Looks to build on an outstanding return to the lineup in 2012... Named to Athlon's preseason All C-USA first team and second team by Phil Steele... Also named to *Dave Campbell's Texas Football's* All Texas College second team.

### 2012

Enjoyed an outstanding return to the field after sitting out the 2011 season while recovering from surgery... Named to *Dave Campbell's Texas Football's* postseason All Texas College team... Honorable Mention All C-USA by league coaches... Started all 13 games and reached career highs across the board, finishing with 51 tackles, (36 unassisted), 15 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, two fumbles, two fumbles forced, one pass breakup and one interception. Ninth in the league and led the team with his 12 TFL, which also tied him for 10th on the Rice season list... Opened the year with a TFL in the first six games, including three vs. Memphis... Matched his single-game high with three vs. SMU... Sack high was a pair vs. SMU, the first of which forced a Garrett Gilbert





## David BAILIFF

### Head Coach

### Seventh Season

In leading Rice to a second bowl victory in his six seasons as head coach, David Bailiff has joined Jess Neely as the only coach to lead the Owls to multiple bowl games and has continued build a program that makes its mark on the field, in the classroom and in the community.

Since taking over in 2007, Bailiff has led the Owls to a pair of bowl championships while also improving the teams cumulative GPA each year. The Owls have led Conference USA football teams in GPA in each of their seven seasons in the conference and in 2010 were honored by the American Football Coaches Association as the co-winners of the Academic Achievement Award. He is a member of the American Football Coaches Association Board of Trustees and has served as a member of the USA Today Coaches' Poll for the past three seasons.

Bailiff's staff has made the state of Texas a priority in recruiting, solidifying relationships with high school coaches throughout the state that has also seen the Owls increase their walk-on program. The Owls 2012 recruiting class featured 17 of 18 signees from Texas.

Those recruiting efforts have also paid off as pair of players from his first Rice recruiting class (Cheta Ozougwu and Scott Solomon) were drafted and made their debuts in the NFL in 2012. All told five players who played the majority of their careers under Bailiff have reached the NFL.

He has also made good on his promise to keep the Owls active in community work, as the Owls have been tireless in their efforts with local schools and hosting a series of free clinics as well as reaching out to Rice's diverse student population through an annual International Students' Clinic each August. In July of 2009, Bailiff accepted an invitation to join with four other college football coaches on a goodwill tour to visit military personnel stationed in Afghanistan and again honored our troops in 2011 by participating as a driver in the "Crossing of America" tour. The Owls also are regular participants in efforts to send care packages to members of the armed forced deployed overseas.

He was honored by the Conference USA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) with its 2012 Coaches Choice Award. The SAAC Coaches Choice Award recognizes a coach that is committed to fostering student-athlete development and welfare through a positive athletic and academic atmosphere. Each C-USA institution selects a nominee and then voting is done by the conference SAAC representatives during its annual in-person meeting. In 2008, the Owls endured a series of challenges as well as the aftermath of Hurricane Ike and produced the first 10-win season for Rice since 1949 and the Owls' first victory in a bowl game since their memorable win over Ala-

bama in the 1954 Cotton Bowl. For his efforts, Bailiff was honored by his conference peers as the 2008 Conference USA Coach of the Year.

Opening with a 56-point outburst against SMU on national TV in late August, Chase Clement and his band of receivers piled up points at a record pace. Clement and Jarett Dillard went on to become the most productive passing duo in NCAA history, while Dillard broke the NCAA career mark for touchdown receptions. James Casey, the multi-talented former pro baseball player, broke the C-USA record with 111 catches.

Bailiff came to Rice after three seasons as the head coach at Texas State University in San Marcos, TX where he posted a 21-15 record while leading the Bobcats to their first Southland Conference championship and the semifinals of the NCAA Division 1-AA playoffs in 2005.

In his last two seasons at Texas State, Bailiff produced standouts both on the field and in the classroom. He produced both the Southland Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year in 2005 (Berrick Nealy and Fred Evans) and the league's Student Athlete of the Year for football in 2006 (Walter Musgrove). Overall, he produced a total of 14 All Southland Conference first team selections, and 13 players who were named to the academic all conference squad in his last two years.

The 2005 season was truly a magical one. The Bobcats went 9-2 during the regular season and earned the school's first berth in the Division I-AA playoffs.

In their first game, the Bobcats stormed back from a 35-16 deficit against Division I-AA national power Georgia Southern to score 34 unanswered points and beat the Eagles 50-35. The 'Cats then de-

feated Cal Poly 14-7 to move on to the national semifinals. Only a 40-37 overtime loss to Northern Iowa stood between Texas State and an appearance in the Division I-AA National Championship Game.

Bailiff was named the American Football Coaches Association's Region 5 Coach of the Year and finished third in the voting for the Eddie Robinson Award presented annually to the top coach in Division I-AA.

Prior to being named Texas State head coach, Bailiff spent three seasons on the staff at TCU. He served as the Horned Frogs' defensive coordinator in both 2002 and 2003 while working with the team's defensive linemen.

The 2003 Horned Frogs posted an 11-2 record and were ranked 25th in the final Associated Press writers poll and 24th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll. Bailiff was part of a staff which built quite a tradition on defense at TCU. During his three seasons in Fort Worth, the Horned Frogs were ranked 24th, 1st and 38th in the country in total defense and 10th, first and ninth against the run.

In 2002, TCU allowed just 240.2 yards of total offense per game which led the country. The Horned Frogs surrendered an average 64.8 yards on the ground. During the year, the Frogs held Tulane to a school-record -53 yards rushing. TCU also ranked second in the country in pass efficiency defense, allowing opponents to complete less than 39 percent of their passes.

Six TCU defensive players earned all-conference accolades in 2002 including Conference USA Defensive Player of the year and Second-Team All-American LaMarcus MacDonald.

While at TCU, the Horned Frogs played in a bowl game every season - the galleryfurniture.com Bowl (2001), AXA Liberty Bowl (2002) and the Plains Capital Fort Worth Bowl (2003).

He began his coaching career as the defensive line coach at New Braunfels High School (1982-84). He went into private business from 1984-88 before returning to the coaching ranks as a defensive graduate assistant coach at Texas State in 1988. He was elevated to the Bobcats' defensive line coach in 1989.

Bailiff left Texas State in 1992 for an assistant coaching position at New Mexico. He returned to Texas State in 1997 as defensive coordinator and added assistant head coach responsibilities to his role in 1999.

It was in 1999 that Bailiff was selected the NCAA Division I-AA Assistant Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association. While at TCU Bailiff was also honored as the Top Assistant Football Coach by the All-American Football Foundation following the Horned Frogs' 2002 season.

As a player, Bailiff was named All-Lone Star Conference as well as All-America honorable mention while playing at Texas State from 1977-80. He served as a team captain in 1980 and was named honorable mention to the Lone Star Team of the Decade.

Bailiff is married to the former Angie Daniels of Versailles, Mo. He has a daughter, Brooke (28), and the couple has twin 16-year-old sons, Grayson and Gregory.

## **Darrell PATTERSON**

**Assistant Head Coach/Linebackers**  
**Seventh Season**

Darrell Patterson is back for his seventh season of at Rice and his second as Assistant Head Coach. He is in his fourth season of guiding the Owls' linebackers and his third as special teams coordinator.

He continues to spearhead Rice's recruiting efforts in Canada, where he made his name as a CFL standout for eight seasons. The Owls have signed a total of eight Canadians in the past seven years, including All C-USA OT Scott Mitchell and All C-USA Tight End Luke Willson, who was taken by Seattle in the fifth round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Patterson joined the Rice coaching staff on February 20, 2007 after two seasons as the linebackers coach at Stanford.

Patterson was a standout linebacker at TCU from 1979-82 and is a member of the school's Hall of Fame. He remains the school's all-time leader in total tackles (544), unassisted tackles (286) and assisted tackles (258).

He was selected in the sixth round of the 1983 NFL Draft by the New York Giants, but found his way to the Canadian Football League for a seven-year career as a linebacker for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1984-88) and the Hamilton Tiger Cats (1988-90). Patterson won a Grey Cup championship with Winnipeg in 1984 and was on a runner-up in 1989 with Hamilton.

Following his playing days, Patterson began his coaching career as an intern for the British Columbia Lions in 1991. His collegiate coaching stops have included Akron (1992-94), Temple (1995-96), Kentucky (1997-2000), Arkansas State (2001), Baylor (2002), Southern Methodist (2003-04) and Stanford. He also had a coaching stint with Ottawa of the CFL in 1995.

Patterson coached linebackers during his stops at Southern Methodist, Baylor and Arkansas State. At Baylor, he coached linebacker John Garrett, who went on to sign an NFL free agent contract.

During his four seasons at Kentucky, Patterson was part of a staff that advanced to two bowl games: the Outback Bowl versus Penn State following the 1998 season and the 1999 Music City Bowl against Syracuse. While at Kentucky, Patterson coached safeties Willie Gary and Anthony Wajda to All-SEC honors, as well as Freshman All-American David Jackson.

Patterson coached defensive tackle Larry Chester during his two seasons at Temple. Chester went on to sign an NFL contract with the Indianapolis Colts. He returned to the Canadian Football League in 1995 as a defensive line and special teams coach for the Ottawa Rough Riders.

Patterson's first foray into the collegiate coaching ranks came in 1992 when he began a three-year stint at Akron (1992-94).

Patterson earned a bachelor's degree in Human Relations from TCU in 1984. He and his wife Julie, whom he met while playing professionally in Canada, have three children: a son, Michael, who was a three-year letterman and 2012 Rice graduate Rice, and two daughters, Monika and Meghan.



## John REAGAN

### Offensive Coordinator Running Backs Fourth Season

John Reagan enters his fourth season at Rice and his third as the Offensive Coordinator and will coach the running backs for his second season.

In 2012, the Owls produced the second-most productive offensive season in school history, piling up 5,556 yards, 414 points and 306 first downs on their way to winning the last five games and capturing the Armed Forces Bowl Championship. The Owls also set a school record and led the nation by averaging 33:59 in time of possession.

Reagan joined the staff on February 2, 2010, serving as run game coordinator and coaching the tight ends and assisting with the O-Line. He was promoted to Offensive Coordinator in 2010.

Prior to joining the Owls, Reagan spent five seasons at Kansas as the offensive line coach and run game coordinator. Under his direction, KU posted a better rushing average in each of the first four seasons, including running for 188.8 yards per game in 2007.

In 2008 Reagan molded an offensive line which featured two redshirt freshmen starters at the tackle spots who went on to earn freshman All-America honors (Jeremiah Hatch and Jeff Spikes), while two interior linemen, center Ryan Cantrell and guard Adrian Mayes, were both named All-Big 12 Honor-

able Mention..

Under Reagan's direction, offensive tackle Anthony Collins developed into a 2007 All-America selection and was one of three finalists for the Outland Trophy, given annually to the best interior lineman in college football. Collins went on to be selected in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals. That season, the Jayhawks were fifth in the Big 12 Conference in rushing offense and 31st in the nation with 188.8 yards per game, which included 4.8 yards per carry. KU scored 30 rushing touchdowns on the year.

The 2006 season saw the Jayhawks' rushing offense finish fourth in the Big 12 behind Jon Cornish, who set a new Kansas single-season rushing record with 1,427 yards following the KU line. Reagan saw center and senior captain David Ochoa earn All-Big 12 Second Team honors.

In 2005, KU's rushing offense ended the season averaging 134 yards per game and nearly four yards per carry. The year before his arrival, the Jayhawks averaged just 94.0 yards per game and less than three yards per carry. Two offensive linemen -- David Ochoa and Bob Whitaker -- earned All-Big 12 honors in Reagan's first year at KU.

Reagan, who spent the 2003-04 seasons as the offensive line coach at the U.S. Air Force Academy, also assisted with several special teams units at AFA, including the extra point and field goal teams. During Reagan's first year in Colorado Springs, the offensive line featured Falcon players Brett Huyser, Jesse Underbakke and Blane Neufeld, who each earned All-Mountain West Conference honors.

In 2004, Reagan took over a young, inexperienced group of linemen and molded them into one of the top offensive lines in the MWC -- two athletes, John Wilson and Ross Weaver, earned All-MWC honors.

Reagan was the offensive line coach for one season at Temple before

taking his position at Air Force. He directed the defensive line at Temple for two years before his switch to the opposite side of the ball. In 2001, Reagan directed Temple's defensive front four to a productive campaign that saw the school ranked 19th nationally in total defense. In addition, defensive tackle Dan Klecko became Temple's first unanimous All-Big East honoree, while defensive end Raheem Brock was taken in the seventh round of the NFL draft by the Philadelphia Eagles.

Reagan joined the Temple coaching staff in February 2000 after instructing the Akron defensive line in 1999. Before coaching at Akron, Reagan was the tight ends coach and offensive tackle coach at Army in 1998. In 1997, he held the same position as an assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania. Reagan spent the 1996 season as an offensive graduate assistant at Oklahoma State. He began his coaching career in 1994 as the assistant offensive line and fullback coach at Albany, where he remained until joining the Cowboys in 1996.

A native of Delmar, N.Y., Reagan was standout center at Bethlehem High School and was inducted into the Capital Region Football Hall of Fame in up-state New York in 2012.

He was a three-year starter at Syracuse, graduating in 1994 with a dual major in exercise science and sport psychology. As a senior captain in 1993, Reagan earned the Ben Schwartzwalder Most Exemplary Football Player Award after leading his team to a 26-22 victory over Colorado in the Fiesta Bowl. While with the Orangemen, he also competed in the 1992 Hall of Fame Bowl when Syracuse defeated Ohio State 24-17. Reagan was twice named to the GTE Academic All-America team (1992-93) and was presented with the Toyota Leadership Award following his senior season.

Reagan has a daughter, Kaitlyn and a son, Daniel.



## Chris THURMOND

### Defensive Coordinator Cornerbacks Second Season

Chris Thurmond enters his second as Rice's Defensive Coordinator and his third year overall coaching the Owls' cornerbacks.

In his first two seasons, Thurmond has produced a Freshman All American (Bryce Callahan, 2011) and preseason C-USA Defensive Player of the Year (Phillip Gaines, 2013). In his first season in directing the Rice defensive scheme, the Owls allowed their few points overall since 2004 and their fewest for any 13 game schedule.

Rice held five of its last eight opponents to 17 points or less as Rice went 6-2 over that stretch, culminating with a 33-14 win over Air Force. Thurmond's defenders held the nation's second ranked rushing attack to only 25 yards in the second half and 166 in the game. The Owls held opponents to a third down conversion rate of 37%, the lowest by the Owls since 2001 and tied for fifth in the country with 16 fumble recoveries.

Thurmond originally joined the staff on Feb. 22, 2011, after spending the previous three seasons at Kentucky. In his first year with the Owls, Thurmond guided redshirt freshman Bryce Callahan to Freshman All America and Conference USA All Freshman honors after picking off

six passes to lead the nation and defending 15 passes.

In his three seasons at Kentucky, the Wildcats advanced to bowl games each season -Liberty Bowl (2008), Music City Bowl (2009) and the BBVA Compass Bowl (2010). Thurmond had student-athletes go on to sign National Football League contracts two straight seasons. Cornerback Trevard Lindley earned second-team All-America honors in 2008 and established a UK career record for pass breakups. Despite being sidelined for much of his senior season in 2009, Lindley repeated All-SEC honors in 2009 and was drafted by the Eagles.

Defensive backs coached or recruited by Thurmond have been apart of the three of the last five Super Bowl championship teams. Both Anthony Madison (Pittsburgh Steelers) and Roman Harper (New Orleans Saints), who Thurmond recruited to Alabama, were members of Super Bowl XLIII and XLIV championship teams in 2009 and 2010, respectively. Thurmond also coached Green Bay Packer Charlie Peprah, who was part of the Super Bowl XLV championship team in 2011.

Between stints at Alabama (2001-02) and Kentucky (2008-10), Thurmond coached five seasons in the state of Texas. Highlighted by a trip to the Cotton Bowl following the 2004 season, he was the cornerbacks coach at Texas A&M from 2003-05.

He coached cornerbacks and was the recruiting coordinator for two seasons across town at the University of Houston (2006-07). He helped the Cougars advance to the 2006 Liberty Bowl and in 2007 was the interim head coach for UH in the Texas Bowl after head coach Art Briles became the coach at Baylor.

While at Houston, he coached cornerback Willie Gaston who was a second-team All-Conference USA selection and went on to play for the

Baltimore Ravens.

During his two seasons at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won the 2001 Independence Bowl. The 2002 Alabama team led the SEC and ranked third nationally in total defense, posting the best record in the SEC Western Division. Eight Alabama players he either coached or recruited signed National Football League contracts.

Thurmond has also worked at Tulsa (1983-91, 1994), East Carolina (1992-93), Texas Christian (1995, 1998-2000) and Oklahoma (1996- 97), coaching the cornerbacks or entire secondary unit during each of the stints.

During his second term at TCU, Thurmond helped guide the Horned Frogs to the 2000 Western Athletic Conference co-championship. TCU led the nation in scoring defense and total defense while ranking third in pass efficiency defense.

While at Tulsa in 1991, the Golden Hurricane ranked among the nation's leaders in pass defense efficiency. Tulsa capped the season with a win in the Freedom Bowl.

Thurmond has coached in 13 bowl games during his career and has coached or recruited numerous athletes who have gone on to play in the NFL. In addition to Madison, Harper, Peprah and Lindley, the list of current NFL players who were coached or recruited by Thurmond includes Houston Texans defensive end Mark Anderson.

A native of San Springs, Okla., Thurmond graduated from the University of Tulsa in 1975. He spent seven years as a high school coach in Oklahoma including head coach at his alma mater, Charles Page High School, before entering the college ranks.

Thurmond's daughter Paige lives in Little Rock, Ark.



## Larry EDMONDSON

Passing Game Coordinator/Quarterbacks  
Fifth Season

Larry Edmondson enters his fifth year with the Owls and his third quarterback coach and passing game coordinator. Edmondson joined the Rice staff on January 30, 2009 as the Owls' wide receiver coach.

In 2012, Edmondson saw junior Taylor McHargue produce the fourth-best season in school history in both passing and total offense, while redshirt freshman Driphus Jackson was able to step in when McHargue was injured and lead the Owls to victory in the Armed Forces Bowl.

Edmondson is entering his 25th year of college coaching, including 14 years of coaching wide receivers. He was the wide receivers coach at SMU from 2004 to 2007, Auburn in 1997-98, Mississippi State in 1996, LSU from 1991-94 and at Southern Miss from 1988-90. He has also served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at SMU (2002-03) and Louisiana-Lafayette (1999-2001).

While at SMU, Edmondson guided Bobby Chase to All-C-USA honors in 2005 and Emmanuel Sanders to All-Conference and freshman All-America honors in 2006. As the offensive coordinator at Louisiana-Lafayette, he constructed an offense that set six school records in 2001 and was credited with the development of sophomore quarterback Jon Van Cleave, who led the Sun Belt Conference in passing yards per game.

In addition to coaching wide receivers at Auburn, Edmondson also oversaw the Tigers recruiting efforts. Auburn won the 1997 SEC West Division championship and went on to defeat Clemson in the 1998 Peach Bowl.

A 1983 graduate of Texas A&M where he lettered as a tight end and was a teammate of Houston Texans head coach Gary Kubiak, (and now coaches Kubiak's son Klein, a freshman at Rice), Edmondson began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Aggies from 1984 to 1986. He served as a GA at Arizona in 1987 before joining Curly Hallman's staff at Southern Miss as wide receivers coach in 1988.

In his first year at USM, the Golden Eagles went 10-2 including a 38-18 win over UTEP in the Independence Bowl. Southern Miss opened the 1990 season with a win over Florida State and played in the All-American Bowl that year, and also posted wins over both Alabama and Auburn during his time there.

Married (Cara) with two children, son Sean, who is a grad assistant coach with the Owls and daughter Taylor.



## Larry HOEFER

### Safeties

### Second Season

Texas native and longtime defensive coach Larry Hoefer is in his second year with the Owls, joining the Rice staff as safeties coach on February 6, 2012.

In Hoefer's first year on South Main, the Owls safety corps overcame the loss of two-year starter Corey Frazier at the start of the season as Paul Porras put together his best season and Julius White stepped into the void and finish third on the team in tackles. Porras led the Owls with 93 tackles while he and White shared the team lead with a pair of interceptions. The Owls safeties combined with the cornerbacks to hold opponents to only 21 touchdown passes, the fewest since 2005 as the Owls went on to capture the Armed Forces Bowl title with a 33-14 win over Air Force.

The bowl game marked Hoefer's seventh as a coach, in addition one at Baylor and UTEP and four at Texas Tech.

A veteran of 36 years of coaching, Hoefer came to Rice after seven seasons at Baylor where he coached both the safeties (2003-07) and linebackers (2008-09).

Hoefer, who came to Baylor in 2003 with Guy Morriss from Kentucky, served as Baylor's defensive coordinator and safeties coach in 2007. He coached

at least one All-Big 12 performer every year.

In his first year at Baylor, Hoefer coached the Bears' leading tackler in Maurice Lane, who had 129 stops at free safety en route to honorable mention All-Big 12 honors, and Derrick Cash, the team's fourth-leading tackler as an outside safety. Another pupil, outside safety Willie Andrews, led the team in interceptions and was third on the squad in tackles.

In 2004 Andrews earn first-team All-Big 12 honors as a safety from the Dallas Morning News and as a return specialist from the league's coaches, while Lane garnered first-team all-conference recognition from the San Antonio Express-News. Lane again paced the squad in tackles, while Andrews again ranked third in tackles and had a team-high three sacks.

Lane led the Bears in tackles for the third consecutive year in 2005 en route to first-team All-Big 12 honors from both The Associated Press and the Dallas Morning News. Andrews earned first-team All-Big 12 recognition from the league's coaches as a safety and was later selected in the seventh round of the 2006 NFL Draft.

In 2006, outside safety Maurice Linguist and free safety Dwain Crawford both earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors from the league's coaches. Jordan Lake was a consensus second-team All-Big 12 selection as a free safety in 2007 after leading the Bears with 120 total tackles.

In 2008 Hoefer coached linebacker Joe Pawelek, who ranked seventh nationally in both tackles (10.7 per game) and interceptions (0.5 per game) - the only player nationally ranked in the top 10 of both categories. Pawelek was named an All-American and consensus All-Big 12 player.

Hoefer spent two seasons as safeties coach on Morriss' Kentucky staff before making the move to Waco. He went to UK from Texas-El Paso, where he was

defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the 2000 season. The Miners posted an 8-3 regular season record, were WAC co-champions and played in the Humanitarian Bowl.

Using an eight-man front under Hoefer's guidance, UTEP reduced its rushing yards allowed from 208.2 yards per game in 1999 to 153.8 ypg in the 2000 season. UTEP held five of its league opponents under 100 yards rushing.

Hoefer worked for coach Spike Dykes at Texas Tech from 1994-99, where he coached the outside linebackers. Tech was bowl-eligible every season and played in the Cotton, Copper, Alamo and Independence bowls during Hoefer's tenure. Among his pupils were Marcus Coleman, a first-team All-American in 1995 and Ty Ardoin, each of whom played in the NFL. Hoefer also coached All-Big 12 picks Robert Johnson and Jody Brown. Tech ranked first in the nation for takeaways over a five-year period from 1993-97.

Hoefer had multiple responsibilities as an assistant at Missouri from 1989-93, working his way up from receivers coach to defensive coordinator and assistant head coach. His first term at UTEP, from 1982-88, was capped by a 10-win season and a berth in the 1988 Independence Bowl.

A native of Abilene, Texas, Hoefer stayed in his hometown and played defensive back at McMurry University, graduating in 1973. He was team captain and earned the squad's MVP honor.

Hoefer's first coaching stop was at Tarleton State from 1974-75 as a graduate assistant working with the defensive backs. He went on to coach at Big Spring (Texas) High School in 1976 and Abilene (Texas) High from 1977-80. Hoefer coached at West Texas State in 1981 before joining the UTEP staff for the first time.

Hoefer and his wife, Kathy, have three children and six grandchildren.



## Billy LYNCH

### Wide Receivers

### Third Season

Billy Lynch is entering his third season of coaching the Owls wide receivers and his second as the Recruiting Coordinator.

In 2012, Lynch saw sophomore Jordan Taylor emerge as a vital component of the Owls air attack which was punctuated with his record-setting effort in the Armed Forces Bowl. Taylor set a Rice bowl game record with 153 yards and three touchdowns on nine receptions to earn Rice MVP honors in the game. A former quarterback, Taylor led the team with 57 catches on the season. Lynch also guided the transition of Sam McGuffie from running back to receiver and the senior responded with 54 receptions and five touchdowns.

Lynch joined the Rice coaching staff on Feb. 22, 2011 after six seasons at Indiana where he developed some of the most productive receivers in Hoosiers' history.

In 2010 his top three receivers, Damarlo Belcher (78 catches, 832 yards, 4 touchdowns), Terrance Turner (67, 681, 3) and Doss (63 catches, 706 yards, 7 touchdowns) topped 60 catches and 700 yards receiving and the unit set a school record with 3,446 total yard.

In 2009, Tandon Doss became Lynch's second All-Big Ten receiv-

er (James Hardy), as he earned first team honors from the conference media and second team recognition from the league's coaches.

As sophomores in 2009, Doss and Belcher became the first duo in IU history to each collect 60-plus receptions and 700-plus yards in a season. Their 138 combined catches rank first in Hoosier lore (third in Big Ten in 2009) and 1,732 yards sit second (second in Big Ten).

Doss finished second in the Big Ten and 30th nationally in yards per game (80.2) and third in the league and tied for 22nd nationally in catches per game (6.64).

The 2008 corps, led by Ray Fisher and Andrew Means, saw four receivers reach 25 receptions and post over 275 yards. It also featured one of the top true freshman duos in IU history - Belcher and Doss.

Fisher and Means, who signed a professional baseball contract with the Cincinnati Reds in 2008, became the 13th and 14th Hoosiers, respectively, to go over 100 career receptions and 1,000 career yards in 2008, joining Hardy as the second and third wideouts under Lynch to enter the elite club. Means also earned a spot on the Biletnikoff Award Watch List, the third straight year a Hoosier appeared on the list (Hardy - 2006, 2007).

Belcher (25 catches, 337 yards and two touchdowns) and Doss (14, 186, one) combined for the second-highest receiving yardage total by a true freshman duo in school history.

The 2007 season saw Lynch's wide receivers re-write the IU record books, as they recorded a school-record 3,073 yards. Hardy, who was selected in the second round (41st pick) by the Buffalo Bills, set new school marks with 16 receiving TDs and 79 catches. He finished

his career as the school's all-time receiving yardage (2,740), receptions (191) and receiving touchdowns (36) leader. Hardy was a semi-finalist for the Biletnikoff Award, named All-America by five publications and selected first team All-Big Ten.

The 2006 Hoosiers finished third in the Big Ten in receiving yards per game. Hardy was a second team all-conference selection after leading the team with 51 catches, 722 yards and 10 touchdowns. Six different Hoosier wideouts caught 20 passes and went over 200 yards, with five of those six being underclassmen.

In 2005, Hardy finished with 61 receptions (fourth in school history), 10 touchdowns (tied for third all-time) and 893 yards (seventh all-time). In addition, his five 100-yard games were tied for the second most in a season in school history.

One of five assistant coaches that came from Miami (Ohio) University to Indiana, Lynch was the RedHawks' tight ends coach in 2004 and offensive graduate assistant in 2002-03. During his tenure in Oxford, Lynch assisted with a potent offense that led the nation at 43.0 points per game in 2003.

He spent his undergraduate years as a wide receiver and three-year letter winner at Ball State University, where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in education in 2002. He led the Cardinals with 40 receptions his senior year. He also lettered three years in basketball, including the 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons for then-BSU head coach and current Indiana assistant basketball coach Tim Buckley.

Billy and his wife, Carla, have three children, Lindsey (7), and two sons, Max (5), and Ryan (4).



## Michael SLATER

Defensive Line  
Second Season

Michael Slater returns for his second season of coaching the Rice defensive line.

Slater's first season opened with only one returning starter and concluded with his squad producing one of the most productive seasons by a Rice defensive line in recent history.

Each of the four starters recorded at least five sacks and the Owls finished with 28, their highest total since 2006. Interior defenders Hosam Shahin and Christian Covington combined for 10 sacks, the most for any interior duo in school history. Junior defensive end Cody Bauer returned to the field after an injury redshirt and tied for the team lead with 5.5 sacks and earned second team postseason All Texas College honors from *Dave Campbell's Texas Football*.

No stranger to the Rice campus, Slater served for three seasons at Rice as a defensive graduate assistant, earning a Master's of Liberal Studies degree during his tenure while working with the defensive line. After

his graduation in the spring of 2011, Slater spent one season as the Defensive Line coach at Angelo State before returning to Rice.

Slater coached at the high school level in the Houston area for 12 years, first at Alief Hastings for five seasons and most recently at Alief Taylor for seven years. He coached the defensive line and also coordinated special teams.

As the defensive line coach at Taylor, he coached future Owl and current Chicago Bear Cheta Ozougwu.

He began his coaching career while attending Southwest Texas State (now Texas State), where he served as a student assistant coach in 1993 before graduating with a degree in Agriculture/Animal Science.

Slater has one son, Kyle.



## **David SLOAN**

**Tight Ends/Assistant Special Teams  
Fourth Season**

2013 marks the second season that former NFL Tight End David Sloan will coach the Owl's Tight Ends and assist with Special Teams. Sloan is in his fourth season overall at Rice, having spent his first two as an Offensive Graduate Assistant and Special Teams Quality Control Coach.

In his first season, Sloan had arguably one of the top tight end units in the country in Vance McDonald, Luke Willson and Taylor Cook and his unit joined Stanford as the only to produce two tight ends drafted in the first five rounds of the NFL Draft.

McDonald was taken in the second round by the San Francisco 49ers after finishing his career ranked in the Owls top ten in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns. McDonald became the first Owl since ND Kalu in 1996 to be invited to play in the Senior Bowl. Willson, who was taken by Seattle in the fifth round, was a four-year starter who was drafted by the Toronto Argos of the CFL prior

to his senior year and was a standout in the NFLPA Collegiate Bowl in January. Cook's solid year ended with a tryout with the Cowboys, completing his successful transition from quarterback to tight end. Sloan's contributions in Special Teams were also noteworthy as his punt return unit became the first to score a touchdown since 1997 and his kickoff return unit also became the first to take one the distance since 1984.

When Sloan joined the Owls in 2010, he reunited with Rice head coach David Bailiff, who was on the staff at the University of New Mexico in 1993 when Sloan signed with the Lobos out of junior college.

A two-time Academic All-Conference selection while playing basketball at Fresno City College from 1990-91, Sloan made the jump to football in the fall of 1992.

He caught the eye of Bailiff after catching 13 passes for 254 yards and 4 touchdowns. He signed with New Mexico and earned All-WAC Honorable Mention as a junior in 1993. He improved on that effort as a senior, earning first-Team All-WAC honors and was named one of the Lobos' team co-captains after catching 24 receptions for 320 yards and 1 touchdown during his senior campaign. After his senior year, he played in the Blue Gray All-Star Game, Senior Bowl and participated in NFL Scouting combine in Indianapolis.

Sloan was selected as the sixth pick in the third round in 1995 by the Detroit Lions and became a starter midway through his rookie season and the Lions won seven straight to earn a playoff spot. He enjoyed his best season in 1999, when he earned All-Pro honors after catching 47 passes for 591 yards and four touchdowns as the Lions again reached the playoffs.

Sloan started for the NFC in the 2000 Pro Bowl and was named as an alternate in 2001. He led the Lions with seven touchdown passes in 2001. He was signed by New Orleans in 2002 and retired after the 2003 season. He finished his NFL career with 199 receptions, for 2251 yards and 17 touchdowns including seven catches for 100 yards and two touchdowns in three playoff games.

He has two daughters: Trinity (8) and Bentley (6).



## Ronnie VINKLAREK

### Offensive Line

### Fifth Season

Ronnie Vinklarek enters his fifth season of coaching the Rice offensive line, having joined the Owls' football staff on February 28, 2009.

After losing four players who had started 166 games, Vinklarek oversaw a total overhaul of the Owls offensive line in 2012 and his new front line led the way for an offense that produced the second-best marks in total offense, scoring and first downs in addition leading the nation in time of possession.

In 2013, Vinklarek welcomes veteran line that features two seniors, two juniors and a sophomore in addition to a number of redshirted freshmen who will battle for playing time.

Vinklarek is no stranger to the Houston area or Conference USA. He coached the linemen at the University of Houston from 1988-93 and at SMU from 2004-07. He also coached at the high school level in Houston, coaching the defensive line at Spring Branch High School in 1983-84.

While at Houston, he mentored the offensive line that protected Andre Ware during his Heisman Trophy winning season (1989) and was selected to coach in the 1990 Blue-Gray Game after helping UH to a 10-1 season. He originally came to Houston as a graduate assistant under former Houston Oilers and Washington Redskins head coach Jack Pardee and was promoted to full-time assistant in 1990.

Vinklarek coached in the NFL for three seasons. He broke into the league in 2000 with the Tennessee Titans as their defensive quality control, linebackers and special teams coach. He moved on to the Buffalo Bills in 2001 and coached their offensive line for two seasons. In 2002 the Bills offensive line paved the way for a 4,359-yard passer in Drew Bledsoe, a 1,439-yard rusher in Travis Henry and two 1,200-yard-plus receivers in Eric Moulds and Peerless Price.

Prior to joining the Owls, he coached the offensive line for the Edmonton Eskimos of the CFL. He broke into the coaching ranks as the seventh and eighth grade coach at Hill Country Middle School after graduating from Southwest Texas in 1981. From 1983 to 1984, was the defensive line coach for Spring Branch High School in Houston before becoming the defensive coordinator at Marble Falls (Texas) High School from 1984-86.

He also served as offensive line coach at Oklahoma State (1998 & 1999), Valdosta State (1997) as well as with the CFL's Birmingham Barracudas (1995).

A Flatonia, Texas, native, Vinklarek is married to the former Marianne Britz. The couple has two sons, Trevor and Trent.



**Ryan CANTRELL**

Fourth Season

Ryan Cantrell joined the Rice football staff prior to the start of the 2010 season.

A Houston native, Cantrell was a standout center at Kansas while playing for current Owls' Offensive Coordinator John Reagan. He started 33 games at KU, including his final 25 consecutive, and was elected as a captain of the Jayhawks' 2008 team.

As a junior, he anchored an offensive line (which included current Rice offensive grad assistant Adrian Mayes) that led KU to an Orange Bowl title. He was a member of three bowl championship teams (2005 Fort Worth Bowl, 2008 Orange Bowl, 2008 Insight Bowl) and was named honorable mention All Big XII in his last two seasons as well as to the Rimington Award Watch List prior to his senior year. He was presented the Gale Sayers Award for Courage as

a senior.

He was a two-time member of the KU Athletic Director's Honor Roll and graduated with a degree in Economics (with a Business minor) in 2009.

A 2004 graduate of Clements High School where he was a member of *Dave Campbell's Texas Football SuperTeam*, Cantrell returned to the school after his graduation from Kansas and was an assistant offensive line coach from 2009-10.

Adrian Mayes joined the Rice football staff as a Graduate Assistant in 2011.

Mayes walked on at Kansas and developed into a standout offensive guard, being named the Jayhawks Offensive Lineman of the Year as a senior. He was a two-time honorable mention All Big XII selection while playing for current Owls' Offensive Coordinator John Reagan alongside current Owls Offensive Quality Control assistant Ryan Cantrell.

Mayes was a two-year starter and a member of three bowl championship squads (2005 Fort Worth Bowl, 2008 Orange Bowl, 2008 Insight Bowl). He also excelled in the classroom, earning back-to-back spots on the Big XII All Academic second team.

He earned both his bachelor's (Business Management Leadership 2009) and master's degree (Sport Management 2011) from Kansas. He served as a Graduate Assistant on KU's Strength and Conditioning staff while earning his masters.

Mayes and wife Amy make their home in Houston along with their two dogs, Marley and Minnie.

## **UCLA 49, Rice 24**

**Aug. 30, 2012 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas**

On a night that saw a number of odd plays and unpredictable outcomes around the country, Rice and UCLA staged their own worthy contribution. The two teams fashioned a wild first half filled long scoring plays that generated 59 points and an NCAA record for blocked extra points, but the Bruins defense tossed a second-half shutout and emerged with a 49-24 win at Rice Stadium on Thursday Night.

UCLA's Jonathan Franklin rushed for 214 yards and scored a pair of touchdowns, while redshirt freshman quarterback Brett Hundley threw for 202 and ran for 68 to hand Bruins' coach Jim Mora a win in his collegiate debut. The pair sparked an early Bruin explosion that saw them take a 19-0 lead on just five offensive plays.

Rice linebacker Cameron Nwosu was the cause for the odd tally on the scoreboard. The junior from Houston blocked each of the Bruins' first two extra points and added a third in late in the second quarter to break the NCAA single-game record of two, which had been done five times.

Junior quarterback Taylor McHargue rallied the crowd of 23,105 from their slumber by cutting the margin to 19-7 with an eight-yard touchdown pass to Luke Willson. McHargue finished the night with a career-best 95 yards on the ground and threw for 172 more with a pair of scores.

The Owls defense, having been stung on the previous three possessions, forced a three-and-out to hand the ball right back to their offense. McHargue hit Jordan Taylor with a 28-yard pass to move into UCLA territory, but when the drive stalled, the Owls turned to their Groza Award candidate Chris Boswell who cut the margin to 19-10 with a 53-yard field goal.

The three-pointer was Boswell's sixth career kick of 50 yards or better, breaking the school record he had shared with James Hamrick, and was only one yard shy of this career long kick in 2011 vs. Tulane.

The Owls would continue to storm back, cutting the margin to 19-17 early in the second quarter on a short plunge by McHargue. UCLA answered with a field goal to extend the margin to 22-17, but the Owls appeared ready to answer with a field goal of their own, but Boswell was wide left from 43 yards. UCLA then dipped back into the explosive playbook, as Franklin scored on a 78-yard run to push the lead back to 29-17, but McHargue answered right back, driving the Owls 75 yards to a two-yard touchdown toss to Sam McGuffie to draw them to 29-24.

A Nwosu interception seemed to close the door on the first half with the Owls down just five, but UCLA's Damien Holmes scooped up a late fumble for a 44-yard score and give UCLA a 35-24 cushion at the break.

The second half could not maintain the manic pace of the first, as the two teams combined for just over 100 yards and no points. UCLA iced the game with a pair of fourth-quarter scores to send them home to face Nebraska in the Rose Bowl next Saturday.

## Rice 25, Kansas 24

Sept. 8, 2012 • Memorial Stadium • Lawrence, Kansas

Chris Boswell drilled a 45-yard field goal as time expired to cap furious Rice rally and give the Owls their first victory over a Big XII school in history, downing Kansas 25-24 in Lawrence on Saturday.

A crowd of 44,683 sat in stunned silence as Boswell's winner sailed through goal post in the south end zone, breaking a streak of 20 consecutive losses against Big XII schools dating back to the birth of the league in 1996. It was also the Owls' first road win against a BCS conference school since they won at Northwestern in 1997.

Less than two quarters earlier, the home crowd was settling comfortably in their seats after the Jayhawks opened the second half with a nine play, 75-yard drive to push the lead to 24-13. However, the home team would not add another point, seeing a pair of second-half field goals miss the target, while the Owls and their kicker began to mount their comeback.

Down 24-16, Rice found itself pinned back at its own seven after penalty on a punt return. But junior quarterback Taylor McHargue, who tied his career-high with 23 completions, hit on all four throws for 81 yards to lead the Owls quickly down the field. He hit Vance McDonald for a 38-yard gain and con-

nected with Jordan Taylor three times for 43 yards, including a leaping 29-yard grab to the Jayhawk two yard line to set up Charles Ross' short plunge to close the gap to 24-22.

Taylor topped 100 yards receiving for the first time in his career, finishing with a career-best nine catches for 101 yards. Ross put together his most productive game since his freshman year, rushing for 94 yards on 14 carries.

Sophomore safety Julius White, making his first career start, teamed with Christian Covington to drop Taylor Cox for a two-yard loss on second down and one play later, Callahan picked off his second pass of the day to present the Rice offense with the opportunity they sought with just 3:47 left on the clock.

Knowing they only needed to travel a short distance to place Boswell within striking distance, the Owls were staring down a 4th and four at the KU 47 before McHargue and McDonald combined on a crucial seven-yard connection. A 12-yard scamper by McHargue three plays later place the ball well within Boswell's range.

After the Jayhawks attempted to ice Boswell by calling their last two time outs, the Groza Award candidate set of a celebration on the Owls sideline and in the far corner of the end zone where Owls fans were seated with a solid kick between the uprights.

It was the Owls first win as time expired since their thriller vs. Purdue at Rice Stadium last year and was the first walk off win via field goal since Clark Fangmeier beat SMU with a three-pointer on the road in 2007 as time expired.

## Louisiana Tech 56, Rice 37

Sept. 15, 2012 • Joe Aillet Stadium • Ruston, La.

Louisiana Tech started fast and never looked back, taking a 56-37 home win over the visiting Rice Owls Saturday night at Aillet Stadium in Ruston, La.

The Bulldogs jumped out to a 21-0 advantage and then traded points with the Owls the rest of the way to remain unbeaten and top 50 points in consecutive games for the first time since 1910.

Rice head coach David Bailiff said the dramatic last-second win over Kansas the previous week may have had a lingering impact on preparations for Tech.

Junior quarterback Taylor McHargue and junior running back Charles Ross provided most of the firepower for the Owls, who finished the day night with a season-best 477 yards of total offense.

McHargue finished with 298 yards of total offense, throwing for 205 yards and a pair of touchdowns and rushing for three more scores in addition to totaling 93 yards on the ground. Ross rushed for a career-best 116 yards on 14 carries and added 18 more on his first career touchdown reception.

Junior placekicker Chris Boswell added another school record to his collection when he connected on a 57-yard field goal just before halftime. The kick tied James Hamrick's school record for the longest field goal and it allowed Boswell to move past Hamrick into sole possession of the Rice career field goal mark with 34.

It was also Boswell's seventh career field goal of 50 yards or longer (also a school record), moving him into a tie with Clayton Sturgis of Florida for the most from that distance among active kickers. Boswell is the only one of the top ten active kickers on the list who is not a senior.

The Owls are now 1-2 on the young season, with the losses coming at the hands of a pair of unbeatens: UCLA which moved to 3-0 with a 37-6 win over Houston late Saturday night, and the Bulldogs, who opened their season with a 56-49 win over the Cougars the previous weekend.

## Marshall 54, Rice 51 (2OT)

Sept. 22, 2012 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

After over 1200 yards of total offense, an epic offensive slugfest was settled by just five yards, as Marshall's Kevin Grooms covered that distance give the Herd a 54-51 win over Rice in double overtime at Rice Stadium on Saturday.

Marshall entered the game as the nation's top passing offense, but the Herd turned to their running game, finishing with 361 yards while throwing for 259. The Owls finished with 647 yards, the fifth most in school history with a balanced attack that topped 300 yards on the ground (301) and through the air (346).

Grooms' score in the second overtime came after Rice had been held to a field goal in its second possession of the extra period. The Owls force the overtime thanks to the heroics of quarterback Taylor McHargue, who brought the Owls back from a 10-point deficit in the last four minutes.

McHargue shattered every measuring stick for personal performance, becoming the second Rice player to top 450 yards of total offense, finishing with 467. He threw for 314 and three scores and ran for 153 and another score, with 98 of those rushing yards coming in the course of three plays in the last three minutes that put Rice in position to win the game.

Down 41-31, he fashioned an improbable 43-yard scoring run that began as an escape from the Marshall pass rush and ended with a sprint into the northeast corner of the end zone.

After a Boswell kickoff pinning Marshall at its own six, Cameron Nwosu made a pair of key stops to thwart the Herd's plans to run out the clock and force a punt to give the ball right back to McHargue and the offense.

He hit Jordan Taylor with a 13-yard gain on first down, then rushed for eight. An incompletion to Turner Petersen was followed by a nine-yard run by Petersen for a first down. McHargue then busted off an epic 47-yard run that ended at the Marshall two, but also ended with McHargue on the ground in pain after suffering an injury when he hit the ground. He did not return to the game.

After a one-yard run by Turner Petersen put the ball at the Marshall one, a false start penalty later moved the Owls back to the six and they eventually were forced to settle for a Chris Boswell field goal to send the game to overtime. Marshall scored to open the overtime, but Jackson led Rice to a tying score. He hit Jordan Taylor with a 22-yard strike to the three and then scored his first career touchdown two plays later to send the game to a second overtime.

Jackson led Rice to one first down on the Owls second overtime possession, but the drive stalled at the Marshall 11 and Boswell booted his third field goal to give Rice its first lead of the day, setting the stage for Grooms' game winner.

## Houston 35, Rice 14

Sept. 29, 2012 • Reliant Stadium • Houston, Texas

Driphus Jackson threw for 272 yards in his starting debut and connected with Sam McGuffie on the longest passing play in school history, but it wasn't enough to overcome the Houston Cougars, who retained the Bayou Bucket with a 35-14 win at Reliant Stadium on Saturday in front of a crowd of 32,718.

Jackson, subbing for an injured Taylor McHargue, completed 17-35 passes and threw his first two touchdown passes, both to senior Sam McGuffie, who finished with a career-best 119 yards on six receptions.

The game began tentatively for both teams. Rice moved 22 yards on the game's first series but Jackson was sacked for the first of five times on the day and fumbled to set up Houston at the Owls' 31. However the Owls defense allowed the Cougars to advance only three yards and Matt Hogan's 45-yard field goal attempt sailed wide left.

The Cougars found the end zone on their next series, driving 65 yards in seven plays, the last 25 coming on a David Piland pass to Larry McDuffey.

Houston extended the lead to 14-0 at halftime and built a commanding 28-0 lead in the third before the Owls broke into the scoring column.

Two plays after Michael Kutzler recovered a fumbled punt, Jackson lobbed a 24-yard scoring toss to McGuffie to cut the margin to 28-7. They pair connected again late in the fourth quarter after defensive end Cody Bauer recovered a Houston fumble. Jackson hit McGuffie up the west sideline on an 88-yard scoring strike which broke the school record for the longest pass play in school history. Kerry Overton and Elliston Stinson combined on an 86-yard play at Air Force in 1985.

It also marked the second straight Bayou Bucket in which a long-standing Rice record was broken. Tyler Smith scored on a 97-yard run last year at Robertson Stadium.

The loss marked the first time since 2006-07 that the Owls have dropped consecutive efforts to capture the Bayou Bucket and dropped the Owls to 1-4 on the season, 0-2 in Conference USA.

## Memphis 14, Rice 10

Oct. 6, 2011 • Liberty Bowl Stadium • Memphis, Tenn.

After shutting out Memphis through the first 30 minutes, the Rice Owls found the tables turned in the second half, as the Tigers blank the Owls while finding the end zone twice to claim a 14-10 victory at the Liberty Bowl on Saturday night.

The Owls hit the midpoint of the game with a 10-0 lead, thanks to 12-yard return of a fumble by Phillip Gaines on Memphis' first play from scrimmage and a strong defensive effort that limited the Tigers to just 97 yards in the first two quarters. But poor field position and costly penalties in the third quarter led to a pair of Memphis touchdowns while the Tigers defense stymied the Owls in the second half.

The Owls force four punts and a pair of turnovers in the first half and opened the second half by forcing the Tigers' fifth punt of the night, but Dennis Parks fumbled the attempt at a fair catch and the Tigers had the ball at the Rice 27. While the Owls defense responded and forced another punt, the field position battle shifted further in favor of Memphis, after the punt was downed at the Rice one yard line.

Memphis forced a Rice punt and then embarked on a seven play, 44 yard drive to reach the end zone for the first time. The Tigers then attempted to surprise the Owls with an onside kick attempt, but Andre Gautreaux foiled the attempt to set Rice up at the Memphis 39.

But the Tigers allowed just three yards on three plays, and Chris Boswell's 53-yard field goal was short of the mark. Memphis took over at its 36 and marched 64 yards in eight plays to take the lead.

The Owls were held to only two first down in the second half and could never mount a serious scoring threat over their last three possessions.

Quarterback Taylor McHargue, who missed the Houston game with an injury sustained late in the C-USA opener vs. Marshall, returned to the starting lineup and hit on 16 of 30 passes for 117 yards. Turner Petersen, who also missed the Houston game, led the Owls in rushing. Linebacker James Radcliffe, making his first career start, was credited with a career-high 12 tackles, including three for losses. Cody Bauer was credited with nine tackles, including three for losses and also recovered a fumble.

The 24 combined points in the game were the fewest in C-USA game for the Owls in their eight seasons in the league and the fewest in any game since they defeated Houston 10-7 in the opening game of the 2004 season.

The Owls will step out of conference action this week, hosting the UTSA Roadrunners at 2:30 next Saturday. The game will be the centerpiece of activities celebrating the culmination of the Rice Centennial. In addition, former Owl All America Tommy Kramer will be honored by the National Football Foundation with his on-campus salute for his pending induction into the College Football Hall of Fame.

## Rice 34, UTSA 14

Oct. 13, 2012 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

On a day awash in tradition and commemoration, the Rice Owls extended their Homecoming winning streak and regained their footing after a frustrating three-week run, using a dominating performance along the line of scrimmage to down the UTSA Roadrunners, 34-14.

Rice University concluded a year-long celebration of its Centennial with the Homecoming football game serving as one of the final events. At the same time, Rice and the National Football Foundation honored former Owl All America Tommy Kramer with his on-campus salute, a prelude to his official induction into the College Football Hall of Fame in December.

Wearing throwback uniforms to honor some of the Owls' greatest teams of the past, the current edition of the Owls used a dominating performance by both lines to earn their eighth consecutive Homecoming victory and end a four-game losing streak.

After a pair of Chris Boswell field goals in the first quarter, the Owls dipped into their bag of tricks to score their first offensive touchdown in the last six quarters. True freshman running back Luke Turner, who was a quarterback at Gilmer High School one year ago, threaded a pass to Donte Moore that resulted in a 38-yard scoring play.

UTSA mounted responding drive of its own, moving to the Rice one on second and goal. But a mishandled handoff resulted in a two-yard loss and James Radcliffe forced an incompletion on third down to hold the Roadrunners to a field goal.

Holding just a 13-3 lead after the first 30 minutes, the Owls turned to their youthful offensive line to open the second half. The line, which opened the year as one of the least experienced in college football and was playing Ian Gray making his first career start at right tackle in place of an injured Caleb Williams, led the Owls on a 12 play, 75 yard drive entirely on the ground to extend the margin to 20-3.

After a three-and-out by the defense, Taylor McHargue revisited a section of the playbook that had been off limits in his initial return from a shoulder injury at the end of the Marshall game, dashing down field and directing blocks by Vance McDonald and Donte Moore for a 44-yard touchdown to give the Owls additional breathing room.

After UTSA scored 11 points to cut the margin to 27-14, McHargue answered back with an 11-play, 72 yard march, ending it with a three-yard keeper on an option play.

McHargue finished the day with 212 yards of total offense, throwing for 144 and rushing for 68. The Owls rushing attack was fueled early by junior Charles Ross, who ran for a career-high 117 yards and later by Turner Petersen and true freshman Brandon Hamilton who added 53 yards each.

The Owls closed out their 2012 non-conference schedule with a 2-2 mark, their best since they were 2-2 in 2008.

## Tulsa 28, Rice 24

Oct. 20, 2012 • H.A. Chapman Stadium • Tulsa, Okla.

Ja'Terian Douglas turned a stout Rice defensive effort on its ear, bursting free on a 75-yard run late in the fourth quarter to set up the winning score as Tulsa downed Rice 28-24 at H.A. Chapman Stadium in Tulsa.

Tulsa improved to 7-1 overall and kept its conference record spotless at 5-0, while Rice fell to 2-6 and 0-4 in the league.

The Owls were making a strong bid to snap a five-game losing streak to the Hurricane and a 13-game road losing streak inside Conference USA and never trailed until the game's final moments. They had outrushed the conference's leading ground attack and dominated possession time in the second half, holding the ball for 23:14. The Owls offensive line held the top sack attack in FBS to half their average while rushing for 246 yards. The Rice defense had held Tulsa to just 159 yards on the ground before the fateful possession.

But after finding the end zone three times in the first half, they could capitalize on only one of three scoring chances in the second half, a Chris Boswell 35-yard field goal with 9:24 left in the fourth to break a 21-21 tie. Those missed opportunities came back to haunt the Owls in the game's final moments.

True freshman Luke Turner ran for a career-best 102 yards, all in the second half to set the Owls up with their scoring chances. He carried three times for 27 yards to set up Boswell's 35-yarder and then after a 14-yard Tulsa punt set the Owls up at the Rice 47, Turner carried the ball seven times for 24 yards to set up a 36-yard attempt that was wide left.

On the first of eight punts by the Hurricane, Sam McGuffie broke past the defenders to block Cole Way's punt then picked up the loose ball and returned it the final 12 yards for a touchdown. The score goes into the books as a punt return and was the first punt return touchdown by the Owls in 173 games since LaDoughyous McCalla returned one against TCU on Nov. 8, 1997.

Tulsa responded with a score to knot the game at 7-7 but the Owls defense forced consecutive three-and-outs on Tulsa's next two possessions, the second coming when the Golden Hurricane were pinned deep in their own end after a Boswell punt to the Tulsa nine. After a 41-yard punt by Way, the Owls set up shop at their own 48 as the first quarter neared its end.

Taylor McHargue took the lead as the drive resumed in the second stanza, scrambling for 15 yards and then covering the final 20 on a quarterback draw to put Rice back up 14-7.

Working with a short field after the kickoff went out of bounds, Tulsa needed just three plays to cover 65 yards and tie the game again.

But the Owls answered right back, driving 75 yards in nine plays with McHargue connecting with Luke Willson for an eight yard touchdown. The scoring play was Willson's first trip to the end zone since he scored the Owls first touchdown of the season vs. UCLA.

The lead held through most of the third quarter until Dexter McCoil picked off a McHargue pass at the Rice 28 and Henderson found Garrett for a 28-yard score to tie the game at 21.

Turner's running gave the Owls their final lead of 24-21, but 58 minutes of winning effort came crashing down as Douglas darted through the Owls defense in the final moments to hand the Hurricane a memorable Homecoming win.

## Rice 44, Southern Miss 17

Oct. 27, 2012 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

The Rice Owls rebounded from a frustrating late loss at Tulsa, putting together their best overall performance of the year in a 44-17 throttling of Southern Miss at Rice Stadium. The win broke a five-game conference losing streak for the Owls.

Turner Petersen rushed for a season-high 136 yards on one touchdown and added a second score on an 38 yards pass from Driphus Jackson, while the Owls defensive added six points of their own while forcing five turnovers and recording 10 tackles for loss to give Rice its most decisive Conference USA win since the Owls blitzed SMU 56-27 in the opening game of the 2008 season.

After trading punts in the early going, Rice took advantage of a special team's error by Southern Miss to break on top.

An errant snap on a punt ended when USM punter Peter Boehme was tackled for a nine-yard loss. Starting from their own 49, the Owls needed four plays to cover the 51 yards, the final 35 coming on a pass from McHargue to Dennis Parks. The touchdown reception was the first of Parks' career and the ninth of the season for McHargue to establish a career-best.

After a 50-yard field goal by Corey Acosta put Southern Miss on the scoreboard, J.T. Blasingame's 46-yard kickoff return set the Owls up on the Southern Miss half of the field near the end of the first quarter. On the first play of the second stanza, Driphus Jackson hit Turner Petersen in stride up the right sideline for a 38-yard touchdown.

USM responded with a 75 yard march to cut the margin to 14-10 and looked to be headed for more on its next possession before a sack by Hosam Shahin and Christian Covington forced a 40-yard attempt by Acosta that sailed right into the gusting northerly winds.

Taking over at its 25, the Owls needed 10 plays to cover the distance, with Donte Moore finishing the drive with an nine-yard run on a reverse to send the Owls to the locker room with a 21-10 lead.

After a Boswell 40-yard field goal gave the Owls a 24-10 game, Porras plucked a deflected pass out of the air in front of the Rice bench and returned it 75-yards to give the Owls a three touchdown advantage. The interception return for a touchdown was the first by an Owl since Chris Douglas returned one 40 yards vs. North Texas in 2008.

Jackson then found Moore for a 25-yd touchdown to extend the margin to 38-10.

Leading 38-17 in the fourth, the Owls turned to Petersen and the running game to snuff out any last hopes for the Golden Eagles. Petersen carried the bulk of the assignment, closing the drive with an eight-yard touchdown. His effort pushed his career total to 1,045 yards, making him the third current Owl to have rushed for over 1,000 yards in his career.

Sophomore Gabe Baker, in his second career start, finished with a career-high nine tackles to lead a stout Rice defensive effort that included interceptions from Porras, Cameron Nwosu and Julius White, sacks by Cody Bauer, Hosam Shahin, Jared Williams and Christian Covington and fumble recoveries by James Radcliffe and Ross Winship.

## Rice 49, Tulane 47

Nov. 3, 2012 • M-B Superdome • New Orleans, La.

Phillip Gaines has re-written the Rice record book for pass breakups, but it will be the one that does not count that will be best remembered as the most crucial one of his junior season as he foiled Tulane's two-point conversion attempt with 56 seconds left to give Rice a 49-47 win.

The win broke a 14-game road losing streak for the Owls in conference play and was their third in the last four games, giving them a surge of momentum heading into their bye week.

Gaines came into Saturday tied for the national lead in breakups and added a 17th earlier in the game to set a school record, but his game-saver does not count in the statistics because two-point conversions are untimed downs. However, it had a major impact on this team's drive to remain in contention for a postseason bowl. Senior Taylor Cook then slammed the door on Tulane's hopes for a Homecoming win by recovering the Green Wave's onside kick attempt.

There was special satisfaction that Cook ended the game with the ball in his hands. In Rice's last game in New Orleans as a quarterback in relief of starter Nick Fanuzzi, Cook had seen his own rally fall short on the final play, ending the Owls' hopes for bowl eligibility.

Cook also led the team with three catches for 53 yards.

The foiled two-point attempt dimmed an amazing second half for Tulane quarterback Ryan Griffin, who threw for 341 yards and three touchdowns in the second half.

Rice QB Taylor McHargue, who threw for 259 yards and ran for another 60, led a pair of fourth quarter scoring drives after Tulane took its only lead of the day to put Rice up 49-41 to force Tulane to go for two at the end of the game.

Rice scored three times off turnovers in the first half and headed to the locker room with a 28-10 lead.

The Owls opened sharply, taking the opening kickoff and marching 75 yards in seven plays with McHargue capping the drive with a nine-yard run. McHargue was back in the end zone less than two minutes later, scoring from 11 yards out after the Owls were set up deep in Green Wave territory thanks to a fumble on the kickoff following his first touchdown.

Rice stumbled over the next few series, thanks to a flurry of penalties. Tulane took advantage of favorable field position and a roughing the passer penalty to cut the lead to 14-7 on a 35-yard pass from Griffin to Wilson Van Hooser.

Baker grabbed a deflected pass and sprinted untouched for a 55-yard touchdown, the Owls second pick six in as many weeks. Baker's score on his first career interception gave the Owls 28 first-half points, their largest production of the year and their most since they scored 34 against East Carolina in the first half on November 20, 2010.

Tulane turned the tables on the Owls in the third quarter when Ryan Travis plucked a deflection off the hands of Jordan Taylor and returned it 73 yards for a score, setting off a wild third quarter that saw Tulane outscore the Owls 28-7 to take a 38-35 lead.

## Rice 36, SMU 14

Nov. 17, 2012 • Rice Stadium • Houston, Texas

Chris Boswell tied an NCAA record with his long-distance field goals, while his Rice Owl teammates won the close-in battles in the trenches on both sides of the ball as the Owls dropped SMU 36-14 at Rice Stadium on Saturday, setting up a season-ending road game with UTEP with a bowl berth on the line.

The Owls (5-6, 3-4) won their third straight game and fourth in the last five to put them in contention for a bowl berth next week when they travel to El Paso to take on the Miners.

Boswell became the sixth player in NCAA history to kick three field goals of better than 50 yards and broke the school record with five three-pointers on the day.

The Owls put together their best effort of the year despite the loss of several key regulars early in the game to injuries. Cornerback Phillip Gaines, tight end Luke Willson, safety Julius White and deep snapper Trevor Gillette all left the game with injuries but the Owls were able to maintain their effort thanks to the play of cornerback J.T. Blasingame, safety Garrett Fuhrman, and deep snapper Tanyan Farley, the latter player who was making his college debut at that position.

After Rice took the opening kickoff and drove to midfield where Boswell crushed home his 56-yard field goal, SMU responded with a nine-play, 68 yard drive to take a 7-3 lead. The Owls responded by moving Boswell into range, and he connected from 51 yards to cut the SMU lead to 7-6 after one quarter.

That lead held up through most of the second quarter, but after a Boswell miss from 44 yards, the Rice defense rose up and put the Owls in position to take the lead for good.

SMU quarterback Garrett Gilbert had the ball stripped by defensive end Cody Bauer and senior defensive tackle Jamael Thomas, who made his second career start on Senior Day, recovered the ball to set Rice up at the SMU 19.

One play later, Taylor McHargue celebrated the return of Vance McDonald to the lineup by hitting the senior tight end for a 19-yard touchdown to put Rice back on top, 13-7.

After a three-and-out by the defense, McHargue led the Owls back down the field in the final two minutes of the half, rolling to his right and finding Donte Moore in the end zone for seven-yard score to push the margin to 20-6 at the half.

Boswell opened the fourth quarter with his NCAA record-tying third field goal from over 50 yards, a 53-yard effort to build the lead back to 26-14.

McHargue completed a career-high 24 passes, 21 of them in the first three quarters. He finished with 335 yards of total offense (297 passing, 38 rushing). McDonald, who has been dogged by a foot injury for multiple weeks, celebrated his return to the playing field by catching seven passes for 85 yards and a touchdown.

## Rice 33, UTEP 24

Nov. 24, 2012 • Sun Bowl • El Paso, Texas

Faced with the need to answer a late UTEP score and preserve their hopes of returning to a bowl game for the first time in four years, the Rice Owls turned to an unlikely option, as Jeremy Eddington stunned UTEP with a 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to seal Rice's 33-24 win at the Sun Bowl.

The win was the Owls fourth in a row and fifth in the last six to close their regular season at 6-6 and clinch a spot in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl.

Rice had not returned a kickoff for a touchdown since before any of the current squad had been born, a period of 319 games since Antonio Brinkley returned one against Baylor at Rice Stadium in 1984.

It fell to Eddington to remove Rice from the mantle as he darted up the sideline in front of the UTEP bench and retiring head coach Mike Price. Price, who ended a 31-year coaching career, was in only his fourth year at Weber State when the Owls' kickoff drought began.

Rice stormed to a 17-14 halftime lead thanks to the powerful running of Charles Ross and the passing combination of Taylor McHargue and Vance McDonald. Ross topped 100 yards in the first half and would finish with a career-high 154 yards and a pair of touchdowns. McHargue and McDonald combined on three key third down completions to keep Rice scoring drives alive during the first half.

McDonald continued to celebrate his return from injury by catching a career-high nine for 99 yards.

After halftime, UTEP retook the lead in the third quarter, but Eddington returned the ensuing kickoff 56 yards to set up a Chris Boswell 51-yard field goal to cut the lead to one. It was Boswell's sixth field goal this year from 50 yards or more and his fourth consecutive successful kick from that distance.

UTEP seemed to be ready to answer right back after Nathan Jeffery busted off a 37-yard run to the Rice 37, but the Owls held and Hosam Shahin's tackle for loss on third down force a punt which was downed at the Rice five yard line.

From there the Owls mounted a methodical 20-play, 95-yard drive to retake the lead on Ross' second touchdown of the night. After missing a try for two, the Owls led 26-21. UTEP cut the lead to 26-24 after recovering a muffed punt, setting the stage for Eddington's dash.

Eddington finished with 210 yards on four kick returns, the second-best total in school history added 59 yards on the ground and caught one pass for a total of 279 all-purpose yards which was just 16 yards shy of Trevor Cobb's school mark of 295 set vs. Iowa State in 1991.

The win was Rice's 19th in its last 28 November games since 2006. In each of the Owls three bowl seasons, they ran off an unbeaten final month to earn the chance to play an additional game.

## Rice 33, Air Force 14

Dec. 29, 2012 • Amon G. Carter Stadium • Ft. Worth, Texas

Driphus Jackson and Jordan Taylor sparked a second-half offensive explosion while the Rice defense totally dominated one of the top rushing offenses in the country and the Owls downed Air Force 33-14 in the 10th annual Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl in Fort Worth.

Playing in a newly-renovated Amon G. Carter Stadium the site of so many past memories from the days when Rice and TCU were Southwest Conference rivals, the 2012 Owls closed out a remarkable sprint to the finish, winning their fifth straight and sixth in the last seven to rescue a season that saw them open 1-5.

Jackson came on in relief at quarterback just before half-time after Taylor McHargue was knocked out of the game. He threw for 264 yards and a pair of touchdowns as the Owls out-scored the Falcons 26-0 in the second half.

Taylor matched the legendary Dicky Maegle's effort in the 1954 Cotton Bowl, scoring three times on touchdown receptions. He finished with a career-best nine catches and set a Rice bowl record with 153 yards receiving to earn Rice MVP honors as well as a spot on several All-Bowl game teams.

After taking an early 7-0 led, the Owls found themselves down 14-7 at the half thanks in part to three turnovers. But they played error-free football in the second half on offense, while the Rice defense throttled the Air Force rushing game to just 25 yards in the second half.

Air Force entered the game ranked second in the country, averaging 328 yards per game, but the Owls held them to just 166 in the game, only the fourth time in the last four years a team had held them under 170.

After the Owls' defense stopped the initial Falcons' possession of the second half, the offense put together an eight play, 87-yard drive to knot the score on a 22-yard pass from Jackson to Taylor.

Rice went ahead to stay on their next possession, eating up the rest of the third quarter as they marched 74 yards in nine plays. Two plays into the fourth quarter, Charles Ross barged in from two yards out to make it 21-14.

The Rice defense held Air Force to four three-and-outs in the last half and the offense never gave the Falcons a chance to get back into the game, holding on to the ball for 20:31 in the second half.

The win was the Owls second straight in a bowl game under David Bailiff, allowing him to join Jess Neely as the only coaches in school history to have won multiple bowl games.






## Mike TYLER
