



Kramer led Rice in passing for four straight years and his career and season marks were the standard at Rice for over 30 years until they were shattered by Chase Clement, another San Antonio signal caller. Kramer left Rice with school records in single-season passing yards, career passing yards (6,197), season total offense (3,272), career total offense (6,336), season touchdown passes (21), career touchdown passes (37), season total touchdowns (25) and career total touchdowns (48). He was the 1976 George Martin Award winner as Rice's MVP in 1976. He was elected to the Rice Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984 and to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in 2010.

1976

Prospered under Homer Rice's inovated passing attack as a senior... Earned consensus All America honors and finished fifth in the voting for the Heisman Trophy in 1976 after leading the nation in passing (3,317) and total offense (3,272), the second-best totals in NCAA history at that time. The

leader of the "Rice Air Corps" as they were known, Kramer was the first player in Southwest Conference history to top 3,000 yards in total offense and he set SWC single-season records for attempts (501), completions (269) and touchdown passes (21) and total plays (562) in addition to his passing and total offense marks. He also recorded four of the top eight passing games in conference history in 1976... Despite Rice's 3-8 record, Kramer was the consensus choice for All America honors as a senior, joining John Elway as the only quarterbacks since 1970 to be honored while playing for teams with a losing record... Selected to play in the Senior Bowl and the Blue-Gray Game in 1976 and was named MVP of the Senior Bowl. He also received the Fort Worth Kiwanis Sportsmanship Award in 1976...

David BAILIFF

Head Coach

Sixth Season

David Bailiff enters his sixth season at the helm of the Rice Owls, leading a program that has achieved success on the field, in the classroom, in the community and on the recruiting trail.

In his first five seasons, Bailiff has led the Owls to their first bowl title in over 50 years while also improving the teams cumulative GPA each year. The Owls have led Conference USA football teams in GPA in each of their seven seasons in the conference and in 2010 were honored by the American Football Coaches Association as the co-winners of the Academic Achievement Award. He is a member of the American Football Coaches Association Board of Trustees and has served as a member of the USA Today Coaches' Poll for the past three seasons.

In 2011 Bryce Callahan became the third Owl under Bailiff to earn multiple Freshman All-America honors and Bailiff has also produced a pair of All Americans (Jarett Dillard and Kyle Martens) in the past four years.

Bailiff's staff has made the state of Texas a priority in recruit-

ing, solidifying relationships with high school coaches throughout the state that has also seen the Owls increase their walk-on program.

He has also made good on his promise to keep the Owls active in community work, as the Owls have been tireless in their efforts with local schools and hosting a series of free clinics. In July of 2009, Bailiff accepted an invitation to join with four other college football coaches on a goodwill tour to visit military personnel stationed in Afghanistan and again honored our troops in 2011 by participating as a driver the "Crossing of America" tour.

In 2008, the Owls endured a series of challenges as well as the aftermath of Hurricane Ike and produced the first 10-win season for Rice since 1949 and the Owls' first victory in a bowl game since their memorable win over Alabama in the 1954 Cotton Bowl. For his efforts, Bailiff was honored by his conference peers as the 2008 Conference USA Coach of the Year.

With their 38-14 victory over Western Michigan in the Texas Bowl, the Owls closed the season with seven straight wins, validating the faith he had placed in the 2008 senior class to motivate its teammates to make it a memorable year. From the rigors of winter conditioning to the early morning workouts all through the summer of 2008, the Owls were molded into a team determined to make a statement this season.

Opening with a 56-point outburst against SMU on national TV in late August, Chase Clement and his band of receivers piled up points at a record pace. Clement and Jarett Dillard went on to become the most productive passing duo in NCAA history, while Dillard broke

the NCAA career mark for touchdown receptions. Clement shattered the conference career marks for touchdown passes and total touchdowns, while James Casey, the multi-talented former pro baseball player, broke the C-USA record with 111 catches.

At the same time, the Owls defense, bolstered by the fruits of Bailiff's first two recruiting classes, was able to improve with each game and produced some stout efforts during a seven-game winning streak to end the year.

Bailiff came to Rice after three seasons as the head coach at Texas State University in San Marcos, TX where he posted a 21-15 record while leading the Bobcats to their first Southland Conference championship and the semifinals of the NCAA Division 1-AA playoffs in 2005.

In his last two seasons at Texas State, Bailiff produced stand-outs both on the field and in the classroom. He produced both the Southland Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year in 2005 (Berrick Nealy and Fred Evans) and the league's Student Athlete of the Year for football in 2006 (Walter Musgrove). Overall, he produced a total of 14 All Southland Conference first team selections, and 13 players who were named to the academic all conference squad in his last two years.

The 2005 season was truly a magical one. The Bobcats went 9-2 during the regular season and earned the school's first berth in the Division I-AA playoffs.

In their first game, the Bobcats stormed back from a 35-16 deficit against Division I-AA national power Georgia Southern to score

34 unanswered points and beat the Eagles 50-35. The 'Cats then defeated Cal Poly 14-7 to move on to the national semifinals. Only a 40-37 overtime loss to Northern Iowa stood between Texas State and an appearance in the Division I-AA National Championship Game.

Bailiff was named the American Football Coaches Association's Region 5 Coach of the Year and finished third in the voting for the Eddie Robinson Award presented annually to the top coach in Division I-AA.

Prior to being named Texas State head coach, Bailiff spent three seasons on the staff at TCU. He served as the Horned Frogs' defensive coordinator in both 2002 and 2003 while working with the team's defensive linemen.

The 2003 Horned Frogs posted an 11-2 record and were ranked 25th in the final Associated Press writers poll and 24th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll. Bailiff was part of a staff which built quite a tradition on defense at TCU. During his three seasons in Fort Worth, the Horned Frogs were ranked 24th, 1st and 38th in the country in total defense and 10th, first and ninth against the run.

In 2002, TCU allowed just 240.2 yards of total offense per game which led the country. The Horned Frogs surrendered an average 64.8 yards on the ground. During the year, the Frogs held Tulane to a school-record -53 yards rushing. TCU also ranked second in the country in pass efficiency defense, allowing opponents to complete less than 39 percent of their passes.

Six TCU defensive players earned all-conference accolades in 2002 including Conference USA Defensive Player of the year and

Second-Team All-American LaMarcus MacDonald.

While at TCU, the Horned Frogs played in a bowl game every season - the galleryfurniture.com Bowl (2001), AXA Liberty Bowl (2002) and the Plains Capital Fort Worth Bowl (2003).

He began his coaching career as the defensive line coach at New Braunfels High School (1982-84). He went into private business from 1984-88 before returning to the coaching ranks as a defensive graduate assistant coach at Texas State in 1988. He was elevated to the Bobcats' defensive line coach in 1989.

Bailiff left Texas State in 1992 for an assistant coaching position at New Mexico. He returned to Texas State in 1997 as defensive coordinator and added assistant head coach responsibilities to his role in 1999.

It was in 1999 that Bailiff was selected the NCAA Division I-AA Assistant Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association. While at TCU Bailiff was also honored as the Top Assistant Football Coach by the All-American Football Foundation following the Horned Frogs' 2002 season.

As a player, Bailiff was named All-Lone Star Conference as well as All-America honorable mention while playing at Texas State from 1977-80. He served as a team captain in 1980 and was named honorable mention to the Lone Star Team of the Decade.

Bailiff is married to the former Angie Daniels of Versailles, Mo. He has a daughter, Brooke (27), and the couple has twin 15-year-old sons, Grayson and Gregory.

Darrell PATTERSON

Assistant Head Coach/Linebackers

Sixth Season

Darrell Patterson is back for his sixth season of at Rice and his first as Assistant Head Coach. He is in his third season of guiding the Owls' linebackers and his second as special teams coordinator.

He continues to spearhead Rice's recruiting efforts in Canada, where he made his name as a CFL standout for eight seasons. The Owls have signed a total of seven Canadians in the past six years, including All C-USA OT Scott Mitchell and All C-USA Tight End Luke Willson.

Patterson joined the Rice coaching staff on February 20, 2007 after two seasons as the linebackers coach at Stanford.

Patterson was a standout linebacker at TCU from 1979-82 and is a member of the school's Hall of Fame. He remains the school's all-time leader in total tackles (544), unassisted tackles (286) and assisted tackles (258).

He was selected in the sixth round of the 1983 NFL Draft by the New York Giants, but found his way to the Canadian Football League for a seven-year career as a linebacker for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1984-88) and the Hamilton Tiger Cats (1988-90). Patterson won a Grey Cup championship with Winnipeg in 1984 and was on a runner-up in 1989 with Hamilton.

Following his playing days, Patterson began his coaching career as an intern for the British Columbia Lions in 1991. His collegiate coaching stops have included Akron (1992-94), Temple (1995-96), Kentucky (1997-2000), Arkansas State (2001), Baylor (2002), Southern Methodist (2003-04) and Stanford. He also had a coaching stint with Ottawa of the CFL in 1995.

Patterson coached linebackers during his stops at Southern Methodist, Baylor and Arkansas State. At Baylor, he coached linebacker John Garrett, who went on to sign an NFL free agent contract.

During his four seasons at Kentucky, Patterson was part of a staff that advanced to two bowl games: the Outback Bowl versus Penn State following the 1998 season and the 1999 Music City Bowl against Syracuse. While at Kentucky, Patterson coached safeties Willie Gary and Anthony Wajda to All-SEC honors, as well as Freshman All-American David Jackson.

Patterson coached defensive tackle Larry Chester during his two seasons at Temple. Chester went on to sign an NFL contract with the Indianapolis Colts. He returned to the Canadian Football League in 1995 as a defensive line and special teams coach for the Ottawa Rough Riders.

Patterson's first foray into the collegiate coaching ranks came in 1992 when he began a three-year stint at Akron (1992-94).

Patterson earned a bachelor's degree in Human Relations from TCU in 1984. He and his wife Julie, whom he met while playing professionally in Canada, have three children: a son, Michael, who was a three-year letterman and 2012 Rice graduate Rice, and two daughters, Monika and Meghan.



John REAGAN

Offensive Coordinator Running Backs Third Season

John Reagan enters his third season at Rice and his second as the Offensive Coordinator. He will make a position group switch and be responsible for the Rice running backs in 2012.

Reagan joined the staff on February 2, 2010, serving as run game coordinator and coaching the tight ends and assisting with the O-Line. He was promoted to Offensive Coordinator in 2010.

Prior to joining the Owls, Reagan spent five seasons at Kansas as the offensive line coach and run game coordinator. Under his direction, KU posted a better rushing average in each of the first four seasons, including running for 188.8 yards per game in 2007.

In 2008 Reagan molded an offensive line which featured two redshirt freshmen starters at the tackle spots who went on to earn freshman All-America honors (Jeremiah Hatch and Jeff Spikes), while two interior linemen, center Ryan Cantrell and guard Adrian Mayes, were both named All-Big 12 Honorable Mention.

Under Reagan's direction, offensive tackle Anthony Collins developed into a 2007 All-America selection and was one of three finalists for the Outland Trophy, given annually to the best interior lineman in college football.

Collins went on to be selected in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals.

That season, the Jayhawks were fifth in the Big 12 Conference in rushing offense and 31st in the nation with 188.8 yards per game, which included 4.8 yards per carry. KU scored 30 rushing touchdowns on the year.

The 2006 season was also an extremely successful campaign, due in part to the exploits Reagan's unit accomplished. The rushing offense finished fourth in the Big 12 behind the talented Jon Cornish, who set a new Kansas single-season rushing record with 1,427 yards following the KU line. Reagan saw center and senior captain David Ochoa earn All-Big 12 Second Team honors, as the rushing unit averaged 176.4 yards per game and nearly five yards per carry.

In 2005, Reagan helped execute KU's rushing offense which ended the season averaging 134 yards per game and nearly four yards per carry. The year before his arrival, the Jayhawks averaged just 94.0 yards per game and less than three yards per carry. Reagan had two offensive linemen – David Ochoa and Bob Whitaker – earn All-Big 12 honors during his first year at KU. In addition, Matt Thompson was named Academic All-District Second Team.

Reagan, who spent the 2003-04 seasons as the offensive line coach at the U.S. Air Force Academy, also assisted with several special teams units at AFA, including the extra point and field goal teams.

During Reagan's first year in Colorado Springs, the offensive line featured Falcon players Brett Huyser, Jesse Underbakke and Blane Neufeld, who each earned All-Mountain West Conference honors. In 2004, Reagan took over a young, inexperienced group of linemen and molded them into one of the top offensive lines in the MWC -- two athletes, John Wilson and Ross Weaver, earned All-MWC honors.

Reagan was the offensive line coach for one season at Temple before taking his position at Air Force. He directed the defensive line at Temple for two years before his switch to the opposite side of the ball. In 2001, Reagan directed Temple's defensive front four to a productive campaign that saw the school ranked 19th nationally in total defense. In addition, defensive tackle Dan Klecko became Temple's first unanimous All-Big East honoree, while defensive end Raheem Brock was taken in the seventh round of the NFL draft by the Philadelphia Eagles.

Reagan joined the Owls' coaching staff in February 2000 after instructing the Akron defensive line in 1999. Before coaching at Akron, Reagan was the tight ends coach and offensive tackle coach at Army in 1998. In 1997, he held the same position as an assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania. Reagan spent the 1996 season as an offensive graduate assistant at Oklahoma State. He began his coaching career in 1994 as the assistant offensive line and fullback coach at Albany, where he remained until joining the Cowboys in 1996.

Reagan, a native of Delmar, N.Y., graduated from Syracuse in 1994 with a dual major in exercise science and sport psychology. He was a three-year starter at center for the Orangemen. As a senior captain in 1993, Reagan earned the Ben Schwartzwalder Most Exemplary Football Player Award after leading his team to a 26-22 victory over Colorado in the Fiesta Bowl. While with the Orangemen, he also competed in the 1992 Hall of Fame Bowl when Syracuse defeated Ohio State 24-17. Reagan was twice named to the GTE Academic All-America team (1992-93) and was presented with the Toyota Leadership Award following his senior season.

Reagan has a daughter, Kaitlyn and a son, Daniel.



Chris THURMOND

Defensive Coordinator Cornerbacks Second Season

In his second season at Rice, Chris Thurmond has assumed the duties of Defensive Coordinator in addition to continuing to coach the Owls cornerbacks.

Thurmond originally joined the staff on Feb. 22, 2011, after spending the previous three seasons at Kentucky. In his first year with the Owls, Thurmond guided his younger corners through the challenge of early-than-expected playing time due to injuries to the veterans. At the end of the season, redshirt freshman Bryce Callahan had earned Freshman All America and Conference USA All Freshman honors after picking off six passes to lead the nation and defending 15 passes.

In his three seasons at Kentucky, the Wildcats advanced to bowl games each season - Liberty Bowl (2008), Music City Bowl (2009) and the BBVA Compass Bowl (2010).

Prior to joining the Rice staff, Thurmond had student-athletes go on to sign National Football League contracts two straight seasons. Kentucky cornerback Trevard Lindley earned second-team All-America honors in 2008 and established a UK career record for pass

breakups. Despite being sidelined for much of his senior season in 2009, Lindley repeated All-SEC honors in 2009 and was drafted by the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles.

Defensive backs coached or recruited by Thurmond have been apart of the last three Super Bowl championship teams. Both Anthony Madison (Pittsburgh Steelers) and Roman Harper (New Orleans Saints), who Thurmond recruited to the University of Alabama, were members of Super Bowl XLIII and XLIV championship teams in 2009 and 2010, respectively. Thurmond also coached Green Bay Packer Charlie Peprah, who was part of the Super Bowl XLV championship team earlier this year.

Between stints at Alabama (2001-02) and Kentucky (2008-10), Thurmond coached five seasons in the state of Texas. Highlighted by a trip to the Cotton Bowl following the 2004 season, he was the cornerbacks coach at Texas A&M from 2003-05.

He coached cornerbacks and was the recruiting coordinator for two seasons across town at the University of Houston (2006-07). He helped the Cougars advance to the 2006 Liberty Bowl and in 2007 was the interim head coach for UH when the team played in the Texas Bowl after head coach Art Briles became the coach at Baylor. While at Houston, he coached cornerback Willie Gaston who was a second-team All-Conference USA selection and went on to play for the Baltimore Ravens.

During his two seasons coaching the cornerbacks at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won the 2001 Independence Bowl. The 2002 Alabama team led the SEC and ranked third nationally in total defense,

posting the best record in the SEC Western Division. Eight Alabama players he either coached or recruited signed National Football League contracts.

Thurmond has also worked at Tulsa (1983-91, 1994), East Carolina (1992-93), Texas Christian (1995, 1998-2000) and Oklahoma (2996-97), coaching the cornerbacks or entire secondary unit during each of the stints.

During his second term at TCU, Thurmond helped guide the Horned Frogs to the 2000 Western Athletic Conference co-championship. TCU led the nation in scoring defense and total defense while ranking third in pass efficiency defense.

While at Tulsa in 1991, the Golden Hurricane ranked among the nation's leaders in pass defense efficiency. Tulsa capped the season with a win in the Freedom Bowl.

Thurmond has coached in 12 bowl games during his career and has coached or recruited numerous athletes who have gone on to play in the NFL. In addition to Madison, Harper, Peprah and Lindley, the list of current NFL players who were coached or recruited by Thurmond includes Houston Texans defensive end Mark Anderson.

A native of San Springs, Okla., Thurmond graduated from the University of Tulsa in 1975. He spent seven years as a high school coach in Oklahoma including head coach at his alma mater, Charles Page High School, before entering the college ranks.

Thurmond's daughter Paige lives in Little Rock, Ark.



Larry EDMONDSON

Passing Game Coordinator/Quarterbacks
Fourth Season

Larry Edmondson took over as the Owls quarterback coach and passing game coordinator in January of 2011. Edmondson joined the Rice staff on January 30, 2009 as the Owls' wide receiver coach.

Edmondson, who was the offensive coordinator and assistant head coach at Katy Taylor High School in 2008, is entering his 24th year of college coaching, including 14 years of coaching wide receivers. He was the wide receivers coach at SMU from 2004 to 2007, Auburn in 1997-98, Mississippi State in 1996, LSU from 1991-94 and at Southern Miss from 1988-90. He has also served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at SMU (2002-03) and Louisiana-Lafayette (1999-2001).

While at SMU, Edmondson guided Bobby Chase to All-C-USA honors in 2005 and Emmanuel Sanders to All-Conference and freshman All-America honors in 2006. As the offensive coordinator at Louisiana-Lafayette, he constructed an offense that set six school records

in 2001 and was credited with the development of sophomore quarterback Jon Van Cleave, who led the Sun Belt Conference in passing yards per game.

In addition to coaching wide receivers at Auburn, Edmondson also oversaw the Tigers recruiting efforts. Auburn won the 1997 SEC West Division championship and went on to defeat Clemson in the 1998 Peach Bowl.

A 1983 graduate of Texas A&M where he lettered as a tight end and was a teammate of Houston Texans head coach Gary Kubiak, (and now coaches Kubiak's son Klein, a freshman at Rice), Edmondson began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Aggies from 1984 to 1986. He served as a GA at Arizona in 1987 before joining Curly Hallman's staff at Southern Miss as wide receivers coach in 1988.

In his first year at USM, the Golden Eagles went 10-2 including a 38-18 win over UTEP in the Independence Bowl. Southern Miss opened the 1990 season with a win over Florida State and played in the All-American Bowl that year, and also posted wins over both Alabama and Auburn during his time there.

Married (Cara) with two children, son Sean and daughter Taylor.



Larry HOEFER

Safeties

First Season

Texas native and longtime defensive coach Larry Hoefer joined the Rice staff as safeties coach on February 6, 2012.

Hoefer brings 35 years of coaching experience to the Owls, including seven seasons at Baylor where he coached both the safeties (2003-07) and linebackers (2008-09).

Hoefer, who came to Baylor in 2003 with Guy Morrise from Kentucky, served as Baylor's defensive coordinator and safeties coach in 2007. He coached at least one All-Big 12 performer every year.

In his first year at Baylor, Hoefer coached the Bears' leading tackler in Maurice Lane, who had 129 stops at free safety en route to honorable mention All-Big 12 honors, and Derrick Cash, the team's fourth-leading tackler as an outside safety. Another pupil, outside safety Willie Andrews, led the team in interceptions and was third on the squad in tackles.

In 2004 Andrews earned first-team All-Big 12 honors as a safety from the Dallas Morning News and as a return specialist from the league's coaches, while Lane garnered first-team all-conference recognition from the San Antonio Ex-

press-News. Lane again paced the squad in tackles, while Andrews again ranked third in tackles and had a team-high three sacks.

Lane led the Bears in tackles for the third consecutive year in 2005 en route to first-team All-Big 12 honors from both The Associated Press and the Dallas Morning News. Andrews earned first-team All-Big 12 recognition from the league's coaches as a safety and was later selected in the seventh round of the 2006 NFL Draft.

In 2006, outside safety Maurice Linguist and free safety Dwain Crawford both earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors from the league's coaches. Jordan Lake was a consensus second-team All-Big 12 selection as a free safety in 2007 after leading the Bears with 120 total tackles.

In 2008 Hoefer coached linebacker Joe Pawelek, who ranked seventh nationally in both tackles (10.7 per game) and interceptions (0.5 per game) - the only player nationally ranked in the top 10 of both categories. Pawelek was named an All-American and consensus All-Big 12 player.

Hoefer spent two seasons as safeties coach on Morrise's Kentucky staff before making the move to Waco. He went to UK from Texas-El Paso, where he was defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the 2000 season. The Miners posted an 8-3 regular season record, were WAC co-champions and played in the Humanitarian Bowl. The bowl game marked Hoefer's sixth as a coach, in addition to four at Texas Tech and one (1988) during his previous stint at UTEP.

Using an eight-man front under Hoefer's guidance, UTEP reduced its rushing yards allowed from 208.2 yards per game in 1999 to 153.8 ypg in the 2000 season. UTEP held five of its league opponents under 100 yards rushing. The Miners also ranked 19th nationally in pass efficiency defense.

Hoefer worked for coach Spike Dykes at Texas Tech from 1994-99, where he coached the outside linebackers. Tech was bowl-eligible every season and played in the Cotton, Copper, Alamo and Independence bowls during Hoefer's tenure. Among his pupils were Marcus Coleman, a first-team All-American in 1995 and Ty Ardoin, each of whom played in the NFL. Hoefer also coached All-Big 12 picks Robert Johnson and Jody Brown. Tech ranked first in the nation for takeaways over a five-year period from 1993-97.

Hoefer had multiple responsibilities as an assistant at Missouri from 1989-93, working his way up from receivers coach to defensive coordinator and assistant head coach. His first term at UTEP, from 1982-88, was capped by a 10-win season and a berth in the 1988 Independence Bowl.

A native of Abilene, Texas, Hoefer stayed in his hometown and played defensive back at McMurry University, graduating in 1973. He was team captain and earned the squad's MVP honor.

Hoefer's first coaching stop was at Tarleton State from 1974-75 as a graduate assistant working with the defensive backs. He went on to coach at Big Spring (Texas) High School in 1976 and Abilene (Texas) High from 1977-80. Hoefer coached at West Texas State in 1981 before joining the UTEP staff for the first time.

Hoefer and his wife, Kathy, have three children: son, Bennett, a 2007 Baylor graduate and three-year letterman at safety; married son Tyler (wife, Meagan and daughter, Avery) a United States Naval Academy graduate and captain in the U.S. Marines; married daughter, Alison Schupp (husband, Chris, and daughters Sydney, Samantha and Sophia).



Billy LYNCH

Wide Receivers

Second Season

Billy Lynch is entering his second season of coaching the Owls wide receivers and his first as the Recruiting Coordinator. He joined the Rice coaching staff on Feb. 22, 2011 after six seasons at Indiana where he developed some of the most productive receivers in Hoosiers' history.

In 2010 his top three receivers, Damarlo Belcher (78 catches, 832 yards, 4 touchdowns), Terrance Turner (67, 681, 3) and Doss (63 catches, 706 yards, 7 touchdowns) topped 60 catches and 700 yards receiving and the unit set a school record with 3,446 total yard.

In 2009, Tandon Doss became Lynch's second All-Big Ten receiver (James Hardy), as he earned first team honors from the conference media and second team recognition from the league's coaches.

As sophomores in 2009, Doss and Belcher became the first duo in IU history to each collect 60-plus receptions and 700-plus yards in a season. Their 138 combined catches rank first in Hoosier lore (third in Big Ten in 2009) and 1,732 yards sit second (second in Big Ten).

Doss finished second in the Big Ten and 30th nationally in yards per game (80.2) and third in the league and tied for 22nd nationally in

catches per game (6.64). He closed out the year second on IU's single-season receptions list and fifth in the school's single-season yardage rankings.

Belcher wrapped up the year tied for fourth on Indiana's single-season receptions list and 13th on the single-season yardage list. He ranked fifth in the Big Ten with 5.08 grabs per game and sixth in yards per game (64.2).

The 2008 corps, led by Ray Fisher and Andrew Means, saw four receivers reach 25 receptions and post over 275 yards. It also featured one of the top true freshman duos in IU history - Belcher and Doss.

Fisher and Means, who signed a professional baseball contract with the Cincinnati Reds in 2008, became the 13th and 14th Hoosiers, respectively, to go over 100 career receptions and 1,000 career yards in 2008, joining Hardy as the second and third wideouts under Lynch to enter the elite club. Means also earned a spot on the Biletnikoff Award Watch List, the third straight year a Hoosier appeared on the list (Hardy - 2006, 2007).

Belcher (25 catches, 337 yards and two touchdowns) and Doss (14, 186, one) combined for the second-highest receiving yardage total by a true freshman duo in school history. Among Hoosier true freshmen, Belcher's 25 receptions and 337 yards rank third all-time.

The 2007 season saw Lynch's wide receivers re-write the IU record books, as they recorded a school-record 3,073 yards. Hardy, who was selected in the second round (41st pick) of the NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills, set new school marks with 16 receiving TDs and 79 catches. He finished his career as the school's all-time receiving yard-

age (2,740), receptions (191) and receiving touchdowns (36) leader. Hardy was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, named All-America by five publications and selected first team All-Big Ten.

Led by Hardy, the 2006 Hoosiers finished third in the Big Ten in receiving yards per game. Hardy was a second team all-conference selection after leading the team with 51 catches, 722 yards and 10 touchdowns. Six different Hoosier wideouts caught 20 passes and went over 200 yards, with five of those six being underclassmen.

In 2005, Lynch tutored Hardy to one of the most prolific debut seasons IU has seen at wide receiver. Hardy finished with 61 receptions (fourth in school history), 10 touchdowns (tied for third all-time) and 893 yards (seventh all-time). In addition, his five 100-yard games were tied for the second most in a season in school history.

One of five assistant coaches that came from Miami (Ohio) University to Indiana, Lynch was the RedHawks' tight ends coach in 2004 and offensive graduate assistant in 2002-03. During his tenure in Oxford, Lynch assisted with a potent offense that led the nation at 43.0 points per game in 2003.

He spent his undergraduate years as a wide receiver and three-year letter winner at Ball State University, where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in education in 2002. He led the Cardinals with 40 receptions his senior year. He also lettered three years in basketball, including the 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons for then-BSU head coach and current Indiana assistant basketball coach Tim Buckley.

Billy and his wife, Carla, have three children, Lindsey (6), and two sons, Max (5), and Ryan (4).



Michael SLATER

Defensive Line
First Season

Michael Slater joined the Rice staff on February 23 as the defensive line coach.

Slater served for three seasons at Rice as a defensive graduate assistant, earning a Master's of Liberal Studies degree during his tenure while working with the defensive line. After his graduation in the spring of 2011, Slater spent one season as the Defensive Line coach at Angelo State before returning to Rice.

Slater coached at the high school level in the Houston area for 12 years, first at Alief Hastings for five seasons and most recently at Alief Taylor for seven years. He coached the defensive line and also coordinated

special teams. As the defensive line coach at Taylor, he coached future Owl Cheta Ozougwu.

He began his coaching career while attending Southwest Texas State (now Texas State), where he served as a student assistant coach in 1993 before graduating with a degree in Agriculture/Animal Science.

Slater has one son, Kyle

Tight Ends/Assistant Special Teams
Third Season

After two seasons serving as a graduate assistant and in a quality control position, David Sloan was promoted to Tight Ends Coach in February of 2012. He also assists with the Owls special teams.

Sloan joined the Owls in 2010, reuniting with Rice head coach David Bailiff, who was on the staff at the University of New Mexico in 1993 when Sloan signed with the Lobos out of junior college.

A two-time Academic All-Conference selection while playing basketball at Fresno City College from 1990-91, Sloan made the jump to football in the fall of 1992.

He caught the eye of Bailiff after catching 13 passes for 254 yards and 4 touchdowns. He signed with New Mexico and earned All-WAC Honorable Mention as a junior in 1993. He improved on that effort as a senior, earning first-Team All-WAC honors and was named one of the Lobos' team co-captains after catching 24 receptions for 320 yards and 1 touchdown during his senior campaign.

After his senior year, he played in the Blue Gray All-Star Game, Senior Bowl and participated in NFL Scouting combine in Indianapolis.

Sloan was selected in the third round of the 1995 by the Detroit Lions and became a starter midway through his rookie season and the Lions won seven straight to earn a playoff spot. He enjoyed his best season in 1999, when he earned a spot in the Pro Bowl after catching 47 passes for 591 yards and four touchdowns as the Lions again reached the playoffs.

Sloan started for the NFC in the 2000 Pro Bowl and was named as an alternate in 2001. He led the Lions with seven touchdown passes in 2001.

He was signed by New Orleans in 2002 and retired after the 2003 season. He finished his NFL career with 199 receptions, for 2251 yards and 17 touchdowns including seven catches for 100 yards and two touchdowns in three playoff games.

He and his wife Jennifer have two daughters: Trinity (6) and Bentley (3).



Ronnie VINKLAREK

Offensive Line

Fourth Season

Ronnie Vinklarek joined the Rice football staff as the offensive line coach on February 28, 2009.

Vinklarek will oversee a total overhaul of the Owls offensive line in 2012, after the graduation of players who had a combined total of 166 career starts. He will welcome one returning starter in redshirt sophomore Drew Carroll and a JC All America transfer in Nate Richards, who will join with a group of talented redshirts to form the Owls offensive line.

Vinklarek, has 20 years of coaching experience at the collegiate and professional level and is no stranger to the Houston area or Conference USA. He coached the linemen at the University of Houston from 1988-93 and at SMU from 2004-07. He also coached at the high school level in Houston, coaching the defensive line at Spring Branch High School in 1983-84.

While at Houston, he mentored the offensive line that protected Andre Ware during his Heisman Trophy winning season (1989) and was selected to coach in the 1990 Blue-Gray Game after helping UH to a 10-1 season. He originally came to Houston as a graduate assistant under former Houston Oilers and Washington Redskins head coach Jack Pardee and was promoted to full-time assistant in 1990.

Vinklarek coached in the NFL for three seasons. He broke into the league in 2000 with the Tennessee Titans as their defensive quality control, linebackers and special teams coach. He moved on to the Buffalo Bills in 2001 and coached their offensive line for two seasons. In 2002 the Bills offensive line paved the way for a 4,359-yard passer in Drew Bledsoe, a 1,439-yard rusher in Travis Henry and two 1,200-yard-plus receivers in Eric Moulds and Peerless Price.

Prior to joining the Owls, he coached the offensive line for the Edmonton Eskimos of the CFL. He broke into the coaching ranks as the seventh and eighth grade coach at Hill Country Middle School after graduating from Southwest Texas in 1981. From 1983 to 1984, was the defensive line coach for Spring Branch High School in Houston before becoming the defensive coordinator at Marble Falls (Texas) High School from 1984-86.

He also served as offensive line coach at Oklahoma State (1998 & 1999), Valdosta State (1997) as well as with the CFL's Birmingham Barracudas (1995).

A Flatonia, Texas, native, Vinklarek is married to the former Marianne Britz. The couple has two sons, Trevor and Trent.

Third Season

Ryan Cantrell joined the Rice football staff prior to the start of the 2010 season.

A Houston native, Cantrell was a standout center at Kansas while playing for current Owls' Offensive Coordinator John Reagan. He started 33 games at KU, including his final 25 consecutive, and was elected as a captain of the Jayhawks' 2008 team.

As a junior, he anchored an offensive line (which included current Rice offensive grad assistant Adrian Mayes) that led KU to an Orange Bowl title. He was a member of three bowl championship teams (2005 Fort Worth Bowl, 2008 Orange Bowl, 2008 Insight Bowl) and was named honorable mention All Big XII in his last two seasons as well as to the Rimington Award Watch List prior to his senior year. He was presented the Gale Sayers Award for Courage as a senior.

A 2004 graduate of Clements High School where he was a member of *Dave Campbell's Texas Football SuperTeam*, Cantrell returned to the school after his graduation from Kansas and was an assistant offensive line coach from 2009-10.

During his time at Kansas, the Jayhawk football team broke into the top ten in the rankings as well as captured bowl championships at the 2008 Orange Bowl over Virginia Tech and the 2009 Insight Bowl over Minnesota.

Jerry Pickle joined the Rice staff in June of 2008 as the Assistant AD for Football Operations.

He came to Rice after 24 years at Baylor, including the last 13 as the director of football operations. He joined the Baylor program full-time in 1986 as recruiting coordinator and administrative assistant to Hall of Fame coach Grant Teaff.

Texas 34, Rice 9

Sept. 3, 2011 • DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium • Austin, Texas

For the better part of three quarters, the Rice Owls provided more than enough evidence that their 100th season of football might possibly be headed for a memorable opening night.

But the Texas Longhorns' offense caught its rhythm over a 12-minute stretch to grind out three long touchdowns and turn a tight, 13-9 game into a 34-9 win in front of a sellout crowd of 101,626 at DKR Memorial Stadium in Austin.

"I'm really disappointed," Rice head coach David Bailiff said. "It's one of those games you put a lot of work into, you go out there and expect to win and it hurts when you don't. I thought we played a tremendous first half, but the second half we gave up too many big plays."

The inspired Owls opened strongly, forcing a three-and-out by the Horns in their initial possession of the season, and then moved down the field to set up Chris Boswell for the first of his three field goals on the night. It marked the third consecutive game vs. Texas that the Owls scored first, all by field goals, and the second consecutive year that Boswell opened the scoring with a 42-yarder.

Texas responded with a field goal of its own and then capi-

talized on a Rice fumble of a punt to take a 10-3 lead in early in the second quarter. They added a second field goal to extend the margin to 13-3 before Boswell connected from 49 yards at the end of a 13-play, 50-yard drive to close the gap to 13-6 at the half.

After forcing a Texas punt on the Horns' initial possession of the third quarter, the Owls threw a scare into the sellout crowd by quickly moving down field thanks to a Texas penalty and a 20-yard run by senior Tyler Smith to set up shop with a first and goal at the Longhorn eight.

The Texas defense stiffened and Boswell was called upon again, connecting from 26 yards out to move the Owls to within four points at 13-9 with 9:07 to play in the quarter.

The Longhorns struck back with a touchdown to push the lead to 20-9 with John Harris tossing a 36-yard touchdown pass to Jaxon Shipley.

The Owls moved the ball back to midfield on their next offensive series and after Kyle Martens pinned the Horns at their own one yard line with a 48-yard punt, Rice seemed poised to gain a field position edge.

Rice would be flagged for defensive offsides on the first play from the one to give the Longhorns some breathing room and on first-and-five, UT quarterback completed a 55-yard pass to Mike Davis to the Owl 39. Fozzy Whitaker would later cap an eight-play, 99-yard drive with a seven-yard touchdown

run to run the Texas lead to 27-9 early in the fourth quarter.

Smith finished with 67 yards rushing to lead the Owls, while sophomore Cameron Nwosu led the defense with 12 tackles in his starting debut.

Martens showcased his All-America credentials by averaging 48.6 on five punts, while Boswell's three field goals moved his career total to 14, good enough to move into a tie for eighth on the Rice career list.

Against Texas, Rice failed to reach the end zone for the first time since the 2002 season, ending a streak of 76 straight games with at least one touchdown.

Rice 24, Purdue 22

Sept. 10, 2011 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

Justin Allen turned a window of opportunity into the play of a lifetime, slicing through the Purdue front wall to block Carson Wiggs' attempt at a game-winning 31-yard field goal as time ran out to give Rice a 24-22 win at Rice Stadium.

Purdue had driven 38 yards over the final 1:50 to put Wiggs in position to give the Boilermakers their second straight come-from-behind win. Without a timeout left, Wiggs and his field goal unit had to run on the field after Akeem Shavers was stopped short on third down by Allen's partner at linebacker, Cameron Nwosu. Allen said the quick setup for the final play led to his opportunity.

"Sometimes when (the opponent) is in a rush, they don't get their proper splits," Allen noted. "I saw the 'A' gap open in front of me more than I thought it would be. I took full advantage. I got skinny. I took three quick steps and got my hand up and the ball hit off my right forearm."

Amid the post-block celebration on the field, there was no consensus as to who had made the play. "At the end of the game I couldn't figure out who had the block because there so many blue jerseys on that side of the line of scrimmage," head coach David Bailiff said. "I couldn't get anybody to talk to me,

nor could I talk," he added.

Allen's block allowed the Owls to end an 22-game losing streak against BCS conference schools, and also post their first win over a Big Ten team since September 20, 1997 when they defeated Northwestern, 40-34. The Owls had not defeated a BSC conference school since downing Duke 15-13 on September 8, 2001. That win came three days before the terrorist attacks struck the United States and the streak came to an end one day before the 10th anniversary of those attacks.

The day opened with a special commemoration of that anniversary, and the Owls further honored the moment by wearing special R's on their helmets with the US flag in place of the traditional white. Once the ceremonies were concluded by a flyover by a vintage B-17 bomber, the crowd of 25,317 and a national audience on CBS Sports Network saw the two teams stage a back and forth affair.

The Owls struck first for the second consecutive week off the leg of Chris Boswell, who drilled a 33-yard field goal. Purdue struck back to take a 7-3 lead near the end of the quarter on a 5-yard run by quarterback Caleb TerBush.

Rice countered with the Turner Petersen show on its next possession to retake the lead.

Petersen contributed a total of 63 of the 78 yards on the scoring drive with his arm, his feet, his hands and his chin. He completed a 12-yard pass to Vance McDonald and then added

15 more yards after the play when Purdue was charged with roughing. He caught a 30-yard pass from Taylor McHargue and then finished off the drive with a two-yard run.

Purdue scored the next 10 points and looked to be headed to the locker room with a 17-10 lead, but McHargue capped a 59-yard drive with a four-yard scoring strike to Luke Willson on the final play of the half to knot the score at 17-17.

Rice kept up its momentum on the first series of the third quarter, driving 80 yards in 11 plays to take the lead when McHargue hit Sam McGuffie with a 19-yard scoring pass. It would then fall to the Owls' defense to make those 24 points stand, and it took all the remaining 25+ minutes to do so.

McHargue threw for a career-high 230 yards to lead the Owls offense.

Baylor 56, Rice 31

Sept. 24, 2011 • Floyd Casey Stadium • Waco, Texas

Robert Griffin III passed for 338 yards and five touchdowns as Baylor knocked off Rice 56-31 in Floyd Casey Stadium.

After Baylor was forced to punt on a three-and-out first series, Griffin engineered five straight scoring drives with four culminating with passing strikes to four different receivers.

In addition to Griffin's 29-of-33 passing numbers, the Bears also took advantage of a special teams fumble recovery which led to an early 21-0 Baylor lead.

Rice's Charles Ross had already had one long kickoff return called back by an illegal block. On his second return, Baylor's Tevin Elliot dislodged the ball and recovered the fumble to give the Bears the ball on the Rice 21.

Griffin's 17-yard touchdown pass to Kendall Wright gave Baylor a 21-0 lead. The Bears would extend the margin to 28-0 before the Owls got on the board in the second quarter.

Rice players registered the longest rush and pass play of the season on back-to-back plays to help set up a two-yard Jeremy Eddington touchdown run. Turner Petersen had a 27-yard run into Baylor territory and Randy Kitchens' 42-yard reception of a Taylor McHargue pass moved the ball to the two.

McHargue set career highs for passing in the game, completing 23-of-38 passes for 260 yards and three touchdowns.

Following Baylor's fifth scoring drive, Rice would close out the first half with the final 10 points to cut the margin to 35-17.

Chris Boswell's 31-yard field goal with 7:56 to play in the half cut the lead to 35-10.

On the ensuing kickoff, Tolu Akinwumi dislodged the ball from returner Darius Jones and Corey Frazier pounced out it at the Baylor 33.

McHargue would complete a 10-yard pass to Mario Hull with the Owls facing third-and-six. An offside call on the Bears with Rice facing fourth-and-one gave the Owls first-and-goal from the five. McHargue would hook up with Vance McDonald for the first of two scoring passes.

Baylor would get two quick strikes early in the second half to extend the lead to 49-17.

Ahmad Dixon had a 55-yard interception return for a touchdown. Tevin Reese would later catch a 64-yard touchdown pass.

McHargue had two-touchdown passes in the second half.

Andre Gautreaux caught a 19-yard touchdown pass for his first career reception as an Owl.

McDonald, who finished the 2010 season with touchdown receptions in the last three games, caught a 24-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter for his second scoring reception of the game to cap the game's scoring.

Southern Miss 48, Rice 24

Oct. 1, 2011 • M.M. Roberts Stadium • Hattiesburg, Miss.

Rice returned two fumble recoveries back for touchdowns, the second giving the Owls a 14-13 lead, but Southern Miss scored the final 28 points en route to a 48-24 win.

Southern Miss rolled up 654 yards of total offense including 260 yards in the third quarter. The Golden Eagles' defense held Rice to 67 yards of total offense after the intermission.

Rice grabbed a 24-20 lead early in the second half. USM began the half by moving the ball from its own 20 to the Rice four. Facing fourth-and-one, Kendrick Hardy carried over right tackle and was stripped of the ball by Scott Solomon. Xavier Webb returned the fumble 96 yards for the score.

Webb's play ended a Rice streak of 35-straight games without a defensive touchdown. The Owls' previous defensive score came on a Chris Douglas' interception return in the fourth quarter of the North Texas game in 2008.

Webb would force another fumble on the Golden Eagles' next drive but USM would maintain possession and go on to score on a one-yard touchdown run by Austin Davis that gave Southern Miss a 27-24 lead.

Webb had 13 tackles (7 solo stops), setting a new career high.

USM would go on drive 75 and 63 yards on their next two series and would lead 41-24 heading into the fourth quarter.

Davis completed a 23-yard touchdown pass to Ryan Balentine with 3:13 to play to cap the Golden Eagles' scoring. The final drive included five straight carries by Tracy Lampley (48 yards on the drive) before the touchdown pass.

Lampley had 70 rushing yards and a touchdown on the night. Hardy led USM with 172 yards and a score on 23 carries. Davis completed 21-of-33 passes for 284 yards while Kelvin Bolden had nine receptions for 132 yards and one touchdown.

Southern Miss had drives of 78 and 60 yards in the first quarter, culminating with a 47-yard touchdown run by Hardy and a 46-yard Davis to Balentine hookup.

Rice would strike for a pair of touchdowns late in the quarter to take a 14-13 lead.

Vance McDonald's 2-yard touchdown reception from Taylor McHargue got the Owls on the board with five seconds to play in the quarter.

Rice had been held to -2 yards of total offense on its first three offensive series (a trio of three-and-outs) before going on an 7-play, 80-yard drive, highlighted by a 42-yard McHargue to McDonald pass down to the USM 16. The drive was sustained by a pass interference call in the end zone.

On the ensuing kickoff, Zach Patt forced Golden Eagle returner Francisco Llanos to fumble at the 17. Michael Kutzler picked up the loose ball, returning it into the end zone for the score. Chris Boswell's point-after try gave the Owls' a 14-13 lead at the end of the quarter.

Southern Miss took a 20-14 lead when Cordarro Law forced Taylor McHargue to fumble. Marquese Wheaton picked up the loose ball and raced 75 yards for the USM score.

Boswell would connect on a 41-yard field goal in the final minute of the first half and the Owls went to the locker room trailing 20-17.

Rice did not have an interception in its first three games before Bryce Callahan ended the drought with a pair of picks against Southern Miss. He became the first Rice player to have two interceptions in a game since Chris Douglas against SMU on Aug. 29, 2008.

Callahan was credited with three tackles, including an assist on a tackle for loss and broke up a pass in addition to his pair of interceptions.

Rice 28, Memphis 6

Oct. 8, 2011 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

Rice's defense provided all the points the team would need, while the Owls' offense added three more scores in a 28-6 win over Memphis. The victory was Rice's fifth straight at home.

The Owls held the Tigers to a pair of field goals and then used a pair of stops to allow their fewest points in a game since blanking UNLV 38-0 in the opening game of the 1995 campaign. It was also the fewest points Rice has allowed in seven seasons as a member of Conference USA.

Rice held Marshall to 10 points in a 38-10 win during the 2008 season in a game played in Houston.

"I'm proud of the defensive coaches, proud of the execution, and how hard those kids played," Rice head coach David Bailiff said. "They bent a couple of times, but didn't break even after a turnover when they were already in field goal range and made them settle for a field goal."

After the Owls took a 14-3 lead into the locker room at halftime, junior defensive end Jared Williams broke the game open in the third, returning a deflected pass 47-yards to tally Rice's second defensive touchdown in as many weeks.

Rice safety Paul Porras blitzed Memphis quarterback Tay-

lor Reed on the play, making contact as the ball was released. Williams plucked the ball out of the air and burst past the Tigers' line to score his first career touchdown.

"It felt great," Williams said. "I played a lot of offense in high school so when you see that ball in the air you want to take it and it all comes back to you. It felt great to be in the end zone again with your team all around you. As coach said, it was a big momentum builder for the team coming into the second half."

Senior Tyler Smith provided the offensive spark for the Owls, rushing for a season-high 97 yards on 14 carries. It was Smith's most productive outing since he closed the 2009 season with back-to-back, 100-yard rushing efforts.

Rice opened the scoring late in the first quarter when Turner Petersen scored the first of two, one-yard touchdowns to cap a nine-play, 69-yard drive that was highlighted by a 31-yard romp up the sidelines by Smith.

The Owls offense would be held scoreless on their next four possessions, while Memphis closed the score to 7-3 before Rice mounted an 11-play drive over the final two minutes to push the advantage to 14-3 at intermission.

Taylor McHargue found Luke Willson in the end zone for a 15-yard score, one of five passes Willson would catch on the day. McHargue threw for 170 yards and a score, completing 15 of 22 with a pair of interceptions.

Williams took center stage on the Tigers' second possession of the second half to extend the lead to 21-3 and match his roommate, Xavier Webb in the defensive scoring category. Webb returned a fumble 96 yards for a score last week at Southern Miss.

The Owls' defense, which had given up 104 points in the previous two games, kept the Tigers out of the end zone on the strength of 10 tackles for loss, including a season-high five sacks. Both of Williams tackles on the day were for losses.

Senior defensive end Scott Solomon led the defenders with a pair of stops behind the line, including one sack and he also recovered a fumble on a sack by Cameron Nwosu at the Rice 24 to thwart a late Memphis scoring threat. The two tackles for loss moved Solomon into fourth on the Rice career list, one ahead of Matt Sign. His sack moved him to within one of passing ND Kalu for second on the Owls career sack list.

Tron Martinez scored from four yards out with 1:49 remaining to play give Marshall a come-from-behind, 24-20 Homecoming victory over Rice.

The late score was set up by an Owl fumble deep in their own territory as Rice was looking to run out the clock and take a victory back to Houston.

Rice running back Sam McGuffie, who led the Owls with 70 yards on the ground and had put them in the lead with a four-yard run of his own late in the third quarter, had the ball stripped from behind by Marshall's Vinny Curry at the Rice 23. Five plays later, Martinez scored to clinch the game for The Herd.

The Rice defense had stopped Marshall a series earlier, forcing the Thundering Herd into a three-and-out that started on the Owl 49. On second down of the drive, Tron caught a pass on the outside but was dropped by Justin Allen for a five-yard loss. Marshall quarterback Rakeem Cato then threw an incompletion to bring on the punting team.

Rice gained possession with 3:38 to play and on first down McGuffie sprinted for eight yards before Curry stripped the ball to set up the game-winning score.

Early in the fourth quarter and after a booth review, Curry was credited with a fumble recovery on a loose ball following a fumble by Rice quarterback Taylor McHargue.

Trailing 24-20, Marshall had the ball at the Rice 25 but on first down, Herd quarterback A.J. Graham was intercepted by Paul Poras at the 8-yard line.

The two teams then each traded a pair of punts before the Owls fumbled late.

Marshall started fast and took a 17-6 lead into the locker room, but Rice roared out of the break to score a pair of touchdowns and surge to 20-17 lead. After forcing a punt on Marshall's opening possession of the third quarter, the Owls marched 86 yards in six plays to score their first touchdown.

Taylor McHargue ran the ball twice for 32 yards to move the ball to midfield. He then found Vance McDonald alone downfield while he was evading the Marshall pass rush and hit the junior receiver for a 49-yard touchdown. The score was the 12th TD reception of McDonald's career, moving him into a tie for ninth on the Rice career chart.

The Rice defense got the ball right back, forcing a three-and-out, and setting up the Owls at the Rice 21.

McHargue twice found Mario Hull for gains totaling 44 yards to set Rice up at the Marshall 13. From there, McGuffie did the rest of the work, covering nine yards on first down and then putting the Owls into the lead from four yards out.

After being forced to punt four times to begin the game, Rice scored on its next four possessions - the final two possessions of the first half led to Chris Boswell field goals of 35 and 24 yards then the offense found the end zone twice in the third quarter.

Rice outgained the Thundering Herd 361 yards to 328. McHargue completed 10-of-16 passes for 150 yards.

Defensively, linebacker Cameron Nwosu led the Owls with a career-high 16 tackles while Allen finished with 10 stops.

Curry helped pace Marshall's defense with a nine-tackle performance which included 3.5 quarterback sacks.

Houston 73, Rice 34

Oct. 27, 2011 • Robertson Stadium • Houston, Texas

For the fourth consecutive season, the Bayou Bucket trophy, presented by State Farm, had a change of address, after the Houston Cougars withstood a fast start by Rice and downed the Owls 73-34 at Robertson Stadium.

The Owls went into the game as heavy underdogs to the Cougars who entered the contest ranked 17th by AP and 18th by the coaches and struck first in the opening seconds of the game, thanks to Tyron Carrier's 100-yard return of the game's opening kickoff.

But the Owls responded by scoring the next 17 points to take a 17-7 lead. Turner Petersen opened the game at quarterback and moved the Owls into scoring position on their first drive. Chris Boswell converted on a career-best 51 yard field goal to start the Owls scoring.

Rice then recovered a bobbled squib kick and needed three plays to score, with Tyler Smith taking it the final yard.

The Owls' defense sparkled in the early going, forcing a punt on the Cougars' first possession, then intercepted a Case Keenum pass on the next possession. On Houston's third series with the ball, Keenum had the ball slip out of his hands deep in his own territory and sophomore linebacker Cameron

Nwosu scooped up the ball and returned it 12 yards for the Owls' third defensive touchdown of the season.

Houston's high-powered attack found its rhythm, scoring on its next five possessions to take a 38-20 lead into the locker room. The Cougars added 28 points in the third quarter and a final score in the fourth.

Smith added a pair of long-distance scores for the Owls in the third quarter. Early in the frame, Nick Fanuzzi found him alone up the sideline on a wheel route for a 67-yard scoring play. Later, after the Owls were pinned at their own one and following a two-yard quarterback keeper, Smith darted through the line and ran away from a pack of defenders to record the longest run from scrimmage in both Rice and Conference USA history.

His 97-yard scoring jaunt knocked Dicky Maegle's famous 95-yard scoring run in the 1954 Cotton Bowl and Kyle Herm's equally long scoring sprint at home from the Rice records. He also bettered the conference mark of 96 yards by Houston's Antowain Smith in 1996.

One the night, the fifth-year senior re-wrote his personal record book, finishing with 170 yards on 13 carries and a pair of scores, 73 yards on three receptions and a touchdown, and 243 all-purpose yards. Petersen recorded his first career 100-yard rushing day, finishing with 140 yards on 23 carries.

The win by the Cougars marked the fifth straight win by the home team in the annual contest between the two schools. After Houston captured the trophy for three consecutive years from 2005-07, the two schools have traded victories over the last four games, with the home team winning each game.

Rice 41, UTEP 37

Nov. 5, 2011 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

Nick Fanuzzi threw for a career-high 405 yards to lead the Rice Owls to one of their greatest offensive outputs in school history en route to a 41-37 Homecoming win over UTEP.

All week long, the Rice Owls impressed head coach David Bailiff with a spirited week of practice on the heels of their loss to Houston and on Game Day, both coach and team savored the results of that work as the Owls extended their Homecoming winning streak to seven years and their November Rice Stadium winning streak to eight games.

Rice amassed 671 yards on the day, the third-highest total in school history, the most since piling up an even 700 vs. Tulsa at Rice Stadium in 2007. The Owls ran nearly double the amount of plays as did UTEP (93 to 50) and held the ball for nearly 40 minutes. But UTEP leveraged a number of short-field situations to keep the Owls on their heels and in need of additional offensive production.

While the Owls found early success running the ball, it fell to the steady play of Fanuzzi to rally the team in the fourth quarter and secure the victory.

Fanuzzi, who became just the third Owl to throw for over 400 yards in a game, hit on nine of 14 throws for 148 yards and a pair of scores in the final frame. His 23-yard toss to Randy Kitchens capped an eight play, 79 yard drive that was set up by the second interception of the day by freshman cornerback Bryce Callahan.

Callahan's pick quelled a UTEP march that had begun at their own 25 after the Owls had re-taken the lead.

Fanuzzi hit on 30 of 43 passes, including three touchdowns and added 35 yards on the ground to become second Owl to top 400 yards total offense in a game. Chase Clement topped the mark six times and Fanuzzi's total matched Clement's final total vs. Houston in 2008 as the sixth best in school history.

Junior wide receiver Vance McDonald led a parade of nine receivers who benefited from Fanuzzi's big day, setting career-bests with eight catches for 157 yards and a touchdown. Running back Tyler Smith also caught a career-high eight passes for 74 yards and added another 89 on the ground.

After UTEP struck in the opening minutes of the game to take a 7-0 lead, Turner Petersen quickly answered for the Owls, scoring on a career-long, 44-yard scamper out of the Wild Owl formation. The Owls unleashed a balanced attack in the opening stanza, rushing for 122 and passing for 101 to move out to an early 17-7 lead, but the Miners struck back with 17 second quarter points to take a 24-20 lead at the half.

Fanuzzi hit McDonald with a 25-yard TD pass to put the Owls back in front midway through the quarter, but UTEP struck back with a score late in the period to take a 31-27 lead into the fourth.

Dan Persa showed no lingering effects from an injury that knocked him early from a game one week earlier, throwing for 372 yards and four touchdowns to lead Northwestern to a 28-6 win over Rice.

The win evened the Wildcats' record at 5-5, keeping their bowl hopes alive, while the Owls saw their dreams of an additional game over the holidays end.

After Kyle Martens pinned Northwestern at their own four-yard line, Persa connected with Jeremy Ebert on a 90-yard scoring strike to jump out on top. The scoring connection was one of two on the day for the duo, as Ebert finished with seven catches for 208 yards.

The Owls were stymied by a Northwestern defense that allowed yards in the middle of the field before stiffening. Rice's best scoring chance of the first half came when sophomore kicker Chris Boswell attempted a school-record, 60-yard field goal just before the end of the half. Boswell's attempt was dead center, but smacked the cross bar and bounced back.

Freshman cornerback Bryce Callahan continued his drive for postseason honors by picking off his sixth pass of the season, most in the nation among freshmen. Junior Corey Frazier added his first interception of the year to give the Owls a pair of pickoffs of Persa.

Rice averted being shutout for the first time in 132 games when Tyler Smith scored on a nine-yard run with just over four minutes left in the game. The score was set up by a 43-yard pass completion from former high school quarterback Jordan Taylor to Andre Gautreaux.

Smith led the Owls with 84 yards rushing on 21 carries and added four receptions for 21 yards. Sophomore Paul Porras (13) and senior Justin Allen (10) both topped double figures in tackles.

Rice 19, Tulane 7

Nov. 19, 2011 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

On a day when 25 seniors bid farewell to Rice Stadium, three fifth-year players made certain they would close out their home careers on a winning note as they led Rice to a 19-7 victory over Tulane.

Senior defensive end Scott Solomon, who has battled a series of injuries for the latter half of the season, tied the school career sack record with a pair of quarterback drops; while linebacker Justin Allen added a pair of key tackles for losses to lead the defense. Tyler Smith rushed for 145 yards and a pair of touchdowns, continuing his late-season surge to lead the offense. The win was the Owls' ninth consecutive home win in November.

"It was really exciting to see this football team win with seniors on the Senior Day and was proud for them to have this memory," Rice head coach David Bailiff said. "For their last home game, it gave them a lot of motivation for when we got on the road and go play the SMU."

"Coming down (the ramp to be introduced in pregame ceremonies), I was flooded with emotions just like the other seniors, but once we got going we just had fun," Solomon said. "We made plays, and I felt like if you have fun out there you

make plays, and I think that was the biggest thing today."

"We kind of struggled at the beginning, we had too many emotions," Smith noted. "But we pushed through it and came out with a win."

The Owls took a 13-0 lead into the fourth quarter, thanks to a Smith five-yard run in the first quarter and a pair of long distance field goals by Chris Boswell. But the Green Wave cut that margin to 13-7 with a 16-play, 75-yard drive that ate up over six minutes. Rice was unable to move the ball on its next possession, and Tulane set up at its own 20 with 6:36 to go looking to take advantage of the tired Owls defense.

However, Solomon and fellow senior Justin Allen quickly spoiled those plans. Allen broke up a pass on first down and then Solomon followed with his second sack of Tulane's Ryan Griffin, dropping him for a five-yard loss to bring his career sack total to 24, matching Brandon Green (1999-2002) for the most in school history. Allen then stopped Orleans Darkwa for a loss on a pass reception on third down to end the Tulane possession and set up Smith for a final drive to the clinching touchdown.

Smith carried the ball 10 times in the final quarter for 69 yards, including 55 of the 60 yards the Owls needed in their final drive. He clinched the win with a 12-yard bolt up the east sideline, diving into the end zone with just over one minute left.

Boswell moved to within one field goal of the Rice season record, connecting twice into the wind from over 50 yards. He blasted a 54-yarder in the second quarter, matching the third longest field goal in school history and added a 51-yarder in the third quarter. He now has three field goals of at least 50 yards this season, and five in his career, matching James Hamrick on both accounts.

Solomon's two sacks gave him a career-high 8.5 this season, which ranks second to Green's 12 in school history. He also raised his career tackles for loss total to 42.5, also second all-time. But he was quick to share any acclaim his career totals might generate.

"I don't think it's an individual effort at all, it's a team effort," he noted. "From the coaching staff all the way down to the players: everything. It means a lot to me, but I feel like it's everyone else contributing."

One week after celebrating their own version of Senior Day with a win over Tulane, the Rice Owls saw their bid to sour SMU's senior sendoff fall just short, as the Mustangs held on for a 27-24 win on a cold and blustery afternoon.

On a day when the offense struggled against the stout SMU defensive front, Rice's defense provided the offensive spark thanks to a pair of turnovers.

SMU built a 14-0 lead while the Owls were without a first down on their first six possessions. But after Kyle Martens had pinned the Mustangs deep thanks to a 63-yard punt, Xavier Webb picked off his second pass of the season and returned it to the SMU 13.

Senior quarterback Nick Fanuzzi wasted no time, connecting with Donte Moore on a 13-yard scoring play, the first touchdown of Moore's career, to cut the margin to 14-7 with 4:45 left in the half.

The Owls defense forced a three-and-out, but found themselves with their backs immediately against the wall after an errant Fanuzzi pass picked off by Richard Crawford and returned it to the Owls' 11. But a second down stop for no gain by Justin Allen and a third down deflection of a J.J. McDermott

pass by Michael Smith forced the Mustangs to attempt a field goal which was missed.

Down 14-7, the Owls used the blustery wind and their opportunistic defense in the third quarter to take a 17-14 lead.

SMU's Jared Williams lost control of the ball while running into the line at his own 21 and Cameron Nwosu scooped up the loose ball and dodged a pair of Mustangs to score his second defensive touchdown of the year to tie the game at 14-14.

The Owls found their offensive footing on their next series, sparked by a 38-yard run up the middle by Fanuzzi to the SMU eight. A pair of runs by Tyler Smith pushed the ball to the Mustang one, but a fourth-down carry by Smith was stopped short and SMU took over on downs.

Rice's defense again forced a three-and-out and after a 25-yard punt that hung in the wind, the Owls were back inside the SMU 40, setting up a 49-yard field goal by Chris Boswell to put Rice up 17-14. The field goal was Boswell's 17th of the season, tying the school record set by James Hamrick in 1985.

SMU answered with a touchdown drive of its own extending into the fourth quarter which gave the Mustangs the wind advantage. Rishaad Wimberly scored from one-yard out, but the point after was missed, giving SMU a 20-17 lead. The Mustangs added a second score and appeared to have the game in hand, 27-17, before Fanuzzi engineered a late charge that

kept the remnants of the crowd of 14,442 in their seats.

He hit Vance McDonald over the middle and the junior wideout blasted his way for a 31-yard gain to the SMU 1. Fanuzzi hooked up with Jordan Taylor one play later to cut the margin to 27-24 and after Corey Frazier recovered the ensuing onside kick, the Owls were 59 yards away from an memorable finish to their season.

Completions to Taylor for 10 yards and Klein Kubiak for five offset a sack on first down to give the Owls a first down at the SMU 49. A nine-yard completion to Brent Hotard on third down forced a fourth-and-one from the SMU 40, but Fanuzzi's last pass attempt as an Owl was tipped at the line and fell just short of Moore, bringing Rice's final threat to an end.

Fanuzzi completed 22 of 38 passes for 158 yards and a pair of scores and added 53 yards on the ground to lead the Owls. Taylor led the receivers with a career-best five catches for 42 yards and a touchdown.

Paul Porras led the defense with eight tackles and his second interception of the year. Scott Solomon was credited with one tackle for loss (one of six by the Owls on the day), but did not register a sack, closing his career sharing the Rice career sack record of 24 with Brandon Green

It is given in memory of Bob Quin, a well-respected Rice student-athlete who passed away during a trip across the Atlantic Ocean in 1930. A group of Quin's friends felt that there would be no more suitable memorial to him than to establish an award at Rice to be given each year to the male student-athlete who exemplifies distinction in athletics, academics and leadership.
