

INTERVIEWS

- Interviews with head coach **Mark Whipple**, his staff and UMass players can be set up by contacting **John Sinnett** in the UMass Media Relations Office at (413) 545-1744 or (413) 687-2237. Players and coaches are available in person and for phone interviews Tuesday through Thursday afternoons outside the locker room at McGuirk Alumni Stadium. Arrangements for interviews must be made by 1:00 p.m. the day prior to the interview so that it can be posted for the players and coaches (example: call by 1:00 p.m. Monday for a Tuesday interview). This will include both personal and phone interview requests. A representative from the UMass Media Relations Office will be on hand to assist you. Cell phone numbers will not be given out.

WEEKLY SPORTS LUNCHEON

- Head coach **Mark Whipple** will be in attendance and available to the media at the weekly UMass Sports Luncheon, held each Wednesday at 12:15 p.m., normally in the Massachusetts Room of the Mullins Center. In addition, the UMass Athlete of the Week and his or her coach will be available to the media. Lunch for the media is provided free of charge. Please contact the UMass Media Relations Office by Monday if you will be attending the luncheon so we can make the necessary reservations.

WHIPPLE ON MAC CONFERENCE CALL

- Every Monday morning through the end of the season, the MAC Football Conference will conduct a teleconference with each of its head coaches. The teleconference will start at 9:20 a.m. with a brief recap of the weekend's action and other pertinent information. Following that, each head coach has an assigned 8-minute slot to discuss his team and its upcoming opponent, and field any questions from the media. The conference call will also be available online at www.mac-sports.com.



POSTGAME PROCEDURES

- The UMass football locker room is closed to the media. Members of the media should submit player interview requests to **John Sinnett** of UMass by the five-minute mark of the fourth quarter.
- At **Gillette Stadium** home games, all postgame interviews will be held in the New England Patriots Television Studio just down from the UMass football locker room. At **McGuirk Stadium** home games, all postgame interviews will be held in the UMass Football Auditorium on the second floor of the Football Performance Center. Following a 10-minute cooling off period, head coach **Mark Whipple** and requested UMass players will be available in the interview area.
- If requested, the visiting head coach and select players will be brought to the press conference as well. If the coach and players are not requested, a member of the UMass Media Relations Staff will gather quotes from the visiting team to give to the media.
- The postgame press conference will also be played live in the pressbox of each stadium for any members on a deadline.

ON THE RADIO

- All University of Massachusetts football games can be heard live on the UMass Sports Network, with **WEEI 105.5 FM** (Springfield/Western Massachusetts) serving as the flagship station. **Josh Maurer** is in his seventh season as the play-by-play announcer. He is joined by veteran color commentator **Matt Goldstein**, now in his 12th season calling games at UMass, sideline reporter **Cody Chrusciel** and in-game host **Adam Frenier**.

Season Preview

The 2014 UMass football campaign may well be known as a season of comebacks. Starting with the return of several home games to McGuirk Alumni Stadium on the UMass campus to the return of one of the most well-known coaches in program history, **Mark Whipple**, the Minutemen enter the new year with a lot of hope and optimism on their side.

Off the field, improvements for the program include the completion of the UMass Football Performance Center - the new 55,000 square foot home of UMass football - along with the Martin And Richard Jacobson Press & Skybox Complex at McGuirk Stadium. The completion of these two keystone projects allow the Minutemen once again to play home games in their traditional campus stadium, while still hosting several games at Gillette Stadium.

The hiring of Whipple in January renewed fans' excitement for the program after a tough first two seasons at the Football Bowl Subdivision level. The return of Whipple also meant the return of several of UMass' greatest players in program history - this time as members of the coaching staff. UMass alums **Liam Coen**, **Marchel Shipp** and **Charles Walker** will be seen on the sidelines this year, while former staffers **Tom Masella**, **Mike Cassano** and **Paul Gorham** also return to join Coach Whipple.

While Whipple said he would not be making the guarantee of a national championship like he did during his first coaching stint at UMass, fans can expect a new look with the Minutemen as another chapter in the FBS era is started.

On offense, Whipple will call the plays for an offense that returns to its traditional Pro Set formation. The change in offense will reflect in a change of tempo as the Minutemen will move away from the no-huddle, spread. A bigger emphasis on play-action set-up by the run game will be on tap, but UMass will have several key areas that need to find success in 2013 if progress is to be made.

As always, it will start in the trenches where the Minutemen lost three veteran linemen from 2013 in **Anthony Dima**, **David Osei** and **Vincent Westcarr**. **Matt Sparks** returns at center while **Tyrell Smith** moves to left guard. **Fabian Hoeller** and **Tyshon Henderson** are expected to push for starting roles, while **Cameron Mock**, **Elijah Wilkinson** and **Josh Bruns** will also be in the mix. Junior college transfer **Ryan Johnson** is also predicted to make an instant impact on the group which will now be led by **Shane Waldron**.

A.J. Doyle returns for his junior year at quarterback after starting all but three games last season. He was 128-of-235 with six touchdowns and 11 interceptions as a sophomore but could see those numbers improve in the Pro Set offense. Doyle will be pushed in camp by **Blake Frohnapfel** who transfers to UMass from Marshall as a graduate student with two seasons of eligibility remaining. **Andrew Verboys** showed progress during the spring season and will fight for reps as well.

The returning offensive weapons for the Minutemen are an interesting group this year. Gone is all-time tight end **Rob Blanchflower** who was drafted by the Steelers in the seventh round during the off-season. However, the bulk of the receiving and running back corps return largely intact.

Tajae Sharpe is widely regarded as one of the top receivers in the Mid-American Conference and should be

the Minutemen's top option in 2014. He posted a career-best 61 catches for 680 yards and four touchdowns last year as a sophomore. Also returning are **Bernard Davis** and **Elgin Long** who each started at the other wideout positions last year. **Shakur Nesmith** returns after suffering a season ending injury at Wisconsin last year as does **Marken Michel** after spending a year away from football last season. Penn State transfer **Alex Kenney** joins the Minutemen and is heralded as one of the fastest players on the team and potentially the MAC. Also transferring to UMass is **Jalen Williams** who impressed fans during the spring.

While the wide receiving corps looks to be deep even though it is relatively inexperienced in the new scheme, its the running back position that has a tremendous amount of potential talent. Finding reps for each of the backs will be a challenge, but if the Minutemen can avoid the same injury bug that hit the group last year, it could be a strong position group.

Predicted 2013 starting tailback **Jordan Broadnax** is back after suffering a season-ending injury during preseason camp last year. Also back are **Jamal Wilson** and **Lorenzo Woodley** who combined for seven starts, 184 carries, 682 yards rushing and three touchdowns last year. **Shadrach Abrokwah** also returns after being the surprise of the year in 2013. With the backfield decimated by injuries, Abrokwah carried the load in the final two games last year where he averaged 101.5 yards and scored a touchdown.

JT Blyden and **Drew Harris** are two impressive newcomers in the backfield which adds to the mix and should ensure strong competition throughout the year.

Whipple's offense also utilizes a fullback where **Daquan Mack**, **Matt Tuleja** and **Rodney Mills** could all see action.

The tight end position will be another interesting area after the loss of **Blanchflower** who was the second leading receiver last year in terms of yards and touchdowns. **Brandon Howard** saw the bulk of the action as the starting tight end during the spring. **Sharif Custis** and **Mills** are also expected to make contributions throughout the year. Junior college transfers **Jean Sifrin** and **Jon Denton** both possess impressive resumes as well as physical attributes at the position. **Jordan Fiske** and **Jon Lucier** will definitely add depth to the group, while **Todd Stafford** converted to the position from quarterback prior to the start of preseason camp.

While the offense moves back to a more traditional look, the defense will move to a 3-4 scheme which has been utilized some over the last three seasons. **Masella** takes over as the defensive coordinator and inherits what should be one of the top overall secondaries in the MAC. The defense also features several seasoned linebackers led by fifth-year senior **Stanley Andre**, but will need to find depth on the line if the group is to be successful.

Up front, fifth-year senior **Daniel Maynes** will anchor the defensive line with sophomore **Peter Angeh** and redshirt freshman **Sha-Ki Holiness** seeing time at the defensive end positions during spring camp.

Robert Kitching will back up Maynes along with **Al Leneus** who moves back over to the defense after playing on the offensive line over the last two seasons.

Enoch Asante and **Femi Oyewole** saw time over the spring as back-up defensive ends and are also projected to see the field during the season.

Several newcomers such as **Jack Wynne**, **Jake Largay**, and **Chris Carter** will add depth alongside redshirt freshman **Joe Tyo** and redshirt sophomore **Michael Dowe, Jr.**

The linebacking corps is led by Andre at one inside spot and junior **Jovan Santos-Knox** at the other. On the outside, junior **Kassan Messiah** and redshirt junior **Trey Seals** are projected to start.

The Minutemen will return two key linebackers who suffered season-ending injuries last year in redshirt freshman **Steve Casali** and sophomore **Shane Huber**.

Junior **John Robinson-Woodgett** has been a very solid inside linebacker and special teams member, while **Peter Ngobidi** played in six games as a true freshman last year. Outside linebacker **Da'Sean Downey** was impressive in the spring game with speed off the edge and could be a key player in the group.

If UMass can play well against the run and have a strong presence off the edge, the secondary could be one of the top overall units in the MAC. Redshirt junior **Randall Jette** and junior **Trey Dudley-Giles** have each started the last two seasons at the cornerback spots, while **Joey Colton** has started at strong safety.

Khary Bailey-Smith is coming off an injury from the 2013 season and has plenty of game experience and a wealth of athletic ability. He will be pushed in preseason camp by several veteran back-ups and newcomers.

Quayshun Smith and **DuVaughn Beckford** add experience as back-ups on the corners or as players in a nickle package. Redshirt freshman **Jackson Porter** will look to crack the line-up as a back-up safety, while **Lucas Amato** could also see time there.

Newcomers **Charan Singh**, **Jarell Addo**, and converted linebacker **Zeke Edmonds** were each highly regarded coming out of high school and add athleticism and hard hitting to the group. Sophomore **D.J. Woods** moves to corner back after playing wide receiver last season, while redshirt freshman **Jesse Monteiro** made several nice plays in the spring game. Junior **Jaurice Jones**, redshirt junior **Michael Grasis** and freshman **Jeremy Rodriguez** round out the secondary.

On special teams, several new faces will be vying for time during the upcoming season. Redshirt freshman **Logan Laurent** and graduate student **Brian McDonald** will battle for punting duties.

In the kicking game, **Blake Lucas** returns for his junior season and looked more consistent during the spring. He will be pushed by freshman **Matthew Wylie** on field goal and kick-off duties.

After enjoying the consistent service of **Vance Barton** as the long snapper and **Jeff Strait** as the holder on field goals and PATS, this is another area of the kicking game that will see change this year. **Nick Berus** and **Emmett Odegard** are UMass' top long-snappers, while **Laurent** is slated to be the holder.

The return game should be a strong suite for UMass with **Trey Dudley-Giles** having excelled over the last two years on punt returns and kick returns. With **Broadnax** back, the pair could be very dangerous with their combination of speed and agility.



UMass is excited to return to its longtime home McGuirk Stadium starting with the 2014 campaign. After undergoing construction over the last two seasons, the facility is finally ready to once again host football games.

In July, the 55,000 square foot UMass Football Performance Center officially opened giving the Minutemen a world-class place to train and work. In August, the Martin And Richard Jacobson Press & Skybox Complex was also completed replacing the original press box which had stood since the stadium's construction over 50 years ago.

Also added over the summer was new field turf which replaced the original turf surface installed back in 2006.

While seating capacity still remains at 17,000 fans, the cozy nature of McGuirk is expected to once again provide UMass with that home field advantage.

UMass Football Performance Center


Beginning in 2014, the Minutemen will have a new home base of operations on campus with the UMass Football Performance Center adjacent to McGuirk Alumni Stadium. Ground was officially broken April 2013 and construction soon after underway on the state-of-the-art building which will be one of the premier football facilities in the Northeast.

In addition to the Football Performance Center, a new Press Box was also part of the \$34.5 million upgrade project at McGuirk Stadium. The Performance Center is a 55,000 square foot complex which will include coaches offices, a new locker room space, meeting rooms, athletic training facilities and a dedicated strength and conditioning facility. The Press Box measures 5,800 square feet and will be designed to accommodate a range of media with a primary focus on television production accessibility.



DETAILS ON THE UMASS FOOTBALL PERFORMANCE CENTER/PRESS BOX:

The state-of-the-art Football Performance Center marks the first-ever dedicated facility housing all support elements for the UMass football program. The two-level complex will greet visitors with a foyer displaying proud moments in the program's history while providing a dynamic vision of the future. Office space, meeting rooms, a multi-purpose/formal event space and a terrace overlooking the field highlight the upper level. The lower level houses the locker room, equipment room, strength and conditioning space and the athletic training room. The Press Box contains dedicated booths for media, television, radio and instant replay along with game operations. The project designer/architect is Perkins & Will, Inc., while the contractor is Consigli Construction Co., Inc. The Mid-American Conference

THIS IS THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

Providing leadership in education and diversity, the Mid-American Conference moves into its 69th year of service to the student-athlete.

Since its inception in 1946, the Mid-American Conference has progressively grown and developed into one of the most aggressive Division I conferences in the country. One of only ten football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences, the MAC named Dr. Jon A. Steinbrecher as its eighth commissioner in March of 2009.

The league has grown its commitment to championships by expanding to six its number of neutral site post season events - football (Ford Field, Detroit), men's and women's basketball (Quicken Loans Arena, Cleveland), softball (Firestone Stadium, Akron) and baseball (All Pro Freight Stadium, Avon, Ohio). In addition, the SPIRE Academy (Geneva, Ohio) will also serve as the site for the 2015 MAC men's swimming & diving championship.

In addition to growing its commitment to MAC championships, Steinbrecher has strategically positioned the MAC's participation in hosting NCAA events and championships. The MAC will serve as the host for the 2015 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Midwest Regional and was recently awarded the 2018 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships as both events will take place at Quicken Loans Arena in Cleveland. The MAC has also hosted both the 2012 and 2014 NCAA Women's Bowling Championships under his direction.

In 2013, the MAC had five programs receive football bowl invitations: Bowling Green (Little Caesars Pizza Bowl), Northern Illinois (San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl), Ball State (GoDaddy Bowl), Buffalo (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) and Ohio (Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl St. Petersburg). The MAC had three programs with 10 or more wins (Northern Illinois 12-2; Ball State 10-3; Bowling Green 10-4) which tied for third among FBS conferences (ACC, Big 12 and Conference USA), trailing only the SEC and Pac-12.

Last December Northern Illinois quarterback Jordan Lynch finished third overall in the Heisman Trophy voting, the highest ever finish by a MAC student-athlete. Lynch was invited to the Heisman Trophy Award ceremony in New York City and became only the third MAC student-athlete to receive an invitation to the ceremony - Marshall QB Chad Pennington (1999) and Marshall WR Randy Moss (1997).

Buffalo Bulls linebacker Khalil Mack was the fifth overall selection by the Oakland Raiders in the 2014 NFL Draft. Mack's se-

lection was the highest ever for the Buffalo program and the second-highest ever selection for a MAC student-athlete. This marked the second consecutive year for the MAC to have its two highest ever selections in the NFL Draft. In the 2013 NFL Draft, Central Michigan offensive tackle Eric Fisher was selected as the first overall selection by the Kansas City Chiefs, making Fisher the first-ever football player from the MAC selected first overall in the NFL Draft.

In 2012, the MAC witnessed a record setting seven teams receive bowl invitations, including the first ever BCS Bowl invitation with Northern Illinois playing in the Discover Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 2013. The MAC also had four football programs ranked in the top 25 of national polls - Northern Illinois, Kent State, Toledo and Ohio—as the BCS Standings had two MAC programs in the Top 25 at the end of the regular season with No. 15 Northern Illinois and No. 25 Kent State. The MAC also set a conference record for the most wins against FBS opponents with 16 victories.

In the fall of 2013, the MAC announced the creation of newly created bowl games in Boca Raton, Fla., Nassau, Bahamas, Miami Beach, Fla., and Montgomery, Ala. for a six-year period (2014-2019). The creation of the Boca Raton, Bahamas and Miami Beach Bowls is the centerpiece of a joint agreement between several FBS conferences and will be supported by several FBS conferences on a six-year rotating basis.

The Boca Raton Bowl will be owned and operated by ESPN and will be played at FAU Stadium, an open air stadium which seats nearly 30,000 fans on the campus of Florida Atlantic University. The Bahamas Bowl will be played at Thomas A. Robinson Stadium. The Miami Beach Bowl will be played at Marlins Park. The Camellia Bowl, based in Montgomery, Ala., is owned and operated by ESPN and will be played in the Cramton Bowl, a 25,000 seat stadium.

The MAC is also a partner with the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl as a primary partner in 2017 and 2019, and a secondary partner in 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2018 bowl seasons. The MAC will play the Mountain West in both the 2017 and 2019 bowl seasons, played at Qualcomm Stadium in San Diego.

Starting in the 2014 season, the MAC will have a minimum five guaranteed bowl opportunities. The MAC has long-term primary contracts with the GoDaddy Bowl (based in Mobile, Ala.) through the 2017 season and Famous Idaho Potato Bowl (based in Boise, Ida.) through the 2019 season.

In its partnership with ESPN, the MAC is in the sixth year of its eight-year rights agreement (through 2016-2017 academic years) for football, as well as men's and women's basketball. The deal is the most extensive in the history of the conference. The agreement calls for a minimum of 25 events annually to be produced and aired on an ESPN platform including the men's and women's basketball championships, a regular-season MAC presence on ESPN, the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game and a minimum of 11 regular-season football games.

From two-time Super Bowl quarterback winning Ben Roethlisberger (Miami University), NFL Defensive MVP James Harrison (Kent State University), NFL Pro Bowlers (OT Joe Staley, TE Antonio Gates, WR Antonio Brown), British Open winner Ben Curtis (Kent State University), World Series winning manager Bob Brenly (Ohio University) and Olympic bobsled team member Brock Kreitzburgh (University of Toledo), the Mid-American Conference continues to excel in producing leaders in the world of athletics.

History of the MAC

Based in Cleveland since July 1999 following a 15-year stay in Toledo, Ohio, the MAC has established historic measurements in both football and men's and women's basketball since moving to Northeast Ohio. The MAC was founded as a five-school league on February 24, 1946 in Columbus, Ohio with Ohio, Butler, Cincinnati, Wayne State and Western Reserve admitted as charter members. The Mid-American Conference membership consists of 12 universities across five states (Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, New York and Ohio).

In 1946 men's basketball was the first competitive sport in the MAC, which now sponsors a total 23 sports. Women's sports were brought into the conference's structure in 1980. For men, there are 11 championships sponsored in football, basketball, baseball, cross country, soccer, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, wrestling, golf and tennis. For women, 12 championships are sponsored in basketball, softball, volleyball, cross country, field hockey, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, gymnastics, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and tennis.

Head Coach Mark Whipple

The architect of one of the University of Massachusetts football program's most successful eras returns as Mark Whipple was officially

named the team's head coach on January 14, 2014. In his first stint from 1998-2003, Whipple led the Minutemen to new heights by winning the NCAA I-AA National Championship in his first season and making two other postseason appearances in the following five years.

A 31-year coaching veteran of the collegiate and professional levels, Whipple is widely regarded for his prowess as an offensive coordinator and his ability to develop quarterbacks. He helped Ben Roethlisberger of the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers win a Super Bowl in his second year, built the University of Miami's 2009 and 2010 offenses into two of its best all-time, and his teams set 40 offensive records while at UMass.

"Sometimes, you need to go away to find out where your home is and I have found it," said Whipple during the introductory press conference. "I can make a bigger impact than I have ever made in my life with people young, old and in between at the University of Massachusetts and that's what I am really excited about. I believe in this place and it hit me after the interview when I drove around campus and then got out and walked. This is a special place and I will represent this University better than I ever have. I am trying to do it better than anyone ever has. People ask me, 'Why would you leave the NFL?' They haven't been to UMass. They haven't been to the University of Massachusetts."

"I am extremely pleased that mark has returned to guide UMass football. He brings a unique combination of experience, accomplishment and passion for our football team that can not be matched," said Director of Athletics John McCutcheon. "We all stand ready to support Mark, his staff and our student athletes as we develop an outstanding football program that the entire UMass family will be proud of."

The 56-year-old native of Tarrytown, N.Y., brings 16 years of experience as a head coach with a 121-59 overall record including a 49-26 mark at UMass. His coaching resume includes a National Coach of the Year award (1998), a Brown Athletic Hall of Fame induction (1996), an NFL Super Bowl Championship (2006), and a pair of collegiate bowl game appearances (2009, 2010).

As he begins his second coaching stint in Amherst, Whipple will become the second head coach of the program during the Football Bowl Subdivision at UMass. He is the fourth of the Minutemen's 29 all-time coaches to serve multiple tenures.

"We are confident that Coach Whipple will be an inspiring leader who reaffirms our commitment to playing Division 1 football at the highest level," said UMass President Robert Caret. "I couldn't be happier for the student-athletes, the loyal fans - including myself - and everyone else who looks forward to welcoming him back and cheering on the Minute-men come this fall."

"We are thrilled to welcome back one of the greatest coaches in the 135-year history of UMass football," said UMass Amherst Chancellor Kumble R. Subbaswamy. "Coach Whipple is committed to fostering a positive environment in which our student-athletes will thrive both athletically and academically. His passion for the flagship campus and his drive

for excellence have already earned the support of alumni, faculty, students and fans. I am confident that, under coach Whipple's leadership, Minuteman football will continue to improve and will excel at the FBS level."

Whipple's last coached with the Cleveland Browns from 2011-12 where he served as quarterbacks coach. While there he worked with second-year quarterback Colt McCoy (2011) and rookie Brandon Weeden (2012) within the Browns' West Coast offensive scheme.

His most recent collegiate stop was at the University of Miami as the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator, and quarterbacks coach during the 2009-10 seasons. While in Coral Gables, he guided the explosive Hurricanes' offense during two of their best statistical seasons in program history. Both years featured total yardage in excess of 5,000 yards with 2010's total of 5,483 standing as the third most in program history.

In 2009 Whipple led Miami to its best offensive season since the national title contending 2002 team. The Hurricanes' offense put up 5,199 yards - becoming just the eighth team in school history to eclipse the 5,000-yard mark in total yards gained. Under Whipple's tutelage, quarterback Jacory Harris totaled the second-most pass completions (249), fourth-most passing yards (3,352) and sixth-most touchdowns (24) in a single season at Miami.

The 2010 Miami squad posted the fourth-best total rush yardage in program history with 2,372 on the ground. Damien Berry led a stable of tailbacks with 899 yards and five touchdowns. The group overall averaged 182.5 yards on the ground per game with an average of 4.8 per carry.

In his time with Miami, the Hurricanes posted a 16-10 overall record including a 10-6 mark in the Atlantic Coast Conference and two bowl game appearances.

Whipple spent the 2008 season as an offensive assistant coach with the Philadelphia Eagles, helping the team to an appearance in the NFC championship game. Before joining the Eagles, he served as the quarterbacks coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2004-06 where he was instrumental in the development of Ben Roethlisberger, who became the youngest starting quarterback to win a Super Bowl as a rookie. In 2004, Roethlisberger became the first NFL quarterback to finish a season undefeated with a 13-0 record in games he started.

Prior to his move to the NFL, Whipple spent 16 years as a collegiate head coach. In addition to his time at UMass, Whipple also led the Brown and New Haven programs.

At every stop in his college coaching career, the trademark of a Whipple team was a high-powered offense. His UMass teams rewrote the program's record book setting more than 40 team records. In 1998, his national championship team posted school records in points scored (524), touchdowns (73), total yards (7,074), passing yards (4,050), completions (306) and first downs (354). While at Brown, his 1997 squad set Ivy League and school records for total offense (474.3 yards per game), which included a single-game record of 629 yards against Yale. His 1995 team set several single-season records, including most points (282), total offense (4,165 yards), passing offense (2,502 yards) and first downs (227). At New Haven, his 1992 squad led all NCAA divisions in scoring offense (50.5 points per game) and total offense (587.7 yards per game). His 1993 New Haven team was named Sports Illustrated's "Best Offense in College Football," averaging 52.5 points and 557.6 yards of total offense per game.

While at UMass, he posted a 49-26 (.653) record in six years (1998-2003) leading the Minutemen to a Division I-AA National Championship in his first season with the team in 1998. He also won three Atlantic 10 Conference championships. He was named the American Football Coaches Association's GTE Division I-AA National Coach of the Year, while also receiving National Coach of the Year honors from Don Hansen's Football Gazette and finished runner-up for the Eddie Robinson Award, presented by The Sports Network. In addition, Whipple was named the Scotty Whitelaw Division I-AA Coach of the Year by the New York Metropolitan Football Writers Association, and earned AFCA / GTE Region I Coach of the Year honors. In 2003, he earned Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year honors. He was selected as the New England Coach of the Year by the New England Football Writers and the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston in both 1998 and 2003. He posted five winning seasons in only six years as head coach with 17 different players earning All-America honors.

Taking over a program which finished 2-9 in 1997 and having had won just 19 games in the previous four seasons before his arrival, Whipple brought unparalleled success to the Minutemen under his leadership. Consider that in Whipple's six seasons on the sideline, UMass football captured a national title, won three conference championships, made consecutive NCAA I-AA playoff appearances for the first time ever and had three NCAA berths overall.

Introduced as the 26th coach in UMass history by then-athletic director Bob Marcum on Dec. 16, 1997, Whipple-coached teams posted a .500-or-better record 14 times. No UMass football coach reached the 20-win plateau faster than Whipple, who also owns five of the school's 11 all-time postseason victories.

In Whipple's rookie season at UMass, the Minutemen won a then school-record 12 games (broken by the 2006 NCAA National runner-up team) en route to the 1998 NCAA Division I-AA championship. UMass posted a record six victories over ranked opponents in 1998, including a 55-43 triumph over top-ranked and previously unbeaten Georgia Southern in the NCAA Championship game.

The Minutemen followed up Whipple's first campaign with another outstanding season in 1999. Armed with a lofty preseason ranking, UMass rebounded from a 1-3 start to post a 9-4 record and advance to the quarterfinals of the NCAA playoffs. Along the way, UMass tied the all-time school record for consecutive victories with eight, and also claimed a share of the 18th Atlantic 10 Conference title in school history.

In 2000, UMass struggled with injuries to key players throughout the season, but was still able to post an overall record of 7-4, with three of the losses coming against teams which advanced to the Division I-AA playoffs. It marked the first time UMass had strung together three straight winning seasons since a five-year run from 1977-1981. In addition, the Minutemen finished in third place in the Atlantic 10 with a 5-3 league mark, and handed Whipple his 100th career win with UMass' 29-21 season-ending victory at Rhode Island.

A young and inexperienced team was hit hard by injuries in 2001 finishing 3-8, but Whipple's 2002 Minutemen rebounded to post an overall record of 8-4. UMass tied for third place in the Atlantic 10 with a 6-3 mark in conference games, while downing two teams ranked in the top five in the nation (No. 2 Maine and No. 4 Villanova).

Head Coach Mark Whipple

Whipple came to UMass following a four-year stint at his alma mater, Brown University. During his four years at Brown, Whipple compiled a 24-16 (.600) overall record without a losing season. His teams won more games in four years than the previous eight seasons at Brown combined.

During his career at Brown, Whipple's teams were prolific on the offensive side of the ball. In 1997, his squad set Ivy League and school records for total offense (474.3 yards per game) and Brown records for single season first downs (233), passing yards (317.9 yards per game) and single game total offense (629 yards vs. Yale). Whipple led Brown to a 7-3 mark and a second-place finish in the Ivy League in his first season in 1994, posting the school's best record and first winning season since 1987. His squad capped the year with four consecutive victories, marking the first time since 1980 that Brown had accomplished that feat.

In 1995, the Brown offense set several single season school records, including most points (282), total offense (4,165 yards), passing offense (2,502 yards) and first downs (227). His 1996 team came within a play of the Ivy League title. Battling Dartmouth to the final minute of the game in the ninth week of the season, the Bears fell to the undefeated Big Green by three points. For the second straight year, Whipple's passing offense set a new school mark with 2,628 yards.

Before his tenure at Brown, Whipple spent six years at the University of New Haven, where he posted an impressive 48-17 (.738) overall record as head coach and offensive coordinator, including two straight NCAA Division II playoff appearances in 1992 and 1993. In 1992, he led the Chargers to a 12-1 mark, advancing to the NCAA semifinals and finishing with a No. 5 ranking nationally. Whipple guided the 1993 squad to a second straight undefeated regular season (10-0) and a No. 2 national ranking, before falling in the NCAA quarterfinals.

His 1992 offense led all NCAA Divisions in scoring offense (50.5 points per game) and total offense (587.7 yards per game). Whipple's 1993 team, which was named Sports Illustrated's "Best Offense in College Football," averaged 52.5 points and 557.6 yards of total offense per game. The Chargers were ranked in the top 20 nationally in five of his six seasons at New Haven.

Prior to his stint at New Haven, Whipple served as the offensive coordinator at the University of New Hampshire for two years. He was also a member of the coaching staff for the USFL's Arizona Wranglers under George Allen, assisting with the quarterbacks. Whipple was an assistant coach at Brown for one season (1983), working with the wide receivers. He began his coaching career as an assistant coach at St. Lawrence University (1980), before serving as the offensive coordinator at Union College for two years (1981-82).

A 1979 graduate of Brown University with a bachelor's degree in political science, Whipple was the starting quarterback for the Bears in 1977 and 1978 leading Brown to a 13-5 record and a pair of second-place Ivy League finishes. He was a member of the Bears' 1976 Ivy League championship team, the first Ivy football championship in school history. During his three-year varsity career, he completed 175 of 340 passes for 2,365 yards and 13 touchdowns, while running for 518 yards and 10 touchdowns. A two-time honorable mention All-Ivy pick in football, Whipple also earned four varsity letters on the baseball diamond as Brown's starting shortstop. He was inducted into the Brown Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

Whipple (April 1, 1957) was born in Tarrytown, N.Y., before moving to Phoenix, Ariz., at the age of nine. He is a graduate of Camelback High School, where he was an All-State performer in both football and baseball. Whipple was named the Arizona Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 1975. He and his wife, Brenda, have two sons, Spencer and Austin. Spencer was a quarterback at UMass and the University of Miami where he graduated in 2012. He is currently the tight ends coach at UMass after serving as a defensive assistant at the University of Pittsburgh in 2013. Austin began his college career as a quarterback on the Penn State football team before transferring to UMass for the 2014 season.

A familiar face both on the UMass sideline and across from it, veteran Tom Masella re-joins the Minutemen in 2014 to take over as defensive coordinator.

Masella's coaching career spans over thirty years and nine different institutions, including a previous stint at Massachusetts as defensive coordinator under Whipple in 2002 and 2003. He has held head coaching duties at four different schools: Fairfield, Boston University, Central Connecticut, and Fordham with a record of 44-66 overall.

Masella spent his first tenure in Amherst helping the Minutemen to a resurgence in the Atlantic 10. In 2003, Masella's defense allowed an average of 22.7 points per game, recovered 18 fumbles, and made 27 sacks. That season, UMass finished with the 11th position in the Sports Network I-AA poll and a 10-3 record. Collectively between two seasons with the Minutemen, three of his players were named First-Team All-Atlantic 10. Four more received second and third-team all-conference honors.

A 1981 graduate of Wagner College, Masella began his coaching career at his alma mater. He served the Seahawks in varying coaching capacities from 1982 to 1984. In 1985, he took over the defense at the United States Merchant Marine Academy, where he remained until 1989, also holding the role of assistant athletic director.

The 1990s saw Masella spend seven seasons in two stops at Boston University including as head coach in 1996 and 1997. From 1990-1994 he coached the Terriers' secondary and also served as defensive coordinator in 1993 and 1994. Between his BU stints, Masella was the head coach at Fairfield University, preparing the Stags for their first season of competition at the NCAA Division I-AA level.

After his time in Boston, Masella moved to the University of Connecticut for the 1998 season where he worked alongside current UMass Strength & Conditioning Coach Mike Golden. Masella coached the Huskies' secondary and also served as assistant head coach.

After his season in Storrs, Masella moved south to Louisiana Tech where he helped turn the Bulldog defense into one of the nation's top units. His 2001 defense ranked 11th nationally in interceptions and 13th in turnovers forced en route to the Western Athletic Conference Championship.

A two year stint as head coach at Central Connecticut was next with Masella helping the Blue Devils to a pair of NEC Championships in 2004 and 2005 - the school's first-ever football championships.

In 2007, as head coach at Fordham, Masella led the Rams to one of the greatest NCAA FCS turnarounds, taking that program from a 3-8 record in 2006 to an 8-4 campaign the following year. His 2007 season was also marked in part by a Patriot League championship and a berth in the NCAA FCS playoffs which ended with a loss at UMass in the first round.

At the end of 2007, he was named the Patriot League Coach of the Year as well as the AFCA Regional Co-Coach of the Year. Masella was also honored as the Bronx Sportsperson of the Year by the New York Daily News and was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award which is presented annually to the NCAA FCS National Coach of the Year.

Following Fordham, the Staten Island native, returned for two seasons as the associate head coach and offensive coordinator at Wagner. In 2012, he helped the Seahawks capture the NEC Championship and advance to the second round of the NCAA FCS playoffs.

Masella resides with his wife, Leslie-Ann. The couple has two children, T.J. (born July 25, 1996) and Jack (born January 12, 1999).

Mike Cassano returns to UMass after spending 2013 with Georgia Tech as the Yellow Jackets' assistant director of player personnel. Overall, he has 17 years as an assistant coach in the college football ranks including three other stops working with

Whipple.

The Andover, Mass., native spent 1997 with Whipple at Brown before joining him for the next six years in Amherst. The pair worked together again during the 2010 season at Miami.

Cassano also spent time at Florida International, Eastern Michigan and Lehigh during his coaching career.

The graduate of New Hampshire (1994) has coached in five bowl games, three NCAA Tournaments and was a key member of UMass' 1998 NCAA National Championship run.

Prior to his time at Georgia Tech and Miami, Cassano spent the 2007-09 seasons at Florida International where he was the Golden Panthers' running backs coach and recruiting coordinator.

Before that he spent three years as a volunteer coach and an offensive graduate assistant where he played a major role in the success of the Hurricanes offense and running game. He coached in the 2004 and 2005 Peach Bowls, as well as in the 2006 Micron PC Bowl in helping the 'Canes to an overall 25-12 record.

Cassano worked primarily with the running backs in 2006 as a graduate assistant, helping true freshman Javarris James set numerous Miami freshman records with a team-leading 802 yards on 175 carries. With Cassano's assistance in 2005, Miami's backfield scored 19 touchdowns and averaged 137.6 rushing yards per game.

In 2004, Cassano served as a volunteer assistant and helped the Hurricanes to 365.5 yards of offense and 31.7 points per game. That year's offense produced NFL draftees in wide receiver Roscoe Parrish (Buffalo Bills, second round), tight end Kevin Everett (Buffalo Bills, third round), running back Frank Gore (San Francisco 49ers, third round) and offensive lineman Chris Myers (Denver Broncos, sixth round).

From 1998-2004 Cassano was running backs coach at UMass during one of the most successful times in the program's history. During his career in Amherst, UMass won the 1998 national championship and advanced to the NCAA playoffs in 1999 and 2003. In that stretch, the Minutemen also claimed three Atlantic 10 Conference titles.

His most distinguished student-athlete at UMass was Hall of Famer and former Arizona Cardinals running back, Marcel Shipp, who was a three-time finalist for the Walter Payton Award and three-time FCS All-American. Shipp was the sixth all-time leading rusher in Division I-AA history and holds the bulk of UMass' rushing records.

In 1997, Cassano coached the running backs at Brown after graduate assistant stints at Lehigh (1994) and Eastern Michigan University (1995 and 1996).

A native of Andover, Mass., Cassano was a two-year letterman at Colgate before transferring to New Hampshire where he earned two more varsity letters as a defensive back. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from New Hampshire in 1994 and attended graduate school at Lehigh and Eastern Michigan.

Dave SOLLAZZO

Third Year at UMass
Assistant Head Coach/
Defensive Line
The Citadel '77

A veteran collegiate coach with 35 years of experience, Dave Sollazzo joined the UMass football program as the assistant head coach and the leader of the defensive line in 2012. Of his extensive coaching career, 13 of those seasons were spent at Maryland where he helped the Terps reach eight bowl games.

In his first year with the Minutemen, Sollazzo tutored five linemen who set single-season career-best marks for tackles and TFLs along with a trio who earned personal bests for sacks.

In 2013, Sollazzo's defensive line unit again showed great progress as the group accounted for 8.5 of the Minutemen's 12 total sacks on the year. Justin Anderson led the way with four as part of a 57 tackle season that included 7.5 TFLs. Following the season, Galen Clemons who spent two seasons with Sollazzo was invited to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers rookie mini-camp in May.

Sollazzo moved to UMass after spending the 2011 season coaching the defensive line at former CAA rival Villanova, where the Wildcats led the conference in rushing defense.

Prior to that, he spent 10 seasons at the University of Maryland as the defensive line coach and served as the Terrapin recruiting coordinator for his final five years in College Park. During his last four years at Maryland, the Terps signed 72 student-athletes ranked among the top 100 nationally at their positions, including 17 All-Americans and 56 all-state selections.

During his career at Maryland, Sollazzo helped several individual players achieve at the highest levels.

In 2010, he guided defensive lineman Joe Vellano to second team All-ACC honors and helped the Terps to the second biggest turn around in the country going from 2-10 in 2009 to 9-4 in 2010. Maryland closed out the 2010 campaign with a victory over East Carolina in the Military Bowl.

Jeremy Navarre, a four-year starter, earned honorable mention All-ACC honors in 2008 en route to signing with the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars where he earned extensive playing time.

Dean Muhtadi, a significant contributor in 2007 and 2008, also moved onto the NFL, where he spent time with Green Bay and Arizona.

In 2007, the defensive line was led by Dre Moore who secured first-team All-ACC honors and went on to be selected in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In 2006, Moore anchored the line along with Conrad Bolston, who played parts of two seasons in the NFL.

In 2004, the Terrapin defense ranked 21st nationally, giving up an average of 315.3 yards per game. Though it had lost standout DT Randy Starks a year early (selected by the Tennessee Titans in the 2004 NFL Draft), the defensive line still performed well, helping the team to top 25 rankings in three categories.

In 2003, the Terps were first in the league in total defense (15th nationally) and pass defense while finishing third in rushing defense. They recorded 35 sacks, just one fewer than league leader Florida State, and Starks became just the second Maryland tackle in 15 years to earn first team all-conference honors.

Maryland finished second in the ACC in 2002 in total defense while holding its opponents to 57 yards below their season rushing averages coming into their respective games with the Terrapins. In addition, the Terps finished atop the league and seventh nationally in scoring defense, yielding just 16.3 points per game. Individually, Starks earned second-team All-ACC honors in just his second season.

In his first year back at Maryland, Sollazzo took a group that entered the season as a concern in terms of talent and depth, and turned it into a rock-solid unit that helped anchor one of the top defenses in the ACC as the team led the league in rushing and scoring defense. Under his tutelage, nose tackle Charles Hill became an honorable mention All-ACC pick and, ultimately, a third-round choice of the Houston Texans in the 2002 NFL Draft. Maryland won the ACC that year, played in the 2001 Fed-Ex Orange Bowl against Florida and was ranked 11th nationally in the final coaches poll of the season.

Prior to his stint at Maryland, Sollazzo spent two seasons (1999-00) at Georgia Tech as a defensive tackles coach helping the Yellow Jackets reach bowl games each year (1999 Gator Bowl and 2000 Peach Bowl).

Before joining the Yellow Jackets, Sollazzo was the defensive line coach at The Citadel from 1989-98. The Citadel was another homecoming for Sollazzo, as he had lettered for the Bulldogs for three years on the defensive line from 1974-76. In that time, he started 33 consecutive games under former Maryland coach Bobby Ross. His position coach was Ralph Frieden, the head coach for the Terps from 2001-10.

As a coach at The Citadel, Sollazzo helped Brad Keeney achieve All-America honors and Southern Conference-leading totals in sacks and tackles for loss in 1995.

In addition, he coached nine other defensive linemen to all-conference honors while with

the Bulldogs. The highlight of his coaching career in Charleston, S.C., however, may have been his involvement in helping The Citadel to the 1992 Southern Conference championship and a No. 1 ranking at the end of the regular season. That squad led the nation in points allowed (13 ppg) and finished sixth in pass efficiency defense. In 1997, he was a part of an impressive defensive effort in which the Bulldogs finished their season by not allowing a touchdown over the final 13 quarters.

Along with his ties to Maryland and The Citadel, Sollazzo has an extensive history in prep coaching. With the exception of working at Maryland in 1984 as a graduate assistant (a season that saw the Terps win the ACC and earn a berth in the Sun Bowl), Sollazzo was a high school defensive coordinator in South Carolina from 1978-85. He then returned to Maryland for the 1986 and 1987 campaigns as a volunteer assistant coach before moving on to Guilford and then The Citadel.

Sollazzo was born in Harrison, N.Y., on Christmas Eve, 1955, and earned his degree from The Citadel in 1977. He has a son, Christopher. In 2012 he was inducted into the Harrison High School Hall of Fame.

Liam COEN

A former four-year starter at Massachusetts, Liam Coen is regarded by many as the greatest quarterback in school history. Coen had previously served as quarterbacks coach at Brown University (2010, 2012-2013) and Rhode Island (2011). He also spent time as a quarterback with the Alabama Vipers of the Arena Football League in the 2009 season.

In 2010, Coen helped Brown to a second-place finish in the Ivy League with a 5-2 record. Under his watch, the Bears maintained the Ivy League's top passing game, averaging 244.3 yards per game.

In his only season at URI, his first and second-string quarterbacks both ranked in the top 10 in the Colonial Athletic Association in total offense.

The Newport, R.I., native rewrote the record books during his time as a student-athlete. He holds nearly every career Massachusetts passing record, including most yards gained (11,031), highest passing efficiency (152.92), completion percentage (63.9), completions (830), attempts (1,303), and most touchdowns (90). Coen led the Minutemen to conference championships and NCAA playoff berths in 2006 and 2007, which included an appearance in the NCAA championship game in 2006. In total, he led UMass to a 36-13 record during his collegiate playing career.

During his career, he was honored with the Harry Agganis/Harold Zimman Award as the Outstanding Senior in New England Football. He was a two-time Walter Payton Award Candidate in 2007 and 2008 and was a 2008 All-CAA Second-Team selection.

Coen was the 21st quarterback in FCS history to throw for 10,000-or-more career passing yards. Among all-time FCS quarterbacks, Coen ranked 12th all-time in yardage and 14th all-time in touchdowns.

Prior to his playing days at UMass, Coen earned a number of accolades at La Salle Academy (R.I.). He was named Gatorade Player of the Year, Super Prep Magazine All-Region, and led La Salle to four consecutive Division I Super Bowl appearances. As a senior, he also received All-State honors.

He holds a Bachelor's degree from UMass in Communications.

An experienced collegiate and professional football coach, Ted Daisher (pronounced DASHER) brings a wealth of knowledge to the UMass defense. Hired in 2012, Daisher has coached the UMass safeties, the outside linebackers and the inside linebackers in

both 4-3 and 3-4 schemes. In 2013, he assumed the role of special teams coordinator as well.

Daisher has coached football since 1978 at all levels including six years in the National Football League and one year in the United Football League.

In 2011, Daisher coached at Bryant serving as the defensive backs coach following his seven years working in professional football. While in the professional ranks, he worked on the staffs of the Philadelphia Eagles (2004-05 & 2009), the Oakland Raiders (2006), the Cleveland Browns (2007-08) and the Hartford Colonials (2010, UFL). During his first stint with the Eagles, he worked as the special teams quality control coach and assistant defensive line coach for Andy Reid's squad that reached the Super Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla.

At the collegiate level, the Michigan native has spent time at Illinois, Northern Illinois, Eastern Michigan, Cincinnati, Army, Indiana, and East Carolina. He helped Northern Illinois win the MAC Championship in 1983 and the California Bowl. He repeated those wins in 1987 with Eastern Michigan. In 2001, he served with East Carolina as the Pirates played in the GMAC Bowl.

Daisher graduated from Western Michigan where he was a letterwinner from 1975-77 as a wide receiver and defensive back. He and his wife Danielle have three children: Nicole, Ted and Taylor.

Marcel Shipp returned to the University of Massachusetts in January of 2014 after being named running backs coach by Mark Whipple.

Before UMass, Shipp spent the 2012 season as the running backs coach of the Las Vegas Locomotives of the UFL. He also served the Arizona Cardinals in a coaching capacity in 2013.

As an undrafted NFL running back, he spent seven seasons with the Cardinals (2001-2007) and totaled 605 carries for 2,197 yards. In 2002, he had a team-high 834 rushing yards on 188 carries. He repeated this feat the following season playing alongside Hall of Famer Emmitt Smith, rushing for 830 yards on 228 carries.

As a running back at Massachusetts, Shipp is widely held as one of the greatest players of all-time.

He was part of the school's 1998 Division I-AA National Championship squad, rushing for 244 yards and three touchdowns in the championship game versus Georgia Southern.

Shipp earned first-team All-American honors in 1998 and 1999 and received All-Conference honors three times.

Shipp still holds a number of UMass career records, including most carries (1,215), most rushing touchdowns (58), and all-purpose yards (7,759).

Before coming to UMass as a student-athlete, the Paterson, N.J., native attended Milford (Conn.) Academy and Passaic (N.J.) Tech. He was a New Jersey Super 100 pick as one of the state's top 100 high school seniors. Shipp's other high school awards include a first-team all-state selection and participation in the New Jersey North-South All Star Game.

Shipp holds a degree in sociology from UMass.

As part of the first Football Bowl Subdivision coaching staff at UMass, Shane Waldron joined the Minutemen in 2012 as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator bringing with him experience at the professional level as a coach in the NFL and UFL. He also

served three seasons on the coaching staff at Notre Dame.

When Mark Whipple took over as head coach prior to the 2013 season, Waldron assumed a new role on the staff moving from tight ends to offensive line. As the recruiting coordinator, Waldron has done well during his time in Amherst by helping to bring in a wealth of talent as the Minutemen made their transition to the FBS level.

In 2010, Waldron served as the wide receivers coach for the Hartford Colonials of the United Football League.

Prior to his stint in the UFL, Waldron worked with the New England Patriots for a number of years. Beginning in 2002, Waldron served as an operations intern, helping to prep game plans and playbooks, as well as assisting in the day to day running of an NFL team. In 2004, Waldron was promoted to the title of an operations assistant, handling special teams quality control duties and overseeing the completion of weekly game plans.

After leaving the Patriots to coach at Notre Dame, Waldron returned to New England in 2008 where he served as a Quality Control Coach for the offensive. Here, he helped to implement and develop the offensive system. In 2009, he served as the tight ends coach creating and implement a strategic and successful offense. From 2005 until 2007, Waldron worked at Notre Dame as an Offensive Graduate Assistant, evaluating recruits, helping to run special teams, and assisting with the coaching line. With the Irish, he was a part of two of the most explosive offenses in school history as both the 2005 and 2006 units averaged at least 31 points per game and 389 yards. During his time there he helped coach an offense that included Brady Quinn, Darius Walker and Jeff Samardzija.

Most recently, Waldron worked as an offensive coordinator at the Buckingham Browne and Nichols High School in 2011 and also as a Northeast Sports Consultant. In both jobs, Waldron gained experience working with high school talent.

A native of Portland, Ore., Waldron is a 2002 graduate of Tufts University where he was a three-year letterman as a tight end and long snapper. Waldron and his wife Meghan have a daughter, Lainey.

Charles Walker was introduced as Massachusetts' outside linebackers coach by Head Coach Mark Whipple in the Spring of 2014. Walker is an alum of UMass and was a four-year letterwinner during his career as a student-athlete.

As a player, he maintained an illustrious career at linebacker and on special teams. He appeared in 50 games and started 36, totaling 340 total tackles (58 TFL), 38 sacks, and one interception. In 2004, he tied the Massachusetts single-game high for tackles (23), a record he shares with John McKeown. Walker also tallied 10 career games in which he earned 10 or more tackles.

Walker's accolades as a player are numerous. In addition to being named a captain in 2007, he was named a CAA First-Team Linebacker, New England Writers All-Star, and CAA Preseason All-Conference member.

In 2006, he received Atlantic 10 Second-Team honors and was named honorable mention for the Don Hansen All-Northeast Region Team. That season, he also helped lead the Minutemen to the NCAA Division I-AA Championship Game under Head Coach Don Brown.

Following his student-athlete career, Walker served Nichols College (Mass.) for four years in a number of capacities, including linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator.

In 2012 and 2013, he was a member of the Vanderbilt University staff with the title of defensive quality control coach. In 2013, the Commodores ranked second in interceptions in the Southeastern Conference (18), led in interception return yards (277), and tied for fourth in sacks (28). Walker was a member of James Franklin's coaching staff in Nashville that is credited for turning around the Vandy program into a top-caliber bowl contending team during their time there.

He is a native of North Lauderdale, Fla., and holds a bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Massachusetts.

Golden came to UMass after spending the previous two years at South Florida with head coach Skip Holtz. There he supervised the football program's year-round weight training, speed, agility, and conditioning sessions. As the Assistant Athletic Director of Sports Performance, he also oversaw the development of rehabilitation and performance enhancement programs for all of South Florida's sports.

Prior to South Florida, Golden helped Holtz build East Carolina into one of the top football programs in Conference USA. The Pirates won back-to-back conference championships in 2008 and 2009 and went to five consecutive bowl games from 2006-2010. While in Greenville, Golden worked with first round draft pick Chris Jonson who turned in the fastest 40-yard dash time in NFL Combine History. At ECU, Golden was often credited by Holtz for playing an integral role in turning around the program which had won just three games in 25 outings prior to 2005.

Before taking over ECU's top athletic performance position, Golden spent three years on the South Carolina staff beginning in March of 2002 as assistant strength coach, where he worked directly with the Gamecocks' tennis and women's golf teams, while also providing ancillary support for the football, volleyball and cheer-leading programs. In 2004, he designed and implemented South Carolina football's summer strength, speed and conditioning program.

In March of 1998, after spending 20 months working with the strength and athletic programs at Bloomfield (Conn.) High School, Golden accepted a position as head football strength and conditioning coach under Holtz at the University of Connecticut, where he designed, implemented and supervised all weight training, agility and conditioning sessions. He also coordinated all strength and speed testing, and the Huskies' sideline management operation, playing a key role in UConn's first 10-win football campaign and an NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearance in the fall of 1998.

Golden earned his first collegiate full-time position in 1996 and spent nearly two seasons as head strength and conditioning coach at Central Connecticut State, where he played an integral role in the design and inventory purchases for the Blue Devils' new weight room facility. A 1992 graduate of Central Connecticut State, Golden earned a bachelor's degree in physical education. Upon graduation, he spent seven months as an intern at Harvard during the 1992-93 academic year, working as head strength coach for the institution's rugby squad, which advanced to the Final Four, while also working with the Crimson's football and ice hockey programs.

He gained additional experience as an assistant at the National Football League Scouting Combines in 1995, '96 and '97, and as a training camp intern for the Cleveland Browns in 1996.

Golden has also put together an extensive background of international competition, serving as an assistant coach for the five-time World Powerlifting Champion USA Men's Team at venues in Birmingham, England (1992); Jonkoping, Sweden (1993); Johannesburg, South Africa (1994); Pori, Finland (1995) and Salzburg, Austria (1996). He has also published articles in two international strength magazines - Powerlifting USA and Ironman Japan.

Golden is a certified member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA), Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA), United States Weightlifting Federation (USWA) and National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA). In the Spring of 2013, Golden was named a Master Strength & Conditioning Coach by the CSCCA earning the organization's Blue Jacket - the highest honor bestowed upon a strength and conditioning coach.

Golden is married to the former Nicole Kitsos of Cheshire, Conn. The couple has four daughters (Natasha, Tatiana, Sophia, Anastasia) and a son (Magnus).

Derek Beck had a game-high and single-game personal-best six catches go for 37 yards. Ricardo Miller added 22 yards on a pair of grabs while Brandon Howard hauled in two passes for 21 yards.

On defense, Devin Brown led the Minutemen with a career-high nine tackles and an interception. Stanley Andre registered seven takedowns while Randall Jette added six stops, including five solo tackles.

Melvin Gordon finished with 144 yards on 13 carries for the Badgers, netting one touchdown. James White also found the endzone once while gaining 143 yards on 11 carries. FOXBORO, Mass. - Marcus Wasilewski passed for 264 yards and rushed for 78 more to lead Maine to a 24-14 win over Massachusetts at Gillette Stadium on Saturday.

UMass got strong play from receiver Tajae Sharpe, who established career highs with 11 catches for 85 yards, including his first touchdown as a Minuteman in the fourth quarter. Linebacker Ed Saint-Vil led the Minutemen defense with 14 tackles and a pass break up. Joe Colton also recorded double digits with 11 stops.

Maine earned 514 yards of offense to pick up its second-ever win over a Football Bowl Subdivision opponent. UMass received the opening kick and rode the momentum of a 41-yard return by Trey Dudley Giles to a quick 7-0 lead. The Minutemen needed just four plays before Mike Wegzyn found Bernard Davis in the middle of the end zone for the score.

The Black Bears got on the board when they recovered a muffed punt at the UMass 40 following their next possession. The 10-play drive was capped by a 26-yard Sean Decloux field goal. Maine's Ricky Stevens broke off a 35-yard scoring run five minutes into the second quarter to put the visitors ahead 10-7.

Maine added to its lead late in the third when Zedric Joseph scored from a yard out to complete a 12 play, 68-yards march that amassed more than five minutes.

The Minutemen snapped Maine's 24-0 run with 11:10 to play when sophomore A.J. Doyle tossed a touchdown pass to Sharpe for an 8-yard strike.



Quarterback A.J. Doyle was 21-of-31 for 186 yards and two interceptions in his first start of the year. Defensively, UMass was led by Ed Saint-Vil who had 12 tackles and Joe Colton who had nine, including a sack.

Kansas State earned 329 yards on the ground, including John Hubert's 118. Daniel Sams had 77 yards, while Jake Waters had 74 yards rushing. Waters was 5-for-10 for 115 yards with two touchdowns and an interception.

The Wildcats took a 6-0 lead on a 38-yard interception return for a touchdown by Kip Daily with the Jack Cantele extra point being blocked.

Doyle and Bedell went to work to quickly drive the Minutemen down the field for a five-play touchdown drive. Doyle hit Sharpe for a 27-yard pick-up and Bedell punched it in for his first career touchdown two plays later closing out the first quarter giving UMass a 7-6 lead.

Kansas State scored three times in the second quarter including a 26-yard run by Robert Rose and a 43 yard reception by John Hubert in the final four minutes of play to take a 27-7 lead at halftime.

The Minutemen failed to make any headway on their opening possession of the second half. After a quick three-and-out gave the ball back to KSU, a 50-yard pass play from Waters to Glenn Gronkowski, the brother of New England Patriots tight end Rob Gronkowski, put the Wildcats up 34-7. The Wildcats added a 42-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter.

FOXBORO, Mass. - The Massachusetts football team battled hard with Vanderbilt of the Southeastern Conference (SEC), but allowed two fourth-quarter touchdowns in a 24-7 loss at Gillette Stadium on Saturday.

UMass tied the game at 7-7 early in the second quarter before Vandy scored 17 unanswered to pull away for the win. The Minutemen drop to 0-4 on the season, while the Commodores move to 2-2.

A.J. Doyle threw for 133 yards on 20-of-28 with a touchdown before missing parts of the fourth quarter with an injury. Doyle was also the leading rusher for UMass, collecting 29 yards on eight carries.

Tajae Sharpe hauled in seven balls for 45 yards - both team-highs - and a touchdown. He now has 241 yards receiving through four games, bettering his 206 yards through all of 2012. Additionally, Rob Blanchflower saw his first action of the year after being sidelined with an injury. He also hauled in seven catches for 42 yards.

On the defensive side of the ball, Devin Brown led UMass with 10 stops. Kevin Byrne had a career-high nine tackles and he forced a fumble on Vanderbilt's opening possession.

The defense also extended its streak of games with a turnover to 11.

Vanderbilt outgained UMass 406-248 in total offense, with 230 coming through the air. Carta-Samuels was 18-for-27 for 219 yards, rushed nine times for 39 yards and caught a halfback pass for 21 yards on a crucial third down at the start of the fourth quarter.

The Commodores put the game out of reach with a final scoring drive that consumed 89 yards and took 7:03 off the clock. Jerron Seymour scored from a yard out to put the visitors ahead 24-7 at the 4:41 mark. Vandy converted a pair of third downs and a fourth down on the drive.

BOWLING GREEN, Ohio - In its first Mid-American Conference game of the season, the University of Massachusetts football team dropped a 28-7 contest at Bowling Green's Doyt Perry Stadium on Saturday afternoon.

Jamal Wilson led the ground attack with a career-high 119 yards on 20 carries to average 5.9 yards per rush. The strong performance by Wilson marked his first career game with at least 100 yards rushing.

Quarterback A.J. Doyle finished 4-for-17 for 20 yards while Mike Wegzyn added a 7-for-8 performance with 76 yards, a touchdown and one interception. Wide receiver Tajae Sharpe hauled in his third career touchdown as part of a three reception, 38-yard day.

On defense, Devin Brown finished with 10 tackles to lead both sides. Stanley Andre added nine stops and a pass breakup. Defensive lineman Justin Anderson secured a pair of sacks as part of a five-tackle afternoon.

Travis Greene led Bowling Green with 160 yards on 22 carries. Falcons quarterback Matt Johnson was 11-for-20 with 166 yards and three touchdowns. Heath Jackson, Ronnie Moore and Tyler Beck each recorded one touchdown reception. Justin Ford led the Bowling Green defense with seven stops while Gabe Martin added six takedowns with an assisted tackle-for-loss.

Bowling Green got on the board in the second quarter with Moore's 51-yard reception and a touchdown plunge by Howard to go up 14-0 at the halftime break. Two more scores in the third gave the Falcons a 28-0 advantage, with Beck and Jackson hauling in passes from Johnson, before the Minutemen responded. Wegzyn hit Sharpe with a 24-yard strike to cap a 10-play, 71-yard drive spanning six minutes, two seconds with 4:34 remaining to play to reach the final score, 28-7.

FOXBORO, Mass. - A.J. Doyle threw for 249 yards and two touchdowns to lead Massachusetts to a 17-10 win over Miami (Ohio) at Gillette Stadium on Saturday. UMass established season-highs with 376 yards of total offense and 23 first downs. Doyle was 19-of-35 on the day and had two interceptions as well.

Jamal Wilson had his second 20-plus carry game as he rushed 23 times for 82 yards. Rob Blanchflower led the UMass receiving corps with five catches for 98 yards and touchdown. The Minutemen defense continued its strong play by forcing three turnovers, with two interceptions by Khary Bailey-Smith and one by Devin Brown. Stanley Andre led all UMass players with a career-high 14 tackles while Justin Anderson added two sacks among seven stops.

Miami had 290 yards of offense and was just 1-of-11 on third down. Austin Boucher threw for 166 yards on 14-of-34 with one touchdown. The last time UMass held an opponent to fewer than 300 yards of total offense came on Oct. 29, 2011 at Richmond (299).

After a turnover at the Miami one-yard line on their first possession, the Minutemen made good on drive number two as Doyle found Elgin Long on a scramble for a 22-yard strike to go ahead 7-0 just past the midway point of the first quarter. Long finished with a career game as he caught four passes for 29 yards.

Miami answered with a 64-yard drive that saw Boucher connect with Steve Marck for a 13-yard pass to tie the game up at 7-7. The RedHawks took their only lead of the game at 10-7 when Kaleb Patterson connected on a season-long 45-yard field goal with 8:09 left.

UMass regained the lead with a methodical 9-play, 81-yard drive that culminated in a 47-yard Doyle pass to Blanchflower. The ball was tipped and almost intercepted near the 20-yard line by Miami's Dayonne Nunely, but Blanchflower caught the ball behind the safeties and scampered in untouched for the longest reception of his career. The Minutemen tacked on a 25-yard Blake Lucas field goal to reach the final score.

BUFFALO, N.Y. - Branden Oliver ran for 216 yards on 43 carries and Patrick Clarke hit three field goals to lead Buffalo to a 32-3 win over the UMass football team on Saturday at UB Stadium. UMass (1-6, 1-2 MAC) trailed just 13-3 at halftime but a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns by the Bulls gave the final score.

With the win, Buffalo improved to 5-2 overall and 3-0 in the MAC. The Bulls were also led by Joe Licata who was 18-of-27 through the air for 167 yards and a touchdown. Fred Lee had eight catches for 70 yards and a score. Khalil Mack had an interception return for a touchdown to go with three tackles, while Adam Redden and Lee Skinner led the Bulls with 12 and 11 tackles, respectively.

UMass was led by Tajae Sharpe who had seven catches for 94 yards. Jamal Wilson and Stacey Bedell combined for 62 yards rushing on the ground. A.J. Doyle threw for 162 yards going 14-of-28 but did throw an interception and had two fumbles lost. Blake Lucas scored the Minutemen's only points of the day on a career-long 42 yard field goal.

The defense was led by Devin Brown's 12 tackles and Stanley Andre and Justin Anderson who each had eight. Buffalo took a 13-3 lead into halftime as both teams scored all their points in the second quarter. The Bull capped a five-play, 21 yard drive which started with less than two minutes left in the first quarter with a 44 yard field goal just five seconds into the second quarter.

UMass recorded its only points on a 42-yard field goal by Blake Lucas, as a hurry-up offense was bolstered by a 27-yard Elgin Long reception to set up the kick.

Following a Western Michigan score to go ahead, 31-24, UMass worked its way down the field, converting a trio of third downs and a crucial fourth down one play prior to Lorenzo Woodley's two-yard run. UMass then opted to go for two and A.J. Doyle missed Elgin Long on an overthrow in the back of the end zone, leaving the Minutemen down by a point.

The on-side kick attempt that followed slipped through Khary Bailey-Smith's hands and the Broncos recovered to take a knee and secure their first win of the year.

Western Michigan took a 31-24 lead late in the game when Zach Terrell completed a 54-yard scoring pass on third-and-long slant to Corey Davis for a 31-24 advantage.

For UMass, A.J. Doyle was 15-for-24 and 194 yards and one touchdown. Tight end Rob Blanchflower caught seven balls for a career-high 131 yards and score. The red-shirt senior's performance now gives him 1,138 career yards receiving, just 14 yards shy of breaking Milt Morin's record for reception yards by a tight end.

Running backs Lorenzo Woodley and Jamal Wilson both reached the end zone for the Minutemen, while kicker Blake Lucas made a 37-yard field goal and three extra points. Woodley led the team with a career high 16 carries and 58 yards, while his score in the fourth was the first of his career.

UMass opened the game with a bang as Bailey-Smith returned the kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown. The first kick off taken for a touchdown since Jesse Julmiste returned a kick 90-yards at Richmond on October 8, 2011.

UMass totaled 324 yards of offense with 155 on the ground. The defense also collected a pair of fumbles on the day, while junior Quayshun Smith blocked a Huskie field goal attempt in the third quarter.

Redshirt-junior linebacker Stanley Andre led all players with a career-high 17 tackles and he forced a fumble.

Lynch led NIU with 119 rushing yards and four touchdowns while adding 160 passing yards and a touchdown on 10-of-13. The Huskies had 612 yards of total offense.

Northern Illinois recorded three touchdowns each in the first and second quarters to put up 42 points by half-time. The Huskies added another TD in the third before finding the endzone twice in the fourth quarter to reach the final score of 63-19.

UMass only had the ball one more time and moved it into Akron territory but failed to convert on fourth down with just under seven minutes to play. The Zips moved the ball to the UMass three and attempted a field goal. The kick was good but a personal foul was called on the Minutemen, giving the Zips a first down, allowing them to run-out the clock.

UMass (1-9, 1-5 Mid-American) had 323 yards of total offense and 172 on the ground - the second-most this season. Jamal Wilson led the attack on the ground with 22 carries for 70 yards.

Mike Wegzyn threw for 76 yards and was 4-for-7 with a touchdown pass. A.J. Doyle completed 13 attempts for 75 yards. Brendon Levensgood made two field goals to extend his streak of consecutive makes to six.

Rob Blanchflower had 26 yards receiving to run his career totals to 1,164 and set a career-high mark for tight ends at UMass.

MOUNT PLEASANT, Mich. - Central Michigan scored 20 points in the second quarter en route to an 37-0 win over the UMass football team on Saturday afternoon at Kelly Shorts Stadium. While the Minutemen were able to slow the Chippewas running game, it was Titus Davis' two touchdown receptions and 154 receiving yards that changed the game early.

Another round of injuries affected the Minutemen with starting tackle Anthony Dima, starting tight end Rob Blanchflower and starting running back Lorenzo Woodley all out for the game.

Freshman Shadrach Abrokwah stepped to the plate offensively with 93 yards in his collegiate debut. The pass game struggled with A.J. Doyle going just 6-of-16 for 45 yards. Defensive, UMass was led by Stanley Andre who had eight tackles and Joe Colton and Justin Anderson who each had seven.

Davis' day for the Chippewas was thanks in part to quarterback Cooper Rush who was 13-of-21 for 231 yards and two touchdowns. Zurlon Tipton, who ran for 185 yards and 4 touchdowns against UMass last season, was held to just 50 yards in the game. As a team, CMU ran for just 67 yards - the fewest allowed by the UMass defense this season.

The game started with Central Michigan marching 75 yards on eight plays for a three-yard touchdown plunge by Tipton putting the Chips up 7-0 just 3:37 into the first quarter. UMass was unable to answer in the first, but held CMU off the board for the rest of the quarter as well.

A 33 yard field goal to start the second quarter then led to a pick-six for the Chips as Tony Annese returned a Doyle interception 34 yards to give CMU a 17-0 lead with 10:31 left before halftime.

Nearly three minutes later, Rush hit Davis for a 34 yard touchdown pass before Ron Coluzzi hit his second field goal of the day to put Central Michigan up 27-0 at the intermission.

Rush found Davis again in the third quarter for a 30-yard touchdown pass before Coluzzi hit his third field goal of the day to give the final score.

ATHENS, Ohio - A pair of second quarter turnovers led to 14 points for Ohio en route to a 51-23 win over the UMass on Friday, Nov. 29 at Peden Stadium. After the Bobcats scored twice on their first two possessions of the game, UMass fought back to pull within four, 14-10, in the second quarter before the game began to slip away. The second quarter momentum swing led to a 31-10 halftime score that the Minutemen were unable to overcome.

For the second consecutive game, the Minutemen received a yeoman's effort from Shadrach Abrokwha who earned his first career start at running back. The freshman recorded 31 carries for 110 yards on the day. Quarterback A.J. Doyle was 4-for-12 for 109 yards with two interceptions and a touchdown. Tajae Sharpe had three catches for 73 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively for UMass, Devin Brown and Trey Dudley-Giles led the charge with 12 and 10 tackles respectively. Ohio was led by Beau Blankenship with 124 rushing yards on 13 carries and one touchdown. Quarterback Tyler Tettleton was 18-of-27 through the air for 243 yards with two touchdown tosses.

The game opened up with the Bobcats scoring in just two plays on their first drive. Blankenship ran through the Minutemen for a 50-yard touchdown scamper to put Ohio up 7-0 just 25 seconds into play. UMass went three-and-out on its opening possession which led to a five-play, 54 yard scoring drive for the Bobcats which led 14-0 with 10:45 to go.

Six minutes later and UMass was able to get on the board with a 42-yard field goal from Brendon Levensgood. The Minutemen followed that in the second quarter with a 45-yard drive capped by a three-yard touchdown plunge from Abrokwha.

After forcing an Ohio punt, it looked as if the Minutemen were marching towards another scoring drive. A 34-yard pass from Doyle to Tajae Sharpe started the UMass drive which reached the Ohio 39 yard line. On 3rd-and-9, Doyle was picked off by Travis Carrie who returned the interception 66 yards for a touchdown to make it 21-10 and UMass was unable to pull closer than within 11 points the rest of the way.

Football Chronology

Fall, 1878: Francis Codman '80, the "Father of Massachusetts Agricultural College Football," organizes the initial Aggie team, although no games are played.

Nov. 22, 1879: Massachusetts Agricultural College plays its first football game, defeating the freshman team from cross-town rival Amherst College, 4-0, on Alumni Field. The game was the only one of the season for the Aggies, giving them their first undefeated season.

Nov. 13, 1880: The first road game for the Aggies is a 0-0 tie at Amherst College.

Nov. 4, 1885: M.A.C. and Amherst College meet for the fourth time in the 1885 season. The Aggies win the four-game set, 2-1-1.

Nov. 22, 1889: The Aggies complete their second undefeated season with a 2-0 record. Both wins come over Williston Academy.

Sept. 25, 1897: Doctor Weeks, an 1897 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania where he was a regular quarterback, becomes the first M.A.C. football coach. The volunteer mentor loses his first game, 4-0 at Holy Cross, and posts a 1-4-1 mark in his only season as coach.

Nov. 6, 1897: The first-ever meeting between Massachusetts and Connecticut takes place, with M.A.C. winning the game, 36-0.

Sept. 28, 1901: James Halligan, former captain of the 1899 squad, leads the Aggies to a 17-0 victory at Holy Cross. Halligan becomes the first full-time seasonal football coach in school history.

Oct. 14, 1903: The first-ever meeting between Massachusetts and Rhode Island takes place, with the Aggies prevailing, 46-0. Massachusetts has faced Rhode Island 76 times, more than any other school.

Oct. 9, 1915: M.A.C. plays its first game at "New" Alumni Field, defeating Colby, 26-0.

Oct. 2, 1920: Massachusetts picks up its 100th win in school history, defeating Connecticut, 28-0.

March 26, 1931: Massachusetts Agricultural College becomes Massachusetts State College.

Sept. 26, 1931: Mel Taube coaches his first game against Cooper Union, leading the Aggies to a 50-0 victory. Taube goes on to become the school's all-time winningest coach by percentage (.682 / minimum 40 games). The game marks the first collegiate appearance by Lou Bush, who runs for three touchdowns on the afternoon.

Nov. 14, 1931: The Aggies defeat Wagner, 77-0, behind a school-record five touchdowns by Lou Bush. The margin of victory is still tied for the largest ever by Massachusetts.

Nov. 21, 1931: Lou Bush finishes the season with a then-school record 127 points to lead the nation in scoring. Bush goes on to win the national scoring title again in 1932 with 114 points.

Sept. 24, 1932: Lou Bush sets the school record by rushing for five touchdowns against Cooper Union, leading the Aggies to a 50-0 victory.

Nov. 5, 1937: Massachusetts loses at Coast Guard, 7-6, in the first-ever night game for the Aggies.

Nov. 10, 1945: The last meeting between Massachusetts and Amherst College ends in a 7-7 tie.

Dec. 3, 1946: The Yankee Conference is created. Massachusetts is a charter member, along with Rhode Island, Connecticut, Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont.

May 7, 1947: Massachusetts State College becomes the University of Massachusetts.

Oct. 18, 1947: UMass hosts Rhode Island in its first-ever Yankee Conference game. Rhode Island wins the contest, 20-13.

Jan. 16, 1948: UMass changes its team nickname from the Aggies to the Redmen.

Oct. 30, 1948: The Redmen win their first Yankee Conference game, 33-0, at home against Vermont.

Sept. 27, 1952: UMass wins its 200th game in school history, posting a 39-6 win over Bates in Amherst.

Nov. 15, 1952: UMass travels to Tufts and wins 32-0 in the first televised game in school history.

Oct. 2, 1954: In the first meeting between the two schools in nearly 40 years, UMass posts a 13-7 upset victory at Harvard.

Oct. 1, 1960: Under the direction of first-year head coach Charles Studley, UMass upsets Harvard 27-12 on the road to open the season with a 3-0 record.

Nov. 12, 1960: UMass earns a share of its first Yankee Conference championship with a 35-15 win over New Hampshire.

Sept. 30, 1961: Vic Fusia coaches his first game at Massachusetts, leading the Redmen to a 21-12 victory over American International College (AIC). Fusia goes on to become the school's all-time winningest coach with 59 victories.

Nov. 22, 1961: Maine defeats UMass, 10-7, for the Yankee Conference championship in a game postponed from Sept. 23 because 22 members of the UMass team had been struck with an intestinal virus epidemic.

Nov. 10, 1962: The Redmen record a 19-18 upset win at Villanova. To this day, it remains UMass' only victory at Villanova.

Sept. 21, 1963: UMass surrenders a touchdown to Maine in a 14-7 win over the Black Bears. It would be the only touchdown the Redmen allowed all season.

Nov. 16, 1963: The Redmen clinch their first outright Yankee Conference title with a 48-2 victory over New Hampshire. The win also closes out the team's third and most recent undefeated season (8-0-1).

Nov. 14, 1964: UMass defeats New Hampshire, 47-0, to clinch its second straight and third overall Yankee Conference title. Vic Fusia is named New England Football Coach of the Year, while quarterback Jerry Whelchel receives the George Bulger Lowe Award from the Gridiron Club of Boston as New England's most outstanding player.

Dec. 12, 1964: UMass plays in its first-ever postseason game, the Tangerine Bowl. After leading East Carolina, 13-0, the Redmen tire late in the game and fall 14-13.

Sept. 25, 1965: UMass defeats American International College (AIC), 41-0, in the first game ever at Alumni Stadium.

Oct. 16, 1965: UMass defeats Rhode Island, 30-0, in the official dedication game of Alumni Stadium.

Oct. 30, 1965: Greg Landry throws for a then-UMass record 300 yards to lead the Redmen to a 41-6 victory over Vermont. Landry goes on to lead the team in passing in all three of his years (1965-1967), and lead the squad in both rushing and scoring in 1965 and 1967. His quarterback efficiency rating of 145.4 in 1965 is still a school record.

Nov. 27, 1965: Milt Morin becomes the first UMass player to be drafted in the first round when the Cleveland Browns select the All-America tight end as their number one pick in the 1966 NFL Draft.

Nov. 12, 1966: UMass defeats New Hampshire, 14-7, to claim its fourth Yankee Conference title.

Nov. 18, 1967: The Redmen earn their fifth Yankee Conference championship with a 14-13 victory at New Hampshire.

Jan. 30, 1968: Greg Landry is chosen as the 11th overall pick by the Detroit Lions in the first round of the 1968 NFL Draft. Landry's selection still remains the highest draft pick by a UMass football player in school history.

Nov. 15, 1969: UMass defeats New Hampshire 48-7 to earn its sixth Yankee Conference championship.

Sept. 18, 1971: Dick MacPherson coaches his first game at UMass, defeating Maine 13-0. MacPherson goes on to lead UMass to four Yankee Conference championships in his seven-year tenure.

Nov. 13, 1971: The Redmen earn a piece of their seventh Yankee Conference title with a 38-20 victory at New Hampshire.

Spring, 1972: UMass changes its nickname from the Redmen to the Minutemen.

Nov. 18, 1972: The Minutemen defeat New Hampshire 42-7 to claim their eighth Yankee Conference title.

Nov. 25, 1972: In front of an Alumni Stadium record 20,000 fans, the Minutemen post a 28-7 win over arch-rival Boston College.

Dec. 9, 1972: UMass defeats California-Davis 35-14 at the Boardwalk Bowl in Atlantic City, N.J., to win its first postseason game.

Sept. 15, 1973: The Minutemen win the 300th game in school history, defeating Villanova 21-20.

Nov. 16, 1974: The Minutemen defeat New Hampshire 27-17 to earn a share of their ninth Yankee Conference title.

Oct. 23, 1976: Brian McNally throws for a then-school record 389 yards against Connecticut in a 28-6 loss.

Nov. 12, 1977: UMass claims its 10th Yankee Conference title with a 19-6 win at New Hampshire.

Nov. 19, 1977: The Minutemen conclude the 1977 regular season with a 34-7 loss at Boston College. The 30,846 fans in attendance marked the biggest crowd to watch a UMass football game until 2002.

Nov. 26, 1977: Lehigh defeats UMass, 30-23, in the first round of the NCAA Division II Playoffs at McGuirk Alumni Stadium, despite a spirited second-half surge by the Minutemen. The contest was the first postseason football game played in Amherst and marked Dick MacPherson's last game as head coach of the Minutemen.

Nov. 18, 1978: The Minutemen earn their 11th Yankee Conference title with a, 34-7, victory over New Hampshire.

Dec. 9, 1978: UMass overpowers previously unbeaten and top-ranked Nevada-Reno, 44-21, in the NCAA Division I-AA semifinals at MacKay Stadium in Reno. The Minutemen's victory marked the first NCAA Division I-AA playoff win in school history.

Dec. 16, 1978: UMass falls to Florida A&M, 35-28, in the first-ever Division I-AA championship game. The Minutemen, under first-year coach Bob Pickett, win the Lambert Cup as the best team in the East.

Nov. 17, 1979: The Minutemen claim a share of their 12th Yankee Conference title with a 29-0 win at New Hampshire.

Nov. 14, 1981: UMass defeats New Hampshire 20-9 to earn a piece of its 13th Yankee Conference championship.

Nov. 13, 1982: The Minutemen claim a share of their 14th Yankee Conference title with a 27-0 victory over New Hampshire.

Nov. 20, 1982: Garry Pearson rushes for a then-UMass single-game record 288 yards in the final game of his collegiate career, a 29-13 victory over American International College (AIC).

Nov. 3, 1984: Alumni Stadium is renamed Warren P. McGuirk Alumni Stadium in honor of the late UMass Athletic Director during whose tenure the stadium was built.

Nov. 22, 1986: UMass loses to Connecticut 20-17, but claims a share of its 15th Yankee Conference championship.

Nov. 19, 1988: The Minutemen win a wild 64-42 shootout at New Hampshire to earn their 16th Yankee Conference title and first outright league championship in 10 years.

Nov. 4, 1989: UMass picks up its 400th win in school history, defeating Richmond 17-14.

Oct. 20, 1990: The Minutemen win their first game ever against Delaware 17-3, after losing the first 14 meetings to the Blue Hens. The win comes at a great cost though, when promising sophomore quarterback Gary Wilkos suffers a career-ending fractured neck in the game.

Nov. 10, 1990: UMass defeats Villanova 3-0 to claim its league-leading 17th Yankee Conference title.

Sept. 12, 1992: UMass falls to Delaware 33-13 in the 900th game in school history, and the first for Mike Hodges as head coach. The Minutemen rebound to win seven straight games, and Hodges is named New England Coach of the Year.

Oct. 1, 1994: Rene Ingoglia rushes for a then-UMass and Yankee Conference single-game record 313 yards in a 22-12 victory over Rhode Island at McGuirk Alumni Stadium.

Oct. 7, 1995: Rene Ingoglia becomes the all-time leading rusher in school history in a 32-29 loss to New Hampshire at McGuirk Alumni Stadium. Ingoglia surpasses Garry Pearson's previous mark of 3,859 career yards.

Nov. 11, 1995: Frank Alessio rushes for a UMass and Yankee Conference single-game record 337 yards and three touchdowns in the Minutemen's 28-23 victory at Boston University.

Nov. 18, 1995: Rene Ingoglia closes out his collegiate career by becoming the all-time leading rusher in Yankee Conference history in a 20-7 loss at UConn. Ingoglia finishes with 4,624 career rushing yards, which ranked among the top-25 in Division I-AA at the time.

June 3, 1996: The Yankee Conference announces its 50th anniversary all-time team. UMass led the way with a league-high six players named to the 26-man squad. Quarterback Greg Landry (1965-67), running back Rene Ingoglia (1992-95), offensive lineman Bill Durkin (1990-93), offensive lineman Bruce Kimball (1975-78), defensive lineman Brian Corcoran (1991-94) and defensive lineman Ed McAleney (1972-75) are selected to the prestigious team.

Oct. 5, 1996: Jim Pizano runs 96 yards for a touchdown at Rhode Island, marking the longest run in school history. The rush eclipsed a mark that had stood for over 68 years, when Fred Ellert scampered 95 yards at Tufts on Nov. 27, 1928.

Nov. 16, 1996: The Miracle at McGuirk. Jeff Smith hits Erik Henry on a 20-yard touchdown strike with 31 seconds remaining to complete a 20-point fourth quarter comeback and lead UMass to a 39-38 victory over Connecticut in the final game in Yankee Conference history. The comeback is the greatest in school history.

July 1, 1997: The Atlantic 10 Football Conference officially takes over operation of the Yankee Conference, marking the end of a 50-year football legacy but the beginning of a new era in collegiate football. In the Yankee Conference's history, UMass won more league titles (17) and games (160) than any other conference member.

Aug. 30, 1997: UMass falls to Richmond 21-6, in a game that marks the official kickoff of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. Commissioner Linda Bruno is on hand to perform the ceremonial coin flip prior to the start of the game.

Oct. 31, 1998: Quarterback Todd Bankhead throws for 274 yards in a 27-26 victory over New Hampshire to break the UMass single-season passing record in only the eighth game of the season. Bankhead, who would finish the year with 3,919 yards, also broke school single-season records for completions (303), attempts (525), touchdowns (34) and total offense (3,756).

Nov. 14, 1998: Marcel Shipp rushes for 270 yards in a 55-34 victory over Maine, to break Garry Pearson's UMass single-season rushing record. Shipp finished the year with 2,542 yards, while also breaking school single-season records for carries (428) and all-purpose yards (3,032).

Nov. 21, 1998: Jimmy Moore caught nine passes for 172 yards in a 28-27 loss to Connecticut, breaking the school single-season record for receptions. Moore totaled 92 catches on the year, and also broke UMass single-season records for receiving yards (1,494) and receiving touchdowns (16).

Nov. 28, 1998: The Minutemen jumped out to a 21-0 lead in the second quarter and held on for a 21-19 victory at McNeese State in the first round of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. Freshman Kevin Quinlan, who played in place of an injured Marcel Shipp, rushed for 147 yards as UMass knocked off the 1997 NCAA runner-up.

Dec. 5, 1998: UMass records the first home postseason victory in school history with a 27-21 win over Lehigh at Warren McGuirk Alumni Stadium. Todd Bankhead throws for 270 yards to lead the offense, while the defense stops the Mountain Hawks on fourth and goal in the final two minutes to preserve the victory in the NCAA quarterfinals.

Dec. 12, 1998: The Minutemen advance to the NCAA championship game for the second time in school history with a 41-31 win at Northwestern State (La.). UMass trailed 24-21 entering the fourth quarter, before Todd Bankhead hit Matt Jordan with a 49-yard touchdown pass to ignite a 20-0 run and propel the Minutemen to victory.

Dec. 19, 1998: UMass downs top-ranked and previously-unbeaten Georgia Southern, 55-43 in the NCAA championship game, played in Chattanooga, Tenn. The defense forced the Eagles into seven turnovers on the day, allowing the Minutemen to take control of the game early. Marcel Shipp led the offense by rushing for a then-championship game record 244 yards on 35 carries, while Kole Ayi had 16 tackles, three fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles. In addition to winning its first-ever NCAA I-AA championship, UMass earned the Lambert Cup for the second time in school history.

Oct. 30, 1999: Todd Bankhead completed 16 of 27 passes for 322 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-9 victory over Rhode Island, breaking all-time UMass records for passing yards and attempts in the process. Bankhead would finish his career as UMass' all-time leader in passing yards (7,018), completions (561), attempts (931), touchdown passes (51) and total offense (6,821 yards).

Nov. 6, 1999: Adrian Zullo caught 11 passes for 210 yards and a touchdown in a 33-6 victory at Richmond to break the UMass single-game record for receiving yards. Zullo totaled 179 receiving yards in the first half alone, and shattered Milt Morin's old record of 181 yards, set against Vermont in 1965. Zullo also tied the single-game record for receptions with 11, a mark which he had also achieved earlier in the season against New Hampshire.

Nov. 13, 1999: Marcel Shipp rushed for 210 yards and three touchdowns on 35 carries in a 25-16 victory at William & Mary to break the all-time UMass record for career rushing yards. Shipp bested Rene Ingoglia's old mark of 4,624 yards and went on to finish his career with 6,250 yards.

Nov. 20, 1999: The Minutemen destroyed arch-rival Connecticut 62-20 at McGuirk Stadium in the Huskies last game as a I-AA school and claimed their 18th Atlantic 10 Conference title in the process. Marcel Shipp rushed for three touchdowns in the victory to break Rene Ingoglia's single-season record of 19. Shipp went on to finish the season with 24 rushing scores.

Nov. 27, 1999: Marcel Shipp scored on a one-yard touchdown run in overtime to propel the Minutemen to a dramatic, 30-23 victory at eighth-ranked Furman in the first round of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. In the win, Adrian Zullo caught 10 passes for 121 yards and a touchdown.

Dec. 4, 1999: The Minutemen stayed close in to the fourth quarter, but came up just short in a 38-21 loss at second-ranked Georgia Southern in the quarterfinals of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. In the game, Adrian Zullo broke the UMass career records for catches and receiving yards. Zullo finished his career as the all-time school leader in receptions (187), receiving yards (2,892) and receiving touchdowns (32).

Aug. 31, 2000: In the first-ever night game at McGuirk Alumni Stadium, the Minutemen down William & Mary, 36-16. The game was the first ever for UMass under the lights in Amherst.

Oct. 28, 2000: Kole Ayi makes 13 solo stops in a 24-16 loss at New Hampshire to become the all-time UMass leader in career unassisted tackles. Ayi went on to finish his career with 330 solo tackles and ended third all-time on the school list for total tackles with 478.

Nov. 18, 2000: Marcel Shipp rushed 36 times for 156 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Minutemen to a 29-21 victory at Rhode Island in the final game of his collegiate career. Shipp capped his four years at UMass with 6,250 rushing yards to become the all-time leading rusher in the history of the Atlantic 10 Conference. He also set the school career records for carries (1,215), rushing touchdowns (58), all-purpose yards (7,759), points scored (378) and touchdowns scored (63).

Sept. 28, 2002: The Minutemen drop a 56-24 decision at North Carolina State, ranked No. 17 in Division I-A (FBS). The 51,221 fans in attendance marked the biggest crowd to witness a UMass football game to that point.

Nov. 22, 2003: UMass defeats Rhode Island, 31-17 at McGuirk Stadium to claim a share of its 19th Atlantic 10 Conference title. With the win, the Minutemen also set a school record for regular season victories with 10, while posting seven home wins in a year for the first time.

Nov. 29, 2003: Playing in a blizzard at Colgate, the Minutemen are defeated 19-7 in the opening round of the NCAA I-AA playoffs. UMass takes a 7-0 lead in the first quarter but is unable to overcome the elements as it finishes the season with a 10-3 overall record.

Feb. 9, 2004: Don Brown was named UMass new head coach as former coach Mark Whipple left to become quarterbacks coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers of the National Football League.

Sept. 11, 2004: UMass hosts its second night game in school history at McGuirk Stadium. The Minutemen down Colgate, 30-20 in a rematch of the 2003 NCAA playoff game.

Oct. 16, 2004: UMass picks up its 500th win in program history with a 38-21 victory at New Hampshire. Steve Baylark tallied the game's Bill Knight MVP Award as he ran for a then-career-high 192 yards.

Sept. 17, 2005: UMass sets a Division I-AA record and ties the all-time football mark with three safeties in a 40-0 win over Albany in the third all-time night game at McGuirk Stadium.

Oct. 7, 2006: UMass won back-to-back contests by the score of 48-7 beating William & Mary. The Minutemen also beat Stony Brook by the same score on Sept. 24. The last time UMass won consecutive games by the same score -- was also 48-7 and also separated by a bye week, back in 1969. UMass beat Vermont and New Hampshire, 48-7 on Nov. 1 and 15, 1969.

Oct. 28, 2006: Steve Baylark became the third player in I-AA/FCS history to gain 1,000 rushing yards in four consecutive seasons with 152 yards in a 7-0 win at Northeastern in a rain storm. Baylark joined Jerry Azumah (New Hampshire, 1995-98) and Adrian Peterson (Georgia Southern, 1996-99).

Nov. 11, 2006: UMass clinched the Atlantic 10 Championship and the league's automatic qualifier for the NCAA Tournament with a 10-9 win over Maine. The Minutemen claimed the win as the Black Bears missed an extra point with 1:44 left in regulation.

Nov. 18, 2006: On Senior Day, UMass posted a perfect 8-0 record in the Atlantic 10 with a 22-16 win over Hofstra at McGuirk Stadium. The 8-0 record gave UMass the league's first undefeated record since Villanova in 1997.

Dec. 2, 2006: In the NCAA Division I-AA Quarterfinals, UMass advanced to the National Semifinals for the first time since winning the title in 1998 with a 24-17 victory over No. 9 New Hampshire. The dramatic win came before a sell-out crowd of 17,000 at McGuirk Stadium. It was the first sell-out since Sept. 8, 1973 when 18,100 jammed McGuirk prior to fire codes. It was the ninth-largest in program history.

Dec. 8, 2006: UMass advanced to its third NCAA Division I-AA/FCS Championship Game with a 19-17 win at No. 2 Montana before a sell-out crowd of 23,454 and national-television audience on ESPN2. Kicker Chris Koeplin kicked the game-winning field goal from 43-yards out with 13:25 left in the fourth to put UMass ahead, 19-17. Steve Baylark had 245 all-purpose yards and two rushing touchdowns.

Dec. 15, 2006: UMass falls to No. 1 Appalachian State in the first FCS Division I Championship Game, formerly I-AA, 28-17 in Chattanooga, Tenn.

March 1, 2007: The Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) assumed operational control of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. All 12 teams remained in the league, which was under its third governance, beginning with the Yankee Conference in 1947.

Oct. 13, 2007: UMass beat Villanova in quadruple overtime, 32-24, at McGuirk Alumni Stadium. The game equaled the longest overtime game in program history. UMass lost to Richmond, 52-51 in four overtimes on Sept. 19, 1987.

Nov. 3, 2007: Quarterback Liam Coen became UMass' career passing yardage leader with 191 yards in a 27-7 win over rival No. 14 New Hampshire. He broke Todd Bankhead's mark of 7,018 with an eight-yard pass to Ian Jorgensen in the third quarter. The win also clinched a second straight conference North division title for the Minutemen.

Nov. 24, 2007: UMass piled up 649 yards of total offense, the second-most in a game in school history, an NCAA First Round win over Fordham, 49-35 at McGuirk Stadium. In the win, Liam Coen set a school record for passing yards in a game with 419, breaking Matt Guice's previous mark of 401 earned in 2001.

Sept. 20, 2008: UMass football played before the largest crowd ever to watch a school team in action to that point as the Minutemen lost at No. 10 Texas Tech, 56-14 before 53,190 individuals.

Nov. 22, 2008: Don Brown coached his last game at UMass in leading the Minutemen to a 28-14 win over Hofstra. That game made the 2008-09 UMass senior class the winningest four-year group in the history of the program with a 37-14 record.

Jan. 19, 2009: Kevin Morris was named the 28th head coach in UMass football history. Morris spent the previous five years as the Minutemen's offensive coordinator.

Sept. 18, 2010: UMass football plays before the largest crowd in school history for any sport, at Michigan Stadium. The Minutemen battle hard in a 42-37 loss to the then-No. 20 Wolverines before 110,187 people. UMass led most of the first half but fell behind with a minute left before halftime.

Oct. 23, 2010: UMass played the first-ever college football game at Gillette Stadium as the Minutemen and New Hampshire battled in the Colonial Clash.

Nov. 19, 2011: UMass plays its final game at the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS/I-AA). The Minutemen fall, 34-17 to James Madison.

Dec. 8, 2011: Charley Molnar is named head coach for UMass' first season as a member of the Football Bowl Subdivision and of the Mid-American Conference. Molnar is introduced to fans and media in a press conference at Gillette Stadium in Foxboro, Mass.

Aug. 30, 2012: UMass falls at Connecticut, 37-0 in its first-ever game as an FBS team. It marked the first time the two teams had played since UMass defeated the Huskies 62-20 during the 1999 season - the last game for UConn at the I-AA (FCS) level.

Nov. 10, 2012: UMass picks up its first win as an FBS program and its first conference win as a member of the MAC with a 22-14 victory at Akron. UMass forced four interceptions, blocked a punt, scored three field goals and pinned three consecutive punts inside the five-yard line as defense and special teams highlighted the win.

April 26, 2013: Ground is officially broken as dignitaries from around the Commonwealth of Massachusetts visit the construction site of the UMass Football Performance Center - the home for football at McGuirk Stadium.

June 10, 2013: Brothers and business partners Martin and Richard Jacobson pledge \$2.5 million to the athletic department for the naming rights of the new football press and skybox. The addition to McGuirk Stadium will be named the Martin And Richard Jacobson Press And Skybox Complex.

July 10 & 11, 2013: On July 10, Colter Johnson becomes the first UMass football player named to a major FBS preseason Watch List as he is a nominee for the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter. A day later, Anthony Dima is named to the Outland Trophy Watch List honoring the nation's top interior lineman.

January 14, 2014: Mark Whipple is introduced as the new head coach of the UMass Football program. Whipple, who previously served as head coach from 1998-2003, returns to Amherst after spending time in the NFL and at the University of Miami.

After establishing a 13-0 lead, Yankee Conference champion UMass tired in the Orlando heat in a 14-13 loss to the East Carolina Pirates. The second half run-pass threat of Pirate All-America quarterback Bill Cline was too much for the UMass defense to handle. Cline's nine-yard touchdown run and two-point conversion pass to Pete Crane in the fourth quarter won the game. In the second quarter, UMass' Bob Gogick recovered an East Carolina fumble that gave UMass the ball on the Pirate 12-yard line. UMass quarterback Jerry Whelchel then hit Ken Palm for a 12-yard touchdown, giving UMass a 7-0 lead. After taking the second half kickoff, UMass started its second touchdown drive. Two running plays and a penalty put the Redmen at their own 39, when Palm got behind the East Carolina secondary and caught a Whelchel 61-yard touchdown pass

for a 13-0 UMass lead. Richardson put East Carolina on the board with a two-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, paving the way for Cline's heroics. Fullback Mike Ross led Massachusetts with 55 yards rushing. Cline led East Carolina with 217 yards in total offense. UMass finished the season with an 8-2 record.

The Yankee Conference champions went 60 yards on nine plays for their first score, with Paul Metallo gaining much of the yardage on the ground. Pennington then hit Tim Berra for a 17-yard score. A John Healy interception at the Cal-Davis 27 set up the second score for UMass. The touchdown came on a 10-yard end-around by Steve Schubert. After getting the ball back on downs, Metallo once again did most of the damage on the ground, before hitting Pennington for a 21-yard scoring strike on an option play. Cal-Davis finally got on the board when Bob Biggs found Frank Altick on a 20-yard pass with less than two minutes left in the first half. The Aggies would cut the UMass lead to 20-14 before reserve quarterback Mark Tripucka came in to put the game out of reach with two more Minuteman touchdowns. The Minutemen outgained the Aggies 184-61 on the ground, and Schubert was UMass' top receiver with 69 yards. The Minutemen finished with a 9-2 record.

A spirited second-half comeback by Yankee Conference champion UMass fell short, as Lehigh held on for a 30-23 win. Head coach Dick MacPherson's defense could not stop the Engineer aerial attack of quarterback Mike Reiker and split end Steve Kreider, who connected on a seven-yard touchdown for the winning score with 11:56 left in the game. With Lehigh ahead 23-0, UMass took a punt on the Engineer 36-yard line and needed only two plays to score on a 36-yard pass from Mike Fallon to Dennis Dent. After the half, the Minutemen continued to cut into the Lehigh advantage, scoring on a 10-play, 74-yard drive. Billy Coleman finished the drive with a one-yard run to cut the Engineer lead to 23-16. UMass then tied the contest at 23-23 on a seven-yard touchdown pass from Fallon to John Gladchuk, before Lehigh scored the winning touchdown

in the fourth quarter. Reiker finished the day with 351 yards passing, hitting 25 of 40 attempts, while Kreider had nine catches for 171 yards and four touchdowns. Billy Coleman led the Minutemen with 90 yards rushing. UMass finished the season 8-3.



In the 1978 NCAA Division I-AA semifinal, UMass used a combination of big-play offense and a superlative defense to stop previously undefeated and top-ranked Nevada-Reno 44-21. The Minuteman defense forced seven Wolfpack turnovers (six interceptions, one fumble) to give the offense the ball in fine field position most of the day. UMass opened the contest with an 80-yard drive that ended with a Cliff Pedrow 20-yard scoring run. The play was set up by Dennis Dent's 32-yard flea-flicker to Chris Kurtz. After UMass fumbled a Nevada-Reno punt, the Wolfpack scored on a three-yard run by John Vicari. On the ensuing kickoff, Dent went 96 yards for a touchdown to give UMass a 13-7 lead. UMass' Steve McInnes set up Pedrow's one-yard touchdown run with an interception, and Minuteman quarterback Mike McEvilly ended the first half scoring when he connected with Kevin O'Connor on a 47-yard touchdown strike that gave UMass a 28-7 lead. In the second half, Pedrow scored on a 30-yard run and Kevin Sullivan ran an interception back 59 yards for the final two Minuteman touchdowns.

In the first NCAA Division I-AA championship game, UMass dropped a 35-28 decision to Florida A&M in the Pioneer Bowl. The Minutemen could not contain the Florida A&M running attack, which totalled 470 yards despite playing without leading rusher Ike Williams. Mike Solomon had 207 yards and Melvin McFayden had 177 to pace A&M. Despite the Rattlers' ground success, UMass held a 22-21 lead in the fourth quarter on three Sandro Vitiello field goals and two touchdowns by Cliff Pedrow. With 8:26 left in the game, UMass fumbled and Florida A&M recovered. On the next play, Solomon scored on a 28-yard touchdown run and a two-point conversion to put the Rattlers ahead 29-22. After three unsuccessful downs and a punt by UMass, A&M got the ball back, and Solomon scampered for a 20-yard scoring run to give the Rattlers a 35-22 lead. UMass closed the scoring on a last

second 34-yard touchdown pass from Mike McEvelly to Chris Kurtz. Head coach Bob Pickett's defense played without three starters, including Kevin Sullivan, who broke his ankle in the first quarter. UMass finished the season 9-4 and won the Lambert Cup as the top team in the East.

No. 3 UMass advanced to its third NCAA Division I National Championship game in history with a 19-17 win at No. 2 Montana before a sold-out and raucous crowd of 23,454 and a national-TV audience on ESPN2.

Steve Baylark was an amazing all-purpose back with 245 total yards. He had his ninth 100-yard rushing game this season and 25th of his career with 169 yards and two touchdowns. He also had a career-high 76 receiving yards to lead the receiving corps. It was Baylark's 14th career two-touchdown game and UMass is 13-1 in those games. In his 25 career 100-yard games, UMass is now 22-3. He had 12 carries in the fourth quarter to keep Montana's offense off the field.

Kicker Chris Koeplin kicked the eventual game-winning field goal from 43 yards away with 13:25 left in regulation. The Minutemen, who haven't given up a point in the second half of their three playoff games, held the Grizzlies to just 67 yards in the final 30 minutes.

Koeplin's game-winner was set up when the UMass defense forced a safety in a defensive-minded third quarter. The Minutemen pressured Grizz quarterback Josh Swogger to fumble the ball out of the end zone to make it 17-16 with

1:26 left in the third quarter. Dominique Milton was credited with the safety as he was the last player to hit Swogger after Brandon Freeman and Brad Anderson unleashed huge pressure.

It was again the UMass defense that sealed the game when Brandon Smith intercepted Swogger with 36 seconds remaining in the game after the Minutemen turned over the ball on a missed 46-yard field goal.

On defense, Milton forced a safety for his first career points and sack. Courtney Robinson had a forced fumble and his second career interception.

Appalachian State put the ball in Kevin Richardson's hands with its second straight NCAA Division I-AA title at stake.

Richardson's fourth touchdown sealed Appalachian State's 28-17 victory over Massachusetts on Friday night. The former walk-on finished with 179 yards.

His third touchdown put the Mountaineers (14-1) ahead 21-14 at the beginning of the fourth quarter. He added another for 2 yards with 1:51 left that gave him the I-AA record for rushing touchdowns in a season with 30.

The Minutemen (13-2), hoping to win their first title since 1998, cut it to 21-17 on Chris Koeplin's 42-yard field goal with 8:46 left.

Appalachian State then took 6:46 off the clock as Richardson ran 10 times in a long drive before capping it with his last touchdown.

UMass got the ball back, but Appalachian State's Corey Lynch had an interception to seal it.

The Mountaineers' freshman quarterback, Armanti Edwards managed the game well and finished 12-of-19 for 146 yards. He also ran 15 times for 81 yards, and Appalachian State totaled 285 yards on the ground. Richardson's counterpart for UMass, Steve Baylark, tried to carry the Minutemen. He ran for 133 yards on 24 carries.

UMass tied it at 14 in the third quarter on Liam Coen's 17-yard pass to Brad Listorti, who tiptoed a few yards down the sideline to stay in bounds and score. The Minutemen got the ball after James Ihedigbo intercepted a pass by Edwards at the UMass 19, stopping Appalachian State's first prolonged drive of the second half.

The attendance was announced at 22,808, a sellout and overflow crowd and the largest for the I-AA title game since it moved to Chattanooga in 1997.

No. 7 UMass advanced to the Quarterfinals with a 49-35 win over Patriot League Champion Fordham on a record-setting day for the Minutemen. Liam Coen set the UMass record for passing yards in a game with 419 along with four TD passes. Matt Lawrence had his ninth 100-yard rushing game of the season with 167 and three rushing TDs. Rasheed Rancher had the second-most receiving yards in a game with 198.

The Minutemen piled up 649 yards of total offense, the second-most in a game in school history. They set the record of 651 against New Hampshire in 1965. Fordham had 406 yards as the teams combining 1,055 total yards.

Charles Walker's first-career interception set up the game-sealing drive as Lawrence ran in for his third touchdown of the game for two yards, making it 49-35 with 5:15 left in the fourth.

UMass took the lead back at 42-35 as Lawrence rank in from 13 yards out for his second score of the day. On the drive, Coen set the UMass single-game passing yardage record as he broke the record of 403 held by Matt Guice in 2001.

Skelton hooked up with Sylvester Clarke for an 11-yard touchdown with 11:59 left in the fourth quarter. The drive spanned 98 yards

as Skelton completed 4-of-5 for 69 yards in leading the Rams down the field. The drive began off another UMass turnover on a failed halfback option. Lawrence was attempting to throw a pass to Ian Jorgensen in the end zone, but was picked off.

Despite a valiant comeback, the No. 7 Minutemen lost to No. 4 Southern Illinois, 34-27. UMass finished the season at 10-3, marking its fourth 10-win season all-time.

The Salukis were too much to handle all afternoon from the opening whistle as Southern Illinois gashed UMass' defense for 462 yards, the most the Minutemen have allowed since giving up 516 to Boston College in 2004. UMass allowed its longest reception (69 yards) and longest rush (64 yards) of the season.

Liam Coen threw for a school-record 421 yards on 28-of-42. It marked the second week in a row he set the school record for passing yards.

Matt Lawrence gained more than 100 yards for the 10th time this season with 112, in his final collegiate game. Rasheed Rancher had five catches for 143 yards, giving him 1794 in his career, as he finished his career, fourth in receiving yards all-time at UMass. J.J. Moore had seven catches giving him 185, second all-time to Adrian Zullo (187) at UMass. Moore also had 94 receiving yards as he finished his career second in career receiving yards with 2423. Michael Omar also set career-high with 10 catches and 114 yards for his first-career 100-yard game.

UMass continued to try and rally all second half. The Minutemen cut the lead to 34-27 as Brad Listorti caught his first pass of the season from four yards out with 4:00 left in regulation.

The Minutemen cut the lead to 34-20 with 1:17 left in the third as Coen hit Jeremy Horne from 30 yards out for the receiver's third TD of the season.

1998 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS


When Mark Whipple was hired as the head coach of the Minutemen on Dec. 16, 1997, he talked about winning a national championship. Few people thought that would happen, and almost no one believed UMass could accomplish the goal in only one season. But by the time the 1998 season concluded, the Minutemen had produced one of the greatest turnarounds in college football history, going from a 2-9 record the year before to a 12-3 mark and the NCAA Division I-AA national title.

The season saw a number of close games for UMass, with nine of the first 13 contests coming down to the final minute or overtime. The Minutemen then posted a dramatic come-from-behind win at Northwestern State in the NCAA semifinals, scoring 20 straight points in the fourth quarter to post a 41-31 victory. In the final game of the season, UMass rolled to a 55-43 win over top-ranked and previously unbeaten Georgia Southern, in a game which was not as close as the final score indicated.

On the way to the national championship, the Minutemen set numerous school records, many of which had stood for decades. Included among the records set were team single season marks for points scored (524), touchdowns (73), total yards (7,074), average yards per play (5.9), passing yards (4,050), completions (306) and first downs (354).

In the end, Whipple and his team, led by senior co-captains Khari Samuel and Kerry Taylor, brought UMass the first national championship in the history of a program which played its first game in 1879. The title was also the first in the history of the Atlantic 10.

Football Legends

Kole Ayi

Linebacker • 1997-2000

One of the top linebackers in school history, Kole Ayi was a two-time first team All-America selection in 1999 and 2000. Also a two-time first team All-Atlantic 10 choice, Ayi led the Minutemen in tackles during his sophomore, junior and senior seasons. One of Ayi's top performances came against Georgia Southern in the 1998 national championship game, when he totaled 16 tackles, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries, one of which he returned for a touchdown. A two-time finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award, and the runner-up in 1999, the former walk-on won the 2000 George "Bulger" Lowe Award from the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston. Ayi finished his career as UMass' all-time leader in career solo tackles with 330, while ranking third in total tackles with 478. He also set the school single-season record for solo tackles with 116 during the 1998 season.

Todd Bankhead

Quarterback • 1998-1999

Todd Bankhead is one of the most prolific passers in school history, setting numerous records in only two seasons, and leading the Minutemen to their first-ever national championship in 1998. A classic pocket passer with great arm speed, Bankhead owns many of the top 10 single game passing marks in school history. He set single-season marks for passing yards (3,919), completions (303), attempts (525) and touchdowns (34) during the 1998 season, then broke the mark for completion percentage (.635) in 1999. Bankhead finished his career with school record totals of 7,018 passing yards, 561 completions, 931 attempts, 51 touchdowns and a .603 completion percentage. A third team All-America selection during the 1998 season, Bankhead also earned second team All-Atlantic 10 honors in both 1998 and 1999. Bankhead went on to play for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League.

Steve Baylark

Tailback • 2003-2006

Steve Baylark was a second-team All-American in 2006 in addition to being the Atlantic 10's Offensive Player of the Year that season in leading UMass to the NCAA Championship game. Baylark became the third back in NCAA history to gain more than 1,000 yards in four seasons. He was just the second UMass player to gain more than 5,000 career yards with 5,332. Baylark rushed for 1,960 yards as a senior in 2006, the second-most in a season in UMass history and he scored 42 touchdowns in his career, including 15 as a senior. Baylark played in the East-West Shrine Game following the campaign and went on to sign with the Arizona Cardinals as a free agent in 2007, where he joined Marcel Shipp, the only player to stand ahead of him on the UMass career rushing lists.

Lou Bush

Halfback • 1931-1933

Lou Bush was UMass' first All-American in football and still holds many UMass records nearly 70 years after his last game as an 'Aggie.' Bush was phenomenal in 1931 and 1932, scoring 39 touchdowns over that span, an average of over two per game. In his first year of collegiate football in 1931, Bush led the nation in touchdowns with 20. Bush finished at UMass with 45 touchdowns, before his career was cut short by an early season injury during his senior campaign. Beside setting UMass season (20) and career (45) marks for touchdowns, Bush also shares the game record, twice scoring five touchdowns (vs. Wagner in 1931 and Cooper Union in 1932). One of his five-touchdown performances led UMass to its largest victory ever, a 77-0 thrashing of Wagner in 1931. Bush was inducted as a charter member of the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1969.

Tony Chambers

End • 1951-1953

Tony Chambers was a 1952 All-American for UMass, making 36 catches for 455 yards and seven touchdowns. Chambers teamed with Noel Reebenaker on what remains one of the most prolific passing teams in UMass history, and was named All-Yankee Conference and All-New England in addition to his All-America honors. While excelling on offense, Chambers' love was on the defensive end of the field, and he played every snap of every game in the 1952 season. Among Chambers' coaches at UMass were baseball coaching legend (and football end coach) Earl Lorden and line coach Chester Gladchuk. Chambers was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1980.

Liam Coen

Quarterback • 2005-2008

Liam Coen graduated from the University of Massachusetts in 2008 holding nearly every passing record, including all career marks for a QB. Coen became the 21st quarterback in FCS history with 10,000 career passing yards in the win over Bryant on Oct. 25, 2008. He finished his UMass days first in passing yards (11,031), passing efficiency (152.92), completion percentage (63.9), touchdown passes (90), completions (830) and attempts (1,303). Among all-time FCS quarterbacks, Coen's 11,031 yards ranks 18th and his 90 touchdown throws stands 20th. Coen led UMass to two conference titles in 2006 and 2007, with postseason NCAA berths in both seasons, including an appearance in the 2006 NCAA championship game. Coen was named a three-time all-conference selection and he was a 2007 and 2008 Walter Payton Award candidate. He enters his first season as the UMass football quarterbacks coach in 2014.

Brian Corcoran

Defensive Lineman • 1991-1994

Brian Corcoran was named the Yankee Conference Defensive Player of the Year and earned second team All-America honors in 1994. He was a two-time All-Yankee Conference First Team selection after leading UMass in sacks as a junior and senior. Corcoran finished his career ranked third on the school's all-time career sack list with 30. When the ice hockey program at UMass was reinstated in 1993-94, Corcoran made the team as a walk-on defenseman. He played three professional seasons in the American Hockey League for the Baltimore Bandits and the Hershey Bears. Corcoran was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team in 1996.

Bernie Dallas**Linebacker • 1963, 1965**

Enthusiasm, unlimited energy, leadership and constant optimism made Bernie Dallas a great athlete and man. Dallas was a two-year letterwinner in football for UMass and earned All-Yankee Conference First Team and All-New England honors. He also served as team captain during his senior season. As a sophomore, Dallas played offensive center and defensive linebacker and was a sparkplug on the undefeated 8-0-1 team that captured the school's first outright Yankee Conference football title. Following his UMass career, Dallas went on to play professionally for the Philadelphia Bulldogs. An automobile accident took Dallas' life on April 29, 1968, but the Dallas Memorial Mall across from the East side of McGuirk Stadium keeps his name and spirit alive. Dallas was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1971.

Bill Durkin**Offensive Lineman • 1989-1993**

Bill Durkin was a first team All-America selection in 1993, when he anchored an offensive line unit which helped UMass post a then-school-record 3,261 rushing yards on the season. Durkin was a two-time All-Yankee Conference First Team pick in 1992 and 1993 while serving as team co-captain in each campaign. He went on to play professionally in the Canadian Football League and the World League of American Football (NFL Europe). Durkin was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team in 1996.

Frederick "Fritz" Ellert**Halfback • 1927-1929**

Frederick "Fritz" Ellert was a three-year letterwinner for coach Charles McGeock's Massachusetts Aggies, earning a spot on the 1929 All-New England Team. Ellert caught a touchdown pass from Ken McKittrick to upset Bates 6-0 in 1928. He also had a 95-yard touchdown run in the season finale against Tufts, a school record for the longest run from scrimmage that stood until 1996. Upon completion of his collegiate athletic career, Ellert became a member of the faculty at UMass. He also coached the men's basketball team for three years (1930-1931, 1932-1933, 1940-1941), posting an 18-16 (.529) mark during this time. He retired from his faculty post in 1970 and was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1971.

Vic Fusia**Head Coach • 1961-1970**

Vic Fusia was the head coach from 1961 through 1970 and led UMass to five Yankee Conference championships. His Redmen had their top season in 1964, when he guided them to their first-ever postseason appearance — the 1964 Tangerine Bowl, where UMass lost a heartbreaker to East Carolina, 14-13. Fusia compiled a 59-32-2 record as head coach and is still the winningest coach in UMass history, 43 years after retiring. He also had an incredible 41-7-1 mark in Yankee Conference games, with his .854 winning percentage in league games standing as the second-best mark in conference history. Fusia produced some of the most outstanding players ever at UMass, including NFL stars Greg Landry and Milt Morin. He also directed the stingiest defense in UMass history in 1963, when Fusia's troops allowed only one touchdown the entire season and a total of only 12 points in nine games. Fusia's teams were always competitive, and nothing illustrates that better than this amazing fact — in 10 seasons at the helm at UMass and over 40 Yankee Conference games, only once did one of his teams lose a conference game by more than seven points. A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Fusia passed away in 1991. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

Harold "Kid" Gore**Quarterback • 1911-1912****Coach • 1919-1927**

Harold "Kid" Gore was a two-year letterwinner at quarterback for the UMass football team and went on to become the first full-time Aggie football coach in 1919. Gore compiled a 33-32-5 (.507) record. His 33 wins still rank as the eighth-best total in UMass history. Gore went on to reinstate the men's basketball and baseball programs to varsity status. He later compiled an 85-53 overall mark while coaching the basketball team for 11 years, the second-longest tenure of any basketball coach in school history. Gore was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1969.

Emory Grayson**End • 1914-1916**

Emory Grayson was one of the most versatile athletes in UMass history. He won eight letters in football, basketball and baseball, while also competing in hockey and track. Grayson played as a backup halfback during his freshman year, alternating between the backfield and the end position. In his junior year, he played in the first game on the new Alumni Field, where Whitmore Administration Building now stands, and helped power Massachusetts Agricultural College to a 26-0 win over Colby. He went on to serve as team captain in his senior season. Grayson was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1969.

Rene Ingoglia**Running Back • 1992-1995**

Rene Ingoglia finished his collegiate career as one of the greatest running backs in UMass history. A two-time all-America selection (1994 and 1995), he became the school and Yankee Conference's all-time leading rusher with 4,624 career yards. In all, Ingoglia completed his four years with 10 UMass school records and two Yankee Conference marks to his credit. He became the first UMass player to average more than 100 yards per game rushing over a career at 112.8. Ingoglia posted 21 career 100+ yard games, three career 200+ yard performances and outrushed the entire opposing team 18 times. He also finished second on the all-time Division I-AA career rushing touchdown list (54, one shy of record), fourth among non-kickers on the all-time I-AA scoring list (332), fifth for I-AA rushing yards and 11th in career rushing yards per game. An All-Yankee Conference First Team selection as a senior in 1995, Ingoglia was one of a handful of Division I-AA players chosen to participate in the 1996 Hula Bowl All-Star Classic. During his junior season, he rushed for a then-Yankee Conference and school single-game record 313 yards against Rhode Island. Ingoglia was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary team, announced in June, 1996. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

Shannon James**Defensive Back • 2002-2005**

Shannon James was a two-time first team All-American in 2004 and 2005. He was honored as the Atlantic 10 Defensive Player of the Year in 2004. James was a superior safety as he set the UMass record for career interceptions with 20. During his junior and seniors seasons, James was the career active leader in interception for all NCAA divisions. He tied the school record for pick-offs in a season with eight in 2004. James also finished as the seventh all-time leading tackler in UMass history with 341. He stands fourth in solo stops with 253. James was invited to Baltimore Ravens training camp in 2006 and starred with the Calgary Stampeders (CFL) from 2006-09. He currently plays for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

Bruce Kimball**Offensive Guard • 1975-1978**

Bruce Kimball was a two-time first team All-America selection on the offensive line for the Minutemen. At his right offensive guard position, Kimball anchored a UMass line that helped the Minutemen rush for over 3,000 yards in 1978 - a school record at the time - on their way to the Division I-AA national championship game. Three different players on the squad rushed for over 500 yards, including Dennis Dent with 1,139. Kimball played a couple of seasons in the Canadian Football League and went on to play for both the New York Giants and the Washington Redskins, playing in Super Bowl XVIII with the Redskins in 1984. One of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary Team, announced in June, 1996. Kimball was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000.

Greg Landry**Quarterback • 1965-1967**

Greg Landry is one of the greatest quarterbacks in UMass history. Behind his golden arm and running ability, UMass won two Yankee Conference Beanpots in three years. Landry led the team in passing all three years, and led in rushing and scoring in 1965 and 1967. Landry's quarterback efficiency rating of 145.4 in 1965 is the fifth-best mark in school history to date. He also shared the single-game mark for highest completion percentage (.800). Landry went on to be a successful pro player, spending 14 years in the NFL with the Detroit Lions and the Baltimore Colts, including a season as an All-Pro for Detroit in 1971, when he started for the NFC in the Pro Bowl. Landry also had a stint with the Chicago Blitz in the now-defunct USFL. Landry later served as an assistant coach for his former team, the Detroit Lions, after spending several years on the coaching staff at the University of Illinois. He was the offensive coordinator for the Chicago Bears when they won Super Bowl XX. Landry was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary Team, announced in June of 1996. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1980.

Joe Lojko**Quarterback • 1931-1933**

UMass went 19-6-1 while Joe Lojko was the starting quarterback for Massachusetts State College's single-wing offensive attack that ranked among the best in New England. In addition to playing football for three years, Lojko earned three letters in basketball and two in baseball. He served as team captain of the 1933-1934 basketball team that compiled a 12-0 record, the only major New England school to ever have an undefeated basketball season. His game-winning basket against Amherst College helped preserve the unblemished record. Lojko died in a tragic automobile accident on April 27, 1934, in South Deerfield, Mass., less than two months from his graduation day. Lojko was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1970.

Dick MacPherson**Head Coach • 1971-1977**

Dick MacPherson took over the helm of the Minutemen from Vic Fusia in 1971, and proceeded to lead UMass to four Yankee Conference championships during his seven-year tenure. Between 1971 and 1977, MacPherson compiled a 45-27-1 record and led UMass to its only postseason bowl victory. MacPherson's 1972 squad, featuring receivers Tim Berra and Steve Schubert, and Peil Pennington at quarterback, defeated the University of California-Davis, 35-14, in the 1972 Boardwalk Bowl. His squads also posted a 28-8-1 mark in Yankee Conference games, with his .778 league winning percentage ranking as the fifth-best in conference history. After leaving UMass, MacPherson went on to a successful tour with Syracuse (1981-1990), leading the Orangemen to five postseason bowls, including his undefeated 1987 squad's Sugar Bowl appearance. He also had a two-year stint as head coach of the New England Patriots (1991-1992). He was inducted into the UMass Hall of Fame in 2004.

Ed McAleney**Defensive Lineman • 1972-1975**

Ed McAleney earned first team all-America honors from his defensive end spot in 1975. He was also a three-time first team All-Yankee Conference selection during his career with UMass. In his freshman campaign, McAleney was a member of the 1972 squad that downed California-Davis, 35-14, at the Boardwalk Bowl. McAleney was also a two-time captain for the Minutemen in 1974 and 1975. Following his collegiate career, McAleney spent seven seasons with the Calgary Stampeders in the Canadian Football League (1977-1983). McAleney was one of six Minutemen named to the Yankee Conference 50th Anniversary Team in 1996. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003.

Bob Meers**End • 1963-1965**

Bob Meers was a three-year letterwinner in football, earning All-Yankee Conference and All-New England honors in each of his three seasons. By the time he left UMass, Meers held school marks for career (82) and single-season receptions (39), shared the record for most receptions in a game (nine) and ranked second in receiving yards in a game (146), career receiving yards (1,104), single-season receiving yards per game (58.9) and career receiving yards per game (40.9). A tri-captain of the 1965 team, Meers was a seventh-round pick of the Minnesota Vikings in the 1966 NFL Draft. Meers was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999.

Milt Morin**End • 1963-1965**

Milt Morin, an all-American in 1964 and 1965, was one of the most versatile athletes ever to play for UMass. While catching enough passes to place him eighth on the career receiving yards list and setting the record at the time, he also excelled on defense and was the team's placekicker his senior year. In addition to his action on the gridiron, Morin was the New England heavyweight wrestling champion in 1965 and played for Dick Garber on the varsity lacrosse team. Morin was a key part of two Yankee Conference championship teams and saw UMass compile a 23-4-1 record in his three seasons, including a 14-1 Yankee Conference mark. Morin went on to play 10 seasons professionally for the Cleveland Browns between 1966 and 1975 and played in three Pro Bowls (1966, 1968 and 1969). He is eighth in Browns' all-time history with 4,208 receiving yards. Morin was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1970.

Garry Pearson**Running Back • 1979-1982**

Garry Pearson was a two-time first team all-American (1981 and 1982) for the Minutemen and helped UMass to three Yankee Conference titles in his four seasons. He set new standards for running backs at UMass in his four-year tenure. Spending only three seasons in the backfield, Pearson graduated as the school's career leader in rushing (3,859) and all-purpose (5,277) yardage. During his freshman year, Pearson was used almost exclusively to return kicks, before becoming a starting running back as a sophomore. Pearson capped off his UMass career in spectacular fashion, rushing for a then-record 288 yards against American International College in his final collegiate game. He was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001.

Bob Pickett**Head Coach • 1978-1983**

In his first season as a head coach in 1978, Bob Pickett led UMass to a berth in the first-ever NCAA Division I-AA Championship Game. UMass lost to Florida A&M, 35-28 at the Pioneer Bowl in Wichita Falls, Texas, but on the way to the championship game, the Minutemen routed previously unbeaten and No. 1-ranked Nevada-Reno on its home turf. For his accomplishments that season, Pickett was named coach of the year by the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston and the ECAC, while the team earned the Lambert Cup (given to the best Division I-AA team in the East) and was named ECAC Team of the Year. In his six-year tour as head coach, Pickett compiled a 36-28 record and led the Minutemen to four Yankee Conference titles. Pickett went on to serve as an associate athletic director at UMass, retiring from that position in the summer of 1997. He also served as a color commentator on radio broadcasts of Minuteman football games from 1998-2003.

Noel Reebenacker**Quarterback • 1951-1953**

Noel Reebenacker was a walk-on quarterback who earned three varsity letters in football. He was tabbed All-Yankee Conference in 1952 and named to the Little All-America Team in 1953. Upon the completion of his UMass career, Reebenacker had established school single-season records for passing yards (1,865), completions (132), touchdown passes (20) and total offensive yards (2,080), in addition to recording the longest kickoff return in school history with a 102-yard scamper against Springfield College in 1951. Reebenacker later worked at UMass as the backfield coach for two years under coach Charles O'Rourke. Reebenacker was inducted into the UMass Athletic Hall of Fame in 1982.

Khari Samuel**Linebacker • 1995-1998**

Khari Samuel was a first team all-American and Atlantic 10 All-Conference First Team selection who helped lead the Minutemen to their first-ever national championship in 1998. He was one of the best all-around defensive players in school history, able to stuff the run, put pressure on the quarterback and drop off into coverage. Samuel finished his career as UMass' all-time leader in solo tackles with 328, while ranking second in total tackles (495), fourth in assisted tackles (167) and seventh in sacks (19). As a senior in 1998, he recorded the second-highest single-season total in school history for solo tackles (113), while ranking third on the list for total tackles (160). Samuel also served as a team captain in 1997 and 1998 and received the 1998 George "Bulger" Lowe Award from the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston as the best Division I defensive player in New England. Following the completion of his collegiate career, Samuel was selected by the Chicago Bears in the fifth round of the 1999 NFL Draft.

Marcel Shipp**Running Back • 1997-2000**

One of the top running backs in the history of Division I-AA football, Marcel Shipp was a two-time first team all-America selection for the Minutemen in 1998 and 1999. Shipp rushed for 200 or more yards in a single game seven times during his UMass career, including a 244-yard, three-touchdown performance to lead the Minutemen over Georgia Southern in the 1998 national championship game. Only the 12th player in school history to earn first team all-conference honors three times, Shipp finished his career as the all-time leading rusher in the history of the Atlantic 10 Conference with 6,250 yards. He also set UMass career records for carries (1,215), rushing yards per game (130.2), rushing touchdowns (58), all-purpose yards (7,759), all-purpose plays (1,365), all-purpose yards per game (161.1), points scored (378) and touchdowns scored (63). Shipp spent seven seasons as part of the Arizona Cardinals organization from 2001-07. He enters his first season as the UMass football running backs coach in 2014.

Mark Whipple**Head Coach • 1998-2003**

Mark Whipple led UMass to its first NCAA championship in football, capturing the title in his first season with the Minutemen in 1998. Whipple went on to coach UMass for six seasons compiling a 49-26 overall record for a 65.3 win percentage. Whipple coached UMass to three Atlantic 10 Championships, winning crowns in 1998, 1999 and 2003. He left Amherst in 2004 to serve as quarterbacks coach with the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers, where they won Super Bowl XL in 2006. He went on to serve as an offensive assistant with the Philadelphia Eagles (2007-08) before returning to the college ranks at Miami (Fla.) for two seasons from 2009-10. Whipple was the quarterbacks coach for the Cleveland Browns from 2011-12. He is set to make his return to the University of Massachusetts as the football program's head coach in 2014.

McGuirk Stadium

Recognized as one of the Northeast's finest I-AA football facilities, Warren P. McGuirk Alumni Stadium served as the home of Minuteman football from 1965-2011. With a capacity of 17,000 fans, McGuirk Stadium was a definite home field advantage for UMass over the years as the Minutemen posted an impressive 172-79-2 (.685) record and 17 Yankee Conference/Atlantic 10/CAA Conference titles.

In 2008, UMass installed permanent lighting, which led to the second all-time single-season average attendance mark of 12,383. The record of 12,811 was set in the NCAA Championship year of 1998.

Playing on the new FieldTurf surface in 2006, UMass set a school record with a perfect 8-0 record at home with a pair of wins at McGuirk Stadium in the NCAA Tournament. The Minutemen beat Lafayette, 35-14 on Nov. 25 in the First Round. Then, playing before the first sell-out since 1973, UMass downed arch-rival New Hampshire, 24-17 on Dec. 2, 2006 in front of 17,000 fans.

Built by the UMass Building Authority at a cost of \$1.4 million (and at no cost to the Commonwealth's taxpayers), the structure was designed by the New York firm of Skidmore, Owings and Merrill. On August 27, 1964, the H.P. Madore Company of Southbridge, Mass., began construction on the facility. In May of 1965, the field was blanketed with pure Merion Blue Grass that had been planted by the University's agronomy department four years earlier. The turf was laid on four inches of loam and a 10-inch sand base.

In the summer of 2006 a new FieldTurf surface was laid making the field playable all-year round. Permanent lighting was installed in the summer of 2008.

Alumni Stadium hosted its first game on September 25, 1965, with the Redmen beating American International College (AIC), 41-0. The stadium was officially dedicated on October 16, 1965, when UMass defeated Rhode Island 30-7 in a Homecoming contest. On November 3, 1984 — nearly 20 years after the opening of Alumni Stadium — the facility was rededicated in honor of Warren McGuirk, the school's athletic director for 23 years, during whose tenure the stadium was built.

The stadium is the site of UMass' graduation ceremonies, and has served as host of the 1987 NCAA Women's Soccer Championship and the Lacrosse North-South Senior All-Star Game.

Beginning in 2014, UMass will split home contests between Gillette Stadium and McGuirk Stadium. Major renovations to McGuirk Stadium include a new press box and field house, which will contain all support features for the football program. These renovations began in January 2013 and were completed in July 2014.
