This will include both personal and phone interview requests. A representative from the UMass Media Relations Office will be on hand to assist you. Home phone numbers will not be given out.

WEEKLY SPORTS LUNCHEON

- Head coach Charley Molnar will be in attendance and available to the media at select weekly UMass Sports Luncheon, held each Wednesday at 12:15 p.m., normally in the UMass Campus Center in Room 1009. In addition, the UMass Athlete of the Week and his or her coach will be available to the media. Lunch for the media is provided free of charge. MOLNAR ON MAC CONFERENCE CALL

- If requested, the visiting head coach and select players will be brought to the press conference as well. If the coach and players are not requested, a member of the UMass Media Relations Staff will gather quotes from the visiting team to give to the media.
- The postgame press conference will also be played live in the upper pressbox for any members on a deadline.

Season Preview

The 2013 UMass football season will be one to remember as the program enters its second year as an NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision and Mid-American Conference team. The Minutemen return a core of talented veterans from 2012 and look to the best incoming class of freshmen in program history to help push UMass to success during the upcoming campaign.

The defense returns 13 players who started at least one game during the previous season, including nine with at least four appearances in the starting lineup. Third-leading tackler Kassan Messiah, who finished his true-freshman campaign in 2012 with 65 stops (22-43) in nine games played is back alongside redshirt-sophomore Randall Jette, who finished with 53 tackles (30-23), four pass break-ups and a pair of interceptions in his first year as a starting cornerback. Overall, the Minutemen return six of its top 10 tacklers from a defense that also forced at least one turnover in 11 of 12 games last season.

The secondary looks to improve over a 2012 season which saw many young players develop. Along with Jette, sophomores Khary Bailey-Smith, Joey Colton, and D'Metrius Williams look to expand the potential they showed last season. Redshirt junior Ed Saint-Vil and true senior Antoine Tharpe provide veteran leadership among the group.

In addition to Messiah, the linebacking corps will return sophomore Jovan Santos-Knox who started the bulk of the 2012 season. Redshirt-senior Tom Brandt looks to finish his career on a strong note, while John Robinson also figures to be in the mix for time.

The defensive line lost several key contributors last year, but the return of redshirt-senior Kevin Byrne, redshirt-junior Daniel Maynes, redshirt senior Brandon Potvin and true senior Stanley Andre keeps a strong group in place. Fifth-year transfer Justin Anderson, who was a starter at Maryland in 2010 before missing 2011 with an injury, figures to make an immediate impact in his first year at UMass.

On offense, redshirt-senior tight end and team captain Rob Blanchflower will be looked upon to lead an emerging group of young players. Blanchflower has made 32 appearances during the previous three seasons and owns 851 receiving yards and six touchdowns on 82 catches for his career. A favorite target of quarterbacks Mike Wegzyn and A.J. Doyle as a redshirt-junior, Blanchflower was recognized for

his importance and impact with a spot on the 2013 Phil Steele Preseason All-MAC Team. Sophomore wide receiver Tajae Sharpe, another go-to player alongside Blanchflower on last year's offense, will attempt to add to his 206 receiving yards on 20 catches generated as a freshman.

Sophomore Derek Beck, redshirt sophomore Elgin Long and sophomore Bernard Davis had showed strong performances during Spring Camp and figure to play bigger roles in the upcoming season. Fifth-year transfer Ricardo Miller of Michigan will make an impact as both a tight end and wide receiver. Miller is a pure athlete with FBS size who could pose a problem for opposing defenses. Redshirt sophomore Iric Harris is also added into the mix of wide receivers this year after playing as a defensive back during his first two years at UMass.

The backfield will be one of the spots where most of the competition takes place during summer training camp and throughout the year. Junior Jordan Broadnax is the prohibitive favorite for the starting role, but a healthy redshirt freshman Stacy Bedell showed flashes of speed and elusiveness in the Spring. Redshirt sophomore Jamal Wilson returns and will push the duo for carries. Freshmen Duquan Mack and the highly touted Lorenzo Woodley seem to offer a combination of power and speed and will share the load as well. Along with their ability to gain yards on the ground, the group is just as adept at getting yards through the air which could aid the second year of Molnar's spread offense at UMass.

Redshirt-senior lineman Anthony Dima and senior punter Colter Johnson were lauded by Phil Steele Magazine alongside Blanchflower and became UMass' first pair of players to be named to FBS award watch lists over the summer. Dima is up for the 2013 Outland Trophy, given to the nation's top offensive or defensive interior lineman. Johnson is one of 25

student-athletes on the Ray Guy Award Watch List, which highlights the best punter in the nation each year.

With 23 career appearances, Dima will spearhead the offensive line after spending the 2011 and 2012 seasons as the starter at right tackle. A young group with eight members in their first or second year, the offensive line will also be bolstered by the transfer of Rutgers graduate David Osei, who played center, left tackle and guard for the Scarlet Knights from 2009-12.

The return of redshirt senior Vincent Westcarr, who had previously decided not to return for his final year after 2012, will add depth to the line. Westcarr did not participate in Spring Camp or offseason workouts which allowed him to recover from injury. UMass also adds several youngsters who will fill out the offensive line in freshman Cameron Mock, junior Josh Bruns, and freshman Sam Zeff. Mock was originally a 2012 signee with UMass, but did not enroll until the 2013 spring semester after rehabbing from a car accident. Bruns is a junior college transfer with great size and ability, while Zeff is a true freshman who graduate high school early in order to take part in Spring Camp.

Sophomore Matt Sparks is the other returning starter from 2012 and his growth in the offseason should help the big movers up front.

Johnson, who also appears on the CFP Punter Watch List entering 2013, finished his junior season as the MAC leader in yards per punt with an average of 43.6 (2,880 yards on 66 punts). Nineteen of Johnson's punts went for 50 or more yards and consistently pinned opponents deep in their own territory, with 16 landing in the red zone. The senior leads what is the most experience group of the team as UMass returns all its specialists from 2012. Redshirt senior Brendon Levengood will once again handle kick-off duties, while sophomore Blake Lucas is the top returning placekicker. Redshirt senior Jeff Strait also returns as the holder and back-up punter, while redshirt senior Vance Barton is one of the most consistent long-snapper in the MAC.

The Maroon and White will be tested throughout the 2013 season as the squad faces another challenging slate of games, including opening the year at the University of Wisconsin, which has won the previous three Big Ten Championships. UMass will also complete non-conference battles against opponents from the SEC (Vanderbilt) and Big 12 (Kansas State) in addition to facing regional rival Maine to begin the home portion of the regular season at Gillette Stadium. In addition, the Mid-American Conference will serve as a great proving ground for UMass as the squad is set to face four bowl game participants from one season ago among the eight conference match ups, including meetings with Bowling Green, Central Michigan, Ohio and Northern Illinois.



UMass Football Performance Center

Beginning in 2014, the Minutemen will have a new home base of operations on campus with the UMass Football Performance Center adjacent to McGuirk Alumni Stadium. Ground was officially broken this past April and construction is fully underway on the state-of-the-art building which will be one of the premier football facilities in the Northeast.

In addition to the Football Performance Center, a new Press Box is also part of the \$34.5 million upgrade project at McGuirk Stadium. The Performance Center is a 55,000 square foot complex which will include coaches offices, a new locker room space, meeting rooms, athletic training facilities and a dedicated strength and conditioning facility. The Press Box measures 5,800 square feet and will be designed to accommodate a range of media with a primary focus on television production accessibility.



DETAILS ON THE UMASS FOOTBALL PERFORMANCE CENTER/PRESS BOX:

The state-of-the-art Football Performance Center will mark the first-ever dedicated facility housing all support elements for the UMass football program. The two-level complex will greet visitors with a foyer displaying proud moments in the program's history while providing a dynamic vision of the future. Office space, meeting rooms, a multi-purpose/formal event space and a terrace overlooking the field will highlight the upper level. The lower level will house the locker room, equipment room, strength and conditioning space and the athletic training room. The Press Box will contain dedicated booths for media, television, radio and instant replay along with game operations. The project designer/architect is Perkins & Will, Inc., while the contractor is Consigli Construction Co., Inc. 
As the Head Football Coach at the University of Massachusetts, part of my mission is to help mold our young men into great community leaders. For this reason, we have created the "Minuteman Community March".

The Mid-American Conference

THIS IS THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

Providing leadership in education and diversity, the Mid-American Conference moves into its 67th year of service to the student-athlete.

Since its inception in 1946, the Mid-American Conference has progressively grown and developed into one of the most aggressive Division I conferences in the country. One of only ten football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences, the MAC named Dr. Jon A. Steinbrecher as its eighth commissioner in March of 2009.

The league has grown its commitment to championships by expanding to seven its number of neutral site post season events - football (Ford Field, Detroit), volleyball (SPIRE Academy, Geneva, Ohio), men's and women's basketball (Quicken Loans Arena, Cleveland), softball (Firestone Stadium, Akron) and baseball (All Pro Freight Stadium, Avon, Ohio). In addition, the SPIRE facility will also serve as the site for the 2014 women's swimming & diving championship and 2015 men's swimming & diving championship.

In 2012, the MAC set a conference record with seven teams receiving a bowl invitation, including the first ever BCS Bowl invitation with Northern Illinois playing in the Discover Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, following a thrilling 44-37 double overtime win over Kent State in the 2012 Marathon MAC Football Championship game. The seven MAC programs that were extended bowl invitations included: Toledo (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl); Ball State (Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl St. Petersburg); Central Michigan (Little Caesars Pizza Bowl); Bowling Green (Military Bowl); Ohio (Advocare V100 Independence Bowl); Northern Illinois (Discover Orange Bowl) and Kent State (GoDaddy.com Bowl).

The 2012 season witnessed four football programs ranked in the top 25 of national polls - Northern Illinois, Kent State, Toledo and Ohio-as the BCS Standings had two MAC programs in the Top 25 at the end of the regular season with No. 15 Northern Illinois and No. 25 Kent State. The MAC also set a conference record for the most wins against FBS opponents with 16 victories. MAC programs were 4-4 against the Big East Conference, including wins over Rutgers, Cincinnati, UConn and South Florida, and three wins against opponents from the Big Ten Conference, including wins over Penn State, Iowa and Indiana. The dramatic 2012 football season was capped as Central Michigan offensive tackle Eric Fisher was selected as the first overall selection by the Kansas City Chiefs in the 2013 NFL Draft, becoming the first football player from the MAC with such an honor.

For the first time in league history, the MAC will have seven bowl relationships-three primary and four secondary. The three primary agreements are with the Little Caesar's Pizza Bowl (Detroit, Mich.), GoDaddy Bowl (Mobile, Ala.) and Famous Idaho Potato Bowl (Boise, Ida.). In addition, the MAC has secured secondary agreements with the BBVA Compass Bowl, the Gildan New Mexico Bowl, the Beef O'Brady's St. Petersburg Bowl and the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl.

In its partnership with ESPN, the MAC is in the fifth year of its eight-year rights agreement (through 2016-2017 academic years) for football, as well as men's and women's basketball. The deal is the most extensive in the 67-year history of the conference. The agreement calls for a minimum of 25 events annually to be produced and aired on an ESPN platform including the men's and women's basketball championships, a regular-season MAC presence on ESPN, the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game and a minimum of 11 regular-season football games.

In men's basketball, the MAC witnessed Akron reach the FirstEnergy MAC Men's Basketball Tournament for the seventh consecutive season, as the Zips won their third title in five years. Also, Ohio University earned an invitation to the NIT, while Western Michigan reached the College Basketball Invitational Final Four after wins over North Dakota State and Wyoming. Kent State

received an invitation to the CollegeInsider.com Tournament and defeated Fairfield in the opening round. Akron center Zeke Marshall and Ohio point guard D.J. Cooper were selected to play in the 2013 Reese's Division I College All-Star Game, as Cooper garnered MVP game honors.

During the 2012-13 academic year, the University of Akron men's soccer team won its ninth MAC championship and fifth in the last six years, as the Zips advanced to their fifth consecutive NCAA Round of 16 appearance after defeating Michigan. Akron witnessed senior midfielder Scott Caldwell named as the All-America Scholar Athlete of the Year by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) and a semifinalist for the Hermann Trophy. The MAC had two student-athletes selected in the first round of the 2013 Major League Soccer Supplemental Draft - No. 3 overall Akron goalkeeper David Meyers (Portland Timbers) and No. 12 overall West Virginia defender Eric Schoenle (Philadelphia Union). The MAC also welcomed the addition of West Virginia as an affiliate member in men's soccer for the 2012-13 academic year.

In wrestling, the MAC welcomed Missouri, Northern Iowa and Old Dominion (2014-15) as affiliate members. Missouri won the 2013 conference tournament title as an affiliate member, snapping Central Michigan's 11-year reign as champions. The MAC had a conference-best 40 wrestlers earn an invitation to the NCAA Division I National Championship and 11 wrestlers earned All-America status - Central Michigan seniors Ben Bennett, school's first four-time All-American, and Jarod Trice; Kent State senior Dustin Kilgore, schools first three-time All-American; Missouri's Alan Waters, Nathan McCormick, Drake Houdashelt, Mike Larson, and Dom Bradley, matching the schools most All-Americans in a single-season; Northern Iowa's David Bonin and Ryan Loder; and Ohio redshirt freshman Cody Walters.

In men's cross country, Eastern Michigan claimed its 17th conference championship, while the Eagles captured their 31st conference title in men's swimming and diving. The 31 championship titles for Eastern Michigan in men's swimming and diving is a conference record. In addition, Eastern Michigan won the program's 14th conference championship in indoor track and field.

Kent State won the program's fifth consecutive and 19th overall conference title and received its 26th NCAA appearance. Kent State and Ball State both advanced to the NCAA Men's Conference Championship, marking only the fifth time since 1983 the conference had two programs advance in the NCAA postseason tournament.

In men's tennis, Western Michigan won its second consecutive conference championship and tenth title in the last 15 years. In men's outdoor track and field, Akron won its third consecutive conference title and program's fifth championship in the last six years. In baseball, Bowling Green won the program's first conference title since 1999 as the No. 6 seed in the conference tournament.

Women's athletics continued to shine for the MAC this past year. The MAC had a total of six women's basketball programs invited to postseason tournaments. Central Michigan claimed the MAC tournament title for the first time since 1984 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, while Ball State, Bowling Green, Central Michigan, Miami and Toledo all received at-large invitations to the WNIT Tournament. Three MAC programs - Ball State, Bowling Green and Toledo - all reached the WNIT Sweet 16.

In women's soccer, Miami earned its fourth MAC title in program history and Central Michigan earned an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament, becoming the first team in conference history to earn an at-large bid. Central Michigan fell to Michigan in overtime, 2-1, while Miami defeated Tennessee 3-2 (OT) in the first round of the NCAA tournament and fell to Duke in the

second round. Miami senior forward Jess Kodiak was named third team All-America by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). Kodiak, along with Katie Slaughter of Central Michigan and Kayla Zarkiewski of Miami, were named All-Great Lakes Region First Team by the NSCAA.

In volleyball, Bowling Green claimed the MAC title for the second time since 1991 and became the first team in program history to win a NCAA Tournament match. The Falcons defeated Yale in the first round, 3-2, and fell to Penn State in the second round. In women's cross country, Toledo claimed its fifth title in school history in record fashion. The Rockets scored a conference record-low 24 points and have now won three consecutive conference titles for the first time in school history.

In field hockey, Miami won the program's first conference title in program history, while the RedHawks won the programs 17th conference championship in women's swimming and diving. In women's tennis, Miami won the conference championship for the third time in the last five years.

In gymnastics, Central Michigan and Western Michigan claimed share of the conference championship. For Central Michigan it claimed a share of its fourth consecutive championship and for Western Michigan was the programs fourth overall tournament title. Central Michigan and Kent State advanced to the NCAA Regionals.

In women's indoor track and field, Kent State won its fourth overall conference title and consecutive conference championships for the first time in program history, while the Golden Flashes won the women's outdoor track and field championship for the fourth consecutive year.

In women's golf, Kent State won its 15th consecutive conference championship. In softball, Central Michigan won the conference championship for the tenth time in program history. Ball State's Jennifer Gilbert was named NFCA All-Great Lakes Region First Team, while Macy Merchant was named NFCA All-Great Lakes Region Second Team.

From two-time Super Bowl quarterback winning Ben Roethlisberger (Miami University), NFL Defensive MVP James Harrison (Kent State University), four NFL Pro Bowlers (OT Joe Staley, KR Josh Cribbs, TE Antonio Gates, LB James Harrison), British Open winner Ben Curtis (Kent State University), World Series winning manager Bob Brenly (Ohio University) and Olympic bobsled team member Brock Kreitzburgh (University of Toledo), the Mid-American Conference continues to excel in producing leaders in the world of athletics.

HISTORY OF THE MAC

Based in Cleveland since July 1999 following a 15-year stay in Toledo, Ohio, the MAC has established historic measurements in both football and men's and women's basketball since moving to Northeast Ohio. The MAC was founded as a five-school league on February 24, 1946 in Columbus, Ohio with Ohio, Butler, Cincinnati, Wayne State and Western Reserve admitted as charter members. The Mid-American Conference has 12 full-time schools and a 13th, UMass for football only beginning in 2012.

In 1946 men's basketball was the first competitive sport in the MAC, which now sponsors a total 23 sports. Women's sports were brought into the conference's structure in 1980. For men, championships (11) are sponsored in football, basketball, baseball, cross country, soccer, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, wrestling, golf and tennis. For women, championships (12) are sponsored in basketball, softball, volleyball, cross country, field hockey, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and tennis.

A new era in UMass football began with the naming of Charley Molnar as head coach on December 8, 2011. The long-time

collegiate coaching veteran was tapped as the new leader of the program as it made its transition into the Football Bowl Subdivision and member of the Mid-American Conference in 2012. The 29th head coach in program history, Molnar came to Amherst with 28 years of experience and an exciting plan to build the Minutemen into not just the team for Massachusetts, but for the entire Northeast.

A veteran offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, Molnar developed prolific offensive attacks at Notre Dame, Cincinnati, and Central Michigan. In his time at those schools, the Morristown, N.J., native helped them to a 59-20 record and seven straight bowl games including Cincinnati's historic 2009 season where the Bearcats won the Big East Conference Championship, played Florida in the Sugar Bowl and finished 3rd in the BCS rankings.

"I am extremely pleased that Charley is leading the University of Massachusetts into this new era as our head football coach," said Director of Athletics John McCutcheon. "His background, energy, commitment to student-athletes and desire to be part of a growing program clearly makes him the right man for this endeavor."

While Molnar's inaugural year at UMass was a tough one in the record book, the program does have a bright future. Nearly all of the 2012 freshman class saw significant playing time as either starters or key reserves. The 2013 class is the most talented ever to join the University and was ranked among the top-5 in the MAC. UMass earned its first FBS win on Nov. 10, 2012 with a 22-14 victory at Akron. Three Minutemen earned All-MAC honors and following the season, running back Mike Cox was drafted by the New York Giants while three others signed NFL undrafted free agent contracts.

Molnar joined the Minutemen after two seasons with Notre Dame as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. In his time with the Fighting Irish, the Morristown, N.J., native helped the program to an 8-4 record in 2011 and an appear-

ance in the Champs Sports Bowl along with an 8-5 record in 2010 and an appearance in the Sun Bowl.

"This is an opportunity I worked for my whole career and there is no limit to my excitement that guiding the UMass football program brings me," said Molnar. "I have a vision for this program into the future and we are going to do nothing but great things at the University of Massachusetts."

"Coach Molnar has a track record of winning and has the history of being associated with programs that have won, that have shaped the lives of student-athletes, and that were first-class making their universities, their students, faculty, friends and alumni proud," said University President Robert L. Caret.

The 2013 season will be Molnar's 30th overall including 11 seasons as an offensive coordinator and 17 seasons coaching quarterbacks.

Prior to his time at Notre Dame, Molnar was an integral piece of Cincinnati's rise capped by a Big East Championship, Sugar Bowl Appearance and top-five final ranking in the BCS standings in 2009.

Molnar also has extensive experience with the Mid-American Conference after working at Central Michigan, Western Michigan, Kent State, and Eastern Michigan.

For the six seasons prior to joining UMass, Molnar worked alongside current Notre Dame head coach Brian Kelly.

"Charley was a part of my offensive staff the last six years and a key figure in the success we had at Central Michigan, Cincinnati and Notre Dame. Charley's familiarity with the Mid-American Conference and strong recruiting connections on the East Coast will truly benefit him at UMass.," said Kelly.

For the second straight year, Molnar helped the Irish earn a bowl game bid in 2011 thanks in part to the play of quarterback Tommy Rees. Rees threw for over 2,700 yards that season with 19 touchdowns averaging 225.7 yards per game. As a unit, the Irish averaged 424.1 yards per game on offense thanks in part to the Rees and 1,000-yard rusher Cierre Wood. Alongside Wood, Jonas Gray netted nearly 800 yards rushing and 12 touchdowns on the ground.

Highlighting the 2011 season for the Irish were wins over Michigan State, Pittsburgh, Purdue, and Air Force.

In 2010, his first year with the Irish, Molnar helped install a new offensive system and developed both Dayne Crist and Rees as first-time starting quarterbacks. Crist started the first

nine games and passed for 2,033 yards with 15 touchdowns before injuring a knee in the first quarter of the ninth game. Rees played the rest of the ninth game after Crist was injured and completed 33 of 54 passes for 334 yards with four touchdowns. He started the final four games and led the Irish to wins over No. 15 Utah, Army, at USC and Miami (Fla.) in the Hyundai Sun Bowl.

Under Molnar's tutelage, Rees set Notre Dame freshman records in touchdown passes (12) and completion percentage (61.0). He also ranked in the top five among freshman Irish quarterbacks in completions (third, 100), yards (second, 1,106) and passing efficiency (second, 132.70).

From 2006-09, Molnar coached alongside current Irish head football coach Brian Kelly at Cincinnati and Central Michigan and helped develop record-breaking quarterbacks and wide receivers. With the Bearcats, Molnar was passing game coordinator and coached the wide receivers from 2007-09. He oversaw the two most prolific passing seasons in Cincinnati history and mentored a pair of record-setting receivers.

Wide receivers Mardy Gilyard and Dominick Goodman flourished with Molnar as their coach. Goodman played for Molnar from 2007-08 and initially set Cincinnati career records with 2,512 receiving yards and 22 receiving touchdowns. Goodman also tied the previous school record with 204 career catches. Gilyard received Molnar's tutelage from 2007-09 and broke Goodman's career records by recording 3,053 receiving yards and 25 TD catches. Fittingly, Gilyard also finished his Bearcat career with 204 receptions, tying the school record.

In 2009, Molnar's passing attack averaged 308.77 yards per game to rank eighth in the nation and the 4,014 passing yards set the Cincinnati single-season record. The Bearcats ranked fourth in the country in passing efficiency (161.21), thanks, in part, to a school record 39 TD passes. Cincinnati's high-octane offense averaged 447.5 total yards per game (11th in the nation) and tallied the fifth-most points in the Football Bowl Subdivision at 38.6 per game.

With Molnar's guidance, Gilyard became just the second Cincinnati player ever to be named an All-American by the American Football Coaches Association. He caught a school-record 87 passes for 1,191 yards with 11 TDs and ranked in the top 20 nationally in receptions and receiving yards per game. Gilyard was named first-team all-BIG EAST for the second year in a row and became the Bearcats' first player with multiple 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

Armon Binns developed into a solid complementary receiver opposite Gilyard in 2009. Entering the season, Binns had registered two career receptions for 19 yards and zero TDs, but Binns became a second-team all-BIG EAST performer under Molnar after totaling 61 receptions for 888 yards and 11 TDs.

Gilyard and Goodman both experienced career seasons in 2008 as Gilyard set the Cincinnati record with 1,276 receiving yards and Goodman totaled 1,028 yards receiving. The duo became the first Bearcats players to eclipse 1,000 receiving yards together in the same season since 1968 when Jim O'Brien and Tom Rossley accomplished the feat.

Gilyard caught 81 passes and 11 TDs in his breakthrough season and ranked eighth in the nation in total receiving yards, en route to being named first-team all-BIG EAST. Goodman recorded 84 receptions (a school record, at the time) and seven TDs.

In 2007, Molnar's aerial attack proved a harbinger of things

to come for Bearcats fans as Cincinnati passed for 3,720 yards and 36 TDs - both school records, at the time. The Bearcats ranked eighth in the country in passing efficiency (149.38) and averaged 286.2 passing yards per game to rank 20th nationally. Marcus Bennett was selected second-team all-BIG EAST after tallying a school-record 13 TD receptions.

Prior to Cincinnati, Molnar joined Kelly's Central Michigan staff in 2006 when he helped the Chippewas win 10 games for the first time since 1979. Central Michigan won its Mid-American Conference division, the MAC championship and was victorious in the Motor City Bowl. The Chippewas' offense ranked first in the MAC in scoring and second in passing.

Molnar coached the quarterbacks and wide receivers at Central Michigan and developed the most prolific freshman quarterback and wide receiver duo in the nation in 2006. Dan LeFevour was named MAC Freshman of the Year and was selected first-team all-MAC after he led the conference in passing TDs, passing yards, passing efficiency, completion percentage, total completions and total yards. Under Molnar's tutelage, LeFevour completed 247 of 388 pass attempts for 3,031 yards with 26 TDs. He also rushed 132 times for 521 yards and seven TDs and ranked 13th nationally in total offense (253.7 yards per game). LeFevour set school records for passing yards and TD passes, and his 3,552 total yards also were a Central Michigan record. He finished his rookie campaign ranked 19th nationally in passing efficiency.

On the receiving end of many LeFevour passes was freshman wide receiver Bryan Anderson who snagged a school-record 73 passes for 877 yards and five TDs. Anderson also was named first-team all-MAC and was selected a first-team freshman All-American.

Molnar completed a rare coaching feat at the conclusion of the 2006 season. Not only was he on the sidelines for 15 contests, including the 2006 MAC Championship Game, 2006 Motor City Bowl and 2007 International Bowl, but he coached

the MVP in all three postseason games.


Molnar directed another record-setting quarterback during his only season at Indiana State in 2005. As the associate head coach and offensive coordinator of the Sycamores, Molnar's offense broke six school passing records (including passing yards, completion percentage and TD passes) and two of his players combined to break 11 single-season or single-game school marks. Quarterback Blayne Baggett completed 284 of 473 passes for 2,741 yards, all school records. Baggett's 284 completions also were a Gateway Conference single-season record. Wide receiver Sam Logan was the primary beneficiary, as his 77 receptions were a Sycamore record and his 849 receiving yards ranked second in school history. Logan was honored after the season as a first-team all-Gateway Conference performer.

Molnar coached quarterbacks from 2003-04 at Western Michigan and was forced to develop multiple signal-callers each season. In 2004, Molnar helped three quarterbacks combine to pass for 2,913 yards (264.8 yards per game) with 23 passing TDs. He also had to prepare three Bronco quarterbacks in 2003 as he guided them to the eighth-ranked passing attack in the nation with 3,701 passing yards (308.4 yards per game) and 31 TDs. Chad Munson passed for 2,123 yards with 18 TD passes in 2003, while Jon Drach completed 67.0 percent of his passes for 1,499 yards and 13 TDs.

A one-year stop at Eastern Michigan in 2002 as quarterbacks coach followed a one-year stint as wide receivers coach at Eastern Illinois in 2001.

From 1990-2000, Molnar spent time as offensive coordinator as well as working with quarterbacks and wide receivers at two universities. He worked for seven seasons from 1994-2000 at Kent State after he worked in the same position at Illinois State from 1990-93.

Prior to Illinois State, Molnar called the offensive plays and coached quarterbacks at Western Carolina in 1989. He



made his first foray into major college football as a graduate assistant in 1987-88 at Virginia. With the Cavaliers, he assisted the quarterbacks coach.

Molnar's first coaching job came at his alma mater, Lock Haven University. From 1984-86 he worked with the wide receivers, tight ends, running backs and kickers.

A 1984 graduate of Lock Haven, Molnar earned his bachelor's degree in political science. He was born July 23, 1961, and he and his wife, Meg, have eight children: Charley III, Gillian, Tate, Bryce, Mitch, Gemma, Gianna and Dominic.

A veteran collegiate defensive coach, Phil Elmassian joined UMass as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach prior to the 2012 season. Since 1974 Elmassian has coached collegiate football at the highest levels covering 38 years including 10 as a defensive coordinator.

Elmassian (pronounced el-MAY-shun) spent last season with Purdue marking his second coaching stint with the Boilermakers. Prior to that, he spent the two seasons as the defensive coordinator at Illinois State, and has served in the same capacity at West Virginia, LSU, Boston College and Virginia Tech, as well as the linebackers coach Marshall and defensive backs coach at Nebraska, Wisconsin, Syracuse, Minnesota and East Carolina. He has mentored 26 all-conference players, including two All-Americans, and has coached in 18 bowls in his career.

The veteran coach has been a part of championships in four conferences and has served as the defensive coordinator at five NCAA Division I FBS schools: Louisiana-Monroe, LSU, Virginia Tech, Boston College and West Virginia.

His five league titles include Marshall's Mid-American Conference Championship in 2002; Washington's Pac-10 Championship in 1995; and Virginia's Atlantic Coast Conference Championship in 1989. He also helped lead Wisconsin to the Rose Bowl and Big Ten Championships in 1998 and 1999, as the Badger defense led the nation in scoring defense in 1998 and ranked fifth in 1999.

With Elmassian on staff, the 2003 Boilermakers finished third in the Big Ten in scoring, rushing and total defense and fourth in the league in pass defense. Purdue ranked second in the Big Ten, and 19th in the nation, in pass efficiency defense in 2003, and also ranked 13th nationally in total defense.

During Elmassian's stint at Wisconsin, the Badgers led the nation in scoring defense in 1998 (11.9 points per game) and ranked fifth in 1999 (12.8). They were No. 1 in the Big Ten in scoring defense, total defense (298.1 - 15th nationally) and passing defense (97.9 - fifth nationally) in 1999. Wisconsin became the first Big Ten school to win back-to-back Rose Bowls in 1998 and 1999, defeating the high-powered offenses of UCLA and Stanford. All four of the Badgers' defensive backs earned first team, second team or honorable mention all-conference honors in 1999. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher led the nation in interceptions in 1998 with seven and went on to be named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, earn consensus All-America honors and win the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's outstanding defensive back in 2000.

Elmassian (born April 28, 1951) is a 1974 graduate of William and Mary, where he played defensive back under Lou Holtz. He and his wife, Mary, have three children, Claire, Dylan and Olivia.

With 28 years of coaching experience, John Bond was named the UMass Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks Coach in Spring 2013.

Bond spent the previous five years as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at George State before joining the Minutemen. He also had prior coaching stints at Georgia Tech, Northern Illinois, Army and Illinois State.

Bond was named the first offensive coordinator in the history of Georgia State football starting in 2008 when the school announced the addition of the program. In his time with the Panthers, he coached seven all-conference selections and saw two of his offensive standouts be invited to 2013 NFL Rookie Camps.

Before joining Bill Curry's original Georgia State staff in July 2008, Bond served the 2007 season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Georgia Tech. At Tech, his offense was led by all-Atlantic Coast Conference running back Tashard Choice, the ACC rushing leader who was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys.

He spent the previous three seasons coaching one of the nation's most prolific rushing attacks as offensive coordinator at Northern Illinois (2004-06). All-America Garrett Wolfe led the nation in rushing in 2006 after ranking second as a junior and fifth as a sophomore. The third-round draft pick played for the Chicago Bears.

Bond helped Northern Illinois to two Mid-American Conference Western Division titles and two bowl games, highlighted by a 9-4 record in 2004, when the Huskies ranked 11th in the nation in rushing, 14th in scoring and 14th in total offense.

Before going to Northern Illinois, Bond served four seasons (2000-03) as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Army, where he fashioned a wide-open offense that broke 35 school records.

Bond's first full-time coaching position was at Southwest Missouri State, where he served as running backs coach and recruiting coordinator from 1986-90. The Bears won two conference titles and reached the NCAA I-AA playoffs twice, advancing to the quarterfinals in 1989.

He served as quarterbacks coach at UTEP from 1991-93 and then as quarterback coach and passing game coordinator at Delta State in 1994-95.

From there, Bond moved to a four-year stint at Illinois State, serving as wide receivers coach in 1996 before he was elevated to offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for his final three years (1997-99). The Redbirds ranked in the top 10 in the nation in scoring his final two years. In 1999, Illinois State reached the NCAA I-AA national semifinals, and Bond was a finalist for the American Football Coaches Association's Assistant Coach of the Year award.

His coaching background also includes two seasons as a student assistant (1983-84) and one year as a graduate assistant (1985) at his alma mater, Arkansas, where he worked under Lou Holtz and Ken Hatfield.

A native of Rogers, Ark., Bond was an all-state quarterback for his father, Gary Bond, at Rogers High School. The elder Bond is a member of the state's high school federation Hall of Fame, and John was inducted into the Rogers High Hall of Fame.

Bond, who played one season at Arkansas before a career-ending injury, earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1985.

He is married to the former Jennifer Wilder, and the couple has two daughters, MacKenzie and Mallory, and one son, Brody.

A veteran collegiate coach with 35 years of experience, Dave Sollazzo joined Charley Molnar's staff as the assistant head coach and defensive line coach prior to the 2012 season. Of his extensive coaching career, 13 of those were spent at Maryland where he helped the Terps reach eight bowl games.

Sollazzo joins UMass after spending the 2011 season coaching the defensive line at former CAA rival Villanova where the Wildcats led the conference in rushing defense.

Prior to that, he spent 10 seasons at the University of Maryland as the defensive line coach and served as the Terrapin recruiting coordinator for his final five years in College Park. During his last four years at Maryland, the Terps signed 72 student-athletes ranked among the top 100 nationally at their positions, including 17 All-Americans.

Sollazzo spent two seasons (1999-00) as the defensive tackles coach at Georgia Tech helping the Yellow Jackets to the 1999 Gator Bowl and the 2000 Peach Bowl. Before arriving at Georgia Tech, Sollazzo was the defensive line coach at his alma mater, The Citadel, from 1989-98. As a player, Sollazzo was a defensive lineman at The Citadel from 1973-76.

Between his coaching and recruiting at Maryland, Sollazzo helped several individual players achieve at the highest levels.

In 2010, he guided defensive lineman Joe Vellano to second team All-ACC honors and helped the Terps to the second biggest turn around in the country going from 2-10 in 2009 to 9-4 in 2010. Maryland closed out the 2010 campaign with a victory over East Carolina in the Military Bowl.

Over his last three seasons in College Park, the Terps signed 72 student-athletes ranked among the 100 nationally at their positions, including 17 All-Americans. In addition, 56 of the 88 signees received all-state recognition during their careers.

The 2009 recruiting class was ranked No. 26 nationally by Rivals.com (highest since 2005) and 27th by Scout.com.

On the field Sollazzo groomed a number of players for the next level. Jeremy Navarre, a four-year starter, earned honorable mention All-ACC honors in 2008 en route to signing with the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars where he earned extensive playing time.

Dean Muhtadi, a significant contributor in 2007 and 2008, also moved onto the NFL, where he spent time with Green Bay and Arizona.

In 2007, the defensive line was led by Dre Moore who secured first-team All-ACC honors and went on to be selected in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In 2006, Moore anchored the line along with Conrad Bolston, who played parts of two seasons in the NFL.

In 2004, the Terrapin defense ranked 21st nationally, giving up an average of 315.3 yards per game. Though it had lost standout DT Randy Starks a year early (selected by the Tennessee Titans in the 2004 NFL Draft), the defensive line still performed well, helping the team to top 25 rankings in three categories.

In 2003, the Terps were first in the league in total defense (15th nationally) and pass defense while finishing third in rushing defense. They recorded 35 sacks, just one fewer than league leader Florida State, and Starks became just the second Maryland tackle in 15 years to earn first team all-conference honors.

Maryland finished second in the ACC in 2002 in total defense while holding its opponents to 57 yards below their season rushing averages coming into their respective games with the Terrapins. In addition, the Terps finished atop the league and seventh nationally in scoring defense, yielding just 16.3 points per game. Individually, Starks earned second-team All-ACC honors in just his second season.

In his first year back at UM, Sollazzo took a group that entered the season as a concern in terms of talent and depth, and turned it into a rock-solid unit that helped anchor one of the top defenses in the ACC as the team led the league in rushing and scoring defense. Under his tutelage, nose tackle Charles Hill became an honorable mention All-ACC pick and, ultimately, a third-round choice of the Houston Texans in the 2002 NFL Draft.

Prior to his stint at Maryland, Sollazzo spent two seasons (1999-00) at Georgia Tech as a defensive tackles coach helping the Yellow Jackets reach bowl games each year (1999 Gator Bowl / 2000 Peach Bowl).

Before joining the Yellow Jackets, Sollazzo was the defensive line coach at The Citadel from 1989-98. The Citadel was another homecoming for Sollazzo, as he had lettered for the Bulldogs for three years on the defensive line from 1974-76. In that time, he started 33 consecutive games under former Maryland coach Bobby Ross. His position coach was Ralph Friedgen.

As a coach at The Citadel, Sollazzo helped Brad Keeney achieve All-America honors and Southern Conference-leading totals in sacks and tackles for loss in 1995.

In addition, he coached nine other defensive linemen to all-conference honors while with the Bulldogs. The highlight of his coaching career in Charleston, S.C., however, may have been his involvement in helping The Citadel to the 1992 Southern Conference championship and a No. 1 ranking at the end of the regular season. That squad led the nation in points allowed (13 ppg) and finished sixth in pass efficiency defense. In 1997, he was a part of an impressive defensive effort in which the Bulldogs finished their season by not allowing a touchdown over the final 13 quarters.

Along with his ties to Maryland and The Citadel, Sollazzo has an extensive history in prep coaching. With the exception of the Maryland job in 1984 (a season that saw the Terps win the ACC and earn a berth in the Sun Bowl), Sollazzo was a high school defensive coordinator in South Carolina from 1978-85.

Sollazzo was born in the same hometown as Friedgen, Harrison, N.Y., on Christmas Eve, 1955, and earned his degree from The Citadel in 1977. He and his wife, Ellen, have a son, Christopher.

Greg Burns, a 16-year coaching veteran in the NCAA and NFL ranks, was named as the Defensive Backs Coach in Spring 2013.

The 2013 season will mark Burns' 17th season as a coach with stops at Purdue, Arizona State, Kansas State, USC, Louisville and in the NFL with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to his credit. He has coached in 10 Bowl Games, including four BCS Bowls, and was part of USC's back-to-back National Championships in 2003 and 2004.

Last season with Purdue, three of the Boilermakers' five players named to Big 10 All-Conference teams came from Burns' secondary. During his tenure, he has coached notables such as Troy Polamalu, Darnell Bing, Antonio Roundtree and Ronde Barber.

Burns joined the Purdue staff after spending the previous four seasons (2008-11) as the cornerbacks coach at Arizona State. The Sun Devils led the then-Pac-10 and finished among the nation's top units in rushing, passing and total defense in 2009.

Prior to ASU, Burns spent the 2007 season as secondary coach at Kansas State under defensive coordinator Tim Tibesar.

Burns has found success at many levels during his coaching career, spending 2006 as the defensive backs coach of the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers after coaching the secondary at USC under Pete Carroll for four years (2002-05). Burns also coached for four seasons at Louisville (1998-2001) as well as one season at Idaho (1997).

During his time at Southern California, Burns developed a reputation as one of the brightest young secondary coaches in the country and mentored a number of stand-out performers, including All-American safeties Troy Polamalu (2002) and Darnell Bing (2005). He also coached first-team All-Pacific-10 Conference cornerback Will Poole in 2003. Burns also produced six All-Conference USA cornerbacks during his tenure at Louisville, including first-teamers Anthony Floyd (2000 and 2001) and Antonio Roundtree (1998). Burns also coached All-Pro cornerback Ronde Barber while with the Buccaneers.

Burns was a four-year letterwinner (1991-93, 1995) at Washington State, earning honorable mention All-Pac-10 honors in 1992. He earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Washington State in 1995 and his master's from Washington State in 1997.

He and his wife Crystal have three sons, Christopher, Carter and Cooper.

Daisher has coached football since 1978 at all levels including six years in the National Football League and one year in the United Football League.

In 2011, Daisher coached at Bryant serving as the defensive backs coach following his seven years working in professional football. While in the professional ranks, he worked on the staffs of the Philadelphia Eagles (2004-05 & 2009), the Oakland Raiders (2006), the Cleveland Browns (2007-08) and the Hartford Colonials (2010, UFL). During his first stint with the Eagles, he worked as the special teams quality control coach and assistant defensive line coach for Andy Reid's squad that reached the Super Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla.

At the collegiate level, the Michigan native has spent time at Illinois, Northern Illinois, Eastern Michigan, Cincinnati, Army, Indiana, and East Carolina. He helped Northern Illinois win the MAC Championship in 1983 and the California Bowl. He repeated those wins in 1987 with Eastern Michigan. In 2001, he served with East Carolina as the Pirates played in the GMAC Bowl.

Dave Johnson, a 28-year coaching veteran with offensive lines and tight ends, was named the Offensive Line Coach at the UMass during Spring 2013.

Johnson joins the Minutemen after coaching the past two seasons at Cincinnati where the Bearcats won two Big East Championships and had victories in the Liberty (2011) and Belk (2012) Bowls. The 28-year coaching veteran has served his entire career working with the offensive line and tight ends.

His coaching highlights include 16 Bowl Appearances with an 11-5 record in those games and nine Division IA conference Championship titles (Big East, SEC, MAC). Johnson has mentored 12 NFL players, five All-Americans and 32 all-conference selections.

In 2011 and 2012, Johnson was part of a Cincinnati offense that ranked among the best in the Big East each year. In 2012, the Bearcats led the league in scoring offense and rushing offense. Tight end Travis Kelce was taken in the 3rd Round of the NFL Draft, while he and three of Johnson's offensive linemen were named to all-conference teams.

Prior to joining UC, Johnson was the offensive line coach at West Virginia University from 2008-10. Behind the blocking of the line, the Mountaineer offense accumulated 400 or more yards of total offense in seven games in 2010. WVU finished No. 2 in the BIG EAST in passing, total offense and total first downs. WVU had the top passer in the league in passing yards per game, pass efficiency and second in total yards per game.

In 2009, the offensive line paved the way for the 13th 1,000-yard rusher in the past 14 seasons and first 2,000-yard passer since 1998. Of the 855 plays by the offense in 2009, each of the five offensive linemen logged in more than 830 plays. In 2008, the offensive line was ranked No. 27 nationally for fewest sacks allowed. During his time at WVU, Johnson mentored All-American Ryan Stanchek and All-BIG EAST selections Selvish Capers, Mike Dent and Stanchek.

Johnson spent 2001-07 as the tight ends coach at the University of Georgia. The Bulldogs won 72 games, averaging more than 10 wins a season, three SEC East Division Championships, two SEC Championships, five bowl wins and five Top-10 national finishes during his time in Athens. Four of his tight ends, Randy McMichael, Ben Watson, Martez Milner and Leonard Pope are playing in the NFL. In 2007, the Bulldogs were No. 4 in the SEC in rushing offense (177.0). In 2005, UGA led the SEC in passing efficiency (144.0) and was second in scoring offense (29.5). In 2002, the Bulldogs led the SEC in scoring (32.14) and pass efficiency (138.91).

From 1997-2000, he was the tackles and tight ends coach as well as the recruiting coordinator at Marshall University. The Herd posted a 43-9 record, won four MAC titles and three Motor City Bowl titles, while averaging 11 wins a years during his four-year tenure, including a 13-0 record in 1999. In 1999, Marshall was No. 7 nationally in passing offense, total offense and scoring offense.

Johnson spent nine years at Indiana University (Pa.). From 1987-89, he coached the offensive line, tight ends and assisted with strength and conditioning. He was the Crimson Hawks' offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 1990-96. He helped lead IUP to the NCAA Division II national playoffs eight times, including two championship game appearances and three semifinal finishes. IUP finished with a 99-22-1 record during Johnson's tenure.

He spent the 1986 season coaching the offensive line, tight ends and handling the strength and conditioning duties at Shippensburg University.

He started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater from 1984-85.

Johnson was a four-year letterwinner at West Virginia. He was the starting center on the 1981 Peach Bowl and 1982 Gator Bowl teams. He earned a bachelor's degree from WVU in 1985 and a master's degree in 1986.

Johnson and his wife Lynn have four children, Andrew, Lauren, Zachary and Mark.

Allen Suber joined UMass in 2012 as the wide receivers coach and pro liaison after spending two years at Bethune-Cookman in a similar capacity. Along with his college coaching experience at his alma mater, Suber played three seasons in the NFL and NFL Europe before beginning his coaching career.

A Bethune-Cookman, Suber spent two seasons as the wide receivers coach under Brian Jenkins. During the early months of 2011, Suber was promoted by Jenkins to the role of Recruiting Coordinator. In his time coaching the Wildcats, he oversaw a group that helped to make B-CU among one of the top offensive teams in the nation, which hauled in 146(receivers only) passes for 2,191 yards, and were a major contributing factor in returning a MEAC Championship trophy to B-CU for the first time since Suber was in the backfield.

"Suberman" led one of the greatest eras of B-CU from 1999-2003, including the 2002 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Championship team that finished 11-2, the program's first and second appearances in the NCAA I-AA playoffs, and consecutive victories over Florida A&M, featuring the 2003 victory where Suber rallied the Wildcats from a 28-10 halftime deficit and hit Eric Weems, now with the Atlanta Falcons for a late TD in a thrilling 39-35 victory.

He was the 2003 MEAC offensive player of the year and a finalist for the Walter Payton Award that year. Suber still holds two Wildcat career rushing records for yards (2,897) and touchdowns (39). Additionally, he was a two-time All-American earning the accolades as a junior (2002) and senior (2003).

Suber was on the rosters of the Jacksonville Jaguars, Tampa Bay Buccaneers and Houston Texans before being allocated to the Berlin Thunder of NFL Europe.

His first coaching opportunity came in 2006 when he oversaw B-CU quarterbacks in spring drills. He also participated in a 2007 scouting internship with the Jaguars.

As an offensive coordinator for Treasure Coast High School, Suber helped a young program coming off a 3-17 record its first two seasons into a squad into a squad that won its district and first state playoff.

As part of Coach Charley Molnar's first staff, Shane Waldron joined UMass in 2012 as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator bringing with him experience at the professional level as a coach in the NFL and NFL. He also served three seasons on the coaching staff at Notre Dame.

In 2010, Waldron served as the wide receivers coach for the Hartford Colonials of the United Football League.

Prior to his stint in the UFL, Waldron worked with the New England Patriots for a number of years. Beginning in 2002, Waldron served as an operations intern, helping to prep game plans and playbooks, as well as assisting in the day to day running of an NFL team. In 2004, Waldron was promoted to the title of an operations assistant, handling special teams quality control duties and overseeing the completion of weekly game plans.

After leaving the Patriots to coach at Notre Dame, Waldron returned to New England in 2008 where he served as a Quality Control Coach for the offensive. Here, he helped to implement and develop the offensive system. In 2009, he served as the tight ends coach creating and implementing a strategic and successful offense. From 2005 until 2007, Waldron worked at Notre Dame as an Offensive Graduate Assistant, evaluating recruits, helping to run special teams, and assisting with the coaching line. With the Irish, he was a part of two of the most explosive offenses in school history as both the 2005 and 2006 units averaged at least 31 points per game and 389 yards. During his time there he helped coach an offense that included Brady Quinn, Darius Walker and Jeff Samardzija.

Most recently, Waldron worked as an offensive coordinator at the Buckingham Browne and Nichols High School in 2011 and also as a Northeast Sports Consultant. In both jobs, Waldron gained experience working with high school talent.

A native of Portland, Ore., Waldron is a 2002 graduate of Tufts University where he was a three-year letterman as a tight end and long snapper.

Mike GOLDEN

First Year at UMass

University of Massachusetts head football coach Charley Molnar announced in February 2013 the hiring of Mike Golden as the program's strength and conditioning coach. Golden has 17 years of collegiate coaching experience that includes stops at South Florida, East Carolina, South Carolina and UConn.

Golden comes to UMass after spending the last two years at South Florida with head coach Skip Holtz. There he supervised the football program's year-round weight training, speed, agility, and conditioning sessions. As the Assistant Athletic Director of Sports Performance, he also oversaw the development of rehabilitation and performance enhancement programs for all of South Florida's sports.

Prior to South Florida, Golden helped Holtz build East Carolina into one of the top football programs in Conference USA. The Pirates won back-to-back conference championships in 2008 and 2009 and went to five consecutive bowl games from 2006-2010. While in Greenville, Golden worked with first round draft pick Chris Jonson who turned in the fastest 40-yard dash time in NFL Combine History. At ECU, Golden was often credited by Holtz for playing an integral role in turning around the program which had won just three games in 25 outings prior to 2005.

Before taking over ECU's top athletic performance position, Golden spent three years on the South Carolina staff beginning in March of 2002 as assistant strength coach, where he worked directly with the Gamecocks' tennis and women's golf teams, while also providing ancillary support for the football, volleyball and cheerleading programs. In 2004, he designed and implemented South Carolina football's summer strength, speed and conditioning program.

In March of 1998, after spending 20 months working with the strength and athletic programs at Bloomfield (Conn.) High School, Golden accepted a position as head football strength and conditioning coach under Holtz at the University of Connecticut, where he designed, implemented and supervised all weight training, agility and conditioning sessions. He also coordinated all strength and speed testing, and the Huskies' sideline management operation, playing a key role in UConn's first 10-win football campaign and an NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearance in the fall of 1998.

Golden earned his first collegiate full-time position in 1996 and spent nearly two seasons as head strength and conditioning coach at Central Connecticut State, where he played an integral role in the design and inventory purchases for the Blue Devils' new weight room facility. A 1992 graduate of Central Connecticut State, Golden earned a bachelor's degree in physical education. Upon graduation, he spent seven months as an intern at Harvard during the 1992-93 academic year, working as head strength coach for the institution's rugby squad, which advanced to the Final Four, while also working with the Crimson's football and ice hockey programs.

He gained additional experience as an assistant at the National Football League Scouting Combines in 1995, '96 and '97, and as a training camp intern for the Cleveland Browns in 1996.

Golden has also put together an extensive background of international competition, serving as an assistant coach for the five-time World Powerlifting Champion USA Men's Team at venues in Birmingham, England (1992); Jonkoping, Sweden (1993); Johannesburg, South Africa (1994); Pori, Finland (1995) and Salzburg, Austria (1996). He has also published articles in two international strength magazines - Powerlifting USA and Ironman Japan.

Golden is a certified member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA), Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA), United States Weightlifting Federation (USWA) and National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA). In the Spring of 2013, Golden was named a Master Strength & Conditioning Coach by the CSCCA earning the organization's Blue Jacket - the highest honor bestowed upon a strength and conditioning coach.

Golden is married to the former Nicole Kitsos of Cheshire, Conn. The couple has four daughters (Natasha, Tatiana, Sophia, Anastasia) and a son (Magnus).

EAST HARTFORD, Conn. - Despite forcing three turnovers on defense, the UMass football team was unable to capitalize, falling 37-0 on Thursday night at Connecticut in the Minutemen's FBS era debut. Antoine Tharpe and Tom Brandt each had interceptions, while Greg Hilliard had a fumble recovery. The game was the first meeting between the two former Yankee Conference/Atlantic 10 rivals since the 1999 season - the last for UConn before moving to the FBS ranks.

The Minutemen fall to 0-1 on the season, while the Huskies start the season with a 1-0 record. UMass will host its first-ever FBS home game on Saturday, Sept. 8 as Indiana visits Gillette Stadium.

UConn's Chandler Whitmer threw for 219 yards going 15-for-25, while Lyle McCombs ran for 82 yards and a touchdown. Dwayne Gratz had a key interception return for a touchdown prior to halftime, while Taylor Mack blocked a UMass punt that was recovered for a touchdown in late in the third quarter.

Jeremy Davis paced the Huskies' receiving corps with five catches for 79 yards. UConn finished the night with 372 total yards to UMass' 59.

In his collegiate debut for the Minutemen, Mike Wegzyn was 9-for-22 for 56 yards, freshman A.J. Doyle also saw action, entering the game with 8:24 remaining. Redshirt junior Rob Blanchflower made two catches for 17 yards, while freshman Tajae Sharpe had one catch for 15 yards. Chris Burns carried the ball 11 times for a total of 17 yards.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. - A 32-yard interception return for a touchdown by Christian Birt and a pair of field goals by Brendon Levingood highlighted UMass' scoring in a 63-13 loss at No. 17 Michigan on Saturday afternoon. Denard Robinson showed why he was one of the most prolific players in college football with 291 yards passing and 106 yards rushing with four total touchdowns. The game was a homecoming of sorts for UMass tailback Michael Cox who rushed for a season-high 76 yards against his former teammates. Cox played four years at Michigan before enrolling in graduate school at UMass.

Along with Cox's performance, Mike Wegzyn led the offense going 14-of-29 for 141 yards. Receivers Alan Williams and Deion Walker each had season-best performances. Williams had a career-high six catches for 38 yards, while Walker had four catches for a team-best 63 yards.

Fitzgerald Toussaint rushed for 85 yards and two touchdowns in leading Michigan's run game behind Robinson. Drew Dileo had 3 catches for 91 yards to lead the Wolverines wide receivers.

OXFORD, Ohio - Tailback Michael Cox ran for 188 yards and two touchdowns and UMass had 471 yards of total offense, but it was not enough as Miami (Ohio) defeated the Minutemen 27-16. UMass outgained the Red Hawks, but were unable to convert key scoring opportunities in the loss.

Quarterback Mike Wegzyn was 19-of-40 for 213 yards and three interceptions - two of which were in second half. Wegzyn also added 52 yards rushing in the game. Deion Walker led the UMass receiving corps with 81 yards on six catches, while tight end Rob Blanchflower had five for 50 yards. Defensively, UMass was led by Perry McIntyre who had 12 tackles and Kassan Messiah who had 10 in his first career start.

Miami (2-2, 1-0 MAC) was led by Zac Dysert threw for 192 yards on 12-of-22 passing with three touchdowns. Jamire Westbrook had 105 yards on 17 carries, while Dysert had 76 yards on the ground including one touchdown. Dawan Scott had 3 catches for 92 yards and two touchdowns.

Michael Cox provided both touchdowns on the day as the UMass ground attack out-performed its counterpart, 258-216. For his first TD as a Minuteman, Cox took a handoff over the right side from the nine yard line before leaping and flipping end-over-end into the end zone for the UMass touchdown. Cox also brought UMass within 11 of tying with 3:21 left in the game on a two-yard plunge into the endzone.

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. - Mike Wegzyn threw four touchdowns and completed 27 passes for 373 yards as UMass nearly upset league-leader Ohio, falling 37-34 at Gillette Stadium Saturday.

UMass (0-5, 0-2 Mid-American Conference) outgained its opponent for the second-consecutive week, amassing 511 yards of total offense on 84 plays. Wegzyn completed passes to six different receivers, including three touchdown strikes to Alan Williams and another to Deion Walker.

Walker hauled in a game-high 11 catches for 162 yards, while Williams finished with seven for 127 yards. With receivers Walker (162) and Williams (127) over 100 yards against the Bobcats it marked UMass' first game of two players amassing 100 or more receiving yards since Oct. 23, 2010 at Gillette Stadium in the Colonial Clash (Anthony Nelson [190] and Julian Talley [111]) vs. New Hampshire. Michael Cox rushed for 80 yards on 22 carries to lead the Minuteman ground game.

Ohio (5-0, 1-0) got 269 yards and two touchdowns on the ground from Beau Blankenship, including the eventual game-winner on a 40-yard rush with just over six minutes to play that put the Bobcats ahead 37-27. Tyler Tettleton, who started for Ohio after missing the last game with an injury, went 15-for-27 with two touchdowns and 229 yards.

UMass was able to hold Ohio twice in the final few minutes and score to cut the deficit to three before stalling near midfield in the final minute.

NASHVILLE - Vanderbilt scored 14 points in the final two minutes of the first half and had a 28-point burst in the third quarter to break open a 49-7 win over the UMass football team on Saturday night at Vanderbilt Stadium. Jordan Rodgers threw for 217 yards and two touchdowns, while the Commodore's ground game picked up 226 yards and three total scores.

Mike Wegzyn threw for 162 yards on 15-of-27 attempts. A.J. Doyle took over in the third quarter throwing his first career touchdown pass and going 8-for-14 for 48 yards.

Marken Michel and Deion Walker each had six catches for 56 and 51 yards, respectively.

With career rushing leader Zac Stacy knocked out of the game in the first quarter, Brian Kimbrow and Wesley Tate shared the rushing load for a combined 179 of the Commodores' 226 yards.

Vanderbilt (4-4, 2-3 SEC) jumped on the scoreboard first after a 28 yard punt return by Jonathan Krause put the Commodores on the UMass 25 yard line with 6:12 left in the first quarter. On the second play of the drive, Wesley Tate scored on a 25-yard run giving Vandy a 7-0 lead.

In the second quarter, the Minutemen (0-8, 0-4 MAC) forced a Vanderbilt turnover on downs at their own 15-yard line. UMass marched the ball 74 yards on the ensuing drive but could not pick up a fourth-and-one at the Vanderbilt 9-yard line.

The Minutemen forced a punt on the next Commodore possession and UMass marched to the Vandy 28 yard line but the drive stalled after not being able to pick up a first down on fourth-and-four.

The teams traded possessions from there before Vanderbilt scored a pair of touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first half. Kris Kentera caught a 25-yard pass thrown to the back left of the end zone with 1:53 to go in the second quarter.

A fumble on the ensuing kick-off gave the Commodores the ball back at the UMass 24 yard line. On the third play of the drive Rodgers scrambled to the left before diving into the endzone giving Vanderbilt a 21-0 lead with 58 seconds left in the half.

A 28-point third quarter opened up the game for Vanderbilt. Rodgers hit Chris Boyd for a 14 yard touchdown with 6:34 to go before Trey Wilson picked off a Mike Wegzyn pass returning it for a 17-yard touchdown just 90 seconds later.

After UMass went three-and-out on the next possession, the Commodores took over at their own 26 yard line and Brian Kimbrow took the opening run of the drive 74 yards for the score.

Vandy closed out the scoring in the third quarter with a 40 yard punt return for a touchdown thanks to Krause.

UMass finally got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter with a 10-yard pass from Doyle to Walker with 6:05 left in the game.



AKRON, Ohio - The Minutemen defense forced four interceptions to lead the UMass football team to its first win at the FBS level, 22-14, at Akron on Saturday afternoon at InfoCision Stadium. Along with the defensive efforts, the UMass special teams came up with a blocked punt, three field goals and three consecutive punts downed inside the five-yard line in the fourth quarter. With the win, UMass improves to 1-9 overall and 1-5 in the Mid-American Conference.

Mike Wegzyn completed 23-of-39 passes for 266 yards and a touchdown marking his second highest yardage total for the season. He also ran for a one-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter to seal the win. Alan Williams and Rob Blanchflower each hauled in six receptions with Williams posting a team-high 86 yards and a touchdown.

Darren Thellen led the defense with 11 tackles, while Perry McIntyre added nine. Khary Bailey-Smith, Randall Jette, Joe Colton and Ed Saint-Vil each recorded interceptions.

Special teams were also key for the Minutemen with Blake Lucas accounting for 10 of UMass' 15 points hitting three field goals and an extra point. Punter Colter Johnson averaged 44.8 yards per kick with four punts inside the 10-yard line including three straight in the fourth quarter inside the three-yard line.

Dalton Williams finished the game going 34-of-51 for 332 yards and a touchdown along with four interceptions. Jawon Chisholm rushed for 103 yards and a touchdown. Marquelo Suel led Akron with 10 receptions for 105 yards and a score as one of 10 Zips with a catch in the game.



UMass will wrap up its inaugural FBS season on Friday, Nov. 23, at home against Central Michigan at 3 p.m.

Buffalo improves to a 4-7 record while UMass falls to a 1-10 record.

Coming off a career day against Akron last week, Blake Lucas continued his success, kicking two field goals, including a career-long 39-yarder, and converting one extra point.

Mike Wegzyn threw for 215 yards for the Minutemen, completing 20-of-40 with one touchdown, while Deion Walker paced UMass' receiving corps with 83 yards on five catches. Tying a career high with seven receptions, Alan Williams followed with 62 yards, while Rob Blanchflower had four catches for 44 yards, including a touchdown. Michael Cox, the leading rusher for the Minutemen, ran for 31 yards and a TD on 13 carries.

Defensively for UMass, Perry McIntyre had 13 tackles and one sack, while Ed Saint-Vil made a single-game career-high 11 stops. Randall Jette finished with seven tackles and recorded an interception for a second-straight contest.

Brandon Murie and Rashad Jean combined for 163 yards on the ground for Buffalo with 90 and 73, respectively. Joe Licata finished 18-for-30 with 226 yards and two TDs. Alex Neutz had nine catches for 76 yards and Fred Lee totaled 93 yards on three catches.



FOXBOROUGH, Mass. - Zurlon Tipton rushed for 185 yards and four touchdowns as Central Michigan came from behind to beat Massachusetts, 42-21, on the Minutemen's Senior Day at Gillette Stadium Friday.

Tipton's 25 carries helped CMU (6-6, 4-4 Mid-American Conference) become the seventh bowl eligible team from the MAC as the Chippewas erased a 21-14 third quarter deficit with 28-unanswered points. Ryan Radcliff was 10-of-19 and threw for 82 yards with a touchdown and an interception.

UMass (1-11, 1-7 MAC) was narrowly outgained 340-318 in total offense but two second-half interceptions turned the momentum after the Minutemen had taken their first lead of the game early in the third.

Freshman A.J. Doyle made his first career start and threw for 253 yards on 30-of-45 passing and a pair of touchdowns, including the two interceptions.

His favorite target during the contest was tight end Rob Blanchflower, who caught 10 passes for 100 yards and a TD. Alan Williams and Deion Walker each hauled in seven balls. Michael Cox rushed for 66 yards and a touchdown on 17 carries.

CMU took the first lead of the game when Zurlon Tipton finished a 48-yard drive with a one-yard rush on its second possession of the contest.

A Radcliff 5-yard pass to tight end Connor Odykirk in the opening minutes of the second quarter doubled the Chippewas lead to 14-0.

Darren Thellen intercepted Radcliff and returned it 24 yards to the nine to set-up the Minutemen's first score of the contest - a 1-yard Michael Cox rush just inside the pylon on the left side of the endzone.

Doyle hit Rob Blanchflower on a slant with four seconds left in the half to knot the score up at 14-14.

UMass came out of the half with a strong 65-yard drive that saw Doyle complete all five pass attempts for 39 yards, including a nine-yarder to Deion Walker for a touchdown that put the Minutemen ahead 21-14.

CMU tied it on the next possession, marching 70 yards on 11 plays with Tipton doing most of the damage on the ground. His three-yard carry with 2:21 on the clock was his seventh of the drive.

Doyle was intercepted on UMass' ensuing possession, with the Chippewas taking over at the UMass nine by virtue of Jahleel Addae's 30-yard return. Tipton added his third score of the day CMU's first play after the miscue.

CMU added another score on a Saylor Lavallii run from six yards out following an interception by Avery Cunningham at the UMass 42. Tipton capped off his big day with a 61-yard rush down the left sideline that put CMU up 42-21.

Football Chronology

Fall, 1878: Francis Codman '80, the "Father of Massachusetts Agricultural College Football," organizes the initial Aggie team, although no games are played.

Nov. 22, 1879: Massachusetts Agricultural College plays its first football game, defeating the freshman team from cross-town rival Amherst College, 4-0, on Alumni Field. The game was the only one of the season for the Aggies, giving them their first undefeated season.

Nov. 13, 1880: The first road game for the Aggies is a 0-0 tie at Amherst College.

Nov. 4, 1885: M.A.C. and Amherst College meet for the fourth time in the 1885 season. The Aggies win the four-game set, 2-1-1.

Nov. 22, 1889: The Aggies complete their second undefeated season with a 2-0 record. Both wins come over Williston Academy.

Sept. 25, 1897: Doctor Weeks, an 1897 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania where he was a regular quarterback, becomes the first M.A.C. football coach. The volunteer mentor loses his first game, 4-0 at Holy Cross, and posts a 1-4-1 mark in his only season as coach.

Nov. 6, 1897: The first-ever meeting between Massachusetts and Connecticut takes place, with M.A.C. winning the game, 36-0.

Sept. 28, 1901: James Halligan, former captain of the 1899 squad, leads the Aggies to a 17-0 victory at Holy Cross. Halligan becomes the first full-time seasonal football coach in school history.

Oct. 14, 1903: The first-ever meeting between Massachusetts and Rhode Island takes place, with the Aggies prevailing, 46-0. Massachusetts has faced Rhode Island 76 times, more than any other school.

Oct. 9, 1915: M.A.C. plays its first game at "New" Alumni Field, defeating Colby, 26-0.

Oct. 2, 1920: Massachusetts picks up its 100th win in school history, defeating Connecticut, 28-0.

March 26, 1931: Massachusetts Agricultural College becomes Massachusetts State College.

Sept. 26, 1931: Mel Taube coaches his first game against Cooper Union, leading the Aggies to a 50-0 victory. Taube goes on to become the school's all-time winningest coach by percentage (.682 / minimum 40 games). The game marks the first collegiate appearance by Lou Bush, who runs for three touchdowns on the afternoon.

Nov. 14, 1931: The Aggies defeat Wagner, 77-0, behind a school-record five touchdowns by Lou Bush. The margin of victory is still tied for the largest ever by Massachusetts.

Nov. 21, 1931: Lou Bush finishes the season with a then-school record 127 points to lead the nation in scoring. Bush goes on to win the national scoring title again in 1932 with 114 points.

Sept. 24, 1932: Lou Bush sets a school record by rushing for five touchdowns against Cooper Union, leading the Aggies to a 50-0 victory.

Nov. 5, 1937: Massachusetts loses at Coast Guard, 7-6, in the first-ever night game for the Aggies.

Nov. 10, 1945: The last meeting between Massachusetts and Amherst College ends in a 7-7 tie.

Dec. 3, 1946: The Yankee Conference is created. Massachusetts is a charter member, along with Rhode Island, Connecticut, Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont.

May 7, 1947: Massachusetts State College becomes the University of Massachusetts.

Oct. 18, 1947: UMass hosts Rhode Island in its first-ever Yankee Conference game. Rhode Island wins the contest, 20-13.

Jan. 16, 1948: UMass changes its team nickname from the Aggies to the Redmen.

Oct. 30, 1948: The Redmen win their first Yankee Conference game, 33-0, at home against Vermont.

Sept. 27, 1952: UMass wins its 200th game in school history, posting a 39-6 win over Bates in Amherst.

Nov. 15, 1952: UMass travels to Tufts and wins 32-0 in the first televised game in school history.

Oct. 2, 1954: In the first meeting between the two schools in nearly 40 years, UMass posts a 13-7 upset victory at Harvard.

Oct. 1, 1960: Under the direction of first-year head coach Charles Studley, UMass upsets Harvard 27-12 on the road to open the season with a 3-0 record.

Nov. 12, 1960: UMass earns a share of its first Yankee Conference championship with a 35-15 win over New Hampshire.

Sept. 30, 1961: Vic Fusia coaches his first game at Massachusetts, leading the Redmen to a 21-12 victory over American International College. Fusia goes on to become the school's all-time winningest coach with 59 victories.

Nov. 22, 1961: Maine defeats UMass, 10-7, for the Yankee Conference championship in a game postponed from Sept. 23 because 22 members of the UMass team had been struck with an intestinal virus epidemic.

Nov. 10, 1962: The Redmen record a 19-18 upset win at Villanova. To this day, it remains UMass' only victory at Villanova.

Sept. 21, 1963: UMass surrenders a touchdown to Maine in a 14-7 win over the Black Bears. It would be the only touchdown the Redmen allowed all season.

Nov. 16, 1963: The Redmen clinch their first outright Yankee Conference title with a 48-2 victory over New Hampshire. The win also closes out the team's third and most recent undefeated season (8-0-1).

Nov. 14, 1964: UMass defeats New Hampshire, 47-0, to clinch its second straight and third overall Yankee Conference title. Vic Fusia is named New England Football Coach of the Year, while quarterback Jerry Whelchel receives the George Bulger Lowe award from the Gridiron Club of Boston as New England's most outstanding player.

Dec. 12, 1964: UMass plays in its first-ever postseason game, the Tangerine Bowl. After leading East Carolina, 13-0, the Redmen tire late in the game and fall 14-13.

Sept. 25, 1965: UMass defeats American International College, 41-0, in the first game ever at Alumni Stadium.

Oct. 16, 1965: UMass defeats Rhode Island, 30-0, in the official dedication game of Alumni Stadium.

Oct. 30, 1965: Greg Landry throws for a then-UMass record 300 yards to lead the Redmen to a 41-6 victory over Vermont. Landry goes on to lead the team in passing in all three of his years (1965-1967), and lead the squad in both rushing and scoring in 1965 and 1967. His quarterback efficiency rating of 145.4 in 1965 is still a school record.

Nov. 27, 1965: Milt Morin becomes the first UMass player to be drafted in the first round when the Cleveland Browns select the All-America tight end as their number one pick in the 1966 NFL Draft.

Nov. 12, 1966: UMass defeats New Hampshire, 14-7, to claim its fourth Yankee Conference title.

Nov. 18, 1967: The Redmen earn their fifth Yankee Conference championship with a 14-13 victory at New Hampshire.

Jan. 30, 1968: Greg Landry is chosen as the 11th overall pick by the Detroit Lions in the first round of the 1968 NFL Draft. Landry's selection still remains the highest draft pick by a UMass football player in school history.

Nov. 15, 1969: UMass defeats New Hampshire 48-7 to earn its sixth Yankee Conference championship.

Sept. 18, 1971: Dick MacPherson coaches his first game at UMass, defeating Maine 13-0. MacPherson goes on to lead UMass to four Yankee Conference championships in his seven-year tenure.

Nov. 13, 1971: The Redmen earn a piece of their seventh Yankee Conference title with a 38-20 victory at New Hampshire.

Spring, 1972: UMass changes its nickname from the Redmen to the Minutemen.

Nov. 18, 1972: The Minutemen defeat New Hampshire 42-7 to claim their eighth Yankee Conference title.

Nov. 25, 1972: In front of an Alumni Stadium record 20,000 fans, the Minutemen post a 28-7 win over arch-rival Boston College.

Dec. 9, 1972: UMass defeats California-Davis 35-14 at the Boardwalk Bowl in Atlantic City, N.J., to win its first postseason game.

Sept. 15, 1973: The Minutemen win the 300th game in school history, defeating Villanova 21-20.

Nov. 16, 1974: The Minutemen defeat New Hampshire 27-17 to earn a share of their ninth Yankee Conference title.

Oct. 23, 1976: Brian McNally throws for a then-school record 389 yards against Connecticut in a 28-6 loss.

Nov. 12, 1977: UMass claims its 10th Yankee Conference title with a 19-6 win at New Hampshire.

Nov. 19, 1977: The Minutemen conclude the 1977 regular season with a 34-7 loss at Boston College. The 30,846 fans in attendance marked the biggest crowd to watch a UMass football game until 2002.

Nov. 26, 1977: Lehigh defeats UMass, 30-23, in the first round of the NCAA Division II Playoffs at McGuirk Alumni Stadium, despite a spirited second-half surge by the Minutemen. The contest was the first postseason football game played in Amherst and marked Dick MacPherson's last game as head coach of the Minutemen.

Nov. 18, 1978: The Minutemen earn their 11th Yankee Conference title with a 34-7, victory over New Hampshire.

Dec. 9, 1978: UMass overpowers previously unbeaten and top-ranked Nevada-Reno, 44-21, in the NCAA Division I-AA semifinals at MacKay Stadium in Reno. The Minutemen's victory marked the first NCAA Division I-AA playoff win in school history.

Dec. 16, 1978: UMass falls to Florida A&M, 35-28, in the first-ever Division I-AA championship game. The Minutemen, under first-year coach Bob Pickett, win the Lambert Cup as the best team in the East.

Nov. 17, 1979: The Minutemen claim a share of their 12th Yankee Conference title with a 29-0 win at New Hampshire.

Nov. 14, 1981: UMass defeats New Hampshire 20-9 to earn a piece of its 13th Yankee Conference championship.

Nov. 13, 1982: The Minutemen claim a share of their 14th Yankee Conference title with a 27-0 victory over New Hampshire.

Nov. 20, 1982: Garry Pearson rushes for a then-UMass single-game record 288 yards in the final game of his collegiate career, a 29-13 victory over American International College.

Nov. 3, 1984: Alumni Stadium is renamed Warren P. McGuirk Alumni Stadium in honor of the late UMass Athletic Director during whose tenure the stadium was built.

Nov. 22, 1986: UMass loses to Connecticut 20-17, but claims a share of its 15th Yankee Conference championship.

Nov. 19, 1988: The Minutemen win a wild 64-42 shootout at New Hampshire to earn their 16th Yankee Conference title and first outright league championship in 10 years.

Nov. 4, 1989: UMass picks up its 400th win in school history, defeating Richmond 17-14.

Oct. 20, 1990: The Minutemen win their first game ever against Delaware 17-3, after losing the first 14 meetings to the Blue Hens. The win comes at a great cost though, when promising sophomore quarterback Gary Wilkos suffers a career-ending fractured neck in the game.

Nov. 10, 1990: UMass defeats Villanova 3-0 to claim its league-leading 17th Yankee Conference title.

Sept. 12, 1992: UMass falls to Delaware 33-13 in the 900th game in school history, and the first for Mike Hodges as head coach. The Minutemen rebound to win seven straight games, and Hodges is named New England Coach of the Year.

Oct. 1, 1994: Rene Ingoglia rushes for a then- UMass and Yankee Conference single-game record 313 yards in a 22-12 victory over Rhode Island at McGuirk Alumni Stadium.

Oct. 7, 1995: Rene Ingoglia becomes the all-time leading rusher in school history in a 32-29 loss to New Hampshire at McGuirk Alumni Stadium. Ingoglia surpasses Garry Pearson's previous mark of 3,859 career yards.

Nov. 11, 1995: Frank Alessio rushes for a UMass and Yankee Conference single-game record 337 yards and three touchdowns in the Minutemen's 28-23 victory at Boston University.

Nov. 18, 1995: Rene Ingoglia closes out his collegiate career by becoming the all-time leading rusher in Yankee Conference history in a 20-7 loss at UConn. Ingoglia finishes with 4,624 career rushing yards, and still ranks 18th all-time in Division I-AA history.

June 3, 1996: The Yankee Conference announces its 50th anniversary all-time team. UMass led the way with a league-high six players named to the 26-man squad. Quarterback Greg Landry (1965-67), running back Rene Ingoglia (1992-95), offensive lineman Bill Durkin (1990-93), offensive lineman Bruce Kimball (1975-78), defensive lineman Brian Corcoran (1991-94) and defensive lineman Ed McAleney (1972-75) are selected to the prestigious team.

Oct. 5, 1996: Jim Pizano runs 96 yards for a touchdown at Rhode Island, marking the longest run in school history. The rush eclipsed a mark that had stood for over 68 years, when Fred Ellert scampered 95 yards at Tufts on Nov. 27, 1928.

Nov. 16, 1996: The Miracle at McGuirk. Jeff Smith hits Erik Henry on a 20-yard touchdown strike with 31 seconds remaining to complete a 20-point fourth quarter comeback and lead UMass to a 39-38 victory over Connecticut in the final game in Yankee Conference history. The comeback is the greatest in school history.

July 1, 1997: The Atlantic 10 Football Conference officially takes over operation of the Yankee Conference, marking the end of a 50-year football legacy but the beginning of a new era in collegiate football. In the Yankee Conference's history, UMass won more league titles (17) and games (160) than any other conference member.

Aug. 30, 1997: UMass falls to Richmond 21-6, in a game that marks the official kickoff of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. Commissioner Linda Bruno is on hand to perform the ceremonial coin flip prior to the start of the game.

Oct. 31, 1998: Quarterback Todd Bankhead throws for 274 yards in a 27-26 victory over New Hampshire to break the UMass single-season passing record in only the eighth game of the season. Bankhead, who would finish the year with 3,919 yards, also broke school single-season records for completions (303), attempts (525), touchdowns (34) and total offense (3,756).

Nov. 14, 1998: Marcel Shipp rushes for 270 yards in a 55-34 victory over Maine, to break Garry Pearson's UMass single-season rushing record. Shipp finished the year with 2,542 yards, while also breaking school single-season records for carries (428) and all-purpose yards (3,032).

Nov. 21, 1998: Jimmy Moore caught nine passes for 172 yards in a 28-27 loss to Connecticut, breaking the school single-season record for receptions. Moore totaled 92 catches on the year, and also broke UMass single-season records for receiving yards (1,494) and receiving touchdowns (16).

Nov. 28, 1998: The Minutemen jump out to a 21-0 lead in the second quarter and hold on for a 21-19 victory at McNeese State in the first round of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. Freshman Kevin Quinlan, playing in place of the injured Marcel Shipp, rushed for 147 yards as UMass knocked off the 1997 NCAA runner-up.

Dec. 5, 1998: UMass records the first home postseason victory in school history with a 27-21 win over Lehigh at Warren McGuirk Alumni Stadium. Todd Bankhead throws for 270 yards to lead the offense, while the defense stops the Mountain Hawks on fourth and goal in the final two minutes to preserve the victory in the NCAA quarterfinals.

Dec. 12, 1998: The Minutemen advance to the NCAA championship game for the second time in school history with a 41-31 win at Northwestern State (La.). UMass trailed 24-21 entering the fourth quarter, before Todd Bankhead hit Matt Jordan with a 49-yard touchdown pass to ignite a 20-0 run and propel the Minutemen to victory.

Dec. 19, 1998: UMass downs top-ranked and previously-unbeaten Georgia Southern 55-43 in the NCAA championship game, played in Chattanooga, Tenn. The defense forced the Eagles into seven turnovers on the day, allowing the Minutemen to take control of the game early. Marcel Shipp led the offense by rushing for a then-championship game record 244 yards on 35 carries, while Kole Ayi had 16 tackles, three fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles. In addition to winning its first-ever NCAA I-AA championship, UMass won the Lambert Cup for the second time in school history.

Oct. 30, 1999: Todd Bankhead completed 16 of 27 passes for 322 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-9 victory over Rhode Island, breaking all-time UMass records for both passing yards and attempts in the process. Bankhead would finish his career as UMass' all-time leader in passing yards (7,018), completions (561), attempts (931), touchdown passes (51) and total offense (6,821 yards).

Nov. 6, 1999: Adrian Zullo caught 11 passes for 210 yards and a touchdown in a 33-6 victory at Richmond, to break the UMass single-game record for receiving yards. Zullo totaled 179 receiving yards in the first half alone, and shattered Milt Morin's old record of 181 yards, set against Vermont in 1965. Zullo also tied the single-game record for receptions with 11, a mark which he had also achieved earlier in the season against New Hampshire.

Nov. 13, 1999: Marcel Shipp rushed for 210 yards and three touchdowns on 35 carries in a 25-16 victory at William & Mary, to break the all-time UMass record for career rushing yards. Shipp broke Rene Ingoglia's old mark of 4,624 yards, and went on to finish his career with 6,250 yards.

Nov. 20, 1999: The Minutemen destroyed arch-rival Connecticut 62-20 at McGuirk Stadium in the Huskies last game as a I-AA school, and claimed their 18th Atlantic 10 Conference title in the process. Marcel Shipp rushed for three touchdowns in the victory, to break Rene Ingoglia's single-season record of 19. Shipp went on to finish the season with 24 rushing scores.

Nov. 27, 1999: Marcel Shipp scored on a one-yard touchdown run in overtime to propel the Minutemen to a dramatic 30-23 victory at eighth-ranked Furman in the first round of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. In the win, Adrian Zullo caught 10 passes for 121 yards and a score.

Dec. 4, 1999: The Minutemen stayed close in to the fourth quarter, but came up just short in a 38-21 loss at second-ranked Georgia Southern in the quarterfinals of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. In the game, Adrian Zullo broke the UMass career records for catches and receiving yards. Zullo enters the 2002 season as the all-time school leader in receptions (135), receiving yards (2,130) and receiving touchdowns (23).

Aug. 31, 2000: In the first-ever night game at McGuirk Alumni Stadium, the Minutemen down William & Mary 36-16. The game was the first ever for UMass under the lights in Amherst.

Oct. 28, 2000: Kole Ayi makes 13 solo stops in a 24-16 loss at New Hampshire to become the all-time UMass leader in career unassisted tackles. Ayi went on to finish his career with 330 solo tackles, and also ranks third all-time on the school list for total tackles with 478.

Nov. 18, 2000: Marcel Shipp rushed 36 times for 156 yards and four touchdowns, to lead the Minutemen to a 29-21 victory at Rhode Island in the final game of his collegiate career. Shipp finished his four years at UMass with 6,250 rushing yards, becoming the all-time leading rusher in the history of the Atlantic 10 Conference. He also set new school career records for carries (1,215), rushing touchdowns (58), all-purpose yards (7,759), points scored (378) and touchdowns scored (63).

Sept. 28, 2002: The Minutemen drop a 56-24 decision at North Carolina State, ranked No. 17 in Division I-A. The 51,221 fans in attendance mark the biggest crowd to ever witness a UMass football game.

Nov. 22, 2003: UMass defeats Rhode Island 31-17 at McGuirk Stadium to claim a share of its 19th Atlantic 10 Conference title. With the win, the Minutemen also set a school record for regular season victories with 10, while posting seven home wins in a year for the first time ever.

Nov. 29, 2003: Playing in a blizzard at Colgate, the Minutemen are defeated 19-7 in the opening round of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. UMass takes a 7-0 lead in the first quarter, but is unable to overcome the elements as it finishes the season with a 10-3 overall record.

Feb. 9, 2004: Don Brown was named UMass new head coach as former coach Mark Whipple left to become quarterbacks coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Sept. 11, 2004: UMass hosts its second night game in school history at McGuirk Stadium. The Minutemen beat Colgate 30-20 in a rematch of the 2003 NCAA playoff game.

Oct. 16, 2004: UMass picks up its 500th win in program history with a 38-21 win at New Hampshire. Steve Baylark won the game's Bill Knight MVP Award as he ran for a career-high 192 yards.

Sept. 17, 2005: UMass sets a Division I-AA record and ties the all-time football record with three safeties in a 40-0 win over Albany in the third all-time night game at McGuirk Stadium.

Oct. 7, 2006: UMass won back-to-back games by the score of 48-7 beating William & Mary. The Minutemen also beat Stony Brook by the same score on Sept. 24. The last time UMass won consecutive games by the same score -- was also 48-7 and also separated by a bye week, back in 1969. UMass beat Vermont and New Hampshire, 48-7 on Nov. 1 and 15, 1969.

Oct. 28, 2006: Steve Baylark became the third player in I-AA/FCS history to gain 1,000 rushing yards in four consecutive seasons with 152 yards in a 7-0 win at Northeastern in a rain storm. Baylark joined Jerry Azumah (New Hampshire, 1995-98) and Adrian Peterson (Georgia Southern, 1996-99).

Nov. 11, 2006: UMass clinched the Atlantic 10 Championship and the league's automatic qualifier for the NCAA Tournament with a 10-9 win over Maine. The Minutemen claimed the win as the Black Bears missed an extra point with 1:44 left in regulation.

Nov. 18, 2006: On Senior Day, UMass posted a perfect 8-0 record in the Atlantic 10 with a 22-16 win over Hofstra at McGuirk Stadium. The 8-0 record gave UMass the league's first undefeated record since Villanova in 1997.

Dec. 2, 2006: In the NCAA Quarterfinals, UMass advanced to the National Semifinals for the first time since winning the title in 1998 with a 24-17 victory over No. 9 New Hampshire. The dramatic win came before a sell-out crowd of 17,000 at McGuirk Stadium. It was the first sell-out since Sept. 8, 1973 when 18,100 jammed McGuirk prior to fire codes. It was the ninth-largest in history.

Dec. 8, 2006: UMass advanced to its third I-AA/FCS Championship game with a 19-17 win at No. 2 Montana before a sell-out crowd of 23,454 and national-television audience on ESPN2. Kicker Chris Koeplin kicked the game-winning field goal from 43-yards out with 13:25 left in the fourth to put UMass ahead 19-17. Steve Baylark had 245 all-purpose yards and two rushing touchdowns.

Dec. 15, 2006: UMass falls to No. 1 Appalachian State in the first FCS Division I Championship game, formerly I-AA, 28-17 in Chattanooga.

March 1, 2007: The Colonial Athletic Association assumed operational control of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. All 12 teams remained in the league, which is under its third governance, beginning with the Yankee Conference in 1947.

Oct. 13, 2007: UMass beat Villanova in quadruple overtime, 32-24, at McGuirk Alumni Stadium. The game equaled the longest overtime game in program history. UMass lost to Richmond, 52-51 in four overtimes on Sept. 19, 1987.

Nov. 3, 2007: Quarterback Liam Coen became UMass' career passing yardage leader with 191 yards in a 27-7 win over rival #14 New Hampshire. He broke Todd Bankhead's mark of 7,018 with an 8-yard pass to Ian Jorgensen in the third quarter. He heads into his senior season of 2008 with 8,282. The win also clinched a second straight conference North division title for the Minutemen.

Nov. 24, 2007: UMass piled up 649 yards of total offense, the second-most in a game in school history, an an NCAA First Round win over Fordham, 49-35 at McGuirk Stadium. In the win, Liam Coen set a new school record for passing yards in a game with 419, breaking Matt Guice's 401 in 2001.

Sept. 20, 2008: UMass football played before the largest crowd ever to watch a school team in action as the Minutemen lost at No. 10 Texas Tech, 56-14 before 53,190.

Nov. 22, 2008: Don Brown coached his last game at UMass in leading the Minutemen to a 28-14 win over Hofstra. That game made UMass senior class the winningest four-year class in program history with a 37-14.

Jan. 19, 2009: Kevin Morris was named the 28th head coach in UMass football history. Morris spent the previous five years as the Minutemen's offensive coordinator.

Sept. 18, 2010: UMass football plays before the largest crowd in school history for any sport, at Michigan Stadium. The Minutemen battle hard in a 42-37 loss to the then-No. 20 Wolverines before 110,187. UMass lead most of the first half before falling behind with a minute left before halftime.

Oct. 23, 2010: UMass will play the first-ever college football game at Gillette Stadium as the Minutemen and New Hampshire battle in the first-ever Colonial Clash.

Nov. 19, 2011: UMass plays its final game at the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS/I-AA). The Minutemen fall 34-17 to James Madison in the final game at McGuirk Stadium.

Dec. 8, 2011: Charley Molnar named new head coach for UMass first season as a member of the Football Bowl Subdivision and of the Mid-American Conference. Molnar is introduced to fans and media in a press conference at Gillette Stadium.

Aug. 30, 2012: UMass falls at Connecticut 37-0 in its first-ever game as an FBS team. It marked the first time the two teams had played since UMass defeated the Huskies 62-20 during the 1999 season - the last game for UConn at the I-AA (FCS) level.

Nov. 10, 2012: UMass picks up its first win as an FBS program and its first conference win as a member of the MAC with a 22-14 victory at Akron. UMass forced four interceptions, blocked a punt, scored three field goals and pinned three consecutive punts inside the 5-yard line as defense and special teams highlighted the win.

April 26, 2013: Ground is officially broken as dignitaries from around the state visit the construction site of the UMass Football Performance Center - The new home for UMass football at McGuirk Stadium.

June 10, 2013: Brothers and business partners Martin and Richard Jacobson pledge \$2.5 million to the Athletic Department for the naming rights of the new football press and skybox. The newest addition to McGuirk Stadium will now be named the Martin And Richard Jacobson Press and Skybox Complex.

July 10 & 11, 2013: On July 10, Colter Johnson becomes the first UMass football player named to a major FBS preseason Watch List as he is a nominee for the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter. A day later, Anthony Dima is named to the Outland Trophy Watch List honoring the nation's top interior lineman.

Cal-Davis finally got on the board when Bob Biggs found Frank Altick on a 20-yard pass with less than two minutes left in the first half. The Aggies would cut the UMass lead to 20-14 before reserve quarterback Mark Tripucka came in to put the game out of reach with two more Minuteman touchdowns. The Minutemen outgained the Aggies 184-61 on the ground, and Schubert was UMass' top receiver with 69 yards. The Minutemen finished with a 9-2 record.

The Minuteman defense forced seven Wolfpack turnovers (six interceptions, one fumble) to give the offense the ball in fine field position most of the day. UMass opened the contest with an 80-yard drive that ended with a Cliff Pedrow 20-yard scoring run. The play was set up by Dennis Dent's 32-yard flea-flicker to Chris Kurtz. After UMass fumbled a Nevada-Reno punt, the Wolfpack scored on a three-yard run by John Vicari. On the ensuing kickoff, Dent went 96 yards for a touchdown to give UMass a 13-7 lead. UMass' Steve McInnes set up Pedrow's one-yard touchdown run with an interception, and Minuteman quarterback Mike McEvilly ended the first half scoring when he connected with Kevin O'Connor on a 47-yard touchdown strike that gave UMass a 28-7 lead. In the second half, Pedrow scored on a 30-yard run and Kevin Sullivan ran an interception back 59 yards for the final two Minuteman touchdowns.

In the first NCAA Division I-AA championship game, UMass dropped a 35-28 decision to Florida A&M in the Pioneer Bowl. The Minutemen could not contain the Florida A&M running attack, which totalled 470 yards despite playing without leading rusher Ike Williams. Mike Solomon had 207 yards and Melvin McFayden had 177 to pace A&M. Despite the Rattlers' ground success, UMass held a 22-21 lead in the fourth quarter on three Sandro Vitiello field goals and two touchdowns by Cliff Pedrow. With 8:26 left in the game, UMass fumbled and Florida A&M recovered. On the next play, Solomon scored on a 28-yard touchdown run and a two-point conversion to put the Rattlers ahead 29-22. After three unsuccessful downs and a punt by UMass, A&M got the ball back, and Solomon scampered for a 20-yard scoring run to give the Rattlers a 35-22 lead. UMass closed the scoring on a last

second 34-yard touchdown pass from Mike McEvilly to Chris Kurtz. Head coach Bob Pickett's defense played without three starters, including Kevin Sullivan, who broke his ankle in the first quarter. UMass finished the season 9-4 and won the Lambert Cup as the top team in the East.

The Tribe offense gained 500 yards, including 311 through the air, and the defense stopped UMass twice inside the five-yard line in the first half, as William & Mary rolled to a 38-0 NCAA Division I-AA playoff win. With less than five minutes left in the first quarter, UMass had a second-and-goal situation at the Tribe one-yard line and was forced to attempt a field goal, which was blocked. After William & Mary went up 7-0, UMass drove to the Tribe six-yard line where the drive ended when the William & Mary defense held on fourth-and-one. Steve Baylark romped for 198 yards - his second-highest rushing total - to pace the UMass offensive attack. His 60-yard burst in the first quarter set up his only touchdown of the day.

Brad Anderson intercepted Ricky Santos with 13:30 left in the fourth quarter and returned the ball 31 yards to the UNH 14-yard line which set up Chris Koeplin's 33-yard field goal with 11:08 left in regulation.

UMass took a 21-17 lead as Brandon London snagged a 31-yard TD pass from Liam Coen with 6:21 left in the third quarter. He broke away and dove across the endzone line with tacklers draped on him. It was London's 15th career receiving TD, tying for fourth-most at UMass.

The Wildcats grabbed a 17-14 halftime lead as Tom Manning kicked a 41-yard field goal as time expired in the first half. UNH tied the game at 14-14 with 1:34 left in the first half as Keith Levan hauled in an 11-yard pass from Ricky Santos.

UMass took a 14-7 lead as sophomore Ian Jorgensen caught a 6-yard pass from Liam Coen with 8:56 left in the second quarter.

Appalachian State put the ball in Kevin Richardson's hands with its second straight NCAA Division I-AA title at stake.

Richardson's fourth touchdown sealed Appalachian State's 28-17 victory over Massachusetts on Friday night. The former walk-on finished with 179 yards.

His third touchdown put the Mountaineers (14-1) ahead 21-14 at the beginning of the fourth quarter. He added another for 2 yards with 1:51 left that gave him the I-AA record for rushing touchdowns in a season with 30.

The Minutemen (13-2), hoping to win their first title since 1998, cut it to 21-17 on Chris Koepplin's 42-yard field goal with 8:46 left.

Appalachian State then took 6:46 off the clock as Richardson ran 10 times in a long drive before capping it with his last touchdown.

UMass got the ball back, but Appalachian State's Corey Lynch had an interception to seal it.

The Mountaineers' freshman quarterback, Armani Edwards managed the game well and finished 12-of-19 for 146 yards. He also ran 15 times for 81 yards, and Appalachian State totaled 285 yards on the ground. Richardson's counterpart for UMass, Steve Baylark, tried to carry the Minutemen. He ran for 133 yards on 24 carries.

UMass tied it at 14 in the third quarter on Liam Coen's 17-yard pass to Brad Listorti, who tiptoed a few yards down the sideline to stay in bounds and score. The Minutemen got the ball after James Ihedigbo intercepted a pass by Edwards at the UMass 19, stopping Appalachian State's first prolonged drive of the second half.

The attendance was announced at 22,808, a sellout and overflow crowd and the largest for the I-AA title game since it moved to Chattanooga in 1997.

No. 7 UMass advanced to the Quarterfinals with a 49-35 win over Patriot League Champion Fordham on a record-setting day for the Minutemen. Liam Coen set the UMass record for passing yards in a game with 419 along with four TD passes. Matt Lawrence had his ninth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 167 and three rushing TDs. Rasheed Rancher had the second-most receiving yards in a game with 198.

The Minutemen piled up 649 yards of total offense, the second-most in a game in school history. They set the record of 651 against New Hampshire in 1965. Fordham had 406 yards as the teams combining 1,055 total yards.

Charles Walker's first-career interception set up the game-sealing drive as Lawrence ran in for his third touchdown of the game for two yards, making it 49-35 with 5:15 left in the fourth.

UMass took the lead back at 42-35 as Lawrence ran in from 13 yards out for his second score of the day. On the drive, Coen set the UMass single-game passing yardage record as he broke the record of 403 held by Matt Guice in 2001.

Skelton hooked up with Sylvester Clarke for an 11-yard touchdown with 11:59 left in the fourth quarter. The drive spanned 98 yards as Skelton completed 4-of-5 for 69 yards in leading the Rams down the field. The drive began off another UMass turnover on a failed halfback option. Lawrence was attempting to throw a pass to Ian Jorgensen in the end zone, but was picked off.

Despite a valiant comeback, the No. 7 Minutemen lost to No. 4 Southern Illinois, 34-27. UMass finished the season at 10-3, marking its fourth 10-win season all-time.

The Salukis were too much to handle all afternoon from the opening whistle as Southern Illinois gashed UMass' defense for 462 yards, the most the Minutemen have allowed since giving up 516 to Boston College in 2004. UMass allowed its longest reception (69 yards) and longest rush (64 yards) of the season.

Liam Coen threw for a school-record 421 yards on 28-of-42. It marked the second week in a row he set the school record for passing yards.

Matt Lawrence gained more than 100 yards for the 10th time this season with 112, in his final collegiate game. Rasheed Rancher had five catches for 143 yards, giving him 1794 in his career, as he finished his career, fourth in receiving yards all-time at UMass. J.J. Moore had seven catches giving him 185, second all-time to Adrian Zullo (187) at UMass. Moore also had 94 receiving yards as he finished his career second in career receiving yards with 2423. Michael Omar also set career-high with 10 catches and 114 yards for his first-career 100-yard game.

UMass continued to try and rally all second half. The Minutemen cut the lead to 34-27 as Brad Listorti caught his first pass of the season from four yards out with 4:00 left in regulation.

The Minutemen cut the lead to 34-20 with 1:17 left in the third as Coen hit Jeremy Horne from 30 yards out for the receiver's third TD of the season.

1998 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

When Mark Whipple was hired as the head coach of the Minutemen on Dec. 16, 1997, he talked about winning a national championship. Few people thought that would happen, and almost no one believed UMass could accomplish the goal in only one season. But by the time the 1998 season concluded, the Minutemen had produced one of the greatest turnarounds in college football history, going from a 2-9 record the year before to a 12-3 mark and the NCAA Division I-AA national title.

The season saw a number of close games for UMass, with nine of the first 13 contests coming down to the final minute or overtime. The Minutemen then posted a dramatic come-from-behind win at Northwestern State in the NCAA semifinals, scoring 20 straight points in the fourth quarter to post a 41-31 victory. In the final game of the season, UMass rolled to a 55-43 win over top-ranked and previously unbeaten Georgia Southern, in a game which was not as close as the final score indicated.

On the way to the national championship, the Minutemen set numerous school records, many of which had stood for decades. Included among the records set were team single season marks for points scored (524), touchdowns (73), total yards (7,074), average yards per play (5.9), passing yards (4,050), completions (306) and first downs (354).

In the end, Whipple and his team, led by senior co-captains Khari Samuel and Kerry Taylor, brought UMass the first national championship in the history of a program which played its first game in 1879. The title was also the first in the history of the Atlantic 10.



Football Legends

Kole Ayi

Linebacker • 1997-2000

One of the top linebackers in school history, Kole Ayi was a two-time first team All-America selection in 1999 and 2000. Also a two-time first team All-Atlantic 10 choice, Ayi led the Minutemen in tackles during his sophomore, junior and senior seasons. One of Ayi's top performances came against Georgia Southern in the 1998 national championship game, when he totaled 16 tackles, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries, one of which he returned for a touchdown. A two-time finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award, and the runner-up in 1999, the former walk-on won the 2000 George "Bulger" Lowe Award from the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston. Ayi finished his career as UMass' all-time leader in career solo tackles with 330, while ranking third in total tackles with 478. He also set the school single-season record for solo tackles with 116 during the 1998 season.

Todd Bankhead

Quarterback • 1998-1999

Todd Bankhead is one of the most prolific passer in school history, setting numerous records in only two seasons, and leading the Minutemen to their first-ever national championship in 1998. A classic pocket passer with great arm speed, Bankhead owns many of the top 10 single game passing marks in school history. He set single-season marks for passing yards (3,919), completions (303), attempts (525) and touchdowns (34) during the 1998 season, then broke the mark for completion percentage (.635) in 1999. Bankhead finished his career with school record totals of 7,018 passing yards, 561 completions, 931 attempts, 51 touchdowns and a .603 completion percentage. A third team All-America selection during the 1998 season, Bankhead also earned second team All-Atlantic 10 honors in both 1998 and 1999. Bankhead went on to play for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League.

Steve Baylark

Tailback • 2003-2006

Steve Baylark was a second-team All-American in 2006 in addition to being the Atlantic 10's Offensive Player of the Year that season in leading UMass to the NCAA Championship game. Baylark became the third back in NCAA history gain more than 1,000 yards in four seasons. He was just the second UMass player to gain more than 5,000 career yards with 5,332. He rushed for 1,960 yards as a senior in 2006, the second-most in a season in UMass history. He scored 42 touchdowns in his career including 15 as a senior. He played in the East-West Shrine Game following the year. Baylark was signed by the Arizona Cardinals as a free agent in 2007, where he joined Marcel Shipp, the only player to stand ahead of him on the UMass career rushing lists.

Lou Bush

Halfback • 1931-1933

Lou Bush was UMass' first All-American in football and still holds many UMass records nearly 70 years after his last game as an 'Aggie.' Bush was phenomenal in 1931 and 1932, scoring 39 touchdowns over that span, an average of over two per game. In his first year of collegiate football in 1931, Bush led the nation in touchdowns with 20. Bush finished at UMass with 45 touchdowns, before his career was cut short by an early season injury during his senior campaign. Beside setting UMass season (20) and career (45) marks for touchdowns, Bush also shares the game record, twice scoring five touchdowns (vs. Wagner in 1931 and Cooper Union in 1932). One of his five-touchdown performances led UMass to its largest victory ever, a 77-0 thrashing of Wagner in 1931. Bush was inducted as a charter member of the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1969.

Tony Chambers

End • 1951-1953

Tony Chambers was a 1952 All-American for UMass, making 36 catches for 455 yards and seven touchdowns. Chambers teamed with Noel Reebenbacher on what remains one of the most prolific passing teams in UMass history, and was named All-Yankee Conference and All-New England in addition to his All-America honors. While excelling on offense, Chambers' love was on the defensive end of the field, and he played every snap of every game in the 1952 season. Among Chambers' coaches at UMass were baseball coaching legend (and football end coach) Earl Lorden and line coach Chester Gladchuk. Chambers was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1980.

Liam Coen

Quarterback • 2005-2008

Liam Coen will go down as the greatest quarterback in UMass history. He graduated in 2008 holding nearly every passing record including every career passing record. Became the 21st QB in FCS history with 10,000 career passing yards in the win over Bryant on Oct. 25, 2008. First in passing yards (11,031) passing efficiency (152.92), completion percentage (63.9), TD passes (90), completions (830), and attempts (1,303). Among all-time FCS quarterbacks, 11,031 yards ranks 12th all-time and 90 touchdowns ranks 14th all-time in history. Coen led UMass to two conference titles in 2006 and 2007 with postseason NCAA berths in both seasons with an appearance in the 2006 NCAA championship game. Coen was named three-time all-conference selection. He was a 2007 and 2008 Walter Payton Award candidate.

Brian Corcoran

Defensive Lineman • 1991-1994

Brian Corcoran was named the Yankee Conference Defensive Player of the Year and earned second team All-America honors in 1994. He was a two-time first team All-Yankee Conference selection after leading UMass in sacks as a junior and senior. Corcoran finished his career ranked third on the school's all-time career sack list with 30. When the ice hockey program at UMass was reinstated in 1993-94, Corcoran made the team as a walk-on defenseman. He played three professional seasons in the American Hockey League for the Baltimore Bandits and the Hershey Bears. Corcoran was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team in 1996.

Bernie Dallas**Linebacker • 1963, 1965**

Enthusiasm, unlimited energy, leadership and constant optimism made Bernie Dallas a great athlete and man. Dallas was a two-year letterwinner in football for UMass and earned first team All-Yankee Conference and All-New England honors. He also served as team captain during his senior season. As a sophomore he played offensive center and defensive linebacker and was a sparkplug on the undefeated 8-0-1 team that captured the school's first outright Yankee Conference football title. Following his UMass career, Dallas went on to play professionally for the Philadelphia Bulldogs. An automobile accident took Dallas' life on April 29, 1968, but the Dallas Memorial Mall across from the East side of McGuirk Stadium keeps his name and spirit alive. Dallas was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1971.

Bill Durkin**Offensive Lineman • 1989-1993**

Bill Durkin was a first team All-America selection in 1993, when he anchored an offensive line unit which helped UMass post a then-school-record 3,261 rushing yards on the season. Durkin was a two-time first team All-Yankee Conference pick in 1992 and 1993 while serving as team co-captain in each of those years. He went on to play professionally both in the Canadian Football League and the World League of American Football (now NFL Europe). Durkin was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team in 1996.

Frederick "Fritz" Ellert**Halfback • 1927-1929**

Frederick "Fritz" Ellert was a three-year letterwinner for coach Charles McGeock's Massachusetts Aggies, earning a spot on the 1929 All-New England team. Ellert caught a touchdown pass from Ken McKittrick to upset Bates 6-0 in 1928. He also had a 95-yard touchdown run in the season finale against Tufts, a school record for longest run from scrimmage that stood until 1996. Upon completion of his collegiate athletic career, Ellert became a member of the faculty at UMass. He also coached the men's basketball team for three years (1930-1931, 1932-1933, 1940-1941), posting an 18-16 (.529) mark during this time. He retired from his faculty post in 1970 and was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1971.

Vic Fusia**Head Coach • 1961-1970**

Vic Fusia was the head coach from 1961 through 1970 and led UMass to five Yankee Conference championships. His Redmen had their top season in 1964, when he guided them to their first-ever postseason appearance — the 1964 Tangerine Bowl, where UMass lost a heartbreaker to East Carolina 14-13. Fusia compiled a 59-32-2 record as head coach and is still the winningest coach in UMass history, 33 years after retiring. He also had an incredible 41-7-1 mark in Yankee Conference games, with his .854 winning percentage in league games still ranking as the second-best mark in conference history. Fusia produced some of the most outstanding players ever at UMass, including NFL stars Greg Landry and Milt Morin. He also directed the stingiest defense in UMass history in 1963, when Fusia's troops allowed only one touchdown the entire season and a total of only 12 points in nine games. Fusia's teams were always competitive, and nothing illustrates that better than this amazing fact — in 10 seasons at the helm at UMass and over 40 Yankee Conference games, only once did one of his teams lose a conference game by more than seven points. A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Fusia passed away in 1991. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

Harold "Kid" Gore**Quarterback • 1911-1912****Coach • 1919-1927**

Harold "Kid" Gore was a two-year letterwinner at quarterback for the UMass football team and went on to become the first full-time Aggie football coach in 1919. Gore compiled a 33-32-5 (.507) record. His 33 wins still rank as the seventh-best total in UMass history. Gore went on to reinstate both the men's basketball and baseball programs to varsity status. He later compiled an 85-53 overall mark while coaching the basketball team for 11 years, the second-longest tenure of any basketball coach in school history. Gore was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1969.

Emory Grayson**End • 1914-1916**

Emory Grayson was one of the most versatile athletes in UMass history. He won eight letters in football, basketball and baseball, while also competing in hockey and track. Grayson played as a backup halfback during his freshman year, alternating between the backfield and the end position. In his junior year, he played in the first game on the new Alumni Field (where Whitmore Administration Building now stands) and helped power Massachusetts Agricultural College to a 26-0 win over Colby. He went on to serve as team captain in his senior season. Grayson was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1969.

Rene Ingoglia**Running Back • 1992-1995**

Rene Ingoglia finished his collegiate career as one of the greatest running backs in UMass history. A two-time All-America selection (1994 and 1995), he became the school and Yankee Conference's all-time leading rusher with 4,624 career rushing yards. In all, Ingoglia completed his four years with 10 UMass school records and two Yankee Conference marks to his credit. He became the first UMass player in history to average more than 100 yards per game rushing over a career at 112.8. Ingoglia posted 21 career 100+ yard games, three career 200+ yard performances, and outrushed the entire opposing team 18 times in his career. He also finished second on the all-time Division I-AA career rushing touchdown list (54, one shy of record), fourth among non-kickers on the all-time I-AA scoring list (332 points, ahead of Jerry Rice), fifth on the all-time I-AA rushing yards list and 11th in career rushing yards per game. A first team All-Yankee Conference selection as a senior in 1995, he was one of a handful of Division I-AA players chosen to participate in the 1996 Hula Bowl All-Star Classic. During his junior season, he rushed for a then-Yankee Conference and school single-game record 313 yards against Rhode Island. Ingoglia was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team, announced in June of 1996. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

Shannon James**Defensive Back • 2002-2005**

Shannon James was a two-time first team All-American in 2004 and 2005. He was honored as the Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Year in 2004. James was a superior safety as he set the UMass record for career interceptions with 20. During his junior and seniors seasons, James was the career active leader in interception for all NCAA divisions. He tied the school record for pick-offs in a season with eight in 2004. James also finished as the seventh all-time leading tackler in UMass history with 341. He stands fourth in solo stops with 253. James was invited to Baltimore Ravens training camp in 2005 and is starring with the Calgary Stampeders in the Canadian Football League currently.

Bruce Kimball**Offensive Guard • 1975-1978**

Bruce Kimball was a two-time first team All-America selection on the offensive line for the Minutemen. At his right offensive guard position, Kimball anchored a UMass line that helped the Minutemen rush for over 3,000 yards in 1978 (a new school record at the time) on their way to the Division I-AA national championship game. Three different players on the squad rushed for over 500 yards, including Dennis Dent with 1,139. Kimball played a couple of seasons in the Canadian Football League and went on to play for both the New York Giants and the Washington Redskins, playing in Super Bowl XVIII with the Redskins in 1984. One of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team, announced in June of 1996, Kimball was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000.

Greg Landry**Quarterback • 1965-1967**

Greg Landry is one of the greatest quarterbacks in UMass history. Behind his golden arm and running ability, UMass won two Yankee Conference Beanpots in three years. Landry led the team in passing all three years, and led in both rushing and scoring in 1965 and 1967. Landry's quarterback efficiency rating of 145.4 in 1965 is still a school record. He also shares the single-game mark for highest completion percentage (.800). Landry went on to be a successful pro player, spending 14 years in the NFL with both the Detroit Lions and the Baltimore Colts, including a season as an All-Pro for Detroit in 1971, when he started for the NFC in the Pro Bowl. Landry also had a stint with the Chicago Blitz in the now-defunct USFL. Landry later served as an assistant coach for his former team, the Detroit Lions, after spending several years on the coaching staff at the University of Illinois. He was the offensive coordinator for the Chicago Bears when they won Super Bowl XX. Landry was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team, announced in June of 1996. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1980.

Joe Lojko**Quarterback • 1931-1933**

UMass went 19-6-1 while Joe Lojko was the starting quarterback for Massachusetts State College's single-wing offensive attack that ranked among the best in New England. In addition to playing football for three years, Lojko earned three letters in basketball and two in baseball. He served as team captain of the 1933-1934 basketball team that compiled a 12-0 record, the only major New England school to ever have an undefeated basketball season. His game-winning basket against Amherst College helped preserve the unblemished record. Lojko died in a tragic automobile accident on April 27, 1934, in South Deerfield, Mass., less than two months from his graduation day. Lojko was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1970.

Dick MacPherson**Head Coach • 1971-1977**

Dick MacPherson took over the helm of the Minutemen from Vic Fusia in 1971, and proceeded to lead UMass to four Yankee Conference championships during his seven-year tenure. Between 1971 and 1977, MacPherson compiled a 45-27-1 record and led UMass to its only postseason bowl victory. MacPherson's 1972 squad, featuring receivers Tim Berra and Steve Schubert, and Peil Pennington at quarterback, defeated the University of California at Davis, 35-14, in the 1972 Boardwalk Bowl. His squads also posted a 28-8-1 mark in Yankee Conference games, with his .778 league winning percentage still ranking as the fifth-best in conference history. After leaving UMass, MacPherson went on to a successful tour with Syracuse (1981-1990), leading the Orangemen to five postseason bowls, including his undefeated 1987 squad's Sugar Bowl appearance. He also had a two-year stint as head coach of the New England Patriots (1991-1992). He was inducted in the UMass Hall of Fame in 2004.

Ed McAleney**Defensive Lineman • 1972-1975**

Ed McAleney earned first team All-America honors from his defensive end spot in 1975. He was also a three-time first team All-Yankee Conference selection during his career with UMass. In his freshman campaign, McAleney was a member of the 1972 squad that downed California-Davis, 35-14, at the Boardwalk Bowl. McAleney was also a two-time captain for the Minutemen in 1974 and 1975. Following his collegiate career, McAleney spent seven seasons with the Calgary Stampeders in the Canadian Football League (1977-1983). McAleney was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team in 1996. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003.

Bob Meers**End • 1963-1965**

Bob Meers was a three-year letterwinner in football, earning All-Yankee Conference and All-New England honors in each of his three seasons. By the time he left UMass, Meers held school marks for career (82) and single-season receptions (39), shared the record for most receptions in a game (nine), and ranked second in receiving yards in a game (146), career receiving yards (1,104), single-season receiving yards per game (58.9) and career receiving yards per game (40.9). Meers still ranks ninth all-time at UMass in career receptions. A tri-captain of the 1965 team, Meers was a seventh-round pick of the Minnesota Vikings in the 1966 NFL Draft. Meers was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999.

Milt Morin**End • 1963-1965**

Milt Morin, an All-American in 1964 and 1965, was one of the most versatile athletes ever to play for UMass. While catching enough passes to place him eighth on the career receiving yards list and setting the record at the time, he also excelled on defense and was the team's placekicker his senior year. In addition to his action on the gridiron, Morin was also the New England heavyweight wrestling champion in 1965 and played for Dick Garber on the varsity lacrosse team. Morin was a key part of two Yankee Conference championship teams and saw UMass compile a 23-4-1 (14-1 YanCon) record in his three seasons. Morin went on to play 10 seasons professionally for the Cleveland Browns between 1966 and 1975 and played in three Pro Bowls (1966, 1968 and 1969). He is eighth on the Browns' all-time list in receiving yardage (4,208 yards) and tied for eighth in receptions (271). Morin was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1970.

Garry Pearson**Running Back • 1979-1982**

Garry Pearson was a two-time first team All-American (1981 and 1982) for the Minutemen, and helped UMass to three Yankee Conference titles in his four seasons. He set new standards for running backs at UMass in his four-year tenure. Spending only three seasons in the backfield, Pearson graduated as the school's career leader in rushing (3,859 yards) and all-purpose yardage (5,277 yards). During his freshman year, Pearson was used almost exclusively to return kicks, before becoming a starting running back as a sophomore. Pearson capped off his UMass career in spectacular fashion, rushing for a then-record 288 yards against American International College in his final collegiate game. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001.

Bob Pickett**Head Coach • 1978-1983**

In his first season as a head coach in 1978, Bob Pickett led UMass to a berth in the first-ever NCAA Division I-AA championship game. UMass lost to Florida A&M 35-28 at the Pioneer Bowl in Wichita Falls, Texas, but on the way to the championship game, the Minutemen routed previously unbeaten and No. 1-ranked Nevada-Reno on its home turf. For his accomplishments that season, Pickett was named Coach of the Year by both the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston and the ECAC, while the team earned the Lambert Cup (given to the best Division I-AA team in the East) and was named ECAC Team of the Year. In his six-year tour as head coach, Pickett compiled a 36-28 record and led the Minutemen to four Yankee Conference titles. Pickett went on to serve as an associate athletic director at UMass, retiring from that position in the summer of 1997. He also served as a color commentator on radio broadcasts of Minuteman football games from 1998-2003.

Noel Reebenacker**Quarterback • 1951-1953**

Noel Reebenacker was a walk-on quarterback who earned three varsity letters in football. He earned All-Yankee Conference honors in 1952 and was named to the Little All-America Team in 1953. Upon the completion of his UMass career, Reebenacker had established school single-season records for passing yards (1,865), completions (132), touchdown passes (20) and total offense yards (2,080), in addition to recording the longest kickoff return in school history with a 102-yard scamper against Springfield College in 1951. Reebenacker later worked at UMass as the backfield coach for two years under coach Charles O'Rourke. Reebenacker was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1982.

Khari Samuel**Linebacker • 1995-1998**

Khari Samuel was a first team All-American and first team All-Atlantic 10 Conference selection who helped lead the Minutemen to their first-ever national championship in 1998. He was one of the best all-around defensive players in school history, able to stuff the run, put pressure on the quarterback and drop off into coverage. Samuel finished his career as UMass' all-time leader in solo tackles with 328, while ranking second in total tackles (495), fourth in assisted tackles (167) and seventh in sacks (19). As a senior in 1998, he recorded the second-highest single-season total in school history for solo tackles (113), while ranking third on the list for total tackles (160). Samuel also served as a team captain in both 1997 and 1998, and received the 1998 George "Bulger" Lowe Award from the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston as the best Division I defensive player in New England. Following the completion of his collegiate career, Samuel was selected by the Chicago Bears in the fifth round of the 1999 NFL Draft.

Marcel Shipp**Running Back • 1997-2000**

One of the top running backs in the history of Division I-AA football, Marcel Shipp was a two-time first team All-American selection for the Minutemen in 1998 and 1999. Shipp rushed for 200 or more yards in a single game seven times during his UMass career, including a 244-yard, three-touchdown performance to lead the Minutemen over Georgia Southern in the 1998 national championship game. Only the 12th player in school history to earn first team all-conference honors three times, Shipp finished his career as the all-time leading rusher in the history of the Atlantic 10 Conference with 6,250 yards. He also set UMass career records for carries (1,215), rushing yards per game (130.2), rushing touchdowns (58), all-purpose yards (7,759), all-purpose plays (1,365), all-purpose yards per game (161.1), points scored (378) and touchdowns scored (63). Shipp currently plays for the NFL's Arizona Cardinals.

Mark Whipple**Head Coach • 1998-2003**

Mark Whipple led UMass to its first NCAA championship in football, capturing the title in his first season with the Minutemen in 1998. Whipple went on to coach UMass for six seasons compiling a 49-26 overall record for a 65.3 win percentage. Whipple coached UMass to three Atlantic 10 Championships, winning crowns in 1998, 1999 and 2003. He left Amherst in 2004 to serve as quarterbacks coach with the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers, where they won Super Bowl XL in 2006. He is currently the offensive coordinator at the University of Miami.
