot of up and downs. It's a real challenge of your character. You

just have to be strong," said Clark, who said the support of teammates, family and coaches kept him going.

"Everyone who wants to play college football believes they can contribute to the team. When you don't really get the opportunity to do it as much as you think you can, that's in the back of your head," he added. "You keep working hard and hope that your time will come. Hard work pays off."

If Ohio goes on to have a memorable season, Clark will have two of the big plays that got the Bobcats off on the right foot. In the opener at Penn State, Ohio trailed 14-10 in the third quarter and faced third down at midfield. Tettleton went deep down the right side, and Clark hauled in a 33-yarder that moved the chains.

The 'Cats faced a similar situation last Saturday in Huntington. With Ohio down 7, fourth-down at the Marshall 27, Tettleton made a line call and fired deep to Clark again. And again, he came through.

Senior wide receiver Bakari Bussey said Clark didn't need the big catches to earn his stripes with the position group. He already had them.

"He was on the dark side before," Bussey joked, referring to Clark's CB past. "He's someone we need. He's that shifty, fast receiver. He'll shake somebody in a phone booth."

"He already knew a lot of the stuff," Bussey continued. "It's not hard for him to break somebody off, especially with his quickness."

A developing weapon in the passing game, Clark has already established himself on special teams. When Ohio wants to make sure a punt is caught, Clark is back deep receiving it. He was already accepted as one of the Bobcats' more potent return guys.

Clark is averaging 11.6 yards per punt return this season, and Ohio's 10.2 yard punt return average is third in the Mid-American Conference.

"He had some experience as a punt return guy, but with Travis (Carrie) out he's become the main guy," Solich said. "(10 yard average) that's what you strive for. That's kind of a magic number there. If you can get that, then you know you're getting something done fairly well."

Clark survived several seasons of being a walk-on. He navigated a position switch late in his career. And now he's found a way to be an impact player for Ohio in multiple areas.

He never doubted he could do it.

"I never really lost it, you could say. Playing corner is a lot of the same footwork, you're just doing it running forward so it's a lot easier," he grinned.

"The transition was easier because I know how to attack corners now. I know what they're trying to take away," Clark continued. "I wasn't catching every pass last spring, but I caught a lot of balls in the off-season and I got it back."

And now Ohio can't imagine going forward without Clark as part of the offensive attack.

"You could just tell by the end of the summer he could be a go-to guy for us," Tettleton said. "I'm thrilled we have someone like him who can really get down the field."



Bobcats focused only on Spartans

It was one of the 'darkest' days in Ohio University football history.

Sept. 7, 2002. The Bobcats, in the second game of the second season of then head coach Brian Knorr, laid a colossal-sized egg in the home opener as visiting Northeastern shut out Ohio 31-0.

Northeastern was a Division I-AA program, now known as the Football Championship Subdivision.

Why the history lesson? It's a clear example of why current head coach Frank Solich employs, and always has, a classic 'one game at a time' approach. Don't worry about what's ahead, or behind. Focus on the here and now.

Solich and his Bobcats have spouted off the philosophy plenty this week. Ohio (3-0) puts its undefeated mark on the line today against FCS foe Norfolk State (2-1) inside Peden Stadium.

"We expect it to be a heck of a football game," Solich said. "With our approach...we're putting everything into that and hopefully it's going to be good enough."

These are heady days for Ohio. The club is gunning for its first 4-0 start since 1976. The Bobcats are receiving votes in both major top 25 polls, and Ohio is the preseason favorite to win the Mid-American Conference. But any concern that Ohio will be looking past the Spartans is ill-founded, said senior wide receiver Bakari Bussey.

"We look at every team like we're playing Alabama," he said, referencing the current No. 1 team in the country. "We look at every team like that. We play everybody the same. We practice and prepare for everybody the same way."

Well, Ohio is preparing almost normally. Starting QB Tyler Tettleton is questionable for today's game, and missed substantial practice time this week because of a non-disclosed upper body injury. Tettleton figures to be a game-time decision, and if he can't go then redshirt freshman Derrius Vick will get the starting nod.

Whether that injury is enough to throw off Ohio's offense -- averaging 494 yards and 34 points a game -- remains to be seen. What the Bobcats know already is that the Spartans are athletic enough to cause problems with their 3-4 front. Norfolk State has held opponents to 3.0 yards per carry, and cause havoc with defensive impact plays. The Spartans average more than 9.0 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks per game.

Outside linebacker Jamal Giddens and Lynden Trail are the biggest disrupters, and both show the kind of athleticism that stands out on tape.

"They can really run. They're one-on-one good football players," Solich said. "And they've got skilled people. They have guys who can really make big plays on both sides of the ball."

Offensively, the Spartans will test Ohio with a balanced attack. QB Nico Flores is a dual-threat option -- he subbed in as a Wildcat quarterback last year -- who has rushed for 131 yards and thrown for 542 more with four touchdowns. RB Brendon Riddick paces the ground game with 260 rushing yards and a 6.5 yards per carry average. On the outside, Virginia

Tech transfer Xavier Boyce (18 catches, 152 yards) is a flanker that will bear special attention.

Ohio has allowed just 20.7 points and 350 yards per game, and been especially stout against the run; the 'Cats are 12th in the nation in allowing just 74.0 rushing yards per contest.

The Bobcats will have to corral the zone read, and Flores on designed runs. Ohio would like to establish control early.

"This is going to be their biggest game of the year," said senior DE Corey Hasting. "They're going to come in here thinking they can win and thinking they have a chance. It's up to us as a team to set the tone in the first quarter."

Under Solich, Ohio is 6-0 against FCS competition. The Bobcats have never scored less than 28 points in those six games and won by an average score of 34.5 to 11.8. The closest call in the Solich era came in 2009 with a 28-10 win over Cal Poly.

Ohio generally keeps it close to the vest in such games with Solich -- it has scored more than 36 points just once in the six games -- and instead typically grinds the game down with a run-heavy scheme.

Ohio has won eight in a row overall against FCS teams, but that loss to Northeastern (a program which no longer exists) wasn't that long ago.

Current Bobcats players aren't prodded with that, but they are reminded about the team's approach on a daily basis.

"Everyone is capable of winning the game. It's college football, things can go wrong and things can go your way," said senior WR Ryan Clark. "You can't look past one team because of what league they're in or what status they have. You just have to prepare for each team the same way."

"That's what we do here."

Football: Ohio throttles Norfolk State

ATHENS, Ohio - There were only two bits of intrigue surrounding the Ohio University football team today, but chances are only a few hundred people in Peden Stadium saw the first one play out.

Just minutes before the Bobcats kicked off to Norfolk State, ESPN3 cameras spied coach Frank Solich telling star quarterback Tyler Tettleton that he was being held out of the game for precautionary reasons. Tettleton suffered an undisclosed injury to his right side and a bruised right throwing hand against Marshall last week.

It didn't take long to learn that the Bobcats would be just fine with Tettleton wearing a ball cap and watching from the sideline.

Redshirt freshman Derrius Vick ended all intrigue by doing a fair impersonation of Tettleton by throwing for four touchdowns in Ohio's 44-10 victory over Norfolk State before 23,673 on Parents Weekend.

In many ways, the game had the look and feel of the annual Green & White spring scrimmage, only with thousands more people in attendance. It was the sixth-largest crowd in stadium history.

Even though Tettleton did not practice during the week, the coaching staff did not rule him out until he had difficulty moving during pre-game.

Vick, who is a redshirt freshman from Lincoln, Neb., was told to get ready. He completed 14 of 20 passes for 199 yards.

"I was a little nervous, but after the first play I felt all right," he said. "I knew I had a veteran offense. Every position, we're loaded. Everyone knows they have to come in and do their thing."

Vick's second completion, a 10-yard TD toss to Donte Foster on third-and-goal, was a thing of beauty. Standing confidently in the pocket, he hit Foster in stride in the right corner of the end zone. The defensive back had no chance to make a play.

Four plays before the Bobcats took a 24-0 lead, Vick again showed patience and poise by bailing out of the pocket to find tight end Derrick Roback down the middle for a 46-yard completion to the Spartans' 25-yard line.

Vick threw another touch pass for his final touchdown, a tight 13-yard spiral to Foster in the right corner of the end zone with 6:50 left in the third quarter that made it 41-0.

"We throw that play maybe 10 times in practice every day," Foster said. "Today, he was throwing it right on the money. I think he came in there with a lot of confidence. He stepped to the plate and delivered. He got to the line and executed. It didn't feel any different (from Tettleton). He threw the ball great."

Solich is 10 years removed from the University of Nebraska, where he was a player, assistant coach and head coach for 29 years, but he has contin-

ued to recruit the state.

Vick was signed out of Southeast High School, where Solich coached 11 years.

"I have a few friends (there)," Solich said, smiling. "We actually have a lot of friends in Nebraska who tip us off."

The trait Solich likes best about Vick is his composure under fire.

"He has the kind of personality you like in a quarterback," he said. "Nothing seems to bother him. He'll have a bad play and move on."

There was no panic in Vick's eyes when Solich told him he would start.

"I thought he had an excellent game," Solich said. "I don't think anyone knew what to expect. I don't think Derrius knew what to expect."

Solich said there were three options with Tettleton:

1. Hold him out.
2. Start him and see what happened.
3. Give him some snaps in the second half.

"All week he said, 'This is going to come' for me," Solich said. "He tried to do his thing in pre-game, but it didn't happen for him."

It wasn't a one-man show on offense. Tailback Beau Blankenship ran for 109 yards and a touchdown on 25 carries, and Foster caught six passes for 69 yards and two touchdowns.

The game was so one-sided that third- and fourth-team players played in the fourth quarter.

When they play against fellow Football Championship Series teams, the Spartans (2-2) are a match for most teams in the country. In 2011, they won nine games, won the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference championship and qualified for the playoffs.

Midway through the first quarter, though, it was clear Norfolk State again would be in way over its head playing against a Division I team. Last season, it lost 55-12 to West Virginia.

It has lost all five games against Division I teams dating to 2007.

The trip from Virginia was not a total loss for Norfolk State. In fact, it was a capital gain. It earned \$275,000 for the date.

Bobcats roll Spartans in Vick's first start, 44-10

Told just moments before the start that he would be starting in place of the injured Tyler Tettleton, Ohio redshirt freshman Derrius Vick admitted to having some nervousness.

But once the game started, it was clear who was overwhelmed.

And it wasn't Vick, or the Bobcats.

Ohio steamrolled visiting Norfolk State, 44-10, Saturday afternoon inside Peden Stadium. The sixth-largest crowd in stadium history, 23,673, watched as the Bobcats advanced to 4-0 for the first time since 1976.

"Having that start, we want to keep it going," said Ohio RB Beau Blankenship, who punched out his fourth-straight 100-yard game with 109 yards on 25 carries. "We have that mentality that every game we play, we want to win. We feel like we're going to win."

"We're in a good spot, we just have to keep executing."

The Bobcats followed the lead of Vick, who stepped into Tettleton's place without the offense missing a beat. Tettleton was a game-time decision, but didn't feel comfortable after going through pregame warmups. Ohio head coach Frank Solich said the team debated whether to start Tettleton or sit the junior QB; Tettleton is battling an injury on the right side of his abdomen.

"(Tettleton) went out and tried to do things in pregame. He was not able to do things in the manner that he was hoping to do it," Solich said. "That pretty much solved it for us right there."

Vick took care of things from there. He completed 14 of 20 passes for 199 yards and four touchdowns. His second pass of the day was a 10-yard touchdown toss to WR Donte Foster in the right corner of the end zone.

Vick was sharp early, and helped Ohio leap out to a 24-0 lead by the end of the first quarter.

"Knowing that you're going in, you don't want to mess up and be that guy. It was just executing and doing what I could control. That's what I was mainly focused on," Vick said.

Ohio finished with a season-low 378 yards and 68 plays. The Bobcats were just 3 of 15 on third downs. But a lot of those issues came later. The Bobcats subbed extensively early in the third quarter; Ohio led 44-0 with more than five minutes left in the third quarter.

Vick earned praise from his coach, and wideout Foster.

"It was outstanding. I think he really came in there with a lot of confidence. (Vick) really stepped up to the plate and delivered," said Foster, who finished with a team-high five catches for 69 yards and two touchdowns.

"It really didn't (feel any different). (Vick) got to the line and he executed," Foster added. "He threw the ball great."

Solich thought Vick would shine when given his chance, but now knows he has a capable backup if Tettleton is forced to sit again.

"I don't know if anybody knew quite what to expect. I don't think Derrius did," Solich said. "We do know that he has one of those personalities where he handles things very well. He doesn't get overly excited about anything. He's kind of like Tyler (Tettleton) in that regard."

"It was crucial in terms of preparing him for what may happen this year. He's got confidence right now," the coach continued. "We can spell Tyler now when we want to and feel pretty good about things."

The Spartans (2-2), an FCS program that took a \$275,000 payday to play in Athens, were out of it from the start. Norfolk State was penalized for having two players wearing the same number on the field at the same time during the opening kickoff.

It was all downhill from there. The Spartans fumbled away the ball on their first play from scrimmage, and had five turnovers overall.

Norfolk State finished with 241 total yards, but was also flagged 11 times for 96 yards.

Blankenship scored on a 24-yard pass from Vick, and on a two-yard dive in the first quarter. In between, Matt Weller booted a 49-yard field goal.

Vick dialed in a 15-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Thompson midway through the second quarter. Weller's 40-yard field goal just two seconds before halftime put Ohio up 34-0.

In the third, Foster hauled in a 13-yard touchdown pass from Vick and Weller added a 31-yard field goal.

The Bobcats never let the thought of an upset enter anyone's head.

"Anybody can win on any given day. And there's been a bunch of upsets this year with different I-AAs and Division I. You don't want to give any team life early," Ohio linebacker Keith Moore said. "It's always good to keep the gas pedal on them."

Norfolk State avoided the shutout with Randy Maynes' 7-yard score with 4:28 to go. Kicker Everett Goldberg added a 42-yard field goal with 33 seconds remaining.

The game slowed to crawl in the second half, with penalties becoming the dominant theme after Ohio pulled the first string.

"This game was kind of a tale of two halves. I thought we executed and played well in the first half. And then in the second half we really substituted early," Solich said.

Ohio begins Mid-American Conference play next week with a road trip to UMass. Start time from Gillette Stadium is set for 3:30 p.m.

Ohio Bobcats could run the table: Doug Lesmerises' college football insider

Columbus -- Twenty-seven major college football teams remain undefeated.

You can arrange them by conference: Big 12 (7); SEC (6); Pac-12 (3); Big East (3); Big Ten (3); WAC (2); ACC (1); MAC (1); and Notre Dame.

You can arrange them by state: Texas (five, Texas, Texas Tech, TCU, Baylor, Texas-San Antonio); Ohio (three, Ohio State, Ohio, Cincinnati); Florida (two, Florida State, Florida); Oregon (two, Oregon, Oregon State) and Louisiana (two, LSU, Louisiana Tech) and 13 states with one team.

Or you can arrange them by the teams most likely to keep a zero in the loss column.

And Ohio University is right at the top of that list.

This isn't the first time this opinion has been expressed -- Sports Illustrated called for the Bobcats to go undefeated in the pre-season. Ohio already has its BCS win, 24-14 over Penn State, and its close call against a rival, 27-24 over Marshall.

But considering that the Mid-American Conference won four games against BCS teams over the weekend, with Northern Illinois beating Kansas, Ball State beating South Florida, Western Michigan beating Connecticut and Central Michigan beating Iowa, the conference schedule won't be a cakewalk.

Far from it.

If the Bobcats get to 10-0, a primetime visit to Ball State on Wednesday, Nov. 14, would have a lot of eyes on it. The Cardinals already have wins over Indiana and South Florida, with their only loss to Clemson. Heck, if Ball State keeps winning, it could have a lot on the line that night.

Remember, any team in the top 12 of the final BCS standings must get a bid to a BCS game. Or, any team in the top 16 gets in if one of the automatic BCS champs is ranked below it. So, for instance, a lousy Big Ten or Big East champ could be Ohio's best friend. And typical BCS busters Boise State and Utah already are out of the picture, because the Broncos aren't very good and the Utes are now in the Pac-12.

That rule applies only to the highest-ranked non-BCS team, though. So the real problem for 4-0 Ohio could be 3-0 Louisiana Tech, which destroyed Illinois over the weekend. The Bulldogs have games left with Virginia and Texas A&M in addition to their Western Athletic Conference schedule.

The Bobcats got 40 points in the AP poll while Louisiana Tech got seven, and I ranked the Bobcats 24th on my ballot. But in the coaches poll, which counts in the BCS standings, Louisiana Tech has a 28-13 lead in points.

Of course, some coaches may have gotten Louisiana Tech confused with LSU, because the coaches have proven a lot of them fill out their ballots blindfolded.

The previous MAC team to really challenge for a BCS berth was Ball State in 2008. The Cardinals got as high as No. 12 in the BCS standings that season before losing to Buffalo in the MAC championship. In 2003, after losing to Iowa to open the season, Miami of Ohio finished No. 11 in the final BCS standings when the rules to qualify for BCS games weren't the same.

I think an undefeated Ohio team would wind up between No. 10 and No. 15 in the final BCS standings, but every shred of credit the MAC can gain from these nonconference wins helps. The Bobcats could get higher. But the top 12 would be all that's needed.

Around the rest of the undefeated teams, Ohio State has too many flaws to make a 12-0 run, even in the even more flawed Big Ten. The Southeastern Conference champ always has a chance to go without a loss, but I think Alabama will get a test from some team in the SEC East in the conference championship game.

Florida State, after pulling away from Clemson, has a good shot in the Atlantic Coast Conference, while the Big 12 has seven of its 10 teams without a loss, but it may have too much depth, and no truly elite team, to allow one program to emerge unscathed.

If Oregon and Alabama, or Florida State and Alabama, wind up in an undefeated matchup for the national title, it won't be a shock.

But remember that keeping that zero isn't easy. Though five teams finished the regular season undefeated in 2009, and three in 2010, LSU was the only team to do it through the regular season a year ago.

If there's just one team that does it this season, it just might be Ohio.

Tettleton's status uncertain for UMass

Most of the time, Tyler Tettleton is in total agreement with his head coach.

On Monday, however, his opinion differed — slightly — with that of Bobcat coach Frank Solich.

Ohio (4-0), off to its first 4-0 start in 36 years, will travel to Foxborough, Mass. for a 3:30 p.m. start against UMass (0-4) inside Gillette Stadium. During both his weekly appearance on the Mid-American Conference conference call and his own weekly local press conference, Solich indicated Tettleton would be questionable to make the start.

Tettleton, who had made 17 straight starts at QB for Ohio, sat out Saturday's win over Norfolk State with an undisclosed abdomen injury. It was topic No. 1 for Solich during all his media appearances on Monday.

Solich said Tettleton would sit out practices Monday and Tuesday, and then would attempt to get in some throws during Wednesday's practice. At that point, Solich said, a decision would likely be made.

"If he's to be ready enough to play, he has to get practicing by mid-week," Solich said on the conference call.

Tettleton suffered the abdomen injury on Sept. 8 against New Mexico State. He played through it in Ohio's win on Sept. 15 at Marshall, but was at decidedly less than 100 percent by the end of that game thanks to the injury and a bruised throwing hand he suffered against the Herd.

Tettleton differed with Solich on Monday about one thing. He said there's nothing questionable about him being ready to play Saturday. Asked to gauge how sure he was about being able to play, Tettleton didn't hesitate.

"I'm pretty confident," he said.

So, like 70 percent sure, 80 percent sure?

"Probably more like 100 percent sure," Tettleton replied. "I'm ready to get back, ready to get going."

Even if Tettleton is cleared to play, Solich didn't rule out the notion about possibly continuing to play backup Derrius Vick. Vick, a redshirt freshman, threw for 199 yards and four touchdowns as the starter on Saturday. There's no QB controversy, but finding spots to get Vick more time is something Ohio will mull over.

"Tyler has won so consistently for us and is such an experienced and really good quarterback that when he's operating at a high level it's tough to say 'OK, go sit on the bench for a couple series. We're going to try something else.' So you keep going with him," Solich explained.

"But, there may be times when it makes sense to utilize Derrius in some games. That will be something we'll look at game-by-game."

Depth tested

Ohio has more than Tettleton to keep an eye on this week. The Bobcats' depth will be tested at several spots.

For example, Ohio could be without a single healthy option among its opening day starting trio at wide receiver. Mario Dovell (leg) is already lost for the season, and Solich said on Monday that senior WR Tyler Futrell (shoulder) will miss Saturday's game at UMass. The third starter, junior Donte Foster, is playing with a damaged thumb.

There's more. The offensive line is looking at as many as four players missing this weekend. Backups Mike McQueen (ankle) and Matt Prichard (knee) will be out this week, and could miss several more games. Starting guards Eric Herman (back) and Vince Carlotta (neck) both missed practice Monday and will be watched closely this week.

Also out this week will be DE Tremayne Scott (foot), and RB Ryan Boykin (hamstring) is questionable.

Ohio has tried to build depth, and that's being tested now, Solich said.

"You have to have depth, and our depth is coming into play now," the coach said. "We've lost some really top-line players, a lot of them on the defensive end of it."

"I think we've built the depth within our program to give us a chance," Solich added. "At some point in time it has to level off and it has to stop, in terms of injuries."

Polling data

The Bobcats enjoyed their best week of the season, in terms of points gained, in both major national Top 25 polls this week.

In the Associated Press Top 25, Ohio checked in at No. 29 overall — the same rank the Bobcats held a week ago. However, Ohio picked up 40 points and appeared on 13 voter ballots this week. The 'Cats received 20 points and were on 11 ballots last week.

In the USA Today/Coaches Poll, Ohio was listed 37th overall with 13 points. The Bobcats jumped five spots, and more than doubled its point total from the prior week. After week 3, Ohio was tied for 42nd in the poll with just five points.

Solich said he's not concerned with his team's standing in any of the opinion polls, though he did acknowledge he's aware of Ohio's standing.

"It's brought to my attention. I do not look it up. I view it as nothing really at this point," Solich said.

"Obviously that would be an important step for our program to be able to get that done, to break into the Top 25," he added. "But, you know, that shouldn't happen right now. It'll possibly happen if we really take care of business. Again, that's just looking too far ahead for us."

Ohio relying on deep roster to weather slew of injuries

Injuries are a concern for every football team in every season.

The Bobcats, unsurprisingly, are dealing with more than their fair share currently. The hope is that the depth forged in the program over the past few years helps Ohio navigate some thinning ranks at a number of positions.

Depth was one of Frank Solich's primary concerns when he came to Athens eight years ago. He said it's one of the major keys to fielding a consistent winner.

"In order to do that, you have to have good athletes. You have to have depth, and our depth is coming into play right now," he said. "We've lost some really top-line players, a lot of them on the defensive end of it."

"To be able to overcome that you have to have depth within your program," he added. "I think we've built the depth within our program to give us a chance."

Ohio (4-0) will get another chance to show off that depth Saturday when the Bobcats travel to Foxborough, Mass. for their Mid-American Conference opener against UMass (0-4). On Tuesday, for example, Ohio had upwards of 18 scholarship players out of action for practice.

"It's a tough deal right now," said Ohio offensive coordinator Tim Albin.

The Bobcats have four, potentially five, front-line players already out for the season. Cornerbacks Travis Carrie and Jamil Shaw, both projected starters, played a combined eight snaps; both are done for the year because of shoulder injuries. Wide receivers Sebastian Smith (broken leg, fall camp) and Mario Dovell (broken leg, at Penn State) are also on the shelf until next season. Offensive guard Sam Johnson went down Tuesday with a broken ankle.

In addition to Dovell and Smith, wideouts Tyler Futrell (shoulder) and Landon Smith (neck) are doubtful for Saturday. It's stretched what was thought to be a deep position group to nearly razor-thin status.

"When we first came out we looked like we had a whole lot of depth at wide receiver. As guys go down, other guys have to step up," said junior Donte Foster.

Foster is Ohio's leading receiver, and should play, but even he isn't 100 percent. He's played the last two games with a damaged thumb; Foster suffered ligament damage in the digit in practice prior to the Marshall game on Sept. 15.

Thanks to a plastic sleeve that prevents the thumb from moving in a certain direction Foster is able to play. But, there are sacrifices too. Foster isn't supposed to catch any balls in practice.

"It's been pretty difficult," Foster explained. "Coach Solich told me not to catch the ball (in practice), told me to just run the routes. You have to fight that urge to go after the ball when it's coming at you."

Foster concentrates on one-handed catches with his fully healthy hand in practice. The one-armed approach won't work for junior defensive end Nic Barber. Barber missed all of fall camp and the first two games of the

season with a shoulder injury.

Since his return, at Marshall, Barber has garnered four tackles and 1.5 sacks in two games -- and become a starter. Barber is playing with the first team because regular starter Tremayne Scott is out for a few weeks as a result of a foot injury.

Barber said the season is at the point where most guys are fighting through some sort of injury. He's fresher than most, but it's what football is all about. The next guy in line has to step up.

"We're all banged up man. Neal (Huynh) has about six ice bags on him after every day," Barber said with a laugh. "It's hard not having Tremayne right now. He's a big part of our defense."

"But it's our job to step up and fill in," he added. "That's what you do."

Even the quarterback position hasn't been immune this season. Starter Tyler Tettleton missed the game last week with Norfolk State, and is questionable for the MAC opener. His replacement, redshirt freshman Derrius Vick shined in his debut as a starter on Saturday however. Vick tied an Ohio record, set by Cleve Bryant in 1968, with four touchdown passes against the Spartans.

Like the others, Vick said injuries happen. What matters is how the team rallies after one occurs, and can the next player in line do the job they're asked to do. So far, the Bobcats have met that challenge.

"This team, this year, just clicks," he said. "Whoever has been in, we've found a way to get things done."

Even the injured -- besides their own personal rehab -- have been doing their part. Carrie, for instance, has been a fixture at most practices and has tried to do his part to get Ohio's young corners up to speed. The fifth-year cornerback has been at every game so far, and takes his role as a team captain seriously.

Carrie may be hurt, but still a part of what the Bobcats are doing on game day. That's not always the case as most players find it hard to be around the action when they're unable to play.

"Travis has been great. He's still a vital member of the Unity Council. He's working directly with the corners," Solich said. "It's been great to see him want to contribute in any way that he can to help this football team. That just tells you about him, what kind of person he is and his attitude."

That 'team' attitude is something Solich hopes will help his team through this tough stretch of injuries. But even the coach acknowledges that at some point the Bobcats' luck in that regard has to change.

"It has to level off and it has to stop, in terms of the injuries," he said.

Football: Ohio will remain humble in game against Massachusetts

When asked about his status for Saturday's game against Massachusetts, redshirt junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton's response was simple: He plans to be under center when the offense trots out onto the field at Gillette Stadium.

Whether Ohio coach Frank Solich will play his battered signal caller will likely not be known until the familiar No. 4 or the new No. 15 of redshirt freshman quarterback Derrius Vick enters the offensive huddle.

"(I'm) feeling better and ready for Saturday," Tettleton said. "It was a good week to sit out (against Norfolk State). Derrius did a great job filling in and getting us the win, especially for his first career start ... (I'm) just anxious and ready to get back this week."

Solich has noted Tettleton's competitiveness time and time again, but said that if there's a time to limit his action, it's this week against UMass, which is the worst in the Mid-American Conference in three of the four major offensive categories. The Minutemen are the penultimate team in rushing yards per game, averaging a pedestrian 113 yards.

UMass graduate student Michael Cox, who has run for 301 yards this season, leads the Minutemen's rushing attack. He ran for a season-best 188 yards and two touchdowns in last week's loss to Miami — UMass' first-ever MAC game.

The Minutemen's imperfect start could be attributed to a quarterback situation that is far from ideal.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Mike Wegzyn was thrust into the starting role when redshirt junior Kellen Pagel was sidelined indefinitely with post-concussion symptoms in August. Although Wegzyn has not thrown a touchdown pass this season, he has completed little more than half his passes and averages only 18 more yards through the air than Ohio redshirt junior running back Beau Blankenship does on the ground, Solich said any quarterback could be a threat against the Bobcats' embattled secondary.

"Their quarterback really can throw the ball; he'll try to pinpoint passes (and) he's not afraid to let the ball go," Solich said. "You're going to have to try to get some pressure on him to throw a few up (for grabs)."

UMass has lost to two teams that were beaten by MAC schools and also lost to Michigan lopsidedly, but Solich said they could benefit from a different environment Saturday at home.

"They've only played one game at home; I'm sure they'll be anxious to get home," Solich said. "Statistically it doesn't match up to the kind of football team I believe they are when you turn on the film."

Even though the Bobcats' record is the exact opposite of the Minutemen, the Bobcats will stick with their season mantra of not taking anything for granted when they step on the field Saturday.

"We throw the previous games out the window," Solich said. "The MAC will be a conference that every week you are going to have to play really well to get it done and I believe that's this one."

UMass faces an Ohio team that's on the map now

Ohio University's football team should not to be confused with, compared with, or even mentioned in the same breath with Ohio State University. The teams' expectations and histories diverged a century ago, and Ohio is not contemplating a challenge to the Buckeyes for state supremacy.

But this season, both teams are off to 4-0 starts. And Ohio started the season with a 24-14 victory at Penn State.

"We're not at the level of their program by any stretch of the imagination," said Ohio coach Frank Solich. "No school in the MAC is. But that doesn't mean we can't make strides to elevate our program."

"That is what everyone is trying to do in the MAC. That's why you see the MAC getting better and better, why you see MAC schools lining up and beating teams. The conference is being elevated. Ohio State is dominant in the state, but there are a lot of good programs in Ohio."

The University of Massachusetts is getting an up-close look at those programs. The Minutemen lost to Miami of Ohio, 27-16, in their Mid-American Conference opener last week, and this Saturday they will meet Ohio at Gillette Stadium.

Ohio's ambitions have increased since Solich arrived in 2005. The Bobcats had four successive losing seasons from 2001-04 and went for a fifth in Solich's first year.

But in 2006, Ohio went 9-5, taking the MAC East championship — the first time it finished first in the conference since 1968 — and advancing to the GMAC Bowl. That was followed by 6-6 and 4-8 records.

Since 2009, Ohio has been winning regularly, advancing to three straight bowl games with records of 9-5, 8-5, and 10-4.

And Ohio has even been taking the field against Ohio State. The teams did not face each other from 1902 through 1999, except for a 1918 contest involving the Ohio State freshman team (listed as a 13-6 win for Ohio). Ohio State has won the two recent confrontations with the Bobcats, by scores of 26-14 in 2008 and 43-7 in 2010.

But the Bobcats know their place and they have become dominant there, winning the MAC East championship last year and compiling a 19-5 conference record over the last three seasons.

"We know what the MAC is all about," Solich said. "UMass is a great fit for our conference, and we expect a great ballgame."

"In terms of competition, you've got to be ready to play every week, and if you're not, you're not going to win. Our mind-set is to really prepare well, play well, and see what else transpires."

"UMass is well-coached. We've seen them on film and they have been impressive. They have played a tough schedule: three BCS schools, on the road against Miami, all their games away except one."

"I'm sure they'll be anxious to be get back on their home field. And we see it as a huge challenge and hope to play well."

"They've been up against very physical, talented teams. Coming off those games, obviously, if you don't sustain a lot of injuries, you can benefit. Even though the record may not show it, a team can benefit from those types of games and those experiences."

Among Ohio's few question marks has been the quarterback position. Starter Tyler Tettleton, son of former major league catcher Mickey Tettleton, missed the Bobcats' 44-10 win over Norfolk State last week with an undisclosed injury and his status has not been determined for Saturday.

Derrius Vick, a redshirt freshman, made his first start and went 14 for 20 with four touchdown passes against Norfolk State.

Solich said Tettleton participated in practice Wednesday and will likely be a game-time decision.

Part of Ohio's success can be traced to offensive precision. Tettleton was 66 for 99 without an interception in the opening three contests. The Bobcats' only turnovers have been two fumbles.

And much of the credit for the low turnover total goes to the quarterback.

"We utilize him in the running and passing game," Solich said of Tettleton. "Some plays are called for him, there are some reads for him. He handles the ball in both the running and passing game. He's a guy who can scramble and make plays when plays break down and protection breaks down, and that's the kind of quarterback that's best for us and fits what we want to do."

"We have not made changes [for Vick]. He's been running the offense in the spring camp and fall, all the practices this season. And now, he has a full game under his belt. We prepare the same with him or Tyler — no difference with one in or the other. He's expected to have the same number of plays, the same style of plays. They are similar in ability."

Tettleton passed for 3,302 yards and 28 touchdowns, plus running for 10 scores, last season. In the opener against Penn State, Tettleton rallied Ohio from a 14-3 halftime deficit, passing for two touchdowns and running for one in the second half. Tettleton went 31 of 41 for 324 yards passing in the game.

"That was a huge win for us in terms of our program, of taking steps with our program," Solich said. "When the coaches arrived here [eight] years ago, Ohio was not winning. And now we're on ESPN a lot with the contract with our conference, and being seen around the country by recruits and alumni."

Bobcats cut it close in road win against UMass

Fireworks lit up the sky above Gillette Stadium after Ohio's 37-34 triumph against Massachusetts on Saturday, but both teams saw explosiveness on the field long before the game ended.

The Bobcats entered the game as heavy favorites against a winless Minutemen team that was averaging less than nine points per contest, but they were forced to scrape by to maintain their unblemished record (5-0, 1-0 Mid-American Conference).

UMass has seen marked improvement from week to week this season. In their inaugural Football Bowl Subdivision game, they were shut out and scored only a combined 20 points in their next two games.

UMass' defense had its struggles as well, most of which were a product of Ohio redshirt runningback Beau Blankenship's career-best offensive performance.

Blankenship tied the school record for carries in a single game (43) and the third-most rushing yards in a single game (269). He also chipped in two rushing touchdowns.

Ohio redshirt junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton made it clear he was not operating at 100 percent during the game, and Solich said after the game that Ohio's offense was limited because of the opposing defense's ability to key in on one aspect of the Bobcats' attack. However, the Minutemen were far from successful in containing Blankenship, who seemingly willed his way to an Ohio win.

"I'm just thankful to have (the) players I have around me. The offensive line did a great job opening up holes and receivers did a great job blocking downfield," Blankenship said. "I am just thankful we came out and got the win."

The Minutemen's offense was much more successful, though, stringing together 511 yards of offense — 40 yards more than its next-best showing and eight more than its opponents.

UMass redshirt freshman quarterback Mike Wegzyn did not have a passing touchdown heading into Saturday's game, but walked away with four against Ohio, as he took advantage of Ohio's depleted secondary. He converted 10 of 19 third-down opportunities, while braving Ohio's offensive line, which was in his face from start to finish.

UMass coach Charley Molnar said the Minutemen took a step in the right direction Saturday, but will have to draw upon more of the same to see success in the MAC.

"I tell the guys, 'You are a resilient bunch of guys and you have been knocked on the canvas already and you keep getting back up,'" he said. "That, I love about our group of guys."

Ohio relished the challenge of facing a new MAC opponent, which turned out to be much more stiff of a test than most anticipated heading into the game.

"They're going to be good here (in the MAC) in a couple of years," Tettleton said. "It's a good young team to go against and I'm excited we could come here to Gillette Stadium and get the win."

Sunk by Blankenship

FOXBORO — How close? Try thisclose.

Heavy underdog UMass gave Ohio University everything it could handle before succumbing, 37-34, in a hard-fought game played before a Gillette Stadium crowd of 8,321 yesterday. The loss kept UMass winless while Ohio moved out to a 5-0 start for the first time since the 1968 season.

UMass had no answer for Ohio tailback Beau Blankenship. The transfer from Iowa State carried the ball 44 times for 269 yards and two touchdowns. It marked the first time an opponent had rushed for over 200 yards against UMass since James Madison quarterback Rodney Landers did it in 2008.

UMass quarterback Mike Wegzyn had a stellar game, completing 27 of 51 passes for 373 yards and four touchdowns. UMass receivers Deion Walker (11 catches, 162 yards, TD) and Alan Williams (7-127, 3 TDs) also had career days.

UMass (0-5, 0-2 MAC) won the coin toss and deferred to the second half. The Minutemen defense forced Ohio to punt and Grant Venham uncorked a 55-yarder that backed UMass to its own 18.

The Minutemen produced a 12-play, 82-yard drive and took the lead on a 27-yard aerial from quarterback Wegzyn to Williams. With the score, UMass had a 7-0 lead — its first advantage of the season.

Ohio (5-0, 1-0 MAC) responded with quarterback Tyler Tettleton, the son of former major league catcher Mickey Tettleton, engineering a 16-play, 73-yard march, which culminated in a 27-yard field goal by Matt Weller with 4:26 left in the opening stanza.

UMass tacked on a 30-yard field goal by freshman Blake Lucas on its next possession to make it a 10-3 spread with 1:54 left in the quarter. The drive featured a Wegzyn 17-yard completion to Walker and a 30-yard rush by tailback Michael Cox.

Blankenship carried the ball five times during a 13-play, 70-yard drive before the Bobcats settled for a 24-yard field goal by Weller. That cut the deficit to 10-6 with 11:47 left before halftime.

The Bobcats made UMass punt and turned the ball over to the durable Blankenship, who gained 72 of 79 offensive yards on an eight-play Ohio drive. It finished with Tettleton finding tight end Troy Hill on a 1-yard scoring catch with 5:40 to go in the second to give Ohio its first lead of the day, 13-10.

Blankenship had 20 carries for 137 yards to that point, his fifth consecutive 100-yard rushing effort this season.

UMass, displaying great resiliency, and regained the lead at 17-13 when Wegzyn and Williams teamed up for a 50-yard scoring play.

The Bobcats kept their composure and put together a seven-play package in the closing two minutes of the first half and went back in front, 20-17, before intermission. Tettleton hit receiver Chase Cochran for a 41-yard score after UMass defender Antoine Tharpe missed on a leaping interception bid near the 15-yard line.

The Minutemen compiled 248 total offense yards and were successful on 7-of-10 third-down conversions while Ohio had 315 yards of offense while converting 7-of-11 on third-down chances in the opening half.

UMass went ahead on the opening possession of the third quarter, traveling 81 yards in 12 plays that consumed 4:06. Wegzyn tossed a 26-yard pass to Walker — the quarterback's career-best third TD pass and UMass was celebrating a 24-20 lead. On its next possession, Cox was hit by Corey Hastings and fumbled. Lorenzo Fisher picked up the football and returned 13 yards to the UMass 14.

Tharpe rushed in from the left to block a 33-yard field goal attempt by Weller with 9:06 left in the third. The Minutemen capitalized on the momentum-changer to drive to the Ohio 1 in 13 plays where the march stalled. Lucas came on to boot a 23-yard field goal and the UMass margin was seven points.



Blankenship no worse for wear

Two days after tying a single-game Ohio record with 43 rushing attempts, Bobcat running back Beau Blankenship wasn't hobbled, gimpy or encased in protective wraps and ice.

Besides a thigh bruise, Ohio's burly, bowling-ball back said he couldn't feel better.

"Honestly I didn't feel too bad afterward I just have a few bruises here and there. Just the normal soreness," Blankenship said after Ohio's Monday practice at Peden Stadium.

"I really feel pretty good."

The junior from Norman, Oklahoma and the Bobcats as a whole both have plenty of reason to feel good. Ohio (5-0, 1-0 Mid-American Conference) remains undefeated and Blankenship is on a record-setting pace for production for a Bobcat rusher. He exploded for 269 yards on 43 carries in Ohio's win at UMass on Saturday.

Five weeks into the season, Blankenship leads the MAC and is second nationally with 757 rushing yards; he's already more than halfway to the Ohio single-season record of 1,434 yards (Kalvin McRae, 2007).

Blankenship, third in the nation with a tic more than 150 rushing yards per game, has been steady. He's second nationally with a whopping 156 attempts already this season. The Ohio single-season record there is 294 (McRae, 2007).

Blankenship's toughness, durability and dependability allow Ohio head coach Frank Solich to not feel guilty as he racks up carry after carry. Every running back wants the ball, but Blankenship is able to handle it.

"It's not rare to find players (who want the ball)," Solich said. "It's rare for them to be able to hold up and do it."

Blankenship is aware of his statistical standing thanks to friends and teammates. It's rewarding to be productive, he said, but the team's success remains the primary goal.

"Maybe a little bit," he said when asked if he feels vindicated with his recent success. "I just feel blessed to be in the position to get those yards. I always try to play with a chip on my shoulder. I'm not too worried about the stats or anything."

Solich is a tad concerned for his running back's long-term durability however. The coach said Monday that junior RB Ryan Boykin may be at 100 percent on Saturday and, if so, could be used to spell Blankenship. Boykin has battled a hamstring issue all season.

How much relief Blankenship gets remains to be seen, and if Ohio has to continue to lean on him, well, Solich is OK with that too.

"Everybody wants it. I've not known a running back that doesn't want a 100 carries in a game. But, they can't hold up health-wise in most cases in game after game after game of that."

"(Blankenship) seems to be able to be a guy who can do that," Solich said.

Roster notes

Blankenship may feel fine, but the same can't be said for the entirety of

Ohio's roster.

WR Tyler Futrell (shoulder) will miss his second straight game this week, while DE Tremayne Scott (foot) will sit for a third straight contest.

Backup offensive lineman Matt Prichard (knee) may be done for the season. Backup offensive tackle Mike McQueen (foot) is out of his walking boot but will still be sidelined, Solich said Monday.

Safety Thad Ingol (hamstring) is doubtful for the Buffalo game.

And there are several key questionables in the mix as well. DT Carl Jones got encouraging results from an MRI, Solich said, and may still suit up against UB. Starting FS Gerald Moore and MLB Keith Moore will miss practice time this week, but Solich did not rule either out as of Monday. The injuries to all three are undisclosed and happened during the game Saturday.

There is some good news, however. Boykin and QB Tyler Tettleton may both be at 100 percent by Saturday, the coach said. In addition, WR Landon Smith (neck) was able to return to practice Monday. Offensive guards Vince Carlotta and Eric Herman appear to be ready to go as well after some minor injuries last week.

Polling data

Ohio's win at Massachusetts didn't help the Bobcats in either of the major national polls.

The Bobcats remain one of just four teams outside of the power conferences who are still undefeated; Notre Dame, Louisiana Tech and UT-San Antonio are the others.

Ohio checked in at 34th overall in the latest Associated Press Top 25 Poll, and received 30 points. The Bobcats were 29th, with 40 points, in the Sept. 21 poll.

In the USA Today/Coaches Poll, Ohio was tied for 34th (with Michigan) this week with 11 points. The 'Cats also received 11 points in the Coaches' poll on Sept. 21.

The MAC has six coaches vote in the weekly coaches poll, including Solich. Other MAC voters include Pete Lembo (Ball State), Terry Bowden (Akron), Dave Doeren (Northern Illinois), Darrell Hazell (Kent State) and Matt Campbell (Toledo).

Not good enough

Blankenship had a monster game at UMass, but it wasn't enough to win MAC East Offensive Player of the Week honors. But he shouldn't feel bad; the winner made NCAA history.

Miami quarterback Zac Dysert won the MAC East player of the week honor. The senior set a MAC record for total offense (624 yards) in a single game, and became the first NCAA player in history to throw for more than 500 yards in a single game, while also rushing for more than 100 yards. Dysert, for good measure, set a school record with six touchdown passes.

Ohio DE Hasting honors wounded brother

ATHENS, Ohio — On the day his brother was shot 10 times in Afghanistan, Ohio University defensive end Corey Hasting went to football practice.

That's actually about the fifth or sixth thing he did. Hasting knows the timeline better now, now that the mix of fear and sadness and sickness he initially felt are gone. After a series of the toughest phone calls and text messages he could ever imagine, he found himself alone in his room, alone with a million thoughts.

That's when he knew he needed to go to what was Ohio University's final spring practice of 2011.

"I couldn't be with my family," Hasting said. "But football, that's where my other family was. I needed them."

Scotty Hasting was an Army platoon leader in Afghanistan. On April 21, 2011, Scotty and another soldier entered a hut in a small village, metal detectors in hand. They were looking for Taliban soldiers they knew were in the area.

It was a setup.

Scotty Hasting took bullets in the shoulder, hip and leg. The bulletproof vest he was wearing prevented him from taking more and might have saved his life.

He was rescued, rushed to a local hospital, then life-flighted to a military hospital in Germany. Because his platoon had been in a "black period," it had been longer than usual since Scotty had talked to his family. In the hours after the shooting, his family knew very little about his condition.

At about 11:30 a.m. ET that morning, Corey got a text from his mother asking to give her a call. He replied that he was in class and would call her later. She demanded that he leave class and call immediately.

"I just knew," Corey said. "She was hysterical."

A little more than three frantic hours passed before anyone was able to reach his father, and Corey said sharing the news with his father was "one of the hardest things I ever did."

It was after that call that Corey felt very alone, sitting in his room thinking about all the games and all the wrestling matches and all the conversations he ever had with Scotty, who's about two-and-a-half years his elder. It was all the wondering and mind-wandering that led Corey to get in his truck and go to practice.

"Football has always been my thing," Corey said. "I knew if I just sat in my room that night I'd drive myself crazy."

Four days after the shooting, Scotty Hasting's family met him at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Bethesda, Md. Corey said he can't shake the image there of his brother "all drugged up, in body vacs to treat his wounds, couldn't move his arms or legs."

The whole family was there, but only Corey was in the room when Scotty took his first steps. The doctor on duty didn't see it coming, but Scotty was determined to get himself to the restroom.

So, he stood up and walked there.

"My family is the reason I got up and walked," Scotty said. "I've had amazing support. It's been incredibly hard, but I never planned on doing anything but pushing myself through it."

The timeline goes like this: Scotty and Cara Hasting got married on Dec. 30, 2010. A little less than four months later, Scotty was shot. In June 2011, after three years as a walk-on, Corey Hasting was put on full scholarship by Ohio University. In November 2011, Scotty was released from Walter Reed.

In April 2012, Scotty and Cara welcomed their second child.

Scotty Hasting is now back at Fort Riley in Kansas, working jobs he's able to work and "constantly" undergoing physical therapy for his leg and hand injuries. He's also a full-time fan of the Ohio University football team.

If an Ohio game broadcast is available via the Internet, Scotty finds a way to see it. When the Bobcats are on TV, Scotty doesn't miss a play.

Last October, Scotty was there when Corey and Ohio University played at Rutgers.

With Ohio at 5-0 this season, there are some really big games ahead.

"Corey is tearing it up this year," Scotty said. "I couldn't be prouder."

Scotty worries that he won't be employable in the short term when his military commitment ends. He sees things now in the bigger picture, though, and he believes he'll eventually be fine.

"He's handled it so well," Corey said. "He's open about it. He's given speeches about it. He understands it could have been a lot worse. As terrible as this is, he's turned it into a positive."

"It's crazy. Gives me chills."

Corey said he's learned to appreciate "all the little things in life" a little more than he used to. He says he no longer lets a bad day or bad play on the football field get to him, and he often wears his brother's military dog tags around his neck. He also has a necklace Scotty gave him before he went to Afghanistan.

They played "everything" together growing up. Corey said Scotty was the baseball player of the family, and Scotty said he knew Corey would "make it" as a football player long before he starred at Milford High School near Cincinnati.

Corey Hasting has 21 tackles, 1.5 sacks and 3.5 tackles for loss so far in his final football season. But the stat that means the most to him is that he's five-for-five in writing the words "4Him" in Scotty's honor on his cleats before each game.

"That," Scotty said, "means the world to me."



Bobcats look to survive Mack attack

Queried around lunch time on Monday, Ohio football coach Frank Solich admitted he wasn't entirely familiar with all the ins and outs of the Buffalo football roster.

But prior experience already told him everything he needed to know about one particular Bull.

Buffalo junior linebacker Khalil Mack was already on radar for Solich and the Bobcats, and for every team on the Bulls' schedule. The 6-foot-3, 245-pounder is a terror off the edge and has distinguished himself with two solid collegiate seasons.

This year, Mack has elevated his game to another level. He'll be a primary concern for the Ohio offense when the Bulls invade Peden Stadium for a 12 p.m. kick-off on Saturday.

"Yeah, yeah, we've seen him the last couple of years," Solich said, sounding just a touch like someone discussing an old nemesis.

And with good reason. Mack is averaging 8 tackles, 3.7 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks per game this season. He was suspended for Buffalo's opener, and since then has been a thorn in the side of every offense the Bulls have faced. Mack leads all of Football Bowl Subdivision football in tackles for loss per game, and is tied for second nationally with 1.5 sacks per contest.

Built like a Lawrence Taylor clone, Mack is a walking turnover creator. He's set a Buffalo record with eight career forced fumbles. He finds opposing ball-carriers before they can leave their own backfield, and cuts down on a quarterback's ability to check to a second or third read.

And as Solich indicated, the Bobcats are well aware of the potential havoc Mack can inflict. In two career games against Ohio, Mack has 12 tackles, 1.5 sacks and 3.5 tackles for loss. In addition, he's forced a pair of fumbles on the Bobcats — including a big one in the Bulls' 38-37 win over Ohio last season.

Unlike then however, Ohio won't always know where Mack lines up. Mack was limited in his alignment in 2011; now he's being put in a variety of positions on the defensive side of the ball.

"They use him a little differently this year," Solich explained. "Last year, they were operating more out of a 4-3 front with him as a rush end."

"Now he's an outside (line)backer. At times he's up on the line of scrimmage where he can rush," he added. "They're utilizing him in a lot of ways this year."

And Mack, the current MAC East Defensive Player of the Week, isn't the only weapon in the Bulls' defensive arsenal. Junior defensive lineman Colby Way (6-4, 276) has posted 4.0 sacks this season, for instance. As a team, Buffalo leads the MAC in tackles for loss and sacks — the Bulls are fourth in the nation with 4.25 sacks per game.

"Those are two huge categories," Solich said.

Ohio handled the pressure well enough to put up 37 points on the Bulls last season, but Mack came up with the big play at the end. His sack and forced fumble preserved the Bulls' one-point lead in the final minute.

Establishing the running game will be critical, said Ohio quarterback

Tyler Tettleton. Tettleton said Mack and his cohorts left an impression last year.

"With Mack and (Steven) Means and Way, those guys are special. The only thing you can do is slow them down," he said. "With the guys up front, I feel like we have a good enough (offensive) line to do that."

"And getting the run going will help," Tettleton added. "Any time you can be balanced like that, and set up one or the other, it's always going to help."

Buffalo is getting impact plays defensively, but not turnovers. The Bulls have picked up one interception and no fumble recoveries this season; UB is -6 in turnover ratio and tied for last place in the MAC in the category.

And right now, the Bulls' offense hasn't been good enough to overcome that. Junior quarterback Alex Zordich is completing just 48 percent of his passes this season, and has four interceptions in his last two games. WR Alex Neutz leads the conference with six touchdown receptions, but hasn't been much of a factor of late.

Buffalo coach Jeff Quinn said Zordich will remain the starter this week, but if the offensive struggles continue then redshirt freshman Joe Licata may be called on.

Buffalo is also expected to play without starting fullback Boomer Brock this Saturday, and flanker Fred Lee has also been pronounced out.

However, Quinn is hopeful that RB Branden Oliver can return. Oliver is averaging 6.0 yards per carry, and has 426 yards in essentially two-and-a-half games this season. He's been out of action since suffering a leg injury on Sept. 19 in a loss to Kent State.

Oliver piled up 179 yards and three touchdowns in the Bulls' win over Ohio last season.

Solich, on Monday, wasn't sure of what to make of Oliver's backups but said it wouldn't change what the Bulls are about. Like its defense, the Buffalo offense will play physical football and try to own the line of scrimmage.

"I guess I can't give you that answer, but I know their philosophy," Solich said in answering the question about the Bulls' backup runners. "They got 300-pound linemen. They want big running backs, and strong running backs and tough running backs. (Quinn) is a very physical coach. They got a physical football team."



Ohio hopes to regain defensive edge against Buffalo

The Bobcats say they didn't learn a lesson in last week's closer-than-expected victory at the University of Massachusetts. After all, they already knew it.

"In the MAC, you have to come to play each and every week," junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton said.

If last Saturday's refresher course/scare against the Minutemen wasn't enough, today's opponent -- the Buffalo Bulls -- would be glad to offer Ohio another dose of reality.

The Bobcats (5-0, 1-0 Mid-American Conference) may be undefeated, but they'll be extra cautious against the Bulls (1-3, 0-1 MAC). After the near catastrophe in Foxborough, Ohio faces a team that beat them a year ago.

The Bulls clipped Ohio, 38-37, in Amherst, N.Y., in a game that head coach Frank Solich still has fresh in his mind. But it isn't revenge that will be trying the Bobcats today, it will be the desire to avoid what happened a year ago.

"We just look at trying to get football games won week after week. We look at things in terms of we pretty much got beat across the board," Solich said. "But we lost the turnover battle. We lost the sack battle. We lost the big and explosive play battle. We lost the red zone battle. And we lost the third down conversion battle. That's losing a lot of battles."

"We want to do much better than that."

Like a year ago, Ohio enters the game with injuries presenting a major hurdle. In 2011, Ohio was without, or lost during the game, a total of five defensive starters. The Bobcats today will be without starting defensive end Tremayne Scott, and could have three other starters -- DT Carl Jones, MLB Keith Moore and FS Gerald Moore -- sit out or playing a limited role because of more injuries.

There's nothing to do but deal with the circumstances given, senior DE Corey Hasting said.

"Next man up. Football is a weird game, you never know who is going to go down or what is going to happen," he said. "But everybody has to be ready to play. Young guys included."

"If it happens, it happens. We just have to be ready to overcome adversity as a team."

The Bulls have their own issues. QB Alex Zordich has been athletic (198 rushing yards, 5.2 yards per attempt), but inaccurate (48.5 percent completion rate). Zordich has four interceptions in his last two games alone.

Fullback Boomer Brock is expected to miss the game, as is flanker Fred Lee. WR Alex Nuetz has half the team's rushing yards and leads the MAC with six touchdown catches.

The Bulls' best weapon, RB Branden Oliver, is a question mark. He missed the Bulls' loss last weekend at Connecticut with a leg injury, but terrorized Ohio in 2011 with 179 rushing yards and three touchdowns.

Oliver has 426 yards this season in 2.5 games, while Ohio leads the MAC in rush defense by giving up just 94.0 yards per game and 3.3 yards per carry.

It's unknown whether Oliver will play, but Solich said UB's basic method of attack will not.

"Every team in the MAC, I think has an identity. And theirs is toughness. They like to run the ball from the offensive standpoint," the coach said. "They got 300-pound linemen. They want big running backs, and strong running backs and tough running backs. He's a very physical coach. They got a physical football team."

And should Ohio handle the run game, the focus will turn to the secondary; the Bobcats gave up nearly 400 yards passing through the air last week at UMass. Safety Xavier Hughes is out today, Gerald Moore may not play, and Ohio has three second-year players manning the two corner spots.

"It's a matter of coming up with plays," Moore said. "It's stuff we go over every day, but it's just not connecting right now."

Offensively, Ohio is in better shape. Tettleton is close to 100 percent, RB Ryan Boykin is finally ready to start sharing the load in the backfield, and WRs Tyler Furell and Landon Smith are expected back after injury.

The Bobcats are second in the MAC in scoring (36.6 ppg) and third in total offense (472.6 yards per game) with Tettleton stitching together another terrific season -- 1,010 yards, 64.3 percent passing and nine touchdowns with no picks in four games.

Starting RB Beau Blankenship is second in the nation in rushing yards (757) and has posted five straight 100-yard games.

Buffalo is in the middle of the pack defensively in the the conference, but leads the MAC in tackles for loss (30) and sacks (17). LB Khalil Mack (4.5 sacks, 11 tfl) may be the best defensive player in the conference.

If Ohio's health or play on the defensive side doesn't hold up, it may come down to the offense winning another shootout. It's a prospect neither Hasting or Moore wants to think about right now.

"Especially after last week's game, we have something to prove," Moore said. "We want to get back on track to where we were at the beginning of the season."



Ohio survives bruising Buffalo, goes to 6-0

It was a win only a mother — and perhaps the winning side — would love.

But at the end of the day, the Bobcats weren't about to apologize for improving to 6-0 with a sometimes ugly 38-31 win over visiting Buffalo in front of 20,044 inside Peden Stadium on Saturday afternoon.

"We were able to play well enough to win," Ohio coach Frank Solich said. "It's a bottom-line business. Wins are the bottom line."

The Bobcats ran their record to 6-0 on the season, and improved to 2-0 in Mid-American Conference. Ohio became the first FBS team in the country to become bowl eligible.

But how Ohio got to that bottom line left something to be desired. The Bobcats gave up a whopping 313 rushing yards, trailed 14-0 in the first quarter, yielded a stunning 30 first downs and were dominated by 11 minutes in time of possession.

Buffalo (1-4, 0-2 MAC) out played the Bobcats most of the day, with the exception of turnovers. Ohio finished +2 in TO ratio.

The Bulls averaged 5.6 yards per carry, and had two players — RB Devin Campbell (30 carries, 160 yards) and QB Alex Zordich (19-110) — break the 100-yard barrier.

"That's what we like to do, that's what we want to do," Solich said. "They were able to do that better to us, than we were to them. There's no question about that."

"It's very disheartening. In all my years of coaching, I've come to understand that if you have a football that can just run the ball on you, you got problems."

But despite those issues, the Bobcats rebounded with 24 straight points after a slow start, and led 38-24 with 5:56 remaining after a second fourth-quarter touchdown run by RB Ryan Boykin.

Ohio was down and besieged by a slew of injuries, but found a way to win.

"We're a pretty calm team. We don't really get out of whack on things when it doesn't go our way, when we face adversity," said senior WR Bakari Bussey, who netted a career-high eight catches for 77 yards. "I think that's probably our best attribute, we stay calm and poised."

RB Beau Blankenship was held under 100 yards for the first time this season — he finished with 86 yards on 25 carries — while Boykin added 64 yards and two scores on six tries. Quarterback Tyler Tettleton hit 14 of 26 passes for 183 yards and a touchdown — which moved him into a tie atop the Ohio record book for career TD passes (38).

But the offense was slow to start. The Bulls knifed through the Ohio defense early — they had 131 rushing yards in the first quarter alone — and led 14-0 after Campbell's early 3-yard scoring run and Zordich's 10-yard touchdown pass to Hughes.

Daz'mond Patterson then injected the 'Cats, and the home crowd, with some life. On the kickoff after Buffalo went up 14-0, Patterson took the ball on his goal line and a blazed up the field. Patterson was nearly untouched, and only had to juke the kicker, to race 100 yards for a momentum-changing touchdown.

"It was a spark for us, we started off kind of slow," Patterson, a true freshman, said. "It was great blocking actually. From what I remember, the only guy I had to make miss was the kicker. I just followed my blocks and it hit perfectly."

After that, the Bulls imploded. Buffalo had a three-and-out, then fumbled away the ball on the following two possessions.

Ohio took advantage. Blankenship scored on a 14-yard burst for a one-play scor-

ing drive after the first UB fumble, and tied it 14-14.

The Bulls' third fumble of the first half was a muffed punt. On the snap after that play, Tettleton hit Tyler Futrell in the left corner with a 15-yard touchdown pass; the Bobcats grabbed the 21-14 lead and never trailed again.

"We just held the course. We knew what we had to do and got it done," senior guard Eric Herman said.

Matt Weller's 45-yard field goal early in the third quarter stretched the lead out to 24-14.

But the Bulls stormed back. Alex Dennison, UB's wildcat quarterback, got the ball on a reverse and fired a 55-yard touchdown pass to Alex Neutz that sliced the lead to 24-21 shortly after the Weller field goal.

The Bulls tied it, 24-24, with 3:55 left in the third on Patrick Clarke's 30-yard field goal.

Ohio pulled away early in the fourth. Boykin capped an effective 11-play march with a 1-yard touchdown on the first play of the fourth quarter.

After the Bobcat defense forced two straight punts, Boykin made it a two-score advantage when he took a pitch to the right side, found a seam, and exploded for a 51-yard touchdown that gave Ohio a 38-24 lead with 5:56 to go.

"Coach says if the tight end goes out (blocks), you cut it straight up," Boykin explained. "I followed my guard and he took me to the promised land."

Buffalo cut it to 38-31 with just eight seconds left after Dennison scored on a one-yard keeper. But Ohio's Kendric Davis gobbled up the ensuing onside kick to end it.

Ohio was out gained by 168 yards, never really came to grips with the Bulls running game, and had to deal with widespread injuries. Starting safety Gerald Moore (ankle) and leading receiver Donte Foster (back) were just two of several Bobcats who didn't suit up.

In addition, tight end Jordan Thompson — who made his 47th career start on Saturday — left the game with a leg injury in the third quarter. Solich indicated the injury was serious and could "probably be lost for the season."

The teams also combined for 17 penalties that covered 199 yards.

There was a lot to dislike, except the final outcome, for Solich.

"My personality doesn't allow me to enjoy this kind of game much. Too much of a perfectionist and I want everything to go right," he said.

But Solich wasn't going to feel bad about winning.

"To me, knowing what we face every time we step on the field in the MAC, knowing that we came through a physical non-conference, knowing all the injuries that we've had leading up to this point, I couldn't be more pleased in terms of winning this game and winning the games that we've won regardless of how we've won."



Thompson lost for the season

Jordan Thompson has played his last down as a Bobcat.

Ohio University head football coach Frank Solich confirmed Monday that Thompson, a fifth-year senior tight end, suffered a torn knee ligament in the Bobcats' win over Buffalo on Saturday. Thompson tore his MCL and, according to Solich, it's "90 percent likely" he also suffered a tear to his ACL.

Thompson will undergo season-ending surgery in the near future. The redshirt senior, who has already earned his undergrad degree, is not eligible to apply for a sixth-year from the NCAA; he has already competed in more than 30 percent of Ohio's game this season and has not lost two seasons for reasons beyond his control.

A two-time team captain, Thompson has been a rock for Ohio the past four seasons. He had started 47 straight games. He had eight catches for 95 yards this season, and has 60 catches for 666 yards and five touchdowns in his career.

Solich believes Ohio will be able to get by with the emergence of the team's other top three tight ends — juniors Troy Hill and Tyler Knight, and sophomore Derek Roback. Hill has nine catches for 117 yards and two touchdowns this season, Roback has one catch for 46 yards.

"We got guys who will have to take more snaps now because of Jordan being out and I think they're capable guys," Solich said. The coach also said he's doesn't believe the injury will impact Ohio's ability to line up in two tight end sets, which has become a staple this season.

Ohio will, however, miss all the intangibles Thompson brought to the table. He was an every-down tight end — able to both block at a high level, and run short and deep routes — and been a picture-perfect model of what a scholar-athlete should be during his time in Athens.

"He's a guy who's really grounded," Solich said. "You just can't get a better guy."

Thompson's injury is just the latest tough knock against the Bobcats this season. The tight end will be the seventh player since the start of August who has been lost for the season due to injury.

In addition, Solich said Monday that DE Tremayne Scott, FS Xavier Hughes, and OL Mike McQueen are all out for Saturday's game against Akron. Another half-dozen Bobcats are all questionable for the game including starters Donte Foster (WR) and Gerald Moore (safety).

"We can't keep getting the types of injuries we're getting and have it go the rest of the season that way, and still feel that any amount of depth is going to suffice," the coach said.

"Things seem to have a tendency of evening out. So we're ready for a stretch of no injuries. Hopefully that occurs," he said.

Polling data

The Bobcats are on the cusp of finding themselves ranked.

On Sunday, Ohio checked in at No. 26 in the Associated Press Top 25 poll with 79 points. Michigan, with 82 points, was at No. 25. The 79 points in the poll were a season high for the Bobcats.

In the USA TODAY/Coaches Poll, Ohio was No. 31 overall with a season-best total of 23 points. Iowa State was No. 25 in the coaches poll with 73 points.

In the first Harris Interactive College Football Poll of the 2012 season, also released Sunday, Ohio came in at 28th overall with 108 points. Iowa State was 25th in the Harris Poll with 129 points. The Harris Poll is one of the components the Bowl Championship Series uses to determine its No. 1 vs. No. 2 matchup.

Solich isn't ready to talk about polls yet, however. He expressed doubts that a win over Akron would be enough to get Ohio into the top 25, and doesn't want a possible poll appearance to become a focus for his team.

"(Ohio's players) are pretty bright guys, they're not going to talk like that around me anyway," he joked.

"Our focus has never been that," Solich continued. "We understand what it is going to take for us to continue to be successful. We don't want to be a flash in the pan. We want to be able to do things consistently. In order to do that, you can't be looking that far down the road."

Another winner

True freshman running back Daz'mond Patterson was named the MAC East Special Teams Player of the Week on Monday. Patterson notched a 100-yard kick-off return touchdown on Saturday against Buffalo.

The return tied the Ohio record as the longest in program history and was the first kick-off return score for the Bobcats since 2009. Patterson finished the day with 126 kickoff return yards.

Patterson is the third Ohio player to win one of the weekly MAC awards this season; it's the fifth time a Bobcat has earned such an honor in 2012. QB Tyler Tettleton is a two-time winner of the MAC East offensive player award, and kicker Matt Weller has also picked up two special teams player of the week awards this fall.

Carries have been tough to come by for Patterson, currently slotted behind Beau Blankenship and Ryan Boykin in the backfield, but Solich said he has all the tools to be successful.

"He's got skill. He's got quickness. He's got good hands. He's got good toughness," the coach noted. "All that comes back to him having a chance to be a really good back as he continues to develop in the system."



Lopresti: Unbeaten Ohio U could enter top 25

ATHENS, Ohio – Another Saturday, another victory for unbeaten Ohio University, and 45 minutes after the game, the defensive end had already heard from his role model.

The brother who was shot 10 times in Afghanistan.

“Hell of a nice job Bro. 7-0,” was Scotty Hasting’s text to Corey Hasting, sent from Fort Riley in Kansas, where the recovery goes on.

And so here was Corey Hasting, fresh from the Bobcats’ locker room after a 34-28 win against Akron, wearing his brother’s Army dog tags that never leave him.

“He’s with me all the time,” Hasting said of his brother. “I write ‘For him’ on my cleats. Like today, I had a really bad play. I looked down at my cleats and thought, ‘I’ve got to pick it up. This is for Scotty.’”

Just one of the feel-good stories going at the moment for Ohio. You remember the Bobcats. The team that stole the show back on Sept. 1 when the college football world tuned in to see Penn State get back to playing football. Ohio outscored the Nittany Lions 21-0 in the second half that day in Happy Valley to win 24-14, then promptly disappeared from national notice.

But the Bobcats are still around, 7-0 for the first time since 1968, and on the fringe of being voted into the rankings, which rarely happens for the Mid-American Conference, no matter how many big boys its members upset. The ripples of that Saturday at Penn State still follow Ohio.

“We had a chance to maybe show people the caliber of football we play,” coach Frank Solich said. “I think that opened up a fair number of people’s eyes in terms of what we have here. When we’re really clicking, we’re pretty good.”

To be honest, that remains the only quality win on Ohio’s resume. The other six Bobcat victims own a combined record of 7-30, and four of the Ohio victories have been by a touchdown or less. So there is still much to prove before you could make an unshakable case for the top 25 vote.

“That’s not on our radar screen,” Solich said. “Obviously, if we continue to win, and win by enough numbers and people feel that we’ve accomplished enough to put us there, we’ll probably be there. But right now, we’re not there.”

But there are lots of things to like about them. Hasting’s story for example.

He still remembers the time and date – April 21, 2011, sitting in class at 11:30 a.m. – when the text came from his mother, Rhonda, asking to call. He texted back that he’d call just after class. No, she answered. Now.

“I knew right away what it was,” he said Saturday. “When I called, she was crying hysterically. She said, ‘Scotty’s been shot. All we know is he’s in serious condition.’”

His brother, Army platoon leader, had gone on patrol into a hut in Afghanistan, where an ambush was waiting, and been shot 14 times – although four bullets hit his vest. The other 10 hit arms and legs and shoulders.

The worst day of his life, Corey Hasting says now.

“I went back to my dorm room and just sat there and started thinking. What did I say last to him? Did I tell him I loved him? Was I a good brother?”

But the news got brighter. His brother survived, although a long recovery was ahead. Hasting was there at Walter Reed Medical Center when his brother took his first steps.

He marveled at his brother’s ability to cope and go on with life – becoming a father just last spring, one year after he walked into that hut.

Meanwhile, Hasting, who walked on at Ohio, was awarded a scholarship last season. This season, he starts for an unbeaten team. There is a good luck text from his brother before every game, congratulations after. And a brotherly give-and-take whenever Hasting dares mention the aches and pains of football.

“I’ll tell him my foot hurts,” Hasting said. “And he’ll say, ‘I was shot 10 times.’”

There is more to Ohio. Quarterback Tyler Tettleton, who grew up in Norman, Okla., not far from where the Sooners roam, threw his 39th and 40th touchdown passes against Akron to become the school’s career leader, and he is only a junior.

“I never imagined or dreamed we could be ranked, but that shows the kind of program we’ve built,” he said. “Everybody asked me for reasons why I came here. It was the direction they were headed, and what they were about.”

Then there is Solich. What they had here Saturday was the How-Things-Change Bowl.

Solich coaching for Ohio, Terry Bowden for Akron. Once upon a time, Solich took Nebraska into the BCS national championship game against Miami in the 2001 season. Bowden led Auburn to a perfect 11-0 record in 1993.

But neither lived happily ever after. So two men who once worked in the brightest lights of college football ended up together Saturday in the hills of southeastern Ohio. The long and winding road.

This is not the old days at Lincoln for Solich, with stands full of red sweaters rising to the sky. Look out the north end of Peden Stadium, and you get trees. Look out there south end, there is the Hocking River, and traffic curving past on the highway.

But he has found a home here, doing things for eight years the Bobcats never did before. Play in bowl games, to start with. Even won one of them.

“I feel very good for the players that have put us in this position,” he said. “The players that started with us eight years ago when we were able to take tiny steps, to where we started taking bigger steps, and now we’re taking pretty good steps.”

Tougher MAC games are ahead, and we’ll find out more if Ohio can stay perfect and deserves a top 25 vacancy. One date certain to be special is the last home game on Nov. 7 against Bowling Green.

Bobcats land spot in AP's top 25

Ohio University football coach Frank Solich has a whole new angle to use when recruiting this week.

'Come play for the Bobcats, and play for a top 25 program,' he might pitch to a potential player. And Solich would be telling the god-honest truth.

For the first time in 44 years, Ohio finds itself among the nation's elite in the most prestigious poll in the country. On Sunday, the Bobcats found out they had landed at No. 25 in the latest Associated Press top 25 poll. It is the first time Ohio has been ranked since the final regular-season poll in 1968.

The Bobcats (7-0) are officially on the nation's college football radar now.

"I couldn't be happier for our team," said head coach Frank Solich. "Breaking into the Top 25 is a great accomplishment, but we still have a long ways to go toward accomplishing all the things we set out to do at the start of the season."

Ohio (3-0 in the Mid-American Conference) just started its first and only bye week of the season. The Bobcats won't play again until Oct. 27 at Miami. With the break, the players are getting some needed time off while Solich and his staff are hitting the road to continue to never-ending pursuit of the next crop of players via recruiting.

The latest bit of good news for Ohio is sure to be spread to high schoolers far and wide, Solich said.

"Whenever something negative happens, it gets around pretty quickly," Solich said. "We'll make sure this gets out just as quickly, and it should help in recruiting."

The notoriety of a national ranking, however, will do nothing to lessen the target on the Bobcats' backs. Ohio was the preseason pick to win the MAC and has already seen several conference opponents elevate their level of play in an attempt to knock off the favorite.

That kind of pressure will only increase moving forward. The ranking is the latest bit of national exposure for Ohio, which has also received positive pieces of late in The Wall Street Journal, Sports Illustrated and USA Today.

"We've been talking to our players about that stuff all season," Solich said. "When you start getting national exposure like we have been, that kind of thing just keeps getting bigger."

"It comes with winning football games. We can accept that."

While Ohio was left off the first national polls of the season, the Bobcats have been receiving votes in both the AP and USA Today/Coaches polls since scoring a 24-14 win at Penn State in the season opener. Ohio has steadily climbed in the AP poll, but has seen fluctuations in its standing in the coaches poll.

However, on Sunday Ohio scored a season-high 54 points and came in a season-high 27th (tied with Texas) in the Coaches Poll.

In the initial Bowl Championship Series standings, which were released Sunday night and used to determine which teams play for the national championship, Ohio also came in 27th.

Ohio received 104 points in the AP poll to come in at No. 25. The Bobcats trail Boise State (133 points) for the 24th spot, and edged out both Arizona State (92) and TCU (88) for the 25th spot.

Ohio is one of just 12 undefeated teams left in all of FBS football. Three of them reside in the state of Ohio, as both Ohio State and Cincinnati are undefeated and also in the AP Top 25.

It wasn't exactly a goal to get ranked this season for the Bobcats, but as they inched

closer to the top 25 week by week they couldn't help but think about it, said junior RB Ryan Boykin after the game Saturday.

"It wouldn't hurt being ranked," he said. "I do think it's in the back of our mind a little bit. Everybody wants to be ranked."

"I don't think we let it affect us and what we do on the field," he added. "When we're on the field, it's strictly business."

Wait and see

Solich wasn't immediately sure after Ohio's win Saturday what kind of additional punishment senior DT Carl Jones may face from the conference office.

Jones, a starter, was ejected from Saturday's game after he allegedly 'took a swing' at an Akron player following the fourth play from scrimmage in the third quarter.

"We'll be contacted by the MAC office, I'm sure. I'll have to read through the rule book to see how that will work," Solich said.

The coach, however, had no issue with the action taken against his player during the game.

"I saw what happened and he did take a swing and slap a guy in the helmet. It was a correct call," Solich said. "I think both guys were kind of going at it a little bit. But he certainly deserved the penalty that he received."

Weller lands another award

For the third time this season, and the eighth time in his career, Ohio senior place kicker Matt Weller was named MAC East Special Teams Player of the Week.

Weller was named the recipient on Monday after he kicked home 10 points in Ohio's 34-28 win over Akron on Saturday. Weller connected on all four of his PAT kicks, and converted field goals of 44 and 29 yards in the win. He also boomed five touchbacks on seven kickoffs.

In 48 career games, Weller has scored 363 points with 150 PATs and 71 made field goals. On Saturday, Weller moved past former Toledo RB Chester Taylor for fourth place in the all-time MAC scoring list.

Football: Blankenship approaches McRae's 1,000 rushing yard legacy

When former Ohio running back Kalvin McRae finished his career at Ohio in 2007, his goal was to leave behind a legacy for future running backs. Until recently, it's a legacy that has yet to be fulfilled.

McRae, who was the last Bobcat running back to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season, was never on the same roster as current backfield dynamo Beau Blankenship, a redshirt junior, but is more than pleased to see him have an opportunity to pass his single-season rushing record.

"It gets me upset. I wanted to start something that, when I left, could be carried on throughout the years," said McRae, who rushed for more than 1,000 yards in sophomore, junior and senior seasons. "I don't think we've had an 1,000 yard back since I left. So to see Beau have this kind of season and getting a chance to break that record, I think it's tremendous."

Through six games, Blankenship has racked up 951 yards — 274 more than McRae's pace at the regular season's halfway mark. Ohio offensive coordinator and running backs coach Tim Albin's estimation, Blankenship won't slow down, giving him the opportunity to potentially eclipse McRae's single-season record of 1,434 yards on the ground.

Former Ohio running backs Chris Garrett, Vince Davidson and Donte Harden could not accomplish the feat while clad in the green and white, but were also plagued by injuries that kept them out of games. Blankenship has been relatively healthy in his two active seasons with the Bobcats.

"We've had guys at the tailback spot, in general, (that) have produced over 1,000 yards, but we haven't had one guy show the durability and play every down," Albin said. "(Blankenship) has shown he can run the ball, pass protect and catch. I really like his start to the season, and I see a lot of the same characteristics (of McRae) in Beau."

McRae echoed Albin's praise when talking about the durability Blankenship has shown so far this season.

"He's a really good back, he's a tough runner who gets yards after contact," McRae said. "He's an every down back — that's one of things I prided myself on, and I think that's one of the things that coach Albin and coach Solich look for in a running back."

The single season rushing record is a nice reward to focus on down the road, but Blankenship said individual accolades are far off his radar.

"People ask me about the record and tell me about it, but I'm not focused on it," Blankenship said. "It'd be nice to have, but I am not worried about it. As long as we keep winning, it doesn't really matter."

Ohio's offensive attack is based upon the running game and the read option scheme, so Albin said having a big-yardage back is not as chief of a concern as seeing the same guy in the backfield every game. Albin said

Blankenship has been a model of consistency, and the numbers back him up, as he has averages 4.8 yards per carry.

With the season's second half almost underway, Blankenship needs to average less than 100 yards per game to break McRae's rushing record.

Corey's story: Ohio senior plays each day with his brother in his heart

It's easier now, the talking about it part anyway.

That's not to say anything that Corey Hasting feels when talking about his brother, Scotty, is easy however. Hasting, a senior defensive end for the Ohio University football team, had his life turned on its head about 18 months ago.

Forget about grinding through spring football practice. Forget about lining up more gigs for his burgeoning DJ career. Forget about enjoying his upcoming college graduation.

On that late April morning in 2011 Hasting learned that his brother had been shot — 10 times — while serving as an Army platoon leader in Afghanistan. Scotty Hasting was hit in the shoulder, the hip, the leg. If not for the bulletproof vest he was wearing, he likely would have died on April 21, 2011.

After a frantic call from his mother, Corey had his world view drastically changed.

"It definitely humbles you. You get so fixed in on what this is I need to do this day, to get better at this and that," Corey Hasting explained. "And then God throws you a curve ball."

"No one ever plans for those things. What do I do now? You're just dumbfounded," he continued. "You just have to keep your faith and hope He'll take care of it."

After the ambush, Scotty Hasting was rescued, sent to a local hospital and then air-lifted to a military hospital in Germany. Four days after the shooting, the Hasting family gathered at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Bethesda, Md. There, Corey finally got to see his brother — roughly 2.5 years older. He said it was nearly as hard as hearing about the shooting.

"That's when I think about what could have happened," Corey Hasting said. "I got emotional. I still get emotional whenever I see him."

"He's showing off his scars. It was so close...What if I couldn't see him again? But he's still here and that's all that matters."

Scotty survived the shooting. He was released from Walter Reed in November 2011.

Scotty is currently back at Fort Riley in Kansas. He's able to work some, and is going through physical therapy for his injuries. The family doesn't know what the future holds after Scotty's term of enlistment ends, but they're optimistic.

"The more and more he continued to progress and the more and more he continued to get healthy, the more and more optimistic we get," Corey Hasting said. "We understand it's going to be a long road. It's just great having him back."

The ordeal came at the beginning of a whirlwind 18 months for Hasting. Just two months after the shooting, Hasting was put on full scholarship by Ohio. The Bobcats won the MAC East and the program's first ever bowl game in 2011. His brother was released from the hospital last November. During the off-season, Hasting continued to develop his DJ career.

This season, Corey Hasting is a full-time starter and perhaps the most consistent player on Ohio's defensive line. The Bobcats are undefeated at 7-0 and are ranked in the nation's top 25 for the first time in 44 years.

And to top it all off, Scotty Hasting should be in Athens for Corey's Senior Night next month.

"A roller coaster man," Corey Hasting said. "It's been a wild ride, and a great ride."

And he means it. Corey tries not to see the negative in regards to his brother's

shooting. All he sees is the positive; his brother is still alive.

That's why he's not shy anymore in talking about the incident, the struggle involved afterward and how it felt to go through the whole ordeal.

Corey is proud of his brother. He knows there are others who have fought through, or are fighting through the same emotional struggle.

He doesn't tell his story for himself, though he admits it does help sort through his own emotions. He tells it because of his appreciation for all the service men and women serving overseas.

"Anything I can do to get his name out here...to get him and guys like him the recognition they deserve," Corey Hasting said. "Most people don't really know the people that are fighting over there. Maybe they'll care about those guys just a little more."

Before every game this season, Hasting writes in black marker on his cleats the words "4 him." It's a reminder of the struggle his brother is going through, and who he is playing for.

"Whenever I get down about a play or a missed tackle or whatever, I just look down and there it is," Corey Hasting said. "It keeps me going."

"It's more of a head thing. It feels like he's there with me."

Scotty hasn't been to Athens to see Corey play. He hasn't seen Corey play in person since the Rutgers game in 2011. Corey is thankful he's going to get the chance.

"This whole thing, it's still a blessing," Corey said. "It could have been so much worse."

"We still have him and that's all that matters."

Can a MAC team become a mid-major power?

In a little more than 1 1/2 seasons, the Mid-American Conference has morphed from being a conference that pulled off the occasional eye-opening upset against a major-college team to one that has won four bowl games and has elbowed its way into the national polls.

But can a MAC team take the next giant step and become a mid-major powerhouse similar to Boise State? Sports Illustrated posed that question in a story last week about Ohio University. The Bobcats are 7-0 for the first time since 1968. They have defeated Penn State, are 23rd in the Associated Press poll and 24th in the Bowl Championship Series standings.

Coach Frank Solich said he thinks the competitiveness within the conference could prevent any school from becoming a consistent top-10 team and playing in a BCS bowl game.

"We certainly appreciate the fact that we're in the national rankings, but we understand what that is all about," Solich said. "Getting there is one thing, but staying there is another. We're going to play the toughest part of the schedule against teams that are winning football games. We're going to have to battle every single game to win football games and stay in the polls."

Ohio got its first bowl victory last season by scoring a touchdown in the final minute against Utah State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Three other MAC teams won bowl games: Toledo, Northern Illinois and former member Temple. This season, Toledo is 7-1 and coming off a victory over 21st-ranked Cincinnati, Northern Illinois is 7-1 and Kent State is 6-1.

Boise State was ranked in the top 10 of AP's final poll five of the previous six years. It has won 10 or more games in nine of the past 10 seasons partly because it has dominated the Western Athletic and Mountain West conferences. The Broncos have lost three conference games since 2002.

"If you look at the MAC right now, you see top-level football teams," Solich said. "The programs are getting stronger every year. It's not an oddity for a MAC team to have a winning season to the point where they are upsetting teams at the BCS level. When you have a number of teams that are able to do that in one conference, it's difficult for one team to separate themselves."

First-year Toledo coach Matt Campbell said he thinks the MAC can have a national power because coaches such as Solich have created continuity in the program.

"A Boise State certainly can happen (in the MAC)," Campbell said. "It's all about consistency and the coach being able to sustain his staff."

Recruiting top players from the Midwest creates consistency.

"We all have great recruiting bases," Campbell said. "Whether it's Toledo, Ohio University or Northern Illinois, many of our teams have great foot-

ball tradition. Maybe a young man is looking at a BCS school that doesn't have that kind of tradition. They see that we're able to win."

Bobcats injury report

Safety Gerald Moore and defensive lineman Carl Jones are expected to play for Ohio against Miami University on Saturday. Defensive lineman Tremayne Scott could return at some point this season, but not this week.

Tight end Jordan Thompson, offensive lineman Sam Johnson of Liberty Union and defensive backs Omar Leftwich, Xavier Hughes, Travis Carrie and Jamil Shaw are out for the season.

"The list is pretty extensive," Solich said. "It's a case where we do have some depth in our program. If these injuries happened four or five years ago, we definitely would have struggled. We're hanging in there."

Ohio AD signs extension

Ohio athletic director Jim Schaus' contract was extended five years through June 2017. He came to the university from Wichita State.

Schaus hired former men's basketball coach John Groce, who led the Bobcats to a MAC tournament championship and to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament last season, and was the point man in fundraising for an upcoming \$12.5 million multipurpose indoor facility. The grade-point average for the entire athletic department has risen to above 3.0 during his term.

College football: Central Ohio Watch

A walk through Ohio University's locker room isn't recommended for those with squeamish stomachs. In every corner, there are players wearing slings and on crutches. Others are in the trainer's room getting worked on.

On defense alone, four players have been lost for the season, two more have missed significant playing time and another has been in and out of the lineup.

The attrition bothers safety Josh Kristoff, a third-year sophomore from Pickerington Central.

"That is hard seeing teammates getting hurt like that," he said. "You know how hard these guys have worked, and then it's taken away from them. They aren't just guys I play with. They are friends."

Kristoff, though, said he was bred to be a tough guy since his high-school days. He ranks tied for sixth on the team with 30 tackles.

"I do like mixing it up, and that's how I've been taught ever since Pickerington Central," he said. "I loved the way we played in high school. We played tough under coach (Jay) Sharrett and (defensive coordinator Jeff) Lomonico. I had a lot of big-time experience there, and that was huge. I was not scared of anything, and that included playing against big-time recruits. We were going to hit harder than you."

Ohio was the only Division I college that offered Kristoff a scholarship, but it appeared he would have to wait for his money by paying his way as a freshman as a "gray shirt."

In June 2010, he was about to accept a scholarship offer from Virginia Military Institute, a member of the Football Championship Subdivision, when he got the biggest news of his football life.

"I was about 12 hours away from committing to VMI," Kristoff said. "I was on a senior trip in Florida. This one day I decided to just stay at the house we were renting and hang out. Until then, I was running around without my cellphone. Then I got a call from the Ohio coaches saying I would be getting a scholarship. That was one of the happiest days of my life."

What came next was something resembling a two-minute drill. Kristoff had to return home, pack and get to campus because the summer semester was about to start.

"I hadn't applied for school because I was set to enroll in January," Josh said. "My parents got all the paperwork ready for me. They even got me school supplies. I applied on a Saturday and got accepted on a Sunday."

Life couldn't be any better these days. Kristoff, a mathematics major, plays for a team that is 7-0 and ranked 23rd in the Associated Press poll and 24th in the Bowl Championship Series standings.

"The buzz around campus has been crazy," he said. "We're setting attendance records; so many alumni are coming back. This is becoming a football town. It's great to get national attention, but that doesn't affect how we go about things. It doesn't matter if we're seventh or 76th in the nation. Everybody is on the same page. We've got a lot of young guys on defense because of the injuries, but it's just meeting one challenge after another."

Solich, Bobcats follow winning formula

Frank Solich is a low-key guy who pounds away at fundamentals and consistency.

He has no problem calling himself boring and will always choose substance over flash, and it's showed during his eight-year run at the helm of Ohio University's football program.

The Bobcats have played in three straight bowl games and are ranked 23rd in this week's Associated Press and USA Today Coaches polls. They are 7-0 and headed for Yager Stadium in Oxford to face Miami on Saturday.

"We certainly appreciate the fact that we are in the national rankings," Solich said Monday morning. "However, we understand what that's all about. Getting there is one thing. Being able to stay there is another."

This is an OU squad that started the season like a rocket, going on the road and toppling Penn State 24-14 in the first game of the post-Joe Paterno era.

The Bobcats' last two victories weren't pretty (37-34 over winless Massachusetts and 38-31 over 1-6 Buffalo), thanks in part to a rash of defensive injuries. But they keep winning and are coming off a bye week.

"We gave them quite a bit of time off. I think they earned that," Solich said. "With the physical games that we've been playing, it seemed to make sense to do that. They came back and seemed to be rejuvenated."

"Obviously, they know of the task ahead of them in terms of playing Miami. Last year was a great, great ballgame where we hung on to win it at the end. We expect it to be another game similar to that."

Solich, who posted a 58-19 record in six seasons as Nebraska's head coach and is 57-40 in Athens, will make sure his players are focused. That's part of his daily routine, especially as Ohio's national status has risen. The Bobcats are 24th in the Bowl Championship Series standings this week – it's the first time they've ever been in that Top 25.

"We've tried to stay away from any kind of conversation that looks too far down the road," Solich said. "I think once we take our sights off of just preparing for one game at a time and trying to improve the areas that we need to improve on, we're not going to get it done."

OU is averaging 448.1 yards and 36.4 points per contest with an offense spearheaded by redshirt junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton.

Tettleton, who missed a game with an injury, has completed 108-of-179 passes for 1,343 yards and 12 touchdowns with just one interception. He threw for 3,302 yards and 28 TDs last year while running 166 times for 658 yards and 10 scores.

This team is balanced, averaging 217.3 yards per game on the ground and 230.9 through the air. Redshirt junior Beau Blankenship is a bruis-

ing runner (198 carries, 951 yards, six TDs), and redshirt senior Bakari Bussey (21 catches, 215 yards) from Lakota West High School is among the top receivers.

Defensively, the news isn't so good, despite the play of redshirt junior linebacker Keith Moore, who has a team-high 58 total tackles. The injury bug has been actively biting, and Ohio is giving up 259.6 passing yards per game.

Consequently, Solich is concerned about Miami quarterback Zac Dysert (167-of-267, 1,914 yards, 14 TDs).

"Teams have been throwing on us, so we're going to need to step that part of the game up," Solich said. "We need to start getting some more interceptions (OU has seven). We'll start off as usual trying to stop the ground game and hopefully play sound defense."

"It's a case where we do have some depth in our program," he added of OU's injury list. "If these injuries would've happened three, four, five years ago, we would've definitely struggled to win football games. But we're hanging in there."

Ohio's new semester system might not be a hit with the student body, but it is working in the Bobcats' favor when it comes to handling gridiron collisions.

Once players wrapped up their academic quarter under the university's old system, some would take a step away from the gridiron, heading home to enjoy the holidays. Now, since the semester runs through the middle of December, John Bowman, Ohio director of sports medicine services, will have a better eye on Ohio's student-athletes.

"If we went to a (Mid-American Conference) Championship game and then had a break, they went home and then you didn't get to see them or do a lot with them, so this is a lot better for us," he said, reflecting on the Bobcats' quarter system schedule.

The 2012-13 season has been a perfect storm for the Bobcats' sports medicine staff, as Ohio's bye week came at an opportune time, as well.

A week eight lapse from play was just what the doctor ordered for the Bobcats, giving players a chance to spend time away from the field turf of Peden Stadium, which many used to soak up extra sessions in its athletic training facility.

Bowman said the bye week was used to treat injuries of varying severity and nature, as remedies ranging from ice baths and rest for nagging pains like turf toe to injections dealing with chronic pain were prescribed.

Ohio redshirt junior running back Beau Blankenship said that though he and his teammates like to avoid the training facility for obvious reasons, he appreciates the work that the trainers put in and the relationship they build with players.

"We spend so much time with them — hopefully you don't see them too much — but they take care of us," he said.

Five players also underwent MRIs to identify whether they would need postseason surgery for reoccurring injuries such as cartilage tears and the like.

The most positive impression left following the bye week was not on players requiring extensive care, but those who had nagging injuries resulting from a month of two-a-days and seven straight games.

"For the most part, it's been a lot of rest and modality treatment that we would normally be doing with guys," Bowman said. "We've just been fortunate that we had this time where we can rest them more than one or two days. We can rest them for four or five days, which has been really good for their bodies."

The Bobcats' sports medicine staff employs just more than a dozen individuals, nine of which are undergraduate athletic training students.

Only a handful of trainers travel with the team, where they set up what Bowman called "satellite athletic training" and "injury response" areas in hallways of opposing stadiums.

Kevin Silva, a second-year graduate student studying athletic training and one of Ohio's two graduate assistants, said mentoring younger trainers is equally gratifying to the results he sees on the field.

"It's rewarding to take students that haven't necessarily had a lot of clinical experience and being able to show them what we do," said Silva, who works primarily with Ohio's defensive line. "It's not only just skills, but everything else. It's how to be an athletic trainer and act and take care of patients with that confidence."

Amy Wyke, a first-year graduate student studying athletic training that works mostly with the Bobcats' offensive lineman, said the players "kind of see me as a mom" — a role she has welcomed because of the relationship she has been able to develop with the team.

"You can't really take offense to everything they say or really listen to everything," she said, jokingly. "It's a good experience athletic training-wise because you see the most injuries in football and get the most out of it."

The bond between player and trainer is deep, especially between those who have a long history together. Eric Herman, a redshirt senior offensive lineman, called Bowman, who he has worked with for five seasons, his "go-to guy" and a primary reason he has been able to start a team-high 45 straight games.

"The training staff has 100 percent to do with why I've been in the game so long," he said.

Tyler Tettleton quietly enjoying the ride

ATHENS, Ohio - On this particularly glamorous day in the glamorous life of Ohio University quarterback Tyler Tettleton, he's up with the sun. Within an hour, he's wearing an Oklahoma City Thunder t-shirt and shorts and walking to class -- uphill -- alongside dozens of other students.

If that sounds thrilling, come along a few hours later as he's wandering Athens' famous/infamous Court Street in search of lunch. With dozens of options and plenty of variety abound, Tettleton boldly chooses...Subway.

The sandwich maker behind the counter is less than starstruck. Clearly, she's unaware that she's making a sandwich for the quarterback for the first Ohio University football team to crack the Top 25 rankings since 1968. Dining in what becomes a crowded Subway for almost 45 minutes, Tettleton gets recognized only by a teammate stuck eight deep in line. Back on Court Street, he passes through anonymously.

Completely and totally anonymously. This taking-football-seriously and winning-in-bunches stuff is still relatively new here. The Big Man on Campus is supposed to be a big deal, right?

"No -- and that's fine with me," Tettleton says. "Believe me."

He has enough in his daily sandwich wrapper. Even-keeled and unassuming until he hits the football field, the son of former Major League Baseball player Mickey Tettleton has reluctantly become the face of a Bobcats program that's made a steady climb under coach Frank Solich, is 7-0 so far this season and last weekend made the BCS rankings for the first time ever.

"We knew Tyler had good bloodlines," Solich said. "Once we got him here, we found that he was a very serious worker. He takes pride in his craft, and he's made steady improvement. He's a better young man than he is a football player."

The Bobcats have a veteran offensive line, a workhorse running back in Iowa State transfer and Tettleton's longtime friend, Beau Blankenship, and a mobile, collected quarterback who doesn't necessarily look the part at 6-foot nothing and 200 pounds. Tettleton is the brains and often the engine of a sharp, fast-paced Bobcats offense, leading with the kind of poise and quiet confidence that allowed Ohio to rally from 11 down to win at Penn State and has kept things steady through a rash of injuries and a couple of close calls since.

He's not totally bland; he does mix parmesan with chipotle southwest sauce on his Subway chicken sandwich. As for the jazzy, flashy stuff, he will admit only to thinking that a backfield featuring two high school buddies from Norman, Okla., would lead what was long one one the nation's lowest-profile programs to the Top 25 is pretty darn cool.

"Not in my wildest dreams did I ever think it would be possible," he says. "But it's been a blast."

Tettleton has been walking Court Street during the school day when he's encountered fellow students on the sidewalk and in crosswalks wearing his No. 4 jersey, the one that hangs in the window of more than one campus bookstore. Those students had no idea they were seeing Tettleton himself.

The Bobcats have created quite a buzz, though. The home games have been sold out, and there's already talk that Ohio playing in the MAC Championship Game would bring a crowd of 50,000 to Detroit's Ford Field.

Tettleton, the school's all-time leading passer at the midpoint of his junior season, said he's usually only recognized on campus only by "friends of friends" or when a teammate makes it a point to tell the gathered masses the The Big Star is coming through.

"It's the linemen," Blankenship said. "They love to do things to try to embarrass him. We walk into a restaurant and they scream to anyone who will listen that Tyler is there."

"Tyler hates that stuff."

The closest Tettleton comes to bragging is talking proudly about how his mom and stepfather fly in for almost every game from Oklahoma. After a summertime photo shoot that led to his image being displayed on a 50-foot banner outside Peden Stadium and on billboards throughout Southeast Ohio, he asked for some leftover pictures so he could send them to his grandmother.

"I know they have to do that publicity stuff," Tettleton said. "I don't necessarily like it."

Tettleton knew of Solich from growing up in Big 12 country. When he tore his ACL as a junior in high school and Big 12 schools backed off their recruiting of him, Ohio kept calling. In some ways it was an inside job; Tettleton's high school coach, Lance Manning, was a college teammate of Ohio offensive coordinator Tim Albin.

"Lance told me that when I watched the tape I was going to have a good feeling about the kid," Albin said. "But he said when I actually met Tyler, I'd have a great feeling about him. He wasn't lying. He's different than a lot of kids, and different is good. He's certainly not a kid. He's a polished young man."

"You don't see that confidence outwardly, but it's there. He has the right support system at home, the right demeanor with his teammates and the right kind of leadership qualities to handle being in front of something big. We nailed this one."

Their college experience marks the second time Blankenship has transferred schools to play with Tettleton. They grew up competing against each other "in elementary school track meets and middle school football games," Blankenship said, before Blankenship came to Norman North for high school.

When Norman North, which was formed in 1997, beat neighborhood rival Norman High in football for the first time in 2006, it did so on the strength of a Tettleton touchdown run.

"Legendary stuff back home," Blankenship said. "I don't know that even Tyler would downplay that one."

Tettleton doesn't mind those stories, but he otherwise prefers to not talk about himself. He can go play by play, possession by possession lamenting the miscues that cost his beloved Thunder in the NBA Finals last June. He can name every player on the Ohio defense who's been called into a new or different role through a rash of early-season injuries. When he does have free time, he's most comfortable in his living room playing Call of Duty or Madden Football on XBox.

On this particularly glamorous day, his roommate is playing Madden on one TV while Teen Mom airs on the one above it. It's quite a setup they have, quite a ride Tettleton is on.

Tettleton said he does sometimes wish he'd stuck with baseball longer, "just to see how far I could have gone with it." He lives just down the street from Ohio University's intramural fields, and he'll often hear screams at night from his classmates playing in those really important flag football games on the eastern edge of campus.

"It always sounds like they're having fun down there," Tettleton said. "I think doing something like that would be a lot of fun. But I wouldn't trade how any of this has turned out for anything. I'm having enough fun with our season."

St. Albert grad Waters living the dream at Ohio University

Forgive Matt Waters for bending the truth.

Two months ago, the former St. Albert and Iowa Western football standout made his debut at Ohio University, a Division I school in Athens, Ohio, out of the Mid-American Conference.

The Bobcats opened the season Sept. 1 at Penn State. The Nittany Lions play in Beaver Stadium, which has a capacity of over 106,000.

College football typically takes center stage nationally during the first week of the season, but Beaver Stadium received even more attention on that day. The school was playing its first game under a new coaching staff and trying to shake the tarnished image cast by the Jerry Sandusky scandal.

For Waters to have a million thoughts going through his head before his first Division I game would have been understandable.

"It was crazy," said Waters, a 6-foot, 203-pound wide receiver for the Bobcats. "I tell people I was calm and that I didn't let the crowd affect me very much, but underneath I was real nervous. I had never played in front of more than maybe 10,000 people, and then to multiply that by 10 and have it be my first game with my new team, I was pretty nervous."

Waters didn't have a catch in the game, but his first taste of collegiate football ended nicely with a 24-14 Ohio victory.

"To come out of there with a victory was probably one of the most exciting moments I think I've ever had in sports," Waters said.

This entire year has been an exciting ride for Waters. He arrived on the Ohio campus in January after the Bobcats brought him aboard a couple of weeks before.

Since then, it's been all good news for Ohio on the gridiron. Entering today's game at Miami (Ohio), the Bobcats are 7-0 and No. 24 in the latest BCS standings.

"I thought we were going to be good coming into the season, but we really came together as a team in camp," Waters said. "Every week, we try to go 1-0 and keep trying to add wins up. Right now, we're playing really well. Hopefully, we can keep it rolling."

Waters continues to grow as a receiver. He made his first catch – a 22-yarder – in a 27-24 victory over Marshall on Sept. 15. For the year, he has six catches for 113 yards.

The Council Bluffs native's presence in Athens represents the achievement of a dream since high school. Waters received little attention from colleges despite a terrific prep career at St. Albert.

Iowa Western started its program in 2009, and Waters chose to become a Reiver. That decision came with some risk. A new program at IWCC

didn't necessarily guarantee a Division I future, but Waters took the risk, and it paid off.

After redshirting in 2009, Waters was part of back-to-back 9-2 teams at IWCC the next two years. While there, he tallied 92 catches for 1,542 yards and 15 touchdowns.

Waters' sophomore season ended, and he still had no offers in hand. He figured a walk-on role at either Iowa or Iowa State might have been his best option, but then Ohio entered the picture. Iowa Western coach Scott Strohmeier said that Waters only had about a week left to stay in the IWCC dorms before Ohio offered a scholarship.

Strohmeier was especially happy for his wide receiver. Waters' commitment in 2009 showed other western Iowa recruits that it was OK to stay close to home.

"He was one of the biggest signees we made starting the program," Strohmeier said. "Not only because Matt was a great player but locally, because everybody is following him, when Matt decided to come to Iowa Western, I think it opened up a lot of people's eyes, saying, 'Hey, it's not bad to stay at home and play at a two-year school.'

"Matt was a good student and obviously a good player, so I think it really set the tone for a lot of local kids from a program's standpoint of trying to continue to recruit locally."

Waters is thrilled that Iowa Western is part of his football resume, but he's even more excited about what the program is doing now that he's off campus. His younger brother, Jake, is the starting quarterback on a Reiver team that is currently 8-0, ranked No. 1 in the country and averaging 67 points a game.

"I keep up with them all the time," Waters said. "That's so sweet what they're doing."

Strohmeier thinks it's pretty sweet that a Council Bluffs kid came to campus with a goal and didn't leave until it was reached.

"I was just happy for Matt," Strohmeier said. "His goal when he came here was to see if he could play Division I football, and I felt he could and there was no question he was going to be able to do it at that level. He just needed someone to give him an opportunity."



Redhawks ruin Ohio's undefeated season with 23-20 stunner

OXFORD, Ohio — Ohio's undefeated season, national ranking and potential BCS busting resume took weeks and months to build.

It was erased in nine seconds.

Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton was sacked by Miami's Wes Williams on the final play of the game as the RedHawks stunned the visiting Bobcats, 23-20, Saturday inside Yager Stadium.

It was an ending Ohio fans won't soon forget. The Bobcats (7-1, 3-1 Mid-American Conference) had a first down on the Miami 7-yard line but no time outs. Ohio trailed by three and had just nine seconds remaining on the clock. The Bobcats went for the win...and got burned.

On the play, Tettleton took the shotgun snap and looked for an open receiver. And looked. And looked. He darted to his left, tried to come to the right, and Williams pounced on him from behind. The clock struck 0:00 and Ohio's dreams of an undefeated season fell by the wayside.

Ohio head coach Frank Solich said there was little discussion about trying the potential game-tying field goal with nine seconds left instead of gambling with one more offensive play.

"Not much. We wanted to win it right there," Solich said. "Plenty of time to get a play off. You either throw a touchdown pass, or you throw it away."

Tettleton didn't do either. He admitted afterward he lost focus on the specifics of the situation. Tettleton forgot — yes forgot — Ohio was out of timeouts and just nine seconds remained.

"No, I just totally forgot. Just totally forgot. And that's my fault," Tettleton said. "I was just trying to make a play. Everything broke down and I was just trying to make a play."

Miami (4-4, 3-1 MAC) won for the first time since 2005 against its MAC East rival, and posted a win over a top 25 team for the first time since bumping off Northern Illinois in the 2010 MAC Championship game.

RedHawk quarterback Zac Dysert hit on 21 of 36 passes for 311 yards with a touchdown and an interception. But it was running back Jamire Westbrook's 31-yard run on a late fourth-quarter drive that put Miami in position to win. The long run set up Miami at the Ohio 18-yard line.

After three short runs — which exhausted Ohio's supply of time outs — Kaleb Patterson connected on 31-yard field goal that snapped a 20-20 tie with just 1:24 remaining.

Tettleton guided Ohio on a fantastic final drive. He completed four straight passes to move the Bobcats from their own 25 to the Miami 24. Tettleton then had runs of nine and eight yards to move the ball to the seven.

Then Tettleton lost his head, and Ohio lost its undefeated season.

"It definitely hurts," said Ohio senior safety Gerald Moore. "But as a team we have to regroup."

"The rankings aren't our goal. Our goal is to get back to Detroit and get back to the MAC Championship," he added. "We have a lot of games ahead of us that we have to win."

Tettleton hit on 23 of 38 passes for 302 yards and didn't have an interception. But he was sacked six times; Ohio had allowed only five sacks in the first seven games combined.

"It was weird. It hadn't been like that the past seven games," Tettleton said.

Beau Blankenship and Ryan Boykin both had 74 yards apiece on the ground for Ohio, but the Bobcats never fully capitalized against a Miami defense that was allowing 37 points and 500 yards per game.

The RedHawks came out firing and led 13-0 just 12 minutes in. Patterson sandwiched 40 and 32-yard field goals around Dysert's 54-yard touchdown pass to Nick Harwell and Miami had Ohio on the ropes.

Blankenship scored on a five-yard run late in the first quarter to put Ohio on the board, but Westbrook answered with a 1-yard plunge to give Miami a 20-7 lead early in the second quarter.

Tettleton scored on a 3-yard dive with 9:45 left in the first half to trim the deficit to 20-14 at the break. With Ohio settled in defensively, it appeared the Bobcats were on their way to another come-from-behind win on the road.

"Defensively, overall, that was one of our best games," said Ohio senior LB Keith Moore. "We had some big plays that didn't go our way. Some broken coverages."

"I guarantee if you take five or six of those plays away, we win. It's a new ballgame," he added. "It's unfortunate."

But Ohio's offense wasn't able to take advantage. The Bobcats had a first down on the Miami 26 early in the third, but had to settle for a Matt Weller 45-yard field goal thanks to two offensive line penalties. Later in the third, Ohio was at the Miami 27, but a 12-yard sack on Tettleton on third down led to a punt from the RedHawk 39.

The Bobcats finally tied it late in the fourth at 20-20 on Weller's 38-yard field goal. But that came after Ohio had a first-and-goal at the five, but had to kick after a 15-yard sack on Tettleton on third down.

"There were many opportunities to get ourselves involved in this football game at a much higher level and we did not get that done," Solich said. "We had first-and-goal at the five-yard line, had a chance to put seven points on the board and we didn't get it done."

Tettleton said the game was over, but not Ohio's season.

"It sucks. But it's not the end," he said. "We still have a chance to get back to Detroit. That's been our thing. Unfinished business. It's not over."

Ohio returns to action on Thursday with a 6 p.m. start against Eastern Michigan inside Peden Stadium.

Miami University 23, Ohio University 20: Bobcats run out of time

OXFORD, Ohio — Nine seconds remained and the ball was on the Miami University 9-yard line when Ohio University quarterback Tyler Tettleton took a snap from center Skyler Allen in shotgun formation.

The Bobcats had no timeouts left, but coach Frank Solich wanted one final shot at a winning touchdown before bringing on kicker Matt Weller for a chip-shot field-goal attempt that would have forced overtime. Tettleton drifted to his left and patiently looked for receiver Donte Foster to shake free on a back side slant route in the end zone.

He was too patient.

Tackle Wes Williams burst through the line and sacked Tettleton for a 3-yard loss with three seconds left. There was not enough time to line up and spike the ball to stop the clock for another play. The result was a stunning 23-20 victory for the RedHawks over the 23rd-ranked Bobcats yesterday before 19,326 in Yager Stadium.

In all probability, Ohio (7-1, 3-1 Mid-American Conference) will lose its national ranking in the Associated Press poll and Bowl Championship Series standings. Its winning streak against Miami (4-4, 3-1) ended at six games.

The worst part is the Bobcats are one game behind Kent State in the MAC East and must play three games in 12 days beginning with Eastern Michigan on Thursday in Peden Stadium.

Tettleton, a record-breaking redshirt junior, said he forgot Ohio had no timeouts left and lost track of time.

“I was just trying to make a play — everything broke down,” he said. “I totally forgot, and that’s my fault. That’s all there is to it. (The pass play) wasn’t there. I should have thrown it away.”

It’s a situation Tettleton has been through uncounted times in games and practices. Solich was confident putting the game in his lap once again.

“We wanted to win it right there,” Solich said. “There was plenty of time to get a play off. You either throw a touchdown pass or throw it away.”

Williams, who was moved from end to the interior line for this game, wanted it to be the last play.

“I just had one thought in my head — I’m going to go get him,” he said. “Before the play I was like, ‘Yo, Jay (defensive coordinator Peterson), if we get a sack here, it’s game over.’ We were just doing everything we could to get to him.”

Ohio used its three timeouts to stop the clock just before Miami took the lead on a 31-yard field goal by Kaleb Patterson with 1:24 remaining. The key plays in the drive were a 17-yard reception by Nick Harwell on

third-and-2 to the Miami 48 and a 30-yard run by Spencer Treadwell to the Ohio 18.

Ohio linebacker Keith Moore of Grove City said it was a matter of Miami making a few more plays.

“We had some things that didn’t go our way — some busted coverage,” Moore said. “If you take away five or six plays, we win. Our defense in the second half had plenty of three-and-outs.”

Tettleton was magnificent in driving the Bobcats from their 25-yard line into scoring position. He completed passes of 28, 11, 6 and 6 yards and had 9- and 8-yard runs.

It looked as if he would overcome a shaky day from an offensive line that gave up six sacks and was penalized twice for holding and once for hands to the face.

In 2011, Ohio fell one game behind early in conference play but rebounded to win the division.

“You get a major roadblock and you have to regroup,” safety Gerald Moore said. “The rankings are not our goal.”

Football: Wide receiver's consistency, productivity progresses Bobcats despite injury

Ohio redshirt junior wide receiver Donte Foster has been making big plays since high school, where he had his first brush with the national spotlight by being featured as ESPN's top play for a buzzer-beating basketball swish with his back to the basket in 2009.

Despite his big-play potential, Foster has become more known for his consistency while starring on the gridiron at Ohio. He has averaged 13 yards per catch during the past three seasons, but has only one reception longer than 35 yards, which came in 2010.

That makes Foster's average yardage all the more impressive, as it is not buoyed by many lengthy receptions. Moreover, he has tacked almost 20 yards onto his game average from last season and is on pace to surpass his 2011-12 total of 352 yards with a 29-yard performance Thursday against Eastern Michigan.

Ohio wide receivers coach Dwayne Dixon said Foster's productivity has made him the leading candidate for big-play balls when the game is on the line, filling in for departed deep threats LaVon Brazill and Riley Dunlop.

"Quarterbacks have an affinity to throw it to the guy they think is going to catch it most," Dixon said. "I think (Foster) wants to make sure he makes (quarterbacks) look good, like, 'Just put it in the air and I'll go make a play on it.'"

That's redshirt junior quarterback Tyler Tettleton's mentality in dealing with his most frequent target, who said he learned to judge timing and trajectory on the hardwood, on which he starred in high school and later averaged almost 13 points per game at Seminole State College of Florida before coming to Ohio.

"He's the one that gets open," said Tettleton, Foster's 2011-12 roommate. "I just have to throw it up and give him a chance, because I know he's going to come down with it."

One route that has been a success this season is the corner fade, where Tettleton finesse a floater to the far corner of the end zone, where Foster meets it, airborne, hands outstretched.

That was the case in the first game of the season, when the duo connected to seal a win against Penn State — perhaps the most momentous win of their careers.

With 2:59 remaining in the game and Ohio trailing by three, Tettleton dropped back to pass and released toward the far rear corner of the end zone. By the time he returned to his feet after being knocked to the ground on the 14-yard line by Penn State linebacker Michael Mauti, Foster had already shook off safety Jacob Fagnano, roped in the pass, and ran off the field to the sound of a thousand camera clicks.

That moment will be forever ingrained in Foster's memory, but it was no different than the one practiced at Peden Stadium so many times — 500-600 if Foster's estimation is correct.

"I felt that play would put a dagger in them," Foster said, recalling getting the relay from offensive coordinator Tim Albin in the team huddle. "I just went through my steps on-point. It'll definitely be a memorable play (of) my career."

Since, the road Foster has taken hasn't been easy or as glamorous. He was forced to watch from the sidelines during Ohio's wins against Massachusetts and Buffalo earlier this season because of a thumb injury, and as a result, a thick layer of tape still wraps around his thumb and palm while on the gridiron.

"It's been a big lift for him to fight through and show the guys, 'Hey, I'm going to tough it out even though it's a part of me being able to make plays on the ball,'" Dixon said.

Foster is anxious to get back on the field Thursday after leaving empty-handed from the game against Miami, in which he was supposed to be the primary target on the game-ending broken play that ended Ohio's perfect 2012 campaign.

"The route that the coach had called, I thought that it would be open, myself," he said. "But as they rolled over a safety, I saw that it was going to be kind of impossible to get it in between there. I definitely wanted the ball in my hands in that situation."

"It's good that we have a quick turnaround, though, because we can seek out and go try to punish Eastern Michigan for our loss."



Bobcats bounce back in a big way

Donte Foster turned up field, off a block from a teammate, and saw nothing but open grass between him and his goal.

The Bobcats, as a whole, feel the same way.

Ohio rebounded from its first loss of the season, with vigor, as the Bobcats whipped visiting Eastern Michigan 45-14 in front of an announced crowd of 16,789 inside Peden Stadium Thursday night. In short, Ohio (8-1, 4-1 Mid-American Conference) had its most complete game of the conference season.

"It felt good to get back on track. It was a quick turnaround from Miami," said Foster, a junior wide receiver. "We wasn't very pleased with the Miami game so felt we needed to come out and make a statement."

Foster did his part to lead the charge as he picked up a career-high 164 receiving yards on seven catches and notched a pair of touchdowns. Foster's 79-yard catch-and-run late in the third quarter put the game out of reach, and the Eagles (1-8, 0-5 MAC) out of their misery.

On first down at the Ohio 21, QB Tyler Tettleton fired a 10-yard pass to Foster in the left flat. Foster navigated his way to the middle of field, cut off a block from Tyler Futrell, then exploded through a pack of EMU defenders untouched. The 79-yard play was Ohio's longest of the season offensively, and capped a 99-yard touchdown drive that took the life out of the Eagles.

Ohio's lead went from 24-14, to 31-14 in a span of 15 seconds.

"I was just looking for open space. I saw that I needed to get up field at some point. I just cut it right off Futrell's block and it was off to the races," Foster explained. "The guys give me a hard time and say I'm not fast and everything, so I felt like I needed to prove something different."

The Bobcats played with a bit of a chip on their collective shoulder. After losing last weekend at Miami for its first loss of the season Ohio needed to bounce back; the 'Cats did it in a big way.

Backup RB Ryan Boykin had a season-high 128 yards and a touchdown, while starter Beau Blankenship had 72 yards and another score. The Bobcats racked up 559 yards and shut out Eastern Michigan over the final 32 minutes.

Besides two turnovers, there wasn't much Ohio coach Frank Solich could quibble with.

"Finally a game where we were able to separate ourselves in the second half as the game went on and have a cushion at the end," Solich said. "It was a good win for us."

Tettleton hit 19 of 27 passes for 255 yards and three touchdowns. He had his second interception of the season — when the ball was batted at the line of scrimmage and an EMU defensive linemen made the diving catch on the deflection — but was also victimized by a handful of drops.

Tettleton was sharp, in control, and didn't appear to be the least bit fazed by Saturday's last-second breakdown against the RedHawks.

"We just wanted to get back in the win column, move on and do what we've been doing before the Miami game. One week, one game at a time. All of our goals are intact and we understand that," Tettleton said.

"It was in the past so there was nothing I could do about it. I'm the type to move on and look ahead," he continued. "Another week, new game, and that's what it was

this week."

Bronson Hill rushed for 111 yards for EMU, and RB Ryan Brumfield scored on both a 17-yard reception and a 3-yard run for the Eagles. QB Tyler Benz completed 9 of 21 passes for 138 yards with a score and an interception.

But Eastern Michigan couldn't keep pace with an Ohio offense that converted 8 of 12 third downs and averaged 8.0 yards per play.

"It seemed like everything was clicking. Every hole was open. Can't give enough credit to the linemen," Boykin said. "It seemed like we couldn't miss. We were hitting everything."

Blankenship opened Ohio's scoring with a two-yard TD run early in the first quarter, but fumbled away the ball on the Bobcats' next series. EMU cashed in the giveaway with Brumfield's TD catch from Benz and forged a 7-7 tie that endured through the end of the first quarter.

Matt Weller booted a 25-yard field goal early in the second, then Ohio pushed the lead to 17-7 midway through the frame after Tettleton fired a 7-yard touchdown pass to Chase Cochran.

Eastern Michigan closed to within 17-14 with 2:08 left in the first half after a short punt gave the Eagles a short field. Brumfield scored and it appeared EMU might hang around.

It didn't work out that way. Tettleton got the ball back with 55 seconds left in the first half, after his interception and a quick EMU three-and-out, on the Ohio 35-yard line. The Bobcats needed just 44 seconds to get another touchdown as Tettleton hit Foster with a 19-yard touchdown pass on the right side with just 11 seconds left in the half.

Solich said the situation didn't conjure up any flashbacks to Saturday in Oxford.

"Last week didn't cross my mind," he said.

After Foster's second touchdown blew the game open in the third, Ohio finished off the game with a pair of touchdown runs. Boykin scored on a 13-yard burst with 5:40 left in the fourth, and freshman Daz'mond Patterson notched his first career rushing touchdown with just 1:33 to go.

It was the first easy win of the conference slate for Ohio. It was also the second of three games in 12 days for the Bobcats. Ohio wraps up the flurry Wednesday night when Bowling Green (6-3, 4-1 MAC) visits Peden on Senior Night. Kick off set for 8 p.m. and the game will be broadcast on ESPN2.

"I think it gives us a little momentum going into this next one. We're still in the situation of playing three games in 12 days. We have to get ready for one in six days now," Solich said. "That's not easy."

Ohio played without safety Thad Ingol, cornerback Octavius Leftwich and wide receiver Ryan Clark, who all sat out with injuries. During the game WR Landon Smith broke a bone in his lower right leg, and will see his season end. Solich said Smith will require surgery.

"We're just trying to stay as healthy as we can," the coach said.



Bobcats to face MAC's best defense

Playing for the third time in just 12 days, Ohio University football coach Frank Solich expects his team will be challenged physically.

The fact that the third opponent in the stretch is Bowling Green, well, that just seems like cruel and unusual punishment.

The Falcons bring their nasty, physical, quick defense to Peden Stadium for an 8 p.m. kick-off against the Bobcats Wednesday night. It's a make-or-break type of game for both teams as both Ohio (8-1, 4-1 Mid-American Conference) and Bowling Green (6-3, 4-1 MAC) control its own destinies in the MAC East race.

The schedule-makers did Ohio no favors with this one. Bowling Green is coming in off an extended rest — the Falcons didn't play last weekend — and has had 10 days to diagram, diagnose and game plan for Ohio.

And BG's defense doesn't need extra prep time to be effective. The Falcons have graded out as the best defensive team in the conference this season. The best defense in the league, plus extra prep time, is a formula that is bound to provide Ohio with a challenge.

Solich said the Falcons might be the best defensive club his squad has faced all season.

"This will be, I think, probably the best defense we've played," Solich said Monday. "That's saying a lot. Penn State (Ohio's week one opponent) had a great front seven.

"They're fast...their up-front people are very aggressive," he added. "They penetrate, they have great quickness. They're a ball-hawking unit when it comes to getting the ball in the air.

"They have a great combination of things going for themselves."

Defense has been at the forefront of Bowling Green's current five-game winning streak; the Falcons have allowed just 33 combined points during the stretch while also not allowing any more than 12 points in any one game.

In BG's last two games, the Falcons didn't allow a touchdown in wins over UMass (24-0) and Eastern Michigan (24-3).

"If you look at them the last four or five games, they've really shut people down," Solich said.

It's no fluke. Bowling Green leads the MAC in six major defensive categories including points per game (15.2), yards per game (290.0) and third-down conversion percentage (31.0). The Falcons also rank second in the MAC in sacks (25) and are tied for fourth in turnover margin (+6 for the season, +0.67/game).

The Falcons' quick front seven is paced by senior defensive tackle Chris Jones, who has become the most disruptive defensive player in the conference. Jones leads the nation with 11.5 sacks and is second with 16.0 tackles for loss.

"You obviously have to be aware of where he's at," Solich noted. "But the problem that you have is the other guys surrounding him are also very quick and good pass rushers."

"They do enough movement, with their quickness, to cause most offenses problems."

The Bobcats have stared down top-rated MAC defenses before, however. Specifically, Temple the previous couple of seasons brought a highly-touted defense into late-season match-ups with Ohio only to see the Bobcats reel off big offensive days. The Bobcats, averaging 35.6 points a game and 462.2 yards per contest, simply have to execute at a high level, said quarterback Tyler Tettleton.

"We've been playing good ball, so we just have to keep doing that," he said. "Keep executing, keep moving it on third down, and keep taking care of the ball."

"We're going to have to match their physical play and their aggressiveness, and I think we'll do that."

And as for the Falcons' advantage in prep time? It is what it is, Solich said. Ohio has played a similar slew of games in a two-week window before. The Bobcats won all three games last year under similar circumstances, and won two of three in 2007.

"Not everybody is able to do it. Whether we're able to do it, we'll see," the coach said.

"It's clear you can not look at it as a negative," Solich continued. "You understand what it is. We've been there before, we know what it takes to get it done."

The game is marketed as the 'Bobcat Blackout' and the team will wear an all-black uniform. Solich hopes for a rowdy crowd to help the Bobcats power through.

Senior safety Gerald Moore said it's on the Bobcats themselves, however, to bring the energy. Three games in less than two weeks shouldn't affect Ohio on Senior Night, he said.

"It's not a concern for us," Moore said. "We know we have to grind it out. It's just one of those things. It's rough, but we'll have a break after this one."

Ohio U. lineman inspired by brother injured in Afghanistan

Strength comes from a lot of places. For Scotty Hasting and his brother, Corey, it comes from a bond that extends from the two and through others.

Scotty, shot 14 times in Afghanistan in 2011 and now rehabilitating from his wounds, finds some of his strength to carry on in part from watching Corey, a defensive end for the Ohio University Bobcats.

And Corey draws his strength from Scotty, who now looks forward to Senior Night on Wednesday when the Bobcats (8-1, 4-1 Mid-American Conference) play Bowling Green (6-3, 4-1). Scotty will be there to see his brother play live for the first time at OU's Peden Stadium.

"Ever since we were kids, we kind of fed off of each other," Scotty, 24, said from Fort Riley, Kan., where he has been undergoing rehabilitation that could extend for another year.

"A lot of it has been my wife, too, because I'm only as strong as the people around me. Having Corey around me, my wife, my kids. After I got shot, there were only two options: I could live and push through it, or shut down and become an emotional wreck. I wasn't going to do that."

Yet, he easily could have.

While investigating a hut in Afghanistan, he was surprised and shot by the enemy. Scotty took one bullet through the thigh, four in his hip and five in his shoulder. Four other potentially fatal slugs were buried in his bullet-proof vest. It took four days for him to be transported back to Walter Reed Hospital, where his family, including his wife and brother, were waiting.

"Just seeing him that first night, and having him tell the story, was just unbelievable," said Corey, 22. "Being able to walk into Walter Reed, seeing people without legs, some with half a head, or just one eye, it just humbles you so much. It's like, I go to school for free and play football. And these guys are fighting for our country."

"You might hear, 'These soldiers are fighting for our country.' You don't really realize until it hits home how big of a deal it is actually going on over there."

Corey spent as much time as he could with his older brother through that first year, offering support through his initial recovery.

"I was able to be there when he took his first step," said Corey, who played football at Milford High, outside of Cincinnati. "Being able to see that was overwhelming. We realized it was going to be a tough road for him. But he's handled it so well. All the doctors say he's way ahead of where he should be. He's started running, getting his legs back under him. They expect about 95 to 98 percent recovery."

So while Scotty's wife, Cara, is by his side daily, the whisper in his ear, and the warm hand inside his own, Corey has become the text message outlet for private jokes and encouragement both send back and forth to each other.

Scotty has continued his rehab, watching his brother's games on the Internet. His biggest challenge now is overall strength, and nerve damage in his right hand, limiting its use.

"With nerves, it's weird, and most of my stuff is nerve damage," Scotty said. "You never know with nerves. One day they could be growing nice, then the next day they just stop. Every day my hand gets better, it's a blessing. My specialist says it should get a lot better than what it is right now, so that is what we are hoping for. The main thing is I'm still here."

All of which is a marvel to Corey.

"He's handling it better than I would, that's for sure," Corey said.

"He's open and free to talk about it. He definitely understands it could have been a lot worse, which I think is really good. At first, he was having some night terrors, re-enacting everything. But he's doing really well. He just had a baby, this past April, and that has helped him."

"He got shot in April 2011 and had the baby in April 2012," said Corey, who now wears his brother's dog tags. "So it has been kind of crazy to see how a year can change."

It's been a change for both of them, as during that same span, Corey has gone from walk-on status to a scholarship player and mainstay on the Bobcats' defensive line at 6-1, 260 pounds. As the season wears on, the aches and pains start adding up on the football field, but for Corey, they come with a smile.

"To get a 'Good Luck' text, and 'Good Game' text from my brother before and after games is overwhelming," Corey said. "I write 'For Him' on my cleats. He's with me all the time."

"He just loves watching me play. He's always been my No. 1 fan in everything I've done. I know he would do anything for me if I ever needed it. And he knows when I'm out there, I'm playing for him."

So when Corey sent his brother a text that he had hurt his foot, there was a quick text in response.

"Hey, dude, my hand doesn't work," Scotty said.

Corey knows it will be a special moment Wednesday night.

"To see him, and he's going to walk out on the field with me, too, it will be overwhelming."

And the feeling is much the same from his brother.

"I'm excited, absolutely," Scotty said. "It should be a blast. Every game I watch, I'm excited, but it's going to be even better when I can be there."

"You've got to live every moment. I used to live my life like, yeah, whatever. But now it's like, life can be taken from you in an instant. Now, talking to Corey and my wife, if you want to live forever, live like you will die today."



Bobcats send off seniors with Black Out

Five years ago, Gerald Moore came to Ohio University to play football, and to help build a program.

Now Moore, and his fellow seniors, will play for the final time inside Peden Stadium in a game critical to the continued development of that goal.

Moore and 18 other Bobcat seniors have piled up more wins during their playing careers than any other class in Ohio history. They're hoping for one more tonight when Ohio (8-1, 4-1 MAC) takes on Bowling Green (6-3, 4-1 MAC) in a nationally televised (ESPN2) contest starting at 8 p.m.

It's an elimination game of sorts for both teams. The winner will still control its own destiny in the MAC East chase, while the loser will fall two full games behind division leader Kent State (5-0 MAC) with just games remaining.

Ohio's seniors have won more games than any other group in Bobcat history, but they haven't yet been able to end Ohio's MAC championship drought. The 'Cats haven't won the title since 1968.

Moore said the group talked about forging new ground when they initially came to Athens. Tonight is another chance to keep that dream alive.

"We definitely talk about it," said Moore, a safety and team captain. "It's one of those things that when we came in as a group we wanted to be one of the best classes to play here."

"It's something we've worked for and strived for."

It won't be easy. Bowling Green has the same MAC championship dreams and brings in a confidence-building five-game winning streak and the conference's best defense.

The Falcons have found their identity under Dave Clawson: a lock-down defense with enough offensive creativity to get by.

Bowling Green leads the MAC in every important defensive category, and hasn't given up a touchdown in three weeks. Led by havoc-causing defensive tackle Chris Jones — who leads the nation with 11.5 sacks — the Falcons are giving up a downright stingy 15.3 points per game.

"That's a huge problem," Ohio coach Frank Solich said. "You're going to have few opportunities, when they come you have to be able to take advantage of them."

Bowling Green's offense ranks in the bottom third of the MAC, but Clawson's varied style plus extended prep time will have the Bobcats on their heels at the start. BG comes in off a bye week, while Ohio will be playing for the third time in 12 days.

The Falcons will have plenty of exotic, gadget or trick plays up their sleeve, Moore said.

"It's pretty difficult because they throw a lot at you," he said. "Especially with them having more than a week to prepare for us, you expect them to come out with something new, something different."

Clawson said Ohio's offense will present challenges of its own. The Bobcats' offensive line is capable of blocking the Falcons' quick, swarming front.

And Ohio's balance has helped it pile up 35.6 points and 462.2 yards per game this season. With quarterback Tyler Tettleton able to buy time and extend plays with his legs, the Bobcats are able to force teams to be a little less aggressive.

Add in Ohio's many option looks, and Clawson said even his top-ranked defense

will have a challenge.

"They are very hard to cheat against," Clawson said. "We're playing one the best, and probably most consistent, teams in the MAC over the last four years."

Tettleton is poised to make Ohio history; the junior needs 83 yards and 27 completions to move into first place in both categories in the Ohio record book. Tettleton is already the program's career leader in touchdown passes.

Tettleton didn't want to talk about that, but did say Ohio's offensive line has been good all season and believed they would be able to answer the challenge tonight.

"We have to match their physical play and aggressiveness up front," he said. "I think we will."

Solich believes Ohio will have to play well in all three phases to win, something it did for the first time in a month in last Thursday's 45-14 win over Eastern Michigan.

The coach anticipates a classic battle in the trenches.

"It's a real strength-on-strength match up there," he said.

Ohio is coming in on short rest against a team that has had an extended break. It's a formula that usually adds up to a loss.

But the Bobcats are playing at home. The annual 'Bobcat Black Out' is tonight and fans are encouraged to wear black to match the team's all-black uniform combination (helmet, jersey and pants).

Ohio has had good home support all season and Solich believes that could be a factor tonight in helping his team to another victory.

"It's huge. I don't think every MAC school has a home-field advantage," he said. "We're building that now."



Punting problems puncture Ohio's MAC hopes

Ohio's special season may have been done in by its special teams.

Visiting Bowling Green blocked two punts, and Ohio couldn't get two more punts away, and the Falcons cashed in on the special teams gaffes for 19 points to stop the Bobcats 26-14 inside Peden Stadium on Wednesday night.

An announced crowd of 19,122 came to Peden clad in black as part of a 'Bobcat Blackout' promotion, but instead it was Ohio's Mid-American Conference championship hopes that dimmed. The Bobcats (8-2, 4-2 MAC) have dropped two of their last three games, and saw Senior Night end with just a handful of fans left in the stands to honor the winningest class in program history.

If Ohio wants to win the MAC East, it's going to need a lot of help. The Bobcats trail Bowling Green (7-3, 5-1 MAC) and Kent State (8-1, 5-0 MAC) in the division standings.

"It's always hard to go out like that," said senior safety Gerald Moore. "We just got to keep playing. That's football, that's life."

Bowling Green's MAC-best defense lived up to its billing and held Ohio to just 244 total yards — more than 200 below the Bobcats' average. Ohio started the first half with a 72-yard touchdown drive, and began the second half with a 95-yard touchdown drive, but totaled just 77 yards combined on its other nine possessions.

"It all came down to their defense," said Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton, who became Ohio's career leader in passing yardage with 145 yards on 21 of 34 throws. "That's really about it."

When the Falcons weren't stuffing Ohio, they handed the ball to sophomore running back Anthon Samuel. Samuel responded with a career-high 181 rushing yards and two touchdowns on 29 carries.

"It's obvious we weren't controlling the running game the way we would have liked," Ohio coach Frank Solich said.

But despite those issues, it was the punting game that will earn the bulk of the blame for Ohio's first home loss of the season. Starting punter Grant Venham was blocked twice, and bobbled another punt that led to a fourth-down run that came up short of the marker. With Venham already the victim of two bad punt experiences in the first half, Solich elected to send out place kicker Matt Weller for his first career punt attempt late in the first half.

On that attempt, the snap from Miles Chapman was low and rolled between Weller's legs. Weller fell on the ball in his own end zone for a safety. The play gave Bowling Green a 19-7 lead with just 18 seconds left in the first half.

Without a doubt, Ohio's punt team exploits were an absolute horror show.

"It was all kinds of a nightmare that we didn't just straighten out," Solich said.

Running back Beau Blankenship had 97 yards on 18 carries for Ohio, and was the catalyst in the Bobcats' two scoring drives of the night. On the 'Cats first drive of the game, Ohio ran straight ahead and took a 7-0 lead when Tettleton capped off a 72-yard march with a five-yard touchdown run.

Down 19-7 at the break, Ohio started the third quarter with a 95-yard drive. Tettleton hit Chase Cochran with a three-yard touchdown pass to cap the series, which again featured Blankenship gaining chunks of yardage.

"We were running the ball there," Tettleton said when asked what was different about those two drives.

The second score cut the margin to 19-14 and it appeared Ohio had hope. It disappeared late in the third when Bowling Green collected its second blocked punt after Jude Adjei-Baimah stuffed Venham's rugby-style kick. Samuel plowed in from four yards out seven plays later and Bowling Green led 26-14 with 14:50 remaining.

Ohio's only other drive of note ended at the BG 20 when Tettleton's fourth-down throw to Derek Roback came up 11 yards short of the first down.

"We gave them points off that stuff," Blankenship said. "It put us under more pressure."

Ohio led 7-0 after the first quarter, but BG exploded for 19 points in the second. Samuel scored on a 15-yard run, carrying several tacklers into the end zone, on the first play of the frame to tie it 7-7. The drive started on the Ohio 20 after Brian Sutton came free and blocked Venham for the first time.

Bowling Green went up 14-7 midway through the second when QB Matt Schilz executed a brilliant play-action fake, then found wideout Chris Gallon wide open for a 55-yard touchdown throw.

Tyler Tate added a 35-yard field goal after Venham bobbled a punt snap and couldn't get the kick off for a 17-7 lead with 1:46 to go in the half.

And Weller's aborted punt attempt late in the late the half resulted in a safety.

It was just too many critical special teams mistakes to overcome.

"Special teams were a large part of this," Solich conceded. "We had one punt bobbled, twice...one was a bad snap. And two others where too many guys were coming through the wedge."

Ohio started the season 7-0, hit the top 25 in the national polls, and broke into the BCS rankings. Now, the Bobcats will have to fight for a bowl game. Six teams in the MAC alone are bowl eligible.

"We're not executing at a real high level right now," the coach said. "We have to go back to work."

Bowling Green 26, Ohio University 14: Bobcats outside looking in

ATHENS, Ohio — The Ohio University athletic department declared last night's game against Bowling Green a "Black Out," meaning everyone passing through the turnstiles of Peden Stadium was asked to wear something black in a display of unity.

The Bobcats wore their favorite all-black uniforms that have been something of a lucky charm.

What happened on the field was a blackout of another kind. The lights might have gone out on Ohio's chances of winning a Mid-American Conference East Division championship.

Four gaffes in punt formation by the Bobcats led to two touchdowns, a field goal and safety in a costly 26-14 loss to the Falcons before an announced crowd of 19,122 and a national television audience.

Ohio (8-2, 4-2) trails Kent State by 1 1/2 games and Bowling Green (7-3, 5-1) by one game with two remaining and will need some help to win a fourth division championship since 2006.

It was the Bobcats' third game in 12 days, and they were lethargic.

"The special teams miscues were a large part of this football game," coach Frank Solich said. "The punting game across the board was a negative and a huge problem. We obviously weren't getting things blocked well enough up front."

The night started with promise as the Bobcats drove 72 yards in 11 plays for a touchdown. Quarterback Tyler Tettleton ran 5 yards for a score.

Ohio was never the same after Brian Sutton blocked a punt by Grant Venham with seven seconds left in the first quarter.

The Falcons took over on the Bobcats' 20-yard line and scored in three plays on a 15-yard run by Anthon Samuel.

An impressive ball fake led to Bowling Green's second touchdown, a 55-yard pass from Matt Schilz to Chris Gallon with 7:34 left in the second quarter to make it 14-7.

Ohio's punt team broke down twice more in the second quarter.

On fourth-and-18, Venham dropped a clean snap from center. He had plenty of time to gather himself and kick, but he tried to run for the first down and was stopped after a 4-yard gain.

The Falcons raised their lead to 17-7 with a 35-yard field goal by Tyler Tate with 1:46 left in the half.

The third mistake on a punt resulted when a snap from center skipped between the legs of Matt Weller, the placekicker who replaced Venham.

Weller was tackled in the end zone for a safety with 18 seconds left in the half.

There was hope for a comeback when Ohio drove 95 yards for a touchdown in 14 plays on its first drive of the second half. Tettleton found Chase Cochran for a 3-yard touchdown pass.

But a Venham punt was blocked by Jude Adjei-Barimah of Northland that gave Bowling Green the ball at Ohio's 29. Seven plays later, Samuel ran for a 4-yard touchdown to make it 26-14 with 14:50 left in the fourth quarter.

For the second time in three games, Ohio's offensive line broke down. Tettleton was sacked four times in the first half. A handful of other times he was forced to run out of the pocket.

"It came down to their defense," Tettleton said. "They have an amazing defense, probably the best defense I've played against since I've been here. Everything they did was really good."



Bobcats seek turnaround

The Cardinals are expecting to turn the game into an event.

The Bobcats are hoping it's not a wake for their postseason hopes.

Two teams seemingly traveling in different directions meet Wednesday night as Ohio (8-2, 4-2 Mid-American Conference) visits Muncie, Ind. for a nationally televised tilt against Ball State (7-3, 4-2 MAC).

The Cardinals have won four games in a row, beat two teams from BCS automatic qualifying conferences in the same season for the first time in program history, and play for the first time since a win over then No. 25 Toledo on the road.

The Cardinals are flying high, and want to amp up the atmosphere with a 'Black Out' of their own. Ball State will even be giving a two-year lease on a car during the game at Scheumann Stadium.

Three straight road wins, and a potent two-pronged offense, have second-year coach Pete Lembo feeling good about November.

"Our guys are having fun and responding well," said Lembo.

Ohio, on the other hand, is struggling to pick up the pieces after a gut-wrenching stretch of three games in 12 days. The Bobcats lost the opener in that run, 23-20 at Miami, and then had their MAC championship hopes wiped away with a 26-14 loss on Senior Night to Bowling Green last Wednesday.

Oh yeah, Ohio lost to BG after four punt team failures led to 19 Falcon points.

Ouch.

"Last week hurt," said junior MLB Keith Moore. "But go 1-0 each week. That's been our thing. We have a full week to prepare. We've been getting in the film room, getting out here on the field."

"We're ready."

The Cardinals will make sure to test that Ohio punting unit, which has had four punts blocked this season and another dozen close calls or bobbled snaps. The Bobcats went back to basics with the unit this week and believe they have ironed out the concerns there.

But they won't know for sure until Ball State comes after one.

"Obviously we got to snap the ball well, we got to catch the ball. If we do those two things, I'll feel much more comfortable about what we're doing in the punting game," Ohio coach Frank Solich said.

The Cardinals may elect not to try to block every one of them. Lembo believes Ohio will be ready for that, and besides BSU has the top punt returner in the league in WR Jamill Smith (14.7 per return).

"That coaching staff, as strong as it is, is going to have that rectified," Lembo said.

Even if all the special teams units get passing grades, Ohio will have its work cut out. The Cardinals have one of the most potent offenses in the MAC, and eat up clock like no one else in the conference. BSU leads the league in first downs per game and in time of possession, is second in yards per game, and is averaging 37 points per game in MAC play.

Ohio is also seeking to get its own offense back on track. The Bobcats are coming off a season-low 14 points and 244 total yards against Bowling Green.

QB Tyler Tettleton has been sacked 10 times in the last three games, the wide receiving group has had trouble finding separation in the secondary, and the ground game took a hit this week when RB Ryan Boykin was ruled out for the rest of the season with a knee injury.

The Bobcats have concerns all over the field, and will be playing for the fourth time in 19 days. It's not exactly a formula for success.

"In saying that, I really think we've responded well this week in practice," Solich said.

Ball State hasn't been getting the headlines in the improved MAC this season, but it has quietly put together a solid season.

"I think they might be the best team we've faced," said senior DL Corey Hasting.

The Cardinals have dropped three games this season, but the teams they've lost to (Clemson, Kent State and Northern Illinois) are a combined 27-3 on the season.

Despite that resume Ball State, like Ohio, needs another win or two to feel safe and sure about a bowl game invite.

Whether its extending current momentum, or reversing recent trends, both teams will have plenty invested.

"No doubt, both teams have an awful lot to play for," Lembo said.

Solich realizes Ohio has clinched nothing yet in terms of the postseason. Ohio could still reach a program record 11 wins this season, but that would require wins in its final two regular-season games and then a bowl bid.

Right now, the 'Cats are not sure of playing past the regular-season finale at Kent State on Nov. 23.

"Right now I don't feel comfortable about anything. The only way to make me start to feel comfortable is to win," Solich said when asked if he felt Ohio had locked up a bowl game.

"And that's what we're trying to do."



Falling apart

The loss was the third in four games for Ohio (8-3, 4-3 Mid-American Conference), which has been in free-fall mode since racing out to a 7-0 start and a spot in the top 25 rankings.

"I don't really know how to put it into words," Ohio RB Beau Blankenship said. "This isn't the team that we are. We can play way better than this, we should be playing way better than this. We just got to fix it."

Ball State (8-3, 5-2 MAC) scored the game's final 21 points and racked up 588 total yards. The Cardinals played the entire second half without starting QB Keith Wenning, who hurt an ankle on a reception — via a trick play — in the first half.

Backup Kelly Page hit on 5 of 7 passes for 41 yards and two touchdowns, and rushed for a third score. BSU had two backs hit 100 yards as Jahwan Edwards (169 yards on 17 carries) and Horactio Banks (14-135) plowed through the Ohio defense.

Ohio played the entire second half without starting defensive tackles Neal Huynh and Carl Jones, who both suffered apparent ankle injuries on the same play in the first half.

"It's huge. That's our two inside guys, two great senior leaders on the d-line," said senior DE Corey Hasting, the lone starter on the DL remaining from the start of the season. "We could have done a lot of things better. We just couldn't tackle very well tonight."

Ohio trailed just 31-27 with 12:15 remaining after Matt Weller converted a 34-yard field goal. But the Bobcats had 30-yards in penalties on the ensuing kickoff, which helped BSU start the drive on the Ohio 23. On the next play, Banks broke several tackles on a 23-yard touchdown run to push it to 38-27 and the rout was on.

Backup Derrius Vick replaced starter Tyler Tettleton on the next Ohio series, a three-and-out, and Ball State responded with Page's 13-yard touchdown pass to Zane Fakes for a 45-27 lead.

Tettleton returned on the next series. Solich said his QB was banged up earlier, Tettleton didn't agree.

"I don't know, you're going to have to ask coach Solich about that. I don't know what happened," Tettleton said.

Tettleton rushed for 47 yards and hit on 22 of 30 passes for 236 yards. He was also sacked four times, including on the final play of the first half deep inside Ball State territory. Ohio tried to get off a field goal attempt after the sack — which was a similar situation to that at the end of Ohio's loss at Miami — but officials blew the play dead for the end of the first half before Weller could get the kick off.

Ohio trailed 21-17 at the time. After two separate reviews, the officiating crew ruled that Ohio would not get a chance to kick it.

Solich defended the decision to try one more play, again without a time out, saying he thought his team would need touchdowns not field goals to win.

Tettleton said he was aware of the situation, but there was nothing he could do.

"Just can't take a sack. It was one of those things where I took three (steps) and there was a guy right in my face. There really was nothing I could do," Tettleton said.

Blankenship piled up 161 rushing yards for Ohio and three touchdowns. He scored on a 58-yarder early in the third to put Ohio up 24-21, but Ball State scored

the next 10 points to grab the lead for good.

After Banks' TD run early in the fourth, it appeared the Bobcats wilted down the stretch.

"The second half was not good and things continued to mount on us there. As the game went on, we tackled and blocked worse," Solich said.

"When you do that, things are going to really cave in on you."

Ohio wraps up the regular season on Nov. 23 at Kent State.



Bobcats trying to ramp back up for Flashes

The last time the Bobcats were on the football field, Ball State was running the ball up and down the field.

It's something junior middle linebacker Keith Moore would prefer not to think about.

"I don't even want to talk about last week," he said Monday. "That was disappointing."

Disappointing is a pretty good summation of Ohio's last month. The Bobcats (8-3, 4-3 Mid-American Conference) have lost three of their last four games, and appeared to hit bottom last Wednesday in a 52-27 loss to the Cardinals.

For a team that started the year 7-0, the setback was shocking. But the task facing Ohio and head coach Frank Solich now is to not let that define the team moving forward.

Ohio will be playing for redemption, among other things, Friday when it travels to No. 23 Kent State (10-1, 7-0 MAC) for an 11 a.m. kickoff on ESPNU. The Bobcats aren't guaranteed a postseason game yet, but could essentially lock up a bowl bid with an upset over the Golden Flashes.

The Bobcats could certainly use a lift.

"What we're after is to finish our regular season with a win, and that would, I think, make us feel fairly good about things," Solich said. "We've gone through a stretch where we don't feel good about what we got done."

"But ending it with a win would be big for us."

Ohio gave the players a couple days off after the Ball State loss. It was needed after the Bobcats competed in four games in 19 days. It's hoped that the respite will put some spring back in the step of the beleaguered roster, which has been hamstrung with serious injuries all season.

"I think (the recent schedule) had an effect and that it showed in the second half (at Ball State)," Solich said. "We just didn't seem to have enough to keep going."

"We're hoping the rest will do us good and we'll have the energy to play four quarters," he added. "It's going to have to be that way because Kent is a very, very good football team."

Senior safety Gerald Moore said he believes the Bobcats have the mental makeup to bounce back strong.

"I don't think we have a team that lingers on wins or losses. You got to look forward to the next game you play," he said. "I think a lot of guys are looking forward to this next game and redeeming ourselves a little bit."

Top 25 foes

Friday's game will be the 16th time Ohio has faced a top 25 team. The Flashes were ranked No. 23 in the BCS Standings and AP poll this week, and clocked in at No. 25 in the Coaches Poll.

Ohio is 0-15 all-time against Top 25 opponents. Ohio's last match-up against a Top 25 team resulted in a 43-7 loss at No. 2 Ohio State on Sept. 18, 2010.

"That adds a little bit to the situation," Gerald Moore said.

For the first time since 2003, the MAC has two teams in the top 25 rankings at the

same time. Northern Illinois (10-1, 7-0 MAC) is No. 23 in the Coaches Poll, and No. 24 in the AP poll this week.

Kent State and NIU are already locked into place as the conference's division champions, and will meet in the MAC Championship game on Nov. 30 at Ford Field in Detroit.

All told, four MAC teams have reached the Top 25 this season; Ohio and Toledo also broke into the rankings earlier this season.

"We always feel good about MAC schools breaking into the top 25. I think that's just great for the conference, and this year there's been (four)," Solich said. "I don't know if that's been done in the MAC before but it's certainly not been done since I've been here."

Injury update

Solich played it close to the vest regarding Ohio's two most pressing injury issues for the Kent game. Starting defensive tackles Neal Huynh and Carl Jones both left the Ball State game with lower leg injuries.

"One of them will definitely be out, the other may have a shot. It will probably be a game-day kind of decision," Solich said.

So which is which?

"I'll tell you on game day."

Also impacting the depth chart on the defensive line is the fact that redshirt junior Kendrick Davis has been dismissed from the roster, Solich confirmed Monday. The coach said Davis, who has played in 17 games the last two seasons, was removed for an unspecified violation of team rules and/or policies.

Defensive end Tremayne Scott (foot), who has missed eight straight games, is out again this week.

Tight end Troy Hill, dinged up at Ball State, was a full participant in practice on Monday and should be able to play.



Bobcats thumped 28-6 at Kent State

KENT, Ohio — It was the day after Thanksgiving but the Bobcats got a head start on Christmas.

Ohio gift-wrapped two early touchdowns for the opposition, and the Golden Flashes' defense took it from there as No. 23 Kent State stomped the Bobcats 28-6 Friday afternoon inside Dix Stadium.

Kent State returned a fumble, and then an interception, for two defensive touchdowns before the game was 10 minutes old, and cruised from there. The Flashes (11-1, 8-0 Mid-American Conference) became the first undefeated MAC East champion since 2003 and picked up a 10th consecutive win.

Kent State will play Northern Illinois (11-1, 8-0 MAC) for the MAC Champion-ship next Friday at Ford Field in Detroit.

For Ohio it was more of the same during a season-ending funk. The Bobcats (8-4, 4-4 MAC) lost for the fourth time in their last five games. The preseason MAC favorite fell behind early, had three-fifths of the offensive line wiped out by injury, and saw quarterback Tyler Tettleton sacked eight times in what was another ugly trip to Kent.

"The early part of the game was disasterous for us," Ohio coach Frank Solich said. "The two turnovers that got points on the board for them...were tough. It was a poor start."

Ohio fell to 0-16 all-time against Top 25 opponents. The Bobcats haven't won at Kent State since 2008, and haven't scored a touchdown in its last 10+ quarters inside Dix Stadium. Ohio's last touchdown on the Flashes' home field came from Chris Garrett, with just under 13 minutes left in the second quarter back in 2008.

Ohio drove the ball inside the Kent State four times. Twice Ohio settled for Matt Weller field goals, and twice the Bobcats turned the ball over on downs.

"We were not able to put points on the board although we did have drives. But we were not able to finish those drives off," Solich said.

Ohio bottled up KSU dynamo Dri Archer — the junior running back had a pedestrian (for him) 111 yards rushing and receiving on 15 touches. Backfield partner Trayion Durham finished with 97 yards on 16 carries.

Flashes' QB Spencer Keith had 170 yards and a touchdown, with an interception, while hitting just 9 of 20 passes.

But it was the KSU defense, and Ohio's continued injury issues, which stole the day.

On the game's first series, LB Luke Wollet scooped up a fumble at midfield and rumbled 50 yards the other way for a defensive score to put KSU on top 7-0 with 13:02 left in the first quarter.

After three straight punts by the two teams, Spencer hooked up with Eric Adeyemi for a 44-yard gain down the sideline. Two plays later, Durham bulled into the end zone for a 15-yard score.

Ohio's fourth offensive series ended when Tettleton was picked off by C.J. Malauulu on the first play of the drive. Malauulu picked his way down the left sideline behind a caravan of blockers for the 33-yard interception return touchdown.

There was 5:49 still on the first quarter clock, but Ohio's chances at staging a comeback were essentially ended when three starters on the offensive line — right tackle Ryan McGrath, right guard Eric Herman and left guard Vince Carlotta — all

left the game with injury. McGrath broke his leg and was taken to Columbus for surgery. Carlotta suffered a concussion, and likely will not play again this season. Herman suffered damage in his elbow.

At the end of the game, Ohio was without 10 of its projected 22 starters. With McGrath, 14 Ohio players have had season-ending surgery. The number of front-line players — first teamers and key backups — lost for the season or significant stretches with injury for Ohio is now at 22.

"It's just gut-wrenching seeing my o-linemen get hurt like that," Ohio RB Beau Blankenship said. "We had some people step up and do great jobs today but those guys, I'm close to them and I love them. It's hard to see."

Ohio started the day without DT Neal Huynh, who was hurt last week at Ball State. Whether it's offense or defense, no aspect of the Bobcat squad has been spared from injury this season.

"Losing three o-linemen in one game, that hurts you," senior defensive lineman Corey Hasting said. "You saw today what happened."

What happened was Kent State pinned its ears back and flustered Tettleton throughout. The eight sacks were the most Ohio allowed since a 2010 loss to the Flashes.

Tettleton hit 21 of 37 throws for 232 yards and an interception. But he was taken down for sacks six times on third down. Ohio was held out of the end zone for the first time all season.

"(Tettleton) was under a fair amount of pressure today, and there were times when maybe he bailed out of the pocket when maybe he shouldn't have. Maybe he should have thrown the ball away a couple times," Solich said. "But I think we all have a share in what happened."

Blankenship picked up his eighth 100-yard game of the season with 145 yards on 29 carries. The junior became Ohio's single-season rushing record holder as well; Blankenship has 1,500 yards this year, and passed the old mark of 1,434 yards set by Kalvin McRae in 2007.

The record was the last thing on his mind, however.

"Not right now. I just heard I got it. That's way secondary to winning and this loss really hurts," he said.

After the early barrage, Ohio tried to whittle its way back into it. The Bobcats pulled to within 21-3 at the end of the first quarter on Weller's 33-yard field goal, then made it 21-6 when Weller hit a 41-yard 15 seconds before halftime.

But the Bobcats could get no closer.

Kent State put the game out of reach in the fourth as Keith hit Adeyemi with a 24-yard touchdown pass that made it 28-6 with 11:44 to go.

At 8-4, it appears Ohio is in good shape to make a bowl game. But after the last five weeks — between the injuries and losses — do they want to go to one?

"We all want to go to a bowl game. It's up to other people to have us go, but I feel we can play and we want to play. Hopefully we get the opportunity to," Blankenship said.

Solich said if the Bobcats get selected, they'll play.

"I'm not making a case. We're what we are. We got eight wins," he said. "We're a banged up football team, but we'll go with what the bowls see and how they feel and we'll go from there."



Bobcats brought down by injury bug

Tonight, the pairings for 35 college football bowl games will be announced. They will come in bits and pieces — with the biggest (BCS) games first and then the smaller, less-expensive bowls following suite once they know who's available.

The Ohio Bobcats hope to be playing again this season. Despite a solid 8-4 record, Ohio is left waiting after an end-of-the-season swoon that saw the Bobcats drop four of their last five games.

It was not the way Ohio saw the season unfolding four months ago. But then again, the Bobcats never thought they would have to endure the physical turmoil that has engulfed the roster since the start of August.

The Bobcats were preseason favorites to win the Mid-American Conference, and started the season 7-0. But it came apart at the seams down the stretch.

Why? The answer is simple. Injuries, and a condensed late schedule, pillaged Ohio of talent, depth and confidence. During the critical month of the season — November — the Bobcats appeared to have nothing left in the tank.

Injuries are a part of football. Depth matters. And it's true all teams have to weather some ailments along the way.

But Ohio's potential dream season turned awry thanks to a nightmarish scramble on the depth chart that proved to be too much to overcome. Three of Ohio's four losses came in a 19-day span; the condensed schedule from mid-week football didn't help.

"You can only keep moving on," said senior safety Gerald Moore a month ago. "I mean, we haven't had our whole team this whole season. But you have to keep going, keep working and find a way."

Ohio eventually ran out of answers. Critics are right to point out that missing personnel didn't solely cause some of the losses. The late-game gaffe at Miami, the punting mishaps versus Bowling Green, and the two turnovers early at Kent are all huge, impactful moments.

But how would the rest of those games played out if Ohio had been in better physical condition? Would the Bobcats had been able to create more offense against Bowling Green if more players were available, and it wasn't playing for the third time in 12 days? Would the secondary have given up one less long passing touchdown at Miami if it weren't without three of its projected preseason starters?

The 2012 season will be remembered as a 'what-if?' year for the Bobcats.

"It's just unfortunate that we've had the kind of injuries that we've had this year," Ohio coach Frank Solich said after the loss at Kent State on Nov. 23. "Sometimes those years come along. This one was a bit much."

How bad was it? Only 10 of Ohio's 22 opening day starters were able to play in all 12 games this season. By halftime at Kent State, the Bobcats had 10 preseason projected starters out.

Since the beginning of fall camp in August, 14 Ohio players have had their seasons end with surgery. Of the 14, 11 were either starters or players who were regular (or expected) to be contributors.

The number of Bobcats who missed two or more games this year, or had surgery, is at 25. If you took a count of the number of players who missed or sat out a single game, the tally is above 30.

And even that estimate doesn't take into account some players. Defensive tackle Carl Jones, for instance, played in all 12 games this season, but left three different games with injury. OLB Jelani Woseley played in all 12 games, but battled through a knee injury that limited practice time and game time.

QB Tyler Tettleton missed just one game this season, but his abdomen injury clearly affected his play a game or two longer after his return to the lineup. Leading receiver Donte Foster missed just one complete game, but thumb and back injuries certainly impacted his ability at times to make plays and finish games.

Solich was left perplexed at times this year to try to explain some rotten luck in terms of the injury count. He believes the program's training staff, and strength and conditioning staff aren't to blame.

In short, sometimes you're just unlucky.

"We've looked at a lot of things," Solich explained. "The injuries have not occurred in one place, or just been on our field or opposing teams' fields or the practice field. A few have come in practice, but most have come in games."

"We had a lot of broken bones actually as far as those injuries are concerned. I don't know if, in this game, there is much you can do about that," he added.

Listed below are some of the key personnel losses for Ohio this season. They are broken down into groupings, and it should be kept in mind that this is not a comprehensive list. Many walk-ons, freshmen redshirt players and others that didn't directly affect the game day depth chart are not listed here.

For instance, only 11 players are listed in the surgery list. Solich has said 13 players, 14 with RT Ryan McGrath at Kent State, have had procedures done in season. I listed only the players I had confirmed directly that had a procedure during the season.

Ohio lands bowl bid

The Bobcats' 2012 season isn't over yet.

The Ohio University football team accepted a bid to play in the 2012 AdvoCare V100 Independence Bowl on Sunday night. It will be the fourth-straight bowl game appearance for Ohio (8-4, 4-4 Mid-American Conference) and the fifth in the last seven seasons.

Ohio will face Louisiana-Monroe (8-4) in the Independence Bowl, held in Shreveport, La., on Friday, Dec. 28 at 2 p.m. The game will be broadcast live by ESPN.

Ohio coach Frank Solich said Sunday, through a released statement, that his team was thrilled to participate. Ohio has lost four of its last five games this season, and there was some speculation that the Bobcats may be on the outside when it came to selection Sunday.

"For over 25 years this has been one of the premier bowl games in the country and I couldn't be happier for our team," Solich said. "Louisiana-Monroe has had a very good season and we're certain that this game will be a great matchup."

Ohio has never appeared in the Independence Bowl. The Bobcats are 1-5 all-time in bowl games, and claimed the program's first bowl win last December with a 24-23 win over Utah State in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

The bowl game will be the first in program history for UL-Monroe, which accepted its invite to the game on Saturday. The Warhawks will be playing less than two hours from their home campus. It's a fitting end to the season for UL-Monroe, which posted a winning season for the first time in 19 years as a FBS program.

The Independence Bowl is normally contracted to fill its games with representatives from the SEC and ACC conferences. But with a lack of available teams from those two leagues, bowl organizers cut deals with the MAC and the Sun Belt Conference. The estimated per team payout from the bowl is expected to be \$1.15 million, which would make it the most lucrative bowl Ohio has ever played in. It is unknown at this time whether the payout will remain the same or if the figure was specific to representatives from the SEC and ACC.

It will be the second time in three seasons Ohio has finished the year in Louisiana. Ohio also played in the 2010 New Orleans Bowl against another Sun Belt foe in Troy.

"I've been to this bowl several times and it will be a great experience for our student-athletes and fans," said Ohio Director of Athletics Jim Schaus. "With this being our fourth-consecutive bowl game, this shows that our football program is continuing to build toward a successful future."

Ohio started the season 7-0, and crested at No. 23 in the country in the national polls and Bowl Championship Series standings. But injuries dogged the team all season, and the Bobcats fell off the pace down the stretch when they lost four of their final five games.

The Warhawks, coached by Todd Berry, also started their season with a flourish as they upset then No. 8 Arkansas in the season opener. UL-Monroe finished 6-2 and tied for second in the Sun Belt.

"These are two dynamic football teams that will be a great addition to the long list of great teams that have played in the Independence Bowl," Independence Bowl Chairman Jack Andres said.

Selection Sunday was another banner day for the MAC, in what has become the conference's best football season to date. For the first time ever, a MAC team was selected to take part in one of the five BCS Bowl games as Northern Illinois will face Florida State in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 2013.

All seven bowl-eligible MAC teams were given bowl invitations on Sunday. The seven bowl games is a new record for the conference, which has had five bowl teams on four different occasions. The MAC was 4-1 in five bowl games a year ago, and is 7-3 in its last 10 bowl games overall.

Besides Ohio and Northern Illinois, Kent State (GoDaddy.com Bowl), Toledo (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl), Ball State (Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl, Bowling Green (Military Bowl) and Central Michigan (Little Caesar's Pizza Bowl) accepted bowl invitations.

"The commitment of the student-athletes to excel has earned them this opportunity," said Dr. Jon Steinbrecher, Commissioner of the Mid-American Conference. "I am very excited for our bowl lineup and I look forward to watching the MAC teams compete this bowl season."

The 2012 season ended on a strong note for the MAC as both Northern Illinois (No. 15) and Kent State (No. 25) ended the year ranked in the BCS Standings. Four different MAC teams have been ranked nationally by the BCS, AP, or USA Today Coaches polls this season — NIU, Kent State, Toledo and Ohio.

The MAC also set a record with 16 non-conference wins against FBS foes, including eight wins against teams from BCS automatic qualifying conferences — Penn State, Iowa, Indiana from the Big Ten; Cincinnati, Rutgers, South Florida and UConn from the Big East, and Kansas from the Big XII.



Independence Bowl offers Bobcats chance at good finish

Ohio's 2012 football season didn't play out the way the Bobcats hoped.

But with an invitation to play in the 2012 Independence Bowl, Ohio has a unique opportunity to end the campaign on a high note.

Simply put, Ohio has never played in a bowl game with the history or prestige, or potential payout, of the Independence Bowl. The Bobcats (8-4) will face UL-Monroe (8-4) in the bowl on Friday, Dec. 28 at 2 p.m. in Shreveport, La.

The bowl trip will be the fifth in seven seasons for Ohio, and gives the Bobcats a bowl game for a fourth straight year. It's a needed salve after the Bobcats lost four of their last five games under an season-long avalanche of injuries.

"We definitely deserve it. Over the course of the season we've had a lot of injuries," said Ohio senior safety Gerald Moore. "It hurts."

"But we definitely still earned the right...it's something that we've worked for."

The Independence Bowl will be Ohio's seventh bowl game in program history, and easily the most recognizable of Ohio's postseason destinations in the modern era. The bowl originated in 1976, and has a history of featuring some of the most notable programs in the country.

Since 2000 alone, teams like Alabama, South Carolina, Georgia, Texas A&M, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Iowa State, Missouri and North Carolina have played in the game.

"I remember growing up as a kid watching Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, play (in the bowl)," Ohio quarterback Tyler Tettleton said. "I'm just excited to be playing this type of bowl game."

It's something Tettleton couldn't say in the past three years when Ohio played in the Little Caesar's Pizza, New Orleans, and Famous Idaho Potato Bowls.

Ohio coach Frank Solich is familiar with the bowl and the venue as well. In 2002, Solich led Nebraska against Ole Miss in the Independence Bowl. Ole Miss, behind Eli Manning, won 27-23.

"It's a storied bowl with a lot of great history," Solich said. "If you look back at the teams that have played in that bowl, you'll see some outstanding programs have through there and played in many of their games."

Ohio will be just the third Mid-American Conference team to play in the Independence Bowl. Miami lost 17-13 to Iowa State in 2004, and Northern Illinois dropped a 17-10 decision to La. Tech in 2008.

The game also has the potential to be least painful for Ohio financially. Ohio Director of Athletics Jim Schaus said Ohio would "not be on the hook" for any number of tickets and that he was "confident we'll be able to put our expenses inside the allocation that we have from the conference."

The payout for the Independence Bowl is listed at \$1.15 million per team, but that figure is what is agreed to for the team's contracted conference partners — in this case the SEC and ACC. As a 'free agent' fill in for the bowl slot — as is the case with UL-Monroe — Schaus said he wasn't sure Monday what Ohio's payout may be but was certain it would be lower than the payout contracted to the SEC and ACC.

"When the SEC plays the (ACC), those payouts go to those leagues and they have to take tickets out of it. There's a lot of other infrastructure involved in it," Schaus said. "But those teams are not in it, and we don't get the same amount of money."

The MAC contracts with the Independence Bowl to fill one of its openings. The MAC then distributes that revenue, part of a pool collected from all the conference's bowl game contracts, to its member institutions to cover bowl expenses, Schaus said.

"The conference gives us money to travel. I'm going to guess that \$400,000 is a pretty good estimate in this case," Schaus said. "In addition to that, we get tickets. Those tickets are things we can sell to our fans, we could give those to our students, we can use those tickets as want. We're not really on the hook for those tickets."

Ohio is just one of seven MAC teams to get bowl invites this season, a new conference record. The MAC also made history when Northern Illinois (12-1) received an automatic berth in the BCS and garnered a spot in the Orange Bowl.

Like others, the Bobcats were surprised at the criticism levied against NIU on Sunday — most venomously from ESPN's cadre of talking heads.

"It was really shocking to see that," Tettleton said. "They had a heck of a season and are well-deserving."

Solich wasn't shy in his support of the Huskies. He had NIU at No. 14 in his last coaches' poll ballot.

"I think they have the right combination of things to be an outstanding bowl football team. I'm very excited for (NIU), as our conference is," Solich said.

"Let's just see how it plays out. I say 'Go Huskies.'"

MAC commissioner Jon Steinbrecher said during a media conference call Sunday night that the conference anticipates a minimum of \$12 million to come back to the non-automatic qualifying pool as a result of NIU's appearance in a BCS bowl. That pool is shared by every league that does not have an automatic BCS berth (MAC, Sun Belt, Conference-USA, ect.).

Steinbrecher said the MAC can expect to see two-thirds of that amount, or roughly \$8. He said conference officials are working through a formula on how to manage the influx. Conference university presidents will meet later this week to finalize a distribution plan.

Ohio, like every other MAC school, will receive a cut.

"Every one of our schools will benefit as a result of this," Steinbrecher said.

Two starters out

Solich confirmed Monday that two starters on the offensive line will miss the bowl game.

Right tackle Ryan McGrath suffered a broken leg in the regular-season finale at Kent State. Left guard Vince Carlotta suffered a concussion. Neither will be available for the bowl game, Solich said.

A third starter up front, right guard Eric Herman, is questionable with an elbow injury.

Ohio University football: Bobcats are seeking to heal bodies, spirits

It might feel more like training camp than Christmas break when Ohio University safety Gerald Moore begins preparation for the Independence Bowl this week.

Moore missed games against Miami University and Eastern Michigan because of a high ankle sprain, and he hasn't been at full speed since before the season started. He is one of 25 Bobcats players who missed two games or more because of injuries.

The bowl game against Louisiana-Monroe on Dec. 28 in Shreveport, La., will give Moore one last chance to show what he can do when healthy.

"The ankle should be pretty good by the time the game rolls around," Moore said. "I've been getting treatment to get my flexibility back, and resting. I haven't been doing a lot of running. I'm excited about playing in this game."

Defensive lineman Carl Banks also could be returning to the lineup, but Ohio (8-4) won't be anywhere close to 100 percent for the bowl game. Fourteen players — 11 starters — have been lost to season-ending injuries.

Moore, a senior, should have sat out the final five games to heal, but he returned for a game against Bowling Green on Nov. 7.

"It wasn't a normal sprain, and the diagnosis was I'd be out for six weeks," he said. "I came back after two weeks because I wanted to play. I'm a co-captain and I saw two other co-captains go down with season-ending injuries. I just decided to deal with it. There were limitations. I couldn't push off on the ankle and I couldn't make the sharp cuts. I couldn't run after people."

Injuries and a schedule that had Ohio playing three games in 12 days were the biggest factors in the team going from 7-0 and ranked 23rd in the Associated Press poll to losing four of its final five games.

Quarterback Tyler Tettleton said the players know a victory in a bowl game can be redemption.

In 2011, the Bobcats blew a 20-0 halftime lead in losing 23-20 to Northern Illinois in the Mid-American Conference championship game. They came back to defeat Utah State 24-23 in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

The victory in the bowl jump-started Ohio for spring and preseason practices. The result was a stunning 24-14 victory over Penn State in the season opener.

"This is another opportunity to end the season on good note," Tettleton said. "Just being able to get back on the practice field with the guys is a great thing. Losing four of five games was tough. I think our minds have to be on erasing all that stuff from our minds. We want to get the

program back on track."

The strain of the losing streak showed on Tettleton's face during interviews.

"I'm doing well," he said. "This game is another chance for us to show what we can do. It's another chance to guide the team. I think everyone is excited about this game."

Louisiana-Monroe (8-4) will be difficult to defeat. The Warhawks upset Arkansas 34-31 in overtime in their opener and finished in a three-way tie for second place behind Arkansas State in the Sun Belt Conference.

The team is led by junior quarterback Kolton Browning and senior receiver Brent Leonard. Browning has passed for 2,830 yards and 27 touchdowns and is completing 64.8 percent of his passes. Leonard has caught 97 passes for 1,042 yards and 10 touchdowns.

The Warhawks have won seven of their past nine games.



ULM QB has familiar feel for Bobcats

As the Ohio Bobcats begin, in earnest, to prepare for the 2012 Independence Bowl, a large component of their defensive game plan will center on figuring out a way to slow down Louisiana-Monroe quarterback Kolton Browning.

Ohio won't have to go far to find a reasonable facsimile of the Warhawks' signal-caller. The Bobcats have one in their own locker room.

Nothing more than a cursory glance is needed to see the similarities between Browning and Ohio junior QB Tyler Tettleton. Whether it's body type, skillset, or recruiting background, the two quarterbacks will provide mirror-like reflections of one another in an intriguing Independence Bowl match-up.

"Yeah, a lot of similarities there," said Ohio coach Frank Solich. "Both guys can throw it well, and run it well."

And both have produced at a high level. In 25 games as the Bobcat starter, Tettleton has amassed 6,787 yards of total offense (passing and rushing) and accounted for 59 touchdowns (passing and rushing).

Browning, who differs in that he's left-hander, is a three-year starter for ULM. In 35 starts, he's tallied a whopping 9,124 yards of total offense and 74 touchdowns.

Neither is an old-school drop-back passer. Browning has led the Warhawks in rushing attempts in three straight seasons, and has 1,269 career rushing yards with 16 rushing touchdowns. Tettleton has been nearly as active with his legs, with 868 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns in the past two seasons.

That ability to make plays on the run, or with their arms (both have career completion percentages above 60 percent), have elevated the duo to near the top of their respective conferences.

"Both are great runners. And both are great passers," Ohio MLB Keith Moore said. "We see it with Tyler every day. (Browning) is going to be a great challenge."

Browning was the Sun Belt Conference Offensive Player of the Year in 2012 with his best collegiate season to date. He completed 64.8 percent of his throws, with 27 touchdowns and seven interceptions, for 2,830 yards and a rating of 145.2.

Tettleton's 2012 was fine by any measurement (62 percent, 2,513 yards, 16 touchdowns and 3 interceptions), but his 2011 breakout season was even better than Browning's showing this fall.

In '11, Tettleton finished with a passer rating of 148.6 after hitting 64.3 percent of his throws for 3,302 yards and 28 touchdowns with just 10 interceptions.

"The thing about both guys is how athletic they are. They can really run," said Ohio defensive coordinator Jimmy Burrow. "And (ULM) will utilize (Browning) a lot in the run game."

"He'll get in empty and if they think you're flat-out blitzing, they'll check to a quarterback run. He'll run bootlegs with the option to run or pass," he added. "It's a lot to prepare for."

Browning (6-foot-1, 194 pounds) and Tettleton (6-0, 200 pounds) also share a similar trajectory this season. Both were instrumental in early season eye-opening wins; Browning guided ULM in an upset over then No. 8 Arkansas while Tettleton was clutch down the stretch in a road win at Penn State in week one.

Both got banged up during the season. Tettleton missed one game, and seemed less than 100 percent in at least two other games. Browning, likewise, only played in 11 games this season because of injury.

And while both are starting to get recognized nationally for their ability — CBS Sports named the Independence Bowl the ninth-best bowl match up because of the quarterback battle — neither was a hot recruit out of high school.

Tettleton had limited offers coming out of Norman North (Okla.) High School, and was listed as a two-start recruit. He played as a 'Wildcat' quarterback at Ohio as a true freshmen in 2009, but then redshirted in 2010.

Browning, from Mabank, Texas (60 miles east of Dallas) was also a slightly overlooked two-star recruit out of high school. He redshirted in 2009, then was thrown in the fire as the starter in coach Todd Berry's no-huddle offense.

Both have shown they can play with toughness and intelligence, and are the driving forces behind their teams' respective offenses.

Everything the Bobcats have seen on film from Browning reminds them of their own team captain — and in Corey Hasting's case another famous former college quarterback.

"He's fast, he's tough. He'll run you over if you're in his way. He's got a great arm, he's accurate. I think he's just a left-handed Tyler," said Ohio's senior defensive lineman.

"And he wears the (no.) 15, so he's kind of like Tim Tebow at the same time."



The MAC's rise to prominence

With impatience at epidemic levels these days, you can make the case that all coaching careers should be measured in dog years. But that's especially true in the Mid-American Conference, where bad coaches don't last and good coaches don't stay.

Lately, there have been more good coaches than ever. A league that is home to the Cradle of Coaches, Miami (Ohio), needs a lot bigger cradle. And a better nickname, because "Nursery of Coaches" just doesn't cut it.

But it's true. There are 13 head coaches among the AQ conferences who list a MAC school on their head coaching résumés. The list spans from Nick Saban of Alabama, who spent one season at Toledo in 1991, to Darrell Hazell, who left Kent State (11-2) last week for Purdue.

No other non-AQ conference has sent more than six head coaches to the AQ schools. That's how many former MAC head coaches have been hired in the last year. And that's no coincidence. The league is playing football as well as it has in recent memory.

MAC schools won 16 nonconference games this season, a league record. Four teams reached the Top 25 over the course of the season. And, of course, No. 15 Northern Illinois (12-1) became the first team to qualify for a BCS bowl. The Huskies will play Florida State in the Discover Orange Bowl, although they will be without head coach Dave Doeren. He hightailed it to North Carolina State.

Ohio head coach Frank Solich is the dean of the league. He just finished his eighth season with the Bobcats, who reached No. 24 in the BCS this season. A 7-0 start dissipated into an 8-4 finish after season-ending injuries to 14 players.

"When I first came into the league, it had good coaches," Solich said. "It was able to attract quarterbacks. It was able to attract wide receivers. The style of offense being played gave you a chance."

Ben Roethlisberger played at Miami. Dan LeFevour threw for nearly 13,000 yards at Central Michigan. The league still has quarterbacks. Jordan Lynch of Northern Illinois (4,733 yards) outgained Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Manziel of Texas A&M and everyone else.

"Players want to be part of exciting football," Solich said. "Some of the scores, as you well know, are 48-46."

The easiest way to compete against superior talent is to spread the field and make it harder to use that talent. When it comes to playing better teams, said Bill Cubit, fired last month after eight seasons at Western Michigan, "There's no way you're going to be able to run the ball against these guys. So you had to come up with a plan just to compete with those teams. A lot of people in this league, it was either the spread or just throwing the ball."

Offense was good. Offense still is good. But something has changed in the MAC over the last three seasons. It could be as simple as hiring the right young coaches. Hazell and Doeren came from top jobs on Big Ten staffs, stayed for two seasons and continued climbing the ladder. But there's more to it. They came to the MAC, and they got noticed.

A year after Dr. Jon A. Steinbrecher took over as MAC commissioner in March 2009, he convened a committee to raise the league's competitiveness and its profile. One of the biggest changes they made is in scheduling.

He urged them to make more home-and-home deals and play fewer paycheck games. Western Michigan played 18 AQ schools over the last six seasons. Northern Illinois played 12. If his teams played AQ opponents, Steinbrecher urged his schools to read the standings first -- less Wisconsin, more Kansas.

"If you're 8-4 in this league a couple of years back, you had a heck of a year," Cubit said. "Everybody was playing those BCS teams. Western is still doing it, but some of these teams are getting smarter and not doing it as much, giving themselves a chance."

Steinbrecher urged his members to move their nonconference games to the first five weeks of the season. That made conference games available for ESPN in mid-week during November.

"It provides just a wonderful window into our universe, quite frankly, for football fans across the country," Steinbrecher said. "Our coaches speak very consistently to the visibility it affords their programs. The fact that over the past two or three years, if you watched our league race play out, it has played out on national TV."

And it's made for just outstanding theater."

Solich said you can't overestimate the effect it's had among recruits, both in Ohio, the breadbasket of MAC recruiting, and across the nation. Solich began rattling off the home states of his players, from California to Oklahoma to New York to Florida. He said TV helps in Ohio, too.

"Whether you're playing once on it or you're on it five times, people know the MAC's on TV and you're able to go around the country and recruit," Solich said. "It even worked better for us in the state of Ohio. We had a tough time, when I first got here, getting recruits to come down and visit us. They had to pass so many MAC schools. Now that's not the case. We're winning. We're on TV. Our facilities are getting better."

Ohio is building a \$15 million indoor practice facility. Soon every MAC school will have one. That's as deep into the arms race as the MAC is likely to get. Coaches like Solich and Cubit, who come to the MAC and stay, will be the exception, for the most obvious reason of all.

"I would not anticipate a million-dollar salary in this league anytime soon," Steinbrecher said.

But now, when the good coaches come, they find more hospitable schedules, more television exposure, more of the tools that it takes to succeed in college football in this day and age.

"The key to all of it [is] to make sure that this year is not the exception," Steinbrecher said. "It's going to be challenging. But what we need to make sure is that, and really strive for, that getting a team into a BCS game -- or, in two years, into an access game -- is not a once-in-a-decade or once-in-a-generation-type thing. It's great that we did it this year, but in three weeks we're going to put this year to bed and then it's time to get regrouped and do it again. And maybe see if we can do better. Easy to talk about; not so easy to do."
