

POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL CHAMPIONS



When WKU announced it would be moving to Conference USA beginning with the 2014-15 athletic year, the athletic department knew it would get every league member's best shot as the "new kid on the block."

WKU Athletics delivered in historic and record-setting fashion this year, putting together the best all-around year of all 14 C-USA members in terms of conference competition, postseason play and academics.

CONFERENCE COMPETITION

WKU won eight C-USA championships, a bowl game and a men's swimming and diving conference invitational title in 2014-15, and the eight total league championships tied the C-USA record for its 20-year history (Tulsa, 8; 2011-12).

WKU's volleyball, women's basketball and softball programs all won both the conference regular-season and tournament titles, and the Hilltopper Indoor Track and Field and Lady Topper Outdoor Track and Field programs also captured C-USA championships.

The overall success of the athletic department in 2014-15 also earned WKU a league-high point total in all-sports rankings, marking the second-straight year WKU has won an all-sports title. Using a formula that awards the most points for a first-place conference finish, the second-most points for a second-place finish and so on, across all league-sponsored sports, WKU topped Rice for the most points in C-USA after winning the 2014 Bubas Cup all-sports title in its final year in the Sun Belt Conference.

In addition, WKU student-athletes won 55 C-USA Player of the Week awards in 2014-15, the most in the conference and topping second-place Rice by 16 awards.

POSTSEASON PLAY

With volleyball, women's basketball and softball all winning C-USA Tournament titles and participating in the NCAA Tournament, WKU was one of just 12 programs in the nation to have all three programs play in the NAAs. The three programs combined for 94 wins in 2014-15, which was the second-highest victory total among the 12 programs.

The 12 programs with volleyball, women's basketball and softball all playing in the NCAA Tournament, with combined win totals, are Florida State (107), WKU (94), Washington (94), BYU (92), North Carolina (91), Texas (88), Oklahoma (86), Arizona State (83), Texas A&M (82), LSU (81), Kentucky (80) and Nebraska (78).

By becoming bowl eligible for the fourth-straight season in 2014, the WKU Football program holds the longest bowl-eligible streak in C-USA. The win in the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl gave WKU its second-straight eight-win season behind the strength of the nation's fourth-best offense.

ACADEMICS

WKU saw 56 student-athletes receive 2015 C-USA Commissioner's Academic Medals for having a grade point average of 3.75 or higher, the most of any school in the league.

WKU saw each of its teams achieve an Academic Progress Rate score of 947 or higher in the NCAA's latest APR release, all exceeding the NCAA-mandated 930 score by at least 17 points.

WORKING CREDENTIALS: To request credentials, contact the Athletics Media Relations (AMR) office. All requests should be made as early as possible and should be limited to working press only. Requests made on gameday will not be approved. Working space in the Houchens-Smith Stadium press box is limited and a photo work room is available on the ground level for credentialed photographers.

Credentials will be screened and issued on a priority basis, with national publications, daily newspapers, wire services, originating radio and television networks, television tape crews and student newspapers from WKU and the visiting school receiving top priority. Requests from weekly newspaper, internet publications, and radio stations that cover WKU and the visiting team will be honored on a space-available basis. Requests for credentials will be reviewed on a case-by-case, year-by-year basis.

The Athletic Media Relations office has the final authority on whether any individuals from any organization will be issued media credentials. Complimentary tickets are not provided to the media.

Spouses, dates, equipment carriers and non-working members of the media are restricted from the pressbox, sidelines and interview areas. Any abuse of a credential to a WKU athletic event will result in the immediate removal of the media member from the event as well as the agency losing credential privileges for the remainder of the season.

MEDIA WILL-CALL: If not received by mail, credentials may be picked up at the media "Will Call" table, located next to the press box elevators on the lower level of the east side of the stadium between gates 4 and 5. Please be mindful that parking passes cannot be picked up at will-call and must be received prior to gameday.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Credentials for photographers will be issued on the basis of circulation, with priority granted to agencies covering the participating schools on a regular basis. Credentials will not be issued to freelance photographers unless they are employed by a reputable publication or the AMR office of the participating schools. Per NCAA rule, images or likeness of current student-athletes may not be sold, distributed or used for commercial purposes.

SIDELINE AREAS: Excluding select portions of the game, media sideline access is reserved for photographers/videographers. Credentialed photographers/videographers who arrive at media "Will Call" without proper equipment will not be granted sideline access. When on the sideline, media must remain outside the bench area. This includes during pre-game activities.

FIELD AND LOCKER ROOM ACCESS: Photographers are allowed access to the playing field at only two points throughout the course of the event: when the Hilltoppers enter the field immediately prior to kickoff and immediately following the game.

WKU's locker room is closed at all times.

RECRUITS: Per NCAA rule, media are not permitted to have contact with a prospect or family members of a prospect during their visit (official or unofficial) to campus, including prospects in attendance at practice or games. Contact includes in-person conversations, phone calls, text messages, e-mails, etc. Media are also asked to make every effort to keep distance from prospects on campus, including at practice, during pre-game activities on the sidelines and in the stands.

GAMEDAY SERVICES: Members of the media covering WKU will be provided with pregame notes for both teams, a game program and a flipcard. Statistics and a running play-by-play will be handed out after each quarter. Approximately 30 minutes following the completion of the game, a final statistical book, including complete team and individual stats, running play-by-play and postgame quotes from players and coaches, will be available. The first run of books will be given directly to the visiting SID.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS: For home games, Coach Jeff Brohm will hold a postgame news conference with the media in the team meeting room of Harbaugh Hall. AMR office representatives will be available to assist in postgame interviews. A member of the AMR staff will accompany members of the press wishing to go to the sidelines, beginning with five minutes remaining in the final quarter.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE: Coach Brohm holds a weekly press conference each Monday during the season, beginning at 11:30 a.m. (CT), in the Paul Just Media Center inside E.A. Diddle Arena. Select players will also be available at the weekly presser. For media members unable to attend, a teleconference line is available. Contact Kyle Neaves for more information.

PRACTICES: WKU football practices are open to media Tuesday and Wednesday for periods 1 through 4. Video is permitted for individual drills only during the open periods, although media may be alerted of other portions that are not available for video. Media should remain on the concrete strip on the East side of the stadium for photo and video purposes. Requests for players and assistants should be made by 11 a.m. on the day of practice.

DIRECTIONS TO WKU

From I-65 North (heading south): Take the first Bowling Green exit (exit 28) onto US 31-W. Follow the signs for US 31-W South -- Bowling Green. Stay on the four-lane US 31-W South (Louisville Road) to the stop light at the bridge over Barren River. Continue straight through the light. When the one-way streets merge into the four-lane University Blvd., you will be on the NW corner of the Western Kentucky University campus (railroad on right, WKU on left).

From I-65 South (heading north): Take the second Bowling Green exit (exit 22) onto Scottsville Road and follow it all the way down to the 31-W intersection. Take a left at the light and follow 31-W down to the roundabout and exit right onto University Blvd. WKU's athletic facilities will be located on your right coming up the road.

From US 68-80 West (heading east): Follow US 68-80 (Russellville Road) into Bowling Green. You will pass under a railroad overpass (with its "Welcome to Western" sign) and turn left onto University Blvd. The athletics complex will then be on your right -- first Nick Denes Field (baseball), then Houchens Industries-L.T. Smith Stadium. The Arena/Stadium Parking Lot and E.A. Diddle Arena will be on your right just past the Stadium.

From the Natcher Parkway (heading south): Take the first Bowling Green exit (US 231, exit 9) and turn right onto Morgantown Road (US 231) into Bowling Green. You will cross Veterans Memorial Lane and pass Warren Central High School (on the right). When you reach the junction of US 231 and US 68-80 (Holley Corporation on your right and Arby's straight ahead), turn left onto Russellville Road and follow the directions for US 68-80 above from the railroad overpass ("Welcome to WKU" sign) on in to Diddle Arena/Smith Stadium.

L.T. SMITH

The stadium is named for the late L.T. Smith, who came to WKU in 1920 and established the industrial arts curriculum on campus. Smith headed that department until 1957 when he took over as administrator of the WKU Physical Plant. In 1963, Smith was named the Coordinator of New Construction, a post he held until his retirement in 1965.

In addition to his other duties, Smith coached the Hilltoppers in 1920 and 1921 and the men's basketball team during the 1921-22 campaign. He was instrumental in bringing the legendary E.A. Diddle, a member of both the Naismith and Helms Foundation Basketball Halls of Fame, to The Hill to take over the coaching duties in 1922.

Smith, a member of the Ohio Valley Conference Hall of Fame, also served as chairman of the school's Athletic Committee almost continuously from the time he helped form it in 1922 until his retirement in 1965.

HOUCHENS-SMITH STADIUM

Houchens-Smith Stadium and Jimmy Feix Field has been home to the Hilltoppers for over 40 years, although the facility has seen several phases of improvements since WKU played its first game there on September 21, 1968.

In 2008, the stadium underwent a major \$50 million expansion project, resulting in new locker rooms, meeting rooms, weight rooms, and training rooms.

Ahead of the Conference USA move, the Hilltoppers also installed a brand new FieldTurf surface, complete with black endzones as voted on by WKU fans on WKUSports.com. The turf features FieldTurf's most advanced fill technology with player safety as the foremost concern.

FEIX FIELD

Jimmy Feix was WKU's first football All-American as a quarterback in 1952 and took over the head coaching job in 1968, leading Hilltopper football to some of its greatest seasons, concluding his illustrious 16-year stint at the helm with a school-record 106 wins.

The field inside Houchens-Smith stadium was named in his honor at the beginning of the 1991 season. Feix enjoyed a career in professional football before a four-year career in the armed forces. Feix returned to The Hill in 1957 as an assistant football coach. He passed away on October 5, 2014 at the age of 83.





THE HILLTOPPER NICKNAME

The evolution of the name 'Hilltoppers' is obvious to those who have seen the WKU campus.

The operations of Western Kentucky State Normal School were moved from the site of its forerunner, Southern Normal School, to a commanding hill in the southwestern portion of Bowling Green on Feb. 4, 1911. The move was completed as the entire student body marched to the new site, carrying various articles of school equipment along the way.

Since the summit of 'The Hill' rises 232 feet above nearby Barren River and the comparatively level plain that surrounds the hill, it was only natural that the student-athletes who represented the institution come to be known as 'Hilltoppers'.

Still, the name did not come into use until the 1925-26 school year. Prior to that, WKU's athletic teams were commonly referred to as the 'Pedagogues' or 'Teachers'.

On the sidelines, former college star, NFL player and WKU assistant coach, Terry Obee, provides a unique perspective as well as interviewing the Hilltoppers following the game.

Lee has served as the lead network play-by-play since 2007, after spending five years on the broadcast team at Nebraska. Lee has been on the call for every major historical event in the Hilltoppers' FBS history, including consecutive wins over Kentucky, WKU's first FBS win as well as their first bowl game as members of college football's highest division. Lee also serves as the host of the Jeff Brohm weekly radio show as well as the Hilltopper pre-game show.

Peckenpaugh is a 1974 and 1996 graduate of WKU and has served as the color analyst on the broadcast since 2002. As a Hilltopper quarterback, he garnered All-Ohio Valley Conference honors in 1971 and was also elected to the Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001.

Obee, who joined the team in 2013, is a current professor in the Kinesiology, Recreation and Sport department on The Hill, a post he assumed following his retirement as a collegiate football coach. Obee spent eight seasons in the NFL from 1990 to 1997, following a stand-out career at Oregon. He was the wide receivers coach for the Hilltoppers in 2010 and 2011.

DOUGHTY RETURNS

After receiving a medical hardship waiver for the 2012 season, the nation's leader in passing yards and touchdowns in 2014, Brandon Doughty, returns for a sixth year and third as a starter. Doughty enters 2015 as the FBS active career leader in Passing Yards (7,800) and Touchdown Passes (63) while ranking among the top three in Pass Completions (635), Completion Percentage (66.8), Total Offense (7,637), Passing Efficiency (152.27), Pass Attempts (951) and Passing Yards per Game (260.0).

1,500 AND BEYOND

WKU has had a running back reach the 1,500 yard mark in each of the last five seasons, becoming just the second program in NCAA history to have a 1,500-yard rusher in five-consecutive seasons. WKU is joined on the list Northern Illinois (2002-06). The Hilltoppers passed Oregon (2009-12) and USC (1978-81) when Leon Allen went over 1,500 in the bowl game.

WHAT A DEBUT - NOW THE ENCORE

In his first season as head coach, Jeff Brohm led WKU to a number of program firsts as the Hilltoppers shattered the record books for the second consecutive season offensively. Brohm's offense set or tied 49 school and conference records, both as a team and individually, and broke 50 records overall.

The Tops defeated their first ranked opponent as a member of the FBS (No. 19 Marshall), won their first FBS bowl game (Popeyes Bahamas Bowl), and won at least eight games in consecutive seasons for the first time since 2003-2004.

So, what's left? Plenty.

WKU has yet to win a conference championship at the FBS level and has not won double-digit games since the Division 1-AA National Championship season in 2002 saw the Tops go 12-3. WKU shared the Gateway Conference title that season and last won an outright league championship as members of the Ohio Valley Conference in 2000.

TOPS IN CONFERENCE USA

WKU has won seven or more games in four consecutive seasons, the longest active streak in the league. The Hilltoppers also own a five-game winning streak, another league best. And, over the past three seasons, only Marshall (28) has won more combined games than WKU's 23.

WKU was also the first program in 17 years to break their league's single-game passing (Brandon Doughty, 593) and rushing record (Leon Allen, 345) in the same season (Kent State, MAC, 1997).

4,500 AND 1,5000

Without a doubt, the Hilltoppers love to pass the ball, but they also accomplished something in 2014 no one in the history of college football has ever done and it involved the running game. WKU became the first FBS Team with a 4,500 yd passer and 1,500 yd rusher as QB Brandon Doughty threw for 4,830 and RB Leon Allen rushed for 1,542.

WKU was just the fourth team in FBS history to have a 4,000-yard passer and 1,500-yard rusher in the same season. Baylor (2011), Tulsa (2008) and Oregon State (2003) are the only programs in FBS history to have two individuals hit those marks in the same season.

Their 6,372 combined yards were also the most in FBS history of the teams to accomplish the feat, 532 more yards than RGIII and Terrance Ganaway from Baylor in 2011 during RGIII's Heisman winning season.

GROUP OF FIVE - GROUP OF EIGHT

WKU is one of eight so-called 'Group of Five' programs and one of just 32 teams in the FBS to win seven or more games in four consecutive seasons. Since the 2011 season, these G5 teams have also had four-straight seven-plus win seasons, in order by total number of wins: Northern Illinois (46), Boise State (43), Cincinnati (38), Louisiana-Lafayette (36), Arkansas State (35), Toledo (34), and San Diego State (32).

STARTING AND GAME EXPERIENCE RETURNS

With 16 total starters returning from last year's starting lineup in the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl (seven offense, nine defense), WKU ranks No. 16 nationally in total starters returning, good for second in Conference USA - tied with FIU.

Overall, WKU returns 231 total games of starting experience, the most in all of Conference USA, according to CFB Matrix. CFB Matrix also has WKU No. 3 in the league, just behind Rice at No. 2, in terms of returning game experience by underclassman, meaning the Tops are built for more than just a senior-laden run in 2015.

CONSISTENTLY CONSISTENT

Since Jeff Brohm has been on the sidelines at WKU, the Hilltoppers have had a lead in all but one game, a span of 25 games over the past two seasons.

WKU's run of 2,000-yard all-purpose performers over the past four seasons is an FBS first and puts WKU in a rare category of having five such players in program history, a mark bested by only Utah State with six. Northern Illinois, Toledo and Tulsa also have five players who have eclipsed 2,000 all-purpose yards in a single season.



By winning eight games for a second-straight season and securing the program's first FBS bowl victory, WKU solidified itself as one of college football's most consistent 'Group of Five' teams during its thrilling 2014 season. First-year head coach Jeff Brohm was the mastermind behind the most dominant Hilltopper offense ever, a unit that ranked fourth nationally with 534 yards per game and combined to break 49 single-season and single-game WKU records. Entering 2015, the Hilltoppers are the lone Conference USA team with four consecutive seven-win seasons and come in as one of 32 programs across the FBS with that accomplishment on their resume.

Brohm gets the nation's best signal caller, Brandon Doughty, back to run his high-powered offense. Doughty shattered WKU and Conference USA records in his second season under Brohm's direction and was granted a sixth-year of eligibility by the NCAA in December. The Davie, Fla. native led the nation with 4,830 yards and 49 touchdown passes in 2014 and returns the majority of his weapons in an offense that is primed for another explosive campaign in 2015.

Seven offensive starters return for the Brohm Squad in 2015, including leading rusher Leon Allen, Doughty's top-two wide receivers Jared Dangerfield and Taywan Taylor, along with offensive linemen Forrest Lamp, Brandon Ray and Darrell Williams. Nine starters return from last year's WKU defense that had its growing pains but forced pivotal turnovers that were crucial in the Hilltoppers' eight wins.

WKU has clearly established itself as a winner at the FBS level. The Hilltoppers have been to a pair of bowl games, they won the inaugural Popeyes Bahama Bowl last season and are riding the momentum of back-to-back eight-win seasons. There won't be any "new kid on the block" talk in 2015. In fact, WKU is listed as the Conference USA favorite by many preseason publications. With Brohm emerging as one of college football's premier young coaches, Doughty returning at quarterback to lead a relentless offense and an experienced defensive aiming to prove itself, the Hilltoppers know what the next step is: a conference championship.

THE OFFENSE

Quarterback

It all starts with No. 12.

Coming off one of the best seasons by a quarterback in college football history, Brandon Doughty is back to call the shots for WKU's high-octane attack. Only five quarterbacks since 1956 have thrown more touchdowns than Doughty's 49 in 2014 and only 15 have thrown for more yards than his 4,830. He enters 2015 as the FBS active career leader in yards (7,800) and touchdown passes (63), and also ranks second in completions (635) and completion percentage (66.8).

Doughty flourished in his second season in the same meeting room as Brohm and his offseason improvement was apparent from the get-go in 2014. He set the tone for his monster campaign in the season-opener against Bowling Green with 569 yards and six touchdowns. Doughty went on to eclipse the 300-yard marker 10 times and threw at least five touchdowns on five separate occasions. He broke a C-USA single-game record with 593 yards at Middle Tennessee, set a FBS record for touchdown passes in a road game with eight scoring tosses in WKU's thrilling, 67-66 win at No. 19 Marshall

and was named the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Offensive MVP after thrashing Central Michigan for 486 yards and five touchdowns.

After WKU started the season 3-5 and a postseason berth looked bleak, the Sammy Baugh Award winner was near flawless down the stretch. He was the driving force behind five-straight WKU wins to close the season as he completed nearly 70 percent of his passes, accounted for 1,825 yards and threw 24 touchdowns compared to just two interceptions during the winning-streak.

How does one improve on that kind of production? Doughty hit the weight room for extensive training with assistant strength coach Domenic Reno, who has multiple NFL seasons under his belt to go along with his training of Super Bowl MVP Eli Manning of the New York Giants. Doughty will use his improved strength and agility to captain a 2015 offense that returns four of his top five receiving targets from last year, a veteran offensive line and a bruising rusher in Leon Allen.

Redshirt junior Nelson Fishback and redshirt freshman Drew Eckels will battle for the understudy role behind Doughty. Fishback did not see action in 2014 but played relevant snaps in 2013 while Eckels used his rookie season to absorb WKU's complex offense under Brohm and Doughty's direction.

Offensive Line

Much like 2014, WKU's offensive line will feature a unique combination of youthful experience. Two-time All-Conference tackle Forrest Lamp, a junior, anchors an experienced unit that does not feature a single senior in the starting mix.

Lamp protected the blind side of Doughty during his record-shattering season and as a unit, WKU's offensive line produced the first 4,500-yard passing and 1,500-yard rushing duo in FBS history. The Hilltopper offense broke 49 single-game and single-season records behind the line's protection, which included the top single-game individual passing and rushing performances in Conference USA history.

Brandon Ray was a Freshman All-American at left guard for the Hilltoppers and his pulling ability beside Lamp was a major factor in Leon Allen's 1,542 rushing yards. Darrell Williams started 10 games at right guard last year and returns for his junior season, but WKU will be tasked with filling the shoes of long-time right tackle Cam Clemmons. Matt Nord and Joe Manley, who both earned significant snaps as sophomores, will battle for positions on the offensive line rotation. Max Halpin, who missed 10 games due to injury in 2014, is expected to return healthy at center.

Running Back

Gone are the days where a WKU running back gets 40 carries a game, but synonymous still are the Hilltoppers and 1,500-yard rushers. WKU has transitioned from a Power-I offense, to a power spread and now to a straight spread under its last three head coaches. Differing offensive philosophies have not affected the numbers produced by Hilltopper running backs.

Leon Allen rushed for 1,542 yards in his first season as the Hilltoppers' primary running back, making WKU just the second team in FBS history to have an individual rusher eclipse 1,500 rushing yards in five-consecutive seasons. Despite featuring a high-flying attack in 2014, WKU's ability



to churn out yardage on the ground was essential in its five-game winning streak to close the season. Led by two 200-yard rushing games from Allen, WKU gashed its final five opponents for 1,195 yards (209.8 pg) to supplement Doughty and his explosive receivers.

Allen set a C-USA single-game record with 345 rushing yards in a win over Army and two weeks later, he piled up 237 yards in WKU's win at No. 19 Marshall. His versatility as a pass catcher made him even more of a matchup nightmare for opposing linebackers as he hauled in 51 receptions for 476 yards and three touchdowns to go along with his 13 rushing scores.

Redshirt junior Anthony Wales provided WKU with a change-of-pace presence in the backfield last year, rushing for 518 yards and five touchdowns behind Allen. He and redshirt freshman D'Andre Ferby round out what should be another highly-productive backfield for the Hilltoppers in 2015.

The 6-foot, 235-pound Allen could be the x-factor in just how dominant WKU's offense will be this fall. If he's rolling, the Hilltoppers are as close to unstoppable as you get on the offensive side of the ball.

Wide Receivers/Tight Ends

WKU fielded its strongest wide receiver corps in program history last season and the majority of that nucleus returns in 2015. Long known for their ground-and-pound style and durable running backs, the Hilltoppers flipped the script on opponents in 2014 and lit up the scoreboard with their aerial attack.

Not much should change on that front as Doughty will still be throwing the passes to a loaded group of receivers. Senior Jared Dangerfield re-wrote the WKU record books during his first season on The Hill, setting a WKU single-season record with 69 receptions and tying a single-season record with 11 touchdown grabs. Fellow junior college transfer Antwane Grant was also dynamite for the Tops, hauling in 41 receptions for 509 yards and six touchdowns.

Sophomore Taywan Taylor exploded after a solid rookie campaign, racking up 767 yards and seven touchdowns on 45 catches. He was WKU's clear home run hitter, hauling in 13 receptions of 20+ yards and six touchdown catches of 30 yards or longer.

Another offseason to improve can only mean defensive coordinators across the league have to have their secondary ready when they face the Hilltoppers passing attack in 2015. Of WKU's 378 receptions and 4,866 passing yards last season, 70-percent of the receptions and 68-percent of the yards return.

Rising junior Nicholas Norris, who has shown an ability to turn a screen pass into a big gainer, may find time to fill the void Willie McNeal and Joel German leave while rising sophomore and former Kentucky Mr. Football Nacarius Fant got valuable game experience as a true freshman and could also be a heavy favorite to fill the vacant positions.

WKU loses a staple at tight end in Mitchell Henry, now with the Green Bay Packers, but returns redshirt senior Tyler Higbee, who has flashed brilliance at points in his career.

Higbee was one of many unsung heroes in the Hilltoppers' 67-66 win at No. 19 Marshall. In WKU's disruption of the Herd's bid for an undefeated season, Higbee accounted for 99 yards and three touchdowns on six receptions.

Higbee, who converted from wide receiver to tight end in 2013, will lead the lone offensive position group without a wealth of experience in 2015. WKU will pull the redshirt off 2014 signee Nick True, a Kentuckian who had the benefit of learning under coach Ryan Wallace, Henry and Higbee last season. Converted wideout Deon Yelder and linebacker Shaquille Johnson will also be called on to contribute as the season progresses. A former star for WKU on the hardwood, local product George Fant will give it a go on the gridiron for the Hilltoppers this fall and could end up being a serious threat with his size and athletic ability.

THE DEFENSE

Defensive Line

A defensive line that entered 2014 with plenty of question marks now heads into 2015 with the experience and depth that was missing a year ago. All six leading tacklers from last year's line return, as do WKU's top four sack leaders from 2014. Throw in experienced transfers Jontavious Morris, Sidney Hammond and Omar Bryant, and the Hilltoppers have what should be their deepest defensive line since 2012.

At the forefront is redshirt senior defensive end Gavin Rocker, who led all defensive linemen with 45 tackles and 5.5 sacks in 2014. Youngsters Derik Overstreet and Tanner Reeves emerged as reliable pass rushers opposite Rocker a year ago and bring a year of experience to the table this season.

Overstreet was named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team after racking up 31 tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss and a pair of sacks in his final seven games of the season. He entrenched himself in the starting lineup at the halfway point of 2014 and WKU went 6-1 with him as a starter, culminating in a Bahamas Bowl Defensive MVP effort in which he registered five tackles and two sacks.

In the middle, Bryan Shorter and Devante Terrell, both in their second seasons as the starting interior tackles, held their own as Shorter's 7.5 tackles for loss and 5.5 sacks were both career-bests. Another newcomer, much like Overstreet and Reeves, made arguably the biggest strides from the beginning of the season to the end, All-Name Team favorite Ge'Monee Brown. Brown's eight tackles for loss led all defensive linemen and six of those came in the second half of the season where WKU was 6-1.

Shorter, Terrell, Brown, Morris and Bryant provide WKU with a five-man rotation of gap pluggers while Rocker, Overstreet, Reeves and Hammond give the Hilltoppers their most formidable pass rush since former fifth-round NFL Draft selection Quanterus Smith was on The Hill.

Linebackers

WKU was tasked with replacing its entire starting linebacker corps last season after Andrew Jackson and Xavius Boyd went to the NFL and Chuck Franks graduated following an eight-win campaign in 2013. Replacing one of the strongest units in school history came with some growing pains but the performances of junior college transfers Nick Holt and Dejon



Brown, along with the development of younger players and addition of T.J. McCollum, have the Hilltoppers excited about the middle of their defense in 2015.

Now seniors, Holt and Brown will lead the linebackers once again. Holt, the son of associate head coach and defensive coordinator Nick Holt, led WKU and ranked second in Conference USA with 111 tackles during his first season. The savvy middle linebacker made 62 solo stops, registered seven tackles for loss, tallied 1.5 sacks, broke up three passes and recovered a fumble as the leader of the defense. Brown was right behind Holt with 78 tackles and tied for the team lead with eight tackles for loss.

McCollum, a UAB transfer with three years of eligibility beginning immediately, is expected to make significant contributions during his first season in Holt's defense. The Hilltoppers also return the services of redshirt freshman Joel Iyiebuniwe, who looked strong in three games as a rookie before injury cut his 2014 short. Fellow redshirt freshman Masai Whyte had a solid spring and could be in the mix, as could redshirt sophomore Daeshawn Bertram, who impressed in relief roles last season.

Secondary

There were times in 2014 that the Hilltopper secondary made fans scratch their heads and there were times when it came up with game-defining plays that sent Houchens-Smith Stadium into euphoria. There were some dark moments, but there were definitely some wonderful moments on the last line of WKU's defense.

Wonderful Terry, a Second Team All-Conference USA selection and Name Team All-American, emerged as WKU's biggest playmaker during his first season on The Hill. The rising senior ranked second nationally with three defensive touchdowns in 2014, one of which was a game-winning 90-yard interception return in the fourth quarter against UTEP and another which sealed a win at Navy. Perhaps his biggest play of the season

was not a turnover and was actually WKU's last play of the season. Terry broke up Central Michigan's potential game-winning two-point conversion in the Bahamas Bowl with no time left in regulation to secure WKU's first FBS bowl win.

Terry and fellow senior Prince Charles Iworah will provide experience and leadership at cornerback this season while juniors Marcus Ward and Branden Leston hold down the safety positions. Terry and Iworah combined for 11 pass breakups, three interceptions and two fumble recoveries in 2014. Ward and Leston shared the secondary lead with 63 tackles apiece. Ward enters his third season as a starter and Leston burst onto the scene as another big-time playmaker in the secondary late in the season. Leston picked off Marshall quarterback Rakeem Cato three times during WKU's win in Huntington, came up with an interception against UTSA and set up another interception in the bowl win with a tipped ball in the end zone that teammate Cam Thomas caught to keep CMU off the scoreboard.

Replacing Thomas will be the most difficult task for the secondary in 2015, as his press coverage and run-stopping ability leaves a void on the outside. Terry and Iworah are up to the challenge and DeVante Thomas' return from injury adds toughness to the unit. Redshirt freshman Martavius Mims also impressed during his one season on the scout team and he will look to factor into the rotation at safety, a thin position by comparison for the Hilltoppers. Sophomore De'Andre Simmons will be in the mix as well with a handful of reps under his belt as a primary backup to Iworah and Terry. As a position of need for the Tops, the coaching staff converted running back/wide receiver De'Andre Farris to safety in the spring, and his ball skills and tenacity in the box stood out right away.

COACHING STAFF



HEAD COACH JEFF BROHM

Jeff Brohm, a native Kentuckian and one of the state's most notable football products, enters his second season as the head football coach at WKU.

A 12-year collegiate coaching veteran with experience in the Big 10, Big East, Conference USA and Sun Belt conferences, Brohm came to the Hill as the offensive coordinator in 2013 where he directed a high-flying, high-scoring offensive attack that shattered 18 single-season school records including total offense, individual passing yards and individual rushing yards.

He obliterated those marks once he was given the controls to direct his version of the offense.

In 2014, the Hilltoppers completed their transformation from a ground-and-pound, run-first program to one of the nation's premiere passing offenses with their ability to move the ball seemingly at will against opponents.

In one season under Brohm, WKU broke 50 school and conference records including the school's single-season and single-game records in total yards (season/game), touchdown passes (season/game), points scored in a season, and a host of others.

The head coach's biggest credit, however, may lie in the right arm of senior quarterback Brandon Doughty, the nation's top passer in 2014. In his first season as a starter, Doughty threw 14 touchdowns to 14 interceptions but improved dramatically with Brohm directing the offense.

Doughty's 49 touchdown passes and 4,830 yards were national-best numbers as he earned Conference USA Most Valuable Player honors and the Sammy Baugh Award, given to the nation's top quarterback. Doughty was even more deadly at home where he finished the year without throwing a single interception to 24 touchdowns - the only QB in the

country with more than 60 attempts who can make that claim. To put it into perspective, if Doughty had never played a single road game on the year, he would have still broken WKU's single season touchdown passes record, a record that had stood since 1985 with 22.

The head coach's success is not a one-year wonder. Under his tutelage, 20 players in offenses he coordinated went on to be drafted into the National Football League while four quarterbacks, Stefan LeFors, Brian Brohm, Hunter Cantwell, and Rusty Smith went on to play in the NFL directly out of Brohm's quarterback room.

Brohm inherited a program that is in the midst of a highly successful transition into the FBS. The Hilltoppers are one of just 32 programs heading into 2015 that have at least seven wins in four consecutive seasons and one of just eight Group of Five teams to accomplish that feat.

As the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator for the Tops in 2013, along with Doughty's improvement, running back Antonio Andrews, now with the Tennessee Titans, broke his own school record, set in 2012, and became just the 11th player in FBS history to rush for 1,700 yards or more in consecutive seasons when he piled up 1,730 rushing yards.

For his efforts, Andrews was named the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year and earned four All-American team distinctions. Andrews is also the school's first ever first-round invitee to the Reese's Senior Bowl, the nation's preeminent all-star game for graduating seniors.

Known for his development of signal callers, Brohm spent two years at Illinois before making the move to UAB for the 2012 season. In his second year working with Illinois quarterback Nathan Scheelhaase, Brohm guided the sophomore to improved numbers in passing yardage, completion percentage and passing efficiency in 2011. Scheelhaase's 138.0 rating was the fourth-best season mark in Illini history.

Brohm began molding Scheelhaase in 2010 and he quickly showed results, throwing 13 touchdowns and one interception over the last seven games of the season after

throwing four touchdowns and seven interceptions in the first six games. Scheelhaase also broke the Illinois records for rushing by a quarterback and by a freshman with 868 yards prior to going to Illinois. Brohm spent the 2009 season as the quarterbacks coach at Florida Atlantic in the Sun Belt Conference, where he was reunited with his college coach, Howard Schnellenberger.

Brohm served as the quarterbacks coach at Louisville from 2003-06, assistant head coach and passing game coordinator in 2007, and the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator in 2008.

Under Brohm's direction, the Cardinals' passing attack flourished, including a record-breaking season in 2007 with Brohm's younger brother, Brian, as quarterback. Brian Brohm threw for 4,024 yards including 30 touchdowns, on his way to repeating second team All-Big East accolades. Brian finished second in the nation in passing efficiency and completed 68.8 percent of his throws in 2006.

In his first season as an assistant coach at Louisville, Brohm guided quarterback Stefan LeFors to a No. 1 national ranking in passing efficiency and completion percentage, and watched as the southpaw narrowly missed setting NCAA records in both categories.

Brohm began his NFL career in 1994 with the San Diego Chargers, who played in Super Bowl XXIX. He played for the San Francisco 49ers from 1995-97, where he was the backup quarterback to Hall of Famer and ESPN analyst Steve Young in 1997.

From 1998-2000, Brohm played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Denver Broncos and the Cleveland Browns. In 2001, he played in the XFL for the Orlando Rage and was named first team All-XFL as he owned the league's highest QB rating at 99.9.

Brohm was one of four family members to earn a gridiron letter from Louisville. He wrapped up his four-year collegiate career as one of the most prolific offensive players to wear Louisville's jersey.

As a three-year starter for the Cards, Brohm ranks among the all-time leaders for passing yards, touchdown passes, completions, total offense and completion percentage.

A Louisville native, he was voted the team's MVP in both 1992 and 1993.

Among his most notable victories of as collegiate quarterback was the 18-7 win over Michigan State in the 1993 Liberty Bowl in Memphis. Brohm, playing with two steel pins and one steel plate in the index finger of his throwing hand completed 19-of-29 passes for 197 yards and a touchdown amidst 20-degree temperatures and freezing rain. Entering the fourth quarter, Louisville trailed 7-3 before Brohm connected on a 25-yard touchdown strike to Reggie Ferguson to give Louisville the lead for good. He also helped tack on another insurance touchdown late in the game.

In 1992, Brohm completed 155-of-297 passes for 2,008 yards and nine touchdowns. He followed up his 1992 campaign with 2,626 yards in 1993, completing 185-of-304 passes, including 20 touchdown passes. His 20 touchdown passes in 1993 set a new school mark at the time that held until the record setting 1998 campaign of Chris Redman. He totaled 5,451 passing yards for his career with 38 touchdown passes.





In 2006, his uniform number was honored by the University of Louisville following his prolific career.

In 1989, Brohm was selected in the MLB First Year Player Draft by the Montreal Expos out of high school and later selected by the Cleveland Indians in 1990 during his collegiate days. He spent two seasons in the minor league system, playing for Burlington in 1990 and Watertown in 1991. He saw action in 51 career games, posting 39 hits and four home runs.

Brohm was an elite three-sport athlete during his prep days at Louisville's Trinity High. Brohm excelled in football, baseball and basketball in his time playing at Trinity.


Brohm was named an All-District, All-Region and All-State selection as both a junior and senior. He was also an All-Southern and Dixie Dozen selection as a senior and was named the Bobby Dodd Back of the Year and the Atlanta Touchdown Club Back of the Year following the 1988 season. He helped lead his 1988 team to an undefeated record and was later named to the "Team of the Decade" by the Louisville Courier-Journal. He finished his prep career with 1,707 yards passing and 20 touchdowns as a senior in addition to 602 yards on the ground on 185 carries with 12 touchdowns. In all, he threw for 3,341 yards in three seasons while rushing

for 1,006 yards. He threw 35 touchdowns and ran for an additional 21 scores.

Brohm played under Dawhares/KHSAA Hall of Fame Coach Dennis Lampley at Trinity.

Following his time at Trinity, he became the first player in Trinity's history to have their uniform number retired, an honor he held by himself until after the 2003 season when his brother, Brian, had his number retired by the school.

Brohm was also an All-District and All-Region selection in baseball for coach Rich Rostel while serving as the starting point guard for the basketball team on his way to All-District Tournament Team honors for coach Joe Thompson. He led the basketball team in assists and scoring as a senior in 1989.

Brohm excelled off the field as well, serving as class president and finishing 16th in a class of 293 students with a grade point average of 3.90.

Brohm's high school career has been recognized in various Hall of Fames, including the Dawhares/Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame and the Trinity High School Hall of Fame.

Brohm and his family were also honored in 2013 as the first recipients of the Howard Schnellenberger Family Award for their contributions to Louisville-area Catholic sports.

The son of Oscar and Donna Brohm, Jeff is one of the couple's four children. Greg, currently serves as the Director of Football Operations for WKU, while Brian is a former NFL quarterback and currently plays in the CFL. Sister, Kim, was a three-sport star at Louisville's Mercy Academy and later starred in volleyball, basketball and softball at Spalding in Louisville.

Brohm received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Louisville in 1994. He and his wife, Jennifer, have a son, Brady, and daughter, Brooke.

NICK HOLT

ASSOC. HEAD COACH - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

THIRD YEAR AT WKU | UNIVERSITY OF THE PACIFIC '86

Nick Holt, a former BCS conference defensive coordinator, head coach and a former national champion, serves as the defensive coordinator at WKU. Following the 2013 season, Holt added the title of Associate Head Coach.

Holt has the luxury of returning nine starters on defense in 2015 after seeing just four come back to begin the 2014 season. WKU finished No. 17 nationally in red zone defense and had one of the most opportunistic secondaries last season as they tallied five defensive touchdowns - including four of 80 yards or more, the most since 2007.

In 2013, Holt's defense ranked No. 14 overall in total defense while his pass defense was No. 10 in the nation. Among conference members, the Hilltoppers finished with the top tackler in terms of tackles for loss and sacks in linebacker Xavius Boyd while defensive back Cam Thomas was the league's best ball hawk, leading the SBC with 15 passes defended.

Under Holt's tutelage, Boyd had a career season and was named the SBC's Defensive Player of the Year, giving WKU the award in consecutive seasons (Quanterus Smith in 2012). The Hilltoppers also had four players on the first team All-SBC defensive team as Boyd, Thomas, Jonathan Dowling and Bar'ee Boyd gave the Tops a conference-high for members on the squad.

Before spending one season at Arkansas, Holt was the defensive coordinator at the University of Washington from 2009-11. Prior to that that he was defensive coordinator at the University of Southern California from 2006-08 and the head coach at Idaho from 2004-05. From 2001-03, he was the linebackers coach at USC and helped the Trojans win the 2003 national championship.

In his final season coordinating the USC defense, he helped lead the Trojans to their NCAA-record seventh-straight 11-win season, a seventh consecutive Pac-10 title and seventh straight BCS bowl berth. USC ended the season by beating Penn State for an unprecedented third straight Rose Bowl

victory. The 2008 Trojans led the NCAA in scoring defense at 9.00 points per game, pass defense with 134.38 yards per game allowed and in pass efficiency defense with a 85.75 rating while ranking second in the country by allowing 221.77 yards of total offense per game, the lowest total by a Pac-10 school since 1971.

Holt began his coaching career in 1986 at St. Mary's High School in Stockton, Calif., and moved to the UNLV in 1987 as a graduate assistant. He was promoted to linebackers coach for the 1988-89 seasons before moving to Idaho, where in 1994 the Vandals led NCAA Division I-AA in rushing defense.

Holt was a four-year letterman at linebacker at the University of the Pacific and earned honorable-mention All-America honors in 1985, when he was the Tigers' MVP and team captain. Holt graduated from Pacific in 1986 with a bachelor's degree in political economics.

Holt and his wife Julie have two sons, Nick and Ben, both who play for the Hilltoppers. He is believed to be the only coach in the FBS to have both his sons on the same team and the only coach to have a son (Nick) in his position room.

TYSON HELTON

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR - QUARTERBACKS

SECOND YEAR AT WKU | HOUSTON '99

Tyson Helton serves as the Hilltopper's offensive coordinator after arriving on The Hill following one season at Cincinnati.

In one season as the Hilltoppers' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, he made quite the impression. Serving as the day-to-day coach of 2014 Conference USA MVP Brandon Doughty, Helton saw his quarterback go from a 1:1 touchdown-to-interception ratio to nearly 5:1 ratio. WKU's offense also improved dramatically with Helton as the team's coordinator, jumping from No. 30 nationally in Total Offense to No. 4.

Prior to WKU, Helton served as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach on Tommy Tuberville's first coaching staff at UC. The Bearcats went 9-4 overall and 6-2 in the American Athletic Conference with an appearance in the Belk Bowl against North Carolina.

The 14-year veteran coached First-Team All-American Athletic Conference selections Blake Annen (TE) and Ralph David Abernathy IV (KR) in 2013. He was also part of a staff that produced the most prolific offensive unit in Cincinnati history. The Bearcats set the school record with 6,137 yards of total offense and led the American Athletic Conference, averaging 472.1 yards per game.

Helton spent the previous six years seasons at UAB coaching the quarterbacks (five seasons) and running backs (one year). Under Helton's guidance, Joe Webb developed into one of the most prolific quarterbacks in NCAA history. In 2009, Webb became the first player in NCAA history to pass for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 in back-to-back seasons.

In 2009, the Blazer offense tallied 5,111 yards, the most in school history. In 2010, UAB again had a potent offense as the unit finished with 5,074 yards, second-highest in school history. Under Helton's tutelage, quarterback Bryan Ellis passed for 2,940 yards and 25 touchdowns.

Helton joined the Blazers after three years at Memphis, where he coached special teams and tight ends. While working on the Tigers' staff under head coach Tommy West, the Memphis special teams prospered under his guidance.

In 2005, UM kicker Stephen Gostkowski, now with the NFL's New England Patriots, was responsible for nearly one-third of the team's scoring and was named the Conference USA Special Teams Player of the Year.

Prior to joining the program at Memphis, Helton spent four years as a member of June Jones' staff at Hawai'i. He arrived on the Manoa campus in 2000 as a graduate assistant and worked with the Warriors' special teams.

Helton is the brother of Southern California assistant coach Clay Helton and the son of former NFL and collegiate coach Kim Helton.

Helton earned his bachelor's degree in business at Houston in 1999 after a four-year career with the Cougars at quarterback. He and his wife, April, have two daughters, Shelby Grace and Presley, and twin boys Cole and Clay.

RICKY BRUMFIELD

ASSISTANT COACH - SPECIAL TEAMS/ CORNERS

THIRD YEAR AT WKU | UTAH STATE '99

Ricky Brumfield serves as WKU's cornerbacks coach while assisting with special teams after previously spending two years as the special teams coordinator and safeties coach at Nicholls State.

During his second season on The Hill, Brumfield was charged with replacing a four-year starter at punter among his specialists unit and also assist in the development of new kick and punt returners following the graduation of All-American Antonio Andrews. At corner, Brumfield developed first-year starter Prince Charles Iworah into an every-down corner opposite All-Conference performer Cam Thomas.

Brumfield's cornerback group proved to be among the nation's best in 2013 and topped the conference in every statistical category for pass defenders including total interceptions, passing defense efficiency and pass defense. Brumfield's primary corners, Tyree Robinson and Thomas, combined for nine of the team's 14 interceptions.

Brumfield's coverage units on special team's also excelled as WKU finished the regular season as the top kick and punt cover unit in the league.

In 2011 under Brumfield's tutelage, the Nicholls State special teams unit was among the leaders in the FCS in blocked kicks, accounting for six on the year. In addition, kick returner Chika Madu set a single-game Southland and program record with 304 yards and two touchdowns against Stephen F. Austin en route to being named National, Southland and Louisiana Player of the Week. As a unit, Nicholls finished the season ranked 14th in the FCS with a 23.55 yard kick return average.

Brumfield, a native of New Orleans, joined the Nicholls State staff after directing the special teams at Fairmont State University for seven seasons. In 2010, the Fighting Falcons ranked No. 1 in their conference in overall special teams as his squad blocked five kicks, caused two turnovers and scored two touchdowns on the year.

In 2009, Fairmont State had the third best kick return average in NCAA Division II. Under Brumfield's direction in 2010, three Falcons earned all-conference for special teams. Kicker Frank Keenan and punter Ben Landis were named first-team while second-team kicker returner Zack Page became the all-time record holder in three kick return categories for Division II kick returns, kick return yards and combined return yards.

At Fairmont State, Brumfield also served as wide receivers coach where his top receiver, Perry Baker, was one of the few non-Division I players to be selected to play in the 2010 East-West Shrine Game.

During his tenure at Fairmont State, Brumfield spent five summers assisting with various NFL teams. From 2007-09, he worked with the Pittsburgh Steelers, tutoring wide receivers as well as contributing his efforts to special teams.

Prior to Fairmont State, Brumfield started his coaching career at Union College in 2001, serving as special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach. During his tenure at Union, he received his master's in 2003. Brumfield earned his bachelor's from Utah State University, where he was a four-time letterwinner and two-year starter as a wide receiver. While at Utah State, the Aggies were two-time Big West Conference Champions and earned a berth to the Humanitarian Bowl in 1997.

Brumfield and his wife, Erin, have four children; Kyan, McKel, Tacy and Asher.

NEIL CALLAWAY

ASSISTANT COACH - OFFENSIVE LINE

THIRD YEAR AT WKU | ALABAMA '78

Neil Callaway, a 34-year coaching veteran, serves as WKU's offensive line coach.

Callaway has been a consistent leader, much like his position group, up front for the Hilltoppers. In each of his two seasons, WKU's offensive line has powered the engine of the school's best offensive performances and carried the load for a pair of running backs to rush for over 1,500 yards. The line has done this in constant rotation as Callaway has needed to replace at least two starters every season.

Prior to WKU, Callaway served as the head coach at UAB from 2007-11. Before UAB, he was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Georgia from 2001-06. Callaway has served as an offensive line coach at three different schools in the Southeastern Conference, including Auburn, Alabama and Georgia during his career.

Callaway knows a thing or two about having success at the collegiate level, as he has been a part of 10 Southeastern Conference titles during his career as a player and as a coach. Callaway won three conference championships during his playing days with Alabama, then four as an assistant at Auburn, one as an assistant at Alabama and two during his time as offensive coordinator at Georgia.

Callaway served on the Georgia staff for six seasons (2001-06) before going to UAB, helping the Bulldogs to 61 wins over that six-year span, which included a pair of SEC titles, three SEC East titles, four bowl wins and four top-10 finishes in the national polls. In 2002, the Bulldogs finished as the SEC's top scoring (32.14 ppg) and pass efficiency (138.91) offense and were second in scoring offense in 2005.

In December of 2006 Callaway was awarded his first head coaching position, as he was named just the third head coach in UAB history. Callaway coached the Blazers for five seasons, going 4-4 in Conference USA in his third season in 2009. That season UAB ranked first in the conference and seventh nationally in rushing offense, while ranking third in total offense. In 2010, UAB ranked 24th in the nation in passing

offense and 30th in total offense amassing over 5,000 yards on the season, which ranked second in school history, only behind the mark set in 2009.

Callaway, a native of Macon, Ga., and a graduate of the University of Alabama, served as offensive line coach at Alabama in 1997 and line coach and offensive coordinator from 1998 to 2000. Prior to joining the Crimson Tide, he served as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Houston from 1993-96. In his four seasons coaching at Houston, the Cougars' offensive line allowed just 19.5 sacks per season, including only 10 sacks in his final year. Houston won the inaugural Conference USA championship while he was there as well.

Before making the move to Houston, Callaway served under head coach Pat Dye at Auburn as the offensive line coach from 1981-92, helping the Tigers to four SEC titles, and produced four first team All-Americans and 14 All-SEC players. Callaway also served under Dye at Wyoming and East Carolina early in his career.

Callaway and his wife, Karen, have three children, Russ, Kate and Clay. Callaway was inducted into the Macon (Ga.) Sports Hall of Fame in 2006.

THIRD YEAR AT WKU | KENTUCKY '76

Mike Cassity is in his second stint as a Hilltopper assistant as he returned to The Hill in 2013 after serving as the defensive coordinator and the defensive backs coach from 1983-88 at WKU.

In two seasons, Cassity's defensive backfield has been ball-hawking and hard hitting. In 2013, then-junior corner Cam Thomas led the Sun Belt in interceptions with five while safety Jonathan Dowling led the nation in forced fumbles per game. Last season, the defensive backs were No. 3 nationally in defensive touchdowns with five.

Hilltopper defensive backs intercepted a league-best 14 passes and had two of the top four individual performances of the season. Junior corner Cam Thomas led the league with five picks while senior Tyree Robinson was one of three players in the league to snatch four interceptions. No other player in the league defended as many passes as Thomas either, who finished the regular season with an SBC-best 15 (five interceptions, 10 PBU)

Cassity began his coaching career at UK as a student coach in 1975 while completing his degree. He was a part-time assistant coach in 1979. From there, the trail wound through Morehead State, WKU, Northeast Louisiana, East Carolina, Georgia Tech, Cincinnati, Wisconsin, Baylor, Oklahoma State, Illinois, Louisville and Marshall.

Cassity was the defensive coordinator during his term at Louisville. In 2003, the team improved to 15th in total defense and 24th in scoring defense in Cassity's first season in 2004. His teams finished in the top 40 nationally in total defense from 2004-06.

Cassity helped the Cardinals win the 2004 Conference USA championship and the 2006 Big East title and advance to three bowl games, highlighted by a victory in the 2007 Orange Bowl. In the Orange Bowl campaign, Louisville finished second in the nation in quarterback sacks and 17th nationally in scoring defense.

Cassity also was defensive coordinator at Illinois, the 2001 Big Ten champion and participant in the 2002 Sugar Bowl, and at Baylor, Cincinnati, Georgia Tech, East Carolina, Northeast Louisiana and WKU. During the 1991 season at East Carolina, the Pirates posted an 11-1 record, capped by a victory in the Peach Bowl. The ECU coaches were selected as the National Coaching Staff of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

A native of Ft. Campbell, Ky., Cassity is a graduate of Ft. Campbell High School. He was a two-sport athlete at Kentucky in football and wrestling. In football, he played from 1971-74, starting his final two seasons at safety. He received the Kiwanis Club 110 Percenter Award for his effort and dedication.

KEN DELGADO

ASSISTANT COACH - DEFENSIVE ENDS

SECOND YEAR AT WKU | SAN JOSE STATE '84

Ken Delgado enters his second season as the defensive ends coach on The Hill.

In his first season, Delgado's defensive end group went through a transformation as he oversaw the development of talented freshmen Derik Overstreet and Tanner Reeves and continued to mold defensive captain Gavin Rocker into a pass rushing force. By season's end, Overstreet was the bowl game defensive MVP and an All-Freshman team member while Rocker tied for team lead in sacks (5.5).

Delgado came to The Hill from Eastern Michigan where he spent the previous four seasons as the defensive line coach for the Eagles. In 2012, Delgado helped coach Green Bay Packers linebacker Andy Mulumba to All-MAC Second Team defensive honors. Mulumba was also the second overall pick in the 2013 Canadian Football League Draft while another Delgado product, Kalonji Kashama, was the 27th overall selection in that draft.

Prior to EMU, Delgado spent two seasons on the staff at Louisville where he helped to mentor former defensive ends coach L.D. Scott during his collegiate years with the Cardinals. Before his stint at UofL, Delgado was a long-time staffer at Cal where he coached Brandon Mebane - of the 2014 Super Bowl Champion Seattle Seahawks - to a third round draft pick in the 2007 NFL Draft.

Under Delgado, three linemen - Tully Banta-Cain, Ryan Riddle and Mebane - earned first-team All-Pac-10 honors. Riddle set a school record with 14.5 sacks during the 2004 season. Cal's D-line allowed just 82.5 rushing yards per game in 2004 to rank second in the country.

In his first season at Cal, Delgado's line helped produce a Pac-10-best 44 sacks. Banta-Cain and Tom Canada were the top sack-duo in the league. Banta-Cain, who has won a pair of Super Bowl rings with the New England Patriots, was also named Defensive MVP of the 2003 East-West Shrine Game. While with Cal, Delgado also recruited NFL Pro Bowler DeSean Jackson to the Berkeley campus.

Prior to joining the staff at Cal, Delgado served eight years at San Diego State. He served six seasons as the defensive line coach from 1994-1999, and was promoted to be the Aztecs' defensive coordinator for two years from 2000-01. As an assistant at San Diego State, Delgado tutored Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila (Green Bay), a three-time All-Conference choice and the Aztecs' all-time sack leader. Delgado also helped develop 1998 WAC Freshman of the Year Jerome Haywood, as well as La'Roi Glover, who was a four-time All-Pro defensive lineman with the New Orleans Saints and Dallas Cowboys.

Before heading to San Diego State, Delgado coached one season at Utah in 1993, where he coached future first round pick Luther Ellis. Prior to that, Delgado spent seven seasons at San Jose State. He coached the defensive line from 1988-92 and also served as a graduate assistant from 1986-87. As the defensive line coach at San Jose State, his 1990 Spartan defense ranked third nationally in rushing defense and 13th in the country in total defense.

Delgado earned his bachelor's degree in business management from San Jose State in 1984, where he also played two seasons for the Spartans. He was an Honorable Mention Junior College All-American and a first team All-State performer at Chabot College.

THIRD YEAR AT WKU | EAST TENNESSEE STATE '76

Don Dunn enters his third season as a member of the Hilltopper staff, coaching the defensive tackles as well as serving as the on-staff recruiting coordinator.

Dunn has seen his interior defensive line go through thick and thin and he enters 2015 with perhaps his deepest and most talented interior group yet. Dunn returns the three primary tackles in Bryan Shorter, Ge'Monee Brown and Devante Terrell while adding transfer Jontavious Morris and junior college prospect Omarius Bryant.

In 2014, Brown led the team in tackles for loss while Shorter's 5.5 sacks tied for the team-high, an accomplishment that's rare for a pair of interior defensive linemen.

With 39 years of coaching experience at the collegiate level, Dunn came to WKU after spending three seasons as the director of high school relations at Texas Tech on Tommy Tuberville's staff, after spending 10 seasons on staff with Tuberville at Auburn as the defensive line coach.

Aside from his coaching stops at Texas Tech and Auburn, Dunn has also put time in as an assistant coach at Ole Miss, Nevada, Pacific, Montana State, Tennessee and Lees-McRae Junior College, while also coaching five years at the high school level.

During his time coaching the defensive line at Auburn, Dunn helped the Tigers rank sixth in the nation in scoring defense in 2005 and seventh in 2006, while leading the nation in scoring defense in 2004. Dunn also helped lead Auburn to a berth in the Sugar Bowl in 2005, which is one of 14 bowl games that Dunn has been associated with during his collegiate coaching career.

Dunn also has defensive coordinator experience at the college ranks, serving as the co-defensive coordinator/defensive line coach for one season at the University of Nevada following a three-year stint at Pacific.

Dunn was the defensive line coach, recruiting coordinator and special teams coach while at Montana State from 1985-1990 after initially making his way into the coaching ranks as a graduate assistant at the University of Tennessee from 1983-1985 and at Lees-McRae Junior College in Banner Elk, N.C., where he spent three seasons (1980-83).

Dunn began his career at the high school level from 1976-1980 at Holston High School (Knoxville, Tenn.) and David Crockett High School (Jonesboro, Tenn.) where he was a health and physical education teacher and served as the strength coach from 1977-1980.

Dunn earned an associate's degree from Lees-McRae Junior College in 1973. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education from East Tennessee State in 1976 before graduating with a master's degree in secondary education from Union College in 1980.

SECOND YEAR AT WKU | UAB '10

Bryan Ellis begins his first season leading the running backs on The Hill after spending one season as an offensive quality control coach.

In 2014, Ellis worked primarily with receivers coach Jamarcus Shephard and helped develop one of the most dominant receiving corps in the country as Jared Dangerfield set the program's single-season receptions record (69) and tied the single-season touchdown mark (11) in his first season while Willie McNeal became the program's all-time receptions leader.

Ellis inherits a running back tradition at WKU which has had a running back go over 1,500 yards in five consecutive seasons, tying the longest such streak in FBS history. He will be tasked with leading starting running back Leon Allen back over that plateau in 2015. Allen would become the third running back since 2010 to rush for over 1,500 yards in consecutive seasons, joining All-Americans and current NFL players Bobby Rainey and Antonio Andrews.

Ellis enjoyed a stellar prep and collegiate career as a quarterback. Prior to coming to The Hill, Ellis was an offensive quality control coach at his alma mater, UAB, for the 2013 season under head coach Garrick McGee.

In 2010, Ellis had nine starts at quarterback for the Blazers with 2,940 passing yards and 25 touchdowns in 11 total games. After his playing career was done, Ellis transitioned to a graduate assistant coaching role working with the quarterbacks for the previous two seasons.

Ellis, a Byron, Ga., native, had an outstanding prep career at Peach County High and was tabbed the Atlanta Journal-Constitution AAA State Offensive Player of the Year. He passed for more than 3,600 and threw 31 touchdowns as a senior, leading his Trojans' squad to a 14-1 record and Class AAA State Championship.

Ellis is married to the former Janie Cox.

JAMARCUS SHEPHARD

FIFTH YEAR AT WKU | DEPAUW '05

Jamarcus Shephard enters his second season as the wide receivers coach on The Hill after a stellar rookie season on the coaching staff. He also added Special Teams duties in the spring of 2015.

In 2014, Shephard's wide receivers were among the best in the country, highlighted by the play of first-year starter Jared Dangerfield and veteran Willie McNeal. In one season, Dangerfield broke the program's single-season receptions record (69) and tied the single-season touchdown mark (11) while McNeal became WKU's all-time leader in receptions (171).

Dangerfield was an All-Conference USA second teamer and McNeal picked up honorable mention accolades. Along with Dangerfield and McNeal, Shephard oversaw the development of the explosive Taywan Taylor and Antwane Grant as Taylor led all Hilltopper wideouts with a 17 yard per catch average and had 13 receptions of 20 yards or more.

In 2013, Shephard worked as a quality control assistant for the Hilltoppers, specifically helping the wide receivers transform from a run-heavy offense into a more balanced unit under then-coach Bobby Petrino. Shephard has been at WKU since 2013, serving two years as a defensive analyst and volunteer assistant in 2011 and 2012.

A two-time Division III American Football Coaches Association at DePauw University, Shephard primarily aided in defensive scheming and identifying opponent tendencies. Additionally, he helped to monitor player academic performance and assisted in the recruiting process.

Before his arrival on The Hill, Shephard spent the 2007 season as an assistant track and field coach at DePauw. Shephard began his football coaching career at his high school alma mater, Northrop High in Fort Wayne, Ind., before moving to Indianapolis for a stint at Broad Ripple High.

At DePauw, Shephard participated in the 2005 Hula Bowl as well as the 2004 Aztec Bowl in Cancun, Mexico - both games reserved for collegiate all-stars. He was one of just two Division III participants in the Hula Bowl that season.

Shephard also tied the NCAA record for kickoffs returned for touchdowns in a game with two. In his senior season, Shephard caught 47 balls for 815 yards and seven touchdowns while also taking home first team All-SCAC honors. He finished his collegiate career as DePauw's all-time leader in kickoff return yards and kickoff return average, a mark he still holds today. His 168 career receptions still rank No. 5 all-time at DePauw while his 2,382 career receiving yards are No. 6 all-time. Shephard is also the No. 3 all-purpose player in DePauw history, tallying 3,997 yards over his career.

Shephard graduated from DePauw in 2005 with a degree in Sports Medicine while also serving as a captain on the track and field squad as well as a captain on the football team. At WKU, Shephard also earned his master's degree in Recreation and Sport Administration.

Shephard and his wife Hallie have a son, Jaylan, and a daughter, Alana.

THE COACHING STAFF

Continuity on a coaching staff is one of the largest factors in sustaining success at the FBS level. Despite a head coaching change in 2014, WKU has been able to maintain said continuity and continues its ascension as one of the best "Group of Five" programs in the country.

Brohm retained six of WKU's nine assistants when he was promoted from offensive coordinator to head coach last winter and after an 8-5 season featuring a Bahamas Bowl victory, the Hilltoppers held on to eight of their nine position coaches for 2015.

Brohm, offensive coordinator Tyson Helton, wide receivers coach JaMarcus Shephard and offensive line coach Neil Callaway were the brains behind the best offense in WKU history last season, and all are back on the sidelines. Bryan Ellis is the lone "new" face among the position coaches, but he served as WKU's offensive quality control coach in 2014. Ellis was promoted to running backs coach this spring, and he inherits a talented crop led by senior Leon Allen.

Callaway's line featured a pair of All-Conference USA tackles in Forrest Lamp and Cam Clemmons last season, along with Freshman All-American guard Brandon Ray. His line opened lanes for the mesmerizing offense orchestrated by Helton and Brohm, which led the nation in 20-yard passing plays (75), ranked second in passing offense (374.3) and fourth in total offense (534.6). In his first season as a position coach, Shephard developed the best receiving corps in program history, a unit that had four players haul in at least 40 receptions and six touchdowns. Of WKU's school-record 4,866 passing yards, 1,600 of them were racked up after the catch.

Defensive coordinator and associate head coach Nick Holt will direct WKU's defense for a third-straight season following an adventurous 2014 campaign. Holt was charged with filling an entire linebacker corps and three of four secondary positions with fresh faces last year, and the rawness showed at times. The Hilltoppers gradually progressed as the season went on and despite giving up more yards than Holt would like, the defense forced 23 turnovers, scored five touchdowns and ranked No. 17 nationally in red zone defense.

Holt gets nine starters back with a year of experience under their belt and a number of immediately eligible transfers to bolster his defense in 2015. Veterans Mike Cassity (secondary), Don Dunn (defensive tackles) and Ricky Brumfield (cornerbacks) are back for their third season as Holt's assistants while Ken Delgado enters year No. 2 coaching the defensive ends.

2014 (Jr.): Allen led Conference USA and ranked seventh nationally with 2,018 yards from scrimmage during his junior season. He set both C-USA and WKU single-game rushing records vs. Army, rushing for 345 yards, at the time ranking as the 16th highest single-game rushing output in FBS history. Allen finished off the 2014 season with 1,542 rushing yards, ranking him third in C-USA and 18th nationally. Allen, Boise State's Jay Ajayi and Miami's Duke Johnson were the only three players in the FBS to post 1,500 rushing yards and 400 receiving yards. Allen tallied six 100-yard performances in 2014, and had a pair of 200-yard performances—one of which was a 237-yard effort in a win at No. 19 Marshall. Allen posted 1,011 scrimmage yards (750 rushing) and eight touchdowns during the season-ending five-game winning streak.

2013 (So.): Allen rushed for 357 yards on 72 carries with five touchdowns as the primary back-up to All-American Antonio Andrews. He added 202 yards on 22 receptions and was the only true running back to catch a touchdown pass. Allen's best performance was a 10-carry, 92-yard showing in the season opener against Kentucky when he also scored his first touchdown of the season. In the second week of the season, he had a 13-carry game against Tennessee to set his high-water mark for the season while his season-high for receiving yards was a three-catch, 46-yard day against Louisiana-Lafayette.

2012 (Fr.): Allen became WKU's No. 2 option at running back in his true freshman season, finishing second on the team in rushing yards (317), yards per game (28.8) and yards per carry (5.7). He saw action in 11-of-13 games, leading the Hilltoppers in carries during their first two contests. Allen debuted with immediate impact against Austin Peay on Sept. 1, leading WKU with 93 rushing yards and a touchdown on 13 carries. He totaled the rock a team-high 11 times at top-ranked Alabama on Sept. 8, totaling 28 yards on the day. He carried the ball six times for 20 yards in win at Kentucky on Sept. 15. Allen posted a career-high 132 rushing yards and a touchdown on just 11 carries against Southern Miss on Sept. 22. He rushed four times for eight yards in conference-opening win at Arkansas State on Sept. 29.

HS/Misc.: Allen was rated as a two-star recruit by both Rivals.com and Scout.com, helping lead Manatee High to a 2011 Class 7A Florida State Championship, totaling over 130 yards from scrimmage in the state title game. He served as a dual-threat running back in his senior season, finishing the year with 834 yards on 161 carries and 10 touchdowns to go along with 36 receptions for 336 yards and two scores. He averaged over five yards per carry while finding the end zone 10 times on the ground. He also had a pair of receiving touchdowns,

averaging over nine yards per reception. Allen was named a running back on the South roster in the Florida FACA North-South All-Star Game, scoring the team's first touchdown of the game on a four-yard reception in the first half. He also earned Honorable Mention All-State honors to go along with First-Team All-Area honors.

2014 (r-Sr.): Doughty posted one of the finest seasons by a collegiate quarterback in the history of the game as he led the FBS in passing yards (4,830), passing touchdowns (49), and points responsible for per game (24.2) during his senior campaign.

During the course of the year, Doughty was granted a medical hardship waiver, restoring a season of eligibility lost due to injuries in 2011 and 2012, clearing the way for his return for a sixth year. The waiver granted him the 2012 year back. Doughty was named the 2014 Conference USA Most Valuable Player as well as the Sammy Baugh Trophy award winner for his play. On the year, WKU finished as the No. 4 offense, averaging 534.6 yards, No. 2 passing offense at 374.3 yards, and broke 49 team and individual offensive records.

Among those records were Total Yards, Season (6,950), Total Yards, Game (738), Points Scored per Game (44.4), Touchdowns Scored, Season (76), Passing Yards, Season (4,866) and First Downs, Game (40). Doughty led the league in Player of the Week awards, taking home the award four times and was a four-time recipient of the Manning Star of the Week.

For his performance in the bowl game, where he was named the Offensive Player of the Game, Doughty was named to the All-Bowl Team from CBSsports.com and NFL.com. Doughty threw for 500 or more yards in two of the first three games, 569 vs. Bowling Green and 593 at Middle Tennessee. His 593 yards at MT set a new C-USA single-game record. On 10 occasions, Doughty eclipsed the 300-yard mark and had five or more touchdown passes in five games, including a season-high eight at No. 19 Marshall – the second-most in C-USA history - when he combined with Rakeem Cato to throw an FBS combined record of 15 in a single game. Doughty's eight touchdown passes in that game were matched only by eight other quarterbacks in FBS history and just two others did it against a nationally ranked opponent. He is the only quarterback of those eight to do it on the road. His 11.2 attempts per touchdown ratio was eclipsed by only two other quarterbacks last season, Marcus Mariota (10.6) and JT Barrett (9.2) and he was one of only three quarterbacks to throw at

least 30 more touchdown passes than interceptions (Mariota and Cody Kessler). Doughty finished No. 10 in ESPN's QBR ratings and No. 1 in their Passing Expected Points Added category.

Doughty became WKU's career leader in touchdown passes and also broke the record for passing yards, completions and attempts in a game, touchdown passes in a half and a game, total yards and plays in a season, and enters 2015 101 completions away from that mark and 767 yards away from passing Jeff Cesarone as WKU's all-time passing yardage leader. At home, Doughty was at his most efficient, going 159-of-213 (74.6) for 2,107 yards and 24 touchdowns without an interception. He has not thrown a pick at home since October 15, 2013 – a span of 388 passing attempts – and he was the only starting QB without an interception on his home turf.

Doughty's 49 touchdowns set a single-season C-USA record and were the sixth-most by any FBS QB since 1956. His 4,830 yards were 16th most in that span. Doughty combined with running back Leon Allen to become the first-ever duo in FBS

history to have a 4,500 yard passer and 1,500 yard rusher. WKU also became the first program since Kent State in 1997 to set their conference's single-game passing (593) and rushing (345) yardage marks in the same season. He enters 2015 as the FBS' active career leader in passing yards (7,800) and touchdown passes (63), second in pass completions (635) and completion percentage (66.8) while ranking third in total offense (7,637), passing efficiency (152.3), pass attempts (951) and passing yards per game (260.0).

2013 (r-Jr.): In his first full season as a starter, Doughty began his assault on the Hilltopper record book for quarterbacks, setting new school records for passing yards (2,857), completion percentage (65.8), single-game completions (29, vs. Troy, 10/26), and single-game passing yards (387, vs. Troy, 10/26). Doughty also directed a WKU offense that set a single-season school record for total yards (5,502), yards per play (6.3), yards per game (458.5) and passing yards per game (261.7). Doughty appeared in all 12 games, starting 10, the outliers being Morgan State and Troy. He eclipsed the 200-yard mark in eight games and went over 300 in the Troy (387) and ULM (370) contests while he posted completion percentages above 70-percent against Kentucky (79.4), Navy (80.6), and ULL (78.3). Doughty also threw for multiple touchdowns in four contests including South Alabama (3), ULM (2), Army (2) and Arkansas State (3). He finished the year completing 246-of-374 attempts for 14 touchdowns with 14 interceptions with a long of 60 yards against Troy and a passing efficiency mark for 134.81

2012 (r-So.): Doughty saw relief action against both Austin Peay on Sept. 1 and Southern Miss on Sept. 22, completing 1-of-3 pass attempts for seven yards.

2011 (r-Fr.): Doughty saw his season cut short after suffering a season-ending knee injury in week three against Indiana State on Sept. 17. He had earned the start at quarterback in that game, playing just three plays before leaving with the injury. Doughty made his first collegiate appearance at quarterback in the third quarter in week two against Navy on Sept. 10, throwing for 102 yards on 12-of-21 passing and leading WKU to a touchdown on his first drive under center.

2010 (Fr.): Doughty redshirted his first season on The Hill.

HS/Misc.: Doughty tossed 23 touchdown passes and rushed for four touchdowns as the starting quarterback for North Broward Prep. He completed 170 passes for 2,885 yards and was rated as a three-star recruit by both ESPN.com and Rivals.com. ESPN.com had Doughty ranked as the 75th best quarterback in the nation coming out of North Broward. He was named a FACA North-South All-Star, a Dade-Broward All-Star and tabbed as First-Team All-County by the *Miami Herald* and the *Sun Sentinel*.

For the year, Taylor found the endzone a team-high 18 times with 14 touchdown receptions, two rushing touchdowns and one interception returned for a touchdown. Taylor also rushed for 72 yards on just 12 carries, averaging six yards per touch on the ground for an offense that averaged more than 44 points per game. Taylor got off to a hot start in his final season in 2012, going over 100 receiving yards in four of the first five games of the year with 10 touchdown receptions during that five-game span. The 6-1, 185-pound wide receiver was also a dynamic kick returner for the Panthers, earning All-District honors from the Greater Louisville Football Coaches Association while also being named Honorable Mention All-State by the *Louisville Courier-Journal* as a wide receiver in 2012.



RETIRED HILLTOPPER JERSEYS

The great names to wear a Hilltopper uniform or roam the sidelines as a coach during the history of Hilltopper football are numerous. However, only four have been recognized with a jersey retired in their honor. All-America quarterback - and later head coach - Jimmy Feix was the first to receive the honor. In fact, his number 66 is the only number officially removed from circulation. Following his playing days in the late 90's, Willie Taggart joined Feix with a retired jersey hung outside Houchens Industries - L.T. Smith Stadium.

Willie Taggart (1995-98)
Retired: Oct. 23, 1999

Taggart ended his career not only as the school's all-time leading rusher with 3,997 career yards, but as the leader among all Division I quarterbacks. He was a two-time finalist for the Walter Payton Award, given to the top offensive player in NCAA Football Championship Subdivision.

Following his playing career, Taggart remained on The Hill as an assistant coach from 1999-2006. After three seasons as an assistant coach at Stanford, Taggart returned to WKU in 2009 to become head coach. He remained in that role until 2012 after leading the team to consecutive 7-5 seasons in 2011 and 2012 and the school's first ever FBS bowl game appearance following the 2012 season.

Dale Lindsey (1963-64)
Retired: Sept. 15, 2007

A two-time All-OVC pick, Dale Lindsey earned All-America honors as a linebacker in 1964 and was named to the All-Time OVC Team in 1998.

In 1963, Lindsey was a major factor in the Hilltoppers' undefeated season which concluded with a Tangerine Bowl victory. Lindsey was drafted in the seventh round of the 1965 NFL Draft by the Cleveland Browns, where he played from 1965 to 1972. He signed with New Orleans to play his final season in 1973.

Following his professional playing career, Lindsey coached for several NFL, CFL and USFL teams. In 1988, Lindsey worked with Head Coach Forrest Gregg at SMU to revitalize the program after the infamous 'Death Penalty' sentence. Lindsey was named the head coach at the University of San Diego prior to the 2013 season.

Virgil Livers (1971-74)
Retired: Oct. 20, 2001

One of the most explosive players in school history, Livers ranks among the top six all-time on the Hill in both interceptions and punt return yards.

Livers' career 250 interception return yards are No. 2 all-time and his 24.6 yards per interception return in 1974 and 19.2 career yards per interception return remain school records.

Livers was drafted by the NFL's Chicago Bears in the fourth round of the 1975 NFL Draft where he remained until he concluded his professional career in 1979. Livers appeared in 68 games, starting 60, over his career with Chicago. He also spent time with the Chicago Blitz of the USFL.

Jimmy Feix (1949-52)
Retired: 1999

The first Hilltopper All-American in 1952, Jimmy Feix is also WKU's winningest head coach, leading the Hilltoppers to 106 victories from 1968-83.

Feix led WKU to winning seasons in his first eight seasons as the head coach, still the longest streak of consecutive winning seasons by one head coach in school history. Under Feix, WKU won a pair of Grantland Rice bowl games, finished as the NCAA II national runner up twice and won six Ohio Valley Conference championships.

A member of the inaugural class of the WKU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1991, Feix was also selected to the Ohio Valley Conference 40th Anniversary Team in June 1988. Prior to the 1991 campaign, the field inside Houchens Industries-L.T. Smith Stadium was named 'Feix Field' in his honor. He passed away on October 5, 2014. WKU won its next home game, against ODU, and scored 66 points, Feix's number, in the process.

HOUCHENS INDUSTRIES-L.T. SMITH STADIUM

The 2015 season will be WKU's 48th in Houchens Industries-L.T. Smith Stadium and the eighth since the facility underwent a massive renovation.

The renovation of Houchens Industries-L.T. Smith Stadium began in April 2006 and featured the construction of a new west side of the stadium while also including a significant renovation of the stadium's existing east side. The stadium's capacity now stands at 22,113. The first phase of the renovation to Houchens Industries-L.T. Smith Stadium involved improving the existing east side structure.

Construction began on the West grandstand prior to the start of the 2007 season. The new side of the stadium contains approximately 5,000 seats, including an 832-seat club level, along with new concession stands and restrooms. The building also houses new football offices and a new weight room (10,000 square feet), training room (8,500 square feet), locker room (10,000 square feet) and equipment area.

The Hilltoppers have put together a .500 or better record in 31 campaigns since the stadium opened in 1968. Originally L.T. Smith Stadium, the name was changed to Houchens Industries-L.T. Smith Stadium in July, 2007.

Frazier scored on a 55-yard run on the second play of the second quarter to double WKU's advantage. The defense allowed only 19 yards on seven plays after a late first-half turnover, forcing the Cowboys to settle for a field goal as the Toppers led, 17-6, at the break.

Quarterback Jason Michael connected with Johnson for 49 yards, and Frazier scored from 14 yards out on the next play to cap WKU's first drive of the second half. With MSU trailing by 10 points and the third quarter nearing an end, Michael and Frazier hooked up for a screen pass that would go 54 yards, the quarterback would reach the end zone to finish the drive with 13:49 left in the contest.

Corey Shaw's interception set up the final points of the game, a 23-yard Martinez field goal, while Charles Thompson ended McNeese's final possession with the Toppers' third interception of the contest.

Four conference champions. The top three seeds. Two three-point decisions on the road. All pointed to one result, Western Kentucky's first-ever NCAA I-AA national championship.

WKU defeated McNeese State 34-14 in Chattanooga, Tenn. in the championship game of the I-AA Playoffs to earn the program's first national title after advancing to the championship game for the first time since the school moved to the I-AA level in 1975.

Karl Maslowski intercepted Scott Pendarvis on MSU's first offensive play of the game, the first of a number of big plays for WKU.

Jeremi Johnson bowled over a pair of defenders to score on a 16-yard pass less than five minutes into the game, giving the Hilltoppers the lead for good.

HERE'S THE GIST

Located 60 miles north of Nashville and 110 miles south of Louisville off Interstate 65, Bowling Green is the third-most populous city in the state of Kentucky after Louisville and Lexington. As of 2013, the population for Bowling Green sits at 61,488 with 118,370 in the surrounding Warren County area.

Significant companies in Bowling Green include the **GM Corvette Assembly Plant, Fruit of the Loom/ Russell Athletics, Houchens Industries, Holley Performance Products, and Camping World.**

BRIEF HISTORY

Warren County consists of 546 square miles and was named for General Joseph Warren, a hero of the famous American Revolution Battle of Bunker Hill. The area was first settled in 1785 when Andrew McFadin built McFadin's Station on Barren River. Shortly afterward, another explorer, Robert Moore, paused for a few days at the station before deciding to build in the area. Brothers George and Robert Moore may not have realized how forward looking they were when they selected a site on the Barren River in south central Kentucky for a new settlement in 1796.

At the first county commissioners meeting in early 1798, the pioneers decided that the new town would be "called and known by the name of Bolin Green." This name was after the Bowling Green Square in New York City, where patriots had pulled down a statue of King George III and used the lead to make bullets during the American Revolution.

In laying out the town, the Moore's designed two acres for the construction of public buildings. Those same two acres today make up Fountain Square Park in the heart of downtown. This is symbolic of the city of Bowling Green whose central location allowed it quickly to become a major agricultural community and river port, and later, an important commercial and educational center. Today Bowling Green is a regional entertainment hub for more than 250,000 people in 11 surrounding counties.

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

18TH YEAR AT WKU | WKU '73

Dr. Gary A. Ransdell was named the ninth president of Western Kentucky University on September 12, 1997.

Dr. Ransdell, 63, received his Bachelor of Arts degree from WKU in 1973 in Mass Communications, a Master of Public Service degree in Public Administration in 1974, and a Doctor of Education degree from Indiana University in 1978.

Dr. Ransdell and the WKU Board of Regents are leading the campus through a dramatic transformation from a university of regional importance to a leading American university with international reach. Since 1997, WKU enrollment has swelled from 14,500 to 21,000, and annual graduation numbers have grown from 2,500 to 4,200. The applicant pool has doubled to over 14,000 and student retention has grown from 67 percent to 76 percent.

A key element in the transformation of WKU is growth in private support. WKU completed its first capital campaign on June 30, 2003, with \$102 million in gifts and pledges. A second campaign was completed on June 30, 2012, with \$202 million in new gifts and pledges.

Another priority is a complete rebuilding of the WKU campus. Some \$800 million in campus construction has been completed since 1998, with \$100 million more under way in 2015, and \$100 million on the drawing board.

Other measures of progress include a dramatic push in sponsored research, the growth of new degree programs in electrical, mechanical, and civil engineering; four new doctoral degree programs in Education, Nursing, Physical Therapy, and Psychology; a new emphasis on the commercialization of intellectual property and the transfer of WKU technology to the Kentucky workplace; growth of the three WKU regional campuses in Glasgow, Owensboro, and Elizabethtown/Ft. Knox; the creation of the Gatton Academy of Math and Science, which is now ranked by Newsweek as the No. 1 high school in America three years in a row; Kentucky's only independent Honors College with enrollment of 1,400 high achieving students; expanded study

abroad programs; and the state's first Confucius Institute and only Chinese flagship program. True to its plan, WKU has the largest number of distance-learning courses and the largest distance-learning enrollment among Kentucky's eight universities.

During Dr. Ransdell's tenure, WKU's athletic programs have won over 100 Conference Championships. WKU also leads Conference USA in academic performance. He served as President of the Sun Belt Conference in 2000, and completed in 2013 a four-year term on the BCS Presidents' Oversight Committee. Dr. Ransdell successfully negotiated a move to Conference USA in 2014.

Dr. Ransdell has chaired on the Board of Directors of the Louisville Branch of the St. Louis Federal Reserve Bank, has served on the Board for the Bowling Green Area Chamber of Commerce, the Board for the Inter-modal Transportation Authority of South Central Kentucky, and has chaired the Warren County United Way Campaign. Dr. Ransdell currently serves on the Board of Trustees for the Institute for Shipboard Education (ISE) which operates the global Semester at Sea (SAS) program.

Dr. Ransdell and Julie met, dated, and were married while at WKU pursuing their undergraduate degrees. They have two sons—Patrick, who graduated from WKU in 2002; and Matthew, who graduated from WKU in 2006. Both Patrick and Matthew were lettermen with the WKU baseball team.

Patrick and Brooke (WKU '04) were married in August 2004, and are the parents of Walker and Collins Ransdell, WKU classes of 2029 and 2033! Matthew and Sandra were married in 2014, and both practice law in Tampa, Florida.

Further evidence that Gary and Julie are "all in" for WKU is Spirit and Diddle, their yellow lab and English cocker spaniel!



TODD STEWART

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

EIGHTH YEAR AT WKU | MIAMI (OHIO) '88

Operating with a fast break mentality from the day he was hired, Todd Stewart's tenure as WKU's Director of Athletics has been marked by consistent success for the Hilltoppers on the field of play, in the classroom, and in the community. In his first three years at the helm, 322 student-athletes obtained their degrees, WKU captured 21 total conference championships, and the athletic department staff, coaches and players have devoted close to 4,000 hours of community service. Stewart also played an instrumental role in elevating WKU's athletic programs to Conference USA on July 1, 2014.

In the Hilltoppers inaugural season in Conference USA in 2014-15, 104 student-athletes graduated and WKU became the first school in the league's 20-year history to win eight conference championships and a bowl game in the same season. A total of 56 WKU athletes received 2015 C-USA Commissioner's Academic Medals for having a grade point average of 3.75 or higher, the most of any school in the league. WKU also had a league high 55 athletes earn Player of the Week honors. For the first time since 2008-09, WKU had six sport programs win conference titles for two consecutive seasons (volleyball, women's basketball, softball, men's indoor track, women's outdoor track and men's swimming). The football team captured the school's first ever FBS bowl win in the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl and gave WKU its second-straight eight-win season behind the strength of the nation's fourth-ranked offense. WKU was one of only 12 programs in the nation to have their volleyball, women's basketball and softball teams all earn spots in the NCAA Tournament. Women's basketball finished with a 30-5 record, becoming only the third men's or women's basketball team in school history with a 30-win season (men, 1938; women, 1986). Softball set the school record for highest single-season winning percentage (.720) which included NCAA Tournament wins over North Carolina and Georgia.

In its final year in the Sun Belt Conference in 2013-14, WKU won the league's all-sports championship for the sixth overall time but first since 2008. A total of 110 student-athletes graduated during the year, and WKU's volleyball, soccer,

and women's indoor and outdoor track teams captured Sun Belt Conference regular season championships while the men's swimming and diving team won the Conference USA Invitational. The Hilltoppers' 2013 football team posted a program Football Bowl Subdivision-era-best 8-4 overall record and had four wins over bowl eligible teams, more than the previous five seasons combined. WKU's men's outdoor track program finished tied for 18th in the nation, the highest national team finish for any WKU program since men's basketball reached the Sweet 16 in 2008.

A total of 108 student-athletes graduated in 2012-13, Stewart's first full-year as Director of Athletics, and five sport programs (volleyball, women's swimming and diving, men's track and field, men's basketball, softball) won conference championships. Despite a fifth-place conference finish in football, Stewart's navigation of the bowl landscape helped secure the program's first ever FBS bowl bid, an at-large appearance in the 2012 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl. Men's basketball became the first team in NCAA history to win their conference tournament two consecutive years by winning four games in four days each time. Softball posted two wins in the NCAA Tournament, the first in the program's history. Volleyball also capped a 33-4 season by winning the program's first-ever NCAA Tournament match.

A member of WKU's senior athletic staff since 2008 and 25-year veteran of collegiate and professional sports, Stewart was named WKU's Director of Athletics on May 9, 2012, after serving in the role on an interim basis since March 22.

Stewart has a wide range of experience on many different levels, including nearly two years as WKU's Senior Associate Athletic Director, over two years as WKU's Associate Athletic Director for Communications and Media Relations, more than three years as Associate Commissioner for Communications at the Sun Belt Conference and 15 years of communications and media relations experience with two different franchises in the National Football League.



Stewart joined WKU in June of 2008 after a 40-month stint as Associate Commissioner for Communications for the Sun Belt Conference, where he and his staff were responsible for internal and external communications for all Sun Belt Conference publicity. He also served on the BCS Media Relations Committee for college football's 2008 National Championship Game.

Prior to coming to the Sun Belt, Stewart worked in the National Football League for 15 years. He was hired by the Cleveland Browns as Executive Director of Communications and Media Relations in 1999, helping to create the franchise's communications/media relations department as it reentered the league as an expansion team. Stewart developed the Browns' strategy for releasing organizational messages via press conferences, press releases, interviews, the team's official web site and publications. Stewart assisted the NFL's public relations staff at Super Bowl XXXVI in New Orleans and was the AFC public relations representative at the 2000 Pro Bowl in Hawaii while with the Browns. He also served on the NFL's Media Policies Committee.

Prior to joining the Browns, Stewart was the Assistant Director of Public Relations for the Indianapolis Colts from 1991-99, where he helped direct activities between

the organization, community and media. While with Indianapolis, he worked on the NFL's public relations staff at Super Bowl XXVIII in Los Angeles and at three consecutive AFC Championship Games (1997-99). The Colts' public relations staff was presented the 1996 Pete Rozelle Award, an annual honor bestowed to the NFL's top PR staff as voted by the Pro Football Writers of America.

Stewart, 49, received his bachelor's degree in communications from Miami (Ohio) in 1988, where he twice received the Miami University Parents' Council Student Achievement Award for outstanding service to the university. He worked as a graduate assistant in the sports information department at the University of Tennessee from 1988-90. Stewart currently serves on the Board of Directors for the United Way of Southern Kentucky and is also a member of the Bowling Green Rotary.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Stewart and his wife, Rebecca, have one son, Blake (15).

The Carol and Denny Wedge Student Athlete Success Center opened in January of 2009. SASC is a 10,000 square foot academic complex located in Houchens Smith Stadium and houses the academic advising staff, a computer laboratory and a large study area designated solely for use by student-athletes. The Student Athlete Success Center is also equipped with conference rooms, and several private study rooms for WKU student-athletes to meet with athletic tutors on a one-to-one basis or work on class projects.

The mission of the Student Athlete Success Center is to help student-athletes have the most positive educational and personal experience possible at WKU. The SASC advisement staff has over 50 years of combined experience. We strive to be the resource hub for WKU student-athletes to obtain success academically and in life after sports.

GOALS OF THE ACADEMIC PROGRAM

- To ensure compliance with WKU and NCAA academic requirements
- To provide academic support services, which will assist student-athletes in achieving academic success with tutorial assistance and proper course selection
- To offer educational workshops focusing on career and personal development
- To assist student-athletes in determining career goals and interests
- To exceed general student population semester and cumulative grade point average
- To exceed general student population graduation rate
- To achieve a minimum Academic Progress Rate (APR) of 930 for all sports

CONFERENCE LEADERS IN ACADEMICS

Academic achievement is a high priority on The Hill, and a total of 56 WKU student-athletes earned the Conference USA Commissioner's Academic Medal, with a league-high 54 coming from C-USA-sponsored sports, for having a cumulative grade point average of 3.75 or better.

from Conference USA for maintaining a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better during the 2014-15 academic year.

WKU has also seen over 2,200 student-athletes honored by the conference office since 2004-05.

Academic success is not confined to just one sport, but a major emphasis across all of them. Each of WKU's 18 athletic teams exceeded the NCAA-mandated 930 Academic Progress Rate score through the 2013-14 academic year by at least 17 points, with two programs (Volleyball and Women's Tennis) achieving a perfect score of 1,000.

HILLTOPPERS WITH HEART

Hilltoppers with Heart is WKU's community service initiative, designed to give WKU student-athletes, coaches and staff the unique opportunity to make an impact in the community by volunteering their time and talent with numerous organizations.

WKU Athletics has a commitment to growing sports in the Bowling Green community and the ability to demonstrate leadership in social responsibility. In 2014, the Hilltoppers combined to contribute over 2,000 hours of community service to Bowling Green and its surrounding areas.

THE SPIRIT OF WESTERN

Big Red, Western Kentucky University's athletic mascot, was born in the fall of 1979 and celebrates its birthday on December 1st. Big Red can be best described as the Spirit of Western!

The huge, furry, lovable creature was originally designed and built by WKU student Ralph Carey, ('80 WKU graduate), of Cincinnati, and made its debut during the Hilltoppers' 1979-80 basketball season. Big Red has become a big hit with fans of all ages throughout the state and the nation. Big Red's signature moves are the belly slide and belly shake.

Big Red is an eight-time participant in the Capital One Mascot Challenge and, in 2012, Big Red was named the first member of the Capital One Mascot Hall of Fame.

Prior to the 2013 season, *Sports Illustrated* rated Big Red as the number nine mascot in college football. Of course, on The Hill, we all think Big Red is No. 1.

The ultimate fan and supporter of all WKU's intercollegiate sports, Big Red won the "Key to Spirit" award, the highest honor presented to team mascots at the time, at the Universal Cheerleading Association competition in 1980, 1981 and again in 1983.

In the spring of 1990, Big Red reached the "Final Four" of the UCA's second annual national championship event in San Antonio, TX, taking third-place honors. Then, in the spring of 1996, Big Red reached the "Final Four" of ESPN SportZone's "Battle of the Mascots" in public balloting on the Internet.

Big Red was the centerpiece of ESPN's promotion of the 25,000th Sports Center, airing in August 2002.

In 2005, Big Red placed second at the Universal Cheerleader Association's Summer Camp in Knoxville, TN. Also, in 2005 Big Red was voted the favorite mascot (of participating schools) at the NCAA Mascot Mania celebration in Indianapolis, Ind.





CONFERENCE USA



Conference USA enters its third decade in 2015-16 as it continues to compete and promote the success of its student-athletes. The league has adapted to the ever-changing landscape of collegiate athletics over its first 20 seasons, but the commitment to excellence, integrity, leadership and its student athletes in competition, academics and community is unwavering.

Conference USA enjoys a far-reaching fan base with its 14 members: Charlotte, FIU, Florida Atlantic, Louisiana Tech, Marshall, Middle Tennessee, North Texas, Old Dominion, Rice, Southern Miss, UAB, UTEP, UTSA and WKU.

Debuting in 1995, Conference USA teams have combined for 88 bowl appearances in football, 102 NCAA Tournament appearances in basketball, including three Final Fours, 63 NCAA baseball appearances including six College World Series berths, 79 NCAA soccer tournament appearances including four trips to the College Cup, and 35 individual national champions in track and field and cross country.

Success is not limited to athletic achievement, however, as 197 Conference USA student-athletes have garnered Academic All-America honors, 691 have achieved academic all-district laurels and thousands of student-athletes have earned a college degree.

Conference USA sponsors competition in 19 sports – nine for men (baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field) and 10 for women (basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball).

The league promotes the scholar-athlete ideal, honoring outstanding academic achievement with numerous conference-sponsored awards, including the Commissioner's Honor Roll and the Commissioner's Academic Medal as well as sport-specific All-Academic teams.

C-USA annually awards postgraduate scholarships, along with the Sport Academic Awards, Scholar-Athletes of the Year and the Institutional Academic Excellence Award. Additionally, Conference USA presents a Spirit of Service Award three times each year, recognizing student-athletes who excel on the field, in the classroom and give back to the community through significant service efforts and participation.

SUCCESS ON THE PLAYING FIELD

Conference USA performers have achieved great success in competition, placing the league among the top conferences in the nation.

In addition to the numerous NCAA Tournament berths, C-USA has sent four men's soccer teams to the NCAA College Cup, three softball teams to the Women's College World Series and three volleyball teams to the NCAA Sweet 16. The league has also had 35 national champions in NCAA track and field competition, one national champion in diving, and numerous NCAA individual and team competitors in cross country, golf, swimming, tennis, and track and field. Overall, Conference USA teams and individuals have made more than 1,900 NCAA appearances.

SUCCESS OFF THE FIELD

C-USA institutions are among the nation's best in academic performance of student-athletes, bolstered by the fact that student-athletes at league schools have a higher graduation rate than the general student population. Among C-USA's 5,000 student-athletes, there are champions off the playing field as well. In 20 years, nearly 30,000 student-athletes have been named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll or received the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom.

C-USA ON TV

C-USA enjoys significant television exposure through partnerships with FOX Sports Media Group, CBS Sports Network, ESPN and American Sports Network (ASN). The multi-tiered selection process that is rooted in partnering with all four networks has substantially increased the number of national and regional appearances for football, men's and women's basketball, and all other conference sports.

C-USA membership include institutions within eight of the Top 40 media markets and four in the Top 25 according to Nielsen. C-USA home markets this year will include more than 13 million TV households, a 30 percent increase from two years ago.

C-USA DIGITAL NETWORK

The C-USA Digital Network officially launched in August of 2011. Network programming includes live streaming of non-televized events, video on demand, a weekly C-USA studio

show, podcasting, regular-season and championship event highlights, and conference-produced feature stories. In its first year, 1,164 events were streamed live and 8,126 videos were posted and available on the C-USA Digital Network, and those numbers have more than doubled. Monthly and yearly subscriptions provide fans access to events offered on all of the C-USA member institution's athletic websites as well as C-USA network programming.

C-USA IN THE COMMUNITY

The conference's current footprint is concentrated with 14 members in 10 states and a combined area population of more than 30 million. With a commitment to community involvement, the conference developed several initiatives to maintain strong ties in C-USA cities, as well as with fans and alumni across the country. C-USA schools also place a priority on giving back to their communities through volunteer service with local and national organizations. Individually, student-athletes are recognized each season through the Spirit of Service award.

GOVERNANCE

Conference USA has significant representation in the NCAA governance structure. The presidents of the member institutions serve as the league's Board of Directors.

A PROUD HISTORY

Conference USA was formed in 1995 and quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences. The conference unveiled its name, logo and commissioner April 24, 1995, in Chicago. The league's charter members were Charlotte, Cincinnati, DePaul, Houston, Louisville, Marquette, Memphis, Saint Louis, Southern Miss, Tulane, UAB and USF. Eleven of the institutions began athletic participation in 1995, while Houston joined competition in the fall of 1996.

The league's headquarters were established in Chicago and, after nine years, relocated to the current office in Irving, Texas. Britton Banowsky was named Commissioner in October 2002, succeeding Mike Slive, the league's first commissioner.

C-USA added East Carolina (September, 1996) and the United States Military Academy (March, 1997) as football members. ECU began league competition in 1997; Army in 1998 and UAB began football play in 1999. The league brought in TCU and ECU (1999) for all sports and they began competition in 2001. USF started C-USA football in 2003. Marshall, Rice, SMU, Tulsa, UCF and UTEP became full-time Conference USA members for all sports in 2005.

In 2013, charter member Charlotte returned to C-USA and was joined by new members FIU, Florida Atlantic, Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee, North Texas, Old Dominion and UTSA. WKU joined the league on July 1, 2014.





2015 C-USA FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Conference USA will host its 11th football championship game in 2015.

The event is slated for Saturday, December 5, and will be televised by ESPN or ESPN 2. The team with the highest league winning percentage will serve as host site for the game.

The title game will feature champions from the East and West divisions of the league. Six different schools have hosted the first 10 championship games.

Marshall won its first Conference USA Football Championship last season with a 23-16 win over Louisiana Tech in Huntington, W. Va. Southern Miss won the 2011 C-USA Championship, when the nationally-ranked Golden Eagles defeated previously undefeated Houston on the Cougars home field. Former members East Carolina, Tulsa and UCF each won two championship games, while Houston claimed one crown.

C-USA BOWL OVERVIEW 2015-2019

Conference USA will have 11 bowl affiliations through the 2019 season, securing a minimum of five berths annually and offering fans a number of great destinations across America and beyond.

Conference USA has agreements with three bowls in the state of Florida: the Boca Raton Bowl, the Miami Beach Bowl and the St. Petersburg Bowl, along with an agreement with the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl near the coast of the Sunshine State. C-USA maintains longtime relationships with the Zaxby's Heart of Dallas Bowl and the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl in the central region as well as the Gildan New Mexico Bowl in the southwest and the Hawaii Bowl in the far West. New this year will be an agreement with the new Arizona Bowl in Tucson, Ariz.

Conference USA has secondary agreements with two bowls also located right within the league's footprint, giving teams the opportunities to participate in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl in Fort Worth, Texas and the Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La.

In these bowls, Conference USA will have the opportunity to face opponents from the American Athletic, Big 12, Big Ten, Mid-American, Mountain West and Sun Belt Conferences.

C-USA BOWL 2015 SYNOPSIS

Conference USA has secured guaranteed commitments with seven bowl partners for the 2015 season, as well as one secondary agreement: The Arizona, Gildan New Mexico, Miami Beach, Popeyes Bahamas, R+L Carriers New Orleans, St. Petersburg and Zaxby's Heart of Dallas Bowls are primary agreements. The Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La., is a secondary agreement, should the ACC or SEC not be able to provide a bowl-eligible team. There is no set selection order among C-USA's bowl partners.

As a member of the College Football Playoff, Conference USA will be a part of one of the CFP bowls if it produces the highest rated champion from among the American Athletic, C-USA, Mid-American, Mountain West and Sun Belt Conferences.

The Playoff

During 2014-15 season, college football entered a new era when postseason playoffs began. The format is simple: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and a national championship game played in a different city each year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

The Selection Committee

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performance during the regular season, including, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game.

The Rotation

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.

For the 2015-16 season, the Peach Bowl (Dec. 31), Fiesta Bowl (Dec. 31), Rose Bowl presented by Northwestern Mutual (Jan. 1) and Allstate Sugar Bowl (Jan. 1) will host its regular bowl games, while the Capital One Orange (Dec. 31) and Goodyear Cotton Bowl (Dec. 31) will host semifinals. The College Football Championship will be held on Monday, Jan. 11 in Glendale, Ariz.

C-USA and the College Football Playoff

As a member of the College Football Playoff, Conference USA will be a part of one of the College Football Playoff bowls if it has the highest rated champion from among the American Athletic, C-USA, Mid-American, Mountain West and Sun Belt Conferences.
